## BLACKWOOD GOLD ESCORT.

THE Blackwood Police Gold Escort will be re-established on the following conditions, and will run fortnightly until further notice, commencing on Tuesday, the 24th of May, and reaching Kyneton in time for the mid-day train:—

Gold will be received on alternate Mondays, commencing the 23rd proximo, at Blackwood, for escort, but only for delivery to known residents at Kyneton, or to bank agents on route by the mid-day train, whose appearance must be previously guaranteed by the banks, and who must be provided with orders from the managers of their respective banks to receive parcels of treasure from the police at Kyneton.

The police will take delivery of such parcels of treasure, sealed, at Blackwood, and take receipts for the same number with unbroken seals, at Kyneton; but no responsibility whatever will be incurred by the police as to their value or contents.

Should doubt arise as to the person presenting himself to receive the treasure being duly authorised to receive it, or should no person appear at all, the treasure, if any, will be stored at the Police Barracks, Kyneton, until removed by the bank; no responsibility being incurred, no charge will be exacted for its custody.

Managers of Banks or other persons desirous of availing themselves of this escort will therefore be good enough to notify, in writing, before the 15th proximo, to the officer of police in charge at Kyneton, whether they will appoint agents to take delivery on the foregoing terms, of parcels of treasure from the police escort officer, on the stoppage of the mid-day train at the Kyneton railway station.

Should no such notification be received from either residents at Kyneton or bankers there or elsewhere, the escort will not start.

WHEREAS by *The Municipal Corporations Act, 1863*, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is authorised, by general regulations, to fix the amounts as not exceeding which the council of any borough may, as and in the manner in the said Act provided, demand, receive, and have of and from every person exposing or offering for sale, or selling any of the articles and provisions therein mentioned, in any market established under the said Act, or who shall rent or use any stall or standing-place in any market established under the same Act; as also from any person who shall use any slaughter-house or place for slaughtering cattle, as and for stallages, rents, and tolls:

Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth, by this present regulation, authorise the following amounts to be received, demanded, and had by the council of any borough now or hereafter established under the said Act, in respect of the matters hereinafter mentioned:—

THE accompanying notice respecting Beacons to, and in the roads of, the port of Batavia, which has been received from the Consul-General for the Netherlands, is published for general information.

#### Translation.

The Director of Means and Domains informs navigators, that in case of the beacons to and in the roads of the port of Batavia being lost, these marks will be, as much as possible, temporarily replaced by Herbert's beacons.

To prevent mistakes, it is notified that these buoys are provided at the top with a small ball, so that by making use of this kind of floating beacons the distinguishing difference between conical buoys and balls exists no longer, but instead thereof the Herbert's beacons will be painted white or black, according to the situation they are laid in the place of ball or conical beacons.

THE Governor in Council has approved of the subjoined Rules adopted by the East Melbourne corps of the Royal Victorian Volunteer Artillery, in accordance with the provisions of the Act No. 183, section 3.

#### ROYAL VICTORIAN ARTILLERY.—EAST MELBOURNE CORPS. RULES.

1. At any meeting of the corps the senior officer present shall take the chair.

2. The commanding officer may at any time convene a special meeting of the corps, and must do so on receiving a requisition signed by not less than twenty (20) members. Such special meeting shall be deemed duly convened by notice being given at the next previous parade or company drill, and an advertisement inserted in the *Argus*.

3. Any member changing his permanent address, and failing to give notice of the same to the commanding officer, in writing,

within fourteen (14) days thereof, shall be fined Two shillings and sixpence.

4. Any member appearing at parade or company drill with uniform, arms, or accoutrements dirty or unserviceable from neglect, or who may at any time wear a portion only of the uniform, may be fined by the officer in command, or the captain commanding, the sum of Two shillings and sixpence.

5. A list of all fines imposed in any month shall be signed by the commanding officer, and posted in the orderly-room or other appointed place, previous to the first drill day in the following month.

6. All fines must be paid to the sergeants in charge of squads within the month in which the list is posted.

7. An account of all fines imposed and paid shall be kept in a book open to the members at the orderly-room on drill days.

8. A general meeting of the corps shall be held in the second week of January and July respectively in each year, at which meeting a detailed statement of the financial position of the corps shall be laid before the members; the meeting to be convened by advertisement and notice being given at parade or drill one week previous to such meeting.

9. The civil business of the corps shall be managed by a general committee, consisting of the commanding officer and twelve (12) members, of whom not less than five (5) shall be non-commissioned officers, to be chosen by ballot at each half-yearly meeting, seven to form a quorum: to audit and settle the accounts of the corps; to consider and decide as to the eligibility or otherwise of all candidates for admission to the corps; to consider, pass, and cause to be paid out of the funds of the corps all just and proper liabilities which may from time to time be incurred in the management, or for the benefit of the same. Such committee to meet monthly and as often as occasion may require.

10. The name, address, and occupation of any person desirous of joining the corps shall be posted for one week in the orderly-room. Any member objecting to the candidate shall communicate the same to the committee, who shall decide as to his admission.

11. An account shall be kept between the corps and each of its members, wherein the member shall be debited with the liabilities incurred by the corps on his behalf, and credited with the amount earned by him as an effective. If, on the first day of January in any year, a member's debit exceed his credit by Ten shillings (10s.) or upwards, he shall be fined the amount of such difference; provided always that the amount of such fine shall in no case exceed Two pounds (£2); but the committee may remit such fine or portion of it, or defer payment of it, at their discretion. Any payment made under this rule shall be placed to the credit of the member paying it.

12. Any member desirous of leaving the corps under the provisions of the Act, shall be fined the amount, if any, that his debit exceeds his credit; but subject to the same conditions as the next preceding rule.

13. Supernumerary members shall be subject to the rules of the corps while their names remain on the books. They may at any time have their names struck off by applying, in writing, to the commanding officer, and paying all amounts due by them to the corps.

14. Any member desirous of altering, rescinding, or adding to the above rules must give fourteen days' notice of such intention to the commanding officer, who shall, on a requisition duly signed by twenty (20) members, convene a special general meeting of the corps.

The foregoing fourteen rules were adopted by the corps at a special general meeting, held at the orderly-room, on the 19th April, 1864.

## VICTORIAN RAILWAYS.

## BYE-LAWS.

**THE** Board of Land and Works, by virtue of the powers and authorities vested in it by *The Railways Act, 1863*, doth hereby make the following bye-laws for the several purposes therein respectively mentioned, that is to say:—

1. *Melbourne time to be observed.*—Melbourne time is to be observed at all stations.

2. *Passengers to have tickets.*—Any person (unless having a free pass) taking a seat or remaining in or upon any carriage used on the railway, as a passenger, or travelling therein upon the railway, without having first paid his or her fare and obtained a ticket, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

3. *Passengers to show and deliver up tickets when required.*—Each passenger, on paying his or her fare, will be furnished with a ticket, which he or she is to show whenever required by a station-master or porter authorised by him, or by the guard in charge of the train; and if it be a journey or return ticket, he or she must allow it to be marked when required; and every ticket (whether single, return, or periodical) must be delivered up on demand of any porter or other servant of the Board of Land and Works, who may be authorised to collect tickets. Any person guilty of a breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

4. *Penalty for transferring tickets.*—Tickets are not transferable. A ticket can only be used by the person for whom it may be issued. Any person using or attempting to use a transferred single, return, or periodical ticket, after being once used or travelled with, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

5. *Passengers not to rebook by same train.*—No passenger shall be entitled to rebook or take a ticket at any intermediate station for the purpose of continuing his journey in the same train as that in which he shall have arrived at such station.

6. *Punishment for attempt to defraud.*—Any person knowingly attempting to defraud the board by travelling upon the railway in or upon a carriage of a superior class to that for which he or she is provided with a ticket, or altering a return or other ticket, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

7. *Return tickets available only at certain stations.*—Tickets, whether single or return, shall be available and shall be used by passengers only to convey them to the stations named thereon, or to any station short of that destination, provided the passenger by so using a ticket derives no advantage as regards fare. In no case, however, shall the "cheap" or "excursion" tickets be used at or for any other station than those named thereon. Any person using, or attempting to use, a ticket in violation of this bye-law, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

8. *Penalty for defacing tickets.*—No ticket will be recognised by any collector or servant of the board authorised to collect or examine tickets unless the number, date, and names of the stations printed on such ticket are perfectly legible. The holder of any ticket which may be defaced or rendered illegible in any of the above particulars, will be regarded as not having paid his fare, and will be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

9. *Penalty for selling return tickets, &c.*—Any person, not being duly authorised by the board, who shall sell or offer for sale any free pass, ticket, or portion of a return ticket, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

10. *Ladies' waiting-rooms and carriages to be kept private.*—No male passenger will be allowed to enter or remain in any waiting-room or carriage set apart for the accommodation of females; and any person persisting in remaining in any such room or carriage, after being warned to leave the same, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

11. *Punishment for opening carriage doors.*—Any person, not being a servant of the board, who shall open any carriage, for the purpose of entering the same, with a key or other instrument, after the tickets have been examined, and the carriage doors locked by the station-master, guard, or other person appointed for that purpose, or any person who shall let him or her self out of any carriage on arrival at any station, or at any time during the journey, by the use of a private key or other instrument, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

12. *Punishment for attempting to travel outside.*—No person shall be permitted to travel outside a carriage or vehicle on the railway, under any circumstances whatever, or to get into or upon or to quit any carriage or vehicle when the train is in motion; and any person doing so, or attempting to do so, shall be liable to a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

13. *Smoking prohibited.*—Smoking is strictly prohibited in any of the railway sheds, yards, offices, pier, or waiting-rooms; and any person found smoking in any goods or other shed, yards, offices, pier, or premises, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Two pounds.

14. *In carriages.*—Smoking is strictly prohibited in any of the railway carriages, to the annoyance of any passenger; and any person who persists in smoking, after being requested by a passenger or warned by any servant of the board to desist, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Two pounds, and may be removed from the carriage by any of the railway servants.

15. *Dogs.*—Dogs will be conveyed and charged for, according to printed conditions, but they will not on any account be allowed to accompany passengers in the carriages. Any person persisting in taking a dog into any passenger carriage in breach of this bye-law, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

16. *Gratuities forbidden.*—No gratuity is under any circumstances allowed to be received by the servants of the railway department, on pain of immediate dismissal. Any person giving or offering a gratuity to any such servant shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

17. *Punishment for abusive language.*—Any person making use of insulting or abusive language to any officer or servant of the railway department of the board, while in the execution of his duty, or any person making use of obscene or blasphemous language in any carriage, or upon any platform or premises of the board, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

18. *Penalty for crossing the line when train is in sight.*—Any person driving or attempting to drive sheep or cattle, or attempting to ride or drive any horse across the line, either at an authorised crossing-place or elsewhere, when a train is in sight, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

19. *Penalty for allowing cattle to stray.*—Any person or persons wilfully driving or negligently allowing to stray any cattle, horses, sheep, or other animal, on the railway or any lands or premises of the board, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

20. *No touting or soliciting of custom allowed at stations.*—No carman or hackney-coachman, drayman, porter, carter, or other person, will be allowed to come into or upon the lands, pier, or premises of the board for the purpose of removing passengers or luggage, either with or without a dray, or hand-cart, or truck, unless required by a passenger and specially engaged by him for such purpose; and no person will be allowed to come into or upon the premises of the board for the purpose of touting or soliciting custom (unless licensed to do so) or hire of whatever kind; and any carman or hackney-coachman, drayman, carter, porter, or other person, evading, or attempting to evade, or being guilty of a breach of this regulation, or refusing or neglecting to quit the premises of the board when thereto required by a station-master or other servant of the board, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

21. *Bathing in reservoirs prohibited.*—Any person found bathing, swimming dogs, or otherwise polluting the water in any of the railway reservoirs or tanks, shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

22. *Bill-sticking prohibited.*—Any person or persons, unless those duly authorised by the board, who shall be found posting or sticking bills, &c., within or upon any of the railway property or premises, shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

23. *Board not required to carry diseased cattle or sheep.*—No person shall be entitled to require to be carried upon or along any railway of the board any sheep, cattle, horses, or live stock, which, in the judgment of the board, their officers, or servants, may be infected with any disease of whatsoever nature; and the board, their officers, or servants, may refuse to take any sheep, cattle, horses, or live stock suspected by them to be diseased. Any person causing or procuring any diseased sheep, cattle, horses, or live stock to be carried, or offering, or causing any of them to be offered, for the purpose of being carried upon or along any such railway, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

24. *Punishment for driving diseased cattle on railway premises.*—If any person shall willingly, knowingly, or negligently drive, or attempt to drive, or allow to stray into any railway station, yard, shed, or premises, or upon any lands, or within any fences, the property of the board, any sheep infected with scab or other disease, or any cattle, horses, or live stock having or suffering from any disease whatsoever, he shall be liable to a penalty for every such offence not exceeding Twenty pounds.

25. *Goods to be removed on arrival.*—All goods and merchandise (whether bonded or free), and all luggage arriving by train at any station or pier, shall be removed from the platform, sheds, or pier, within forty-eight hours, or such less time as may be fixed, and any free goods, merchandise, or luggage not removed by that time may be stored at the risk and expense of the consignees or owners, and may then become subject to such charges as may from time to time be fixed by the board; and any bonded goods or merchandise which shall not be removed within the period aforesaid shall be subject to the payment of the sum of One shilling per ton per diem, until the removal of the same from the premises of the board. And all goods, merchandise, and luggage, unclaimed by the owner for the space of seven days after arrival, may be sold by the board, and after deducting what may be due to the board for railway carriage, storage, and charges (including expenses of sale), to pay over the surplus, if any, to the owner on demand.

26. *Goods may be loaded or unloaded at owner's risk.*—If any goods, produce, timber, or other merchandise, should be brought into any station, either by the owner or consignee, or in the waggons or vehicles of the railway department, and which goods or merchandise, in accordance with the conditions of the published tariffs, it shall be the business of the owner, consignor, or consignee to load into or discharge from the railway waggons or vehicles; and in case the owner, consignor, or consignee, refuses or neglects to load into or discharge from the railway waggons or vehicles such goods within twelve working hours of their arrival at the station, the board, by its officers and servants, may forthwith proceed to load into or discharge from the railway trucks such goods, at the risk of the owner, consignor, or consignee; and such goods shall be subject to the cost of such loading or unloading, as the case may be, in addition to the freight, and to such other costs or charges as may become due under preceding bye-law.

27. *Increase of rate for valuable parcels.*—Upon every parcel or package containing any of the articles mentioned beneath (and also in the first section of *The Luncheon and Carriers Act, No. 78*), brought or delivered either to be carried for hire

or to accompany the person of any passenger, and its value and contents declared, as in the said section is mentioned, and where such value shall exceed the sum of Ten pounds, there shall be paid an increased rate of charge, that is to say, double parcels or excess luggage rate if the declared value be over Ten pounds and under Fifty pounds, and quadruple parcels or excess luggage rate if the value exceed Fifty pounds, as a compensation for the greater risk and care to be taken for the safe custody of conveyance; as this case may be, of such valuable articles, or any precious stones, jewellery, watches, clocks, or time-pieces of any description; trinkets, bills, notes of any bank in Her Majesty's dominions, or of any foreign banks; order notes or securities for payment of money, whether foreign or otherwise; stamps, maps, writings, title deeds, paintings, engravings, pictures, gold or silver plate, or plated articles; glass, china, silks in a manufactured or unmanufactured state, and whether wrought up or not wrought up with other materials; furs or lace, or any of them, contained in any parcel or package delivered either to be carried for hire or to accompany the person of any passenger.

28. *Increase of rate for valuable animals.*—The per-centage or increased rate of charge to be paid in respect of animals mentioned in the 24th section of *The Railways Act, 1863*, namely:—In respect of any horse declared to be above the value of Fifty pounds, any herd of neat cattle above the value of Twenty pounds, any sheep, pig, or other small animal above the value of One pound, shall be at the rate of Two pounds ten shillings per centum upon the value so declared above the respective sums so limited as aforesaid, and which per-centage shall be paid in addition to the ordinary rate of charge.

29. *Claims for loss must be made within fourteen days.*—No claim for loss will be allowed or recognised, unless the particulars of such claim be lodged with the secretary within fourteen days after such loss shall have arisen, and no claim for damage will be recognised or allowed after the removal from the railway premises of the goods or merchandise alleged to have been damaged. And the delivery of such goods shall be considered complete when notice of arrival has been given to the consignee; or where the address of the consignee is not known, the board will accept no liability for loss or damage after the goods shall have been at the receiving station forty-eight hours. All goods and live stock to be carried subject to the printed conditions of carriage.

30. *Cloak-room regulations.*—The board will not be responsible for articles left by passengers at any station, unless the same be duly registered, for which a charge per article will be made and a ticket given in exchange, and no article will be given up without the production of the ticket or satisfactory evidence of the ownership being adduced, and any article will be delivered up to the bearer of the ticket unless previously delivered up to the owner. The board will not be responsible for any package exceeding the value of Ten pounds.

31. *Vessels to remove from pier when the cargo is discharged.*—When and so soon as the discharge of the cargo of any vessel at the railway pier shall have been completed (and whether or not such discharge shall happen within the period fixed therefor), the master of the vessel whose discharge shall have been completed shall immediately thereafter cause to be taken on board thereof such sand or stone ballast as may be required to steady such vessel, and shall thereupon leave the pier and anchor such vessel outside of the buoys laid down by the railway department: Provided always that such vessel is not receiving or about to receive loading from the railway pier or the wagons or trucks belonging to the board. Any person guilty of a breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

32. *Vessels to be removed when notice is given by pier-master.*—Every vessel, whether about to receive loading or not, shall be removed by the master thereof from the railway pier within twelve hours after written notice shall have been left on board by the pier-master, requiring the removal of such vessel; and any master failing to remove his vessel within the period aforesaid shall pay to the board a sum of Twenty pounds per day for every day or fractional part of a day thereafter during which such vessel may occupy a berth at the said pier.

33. *Vessels to discharge cargo beyond working hours.*—The master of any vessel arriving at the pier shall cause the discharge thereof to be proceeded with beyond the usual working hours—that is to say, in the summer from Six o'clock in the morning until Six o'clock in the evening, and in winter from Seven o'clock in the morning until Five o'clock in the evening, if so required by the pier-master. And if the master of any vessel, when so required, shall neglect or refuse to cause the discharge of his vessel to be proceeded with accordingly, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds for each and every day or fractional part of a day he shall so neglect or refuse.

34. *To be discharged at expense of agent or master.*—Every vessel shall be discharged by stevedores, and such stevedores shall be employed by and at the expense of the masters or agents of such vessel, and not by or on behalf of the board.

35. *No person to supply ballast unless authorised.*—No person not authorised by the board to supply ballast to vessels lying at the pier, will be allowed to come upon such pier, or within three hundred yards thereof, with ballast for any vessel. Any person guilty of a breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

36. *No boats to ply from pier without license.*—No boatman, waterman, or other person will be allowed to ply for hire to or from the railway pier, or within a distance of three hundred yards therefrom, unless licensed by the board to do so; and any person infringing this bye-law will be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

37. *No vessel to be moored without authority.*—No ship, barque, steamer, brig, schooner, sloop, lighter, barge, boat, or other vessel

of any kind or description whatsoever, shall be moored or fastened to the railway pier, or attached to any ship, barque, steamer, brig, schooner, sloop, lighter, barge, boat, or other vessel of any kind or description whatsoever, so moored or fastened, without the consent in writing of the pier-master; and the master or other person causing any such ship, barque, steamer, brig, schooner, sloop, lighter, barge, boat, or other vessel to be so moored or fastened or attached without such consent as aforesaid, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds; and should the pier-master not have given his consent to the mooring or fastening of such vessel, he may proceed to remove the vessel in the manner pointed out by the 34th clause of *The Railways Act, 1863*.

38. *Charges on goods received from lighters.*—All goods that may be brought to vessels lying alongside the railway piers or breakwater, by lighter or other craft, will be subjected to the following charges, viz.:—One shilling per ton on goods, and Sixpence per bale on wool.
