VICTORIAN VOLUNTEER FORCE.

THE Governor in Council, on the 13th day of February, 1865, approved of the subjoined Rules, adopted by the Metropolitan Troop of the Prince of Wales Victorian Volunteer Light Horse. GEO. VERDON.

PRINCE OF WALES VICTORIAN VOLUNTERR LIGHT HORSE. RULES OF THE METROPOLITAN TROOP.

EVERY candidate for admission to the troop shall be recommended by two members in writing, addressed to the commanding officer, stating in full the name, place of abode, and profession or occupation of the candidate; and such application shall be read out at the next commanding officer's parade, and submitted to the committee at their next meeting, and thereupon the committee shall have power to admit or reject the candidate.

2. Each member on joining shall attend instruction drill at least twice a week, and shall not be permitted to join the ranks at any parades of the troop until he shall have attended at least six drills, or until he shall have been dismissed from recruit drill, whichever may first happen.

3. No member will be allowed to enter the ranks of the troop mounted on a horse or mare under fifteen hands high, or which shall not in all respects meet with the approval of the commanding officer. No horse will be allowed in the ranks until after six lessons in the riding school, or until after been passed by the drill instructor.

4. Any commissioned officer absent from a regimental or staff officer's inspection shall be liable to a fine of One pound; if a non-commissioned officer to a fine of Fifteen (15) shillings; all other members to a fine of Ten (10) shillings.

5. There shall be two mounted parades of the troop in each month, one of which shall be the commanding officer's parade.

The undermentioned fines will be imposed upon any member absenting himself from the commanding officer's parade, viz. —

Non-commissioned officers ... Other member 5 0 2 6

And the same fines will be inflicted on any member neglecting to attend one of the other parades during the month, unless good and sufficient reason be given to the officer commanding, in writing, on or before the last day of the month.

 6. At every parade, on the roll being called, any member not answering to his name shall be deemed absent, unless a sufficient reason has been previously forwarded to the commanding officer. Any member coming late, and assigning a reason for so doing which is deemed sufficient by the commanding officer, shall be considered as having been present at that parade.

 7. Any member who shall attend parade not dressed in accordance with the established regulations, or whose arms, accoutrements, or clothing shall be dirty or in any way unserviceable from neglect, will be liable to a fine not exceeding Two shillings and sixpence for each offence.

 8. Any member guilty of talking or other irregularities on parade will, after being cautioned, be liable to a fine not exceeding Two shillings and sixpence.

 9. Every member will be responsible for the good and

- 9. Every member will be responsible for the good and serviceable order of his arms, accourtements, and clothing, and any damage done thereto shall be made good by him.

 10. A general meeting of the members shall be held annually during the month of January, for the purpose of electing a committee, of which at least fourteen (14) clear days' notice shall be given by advertisement and circular; when the balance sheet for the past year shall be submitted by the committee, with all accounts duly audited by two members of the troop.

 11. The civil affairs of the troop shall be conducted by a committee of six, consisting of the captain, one leutenant, one sergeant, one corporal, and two troopers, who shall be elected annually by ballot at the general meeting in January, or any adjournment thereof; 3 (three) to form a quorum. The commanding officer to be an ex officio member of the committee. The whole committee shall go out of office on the day of the general meeting in January, but all or any of the committee shall be eligible for re-election.
- 12. The committee shall annually appoint a secretary, and a treasurer shall be elected annually by ballot by the members generally out of the whole corps.
- 13. Any vacancy that may occur during the year, amongst the members of committee, may be filled up by the election of a member of the same rank at the next ensuing general meeting of the troop.
- 14. That each member shall pay an annual subscription of £1 during the month of January; or, should be prefer it, or neglect to pay such subscription before the 1st of February, he shall pay a monthly subscription of 2s. 6d., payable in advance, on or before the first parade of each month; but, should such subscription be in arrear for more than fourteen days, it shall be converted into a fine of double the amount.
- converted into a fine of double the amount.

 15. That a list of all members whose subscriptions shall be in arrear for upwards of fourteen days shall be placed in the orderly room, and every defaulter shall have a written notice sent to him, according to his last known address.

 16. If any member shall be absent from drill for the space of three months, the committee shall have the power of striking his name off the roll, unless leave of absence be granted by the commanding officer in writing, or some other sufficient cause be shown for his non-attendance.
- 17. That in the event of a commanding officer or the committee inflicting any fine or fines, and the same shall remain unpaid for twenty-one days after demand made for payment thereof, the member so fined and refusing or neglocing to pay shall be prosecuted for recovery of amount due, and his name struck off the roll of members.
- 18. A book shall be kept, called the "fine book," in which shall be entered all fines inflicted by the commanding officer or committee, and the reason for which such fine has been inflicted, and the name of the offender, and each entry or fine signed by the commanding officer or chairman of the committee, as the case may require.
- 19. All moneys arising from fines or other sources will be collected by a non-commissioned officer, and paid over to the treasurer, who will keep a public account, and submit the same for inspection half-yearly or whenever deemed advisable.
- 20. The officer commanding the troop may at any time convene a general meeting, at which no rule or bye-law shall be passed unless due notice by advertisement or circular shall have been given. At every meeting the senior officer present shall
- 21. Every member shall produce for inspection all arms, accoutrements, or other furnishings supplied to him by the troop whenever called upon so to do, and in default thereof he shall be fined Ten (10) shillings.
- 22. Any person ceasing to be a member of the troop must forward uniform and other troop property to the commanding officer within seven days, in default of which he will be prosecuted according to law.
- 23. Any member resigning or being expelled within twelve months of the receipt of new uniform, such uniform having been provided by the troop, shall pay the full contract price for the same; and after that period, if under eighteen months, shall pay half the cost price of articles furnished.
- 24. Every member joining the troop to be supplied with a copy of these rules and regulations.

· PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c.,

WHEREAS by The Land Act, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of, which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act; Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the common hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE TOWN COMMON OF GLENOECHY, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 21st November, 1864, shall be and the same is hereby increased by adding thereto the following area, viz.:—256 acres 3 roods 18 perches, county unnamed, parish of Glenorchy, being allotments 5, 6, 7, and 8 of section 1, in the said parish.—(64.J.10304.)

MINING OPERATIONS ON EXEMPTED LANDS AT WEDDERBURNE.

4. All instructions given by the mining surveyor or other authorised officer relative to the mode of timbering or otherwise protecting the ground, shall be complied with by the miners.

5. All miners who shall take up claims on this reserve shall, prior to commencing mining operations, deposit in the hands of the Clerk of Petty Sessions at Wedderburne, the sum of Ten pounds as a guarantee that they will observe and fulfil these conditions; and this sum shall be held by the clerk of petty sessions until the miners who have made such deposit shall relinquish the claim held by them. For a first offence any sum not exceeding £5 for each head of cattle driver or removed from any infected district.

For a second offence any sum not exceeding £20 for each head of cattle driven or removed from an infected district. For a third offence any sum not exceeding £100 for each head of cattle driven or removed from an infected district.

THE business of the council at all ordinary meetings shall be conducted with open doors, unless it shall become necessary to exclude strangers on account of their disorderly conduct.

At every ordinary meeting of the council the first business thereof shall be the reading of and putting for confirmation the minutes of any preceding meeting, and no discussion shall be allowed thereon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings. The minutes, when confirmed, shall be signed by the president, or, in his absence, by the chairman of the meeting.

3. The order of the business shall be as follows, or as near thereto as practicable:—

thereto as practicable:-1. Reading correspondence, and-considering and ordering

Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
 Reading and ordering on reports of committees and

3. Reading and ordering on reports of committees and officers.

4. Orders of the day.

5. Motions of which previous notice has been duly given.

6. Examination and passing accounts for payment.

4. Every petition or memorial addressed to the council shall be in proper form, and must be presented by a councillor, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded, and no debate shall take place thereon except as to its being received and taken into consideration after the orders of the day, or at any future meeting, or, if necessary, that it be referred to a committee.

5. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, and any business which the president shall think fit to bring under consideration. Any councillor may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable in form of a notice of motion, such notice to be given in writing to the secretary, at least six clear days previous to the meeting at which the same is to be taken into consideration; and all such notices of motion shall be considered in the order in which they are given.

6. A notice of motion may be dispensed with in cases of emergency, where the council consider it necessary to do so, there being not more than one councillor absent at such council meeting.

7. Normotion entered on the notice paper shall be considered.

7. No-motion entered on the notice paper shall be considered unless the councillor who has given such notice, or some other

councillor authorised by him, be present when the business is called on; and notices not so proceeded with shall be struck off the notice paper.

8. The mover of any motion which shall be referred to a committee, shall for the occasion be a member of such committee.

9. Every councillor, including the president, shall stand up while addressing the council.

10. The president's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice.

11. Every motion or amendment shall be entered on the minutes, with the names of the mover and seconder, and on a division thereon the votes shall be descended.

12. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, one other may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote; but upon any amendment being carried, it shall be competent for any councillor to move one other amendment thereon.

13. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the council, but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained. But if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next ordinary meeting of the council.

14. No councillor shall speak more than once on the same question, except by way of explanation or reply on an original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of an amendment last proposed, and after the reply, the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be put to the vote.

15. Every councillor, when proposing a motion or amendment, or speaking on any matter, shall address the president, and shall not be interrupted except called to order, whereupon he shall sit down until the question of order shall have been decided; the councillor in possession of the chair may then resume the subject.

16. Any councillor who shall refuse to obey when ruled out of order, or shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor, and who, if required by the president, shall refuse to withdraw such expression and make satisfactory apology, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds, to be recovered before any two or more justices of the users.

17. Any councillor may, with the consent of the president, require the sceretary to take down the particular words used by a councillor immediately upon the same being uttered.

18. Any councillor may record his protest against any resolution of the council, on giving notice of his intention to do so on the adoption of a resolution; and on such councillor entering his protest, and his reasons for the same, in a book to be kept for that purpose in the office of the council; provided always that such protest may be expunged if decided by a majority of the council not to be in accordance with truth, or not to be in terms respectful to the council.

19. No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until six clear days' notice shall have been given in some local newspaper, inviting applications for the same, nor unless the salary or allowances attaching to such office shall have been fixed before proceeding to such election.

20. All contracts shall be made by tender unless the council shall otherwise direct. All tenders shall be addressed to the president, and only be opened at the time of their consideration by the council. The respective amounts, with the names of the parties tendering, shall in every case be entered on the minutes of the council. When any tender shall have been accepted by the council, the person tendering, or some one on his behalf, shall pay a deposit, in accordance with a rule hereafter mentioned, into the hands of the treasurer.

21. All payments shall be made by cheque, and be signed by the president and one other councillor, and countersigned by the treasurer, or such other person as the council may appoint; and no cheque shall be given unless the account for which its payment shall have been passed at a meeting of the council, and recommended by the finance committee.

22. The security in all cases of contract shall be 10 per cent. on the amount of the contract, to be paid over by the contractor to the treasurer of the shire, which amount shall be repaid to the contractor when he obtains his final certificate that the works under his contract have been satisfactorily completed.

23. The shire office shall be opened every Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday, between the hours of Ten and Three, during which hours the secretary shall attend to transact the ordinary business of the council. The surveyor shall attend during the hours of business at every meeting of the council.
