## THE WARANGA ROAD DISTRICT ADDED TO.

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight  
Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath,  
Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of  
Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time, if it shall seem fit, to add to any district not divided into subdivisions, or to any subdivision, or separately to two or more subdivisions of a district so divided, any portion of the colony actually adjoining to such district or subdivision, as the case may be, and not lying within the limits of the city of Melbourne or town of Geelong, or of any municipal or road district; and every such portion so added shall thereupon become and be part of such first-mentioned district to all intents and purposes, and of the subdivision, if any, to which the same shall have been added: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the first day of June, 1863, the boundaries of the Waranga road district were defined as therein mentioned: And whereas it has seemed fit to the Governor in Council to make an addition to the said road district by the extension of the northern boundary thereof: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the said addition to the Waranga road district by the extension of its northern boundary, in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act; and do hereby re-define the whole of the said road district added to as aforesaid, in manner following, that is to say:—

Commencing at a point in the centre of the River Campaspe where it is intersected by the south boundary line of the village reserve of Rochester; thence east to the south-east angle of the said reserve; thence by a direct line having a north-easterly bearing to a point in the centre of the River Goulburn due north of the northern angle of the Ardpatrik Run; thence south by the centre line of the said river to a point due east of Mount Camel; thence by a line due west to the centre of the River Campaspe; thence north by the centre of the said river to the commencing point.—(63.2399.)

## THE ECHUCA ROAD DISTRICT.

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight  
Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath,  
Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of  
Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for ten or more inhabitants of any part of Victoria not lying within the limits of the city of Melbourne or town of Geelong, or of any municipal or road district, and of whom each one shall possess property rateable under the said Act within the area next thereafter mentioned, to sign and present to the Governor a petition setting forth that the area, which shall by metes and bounds be described in such petition, contains not less than forty square miles, and rateable property whereof the net annual value is not less than Five thousand pounds, and praying that such area may be constituted a road district; and it is also enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, upon being satisfied that the statements set forth in the petition are true, and that it is desirable to comply with the prayer thereof, to constitute such part of Victoria, under such name as shall in and by the same Order in Council be assigned thereto, a new road district; and the words "proclaimed district," where used in the said Act, shall be deemed to mean such new district: And whereas a petition signed by more than ten inhabitants of the area or part of Victoria hereinafter described, possessing rateable property in such area, has been signed and presented to the Governor, setting forth the matters and things required by the said Act, and due notice of such petition has been published as provided by the said Act, and in compliance with the prayer thereof, an Order in Council, bearing even date herewith, has been made to constitute the said area a new road district: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby constitute and proclaim the part of Victoria hereinafter described to be a new road district, under the name assigned thereto, in and by the Order in Council hereinbefore mentioned, that is to say:—

THE ECHUCA ROAD DISTRICT.—Commencing at a point in the centre of the River Goulburn due north of the northern angle of the Ardpatrik Run; thence northerly by the centre line of the Goulburn River to its junction with the River Murray; thence by the course of the River Murray to the point where the eastern boundary of the Swan Hill road district intersects it; thence southerly, by the eastern boundary of the said district, to the northern boundary of the Campaspe road district; thence east by the said northern boundary of the said district to the centre of the Campaspe River; thence northerly by the centre of the Campaspe River to a point where it is intersected by the south boundary line of the village reserve of Rochester; thence east to the south-east angle of the said reserve; thence by a direct line having a north-easterly bearing to the commencing point.—(63.1693.)

# ADJUSTMENT OF THE BOUNDARIES OF THE SHIRES OF PORTLAND AND DUNDAS.

## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that for adjusting the boundaries of shires and districts to those of electoral districts, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, if it shall seem fit, but so far only as may be necessary for such adjustment, to do without petition all or any of certain acts therein mentioned, and amongst other acts to take away from any shire or district any portion thereof, and to add to any adjoining shire or district, or some one or more riding or subdivisions thereof the portion so taken away: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the thirty-first day of August, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the boundaries of the Portland road district and the Dundas road district were severally described: And whereas by two several Proclamations bearing date respectively the thirtieth day of November, in the year aforesaid, the said road districts were proclaimed and designated the Shire of Portland and the Shire of Dundas: And whereas it seems fit to adjust the boundary of the shire of Portland so as to make it coincide in part with that of the electoral district of Normanby, and also to adjust the boundary of the shire of Dundas so as to make it coincide in part with that of the electoral district of Dundas, and for the purpose of such adjustment it is necessary to take a portion from one shire and to add such portion to the other shire: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, do declare and proclaim that for the purpose of adjusting the boundary of the shire of Portland so that it shall coincide in part with that of the electoral district of Normanby, and for the purpose of adjusting the boundary of the shire of Dundas so that it shall coincide in part with that of the electoral district of Dundas, I have by and with the advice of the Executive Council, taken a portion from one of the said shires, and added such portion to the other of the said shires, as severally described in the Proclamation firstly hereinbefore mentioned; and in order more clearly to show the boundaries of the said respective shires altered as aforesaid, I do hereby re-define the same in manner following, that is to say:—

**THE SHIRE OF PORTLAND.**—Commencing on the sea-coast, at the south-east corner of South Australia; thence north by the eastern boundary line of South Australia to the south-west angle of the township of Lindsay; thence by a line east to the River Glenelg; thence southerly by the River Glenelg to its junction with the Stokes River; thence north-easterly by the Stokes River to a point south-west of the south-east angle of allotment 4, section iv, in the parish of Grassdale; thence by a line north-east to the said south-east angle of said allotment; thence north to the north-east angle of section iv, in the said parish; thence by a line north to the eastern angle of section xvii, in the parish of Tahara; thence by a line east to the centre of the road from Coleraine to Heywood; thence northerly by the centre of the said road to the Wannon River; thence by that river and the northern boundary of the electoral district of Normanby to a point due north of G. Cameron's pre-emptive right in the parish of Yulecart; thence south to the south-west angle of section iv, of the said parish; thence southerly by a direct line to the north-west angle of J. R. Nowlan's pre-emptive right; thence by the western boundary of the shire of Belfast to the sea-coast; thence westerly by the sea-coast to the commencing point—excepting the borough of Portland.—(63.2486.)

**THE SHIRE OF DUNDAS.**—Commencing at the junction of the Pigeon Ponds with the River Glenelg; thence south-easterly by the Pigeon Ponds and the most northern branch of the same to a point in the centre of the road from Harrow to Coleraine, where it crosses the said Pigeon Ponds; thence southerly by the centre of the said road to the south boundary of the township of Coleraine; thence southerly by the centre of the road from Coleraine to Heywood to a point where it intersects the southern boundary of the electoral district of Dundas; thence easterly by the said electoral boundary to a point due north of the western boundary of G. Cameron's pre-emptive right, in the parish of Yulecart, in the county of Normanby; thence south to the south-west angle of section iv, of the said parish; thence southerly by a direct line to the north-west angle of J. R. Nowlan's pre-emptive right; thence by the western boundary of said right to the south-west angle of the said right; thence by a direct line south-easterly to the north-west angle of the Weerancourt pre-emptive right; thence by the west boundary of the said right to the south-west angle thereof; thence by a line south-easterly to the north-west angle of section iv, of the parish of Macarthur; thence southerly by the western boundary of section iv, and the south-western boundary of section ii, of the said parish to the north-west angle of the township reserve of Macarthur; thence by the northern and eastern boundary of the said township reserve to the western boundary of the county of Villiers; thence northerly by the western boundary of the said county to the eastern boundary of the county of Dundas; thence by the eastern and northern boundary of the county of Dundas to the commencing point.—(63.2774.)

# THE BOROUGH OF CASTLEMAINE PARTLY EXCLUDED FROM THE OPERATION OF THE ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL LICENSING DISTRICTS.

## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and the Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act to make provision for the sale of fermented and spirituous liquors and of refreshments in certain districts*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, from time to time to proclaim any part or portion of the said colony to be a district subject to the provisions of the said Act, to be called a Special Licensing District, and to define the boundaries of such district, and from time to time to vary, alter, and revoke such boundaries and any such notice and proclamation: And whereas under and by virtue of divers proclamations under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date respectively the 16th day of February, 1863, the 21st day of January, 1869, the 18th day of June, 1860, the 12th day of August, 1861, and the 15th day of August, 1863, the portion of the colony now included within the boundaries of the borough of Castlemaine, amongst other localities, became subject to the provisions of the said Act: And whereas it is expedient to exclude the whole of the said borough, excepting the portion thereof occupied for the purposes of the Melbourne and Murray River Railway, from the operation of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, do hereby revoke so much of the said several proclamations as refers to the said borough of Castlemaine, save and except as to the land within the limits of the said borough occupied for the purposes of the Melbourne and Murray River Railway.

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

LIGHTHOUSES have been erected on Foul Point and Round Island in the entrance of Trincomalie Harbor. The lights are of the following description, and will be exhibited from sunset to sunrise every night after the 1st of February, 1864:—

**Foul Point.**—A flash light showing a brilliant flash every half minute, which is plainly visible 17 miles in clear weather, from a vessel's deck elevated 18 feet above the sea; a faint light is shown between the flashes, which is not visible beyond a distance of 7 miles.

**Round Island.**—A fixed bright light, which is plainly visible 10 miles in clear weather from a vessel's deck elevated 18 feet above the sea; it shows a red light when brought to bear between the points W. by S.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S. and S.W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S., which is not visible beyond a distance of 6 or 7 miles. Approaching between these bearings the bright light is not seen.

The following directions are for the guidance of vessels entering the inner harbor:—Approaching from the southward bring Foul Point light to bear west distant 2 miles; then steer N.W. until Round Island light bears W.S.W.; then steer direct for it until the extreme point of \* Chapel Hill bears north; then steer W. by N. until Round Island light bears S. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E.; then steer N. by W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W., passing midway between Osterberg Point and Sober Island, and keeping Round Island light bearing S. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E.; anchor immediately when the water is shoaled to  $\frac{1}{2}$  12 fathoms.

Approaching from the northward when Foul Point light is made, bring it to bear S. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E. and steer direct for it until Round Island light bears S.W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W.; then steer direct for it until the extreme point of Chapel Hill bears N. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E.; and then follow the directions already given for approaching from the southward after Chapel Hill bears north.

The red light is intended to direct vessels clear of the dangers off Foul Point and Chapel Rock; therefore vessels working into the harbor should be careful to keep within its limits.

\* Chapel Hill being a high bluff headland may be easily distinguished in the darkest night, as when brought to bear N. or N. by E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E., it will be only 12 mile distant, and will be the extreme point of land visible in that direction.

† The lead should be kept going after passing Osterberg Point, as the water shoals rapidly from 25 to 12 fathoms.

## PERMANENT RESERVATION AND CONTROL OF THE CITY PARK LANDS, ETC.

IN pursuance of the 8th section of *The Land Act, 1862*, and in accordance with an Order in Council made on the 1st day of February instant, it is hereby notified that it is the intention of the Governor in Council to permanently reserve from sale the lands hereinafter described, for purposes of public recreation.

It is also hereby notified that the Governor in Council has, by the same Order, directed the said lands to be vested in the Council of the City of Melbourne, as Trustees thereof.

The lands above referred to are the following, viz.:-

Any person hindering or preventing the removal to any quarantine ground of any cattle so reasonably suspected of being infected as aforesaid, which shall have been directed by the inspector to be removed to such quarantine ground, or in any way offending against those regulations, shall forfeit and pay any sum not less than One pound nor more than One hundred pounds.

THE exposure of carcasses of cattle dying, mostly from pleuro-pneumonia, on the Common Lands of this colony, having been urgently represented to the Central Board of Health as a source of excessive nuisance, and enquiries recently made having shown that in several districts the nuisance exists to an extent fully justifying anticipations of danger therefrom to the public health, the board desire to direct the attention of managers of commons to the subject, and would suggest to them the expediency of framing regulations, under the authority of the Land Act of 1862, to provide for the proper disposal of carcasses of cattle dying on lands under their control.

#### BOROUGH OF SANDRIDGE.

BYE-LAW No. 24.—FOR REGULATING THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS OF THE SANDRIDGE BOROUGH COMMON.

WHEREAS by section 69 of the Act of Parliament 25 Victoria No. 145, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to the sale and occupation of Crown Lands*, it is provided that the council of any municipal district within or in the vicinity of which any town or municipal common is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-laws prescribe, three persons to be the managers of such town or municipal common, and may at any time remove any one or more of such managers, and elect others in their stead: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the borough of Sandridge:—

1. That the election for the appointment of managers of the Sandridge Borough Common shall be held annually at the second ordinary meeting of the council subsequent to the date of the annual election of councillors, with the exception of the first election of managers, which shall take place at the first meeting of the council subsequent to the publication of this present bye-law in the *Government Gazette*.

2. That at any meeting for the election of managers, any member of the council may propose the names of the same number of persons as there are vacancies to be filled up, and in the event of there being more persons proposed than there are vacancies, the voting shall be on cards provided for the purpose, on which the voter shall write the name or names of the candidate or candidates he supports, and sign his own name. The result of such election shall be entered on the minutes of the day, and the voting cards shall be kept in the town clerk's office for twelve months as a record.

3. That when any one or more vacancies occur, through death, resignation, or removal by the council of any manager or managers during his or their term of office, the council shall as speedily as possible elect, in the same manner as hereinbefore provided, a person or persons to fill such vacancy or vacancies.
