THE BOROUGH OF ECHUCA.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-eighth day of December, 1864.

PRESENT:

	His Excellency the Governor
Mr. McCulloch	Mr. Francis

WHEREAS by *The Municipal Corporations Act*, 1863, it is amongst other things enacted that any district not being a district wholly or in part comprised within the limits of the city of Melbourne, or save as therein provided, the town of Geelong, or of any of the boroughs constituted by or under the said Act, which district shall not exceed in area nine square miles, and shall have no one point in such area distant more than six miles from any other point therein, and shall contain a population of inhabitant householders not less than three hundred, may be constituted a borough in manner next hereinafter mentioned; and it is also enacted that if not less than one hundred and fifty of the inhabitant householders resident within any such last-mentioned district shall sign and cause to be presented to the Governor a petition, praying him to constitute such district a borough under the said Act, and in such petition shall set forth accurately the boundaries of the district to which such petition shall refer, and if within one month of the publication as thereinafter mentioned of such petition, an equal or greater number of inhabitant householders resident within such district so described shall not have signed and caused to be presented to the Governor a petition praying him not to grant the prayer of such first-mentioned petition, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by an Order in Council, if it shall seem fit, to con-

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stitute such district, or any portion thereof, a borough within the meaning of the said Act; and it is further enacted that in every such Order in Council as aforesaid the name and boundaries of the borough thereby constituted shall be set forth, and upon the making of every such order the district therein named shall be and be deemed to be a "borough" hereinafter sometimes called a "proclaimed borough" within the meaning of the said Act; provided that such district shall not comprise any locality not included within the boundaries set forth in the petition for the constitution thereof: And whereas a petition in accordance with the provisions of the said Act has been presented to the Governor, signed by not less than one hundred and fifty inhabitant householders resident within the locality hereinafter described, and notice of such petition has been duly given in the *Government Gazette* of the eighteenth day of November now last past: And whereas no petition has been presented to the Governor, in the manner allowed and prescribed by the said Act, praying him not to grant the prayer of the petition above mentioned: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth, in exercise of the power and authority conferred by the said Act, constitute the district hereinafter described a borough within the meaning of the said Act, and doth set forth the name and the boundaries of the said borough in manner following, that is to say:—

THE BOROUGH OF ECHUCA.—Commencing at the west side of the River Campaspe at its junction with the River Murray; thence by a line bearing south 13,500 links; thence by a line bearing east 7000 links to the east bank of the Campaspe River; thence by the east bank of that river to the south-west corner of allotment 44, parish of Echuca North; thence by a line bearing east 6633 links to the south-east corner of allotment 22, parish of Echuca North; thence by a line bearing north 1054 links; thence by a line bearing east 5440 links to the south-east corner of allotment 43; thence by a line bearing north 14,905 links to the Murray River; and thence along the south bank of the River Murray to the commencing point; and comprising an area of 4684 square acres.

And the Honorable James McCulloch, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

INCORPORATION OF HEATHCOTE HOSPITAL.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-eighth day of December, 1864.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for Hospitals and Charitable Institutions*, it is amongst other things enacted, that any institution established for the cure of disease, or for the relief of diseased, aged, incurable, or destitute persons, and supported in whole or in part by the voluntary contributions of not less than fifty persons, each of whom shall have paid not less than One pound per annum or Twenty pounds in one donation, may be incorporated as thereinafter mentioned, and all persons who shall have paid as aforesaid shall be deemed contributors within the meaning of the said Act; and it is also enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than twenty-five of the said persons praying that such institution may be incorporated, to cause the substance or prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition

signed by an equal or greater number of such persons shall have been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication) the Governor in Council may declare the contributors for the time being to such institution to be and they shall thereupon become and continue a body politic and corporate by the style and title named in the Order in Council, and shall have perpetual succession and a common seal: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition signed by not less than twenty-five contributors to the Heathcote Hospital, praying that the said institution may be incorporated: And whereas the substance or prayer of the said petition has been published in the *Government Gazette*, and no counter-petition has been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order declare the contributors to the said institution to be a body politic and corporate in accordance with the provisions of the said Act in manner following, that is to say:—

The contributors for the time being to the institution called and known as the Heathcote Hospital, situate in the borough of Heathcote, are hereby declared to be a body politic and corporate by the style and title of "The Heathcote Hospital."

And the Honorable James McCulloch, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

REGISTRAR GENERAL'S REPORT OF THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF NOVEMBER, 1864.

ACTUAL. Daily Mortality of persons of both sexes under and over five years of age in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, embracing a radius of ten miles, and including the Statistical Sub-districts of Melbourne Proper, East Melbourne North Melbourne and Carlton, Fitz Roy Municipality, East Collingwood, Richmond, Jika-jika parish (exclusive of Nori Melbourne, Collingwood, and Richmond), South Yarra and Prahran, Emerald Hill and Sandridge, St. Kilda and Brighton, Dout Galla and Keilor, Borondara and Heidelberg, Cut-paw-paw parish, and the shipping in Hobson's Bay; also, the Temperature: the shade at Melbourne, deduced from the mean of twenty-four hourly observations taken at the Melbourne Observatory on each day during the month of November, 1864:—

The deaths in November were much below the average of the last five years. If the last four years only be taken, omitting 1860, in which, owing to the prevalence of scarlatina and measles in an epidemic form, the deaths were more than twice as numerous as they have been in the same month of any subsequent year, the deaths in the month under review will still be found to be below the average.

Males contributed 63 and females 37 per cent. to the mortality of the month. Only 43 per cent. of that mortality was children under five—a remarkably small proportion for the time of year. In November 1863, 47 per cent. of the deaths were children under five, 55 per cent. in November 1862, 50 per cent. in November 1861, and 73 per cent. in November 1860.

Fifteen deaths occurred on the 27th, which was the day of the highest mortality. The days of lowest mortality were the 6th, 11th, and 17th, on each of which only three deaths were recorded as having occurred.

A male at the advanced age of 87 died during the month of mortification, and another male aged 78 of old age.

Five deaths from drowning occurred during the month, viz.: four of adults, in the Yarra; and one of a boy, aged 7, whilst bathing in the Gas-house Dock. The death of one of the adults was self-inflicted; a wheelwright, aged 43, committed suicide by

cutting his throat; a mariner, aged 34, shot himself, whether purposely or accidentally is not known; a laborer, aged 26, was killed by injuries caused by earth falling upon him; a male, aged 23, by being passed over by a dray; and a boy, aged 7, by being kicked by a horse.

Fifty-three deaths or 25 per cent. of the whole mortality occurred in public institutions, viz.:—34 in the Melbourne Hospital, 3 in the Benevolent Asylum, 12 the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Immigrants' Home, 2 in the Industrial School, and 1 in the Melbourne Gaol.

Note.—The Melbourne Hospital is in Melbourne Proper, the Benevolent Asylum in North Melbourne and Carlton, and the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum in Jika-jika parish (remainder of).

The children under five years of age who died during the month numbered 87; of whom 44 or about 49 per cent. were males, and 45 or nearly 51 per cent. were females; 40 were under one year of age, 23 were between one and two years, 13 were between two and three, 9 were between three and four, and 5 were between four and five.

The deaths of persons beyond five years of age amounted to 117; of which 85, or 74 per cent. were of males, and 32, or 26 per cent., were of females; of those dying, 16 were between five and ten years of age, 4 were between fifteen and twenty, 9 were between twenty and twenty-five, 13 were between twenty-five and thirty, 16 were between thirty and thirty-five, 9 were between thirty-five and forty, 13 were between forty and forty-five, 8 were between forty-five and fifty, 6 were between fifty and fifty-five, 7 were between fifty-five and sixty, 5 were between sixty and sixty-five, 4 were between sixty-five and seventy, 5 were between seventy and seventy-five, and 2 were seventy-five and upwards.

Deaths from zymotic diseases increased from 31 to 55, and caused 27 per cent. of the mortality, against 16 per cent. in October. The chief increase was in diarrhoea and dysentery, which occasioned 18 deaths, against only 1 in October. Scarlatina and diphtheria occasioned 20 deaths, against 17 in October and against 11 in September. Deaths from constitutional diseases decreased from 37 to 34. Of this class phthisis caused but 18 deaths, against 21 in October, and against 31 in September.

Printed forms of tender may be obtained from the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne, or from the officer in charge of police at each station, by whom also any information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

The tenders for each station will be accepted or rejected separately.
Tenders may be for either of the supplies required, oats, bran, hay, or straw only; and if all be included in one tender, it will be accepted for one article only, if advisable.

Tenders may offer for the manure at each station at per cwt.; manure to be removed as may be arranged with the officer in charge, and the value of the manure will be deducted from the account for forage.

As much forage as the storage will accommodate will be drawn at a time for the convenience of contractors.
The price must be per ton for hay and straw, and per bushel of 40 lbs. for oats, 20 lbs. for bran, and 54 lbs. for maize, including delivery at the stations and all charges; bags to be returned when empty.

The net weight only after deducting the tare is to be charged.

The names and addresses of the tenderers and of their proposed sureties must be stated at full length.

All tenders must be enclosed in a separate envelope, marked "Tender for ——" (as the case may be), and deposited in the box at the Government Stores, King street; or if sent by post they must be addressed to the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

The decision of the Government will be made known by *Gazette* notice and by letter to accepted tenderers.

CONDITIONS.

1. The hay to be eaten, good, sound, and sweet; the straw to be wheaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats (colonial grown) and bran and maize to be sound and sweet and of the best description.

2. The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the officer in charge of the district or station, the quantities stated in schedule being, however, only approximative, and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than stated. The excess over the estimate will not, however, exceed during the whole year 50 per cent. of the estimated quarterly consumption.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the military commissariat.

4. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the District, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours from a reasonable time to be fixed on the order, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue either to the public service or the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. It will be competent for the Government Storekeeper on behalf of the Government, or for the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to that effect, it being understood that such notice only can be given from the first day of a month, and provided that no such notice can be given before the 30th June, 1865.

BOROUGH OF INGLEWOOD.

BYE-LAW No. 20.—FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE INGLEWOOD RESERVOIRS AND WATER-WORKS.

WHEREAS by The Municipal Corporations Act, 1863, the council of any borough is empowered to make bye-laws for the resort to and use of any reservoirs or other water-works, and Crown Lands thereto belonging, which may by grant, lease or otherwise be made over or demised to such council: And

whereas the reservoirs situated at Inglewood, and known as the Old and New Inglewood Reservoirs, have been, by indenture of lease bearing date the first day of January, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and made between Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria of the one part, and the Mayor, Councillors, and Burgesses of Inglewood, of the other part, leased to the said Borough of Inglewood:

Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the Council of the Borough of Inglewood—

1. No person shall bathe in the reservoirs, or wash any dog or live animal therein, or allow any dog or other animal belonging to him or her, or under his or her care, to enter the water thereof.

2. No person shall throw into or place in such reservoirs any dead animal, offal, refuse, or any offensive matter.

3. No person shall injure the banks of said reservoirs, or the fencing belonging thereto, nor climb over said fences, nor dig any holes or erect any pumps or buildings, or do any other work upon the said land demised to the said council, except by special permission, in writing, of the council, or their authorised officer.

4. That no person shall sail any boat on said reservoirs, or fish or endeavor to catch any fish therein, or shoot or endeavor to shoot any wild fowl or other birds thereon, or within one hundred yards of any part of same, in the vicinity thereof, except by special permission of the council.

5. That no person or persons shall take, use, or carry away any water of or belonging to said reservoirs, except by written permission; signed by the town clerk on behalf of the council, or on payment of the fees to be from time to time fixed by the council.

6. Any person guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall, on conviction thereof, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Five pounds.

The above bye-law was made by a special order of the Council of the Borough of Inglewood, at a meeting held at the Council Chambers, Inglewood, the second day of November, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.
