POLLING PLACE FOR ELECTIONS IN A DISTRICT UNDER "THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1863."

At the Government House, Melbourne, the nineteenth day of September, 1864.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act, 1863*, it is amongst other things enacted, that in and for each original district within thirty days after the commencement of this Act, and in and for each single proclaimed district within fifteen days after the constitution thereof, the Governor in Council shall, and from time to time afterwards if it shall seem fit may on the application of the board of any such district, appoint a sufficient number of polling places for every such district at which the poll shall be taken at all elections held for the same, and may from time to time on the like application alter and vary the same: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the fifth day of September instant, the Avon Road District was constituted: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order appoint the township of Stratford to be a polling place for elections under the said Act for the Avon Road District aforesaid.

And the Honorable James Forrester Sullivan shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH ACT EXTENDED TO THE BOROUGH OF TARNAGULLA.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DABLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session held in the eighteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign (number 13), intitled, *An Act for promoting the Public Health in populous places in the colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the said Act, or any clause or section thereof,

shall apply to such city, town, district, or place in Victoria as the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, may by Proclamation see fit to direct: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation declare and direct that the said Act shall apply to and be in force within the borough of Tarnagulla.

LANDING PLACE, ETC., FOR PRISONERS FROM THE "SACRAMENTO" HULK.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor of the said colony to proclaim any hulk or floating prison to be used as a public prison for the reception and safe keeping of all prisoners convicted and sentenced for any offences by any court of the said colony, and to define the limits and boundaries in and around such hulk within which no person shall come, and the place of embarking and landing prisoners to and from such hulk, and such proclamation and the said limits and boundaries from time to time to vary, alter, new assign, and revoke: And whereas by two several Proclamations, bearing date respectively the thirteenth day of March, 1854, and the second day of January, 1855, the hulk *Sacramento* was declared to be a Public Prison, and the limits and boundaries around the same were defined: And whereas it is expedient to employ the prisoners confined on board of the said hulk in quarrying stone and other occupations on the land hereinafter described: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the site hereafter described as the place of embarking and landing prisoners to and from the penal hulk *Sacramento*; and as a place where the said prisoners may be worked, that is to say:—

Eight acres two roods, more or less, county of Bourke, parish of Cut-paw-paw, being part of section 7: Commencing at a point on the west bank of the Yarra-yarra River, said point bearing east from the north-east angle of allotment 40 of section 7; thence west to a point on the east side of allotment 43; thence by part of the east boundary of last-named allotment south six chains; thence by the south boundaries of allotments 43 and 39 and a line bearing east to the west bank of the Yarra-yarra River; and by that bank of the said river northerly to the point of commencement.

DISTRICT BROUGHT UNDER THE GUNPOWDER ACT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the session held in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act to regulate the importation, carriage, and custody of Gunpowder*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to proclaim any town, township, or municipal district, not being a sea-port town, as a district into which no gunpowder shall be brought unless for deposit in a public or licensed magazine; and if any person shall bring more than one hundred pounds of gunpowder into any such district, and shall not forthwith deposit the same in a magazine as aforesaid, it shall be forfeited: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the borough of Tarnagulla as a district into which no

gunpowder shall be brought unless for deposit in a public or licensed magazine.

APPORTIONMENT OF THE TOLLS OF A COMMON-TOLL ROAD.

THE Governor in Council, in pursuance of the provisions contained in the 255th clause of *The Local Government Act, 1863*, has, by an Order in Council made on the 19th day of September, 1864, determined that the tolls payable and collected upon that portion of the Geelong to Ballarat road, proclaimed a Common-toll road under Orders in Council of 22nd February and 18th April, 1864, shall be distributed among the local bodies interested therein in the following proportions, viz. :—

- To the Council of the shire of Buninyong, one-half.
- To the Council of the borough of Ballarat East, one-fourth.
- To the Council of the borough of Buninyong, one-fourth.

The claims of the two latter bodies to take effect from the 22nd of February and the 18th of April respectively.
