JURY LISTS TO BE PREPARED FOR THE JURY DISTRICTS OF CAMPERDOWN AND JAMIESON.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the eighth day of February, 1864.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for regulating Juries*, it is amongst other things enacted, that in case any assizes, or any county court or court of general sessions of the peace, shall hereafter be lawfully directed or appointed to be holden at any town other than those at which the same are now holden, the clerk of petty sessions at such court town, and the clerk of petty sessions at every other town or place within the jury district of such court town, and all justices, constables, officers of police, and sheriffs, shall, within such time as the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, shall order for that occasion only, do and perform all such acts, matters, and things in and towards preparing, correcting, allowing, sending and delivering the lists of men qualified and liable to serve as aforesaid, and making out the jury books for every such jury district as are thereinbefore required to be ordinarily done at a different time or period; and all such last-mentioned jury books shall be brought into use, and the persons whose names shall be therein set down shall be liable to serve immediately after the same shall have been made out by the sheriff; and the said last-mentioned books shall be used until new books shall have been prepared under the provisions thereinbefore contained: And whereas by Orders in Council made on the twenty-eighth day of December, 1863, and the eighth day of February, 1864, it is ordered that county courts shall be holden at Camperdown and Jamieson, the same being places at which county courts have not previously been holden: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that jury lists shall be prepared for the respective jury districts of Camperdown and Jamieson, and that the several acts required by law be done within the times hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

The Clerk of Petty Sessions at Camperdown shall issue his warrant to prepare and make out the jury list for the jury district of Camperdown, on or before Monday, the fifteenth day of February instant; such list shall be prepared forthwith, and the notice prescribed by the eighth section of the said Act shall be affixed, as provided by that Act, on Sunday, the sixth and thirteenth days respectively of the month of March now next ensuing; the court of petty sessions at Camperdown aforesaid shall revise such list on Thursday, the seventeenth day of March aforesaid; such list shall be sent to the sheriff on or before Monday, the twenty-first day of the same month of March; and the jury book shall be prepared and brought into use on or before Friday, the first day of April, in the present year.

The Clerk of Petty Sessions at Jamieson shall issue his warrant to prepare and make out the jury list for the jury district of Jamieson, on or before Monday, the fifteenth day of February instant; such list shall be prepared forthwith, and the notice prescribed by the eighth section of the said Act shall be affixed, as provided by that Act, on Sunday, the sixth and thirteenth days respectively of the month of March now next ensuing; the court of petty sessions at Jamieson aforesaid shall revise such list on Thursday, the seventeenth day of March aforesaid; such list shall be sent to the sheriff on or before Monday, the twenty-first day of the same month of March; and the jury book shall be prepared and brought into use on or before Friday, the first day of April, in the present year.

And the Honorable Archibald Michie, Her Majesty's Minister of Justice for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions hereon accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for the more easy Recovery of certain Debts and Demands*, it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, to direct that county courts shall be holden for the recovery of debts and demands under the said Act, and from time to time, with the advice aforesaid, to direct in what towns and places a county court shall be holden, and that the judge of each court holden under the said Act shall attend and hold such court at the place where the Governor, with the advice aforesaid, shall have directed that such court shall be holden, at such times as such judge shall appoint for that purpose, so that a court shall be holden in such place once at least in such interval as the Governor, with the advice aforesaid,

shall in each case direct: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that a county court shall be holden for the recovery of debts and demands under the said Act, at the place and within the interval following, that is to say:—

At Jamieson, once at least in every six calendar months.

And the Honorable Archibald Michie, Her Majesty's Minister of Justice for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty (Number 14), intituled, *An Act to provide for the Management of Towns and other places in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that so many of the provisions of the said Act as relate to the good order of towns and other populous places, being sections numbered V., VI., VII., VIII., IX., and X., in the said Act, shall extend to and be in force in such cities, towns, districts, and places as the Lieutenant Governor may by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare to come under the operation of the same respectively, or any of them; and it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor to define the limits of such places, and to vary and alter such limits and revoke any such Proclamation; and all the other provisions of the said Act except the last (being numbered XXXIX.) shall extend to and be in operation throughout Victoria and its dependencies from and after the passing thereof: Now I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare that the place, the limits whereof are hereinafter defined, comprising the township of Mornington and its vicinity, shall come under the operation of the sections of the said Act numbered respectively V., VI., VII., VIII., IX., and X. And I do define the limits of the aforesaid place in manner following, viz.:—Commencing at a point on the sea coast, bearing N. 39° W. from the north-east angle of allotment 12, parish of Moorooduc; thence S. 39° E. by a line and the north-eastern boundaries of allotments 12, 10, 9, 8, 7, and 6, to the south-east angle of the last-named allotment; thence by the south-eastern boundaries of allotments 6, 32, 33, 47, and 48, bearing S. 35° W. to the southern angle of the last-named allotment; thence by the south-western boundaries of allotments 48, 45, 44 (all in the parish of Moorooduc), and a line (crossing a road 150 links wide), bearing N. 55° W. to the sea coast, and by the sea coast northerly to the point of commencement.

THE UNITED BOROUGH AND GOLD FIELD COMMON OF ARARAT shall comprise the neighboring commons described after the name of Ararat in two several Proclamations of town and gold fields commons, bearing date respectively the twenty-eighth day of January, 1861, and shall be for the benefit off all persons entitled to commonage on either of the said commons.—(64.I.680.)

THE UNITED BOROUGH AND GOLD FIELD COMMON OF SMYTHESDALE shall comprise the Town Common for Smythesdale, described in a Proclamation bearing date the fifteenth day of July, 1861, and the gold field common described after the name of Smythesdale in another Proclamation bearing date the twenty-eighth day of January, 1861, and shall be for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either of the said commons.—(64.J.612.)

**DECLARING A CERTAIN PORTION OF THE PROVINCE OF  
OTAGO TO BE AN INFECTED DISTRICT, UNDER THE

WHEREAS by section 10 of the *Diseased Cattle Act, 1861*, passed by the General Assembly of New Zealand, it is enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to the Governor that any infectious or contagious disease has broken out amongst cattle in any district of the colony, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by Order in Council, to declare that such district is infected within the meaning of the said Act, and from time to time to make such regulations for destroying cattle therein, and for prohibiting the removal or transportation of cattle from one part of the colony to another, and for preventing the further spread of such disease: And whereas by section 14 of the same Act it is enacted that the Governor in Council may, by warrant under his hand from time to time, delegate to the superintendent of any province within the colony, all or any of the powers vested in the Governor or Governor in Council by the said Act:

And whereas the Governor in Council hath, by warrant under his hand, delegated to me, John Hyde Harris, so long as I shall hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Otago, the several powers vested in the Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act:

And whereas it has been made to appear to me that a certain infectious or contagious disease has broken out amongst cattle imported into the district of Waikouaiti, in the said province: Now therefore I, the said John Hyde Harris, by virtue of the powers delegated to me in this behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare that from and after the date hereof, until further

notice, that portion of the province of Otago in the colony of New Zealand, hereinafter described, shall be deemed an infected district within the meaning and for the purposes of the said *Diseased Cattle Act, 1861*, that is to say, all that area situate in the north-eastern district of the province of Otago; bounded towards the north by Shag River; towards the east by the ocean; towards the south by the southern boundary line of the Waikouaiti Native Reserve; thence by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station L, in the said Waikouaiti survey district; thence towards the west by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station O, of the Waikouaiti survey district; thence by a line due north to the Waikouaiti River; and thence by the boundary of New Hawkesbury Hundred to the Shag River.

And that no cattle, from and after the date hereof until further notice, shall be permitted to be removed or transported from the said infected district.

And whereas it has been made to appear to me that a certain contagious or infectious disease has broken out amongst cattle imported into the said province: Now therefore I, the said John Hyde Harris, by virtue of the powers delegated to me in this behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare that from and after the date hereof until further notice, that portion of the province of Otago, in the colony of New Zealand, hereinafter described, shall be deemed an infected district within the meaning and for the purposes of the said *Diseased Cattle Act, 1861*, that is to say, all that area bounded towards the north by Allen's Creek to its source; thence by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station L, in the said Waikouaiti survey district; thence towards the east by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station O, of the Waikouaiti survey district; and thence by a direct line to Brinn's Point; thence towards the south by the ocean to the mouth of the Taieri River; and thence towards the west by the Taieri River to the Waipori Lake and the Waipori River to Verter Burn; thence to Allen's Creek, the starting point.

And that no cattle, from and after the date hereof until further notice, shall be permitted to be removed or transported from the said infected district.

WHEREAS by section 9 of the *Diseased Cattle Act, 1861*, passed by the General Assembly of New Zealand, it is enacted, that if at any time it shall be made to appear to the Governor that any infectious or contagious disease has broken out in any district out of the colony, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by Order in Council, to declare that such district is infected within the meaning of this Act, and from time to time to make such regulations as to him shall seem fit, for prohibiting the importation of cattle into the colony from such district, and the landing or driving such cattle, and for destroying cattle imported, landed, or driven, contrary to such regulations;

And whereas, by section 14 of the same Act, it is enacted that the Governor in Council may, by warrant under his hand, from time to time, delegate to the superintendent of any province within the colony, all or any of the powers vested in the Governor or Governor in Council by the said Act:

And whereas the Governor in Council hath, by warrant under his hand, delegated to me, John Hyde Harris, so long as I shall hold the office of Superintendent of the province of Otago, the several powers vested in the Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act:

Now therefore I, the said John Hyde Harris, by virtue of the powers delegated to me in this behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare that, from and after the date hereof, all the Australian ports, with the exception of Gipps Land and Mornington, shall be deemed infected districts, places, or ports, within the meaning and for the purposes of the above-mentioned Act; and that no cattle from and after the date hereof, until further notice, shall be permitted to be imported into the province of Otago, from any of the said Australian ports, with the exception of Gipps Land and Mornington aforesaid.

PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by virtue of the powers in me vested in that behalf, I, John Hyde Harris, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, did, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* of the said province, dated the fourteenth day of January instant, declare to be an infected district within the meaning of the *Diseased Cattle Act, 1861*, all that part of the said province lying and being within the north-eastern district of the said province, and bounded towards the north by Shag River, towards the east by the ocean, towards the south by the southern boundary line of the Waikouaiti Native Reserve; thence by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station L of the Waikouaiti survey district; thence towards the west by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station O of the Waikouaiti survey district; thence by a line due north to the Waikouaiti River; and thence by the boundary of New Hawkesbury Hundred to the Shag River:

And whereas by virtue of the said powers I did by another proclamation in the said *Gazette*, dated the sixteenth day of January instant, declare to be an infected district within the meaning of the said Act, all that part of the said province bounded towards the north by Verter Burn to its source; thence by a direct line to the mouth of Allen's Creek on the eastern side of the Taieri River; thence by Allen's Creek to its source; thence by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station O, Waikouaiti survey district; thence towards the east by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station L, in the said Waikouaiti survey district; and thence by a direct line to Brinn's Point; thence towards the south by the ocean to the mouth of the Taieri River; and thence towards the west by the Taieri River, the Waipori Lake, and the Waipori River to Verter Burn; thence to Allen's Creek, the starting point: Now therefore by virtue of the powers vested in me in that behalf, I do make public and proclaim the following regulations for the destruction of diseased cattle in the districts, by the said proclamations declared to be infected districts, and for prohibiting the removal and transportation of cattle out of the said infected districts respectively, and for preventing the further spread of the disease called pleuro-pneumonia:—

REGULATIONS.

1. That if any inspector appointed under the *Diseased Cattle Act, 1861*, for the infected districts above described, shall at any time have reasonable grounds to suspect that any cattle within the infected districts above described are infected with pleuro-pneumonia, or any other infectious disease, it shall be his duty and he is hereby authorised forthwith, or as soon as he conveniently can, to proceed to and enter into and upon the place whether enclosed or otherwise, where such cattle are, or are supposed by him to be, and by inspecting such cattle or in any other manner shall satisfy himself whether such cattle, or any of them, are infected, or may be reasonably suspected to be infected with pleuro-pneumonia or any other infectious disease, or whether same are free from pleuro-pneumonia and other infectious diseases.

2. That if such inspector shall be satisfied that such cattle, or any of them, are actually infected with pleuro-pneumonia or other infectious disease, he shall forthwith give to the owner, or the person having the custody, charge or possession of the said cattle, notice of which of the said cattle he deems actually infected; and such owner or person aforesaid shall within twenty-four hours after such notice destroy the cattle so deemed infected, and shall forthwith bury four feet under ground, or burn the carcasses of the cattle so destroyed; and if the owner or person having the custody or possession of the cattle deemed by the inspector to be infected cannot readily be found, or if such owner or person neglect to destroy the cattle deemed infected, after the receipt of the notice aforesaid, any inspector for the said infected districts may seize and destroy, or cause to be seized and destroyed, such cattle so deemed infected.

3. That if any owner of cattle, or any person having the custody or charge of cattle, shall after having received such notice as aforesaid, neglect or refuse to destroy the same, or any of them, within twenty-four hours after such notice, such owner

or person aforesaid shall be liable to a fine, or penalty of Fifty pounds for every head of cattle which he shall have neglected or refused to destroy.

4. That if any owner of cattle which any such inspector, as aforesaid, has notified to be infected, or if any person having the custody, care, or possession of any such cattle, shall, after the same, or any of them, have been destroyed, neglect or refuse to bury four feet under ground, or to burn the carcasses thereof, within twenty-four hours after the destruction thereof, such owner or person aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds for every carcass which he shall neglect or refuse to bury or burn.

5. That if any inspector for the infected districts, proclaimed as aforesaid, shall suspect that any cattle within the said infected districts are infected with pleuro-pneumonia, or any other infectious disease, but shall not be satisfied that such cattle are actually infected, he may, if he shall think fit, order the owner or person having the custody or being in possession of such cattle, to drive, or cause to be driven, the said cattle to such place within the said infected districts proclaimed as aforesaid, as he may think fit, there to be kept until he shall give permission for their removal.

6. That the inspectors of diseased cattle under the said Act, for the said districts proclaimed, as aforesaid, shall forthwith cause to be publicly posted or exhibited at and about all the main thoroughfares leading into the said infected districts proclaimed as aforesaid, notice that the said infected districts have been so proclaimed and declared infected.

7. That if any person shall drive or remove, or cause to be driven or removed, or assist in driving or removing any cattle out from the said infected districts proclaimed as aforesaid, such person shall be liable to a fine of Fifty pounds for every head of such cattle so driven out from the said infected districts proclaimed as aforesaid.

8. That it shall be lawful for any inspector of the said infected districts proclaimed as aforesaid, or any police constable, having reasonable grounds to suspect that any cattle are about to be driven out from the said infected districts proclaimed as aforesaid, to seize the same, and take charge thereof, until he shall be satisfied that no attempt will be made to drive such cattle out from the said infected districts proclaimed as aforesaid.

9. That in case any person shall wilfully impede or obstruct any inspector or any police constable acting under the authority of these regulations, every person so offending shall and may be seized and detained by such person so acting as aforesaid, or any person or persons he may call to his assistance, until such offender or offenders can be taken before two justices of the peace, and shall be liable to a penalty of Fifty pounds.

10. That all owners or persons having the custody, care, or possession of any cattle within the said infected districts proclaimed as aforesaid shall, within fourteen days from this day, give a notice to the officer in charge of the police station nearest to the place where such cattle are kept or are, containing the number of such cattle, the particulars as nearly as can be of the place or places where such cattle are kept or are, and the brands with which they are branded.

11. That the inspector or inspectors for the said infected districts proclaimed as aforesaid shall make a report in writing, to the superintendent of the province, of all things done by him or them under these regulations and under the said Act, as and when he or they shall be required so to do.

12. That the inspector or inspectors may, if he or they shall think fit, grant a certificate to the owner of any cattle destroyed under or by virtue of the said Act, or these regulations, recommending a grant to such owners of compensation for such destruction; but compensation shall in no case exceed £3 per head for cattle under two years, or £6 per head for cattle above that age.

#### WORKS ON MAIN ROADS ORDERED UNDER "THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1863."

THE Governor in Council, in exercise of the power conferred by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, has, by divers Orders severally made on the 28th and 31st days of December, 1863, directed that the undermentioned Councils of Shires and District Boards of Road Districts shall within the times by the said respective Orders appointed execute the works on Main Roads hereinafter named and described, as provided by the 220th section of the said Act, that is to say:—

The Council of the Shire of Ballarat shall, pursuant to Order in Council made on the 28th day of December, 1863, and within twelve months from the making thereof, execute the following works on the main road from Ballarat to Ararat, according to a plan deposited by the said council with the Board of Land and Works, and recorded as (63.2792.), viz.:—No. 1, Between the 6 and 7 mile-posts, sixty chains of road to be formed, pitched, and metalled; No. 2, Near the 8 mile-post, thirty chains of road to be pitched and metalled; No. 3, Between the 10 and 11 mile-posts, forty-three chains of road to be pitched and metalled; No. 4, Between the 10 and 11 mile-posts, a bridge to be constructed over Burrumbeet Creek; No. 5, Between the 11 and 12 mile-posts, fifty-seven chains of road to be pitched and metalled; No. 6, Between the 6 and 12 mile-posts, three hundred chains of drains to be formed; No. 7, Near the 12 mile-post, ten chains of road to be pitched and metalled.

The Council of the Shire of Hampden shall, pursuant to Order in Council made on the 31st day of December, 1863, and within twelve months from the making thereof, execute the following works on the Geelong to Warrnambool main road, according to plans deposited by the said council with the Board of Land and Works, and recorded as (63.2958.), viz.:—The parts of the said main road to be drained, formed, and metalled, are as follow: 1st, Twenty chains at Brough's Hill, at the west end of Camperdown; 2nd, Ninety chains about two miles east of Camperdown; 3rd, Eighteen chains near the fifth mile-post east of Camperdown; 4th, Forty-six chains near the sixth mile-post east from Camperdown; 5th, Fifty-six chains and sixty-three links, in two several portions, one thereof situated at Terang, and the other about two miles east of that township; 6th, Four miles forty-four chains and twelve links of road extending westerly from the Parin Yallock Creek.

The Council of the Shire of Portland shall, pursuant to Order in Council made on the 28th day of December, 1863, and within twelve months from the making thereof, execute the following works on the main road between Heywood and Casterton, according to a plan deposited by the said council with the Board of Land and Works, and recorded as (63.2735.), viz.:—Eleven chains of the said main road, being in the main street of the township of Digby, to be drained, formed, and metalled.

The District Board of the Ararat Road District shall, pursuant to Orders in Council, severally made on the 31st day of December, 1863, and within twelve months from the making thereof, execute the following works on the main Ballarat to Ararat road, according to plans deposited by the said District Board with the Board of Land and Works, and recorded as (63.2951.) and (63.2952.), viz.:—1st, Eleven chains of road to be drained, formed, and metalled, channel to be excavated for creek, and a timber bridge to be constructed, at the Billy-billy Creek, near Buangor, on the Ararat and Raglan portion of the said main road, according to plan recorded as (63.2951.); 2nd, Road from Dobie's Bridge to Buangor, on the Ararat and Raglan portion of the said main road, to be drained and formed according to plan recorded as (63.2952.).

The District Board of the Woody Yallock Road District shall, pursuant to Order in Council made on the 28th day of December, 1863, and within twelve months from the making thereof, execute the following works on the main road from Ballarat to Smythesdale, according to a plan deposited by the said District Board with the Board of Land and Works, and recorded as (63.2748.), viz.:—The parts of the said main road where the works are to be executed are at Cardigan, and the works consist of forming and metalling seventy-two chains and one hundred and fifty-eight chains of drains.

**BOROUGH OF SANDRIDGE.**

BYE-LAW No. 24.—FOR REGULATING THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS OF THE SANDRIDGE BOROUGH COMMON.

WHEREAS by section 69 of the Act of Parliament 25 Victoria No. 145, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to the sale and occupation of Crown Lands*, it is provided that the council of any municipal district within or in the vicinity of which any town or municipal common is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-laws prescribe, three persons to be the managers of such town or municipal common, and may at any time remove any one or more of such managers, and elect others in their stead: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the borough of Sandridge:—

1. That the election for the appointment of managers of the Sandridge Borough Common shall be held annually at the second ordinary meeting of the council subsequent to the date of the annual election of councillors, with the exception of the first election of managers, which shall take place at the first meeting of the council subsequent to the publication of this present bye-law in the *Government Gazette*.

2. That at any meeting for the election of managers, any member of the council may propose the names of the same number of persons as there are vacancies to be filled up, and in the event of there being more persons proposed than there are vacancies, the voting shall be on cards provided for the purpose, on which the voter shall write the name or names of the candidate or candidates he supports, and sign his own name. The result of such election shall be entered on the minutes of the day, and the voting cards shall be kept in the town clerk's office for twelve months as a record.

3. That when any one or more vacancies occur, through death, resignation, or removal from the council of any manager or managers during his or their term of office, the council shall as speedily as possible elect, in the same manner as hereinbefore provided, a person or persons to fill such vacancy or vacancies.

4. Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, it shall be lawful for the said council, instead of proceeding to the nomination and election of managers aforesaid, to adjourn any such meeting from time to time, as they may think proper, and the election taking place at any such adjourned meeting shall be equally valid.
