REGULATION AS TO CROWN GRANTS OF LANDS SELECTED.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has made the subjoined Regulation, under *The Land Act*, 1862, § 133, relative to the issue of Crown Grants of leased moieties of allotments to original selectors and lessees or their heirs and assigns, viz.:-

Crown Grants of the leased moieties of allotments under *The Land Act*, 1862, shall not be made out and issued until the full amount of rent has been paid, and the persons entitled to such grants have made written application for the same to the Commissioner of Lands and Survey.

Persons claiming as the heirs of the original selectors and lessees must, in addition to the above application, give proof of heirship and of the death of the person through whom they claim; or if claiming as assignees, proof of the fact of their being the assignees of the original selector and lessee.

PRIZE ESSAYS.*

IT is hereby notified that, in pursuance of a resolution of the Legislative Assembly, a premium of One hundred and fifty pounds will be awarded for the best essay on each of the two following subjects, viz.:-

I.

Pleuro-pneumonia; its causes, symptoms, post-mortem appearances (pathology); the best means of treatment; and practical hints on the avoidance of the disease and its eradication from the colony.

II.

Scab; its causes, symptoms, pathology; best means of treatment; and practical hints for its avoidance and extermination.

The possibility of determining by inspection of the entire or divided animal in slaughter-houses or butchers' shops whether the animal has died or been slaughtered; whether it has been the subject of the above or any other disease; and if so, what are the signs by which such disease can be recognized.

Whether food prepared from such flesh should be allowed to be consumed, or whether it should be confiscated and destroyed.

The essays must be legibly written on foolscap paper, on one side only, and leaving a two-inch margin.

No essay is to be in the handwriting of its author nor signed with his name; but for the purpose of identification each essay must bear a motto, and must be accompanied by a sealed envelope containing the name and address of the author, and on the outside, but not in the author's handwriting, the motto affixed to the essay.

The essays must be forwarded to this office, addressed to the Honorable the Chief Secretary, on or before the 1st February next.

The Government will appoint three judges to decide on the respective values of the essays, but it reserves to itself the power to withhold the premium in the case of either subject, should the essays be considered unworthy of the premium offered. The essays for which premiums may be awarded will be considered the property of the Government.

POLLING PLACES FOR THE MURRAY ELECTORAL DISTRICT.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the fourth day of July, 1864.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor

Mr. McCulloch Mr. Verdon

WHEREAS by The Electoral Act, 1863, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council shall within thirty days after the commencement thereof, and afterwards as he shall see fit from time to time, appoint within and for each division of every province and district respectively one place and not more for taking the poll in such division at contested elections for the province or district, and every such appointment may revoke; provided that if the returning officer of the province or district and any police magistrate or superintendent of police acting in the locality shall by writing under their hands certify to the Governor that it is necessary so to do, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to appoint as aforesaid in and for such division one or more polling place or places, and the appointment of such place or places or any of them from time to time to revoke; provided also that no appointment of any polling place in or for any division of a province or district shall be revoked between the issue of any writ for election for the same and the return of such writ: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council, made on the 24th day of November, 1863, the confines of Wangaratta were appointed to be the polling place for the Tarrawingee division of the Murray district: And whereas the returning officer for the said electoral district and the police magistrate acting in the locality have, by writing under their hands, certified to the Governor that it is necessary to appoint certain polling places for the Tarrawingee division aforesaid: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order revoke the appointment of the confines of Wangaratta as the polling place for the Tarrawingee division of the electoral district of the Murray; and doth hereby appoint North Wangaratta (outside the Wangaratta division of the Murray Boroughs) and Tarrawingee to be polling places in and for the Tarrawingee division for taking the poll in such division at contested elections for the Murray district.

And the Honorable James McCulloch, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

DISTRICT FOR BEER LICENSES.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight
Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath,

WHEREAS by The Wines, Beer, and Spirit Sale Statute, 1864, it is amongst other things enacted that a beer license shall authorise the licensee to sell and dispose of, not earlier than Six o'clock in the morning nor later than Eight o'clock in the evening, any ale or beer to be drunk in the house or on the premises described in such license, except in the city of Melbourne or town of Geelong, or in any borough, and if the premises described in such license be subsequently to the granting of such license brought within any borough such license shall expire at the end of the then current year; provided that upon the application by the council of any borough the Governor in Council may by proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare the whole or any part of such borough a district wherein beer licenses may be granted, and may on a like application revoke any such proclamation: And whereas the Council of the Borough of Chewton has made application that the whole of the said borough may be declared a district under the proviso of the Act above recited: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power conferred by the above-recited Act, do by this my Proclamation declare the whole Borough of Chewton to be a district wherein Beer Licenses may be granted.

the other provisions of the said Act except the last (being numbered XXXIX.) shall extend to and be in operation throughout Victoria and its dependencies from and after the passing thereof: Now I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare that the Shire of Creswick shall come under the operation of the sections of the said Act numbered respectively V., VI., VII., VIII., IX., and X.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the Law relating to Ports, Harbors, and Shipping in the colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor of the said colony, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, by proclamation published in the *Government Gazette*, from time to time to define the limits and boundaries of ports in the said colony, and to frame rules for the governance and preservation of the said ports respectively, and for the regulation of shipping in the same, and of pilots, and from time to time to alter, amend, or repeal such rules and substitute others in their stead: And whereas by a Proclamation bearing date the seventeenth day of November, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, the Governor of the said colony, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, in pursuance of the powers vested in him as aforesaid, did define the limits and boundaries of certain ports in the said colony, and did proclaim and declare that certain rules and regulations therein specified for the governance and preservation of the said ports, and for the regulation of shipping in the same, should be substituted for other rules and regulations, previously in force: Now I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare that the following shall be added to the rules and regulations contained in the proclamation above referred to, viz.:—
The Government take no charge of vessels or boats while lying within any port; their security and safety, whether at an anchor or moored alongside any pier or jetty, is at the risk of the owners.

THE Governor in Council has substituted the subjoined Regulations for the Victorian Volunteer Force, in lieu of the Regulations approved on the 21st of September, 1863.

DEFINITION OF AN EFFECTIVE—NAVAL, ARTILLERY, AND RIFLE VOLUNTEERS.

1. On the 1st January in any year after 1864, the following volunteers, and no others, will be classed as effectives in the above-named branches of the force—

(A.) Any volunteer who was enrolled before the 1st April of the year next preceding, and who has gone through the course of musketry instruction for that year, and has also during that year

- (1.) Attended two battalion parades.
- (2.) Attended and passed two parades for official inspection.
- (3.) Attended thirteen other parades.
- (4.) Attended seven other, either parades or company drills.

(B.) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st April and 30th June of the year next preceding, and has during that year

- (1.) Attended two battalion parades.
- (2.) Attended and passed two parades for official inspection.
- (3.) Attended nine other parades.
- (4.) Attended five other, either parades or company drills.

(C.) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st July and 30th September of the year next preceding, and who has during that year

- (1.) Attended one battalion parade.
- (2.) Attended and passed at one parade for official inspection.
- (3.) Attended seven other parades.
- (4.) Attended three other either parades or company drills.

ENROLMENT.

2. No person shall be enrolled in any corps till he has gone through recruit drill.

3. No person shall be re-enrolled who has been discharged from the force for misconduct.

RECRUIT DRILL.

4. Recruit drill shall mean twelve drills of one hour each, and passing inspection, all within the fortnight. Should the recruit fail to pass inspection, he must attend six drills during the next week, or twelve drills in any subsequent fortnight, before again presenting himself to pass inspection.

PARADES.

5. In the definition of an effective, a parade shall mean an assembly of a corps under arms in the open air, whereat not less than 40 members are present, for three-quarters of an hour at least. Should the corps, having assembled in sufficient numbers, be dismissed, from inclement weather, before the three-quarters of an hour be passed, the officer commanding the force may allow the parade to be returned.

6. A company drill shall mean any assembly of a corps for drill whereat not less than 20 members are present. Officers commanding corps may not return in any month more than four parades and four company drills ordered by themselves.

7. For the purposes of battalion drill or inspection, the officer commanding the force may order other parades of corps in addition to the four specified in the preceding regulation, which may be returned by officers commanding corps.

8. A battalion parade shall mean an assembling of two or more corps under the conditions of the regulations defining a parade.

9. Where any corps is composed of two portions in different localities, the officer commanding the force may make a proportionate alteration in the numbers to constitute parades and drills, and such other special provisions as to returns as may to him seem necessary.

INSPECTION.

10. Every corps shall parade for inspection quarterly, on such days and at such hours as shall be appointed by the officer in command of the force.

11. To pass inspection, all naval, artillery, and rifle volunteers will be required to satisfy the inspecting officer in company drill, and in the Manual and Platoon Exercises.

12. Naval and artillery volunteers will further be required to pass in gun drill; rifle volunteers will further be required to pass in light infantry drill.

UNIFORM AND ALLOWANCES.

13. Uniform will be supplied to members on the requisition of the officer commanding the corps, the cost of which will be debited to him in the annual account.

14. At the commencement of each year the commanding officer will also be debited with £182 10s. for drill instruction.

15. At the commencement of each year the commanding officer will be credited for each effective member of his corps in the following sums:—

16. If the debit exceed the credit, no money will be paid to the officer commanding; if the balance be the other way, he will receive it for incidental expenses.

17. No claim shall be admitted at the commencement of any year, if the number of effectives in the corps be below 75; and the services of such corps shall be dispensed with.

FINES AND SUBSCRIPTION.

18. Every volunteer who fails to attend muster for parades twice in each month, shall pay Two shillings and sixpence fine to his corps; if a corporal or sergeant, Five shillings; if a commissioned officer, Ten shillings,—unless on leave of absence or medical certificate.

19. No corps shall impose by rule a subscription of more than One shilling a week.

MISCELLANEOUS.

20. Any volunteer who shall not, during the times of training and exercise, conduct himself in an orderly manner, or shall not obey the command of his superior officer, may be placed in the custody of members of the volunteer force for the period of such training or exercise.

21. Any volunteer may, for any military offence, be placed under arrest by his superior officer.

22. Arrest shall signify a suspension from all military duty; and members placed in arrest shall, on demand, deliver up their arms and accoutrements and uniform to such person as the officer commanding the corps may direct.

23. The officer commanding the volunteer force may at any time order a court of enquiry to be assembled; and such courts of enquiry shall be conducted, as far as practicable, according to the regulations in force in Her Majesty's Army.

24. Acting appointments for temporary purposes, as officers and non-commissioned officers, may be given by the officer commanding the force; and volunteers, while holding such appointments, shall exercise the same authority as though they were permanently appointed.
