### BLACKWOOD GOLD ESCORT.

BLACKWOOD GOLD ESCORT.

THE Blackwood Police Gold Escort will be re-established on the following conditions, and will run fortnightly until further notice, commencing on Tuesday, the 24th of May, and reaching Kyneton in time for the mid-day train:

Gold will be received on alternate Mondays, commencing the 23rd proximo, at Blackwood, for escort, but only for delivery to known residents at Kyneton, or to bank agents on route by the mid-day train, whose appearance must be previously guaranteed by the banks, and who must be provided with orders from the managers of their respective banks to receive parcels of treasure from the police at Kyneton.

The police will take delivery of such parcels of treasure, sealed, at Blackwood, and take receipts for the same number with unbroken seals, at Kyneton; but no responsibility whatever will be incurred by the police as to their value or contents.

Should doubt arise as to the person presenting himself to receive the treasure at all, the treasure, if any, will be stored at the Police Barracks, Kyneton, until removed by the bank; no responsibility being incurred, no charge will be exacted for its custody.

Managers of Banks or other persons desirous of availing themselves of this escort will therefore be good enough to notify, in writing, before the 15th proximo, to the officer of police in charge at Kyneton, whether they will appoint agents to take delivery on the foregoing terms, of parcels of treasure from the police escort officer, on the stoppage of the mid-day train at the Kyneton at Kyneton or bankers there or elsewhere, the escort will not start.

# PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir Charles Henry Darling, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHERAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders, it is amongst other things enacted, that all buildings, erections, houses, and premises thereafter to be erected, built, purchased, enlarged, or maintained at the public expense, as and for public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments within the said colony, which shall from time to time be proclaimed by the Lieutenant Governor of the said colony, by notice in the Government Gazette, as such public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and after the publication of such notice, be severally deemed and taken to be the public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments respectively of the place or district where the same are or shall be situated within the said colony, and shall be subject to the several provisions made for the regulation, discipline, management, and care of the public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments already erected in the said colony, and of the prisoners confined within the same; provided that it shall not be necessary to proclaim any building as a gaol, prison, house of correction, or penal establishment, which has been so proclaimed, notified, or declared before the passing of the said Act; and it is also enacted, that unless where it shall be otherwise declared or appointed by the Lieutenant Governor, every No. 45.—MAY 3, 1864.—1. public gaol shall be and be taken for all purposes as being equally a house of correction and a prison for debtors, and also every house of correction shall be taken to be a prison: And whereas by another Act, passed in the seventeenth year of the same reign, intituled, An Act to amend an Act intituled "An Act to amend an Act intituled "An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor or any officer specially authorized by him, by writing under his hand, to cause that any male person undergoing imprisonment of any criminal offence or misdementor by the sentence of any court of competent jurisdiction, whether sentenced to imprisonment with hard labor or to imprisonment only, may, during the whole or any period of his sentence, be employed at such labor and in such place as the Lieutenant Governor or such afforces as aforesaid shall direct; provided that such labor, in the case of prisoners sentenced to imprisonment only, shall not be severe; provided further that any court of competent jurisdiction, in passing sentence upon any prisoner, shall have authority to exempt such prisoner from the operation of this clause; And it is also enacted, that any male person lawfully imprisoned for any crime, misdemeanor, or offence, by the sentence of any court of competent jurisdiction, or employed at labor as a criminal on the roads or other public works of Victoria, who shall escape or attempt to escape from any gaol, prison, or house of correction, stockade, hulk, or other penal establishment, or from the custody of any constable, gaoler, or other officer, in whose custody he may be, shall be guilty of felony, and being lawfully convicted thereof shall be liable to be imprisoned for any period not exceeding five years: And whereas divers additions and alterations have been from time to time made in the buildings, erections, houses, and premises heretofore proclaimed and used as public gaols, situate in the lo

WHEREAS by The Land Act, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, later, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of, Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the common hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

Rokewood Gold Field Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-eighth day of January, 1861, shall be, and the same is hereby increased, by adding thereto the land hereafter described, viz.:—County of Grewille, six hundred and forty acres, more or less, being the unappropriated Crown lands within the following described boundaries: Commencing at the north-west aughe of the existing Rokewood Gold Field Common; thence south fifty-eight chains and a half; thence west one hundred and twenty-five chains, more or less, to the lilibarook Creek; by that creek northerly to a point bearing west of the commencing point; thence east unety-five chains, more or less, to the point of commencement, as silven on plan deposited in the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(63.G.10706.)

The deaths, which numbered 310 in February and 324 in January, fell to 279 in March. This is 45 below the average of the month in the previous four years, and 8 less than the deaths in March, 1863, which showed the lowest mortality during that period. The mean temperature of the month was 635°, and the mean atmospheric pressure 30°065 inches; the former being 2° lower and the latter 16 inches higher than the average of the month of March in the four years named.

Deaths of males and females during the month occurred in the respective proportions of 56 and 41 per cent.; those of persons under and over five years of age in the proportions of 58 and 42 per cent. respectively. In March, 1863, 57 per cent. of those dying were under five years of age; in March, 1862, 58 per cent.; in March, 1861, 65 per cent.; and in March, 1860, 61 per

The largest number of deaths recorded as having occurred on any one day was 17 on the 13th. The next highest number was 14 on the 5th. The lowest number on any one day was 2 deaths on the 20th.

Three instances of deaths of persons over 75 years of age occurred during the month, viz.:—One at 81, of phthisis; one at 79, of apoplexy; and one at 78, of old age. These aged persons were all females.

Six deaths occurred from drowning during the month, three of which were of adult males, one of an adult female, and the two others of boys, aged respectively 9 and 11 years. A female, aged 40 years, and another under 2 years, died of burns. A laborer, aged 48, died of a sunstroke. A solicitor, aged 38, died of a fractured skull; a master mariner, aged 33, from compound fracture of the left ankle; a carter, aged 35, from a fracture of egs; a sawyer, aged 50, owing to a piece of timber falling on him; a stock agent, aged 47, from a fracture of ribs; and a female child, aged 2‡ years, from injury to brain through a fall. All these deaths are supposed to have been accidental.

Thirty-one deaths took place in the Melbourne Hospital, 8 in the Benevolent Asylum, 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 2 in the Lying-in Hospital, 3 in the Immigrants' Home, 1 in the Immigration Depôt, and 1 in the Collingwood Stockade; making a total of 52 deaths in public institutions, or about 19 per cent. of the whole number returned.

The following table shows the number of persons of all ages according to the last census, the number of deaths of persons under and over five years of age, the total at all ages, and the number of deaths to every 1000 of the population during the month of March, 1864, in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, and in each of the sub-districts of which it is composed:—
