### POLLING PLACES FOR THE EASTERN PROVINCE.

*At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the second day of October, 1865.*

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor Brigadier-General Carey, C.B. Mr. McCulloch Mr. Michie	Mr. Verdon Mr. Francis Mr. Sullivan
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WHEREAS by *The Electoral Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council shall, as he shall see fit from time to time, appoint within and for each division of every province and district respectively one place and not more for taking the poll in such division at contested elections for the province or district, and every such appointment may revoke; provided that if the returning officer of the province or district, or any police magistrate or superintendent of police acting in the locality shall by writing under their hands certify to the Governor that it is necessary so to do it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to appoint as aforesaid, in and for such division one or more polling place or places, and the appointment of such place or

places or any of them from time to time to revoke; provided also that no appointment of any polling place in or for any division of a province or district shall be revoked between the issue of any writ for election for the same and the return of such writ: And whereas the returning officer for the Eastern Province and the police magistrate acting in the respective localities hereinafter mentioned have, by writing under their hands, certified to the Governor that it is necessary to appoint polling places for certain divisions of the said province: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order appoint the polling places mentioned in the Schedule hereunto annexed, to be polling places for the divisions of the Eastern Province opposite to the names of which they are respectively placed, that is to say:—

### THE SHIRE OF AVON.

#### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act 1863* it is amongst other things enacted that if at any time in any district, whether single or united, which shall contain an area of not less than one hundred square miles, the total amount actually paid in respect of the general rate then last made shall have amounted to One thousand pounds, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to proclaim, if it shall seem fit, such district, by such name as in and by such Order in Council may be assigned thereto, to be a shire within the meaning of the said Act, and such district shall thereupon be and be called such shire accordingly; and no district, after the proclamation thereof, as such shire, save as therein provided with regard to the adjustment of boundaries to those of electoral districts, shall be united with any other shire or district, or with any borough or municipal district: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the fifth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, a Road District was proclaimed under the designation of "The Avon Road District." And whereas the area of the said district and the amount of the last general rate therein are not less than the area and amount in the said Act mentioned, and it seemed fit to make an Order in Council this day to proclaim the said district to be a shire accordingly: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the district heretofore proclaimed and called the Avon Road District

to be a Shire within the meaning of the said Act, by the name in and by such Order in Council assigned thereto, that is to say:—

**THE SHIRE OF AVON.**

**RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE ECHUCA  
GENERAL CEMETERY.**

**A**LL charges must be paid when orders are given for interment.

2. Applications for permission to make a vault or erect a monument in the cemetery to be made to the trustees. Permission in the form contained in schedule A. will be granted to applicants on payment of the proper charges.

3. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in the cemetery on evidence to the satisfaction of the trustees that the deceased was without means, and that his relatives or friends are unable to pay the charges.

4. The trustees will cause all ordinary graves to be dug, but should a brick grave or vault be required it must be constructed under the direction of the trustees, or of some person appointed by them. No grave to be less than six feet deep.

5. Orders for interment to be given to the sexton or other person appointed by the trustees on the day preceding the interment, between the hours of Eight o'clock a.m. and Six o'clock p.m.; the particulars, required in schedule B. must be stated when giving the order.

6. The time fixed for the funeral must be the time of arrival at the cemetery.

7. The hours appointed for interment are from Eight o'clock a.m. until Six o'clock p.m. from 1st September to 30th April, and from Eight o'clock a.m. until Four o'clock p.m. during the remaining months.

8. The plans of all monuments, tablets, and fences to be erected must first be submitted to the trustees for approval.

9. Monuments, tablets, and fences are to be kept in proper condition and repair at the expense of the owners, or they may be removed by order of the trustees.

10. Every coffin in a vault must be bricked in and cemented.

11. If an interment is to be made in any private vault or grave the written consent of the owner must be left with the order.

12. A plan of the cemetery and register will be kept.

13. No person employed by the trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge of his duties.

14. All persons injuring the cemetery, or its fences or monuments, will be prosecuted as the law directs.

15. The trustees reserve the right to alter these regulations and charges from time to time, subject to the approval of His Excellency the Governor.

The foregoing Rules and Regulations were agreed to by us, at a meeting of Trustees held at Echuca, on the third day May, 1865.

Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit receipt for a sum equal to twenty per cent. of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance if delivered at the address named in the tender shall be deemed sufficient.

The money deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them on application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts, but not otherwise.

#### COKE FOR FOUNDRY USE.

TENDERS will be received until Noon on Wednesday, the 1st day of November, 1865, from persons willing to supply Coke for foundry use, in such quantities as may be required by the Government, from 1st January to 31st December, 1866.

The coke must be made from Welsh or any good English coking coal.

Security will be required to the amount of Fifty pounds for due fulfilment of the contract, either by debentures, bank deposit receipt, cash deposit, Guarantee Society's bond, or sureties; if the latter, the tender must be accompanied by a certificate from two responsible persons that they are willing to become

bound as sureties, and in either case the security must be completed within ten days, failing which the contract may be again advertised at the risk of the contractor, or another tender accepted. The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender. Persons failing to take up their contract will be disqualified as future contractors.

Tenders, endorsed, "Tender for Coke for Foundry," are to be deposited in the tender-box at the Stores and Transport Office, King street, Melbourne, addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board.

CONDITIONS.

1. The coke must be of the very best description and quality of English coke, strong, hard and close, bright and silvery, oven burnt, free from all impurities, of large size and entirely free from small or dust.

2. The contractor is to deliver the coke in good condition, free from dust and ready for use, into the waggon on the railway or breakwater pier, at Williamstown, at the option of the Government; or may deliver into the railway waggon at any station on the Victorian Railways. The coke will be weighed by the Government, and such weight and returns shall form the basis upon which the contractor's account will be made out.

3. Orders will be issued by the secretary one week previously to the departure of the English mail; and if such orders be not supplied at the expiration of seven calendar months from the date of the departure of such mail, it will be competent for the Railway Storekeeper, on the order of the secretary, to purchase, at the risk of the contractor, and subject him to a mulct not exceeding Five pounds for each and every day's delay in the delivery after the time specified, disasters of the seas excepted.

4. The contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly or bi-monthly on the prescribed form, and present the same in a complete state, to the Locomotive Superintendent, who will send it forward to the Railway Storekeeper to be passed for payment at the Treasury, or at a district pay office, as the case may be.

5. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supply, as to the quality of the coke, the same is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the Engineer-in-Chief, and the decision of the board is to be final.

6. If the delay necessary for obtaining the decision of a board of survey should be detrimental to the public service, the Engineer-in-Chief or Locomotive Superintendent will have the power to reject coke which is of an inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected coke and supply good in its stead, failing which, it will be procured elsewhere and the extra expense charged to him.

7. Irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor to such mulct not exceeding Fifty pounds for each case, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government to terminate the contract forthwith.

8. It will be competent for the contractor, or for the Secretary for Railways on behalf of the Government, to terminate the contract by giving, in writing, a notice of three calendar months, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month.

9. The estimated consumption of coke during the year will be about 200 tons; but the Government do not bind themselves to order this quantity, but only what may be required from time to time.

## IRON CASTINGS.

## COAL.
