## FEE PAYABLE IN CONNECTION WITH LICENSES FOR PASTORAL OCCUPATION.

Upon the issue of every yearly license to occupy runs for pastoral purposes under the provisions of the 80th clause of *The Land Act, 1862*, a Fee of One pound (£1) shall be payable for the same to the Treasury Department, under the provisions of the 133rd clause of the said Act.

## ADDITIONAL REGULATION UNDER "THE LAND ACT, 1862."

REFERRING to the Regulations relating to the issue of licenses by or under the authority of the Board of Land and Works for occupation of Crown Lands under the 53rd clause of *The Land Act, 1862*, published under date of 1st July, 1862, the Governor in Council has approved of the following additional regulation relating to the occupation of Crown Lands under such licenses, viz.:-

The right to occupy and use Crown Lands under license for any of the purposes specified in the first division of the before-mentioned regulations will cease if the prescribed fees, payable in advance, be not paid within fourteen days after the date when such license should be renewed.

Notice to this effect will be given by the Board of Land and Works in the *Government Gazette* to the holders of licenses who fail to make the required payments of fees in due time, and that if the fees in arrear be not paid within fourteen days after the publication of such notice, their right of occupation under license will be liable to be forfeited, and the lands to be re-let by the Board of Land and Works, or otherwise appropriated.

## THE GENERAL SESSIONS AT INGLEWOOD.

## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better administration of Justice in Courts of General Sessions in the Colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, from time to time, to define and appoint by proclamation the times at which such courts shall be holden, and such times to alter or vary as the said Governor shall think fit: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby appoint the times for holding, during the present year, Courts of General Sessions of the Peace at the undermentioned place in manner following, that is to say:—

At Inglewood, in and for the district of Inglewood, on Thursday the twelfth day of May, Thursday the eleventh day of August, and Thursday the tenth day of November.

## PREMISES FOR RECTIFYING AND COMPOUNDING SPIRITS.

## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed by the Parliament of Victoria in the twenty-fifth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the Law relating to the distillation, rectifying, and compounding of Spirits, to the granting a duty upon Spirits distilled in Victoria, and to regulate the brewing of Beer, and also the sale of fermented and spirituous Liquors in certain cases*, it is amongst other things enacted, that any person, except as thereafter excepted, who shall carry on the business of a distiller or rectifier and compounder of spirits, or who shall have in his possession, or who shall make use of any still or other utensil for distilling or rectifying and compounding spirits, except in such place as the Governor in Council shall by proclamation in the *Government Gazette* direct, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than One hundred pounds, nor more than Five hundred pounds: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the undermentioned place as a place wherein the business of a rectifier and compounder of spirits may be carried on, that is to say:—

Building standing on allotments 12 and 13, section A, township of Ballarat West, county of Grenville: Bounded on the west by the road known as the Wendouree parade, bearing north 137 feet; on the north by allotment 14, bearing east 165

feet; on the east by a piece of unsold land, bearing south 137 feet; and on the south by allotment 11, bearing west 165 feet.

## ADDITIONAL POLLING PLACE FOR THE LINTON DIVISION OF THE GRENVILLE DISTRICT.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the fourteenth day of March, 1864.

WHEREAS by *The Electoral Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council shall within thirty days after the commencement hereof, and afterwards as he shall see fit from time to time, appoint within and for each division of every province and district respectively one place and not more for taking the poll in such division at contested elections for the province or district, and every such appointment may revoke; provided that if the returning officer of the province or district and any police magistrate or superintendent of police acting in the locality shall by writing under their hands certify to the Governor that it is necessary so to do it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to appoint as aforesaid in and for such division one or more polling place or places, and the appointment of such place or places or any of them from time to time to revoke; provided also that no appointment of any polling place in or for any division of a province or district shall be revoked between the issue of any writ for election for the same and the return of such writ: And whereas the returning officer for the Grenville electoral district and the police magistrate acting in the locality hereinafter mentioned have, by writing under their hands, certified to the Governor that it is necessary to appoint Snake Valley (Carngham) an additional polling place for the Linton division of the said district: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order appoint Snake Valley (Carngham) to be an additional place in and for the Linton division for taking the poll in such division at contested elections for the electoral district of Grenville.

And the Honorable James McCulloch, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

## ORDER IN COUNCIL UNDER THE "PASSENGERS ACT, 1855."

THE accompanying Order in Council under the *Passengers Act, 1855*, for preserving order, promoting health, and securing cleanliness and ventilation on board passenger ships proceeding from the United Kingdom to any port or place in Her Majesty's Possessions abroad out of Europe, and not being within the Mediterranean Sea, is published for general information.

At the Court at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, the 7th day of January, 1864.

PRESENT:

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the *Passengers Act, 1855*, it is amongst things enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by an Order in Council, to prescribe such rules and regulations as to Her Majesty may seem fit for preserving order, promoting health, and securing cleanliness and ventilation on board of passenger ships proceeding from the United Kingdom to any port or place in Her Majesty's possessions abroad, and the said rules and regulations from time to time in like manner to alter, amend, and revoke, as occasion may require.

And whereas it is expedient to revoke an Order in Council made at a court held at Buckingham Palace on the twenty-fifth day of February, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, in virtue of the provisions of the said Act, and to make a new Order in Council:

Now therefore Her Majesty doth, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of the authority vested in Her by the said *Passengers Act, 1855*, order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Order in Council of the twenty-fifth day of February, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, be and the same is hereby revoked; and that the following shall henceforth be the rules for preserving order, for promoting health, and for securing cleanliness and ventilation, to be observed on board of every passenger ship proceeding from the United Kingdom to any port or place in Her Majesty's possessions abroad, out of Europe, and not being within the Mediterranean Sea.

1. All passengers who shall not be prevented by sickness or other sufficient cause, to be determined by the surgeon, or in ships carrying no surgeon, by the master, shall rise not later than Seven o'clock a.m., at which hour the fires shall be lighted.
2. It shall be the duty of the cook or cooks appointed under the thirty-ninth section of the said *Passengers Act*, 1855, to light the fires, and to take care that they be kept alight during the day; and also to take care that each passenger or family of passengers shall have the use of the fireplace at proper hours, in an order to be fixed by the master.
3. When the passengers are dressed, their beds shall be rolled up.
4. The decks, including the space under the bottom of the berths, shall be swept before breakfast, and all dirt thrown overboard.
5. The breakfast hour shall be from Eight to Nine o'clock a.m. Before the commencement of breakfast, all the emigrants, except as hereinbefore excepted, are to be out of bed and dressed, and the beds rolled up, and the deck on which the emigrants live properly swept.
6. The deck shall further be swept after every meal, and after breakfast is concluded shall be also dry holystoned or scraped. This duty, as well as that of cleaning the ladders, hospitals, round houses, and water-closets, and of pumping water into the cisterns or tanks for the supply of the water-closets, shall be performed by a party who shall be taken in rotation from the adult males above fourteen, in the proportion of five to every one hundred emigrants, and shall be considered as sweepers for the day. But the single women shall do all necessary acts for keeping clean and in a proper state their own compartment, where a separate compartment is allotted to them, and the occupant of each berth shall see that his or her own berth is well brushed out.
7. Dinner shall commence at One o'clock p.m. and supper at Six p.m.
8. The fires shall be extinguished at Seven p.m. unless otherwise directed by the master or required for the use of the sick; and the emigrants shall be in their berths at Ten o'clock p.m., except under the permission or authority of the surgeon, or, if there be no surgeon, of the master.
9. On each passenger deck there shall be lit at dusk, and kept burning till daylight, three safety lamps, and such further number as shall allow one to be placed at each of the hatchways used by passengers.
10. No naked light shall be allowed between decks or in the hold, at any time or on any account.
11. The scuttles and stern ports, if any, shall, weather permitting, be opened at Seven o'clock a.m. and kept open till Ten o'clock p.m.; and the hatches shall be kept open whenever the weather permits.
12. The coppers and cooking utensils shall be cleaned every day, and the cisterns kept filled with water.
13. The beds shall be well shaken and aired on deck, weather permitting, at least twice a week.
14. The bottom boards of the berths, if not fixtures, shall be removed and dry-scrubbed, and, weather permitting, taken on deck, at least twice a week.
15. Two days in a week shall be appointed by the master as washing days; but no washing or drying of clothes shall on any account be permitted between decks.
16. On Sunday mornings the passengers shall be mustered at Ten o'clock a.m., and will be expected to appear in clean and decent apparel. The Lord's Day shall be observed as religiously as circumstances will admit.
17. No spirits or gunpowder shall be taken on board by any passenger; and if either of those articles be discovered in the possession of a passenger, it shall be taken into the custody of the master during the voyage, and not returned to the passenger until he has landed or is on the point of landing.
18. No loose hay or straw shall be allowed below for any purpose.
19. No smoking shall be allowed between decks.
20. The following kinds of misconduct are hereby strictly prohibited; that is to say, all immoral or indecent acts or conduct, taking liberties or using improper familiarity with the female passengers, using blasphemous, obscene, or indecent language, or language tending to a breach of the peace, swearing, gambling, drunkenness, fighting, disorderly, riotous, quarrelsome, or insubordinate conduct, also all deposits of filth or offensive acts of uncleanness in the between decks: Provided that no conviction under the said *Passengers Act* for any of the offences herein specified shall operate as a bar to any civil or criminal proceedings which may in the ordinary course of law be instituted for the same offence by any party aggrieved.
21. Fire-arms, swords, and other offensive weapons shall, as soon as the passengers embark, be placed in the custody of the master.
22. No sailors shall be allowed to remain on the passenger deck among the passengers, except on duty.
23. No passenger shall go to the ship's cookhouse without special permission from the master, nor remain in the fore-cabin among the sailors on any account.
24. In vessels not expressly required by the said *Passengers Act*, 1855, to have on board such ventilating apparatus as therein mentioned, such other provision shall be made for ventilation as shall be required by the emigration officers at the port of embarkation, or, in his absence, by the officers of customs.
25. And, to prevent all doubts in the construction of this Order in Council, it is hereby further ordered, that the terms "United Kingdom," "passenger," "passenger ship," "passenger deck," and "master" shall herein have the same significations as are assigned to them respectively in the said *Passengers Act*, 1855; and, unless inconsistent with the context, words of one number shall import both numbers.

And the Most Noble the Duke of Newcastle, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
