## PROMOTION OF NEW MANUFACTURES AND INDUSTRIES.

THE Governor in Council having appointed

to be a Board to consider claims for Rewards and Premiums for New Manufactures and Industries, in accordance with the Regulations submitted to Parliament on the 12th July last; all persons who may deem themselves entitled to rewards or premiums under the Regulations referred to, are requested to forward their claims to Mr. Edward Black, Secretary to the Board, Custom House, Melbourne, on or before the 15th November next, after which date none will be received.

A copy of the Regulations is attached, to the 4th clause of which the Board desire to direct particular attention.

## REGULATIONS FOR EXPENDING THE SUM OF FIVE THOUSAND POUNDS, VOTED BY PARLIAMENT IN THE YEAR 1865, FOR THE PROMOTION OF NEW MANUFACTURES AND INDUSTRIES.

1. The Governor in Council shall appoint a Board, to whom shall be referred the consideration of all claims for premiums or rewards under the above grant.

2. Such sums as may be recommended by the said Board shall (subject to the approval of the Governor in Council) be paid to the persons or company who shall have, since the 1st January, 1864, first successfully established or may hereafter first successfully establish in Victoria any new manufacture or production.

3. Precedence of claim will be given to the following items, and the reward measured by the excellence and extent of the manufacture or article produced:—

*Woollen Goods.*—Blankets, rugs, flannels, cloth, or other woollen fabrics of general use.

*Paper.*—Wrapping, printing, or writing.

*Glass.*—Sheet or plate glass, tumblers, wine glasses, or bottles.

*Crockery.*—China, porcelain, or any of the finer classes of earthenware.

*Leather.*—For excellence in the manufacture of leather, for other and higher purposes than the sole and kip leather now produced.

*Olive oil.*—The produce of trees grown in Victoria (the quantity not being less than 20 gallons).

*Flax.*—Not less than 1 ton, properly prepared for manufacturing purposes.

*Flax (or linseed) oil.*—Not less than 50 gallons, properly prepared for manufacturing purposes.

*Hemp.*—Not less than 1 ton, properly prepared for manufacturing purposes.

*Cotton.*—Not less than 1 ton, properly prepared for manufacturing purposes.

*Hops.*—Not less than 1 ton, properly prepared.

*Silk.*—Not less than  $\frac{1}{2}$  cwt., the produce of silkworms bred in Victoria.

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4. It shall be competent for the Board to receive, and if approved of, to recommend rewards for other articles of local manufacture or production, or to offer and publish such special rewards or premiums as it may think fit. And also to refuse reward or premium to any new article of growth or manufacture, if it is not considered to be of merit and usefulness sufficient to entitle it to favorable consideration.

## IMPERIAL ACTS 28 &amp; 29 VICT., CHAPTERS 63, 64, AND 113.

THE Governor has directed the subjoined Despatch, and the accompanying Acts of the Imperial Parliament, to be published.

SIR,—I enclose, for your information, copies of three Acts which have been passed during the recent Session of Parliament (cap. 63, 64, & 113; 28 & 29 Vic.).

The first of these Acts, cap. 63, was passed to set at rest certain questions which have been raised in the Supreme Court of South Australia respecting the validity of colonial laws.

It is intended as far as possible to obviate doubt and litigation on this most important subject, by declaring that no colonial law shall be void for repugnancy to the law of England, unless it is inconsistent with an Imperial Act intended by Parliament to extend to the colony in which such law is passed, nor because it is at variance with the Governor's instructions. It also establishes the power of Colonial Legislatures to regulate the administration of justice, on which doubts had been thrown, and the power of every Representative Legislature to alter its own constitution.

The second Act, cap. 64, is passed to obviate a doubt which has been suggested respecting the effect of a colonial law passed to give retrospective validity to marriages already informally solemnized in the colony. It is doubtless true that every Colonial Legislature may prescribe the formalities requisite to constitute a valid marriage within its jurisdiction, and that the formalities thus prescribed will be recognized elsewhere as sufficient for their purpose. But the case is different when a law is passed not to declare what shall be a valid contract in future, but to make valid *ab initio* that which was really invalid. It has been urged that such a retrospective law, though binding with respect to civil rights and property within the colony in which it is passed, may not be held to have the same effect with respect to rights or property which are exercisable or situate in other parts of Her Majesty's dominions.

The first clause of this Act declares explicitly that these retrospective enactments shall have their intended effect throughout Her Majesty's dominions, and not only in the colony in which they may be passed.

The third Act fully explains itself.

## COLONIAL LAWS VALIDITY.

ANNO VICESIMO OCTAVO & VICESIMO NONO  
VICTORIÆ REGINÆ.

CAP. LXIII.—*An Act to remove Doubts as to the Validity of Colonial Laws.*

[29th June, 1865.]

WHEREAS doubts have been entertained respecting the validity of divers laws enacted or purporting to have been enacted by the Legislatures of certain of Her Majesty's Colonies, and respecting the powers of such Legislatures, and it is expedient that such doubts should be removed:

Be it hereby enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1. The term "Colony" shall in this Act include all of Her Majesty's possessions abroad in which there shall exist a Legislature, as hereinafter defined, except the Channel Islands, the *Isle of Man*, and such territories as may for the time being be vested in Her Majesty under or by virtue of any Act of Parliament for the government of *India*:

Definitions:  
"Colony:"

The terms "Legislature" and "Colonial Legislature" shall severally signify the authority, other than the Imperial Parliament or Her Majesty in Council, competent to make laws for any colony:

"Legislature," "Colonial Legislature:"

The term "Representative Legislature" shall signify any Colonial Legislature which shall comprise a legislative body of which one-half are elected by inhabitants of the colony:

"Representative Legislature:"

The term "Colonial Law" shall include laws made for any colony either by such Legislature as aforesaid or by Her Majesty in Council:

"Colonial Law:"

An Act of Parliament, or any provision thereof, shall, in construing this Act, be said to extend to any colony when it is made applicable to such colony by the express words or necessary intendment of any Act of Parliament:

Act of Parliament, &c. to extend to colony when made applicable to such colony:  
"Governor:"

The term "Governor" shall mean the Officer lawfully administering the Government of any colony:

## "Letters Patent."

The term "Letters Patent" shall mean Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of *Great Britain and Ireland*.

Colonial law when void for repugnancy.

2. Any colonial law which is or shall be in any respect repugnant to the provisions of any Act of Parliament extending to the colony to which such law may relate, or repugnant to any Order or Regulation made under authority of such Act of Parliament, or having in the colony the force and effect of such Act, shall be read subject to such Act, Order, or Regulation, and shall, to the extent of such repugnancy, but not otherwise, be and remain absolutely void and inoperative.

Colonial law when not void for repugnancy.

3. No colonial law shall be or be deemed to have been void or inoperative on the ground of repugnancy to the law of *England*, unless the same shall be repugnant to the provisions of some such Act of Parliament, Order, or Regulation as aforesaid.

Colonial law not void for inconsistency with instructions.

4. No colonial law, passed with the concurrence of or assented to by the Governor of any colony, or to be hereafter so passed or assented to, shall be or be deemed to have been void or inoperative by reason only of any instructions with reference to such law or the subject thereof which may have been given to such Governor by or on behalf of Her Majesty, by any instrument other than the letters patent or instrument authorizing such Governor to concur in passing or to assent to laws for the peace, order, and good government of such colony, even though such instructions may be referred to in such letters patent or last-mentioned instrument.

Colonial Legislature may establish, &c. Courts of Law.

5. Every Colonial Legislature shall have, and be deemed at all times to have had, full power within its jurisdiction to establish Courts of Judicature, and to abolish and reconstitute the same, and to alter the constitution thereof, and to make provision for the administration of justice therein; and every Representative Legislature shall, in respect to the colony under its jurisdiction, have, and be deemed at all times to have had, full power to make laws respecting the constitution, powers, and procedure of such Legislature; provided that such laws shall have been passed in such manner and form as may from time to time be required by any Act of Parliament, Letters Patent, Order in Council, or Colonial Law for the time being in force in the said colony.

Representative Legislature may alter Constitution.

Certified copies of laws to be evidence that they are properly passed.

6. The certificate of the clerk or other proper officer of a legislative body in any colony to the effect that the document to which it is attached is a true copy of any colonial law assented to by the Governor of such colony, or of any bill reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure by the said Governor, shall be *prima facie* evidence that the document so certified is a true copy of such law or bill, and, as the case may be, that such law has been duly and properly passed and assented to, or that such bill has been duly and properly passed and presented to the Governor; and any Proclamation purporting to be published by authority of the Governor in any newspaper in the colony to which such law or bill shall relate, and signifying Her Majesty's disallowance of any such colonial law, or Her Majesty's assent to any such reserved bill as aforesaid, shall be *prima facie* evidence of such disallowance or assent.

Proclamation to be evidence of assent and disallowance.

And whereas doubts are entertained respecting the validity of certain Acts enacted or reputed to be enacted by the Legislature of *South Australia*: Be it further enacted as follows:

Certain Acts enacted by Legislature of South Australia to be valid.

7. All laws or reputed laws enacted or purporting to have been enacted by the said Legislature, or by persons or bodies of persons for the time being acting as such Legislature, which have received the assent of Her Majesty in Council, or which have received the assent of the Governor of the said colony in the name and on behalf of Her Majesty, shall be and be deemed to have been valid and effectual from the date of such assent for all purposes whatever; provided that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to give effect to any law or reputed law which has been disallowed by Her Majesty, or has expired, or has been lawfully repealed, or to prevent the lawful disallowance or repeal of any law.

COLONIAL MARRIAGES VALIDITY.

ANNO VICESIMO OCTAVO & VICESIMO NONO

VICTORIÆ REGINÆ.

CAP. LXIV.—*An Act to remove Doubts respecting the Validity of certain Marriages contracted in Her Majesty's Possessions abroad.* [29th June 1865.]

WHEREAS laws have from time to time been made by the Legislatures of divers of Her Majesty's Possessions abroad for the purpose of establishing the validity of certain marriages previously contracted therein, but doubts are entertained whether such laws are in all respects effectual for the aforesaid purpose beyond the limits of such Possessions:



Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :

1. Every law made or to be made by the Legislature of any such possession as aforesaid for the purpose of establishing the validity of any marriage or marriages contracted in such possession shall have and be deemed to have had from the date of the making of such law the same force and effect for the purpose aforesaid within all parts of Her Majesty's dominions as such law may have had or may hereafter have within the possession for which the same was made : Provided that nothing in this law contained shall give any effect or validity to any marriage unless at the time of such marriage both of the parties thereto were, according to the law of *England*, competent to contract the same.

Colonial laws establishing validity of marriages to have effect throughout Her Majesty's dominions.

Not to give effect to marriages unless parties are competent to contract marriage.

Definition of "Legislature."

2. In this Act the word "Legislature" shall include any authority competent to make laws for any of Her Majesty's possessions abroad, except the Parliament of the United Kingdom and Her Majesty in Council.

#### COLONIAL GOVERNORS (RETIRING PENSIONS).

ANNO VICESIMO OCTAVO & VICESIMO NONO

VICTORIÆ REGINÆ.

CAP. CXIII.—*An Act to authorize the Payment of Retiring Pensions to Colonial Governors.* [5th July 1865.]

WHEREAS it is expedient that Retiring Pensions should be granted in certain cases to Officers who have administered the Government of Her Majesty's Colonial Possessions : Be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :

1. In this Act the term "Colony" includes any plantation, island, or other possession within Her Majesty's dominions, exclusive of the United Kingdom of *Great Britain* and *Ireland*, and of the islands being immediate dependencies thereof, and exclusive of *India* as defined by the Act of Parliament of 1858 "for the better Government of *India*."

Definition of "Colony."

2. The full rate of pension hereinafter referred to shall be as follows, that is to say :

Full rate of pension as herein stated.

In the case of officers who shall for at least four years have administered the Government of any colony or colonies in which the salary of the Governor is not less than Five thousand pounds, One thousand pounds :

In the case of officers who shall for at least four years have administered the Government of any colony or colonies in which the salary of the Governor is not less than Two thousand five hundred pounds, Seven hundred and fifty pounds :

In the case of officers who shall for at least four years have administered the Government of any colony or colonies in which the salary of the Governor is not less than One thousand two hundred pounds, Five hundred pounds.

In other cases, Two hundred and fifty pounds.

3. The reduced rate of pension hereinafter referred to shall in all cases be two-thirds of the full rate.

Reduced rate.

4. One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State may, by writing under his hand, grant the full rate of pension to any person who, being of the age of sixty, shall have administered the Government of any colony or colonies for periods amounting in the whole to eighteen years, or who, being of the age aforesaid, shall have administered such Government or Governments for periods amounting in the whole to ten years, and shall have been employed in the whole either in such administration or in the permanent Civil Service of Her Majesty, for periods amounting in the whole to twenty-five years, or to any person who, having administered such Government or Governments for periods amounting in the whole to fifteen years, shall have established, to the satisfaction of such Secretary of State, that he is incapable, from infirmity of mind or body contracted while administering his Government, of discharging the duties of any office in the Public Service, and that such infirmity is likely to be permanent.

When full rate may be granted.

5. Such Secretary of State may, by such writing as aforesaid, grant the reduced rate of pension to any person being of the age of sixty, who, after having attained the age of forty, shall have administered the Government of any colony or colonies for periods amounting in the whole to twelve years, or to any person being of the age of

When reduced rate may be granted.

sixty, who, after having attained the age of forty, shall have administered such Government or Governments for periods amounting in the whole to eight years, and shall have been employed in the whole, either in such administration or in the permanent Civil Service of Her Majesty, for periods amounting in the whole to twenty years, or to any person who, having administered such Government or Governments for periods amounting in the whole to ten years, shall have established to the satisfaction of such Secretary of State that he is incapable, from infirmity of mind or body contracted while administering his Government, of discharging the duties of any office in the Public Service, and that such infirmity is likely to be permanent.

Permanent Civil Service not to be counted under this or any other Act.

6. No person whose claim to a pension under the provisions of this Act is founded in part upon his employment in the permanent Civil Service of Her Majesty shall be entitled to claim a superannuation allowance, in respect of the same employment, under the provisions of any other Act of Parliament.

Deductions from pension on account of half pay, &c.

7. In case any person to whom a pension shall have been granted under the provisions of this Act shall be or become entitled to any half pay, salary, or other emolument from any public revenue raised, or in respect of any public services performed, within Her Majesty's dominions, his pension shall be reduced by half the amount of such half pay, salary, or emolument.

Advancement to higher rates of pension.

8. In case any person to whom a pension shall have been granted under the provisions of this Act shall, by reason of his re-employment, become eligible for any higher rate of pension than that already granted him, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State may, by such writing as aforesaid, grant to him such higher rate of pension.

Person receiving pension bound to accept employment till of age of sixty;

9. In case any person, having administered the Government of any colony and not being of the full age of sixty, shall be called upon by Her Majesty to administer the Government of any colony, not being of a lower class than that on which his rate of pension has been, or in case of his retirement on reaching the age of sixty would be calculated, and not being incapable from infirmity of mind or body of administering such Government, shall refuse to administer the same; or if any such person, not being of the full age of sixty-five, shall relinquish such Government without the permission of Her Majesty, or shall neglect or decline to execute the duties thereof satisfactorily, the said Secretary of State may by writing under his hand declare that such person has forfeited all claim to any pension under this Act, and such claim shall thereupon be forfeited accordingly.

not to relinquish it till sixty-five.

As to pension of person also employed in Civil Service.

10. In case any person shall have administered the Government of any colony or colonies, and shall have likewise been employed in the permanent Civil Service of Her Majesty, but shall not have become entitled to any pension under the preceding clauses of this Act, the number of years passed in the Government of such colony or colonies shall, for the purpose of computing any superannuation allowance to be granted to such person under the Superannuation Act, 1859, be taken to have been passed in the permanent Civil Service of Her Majesty, and at the rate of salary last received by such person in respect of his employment in such permanent Civil Service.

What to be deemed employment in Civil Service.

11. Any person claiming a pension shall, for the purposes of this Act, be taken to have been employed in the permanent Civil Service of Her Majesty while holding any office which at the time of his claiming such pension would entitle the holder thereof to superannuation allowance under the Superannuation Act, 1859.

Secretary of State to determine when an officer is in administration of Government.

12. One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State may, with the consent of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, from time to time determine under what conditions and to what extent any officer shall be deemed for the purposes of this Act to have been administering the Government of any colony while administering the same provisionally, or while absent from his Government with permission of Her Majesty; and for the purposes of this Act the commission issued under the Great Seal of the territory of *New South Wales* for the Government of the district of *Port Phillip* shall be taken to have constituted that district a colony.

Statement of pensions to be laid before Parliament.

13. All pensions granted under this Act shall be paid out of such monies as Parliament may provide for the purpose, and a statement of all such pensions shall be laid annually before Parliament.

## IRON CASTINGS.
