NOTICE TO APPLICANTS FOR LEASES OF AURI-FEROUS LANDS.

THE attention of applicants for Mining Leases is directed to the Ninth and Eleventh clauses, Leases, of the Regulations under Act No. 148, relating to Leases of Auriferous Lands, and for other purposes, where it is notified that—

- 9. The parcel of land demised shall be, in ordinary leases, in the form of a parallelogram (except where the same shall be impracticable by reason of the adjoining land being occupied, or from insuperable impediments), and the maximum length thereof shall not, except as herein-after provided for, exceed more than twice the maximum breadth, and shall be accurately described by metes and bounds.
- 11. The extent of the areas of leases shall be (except in special cases hereinafter provided for):—
 - For ordinary leases an area not less than one acre nor more than thirty acres.
 - 2. For quartz leases an area the length of which shall not exceed six hundred yards, nor be less than one hundred yards along the line of the lode, and the width thereof shall not be more than two hundred yards nor less than fifty yards measured across the lode;

and they are hereby required to mark out such lands as near as may be in the form therein prescribed.

Much delay and no little inconvenience have occurred in consequence of lessees marking out areas in such a manner as to include lands which by law cannot be demised for mining purposes.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-seventh year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, The Post Office Statute, 1864, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may from time to time impose and alter fees to be paid upon letters, packets, and newspapers registered under the said Act, or posted after the time appointed by the Postmaster General for closing the mails, and for the use of private boxes and private bags: And whereas it is further enacted that the Postmaster General shall levy and receive in respect to all money orders issued under the provisions of the said Act a commission at such rate as the Governor in Council may from time to time appoint and fix: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that on and after the 3rd day of August instant, the following fees be imposed:—

REGULATIONS FOR THE CONDUCT AND GUIDANCE OF POSTMASTERS,

MADE BY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL, UNDER 27 VICTORIA, No. 226, CLAUSE 3.

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1. 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2. Every Postmaster is required to make himself thoroughly acquainted with the provisions of the "Post Office Statute 1864," and of the Regulations made by the Governor in Council for the conduct and guidance of Postmasters, and no plea of ignorance of such Act or Regulations can be admitted in extenuation of any breach of duty.

. 3. Every Postmaster is required to give security for the due performance of his duty, in Po such amount and in such manner as may be from time to time determined by the minister duly authorized in that behalf.

8. Postmasters not on the establishment will be paid for their services out of "Contingencies;" and their allowances, which will be regulated according to the amount of business transacted at their respective offices, will be payable half-yearly.

9. Under ordinary circumstances, post offices will be open to the public from 9 a.m. to Hours of attendances, for daily (Sundays excepted), except during such times as may be necessary for sorting and making up mails.

Postmasters will, however, be liable to be called upon, if it should appear necessary to the Head of the Department, to open their offices at earlier or later hours, or both, and on Sundays.

14. Postmasters must keep on hand an adequate supply of postage stamps for sale to the public; and in order that it may not be necessary for them to have recourse to their private funds, an advance of stamps (to be considered the property of the Government) will be made to them as soon as the necessary organizes has been given. them as soon as the necessary guarantee has been given:

15. Postmasters must, at convenient times, requisition for a fresh supply of stamps equal in value to those sold by them on behalf of the department.

16. Postmasters must send with their requisitions for stamps a remittance by cheque or bank draft in favor of the Secretary of the Post Office; Melbourne, for the full amount requisitioned for. In cases where neither cheques nor bank drafts can be obtained, bank notes must be sent in halves at different times. To prevent delay in forwarding postage, stamps that may be tioned for. In cases where neither cheques nor bank drafts can be obtained, bank notes must be sent in halves at different times. To prevent delay in forwarding postage stamps that may be requisitioned for, cheques or drafts must, in all cases where practicable, be drawn on a bank in Melbourne.

Postmasters to obtain supply of stamps fro 17. Postmasters are to obtain their supplies of postage stamps upon requisition from the Head Office only, and on no account to purchase stamps from licensed vendors. In making requisition for stamps, the number of each class and value must be duly entered.

Remittances to be registered.

18. Letters containing remittances must be indorsed (if with a requisition for stamps) "Requisition and Remittance," or otherwise "Remittance." Such letters must also be entered on the letter-bill, and enclosed in the registered mail.

Letters inclosing remittances from licensed vendors must also be entered on the letter-bill thus "Requisition from Licensed Vendor."

Cash to be forwarded to Head Office when taken for postage. 27 Vic., 226, c. 20, 19. When, from unforeseen circumstances, Postmasters are obliged to take money for postage, it must be remitted by the first mail to Melbourne, together with an explanation of the reason for being compelled to receive cash.

Custodyof moneys held for public purposes. 20. Every Postmaster who may be entrusted with public money for the purpose of enabling him to pay money orders drawn upon his office, or who may receive money from any person for money orders drawn by him on any other post office, or who may receive money for postage stamps, sold by him in pursuance of the foregoing Regulations, or who shall receive any postage or fee under the "Post Office Statute" in money, or any money whatsoever on the public account must use such moneys for public purposes only, and must at any time when directed to do so by the Head of the Department, or by such other officer as may be duly authorized in that behalf, remit, or otherwise account for, such money in part or in full as such officer may require.

Head of Department to approve of opening public bank account. 21. Every Postmaster who may find it necessary to lodge the public money entrusted to his care or received by him as hereinbefore mentioned in any bank must, before making such deposit, obtain the sanction of the Head of the Department, and every Postmaster who may be so authorized to deposit the public money must open an account, to be called a "Public Account," and to be so described in the bank books; and all deposits of public money must be made by such Postmaster as to the credit of such public account, and all cheques drawn by the Postmaster against such public account must be so described on the face thereof and bear the official designation of the Postmaster in the manner following:—

Care to be taker of registered letters. 23. Especial care must be exercised in the treatment of registered letters, packets, and newspapers, so that they can at any time be traced to each person through whose hands they have passed.

Postmasters to see that proper amount of post age is affixed to registered letters to 24. Before a letter, packet, or newspaper is registered, it must be seen that the proper amount of postage has been affixed, in addition to the registration fee, otherwise such letter, packet, or newspaper will be sent to its destination, and any deficient postage will be charged against the officer who registered the same.

Registered letters &c., to be stamped. 25. Every registered letter, packet, or newspaper, must have the word "Registered" stamped or plainly written, together with the number, on the left-hand side, above the address, and the name of the sender must be written on the back near the seal.

Address of registered letters, &c., to be entered in book. 26. The address of each registered letter, packet, or newspaper, and the name of the sender must be entered on the butt of the receipt book, and also on the receipt to be handed to the person registering such letter, packet, or newspaper; the receipt to be also stamped with the office date-stamp and duly signed.

Registeredletters, &c., to be entered on letter-bill. 27. The addresses of registered letters, packets, and newspapers, with their respective numbers, must, in every instance, be entered on the letter-bill of the mail by which they are despatched.

How registered letters, &c., are to be sorted. 28. Registered letters, packets, or newspapers, received for delivery at any office, are not to be sorted into the pigeon holes with unregistered letters, but must be kept apart in a secure place, and dockets or memoranda of the addresses of such registered letters, packets or newspapers, are to be placed in their proper places with the ordinary letters.

Registered letters &c., to be entered in book and receipts obtained for same. 29. The addresses of registered letters, packets, or newspapers, received by post for delivery, must be entered in a book supplied for that purpose; and when such letters, packets, or newspapers are delivered, the signature of the receiver must, in every instance, be taken, and the date of delivery recorded.

When registered letter, &c., is lost. 30. Should a registered letter, packet, or newspaper be at any time missing and the person in the employment of the Post Office, who last signed for it, be unable satisfactorily to account for the same, he will be held liable for the loss.

As to registered letters returned through Dead Letter Office. 31. In order to enable Postmasters to determine an applicant's right to a registered letter, packet, or newspaper, returned to the writer through the Dead Letter Office, the original address will be written on the back of the official cover, in the Melbourne Office.

32. Registered letters, packets, or newspapers, are required to be posted one hour before posting registered letters. the time appointed for closing mails, and before 4 p.m. daily.

33. The forms are to be delivered to the Postmaster duly directed, open, and in duplicate. The Postmaster will then compare them, and on being satisfied that they are alike in their address and contents, stamp both with the office date-stamp, return one to the person presenting the notice, and forward the other (after sealing or securing it) to its address by the post.

37. Postmasters are required to observe the distinction between packets posted under the 10th and 11th Clauses of the Postage Act (see also Section XIV. of annexed Schedule A) and book packets forwarded to the United Kingdom and certain British Colonies, under the bookpost regulations. (See Section XV. of annexed Schedule A).

38. Postmasters are required to observe the distinction between town, country, and foreign letters, packets, and newspapers.

39. Postmasters who may be called on to re-direct from one place to another, within the Arto direction colony, any letter, packet, or newspaper, which shall have been carried to its original address, 27 are required to charge such letter, packet, or newspaper, which shall have been carried to its original address, are required to charge such letter, packet, or newspaper, with the amount of postage with which it would have been chargeable if the same had been originally posted at the office at which the same may be re-directed; and the amount with which such letter, packet, or newspaper, is so chargeable, shall be written by the Postmaster in the stamp "More to pay," engraved thereon, in addition to any other charge to which such letter, packet, or newspaper may be liable; for example, a letter not exceeding half an ounce, posted at Melbourne for Castlemaine, is carried to its destination, and on its reaching Castlemaine the Postmaster at that place is requested by the person to whom it is addressed, to re-direct it to any other post office. The Postmaster re-directs the letter accordingly, impresses it with the stamp, "More to pay," and writes within the stamp the amount of postage with which the letter is chargeable for re-direction, in addition to any other charge for deficient postage, &c., to which the letter so re-directed may be liable; and the amount to be charged for re-direction must be determined by the weight of the letter, and by the fact of its being re-directed to any place within ten miles of the post town at which it is re-directed or other-wise, according to the Schedule A. hereunto annexed.

40. Postmasters who may be required to re-direct town, country, or foreign letters, packets, or newspapers to places beyond the colony must, except in cases hereinafter mentioned, see that the foreign rates of postage, together with all other charges, are fully prepaid before transmission.

41. Postmasters who may be required to re-direct town or country letters, packets, or A newspapers to the United Kingdom, South Australia, Western Australia, or New Zealand, must forward the same if one full foreign rate is paid in addition to the amount of the original colonial postage, but letters received from any place beyond the colony must, if re-directed out of Victoria, be fully prepaid before transmission.

42. Postmasters are required to see that the proper amount of postage is placed, in e stamps, upon all letters, packets, or newspapers posted at their offices, according to the hereunto annexed.

43. Postmasters must not forward any letter or packet unless it bears at least one rate of e.

^{*&}quot;It shall be sufficient in every case of notice to any person objected to in any electoral list if the notice "so required to be given as aforesaid shall be sent by post the sum chargeable as postage for the same being "first paid directed to the person to whom the same shall be sent at his place of abode as described in the said "list and when any person shall be desirous of sending any such notice of objection by the post he shall "deliver the same duly directed open and in duplicate to the Postmaster of any post office within such hours "as shall have been previously given notice of at such post office and under such regulations with respect to "the registration of such letters and the fee to be paid for such registration (which fee shall in no case exceed "two-pence over and above the ordinary rate of postage) as shall from time to time be made by the Postmaster-"General in that behalf and in all cases in which such fee shall have been duly paid the Postmaster shall "compare the said notice and duplicate and on being satisfied that they are alike in their address and their "contents shall seal or secure and forward one of them to its address by the post and shall return the other to "the party bringing the same duly stamped with the stamp of the said post office and the production by the "party who posted such notice of such stamped duplicate shall be evidence of the notice having been given to "the person at the place mentioned in such duplicate on the day which such notice would in the ordinary course of post have been delivered."

Letters bearing single rate to b forwarded to certain places.

- 44. Postmasters must forward to destination town and country letters and packets bearing a single rate of postage, but they are to impress on the face of such letters or packets the stamp "More to pay," and within such stamp the Postmaster must write double the amount of deficient postage to be charged on delivery.
- 45. Postmasters must forward letters posted in the colony, addressed to the United Kingdom, South Australia, and New Zealand, if a single rate be prepaid, and the deficient postage, together with a fine equal to a single rate, will be charged on delivery; but foreign letters addressed to other places must be fully prepaid before they can be transmitted.

Irregularly posted letters, ac.

46. Postmasters are to treat the following letters, packets and newspapers (posted in the colony) as irregularly posted, and to forward the same at once to the Dead Letter Office:

(a.) Letters and packets posted unpaid, except such as are "On Her Majesty's ice," and impressed with an official "frank stamp," or bearing less than a single to the saids in the :-- rate of postage. . . .

27 Vic., No. 225, clause 27.

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(b.) Foreign letters reasonably suspected to contain gold or silver.

(c.) Packets posted or suspected to be posted in violation of Clauses 10 and 11 of the Postage Act.

(d.) Newspapers unpaid or over five ounces in weight, or posted in violation of the 13th Clause of the Postage Act.

directed, so that they cannot be forwarded to their destination.

(f.) Letters, packets, and newspapers bearing any obscene or profane address, or reasonably suspected to have been posted in violation of the "Post Office Statute.".

As to delivery of letters.

47. Postmasters can only deliver letters upon the personal application of the persons to whom they are addressed, or upon the written instructions of such persons. Such written orders and instructions to be preserved by the Postmaster for reference.

48. Postmasters shall not willingly or knowingly open, detain, or delay any letter or packet which shall come into their hands, power, or custody, by reason of their employment relating to the Post Office, nor suffer any such letter or packet to be opened, detained, or delayed, except by consent of the person for whom it may reasonably be supposed to be intended, or by direction of the Governor in Council.

49. The strictest caution must be observed by Postmasters to prevent the wrong delivery of letters, and such information is to be required of the particulars of the address, and of the towns where posted, as will tend to show whether letters are intended for applicants or not.

..... 50. Postmasters should always bear in mind, that it is their duty to use every exertion to secure the safe delivery of letters to the rightful owners as speedily as possible.

Letters opened.

51. Any letter that may be opened by a person for whom it is found not to be intended must be immediately re-scaled by the Postmaster, and marked on the back, in the handwritings of the opener, thus, "Not for "... of ""...

As to the return of re-directed letters in certain cases,

52. Postmasters must immediately return any re-directed letter, packet, or newspaper to the office from which it is received if found not to be intended for the person applying for the same; but before any letter is opened by any person, the postage due thereon must be paid to the Postmaster, and cannot afterwards be returned, even should the letter be found not to be intended for the person who opened it.

53. Postmasters are required to pay especial attention to recorded addresses, and to all applications for letters that may be received, as the advertising of unclaimed letters is to be discontinued.

etter once posted becomes the property of the person to whom it is "ressed,

54.: A letter once posted becomes the property of the person to whom it is addressed, and cannot be given up again without the consent in writing of such person. No request, however urgent, will justify a departure from this rule.

55. Postmasters are required to observe the following rules in respect to unclaimed letters :-----

(a) Victorian letters (that is, letters posted within the colony), if not claimed, are to be kept at the post office to which they are directed the remainder of the month in which they are received, and the whole of the following month; and if still undelivered; must then be sent to the Dead Letter Office by the first mail in the next month, or the third ic., No. 226, after receipt.

(b.) Intercolonial letters (that is, letters posted in any of the Australian Colonies, or New Zealand), if not claimed, are to be kept three clear months, and are to be sent to the Dead Letter Office by the first mail in the fifth month after receipt.

- (c.) British and foreign letters (that is, letters posted in the United Kingdom, or at any place beyond the Australian Colonies), if not claimed, are to be kept six clear months, and are to be sent to the Dead Letter Office by the first mail in the eighth month after receipt.
- (d.) Dead letters are always to be returned in the covers supplied for that purpose, except in cases where the letters are too numerous, and then a bag must be used, properly sealed, with the address label indorsed "Dead Letters." Unclaimed registered letters must be entered on the dead letter bill, in the usual way, when returned to Melbourne.

- (e.) Subpostmasters and Postmasters who do not receive mails direct from Melbourne, are to forward their dead letters and monthly lists to the Head Office with which they are in communication, for onward transmission from thence to the Dead Letter Office.
- (f.) A careful examination must be made of all letters lying at a post office at the end of each month, in order to ensure the correct return of such as have become dead letters.
- (g.) All unclaimed letters must bear the date-stamp of the day on which they are made up for return to the Dead Letter Office.
- (h.) Unclaimed newspapers are to be returned to the General Post Office after having been kept the respective periods prescribed for the retention of the several classes of unclaimed letters. They must be returned by the first mail in each month, in a separate unclaimed letters. They must be returned parcel, labelled "Unclaimed Newspapers."
- 56. Postmasters are required to observe, that newspapers must be posted without a cover, or in a cover open at the ends or sides, and that the words "Newspaper only" must be placed of the placed of the ends of in a visible and legible manner on the outside.

57. Postmasters are also required to observe, that there must not be in or upon any 27 Vic. No. 226, newspaper or the cover thereof "Any communication character figure letter or number other "then a line description of the cover the cov "than a line drawn through any report article or paragraph therein the printed title of such "newspaper the printed names occupations and places of business of the printer publisher and "vendor thereof the name occupation and address of the person to whom it is sent and the "words aforesaid" (Newspaper only), nor shall anything be enclosed in, or with, or accompany such newspaper or cover, otherwise it cannot be forwarded. Any violation of the above renders the sender liable to a regulty of not less than five nor more than five regulds. the sender liable to a penalty of not less than five nor more than fifty pounds.

58. Postmasters must notify to the public, that newspapers are required to be posted one hour prior to the time appointed for closing the mails, and before four p.m. daily.

Notice to be given very important market.

59. Postmasters are required to observe the following rules in respect to the despatch posts and receipt of mails. and receipt of mails.

- (a.) The postage stamps on letters posted must be obliterated with the stamp provided for that purpose, and the office date-stamp must be impressed as legibly as possible on the back of all letters, whether for delivery at the several post offices, or for transmission to other post offices, as soon after receipt as practicable. In cases where Postmasters are unprovided with a date-stamp, the name of the office, and date of receipt, must be written on each letter in ink.
- (b.) Postmasters at places from which mails first start, or from which mail lines branch, are severally required to enter upon a way-bill a list of the mails forwarded by each despatch, and hand it to the mailman, taking his receipt in a book to be kept for the purpose.
- (c.) On receiving mails at intermediate post offices, Postmasters are to sign the waybill for the mails delivered to them, and note the time of arrival. They will then enter on the bill the number and destination of the bags they are about to despatch, noting the time of departure, and taking the mailman's receipt in the mail-book.
- (d.) Postmasters at places situated at the end of a mail line of road, will also sign the way-bill for the mails they receive, note the time of arrival, and forward the bill by return post to the office at which it was first issued, for record; the Postmaster at that place to report to this office any irregularity on the face of the bill.
- (e.) If a mail or mails be at any time left behind at a post office through the negligence of the contractor or mailman, immediate steps must be taken for having such mail or mails conveyed onward to destination, or until the mailman is overtaken; and the cost, which the Postmaster must immediately make known to the Head Office, will be charged against the contractor.
- f.) On receiving mails, the seals are to be examined, to ascertain if they have in any way been tampered with. In opening the bags, care must be taken not to cut or injure them, and all mail-bags should be turned inside out so as to render it impossible for any letter or paper to be left in them.
- (g.) The Postmaster or receiving officer must carefully check the contents of mails with the letter-bill (Schedule B), to see that they agree; and if any discrepancy appears, the fact must be immediately reported, and the letter-bill returned for correction. If the letter-bill is correct it must be at once signed and forwarded to the Head Office.
- (h.) No Postmaster may open any mail not directed to his own office, nor in any way interfere with mails while in the custody of the contractor, except it be necessary for their protection.
- (i.) All mails on being despatched are to be correctly addressed with the parchment labels provided for the purpose, and securely fastened with twine, and sealed with the office seals.
- (j.) The address labels must be returned by the first opportunity to the office from which they have been received.

- (h.) A letter-bill (form as per Schedule C. annexed), accurately describing the contents of the mail, is to be forwarded with every despatch, and when there are neither letters nor newspapers, a bag must be forwarded as usual, enclosing a letter-bill marked "Nil."
- (l) Letter-bills are to be numbered consecutively, a fresh number to be commenced with the first mail in each year.
- (m.) Special instructions will from time to time be issued as to the places with which Postmasters are to exchange mails, and the hours for closing such mails, and on no account are mail arrangements to be altered without proper sanction.
- (n.) Postmasters are required to report to the Head of the Department any irregularity relating to the business of the post office that may come under their notice, particularly as regards delay in the time of arrival and departure of mails, injury to same from wet or other causes, or any other breach of contract.
- (o.) Letters addressed to places for which Postmasters do not make up separate mails should be forwarded to the nearest post office in direct communication with the post town given in the address.
- (p.) Letters directed to places unknown to the Postmaster should be forwarded without delay to the General Post Office.
- (q.) Letters sent to any post office in error, ought to be stamped with the date-stamp, and "missent" stamp, and forwarded to their proper destination by the first opportunity.

No person unconnected with the department to have access to the Post Uffice.

- 60. Persons unconnected with the Post Office Department are not to be allowed access to the interior of a post office unless accompanied by a responsible officer.
- 61. Postmasters are referred to the Monthly Postal Guide, supplied to every post office, for detailed information relating to postal rates, &c., and they will be guided by the last number they receive.

Bequisitions for stationery, &c 62. Postmasters are to make requisition at the beginning of each month for the printed forms and stationery required, which must be used with a strict regard to economy. Subpostmasters will obtain their supplies from the head office with which they are in direct communication.

Posting of notices at post offices. 63. Provision should be made at every post office for the exhibition of public notices relating to the department.

Penalties for breach of duty 64. The attention of all persons connected with the Post Office Department is called to the penalty incurred under the 61st Clause of the Postage Act, for wilful breach of the provisions of the Act or of these Regulations.

When regulations

65. These Regulations shall come into force and effect on the 3rd day of August, 1864, and shall take the place of the Regulations of the 20th June, 1854, and of the Instructions to Country Postmasters of 5th February, 1861.

VIII.—PREPAYMENT OF POSTAGE.

The postage upon all letters, packets, and newspapers must be prepaid by affixing stamps thereon, except it may happen that any Postmaster shall not have stamps of the requisite value for sale, in which case the postage may be prepaid in coin, and shall be acknowledged by such Postmaster on the face or cover of such letter, packet, or newspaper.

Town and country letters and packets, bearing postage stamps equal in value to one single rate (letters not exceeding half an ounce, town 2d., country 4d., packets not exceeding four ounces 2d.), will be regularly transmitted; but if over the above weight, will be charged on delivery double the amount of postage which may have been omitted to be prepaid.

Town, country, and foreign letters, packets, and newspapers, posted without any stamp being affixed thereon, and unpaid, and town, country, and foreign letters and packets stamped or paid less than a single rate of postage, are to be sent without delay to the General Post Office

to be dealt with according to law.

Letters addressed to the United Kingdom, South Australia, Western Australia, and New Zealand, will be forwarded if a single rate be prepaid, and the deficient postage, together. with a fine equal to a single rate, will be charged on delivery.

IX.—Exemptions from Postage Rates.

Letters on the Government service, contained in official envelopes or covers, described on the outside thereof as being "On Her Majesty's Service," and attested with the signature of the Governor, or impressed with "a frank stamp" with the title of a Responsible Minister of the Crown thereon, or the title of the officers in command of any portion of Her Majesty's land and sea forces, and the officers of Her Majesty's Ordnance or Commissariat respectively, are exempt from postage.

The Government Gazette, in printed covers, with the words "On Her Majesty' Service," open at both ends, and bearing the imprint of the Government Printer (if received at the General Post Office from the Office of the Government Printer, but not otherwise), to be exempt from

postage

Letters, newspapers, and packets sent by post from any place beyond the limits of the colony are to be transmitted and delivered free of charge, except in cases where it is necessary to collect postage under an arrangement with the country or colony from which such letters, packets, and newspapers have been received.

X .- RE-DIRECTION OF LETTERS.

If any letter, packet, or newspaper, which shall have been carried according to its original address (before the delivery thereof), be re-directed to some new address within the colony, there shall be paid thereon before delivery, the amount of postage which would have been chargeable upon such letter, packet, or newspaper, if the same had been originally posted at the post office at which the same was re-directed.

XI .- REGISTERED LETTERS.

For the registration of letters, stamps to the value of one shilling must be affixed, in addition to the postage.

XII.—LATE LETTERS.

The following fees are to be charged upon letters posted after the time appointed for closing the mails :-For any time not exceeding one half-hour ... For any time beyond half-an-hour during which letters shall be received at any post office

XIII.—Newspapers.

For each newspaper posted in the colony, not exceeding five ounces in weight, one penny must be prepaid by stamp. Newspapers must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the ends, and the words "Newspaper only" must be placed on the outside of the newspaper or cover.

XIV .- PACKETS.

Town, country, and foreign packets of the description undermentioned, and no others, are to be prepaid by stamp at the following rates:

And an additional shilling on foreign packets. 1. Bankers' packets, containing notes, orders, cheque or pass books, sent by or to any

bank or banker. 2. Packets containing process of, or proceedings or pleadings in, any court, briefs, cases, and instructions for counsel, and their opinions thereon respectively, deeds, affidavits, policies of assurance, letters of attorney, depositions or recognizances.

3. Packets in covers open at each end, containing patterns or samples of merchandise, not liaving a value of their own apart from their mere use as patterns or samples, and either unenclosed or enclosed in bags tied round the neck so as to be easily loosened and refastened.

4. Packets in covers open at each end, containing prices current and catalogues.

5. Packets in covers open at each end, containing Acts of the Victorian or Imperial Parliaments, or printed Votes and Proceedings of either House thereof respectively, or Returns or copies of Returns made by or to any officer in the Public Service.

6. Packets in covers open at each end, containing pamphlets, maps, plans, music, photographs, magazines, reviews, placards, almanacs, prospectuses, paintings, engravings, printers' proofs or periodical publications. 7. Packets in covers open at each end, containing a single printed book.

Provided that "There shall not be in or upon any town country or foreign packet or "the cover thereof any letter communication or intelligence except (in case of patterns or "samples of merchandise) a trade mark numbers and the prices of the articles and on the out-"side, thereof the sender thereof shall subscribe or print with his own name and address a "statement of the contents thereof in the following form (that is to say) 'banker's packet' or "'patterns of merchandise' or other proper description within the words of this Act together "with the word 'only' at the end thereof otherwise such packet shall not be transmitted or "delivered."

Regulations.

Every book packet must be sent either without a cover or in a cover open at the ends or sides.

No book packet must exceed two (2) feet in length, breadth, or depth, or three (3) pounds in weight.

A book packet may contain any number of separate books, almanacs, maps, or prints, and any quantity of paper, vellum, or parchment (to the exclusion of letters, whether sealed or open); and the books, maps, papers, &c., may be either printed, written, or plain, or any mixture of the three.

On the cover or outside of the packet, in addition to the name and address of the person to whom the same is to be delivered, the sender thereof shall be at liberty to subscribe a statement of the contents thereof, together with his name and address.

ment of the contents thereof, together with his name and address.

The books, &c., may be in any binding, mounting, or covering, whether such binding be loose or attached. In the case of prints or maps, rollers may accompany them; and markers, whether of paper or otherwise, may be sent with books or other printed papers.

If a hook nacket he found to contain any anglesure which is sealed or otherwise closed.

If a book packet be found to contain any enclosure which is sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any letter, whether sealed or not, the letter or other enclosure will be taken out and forwarded to the address on the packet, charged with the full postage as an unpaid letter, together with an additional rate equal to the amount chargeable on a book not exceeding half (1) a pound in weight. The remainder of the packet, if fully prepaid, will be forwarded without any extra charge.

If a packet addressed to the United Kingdom, India, Ceylon, Mauritius, Hong Kong, Malta, Gibraltar, Tasmania, Western Australia, South Australia, or New Zealand, be not sufficiently prepaid according to its weight, but nevertheless a single book rate be prepaid, it will be forwarded, charged with the deficient book postage, and with an additional book rate. This does not apply to book packets addressed to New South Wales or Queensland, which must be fully prepaid.

In the event of a book packet addressed to any place being posted altogether unpaid, or prepaid less than a single rate, it will be detained and sent to the Dead Letter Office.

Book packets correctly posted will be delivered according to their addresses without further charge.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CONDUCT AND GUIDANCE OF POSTMASTERS IN TRANSACTING MONEY ORDER BUSINESS.

MADE BY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL UNDER 27 VICT. No. 228, CLAUSES 35, 36 AND 37.

Commission of Money Orders. 2. The commission to be paid on Money Orders will be as follows, viz. :-

Orders payable in Victoria.

Not exceeding Five pounds Sixpence.

Above Five pounds, but not exceeding Ten pounds ... One shilling.

Orders payable in New South Wales, Queensland, South Australia, ... Western Australia, and New Zealand

Not exceeding Five pounds One shilling.

Above Five pounds, but not exceeding Ten pounds Two shillings.

Orders payable in Great Britain and Ireland.

Not exceeding Two pounds One shilling.

Above Two pounds, but not exceeding Five pounds Two shillings and sixpence.

Above Five pounds, but not exceeding Seven pounds... Three shillings and sixpence.

Above Seven pounds, but not exceeding Ten pounds... Five shillings.

Orders may be transmitted by telegraph to all Money Order Offices in Victoria and South Australia having telegraphic communication on payment of the telegraph charge for a message of ten (10) words in addition to the commission.

No fractional part of penny allowed. Particulars required for a Money Order. 3. No Order is to contain a fractional part of a penny.

4. With the following exceptions, no Money Order to be issued unless the applicant furnish the surname and, at least, the initial of one Christian name, both of the remitter and the payee, together with the address of the remitter, for entry in the office books, so that, if necessary, he may be traced. If the applicant, however, tender the name of either the remitter or the payee at greater length, such particulars to be received, and the advice to be made out accordingly.

(1.) If the remitter or payee be a peer or bishop, his ordinary title to be sufficient; if a firm, the usual designation of such firm, such as "Baring Brothers," "Smith and Son," "Jones and Co.," to suffice; but the mere term "Messrs," such as "Messrs. Rivington," or the name of a company trading under a title which does not consist of the names of the persons composing it, such as the "Carron Co.," to be inadmissible.

(2.) The remitter, on stating that the Order is to be paid only through a bank, to have the option of giving or withholding the name of the payee, or to substitute for the name of the payee any other designation, such as "The Chief Clerk of the Foreign Office;" in such cases, the officer drawing the Order to cross it in the same way that cheques are commonly crossed when they are intended to

be paid through a bank.

Issue of Money

5. On an application for a Money Order, the particulars must first be entered in the issuing journal, and then the corresponding Order and advice must be prepared, and the date stamped on both; but as Money Orders have sometimes been procured without payment, postmasters are cautioned always to demand the money at the outset before attention is diverted to other matters.

Despatch of letters of advice. 6. When an Order is issued, payable in Victoria; the advice must invariably be despatched by the first mail to the office on which it is drawn. The advices of Orders payable in the other colonies and the United Kingdom to be sent in the first instance to the Melbourne Office; such advices, as well as those drawn upon Melbourne, to be tied together (unfolded) and enclosed in the envelope containing the daily account and returned advices.

How to write ou an Order. 7. When an Order is demanded for a smaller sum than One pound, the postmaster must strike his pen through the £ and adjoining space both at the head and in the body of the Order, thus, \pounds ; again, when no amount is inserted in the space proper for shillings or pence, he must draw his pen through the vacant spaces; and when an amount is inserted which does not fill up the space, he must strike the pen through the portion unoccupied; so as, in all cases, effectually to prevent any subsequent alteration of the Order.

Opening of new Money Order 8. Every postmaster who issues or pays Money Orders, when he receives notice of the opening of any new office, or of any change whatever relative to Money Order Offices, must immediately make the necessary correction in his list.

Errors in Money

9. If an error of any kind be committed in filling up a Money Order, a new Order must be made out, as no alterations or erasures are permitted. Every spoiled Money Order must be sent with the advice in the account in which it would have been entered had it been issued, indorsed with an explanation of the irregularity, and the words "Not granted" must be inserted against the corresponding number in the issuing journal, and in the account furnished to the Melbourne Office. Care must be taken in separating an Order from an advice that neither be torn.

10. An Order once issued cannot be cancelled.

Order must not

11. Should any blank Order be omitted in the series supplied to the postmaster, and the circumstance not discovered in time to have such omission supplied from the Melbourne Office, a note must be made opposite the blank number in the account in which, if supplied, the Order would have appeared. Postmasters should be careful to examine the supplies of Orders and advices immediately upon their receipt, and report all irregularities to the Melbourne Office.

Receipt of ad-

12. Advices on their arrival must be examined to see whether the relative Orders are payable at that particular office; and also whether the advices issued in the other colonies and the United Kingdom have the Melbourne office stamp on them, which they are in all cases required to bear. They must then be arranged in alphabetical order, according to the names of the towns of issue, and entered in the advice book (No. 8). Should an advice of back date be

received, it must not be entered until a careful examination has been made in the advice book, to see whether the relative Order may not have been already advised; but if no such record be found, the advice must be entered in the place where it would have stood had it arrived in due course. After the advices have been entered, they must be compared with the entries to see that these are correct. The advices must then be stamped (at the places indicated upon them) and transmitted (the alphabetical order being still kept) to the Melbourne Office."

13. When an Order is presented with which the advice does not agree as to number or amount, or for which no advice has been received, payment must be refused until the issuing postmaster has been communicated with (by means of the printed forms furnished for that purpose), and the error or omission corrected or supplied. In cases of omission to advise, the irregularity must immediately be reported to the Melbourne Office (by means of the printed form supplied for the purpose).

14. When an Order is presented for payment, the postmaster must first see that the corresponding advice has been received, and that the date, number, and amount entered on the Order, agree with those in the advice, and unless the Order be paid through a bank, that the signature of the payee be as full as that given in the advice, and be not in any way inconsistent therewith. He must then call upon the applicant to give the name of the remitter, and if, the reply be correct, the Order must be paid, unless the postmaster (or, in his absence, his chief clerk, or, if he have no chief clerk, the officer whose duty it is to pay the Order) have good reason for suspecting fraud, the case must be immediately reported to the Secretary for instructions. When an Order is paid through a bank, it is sufficient that it be receipted (without regard to any discrepancy between the signature and the name in the advice, or to whether the receipt is given by the payee himself or by any other person), and that it be presented (crossed with the name of the receiving bank) by some person known to be in the employment the every defend to a way and by the of the bank. 15. If the payee be unable to write he must sign the receipt by making his mark, to be witnessed in writing, as for example :--Joseph Allen,

The witness must sign his name with his address in the presence of the paying officer, who must then certify the payment by adding his initials. The witness must be known to the paying officer, but it is desirable (though not imperative) that he be not connected with the office. In no case must the paying officer act as witness. It is not necessary that the witness should be personally acquainted with the payee. يُم معوديِّه عامية

16. When an Order is paid, it must immediately be initialed by the paying officer, the Stamplan date of payment entered in the advice book, and the Order must forthwith be stamped with the date of payment, and the proper entry made in the paid journal.

17. Payment of an Order to be obtained before the end of the sixth calendar month after Lapsed that in which it was drawn; for instance, if drawn in January, payment to be obtained before the end of July, otherwise the Order to become lapsed, and a new Order (for which a second commission, to be deducted from the amount of the Order, will be charged) to become necessary.

18. Any person presenting a lapsed Order to be directed to transmit it, with an application for a new Order, to the Melbourne Office. 1. 4.1.

19. If an Order be not paid before the end of the twelfth calendar month after that in The which it was drawn-for instance, if drawn in January, and not paid before the end of the following January-all claim to the money to be forfeited, unless, under peculiar circumstances, the post office of the country in which the Order was drawn think proper to allow it. -i.

20. After once paying a Money Order, by whomsoever presented, the office is not liable to any further claim.

21. An account of the Money Order transactions must be made out in the prescribed form (No. 6), and sent to the Melbourne Office daily, enclosed in the proper envelope. h

22. The account must include all the transactions in the period from the last account to the close of the Money Order business of the day on which the new account is dated, and must be forwarded by the first post after such close of business.

23. In the preparation of this account the following course must be pursued: First, the details of each Order issued must be copied from the issuing journal on the debit side of the account; and this copying must be examined to see that it is correct. The journal and account must then be cast up independently, and it must be seen that the two totals agree. Should they not agree, the additions must be repeated, and then if the error do not appear, the separate entries in the account must be again compared with those in the journal; and the examination must be continued until the mistake is found out and corrected. The Orders paid must next be entered alphabetically on the credit side of the account. As with the debit side, the account and the paid journal must be cast up independently, and it must be seen that the totals agree.

24. The paid Orders must be enclosed as vouchers in the account in which they are claimed. Any claim for which the corresponding voucher is not enclosed will be disallowed; as will also (until corrected) any Order which is not stamped with the date of payment, or not properly receipted. When corrected, such Order must be entered in the day's account then in hand, re-stamped with the date of such account, and returned to the Melbourne Office enclosed therein.

25. Immediately after the last day of each calendar month, a statement of the Money Order transactions for the month then just ended must be made out in the prescribed form (No. 7): If this statement be found correct, the postmaster will receive an acknowledgment to that effect; if inaccurate, it will be corrected and then returned, in order that the corrections

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may be duly entered in the postmaster's books; after which it must be again remitted to the Melbourne Office, its correctness being certified in the form of acknowledgment sent with the corrected statement.

Correction of ac

26. A postmaster must at once correct in his Money Order books every error pointed out to him, so that his accounts and returns of transactions may agree with the records in the Melbourne Office; and he must take care that in his correspondence with that office all papers received therefrom are promptly attended to and duly returned.

Advance for payment of Money Orders. 27. Every postmaster who issues and pays Money Orders will be supplied from the Head Office with an advance in money (for which he must give a receipt) to enable him to pay Money Orders drawn upon his office. The amount of the advance will be determined and regulated by the business of each Money Order Office.

Advance to be held in trust and accounted for on demand.

28. Every such advance must be held strictly in trust by postmasters for the purpose above mentioned, and must be accounted for by them on demand made by the Head of the Department, or by any officer duly authorized in that behalf; and every postmaster who may find it necessary to lodge any public money as aforesaid in any bank must, before making such deposit, obtain the sanction of the Head of the Department; and every postmaster who may be so authorized to deposit the public money must open an account, to be called a "Public Account," and to be so described in the bank books, and all deposits of public money must be made by such postmaster as to the credit of such public account, and all cheques drawn by the postmaster against such public account must be so described on the face thereof, and bear the official designation of the postmaster in the manner following:—

Public Account.

and every such public account shall be separate and distinct from any private account such postmaster may have at any such bank.

Bemittance of money received for Money Or29. Every postmaster must be careful to remit by the first post all moneys received by him for Money Orders issued from his office, unless he has been advised of Orders having been drawn on him to a greater amount than his advance, in which case he is authorized to retain sufficient money in hand to discharge known liabilities of his office, but must forthwith report the circumstance to the Head Office, and his report must be accompanied by a list of the Orders to meet which such money has been retained.

Sufficient funds to be provided.

- 30. Care should be taken to prevent the balance in hand from being much below the advance; and with that view timely application must be made for funds. Should a postmaster be compelled to refuse payment of an Order for want of funds, he must forthwith report the fact to the Melbourne Office.
- 31. Every cheque, bill, or bank note remitted, must be stamped on its face (as nearly as possible in the centre) with the date-stamp of the day such remittance is made.
- 32. Every letter containing a remittance must be entered in the letter-bill, like a registered letter, the amount contained in the letter being stated opposite the entry on the letter-bill; and if a postmaster do not by return of post receive an acknowledgment of any remittance, he must immediately apprise the Secretary.

Monthly statement of unpaid Orders. 33. On the evening of the last day of each calendar month, the entries of all Orders which have ceased to be payable must be cancelled in the advice book, and the words "Too late" written in the place usually occupied by the date of payment; at the same time a list of all unpaid Orders must be made out on the prescribed form and forwarded to the Melbourne Office with the monthly account.

Duplicate Orders, transfers, repayments, alteration of name, &c. 34. In the case of the miscarriage or the loss of a Money Order, a duplicate is granted on a written application to the Secretary, and by a similar application to the same officer, who can alone act in such cases, authority can be obtained to transfer the payment of an Order, from one office to another, or to stop payment, or to correct any error in the name of the remitter or payee, or to repay the money to the remitter. Every such application, however, must contain a second commission (namely, Sixpence for an Order not exceeding £5, and One Shilling for an Order between £5 and £10), though one commission will suffice, even when, in the same application, more things than one relating to the same Order are asked for—as both the stoppage of payment and repayment to the remitter.

Unless a sufficient reason is given for an exception, the application must be either from the remitter or payee. Whenever, on complaint being made, it is found that the necessity for an application, entailing the payment of a fresh commission, is attributable to the Post Office, the commission will be returned; and when it can be ascertained where the blame lies, the officer in fault will be required to pay the additional commission, the responsibility in the first instance resting on the postmaster.

35. A postmaster must give information how to apply for a Duplicate Order, &c., and must furnish the applicant with the prescribed form of application (forms 24 to 27).

Moreover, when the payment of an Order is refused in consequence of the replies to the questions respecting the remitter not corresponding with the entries in the advice, or of a difference in the name of the receipt, the postmaster should advise the applicant for payment to communicate with the remitter, and to request him to apply to the Secretary, at the Chief Office, enclosing in his application the additional commission chargeable for the alteration required.

- 36. In every case of transfer, repayment, or alteration of name, the document containing the authority must (when the Order has been paid) be fastened to the Order, and returned with it, enclosed in the account to the Chief Office.
- 37. A transferred Money Order, when it has been paid, must be indorsed, "Transferred from [naming the office at which it was originally drawn] to [naming the office at which it was paid]," and an Order after repayment must be crossed with the word "Refunded."

- 38. When a postmaster receives notice of the transfer to a different office, of an Order originally payable at his own, he must immediately cancel the relative entry in his advice book, noting therein the date of transfer.
- 39. The date of issue of a Duplicate Order must be noted in the issuing journal; and should an application be received from the paying office for the advice of an Order of which a duplicate has been issued, it must on no account be forwarded thereto direct, but must be transmitted with the application to the Chief Office.
- 40. On the receipt of a duplicate with the necessary authority for payment, the advice book must be referred to, and the issue of the Duplicate Order and date of its receipt, must be noted therein against the advice entry. Should, however, the original Order have been paid, the duplicate must be immediately returned to the Chief Office. If the original Order be presented after the duplicate has been paid, it must be cancelled, and sent to the Chief Office, unless the presenter refuse to give it up, in which case it may be returned to him, though not until the following words have been written across it, "Cancelled, paid by Duplicate Order on the (adding the date).
- 41. Repayment, whether of an original, or a renewed, or a duplicate Order, is not made to the remitter until it has been ascertained through the Chief Office of the country where such Order was payable, that the advice has been cancelled at the office on which the Order was originally drawn.
- 42. The journals and window books, being the property of the Postmaster-General, Journals must be carefully preserved and delivered up when called for, or when a postmaster quits office.

- 43. The envelopes for transmitting accounts to the Melbourne Office must be kept strictly Envelopes. to their proper use; separate envelopes to be used for transmitting remittances. Letters of advice from one provincial office to another must not be sent in envelopes, but must be sealed or wafered; and should a postmaster receive an advice not sealed or wafered, he must report to the Melbourne Office the name of the office in fault. Such advices must be entered on the
- 44. The hours for issuing Money Orders will be between Ten o'clock a.m. and Three Hours for issuing o'clock p.m. daily, Sundays excepted:

- 45. The postmaster will use for all telegraph messages Form No. 12, as a receipt to the Telegraph Money Order. remitter, and take a receipt, No. 13, from the payee or receiver.
- 46. When a Money Order is applied for to pass through the telegraph, the postmaster will have to send the Order to the Telegraph Office, and on no account entrust it to a stranger or other than an employé of the Post Office (See Form No. 5).

REGULATIONS FOR THE CONDUCT AND GUIDANCE OF LETTER CARRIERS OF THE POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT OF VICTORIA.

MADE BY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL 27 VICT. No. 226

1. Every candidate for employment as Letter Carrier shall produce satisfactory evidence Candidates that he can read and write and has a knowledge of accounts, that he does not exceed the age of 40 years, that he is of sound health, that he is free from any infirmity of mind or body, that he is of sober habits, and in other respects of good character, otherwise he shall not be considered eligible for the appointment.

2. Every person who shall be nominated for the appointment of Letter Carrier, to a Pe vacancy on the permanent Staff, shall serve on probation for three months, during which period, if his conduct shall not prove satisfactory, his services may at any time be dispensed with. If at the expiration of three months from the date of such employment the first class officer in charge of the Department recommend in writing the probationer as a suitable person to be appointed a Letter Carrier he may be appointed, but not without such certificate.

3. Every Letter Carrier must make himself thoroughly acquainted with the following Le Regulations; and in order that he may be able to do so he will be furnished with a copy, for which he must give a receipt and account whenever he is called upon to do so by proper authority

No plea of ignorance of the Regulations will be received in excuse for any breach of duty.

4. Letter Carriers shall not willingly or knowingly open, detain, or delay, any letter or Letter not packet which shall come into their hands, power, or custody, by reason of their employment relating to the Post Office; nor suffer any such letter or packet to be opened, detained, or delayed, except by the consent of the person for whom it may reasonably be supposed to be intended, or by direction of the Governor in Council,

Letter Carriers to give security. 5. Every Letter Carrier must give the security of such Guarantee Societies as may be from time to time approved of in that behalf in the sum of £100, and is required to keep the policy of guarantee in full effect by the regular payment of the premium as it falls due.

etter Carrier's place of abode to be recorded in office '.6. Every Letter Carrier must give his address, and immediately notify any change of place of abode, to the Superintendent of the Mail Branch.

Letter Carriers to have knowledge of beat. Every Letter Carrier must make himself acquainted with residences of persons on such beat as may from time to time be assigned to him.

Hours of duty.

8. Every Letter Carrier must be prepared for duty between the hours of 6 A.M. and 6 P.M. daily, or earlier or later, as occasion may require.

Letter Carriers to be punctual in attendance. 9. Every Letter Carrier must attend punctually at the office at the appointed hours, and write legibly in the Attendance Book his name and the exact time of his arrival and departure.

Letter Carriers not to leave during business hours.

10. No Letter Carrier shall leave the office during business hours, except for dinner (when allowed to do so), without first obtaining permission from the Superintendent.

When Letter Carriers are ill.

- 11. Every Letter Carrier who from illness is unable to attend to his duties, must so inform the officer in charge of Letter Carriers, in writing, before the duties commence.
- If absent twenty-four hours he must send a medical certificate, which, in the event of continued illness, must be renewed every fortnight.

Letter Carriers to wear uniform. 12. Every Letter Carrier, when upon his beat, must appear in uniform (coat and cap, the latter with white cover in fine weather, and black cover when raining or likely to rain), and be at all times neat and clean.

Letter Carriers not to deliver letters in the street.

13. No Letter Carrier shall deliver letters, packets, or newspapers, in the street, or deviate from his direct beat; nor shall any delivery, unless specially ordered, take place either at the office or in the street, before the general despatch from the General Post Office; and letters must be delivered according to the arrangement of the walk, without any preference or partiality to any person or house.

Letter Carriers to endorse undelivered letters, &c. 14. Letter Carriers must state in writing, on the back of any letter or newspaper they cannot deliver, the cause of non-delivery, sign the endorsement, and hand such letter or newspaper forthwith to the officer in immediate charge.

Letter Carriers not to take letters home. 15. No Letter Carrier shall on any account take his bag, or any undelivered letter or newspaper to his home, or go to his home when on duty.

Letter Carriers to re-address mis 16. Every Letter Carrier who shall receive a letter or newspaper wrongly addressed to his walk, shall immediately re-address such letter or newspaper for the information of the Letter Carrier on whose beat it has to be delivered, and hand it to the officer in charge of the Letter Carriers.

As to letters found open. 17. All letters found open or torn by any Letter Carrier must be handed to the officer in immediate charge forthwith.

As to return of undelivered letters to Post Office.

18. No Letter Carrier shall return to the office any letter or newspaper, whether correctly or incorrectly addressed, until he has made every enquiry for the person addressed without success; and before a letter is finally returned to the delivery branch it must be certified as "Not known," "Gone away," or as the case may be, by the Letter Carriers delivering north and south, east and west. Every Letter Carrier must use due diligence in this respect and no excuse will be taken for the detention or non-delivery of any letter or newspaper addressed to any person "well known," or whose address or name appears in the Melbourne Directory or Letter Carrier's Address Book.

Letters, &c., once delivered not to be taken back 19. Letter Carriers must not receive back any letter, packet, or newspaper, once correctly delivered, or leave in the course of delivery any letter, packet, or newspaper, which has not properly passed through a Post Office, or take out any letter, packet, or newspaper, the postage stamps on which have not been properly obliterated, or which does not bear the correct amount of postage, and all Letter Carriers must immediately report to the officer in charge any irregularity that may come under their notice in respect to unpaid, unstamped, or insufficiently paid or stamped letters.

20. Any Letter Carrier receiving charge of a letter that may be opened by a person for whom it is found not to be intended must see that such letter is immediately resealed and endorsed by the person who opened it, thus "Not for of ."

Letter Carriers to ' pay all postage they collect without delay.

21. Every Letter Carrier must without fail pay immediately, on his return to the office from his beat, to the officer in immediate charge all postage collected by him in the course of his delivery.

Letter Carriers not to give information out of the office. 22. Letter Carriers must not communicate, as to postal matters, with any person not attached to the Department, or give any information relative to any letters or newspapers they may have seen or failed to deliver, or converse with any person on private business while on duty.

No book, &c., to be taken from Post Office. 23. No book or document may at any time be taken from the Post Office, or any information relative to any matter of record in the Department be given to the public, unless with the sanction of the Head of the Department.

24. Every Letter Carrier must be ready to leave the office for delivery punctually at Astocommidelivery. the appointed hours. 25. Every Letter Carrier is required to make himself acquainted with the time at which to sort English mails.

As to attendance to sort English mails. his attendance will be required on the arrival and departure of the English mails. Should the English mail arrive on a Sunday, attendance will be required at 12 midnight. 26. In the event of a Letter Carrier making a wrong entry in any book of the Departbooks of the officer of th ment, he is on no account to erase it, but he is immediately to draw the attention of the officer in charge of Letter Carriers to the error, who will make the necessary alteration, and certify to the same by his initials. 27. Letter Carriers are required to take especial care of, and to give a receipt for, letters any Registered letter that may be handed to them, and are held responsible for its correct delivery, in proof of which, they are required to produce the receipt of some person authorised to receive the same. 28. Letter Carriers are to obtain receipts for Registered letters on the right hand bottom As to receipts for registered letcorner of the receipt book, and to write their names across the receipt so that they may at any time be able to speak positively as to the delivery of any particular letter. 29. Any Letter Carrier who may find that he has on hand any letter, packet, or newspaper, intended for any person on another beat, must deliver such letter, packet, or newspaper, provided it be addressed to any house adjacent to the boundary of the Letter Carrier having such letter, &c., in hand. 30. Any postage stamp (whether obliterated or not), money, or other property, found in the office or in any of the Receiving Boxes, is at once to be handed to the Superintendent. - 31. Impressions made by Letter Carriers on letters or newspapers by the obliterating, As to stamping of letters, ac. daily, or other stamps used in the Department, are to be distinct and clear. 32. When the word "Try" is affixed to any address it is to be distinctly understood As to "trying" that the Letter Carrier is to-wait until the person, if on the premises, with whom the letter is tried decides (by opening or refusing it in the presence of the Letter Carrier) whether or not it is intended for him. 33. Special care must be taken by Letter Carriers of all Government property coming care to be taken into their charge. No fittings or other articles may be removed or disturbed without authority; and strict economy must be observed in the use of stores, &c., supplied for the use of the Department. Any Letter Carrier carelessly losing or breaking the key or lock of any receiving pillar of box must pay the expense of repairing the same. 34. No Letter Carrier will be allowed to take possession of any letter, packet, or How private ters to be taken as a second of the control of newspaper addressed to himself, without first drawing the attention of a second person to the

address; or to take possession of any letter, packet, or newspaper out of the regular course of duty without the sanction of the Superintendent. 35. Letter Carriers must be respectful to and promptly obey the orders of their superior Letter Carrie

officers on any point of duty. Should they feel aggrieved at any such orders they may, after performing the acts required of them, appeal to the Superintendent of the Branch, or to the Head of the Department, as the nature of the case may require.

36. Applications for leave of absence, promotion, or on any other official business, are to be made only through the Superintendent to the Head of the Department, or the officer in immediate charge of the Department.

37. In case the use of the Electric Telegraph is rendered necessary in consequence of Letter Carrier must, if required to an error or omission on the part of any Letter Carrier, such Letter Carrier must, if required to do so, bear the cost of the message transmitted

38. Letter Carriers must be perfectly civil in their intercourse with the public, and are letter Carriers to be civil to the public. expected to exercise a proper restraint over their temper, notwithstanding any provocation they may receive in the discharge of their duty.

39. Letter Carriers while in the office must attend to their public duties alone. Strict attention to Newspaper reading, private letter writing, unnecessary noise or conversation, which may interfere with the business of the office, cannot on any account be allowed.

1 40. Letter Carriers are requested to observe that no strangers are admitted inside a strangers no mitted to ome. Post Office.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE CARNGHAM GENERAL CEMETERY.

LL charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. By the 8th section of the Act, it is enacted, that "Any person making a vault or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees under these rules, and upon the payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons and his representatives, for ever."

3. Application for such permission to be made at the office of the trustees. A certificate of permission, in the form set out in the schedule, will be granted to the party applying for such permission, on payment of the charges in the schedule.

4. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on a certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relatives and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

5. Orders for interments to be given at the office of the trustees; such notice to be given between the hours of Ten a.m. and Three p.m. the previous day.

6. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug; but parties wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of the trustees; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent (in writing) of the party entitled thereto, must be left with the order.

7. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased, must be stated at the time of giving the order.

The himse, age, nate or residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased, must be stated at the time of giving the order.

8. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

9. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals will be from Ten am. to Six p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive; and from Ten am. to Four p.m. in the other four months.

10. All monuments, vaults, graves, and grave-stones, to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

11. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, and covered in to the satisfaction of the trustees.

12. A plan of every monument and tombstone proposed to be receted and placed, shall be exhibited to the said trustees shelore permission for the erection thereof is given; and the said trustees shall be at liberty to withhold such permission and prevent the erection of any monument or tombstone which shall appear to them inappropriate or unbecoming; and shall determine and fix the position of any monument or tombstone which may be proposed to be erected, according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery, in an appropriate manner.

13. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees, will be permitted to receive any grantity for the discharge thereof.

14. The ground will be open daily to the public from sunrise to sunset.

15. A pian of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, is kept at the office, and may be inspected at the charge set out in schedule; and register of all grants are kept by the secretary.

By the 14th section of the said Act, it is enacted, "That if any person shall wantonly and wilfully destroy, or do, or cause to be done, any damage to any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree, or plant, in the said cemetery, will be guilty of a misdemeanor, and being convicted thereof, will be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding £20, or, at the discretion of the justices, to imprisonment for any period not exceeding three months; and any person who shall do, or cause to be done, any injury to any such monument, vault, tombstone, erection, railing, shrubbery, tree, or plant, whether the cause shall have been done wilfully or wantonly, or otherwise howsever, shall be liable to pay damages and compensation, which shall be recoverable in any court of competent jurisdiction in the colony by the
