CERTAIN POLICE LOCK-UPS DISCONTINUED AS GAOLS.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by two several Proclamations under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date respectively the nineteenth day of July, 1859, and the twenty-second day of July, 1861, certain buildings called and known as

No. 35.—APRIL 5, 1864.—1.

Police Lock-ups, situate respectively at Buckland and Snowy Creek, were declared to be and constituted gaols, prisons, and houses of correction, within the meaning of the Act passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders*: And whereas it is expedient to discontinue the use of the said premises for the confinement of prisoners under sentence: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the Proclamations hereinbefore mentioned, and do hereby notify that the said respective premises shall cease to be gaols, prisons, and houses of correction.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN.

SECTIONS V. TO X. OF THE TOWN AND COUNTRY POLICE ACT EXTENDED TO THE SHIRE OF ALBERTON.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty (Number 14), intituled, *An Act to provide for the Management of Towns and other places in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that so many of the provisions of the said Act as relate to the good order of towns and other populous places, being sections numbered V., VI., VII., VIII., IX., and X., in the said Act, shall extend to and be in force in such cities, towns, districts, and places as the Lieutenant Governor may by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare to come under the operation of the same respectively, or any of them; and it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor to define the limits of such places, and to vary and alter such limits and revoke any such Proclamation; and all the other provisions of the said Act except the last (being numbered XXXIX.) shall extend to and be in operation throughout Victoria and its dependencies from and after the passing thereof: Now I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare that the Shire of Alberton shall come under the operation of the sections of the said Act numbered respectively V., VI., VII., VIII., IX., and X.

INTRODUCTION INTO WELLINGTON OF CATTLE FROM CERTAIN OTHER NEW ZEALAND PROVINCES PROHIBITED.

THE accompanying Proclamation, under the New Zealand *Diseased Cattle Act*, 1861, prohibiting the importation into the Province of Wellington of cattle from the Provinces of Auckland, Hawke's Bay, and Taranaki, Canterbury, Nelson, and Marlborough, is published for general information.

DISEASED CATTLE REGULATIONS—WELLINGTON.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Honor ISAAC EARL FEATHERSTON, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Wellington, in the Islands of New Zealand.

WHEREAS by section x. of the *Diseased Cattle Act*, 1861, it was enacted that if at any time it should be made to appear to the Governor that any infectious or contagious disease has broken out amongst cattle in any district of the colony, it should be lawful for the Governor by Order in Council to declare that such district was infected within the meaning of the Act, and from time to time to make such regulations for destroying diseased cattle therein, and for prohibiting the removal or transportation of cattle from one part of the colony to another, and for preventing the further spread of such disease as to him should seem fit: And it was by the same Act also enacted that the Governor in Council might by warrant under his hand from time to time delegate to the Superintendent of any province within the colony all or any of the powers vested in the Governor, or Governor in Council, by the said Act, subject to such regulations as he might think fit, and might from time to time rescind such delegation: And whereas the Governor hath, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, delegated to Isaac Earl Featherston, Esquire, as long as he shall hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Wellington, the several powers vested in the Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act, subject to being rescinded as in the said Act was provided, and subject to the regulations issued by the Governor in Council, on the first day of October, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and to any other regulations to be from time to time duly made: And whereas by Proclamation, issued on or about the fourteenth day of October, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, certain places were declared infected districts within the meaning and for the purposes of the said Act:

Now, therefore, I, the said Isaac Earl Featherston, by virtue of the powers vested in me in this behalf do hereby proclaim and declare that after the date hereof the Provinces of Auckland, Hawke's Bay, and Taranaki, Canterbury, Nelson, and Marlborough, shall also be deemed infected districts within the meaning and for the purposes of the above-mentioned Act, and that no cattle, after the date hereof, until further notice, shall be imported into the Province of Wellington from such districts.

LANDS TO BE PERMANENTLY RESERVED.

The number of deaths during February, 1864, was 310, the mean temperature was 62.8°, and the mean atmospheric pressure was 29.903 inches.

The deaths, although they are thus shown to have exceeded by 31 those of the same month of 1863 were 11 less than the average of the month in that year and the three previous ones. The temperature of the month was 3° lower, and the atmospheric pressure was nearly a tenth of an inch higher than means of these elements extending over the same period.

Males and females died during the month in the proportions of 56 and 44 per cent. respectively. Persons under and over five died in the proportions of 62 and 38 per cent. In February, 1863, these latter per centages were also 62 and 38 per cent.; in February, 1862, they were 65 and 35; in February, 1861, they were 63 and 32; and in February, 1860, they were 66 and 34. In the month prior to the one under review 64 per cent. of the deaths were of children under the age of five years.

The largest number of deaths (19) was on the 7th, the next highest number (16) was on the 26th, after which the next highest number (14) occurred on seven different days. No more than 4 deaths were recorded on the 2nd of the month, which was the day of the lowest mortality.

The oldest person who died during the month was a male of 81 years of age, who succumbed to old age. Another male, aged 77, died of paralysis.

Nineteen violent deaths occurred in the month, a number above the average; of these, no less than twelve were from drowning. In eleven instances the deaths from this cause are supposed to have been accidental; the remaining one was suicidal.

Four deaths were from suffocation: one of a female, aged 40, in a gutter whilst drunk; another of a female, aged 50, in a manner not stated; another of a female, aged 20, in the Lunatic Asylum, also in a manner not stated; and another of an infant, only two weeks old, in bed. A laborer, aged 46, died of a fractured knee joint; an apprentice, aged 16, of extravasation of blood on the brain, caused by violence. A woman, of 38, was killed by a snake bite.

Thirty-two deaths occurred in the Melbourne Hospital, 6 in the Benevolent Asylum, 2 in the Lying-in Hospital, 7 in the Lunatic Asylum, 2 in the Immigration Hospital, 1 in the Immigration Depot, 1 in the Immigrants' Home, 2 in the Central Gaol, and 1 in the Collingwood Stockade; making a total of 54 deaths in public institutions, or rather more than 17 per cent. of the whole number recorded.

Of the 193 children whose deaths occurred under the age of five years, 101, or rather more than 52 per cent., were males, and 92, or nearly 48 per cent., were females; 135 were under one year, 40 were between one and two years, 9 were between two and three, 6 were between three and four, and 3 were between four and five.

Of the 117 deaths of persons above the age of five years, 73, or slightly over 62 per cent., were of males, and 44, or about 38 per cent., were females; of those dying, 8 were between five and ten years of age, 1 was between ten and fifteen, 5 were between fifteen and twenty, 8 were between twenty and twenty-five, 13 were between twenty-five and thirty, 10 were between thirty and thirty-five, 18 were between thirty-five and forty, 12 were between forty and forty-five, 7 were between forty-five and fifty, 13 were between fifty and fifty-five, 6 were between fifty-five and sixty, 4 were between sixty and sixty-five, 6 were between sixty-five and seventy, 4 were between seventy and seventy-five, and 2 were seventy-five and upwards.

2. The funeral must take place at the time appointed, or subject to a fine of Five shillings for every hour after such appointment.
3. The charges will be remitted for the burial of any person on satisfactory evidence being produced to the trustees that the relations or friends of such person are unable to pay the same.
4. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, and should a brick grave or vault be required, it must be constructed under the direction of some person appointed by them.
5. A plan of every monument or headstone must be submitted to the trustees for approval.
6. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones, must be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.
7. Wooden fences may be erected on private graves, but if not kept in proper repair may be removed by order of the trustees.
8. Any person damaging or destroying the fences, or in any manner injuring any property connected with the cemetery, will be prosecuted as the law directs.
9. When a meeting of the trustees is required, the same to be called by the secretary: three to form a quorum.
10. The trustees will have the right of making any alteration from time to time in these regulations and charges, subject to the approval of His Excellency the Governor.

NORTH HARROW DISTRICT ROAD BOARD.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE NORTH HARROW DISTRICT ROAD BOARD, MADE BY SPECIAL ORDER OF THE BOARD, 1ST MARCH, 1864.

THE North Harrow District Road Board shall hold their ordinary meetings on the first Tuesday in every month, at Twelve o'clock noon.

2. The minutes of any preceding meeting not previously confirmed shall be read first at all meetings, in order that they may be confirmed, and no discussion shall be allowed thereon excepting as to their accuracy. The reading of correspondence, the presentation of memorials and petitions, the bringing up of reports and notices of motion, the clerk's reports, and the surveyor's reports of work done and in progress, shall have precedence in the order named of the regular business of each meeting.

3. Every communication addressed to the board shall be in proper form and presented by one of its members, or the clerk, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.

4. The order of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the board and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration. Any member of the board may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable in the form of notice of motion; no such motion, however, shall be decided on at any meeting of the board unless notice thereof shall have been given to the clerk, in writing, by the member bringing it forward, at the meeting previous to that in which the same shall be taken into consideration.

5. No notice of motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorized by him, be present when the business is called in order. Notices of motion not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.

6. No motion proposing any petition, address, bye-law, or standing order, shall be entertained unless the mover shall submit therewith a draft of such petition, bye-law, or standing order.

7. No motion or amendment shall be entered or discussed until it has been seconded.

8. The mover of any motion which may be referred to a committee shall be a member of such committee.

9. The presiding chairman's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument.

10. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time; but if lost, another may be moved before the original motion be put to the vote.

11. Any member proposing a motion or amendment, or if speaking on any matter, must rise and address the chairman. No member, when speaking, shall be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down; in which case the member calling to order shall be heard thereon, in preference to any other, and the question of order shall be disposed of by the chairman, before the subject is resumed or any other matter entered upon.

12. All questions before the board shall be decided by show of hands, unless a motion for any particular question is made and carried that it shall be by ballot.

13. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion of adjournment of the board; but if on the question being put the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the board.

14. No member shall digress from the subject-matter of the question under discussion, or impute improper motives to others; and all personal reflections upon any member shall be considered as highly disorderly; and the member making use of such offensive expressions shall make an apology, if required by the board to do so, and every member or servant of the board refusing to make such apology shall be liable to any fine not exceeding Five pounds.

15. Any member may require the clerk to take down in writing any particular word or words used by a member immediately upon the same being uttered.

16. A finance committee may be appointed composed of not less than three members.

17. No special meeting shall be held unless eight days' clear notice thereof be given.

CONTRACTS.

18. All contracts in value above £100 shall be made by tender, advertised not less than twice in the *Hamilton Spectator*, also by printed or written notice at the Police Office. Each tender shall be addressed to the chairman, and not opened until the appointed time. The respective amounts, together with the names of the parties tendering, to be entered in every case on the minutes of the board; and when tenders are accepted, a contract bond shall be entered into, signed by the contractor, and by two members of the board, or in his absence the chairman of the meeting at which such tender is accepted; and the expense of preparing such bond shall in all cases be borne by the person or persons giving the same.

19. The security in all cases of contract shall be ten per cent. on the amount of the tender, and shall be paid over by the contractor to the treasurer; and the money so paid shall be deposited in the bank with the other moneys of the board, and shall not be repaid to the contractor until he has obtained a certificate from the surveyor of the board that the works under his contract are satisfactorily completed.

20. Money or cash advances may be made to contractors at a rate not exceeding 75 per cent. on the surveyor's report of work performed.

OFFICERS.

21. In all cases it shall be considered sufficient for the collector to apply once for payment of any amount due on the assessment roll; and in the event of any such amount not being paid to him, notice shall be left stating that unless the amount be paid to the collector of the board before the expiration of one month from the date hereof, legal proceedings will be taken for the recovery of the same.

22. The collector shall in no case distrain without the order of the board.

23. The clerk is authorized to provide all necessary forms, books, stationery, &c., required by and for the use and purposes of the board.

24. The treasurer shall weekly deposit in the Bank of Victoria, Hamilton, all moneys received by him by virtue of his appointment as treasurer.

25. The treasurer shall present his accounts, showing the banker's balance, and actual liabilities of the board, at each ordinary meeting of the board.

26. The offices of the board shall be open, and the clerk shall attend there for the performance of his duties, at such times as the board may direct.
