REGULATION TO BE OBSERVED BY OFFICERS OF THE CIVIL SERVICE HOLDING APPOINTMENTS AS DISTRICT SURVEYORS IN CONNECTION WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF LANDS AND SURVEY.

THE Governor in Council, in pursuance of the provisions of the 23th clause of *The Civil Service Act* (25 Victoria No. 160), hereby directs that Officers of the Civil Service holding appointments as District Surveyors in connection with the Department of Lands and Survey, shall not purchase, or lease, or hold under license, any Crown Lands situate within the limits of the respective districts within which they are appointed to act in the capacity aforesaid.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH ACT EXTENDED TO
CERTAIN BOROUGHES.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session held in the eighteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign (number 13), intitled, *An Act for promoting the Public Health in populous places in the Colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted that the said Act, or any clause or section thereof, shall apply to such city, town, district, or place in Victoria as the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, may by Proclamation see fit to direct: And whereas it is expedient to extend the said Act to the boroughs hereinafter mentioned: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, do, with the advice of the Executive Council, hereby declare and direct that the said Act shall apply to and be in force within the undermentioned boroughs, that is to say:—

The Borough of Jamieson.
The Borough of Sebastopol.
The Borough of Craigie.
The Borough of Echuca.
The Borough of Raywood.

YAN YEAN AND MORANG FARMERS' COMMON.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act*, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agriculture area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the fourth day of April, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, a certain area therein described was proclaimed a farmers' common for agriculturists at Yan Yeau and Morang: And whereas it is expedient to abolish the said common, and to proclaim another farmers' common in lieu thereof: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby abolish the said farmers' common at Yan Yeau and Morang; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby proclaim the area hereinafter mentioned to be a Farmers' Common, that is to say:—

YAN YEAN AND MORANG FARMERS' COMMON.—Commencing at the north-east angle of Patrick Reid's pre-emptive section; thence by part of the south boundary of the Upper Plenty and Whittlesea Farmers' Common, bearing east one hundred and seventy chains, more or less, to a point on Arthur's Creek; thence by that creek to a point thereon bearing from the last-mentioned point in a straight line north-easterly three miles, more or less; thence by lines bearing south forty chains, more or less, and south-westerly three hundred and fifty chains, more or less; thence by a line and the north boundary of the Greensborough Farmers' Common, bearing west two hundred and eighty chains, more or less; thence by a road one chain wide, bearing north fifty chains, more or less, to the south-west angle of allotment 33 in the parish of Linton; thence by allotments 33, 32, and 31 in the said parish and a line bearing east eighty chains and north seventy-nine chains ninety links; thence by part of the south boundary of the purchased land of Octavius Brown, bearing east twenty chains, more or less; thence by the east boundary of that land and the east boundary of Patrick Reid's pre-emptive section beforementioned, bearing north eighty chains, more or less, to the point of commencement. Approximate area, 7000 acres.—(65.L.851.)

RULES AND STANDING ORDERS OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE KILMORE HOSPITAL.

THE object of the institution is for the purpose of affording surgical medical relief in cases of accident or disease.

2. **Government.**—The officers of the hospital shall be directed by a board of management, consisting of the president, two vice-presidents, the treasurer, and not more than three honorary medical officers, and a committee of twelve life members, or yearly subscribers, elected at each annual general meeting; and, in accordance with the provisions of the Hospitals Act, one-third of the elected portion of the board shall only retire annually after the first election under the Act (viz., the election of 1865); the one-third lowest on the poll to retire the first year, and the one-third next lowest on the poll to retire on the second year; and every succeeding year the one-third longest in office; the retiring members to be eligible for re-election.

3. **Life members and their privileges.**—That a payment of £20 shall constitute a life member, who shall have the privilege of recommending three in-door or six out-door patients annually, and shall be permitted to vote by proxy at annual or special meetings of the subscribers, and shall be eligible to be elected a member of the board of management.

4. **Annual subscribers and their privileges.**—That a subscription of £1 a year constitute an annual subscriber, who shall be allowed the privilege of recommending one in-door or two out-door patients annually. He shall also be qualified to be elected a member of the board of management, and to vote at the special or annual general meetings of the subscribers; and for every additional £1 he may subscribe he shall be privileged to recommend one in-door or two out-door patients; and that those privileges continue in force only during the financial year when such payments are made. But no new subscriber shall be entitled to recommend a patient until three months after the date of payment of his subscription.

5. **The annual general meeting and election of a board of management.**—The annual general meeting shall be held on the second Thursday in January in each year, for the purpose of receiving the report of the board for the past year, and of electing a new board to manage the affairs of the hospital for the current year; each candidate to be proposed and seconded by an annual or life member, and the votes to be recorded by open ballot; and no person who has not paid his subscription of £1 for the current year, or shall be a life member, shall be privileged to be a member of the board of management or vote at the annual general meeting.

6. **Board of management; powers and duties.**—The board of management shall direct the collection and distribution of funds, appoint and dismiss all paid officers and servants, frame regulations for the management of the hospital (the same not to be repugnant to the Hospitals Act), present an annual report to the general meeting, and manage the affairs of the institution generally. They shall meet for special business on the second Tuesday in each month, and for general business when requisite. The board at their first meeting shall elect two sub-committees (six members to be on each committee), one to be designated the finance committee, who shall examine all accounts sent in for payment, and check them with the "provision consumption account" previously to their being passed for payment by the board of management; such accounts to be made up to the last day in each month, and to be sent in to the board four clear days before the day of meeting. The other sub-committee to be named the visiting or house committee, who shall visit the hospital at least once a month in order to examine the state of the stock and report thereon to the general board. They shall recommend the purchase or repairs of any article required for the use of the patients, and order repairs of building when essentially required, provided the expense does not exceed £2.

7. **Honorary secretary, and duties.**—The board of management, at their first meeting, shall elect one of the board as honorary secretary (if practicable). The secretary shall keep the minutes and records of the hospital, conduct the correspondence, and carry out the resolutions of the board; he shall also convene special meetings of the subscribers when directed by the president, the board of management, or on the written requisition of ten annual subscribers.

8. **Auditors, and duties.**—The annual general meeting shall elect two contributors, not members of the board, as auditors for that year. The auditors shall, at the end of each year, examine the treasurer's financial report, and all accounts, vouchers, and documents relating thereto; and shall report thereon to the annual general meeting. The treasurer's annual financial report to be made up to the 31st December in each year.

9. **Treasurer, and duties.**—The annual general meeting shall elect a treasurer, who shall receive all money on behalf of the institution, and invest the same in such bank as the board shall direct, to the credit of the hospital. He shall pay all accounts passed by them, by drafts on the bank, which shall be countersigned by the president and secretary; he shall also issue cards to contributors for the admission of patients, and submit an annual financial report for each year ended the 31st December, to the general meeting, having been previously examined by the auditors.

10. **Honorary medical officers.**—The annual general meeting shall elect not less than two nor more than three consulting medical officers, who must be legally qualified medical practitioners. They shall, in rotation or together, visit the hospital daily, and shall attend for consultation or operation whenever requested; they shall examine the nature of each case of applicants for admission to the hospital, and decide on its fitness to be received, and discharge such patients as they consider fit.

11. **Election of president and vice-presidents; privileges of honorary officers.**—The annual general meeting shall elect a president and two vice-presidents, who, together with the

treasurer and honorary medical officers, shall be members of the board of management by virtue of their offices.

12. *Quorum of members.*—Four members of the board of management shall constitute a quorum at the monthly meetings.

13. *Vacancies.*—Should vacancies occur in the offices of members of committee, president, vice-presidents, treasurer, or consulting medical officers, the board shall supply such vacancies for the remainder of the year; but should vacancies occur in the office of auditors, a special meeting of subscribers shall be called to supply such vacancies.

14. *Absence.*—Any member of the elected portion of the board failing to attend four consecutive monthly meetings shall forfeit his seat on the board; and the board of management shall forthwith supply the vacancy, by electing another life or annual member in his place.

15. *Certificates of admission.*—Each annual subscriber shall receive a certificate from the treasurer that his yearly contribution has been paid, which will enable him to recommend one in-door or two out-door patients; and the treasurer shall furnish each life member with certificates for the admission of three in-door or six out-door patients, and that a subscription of Ten shillings shall entitle the subscriber to a certificate for recommending one out-door patient.

16. *Property of deceased patients.*—All property found on patients who die in the hospital shall be appropriated to defray the expenses of their maintenance and burial; the residue, if any, to be handed over to their legal representatives, or to the curator of intestate estates.

17. *Admission of clergymen.*—Ministers of religion shall have free access to the hospital at all times, and shall confine their ministrations to those who request the same.

18. *Visitors.*—Visitors may be permitted to see patients two days in each week (Thursday and Sunday), and can do so on special occasions by procuring permission from the resident surgeon or the visiting medical officers.

19. *Accidents.*—Cases of severe accident shall be admitted immediately without certificates from subscribers.

20. *Resident surgeon.*—The resident medical officer shall possess the certificate of qualification of the Medical Board of Victoria. He shall not engage in private practice nor any other occupation, but shall devote his whole attention to the duties of his office, and shall attend one hour every alternate weekday to give advice and medicine to out-door patients who have tickets of recommendation from subscribers.

21. The medicines, surgical instruments, and all the stores belonging to the hospital, shall be under his charge; and he shall make up and dispense with due attention all medicines for the sick as prescribed by the honorary medical officers.

22. He shall take care that every medicine dispensed shall have the name of the patient, and the time and manner of using it, written in a clear and legible hand affixed to the paper, box, phial, &c., into which it is put; and that the label be renewed when so far defaced as not to be easily read.

23. He shall from time to time commit to paper the particulars of such medicines and other articles as may be required for the use of the hospital, and have the same examined and signed by one or more of the honorary medical officers before ordering the required supplies. He shall prepare such quantities of the compound medicines as may be necessary for the practice of the hospital; and insert in the "consumption account" the precise quantity of spirits used in making tinctures, &c.

24. He shall have the superintendence of the sick wards, and see that the meals of the patients are properly served according to the prescribed dietary, and that all the orders of the honorary medical officers are duly carried into effect, the nurses and wardsmen being under him, subject also to the directions of the honorary medical officers.

25. He shall, when required by the honorary medical officers, perform the minor operations of surgery, and in all cases of emergency cause immediate notice of such to be given to them; but he is authorised in the meantime to act to the best of his judgment, avoiding as far as possible any unnecessary interference with the duties of these officers, and when interfering, he shall make a full entry of such in the "prescription book."

26. He shall live in the hospital, and shall not leave it except on necessary occasions. He shall not be absent for more than two hours at any time in each day, such absence to be from Nine o'clock a.m. to Four o'clock p.m., nor more than three hours at any other time, and not after Eleven o'clock at night, without the previous sanction of the board of management.

27. He shall keep a register of the cases treated in the hospital and also for out-door patients, a periodical abstract of which he shall prepare, to be laid before the board yearly, embracing the numbers, diseases, and results. That on the admission of patients into the hospital every week, he shall write the name, age, date of admission, &c., on a card to be suspended over the bed. He shall keep a book in which he shall insert the name of every patient for whom the honorary medical officers shall prescribe either wine, spirits, ale, or stout, the name of the medical officer who has ordered the same, and the precise quantity ordered every day, which book shall be laid before the board of management at their stated meetings, together with a health report of the house, and the name of the medical officer for the current month.

28. He shall keep also such other medical books and papers as the honorary medical officers may require for the use of their department, have charge of the key of the dead-house, and perform autopsies under their direction.

29. He shall visit the patients morning and evening, to ascertain that the treatment prescribed has been properly carried out, and especially to examine the condition of the wards in respect to their cleanliness, temperature, and ventilation, carefully observing if the nurses and wardsmen have done their duty. And should any complaint be made, or any cause for such exist, in regard to the conduct of the nurses or wardsmen, or of the patients themselves, it shall be his duty to report the same at the earliest opportunity to the board of management.

He shall also have power to suspend servants for gross misconduct until the next meeting of the board of management.

30. He shall keep an exact inventory of all the goods belonging to and in the hospital, and shall examine, both as to quantity and quality, all supplies received, and enter an account thereof, and also post daily the "provision consumption account," according to the dietary scales of the board of management and the orders of the medical officers to sick inmates, so as to exhibit the individual and aggregate consumption of provisions and medical comforts.

31. He shall keep an exact account of the admissions and discharges of patients, stating the cause of their discharge from the hospital.

32. *Duties of wardman.*—To nurse the sick and keep them clean, to communicate with the medical officers respecting them, and when required by the patients to procure the attendance of any required clergyman. He shall strictly conform to the instructions of the medical officers with regard to the treatment and attendance of patients, and shall not absent himself from the premises without the permission of the resident surgeon or board of management.

33. *Wardswoman's duties.*—She shall attend on delicate and female patients, and perform whatever she may be directed by the resident surgeon or honorary medical officers.

34. *Visitors' book.*—A book shall be kept in the hospital in which visitors may make remarks regarding the state of the institution, attaching their names thereto, and which shall be submitted to the board of management at each of their monthly meetings.

The foregoing rules were adopted by the subscribers at the annual general meeting, held on Thursday, the 12th January, 1865.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE IN-PATIENTS.

1. That they punctually observe the directions of their physicians and surgeons.

2. That the friends of patients, not exceeding two on the same day to each, be permitted to visit them between One and Four o'clock in the afternoon on Thursdays and Sundays, but that they be admissible at other times by the special permission of the visiting medical officers or resident surgeon.

3. That no patient leave his bed or ward or go outside the hospital ground without leave.

4. That no patient absent himself from the hospital or stay out all night without the permission of his physician or surgeon.

5. That the male patients do not go into the wards of the female patients, nor the females into those appropriated to the male patients, without leave of the matron or resident surgeon.

6. That no patient or other person play at cards, dice, or any other game, smoke, swear, or use abusive language, or in any manner behave indecently in any part of the premises, or bring for the patients liquors or improper provisions.

7. That such patient as may be able to work do, by the permission of his physician or surgeon, such work as the house steward or matron may require.

8. That neither the patients or their friends give money or any gratuity whatsoever to the nurse or any person belonging to the hospital.

9. That every patient having cause of complaint do inform the physician or surgeon, or the steward or matron, of same.

10. That any patient not conforming to these rules may be expelled by the board, the resident surgeon, or visiting medical officers.

CHAP. I.—ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS.

1. That the business of the board of management shall be conducted on all ordinary occasions with open doors, the board having the power to exclude strangers for disorderly conduct.

2. That the board shall commence business at each meeting so soon as the legal quorum is present; but if at the expiration of thirty minutes after the appointed hour of meeting there is not a quorum present, no business shall be transacted by the board at that meeting.

3. The minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read as the first business at all meetings of the board in order to their confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereupon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings.

4. At all meetings of the board the reading of the correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day, the presentation of petitions by members of the board, and the bringing up of reports of committees, shall have precedence of regular business.

5. On the presentation of a petition no debate shall take place thereon, until notice has been given in the usual manner, and the only questions that shall be entertained on the occasion of its presentation, shall be that the petition be received, and if necessary, that it be referred to a committee.

6. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the board, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration. Any member of the board may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable in the form of a notice of motion, such notice to be given in writing to the secretary ten clear days previous to the meeting at which the same is to be taken into consideration. All such notices of motion to be considered in the order in which they were given.

7. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him in writing, be present when the business is called in order. Notices not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.

8. The mover of any motion which may be referred to any committee shall be a member of such committee.

CHAP. 2.—ORDER OF DEBATE.

1. Any member desirous of proposing a motion or an amendment, or of discussing any matter under consideration, must rise and address the president or the presiding chairman, and no member when speaking shall be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down, in which case the member calling to order shall be heard thereon in preference to any other speaker, and the question of order shall be disposed of before the subject is resumed or any other subject entered upon.
2. Any member making a motion or amendment shall put it in form, sign and deliver it to the secretary, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder; and no motion or amendment so made shall be withdrawn without leave of the board.
3. No motion or amendment shall be entertained or discussed unless it be seconded. Any member may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the board, by simply noticing that such order is disobeyed.
4. The members when speaking shall use respectful language to each other.
5. If two or more members arise to speak at the same time, the president, or the then presiding chairman, shall decide which is entitled to pre-audience.
6. Any member who shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other member or person, shall, if required by the board, withdraw such expression, and make satisfactory apology to the board.
7. The president, or the then presiding chairman, shall be entitled to only one vote on each question, and shall, in taking the votes on any motion or amendment, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative, and he may do so as often as it is necessary to enable him to form and declare his opinion, from the show of hands, as to which party has the majority.
8. The board shall vote by show of hands, except in cases of election, when the vote shall be by open ballot. Any member of the board may, however, call for a division upon any question, in which case the members voting in the affirmative shall first stand up, and afterwards those in the negative, until their votes are recorded.
9. No motion, the effect of which if carried would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the board, shall be entertained during the same current year, unless a call of the whole board has been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the board which shall have been negatived by the board shall be again entertained during the same current year.

CHAP. 3.—ELECTIONS.

1. No election to any office at the disposal of the board shall take place until seven clear days' notice shall have been given in one or more local newspapers, inviting applications for the same; and the salary of such office shall in all cases be fixed for the current year before proceeding to the election.
2. No member of the board, or officer belonging to the board, shall be received as surety for any officer appointed by the board, or for any work to be done for the board; and in all cases in which security for the due and faithful performance of any duty or contract is required, the expenses of preparing such surety shall be borne by the person or persons giving the same.
3. Any one or more of the standing orders of the board may be suspended *pro tempore*, in case of emergency, provided that a majority of the board shall deem such suspension necessary, always excepting number 9 chapter 2, and number 2 chapter 3.

KYNETON DISTRICT HOSPITAL.

BYE-LAWS for the Management of the Kyneton District Hospital, presented by the committee at a general meeting of the contributors, specially convened for that purpose, in the hall of the Mechanics' Institute, Kyneton, on the 4th day of February, 1865, in accordance with clause No. 7 of the Act No. 220 of the 27th Victoria, and adopted by resolution.

1. *Object of hospital.*—The hospital shall be for the purpose of affording medical and surgical relief in cases of accident and disease.
2. *Composition of committee—Order of retirement.*—The affairs of the hospital shall be managed by a committee, consisting of a president, vice-president, treasurer, twelve (12) ordinary members, and the honorary medical officers, who shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting of contributors, or at a meeting of contributors specially convened for that purpose, and who shall retire in the following order, viz.:—The president, vice-president, treasurer, and honorary medical officers annually, and the ordinary members in accordance with clause 11 of Act No. 220, 27th Victoria, but every retiring member shall be eligible for re-election; and any member of the committee on being elected to any of the above offices, viz., president, vice-president, treasurer, or honorary medical officer, *ipso facto* ceases to be an ordinary member of committee, and the vacancy so made shall be filled up at the same meeting at which such officer is elected.
3. *Disputed elections.*—At the commencement of the business of the annual meetings, three contributors under the Act above named shall be appointed by the meeting to try the validity of all disputed elections during the year.
4. *Honorary medical staff.*—The honorary medical staff shall be three in number, and they shall live within ten miles of the town of Kyneton.
5. *Election of auditors.*—The annual general meeting of contributors shall elect two contributors, not members of the committee, as auditors for that year.
6. *Meetings of committee.*—The committee shall meet for general business at least once in every month, and for special business at such times as may be requisite; and present a report of their proceedings to the annual meetings of contributors.
7. *Passing accounts.*—All accounts for payments shall be passed by the committee and signed by the chairman of the meeting.

8. *Appointment of officers and servants.*—All paid officers and servants shall be appointed or dismissed by the committee, and shall find such security as may be requisite.

9. *Receiving monies—Paying accounts.*—The treasurer shall receive all monies on behalf of the hospital, and invest the same, in such bank as the committee shall direct, to the credit of the hospital; and he shall pay all accounts, passed by the committee, by drafts on the bank, signed by the president or himself, and the secretary.

10. *Duties of auditors.*—The auditors shall examine, previous to the annual meeting in every year, the books and the treasurer's balance-sheet, with accounts, vouchers, and disbursements relating thereto, and shall report thereon to the general meeting.

11. *Duties of sub-committee.*—There shall be a sub-committee to regulate the admission of patients, who shall also act as a house committee, and shall report to the committee as to the wants of the hospital, and make such purchases as may be authorised by the committee.

12. *Privilege of contributors.*—Every contributor, according to the act of incorporation, shall have power for twelve months from the date of his subscription, to recommend patients for admission to the hospital at the rate of one patient for every pound sterling subscribed, subject to the approval of the sub-committee above named; and shall also be entitled to one vote at the meetings of contributors.

13. *Admission of patients.*—All applicants for admission must in ordinary cases procure a recommendation from a contributor before being allowed the benefits of the hospital. The fitness of all applicants for relief to be determined by the sub-committee, of whom the resident surgeon shall be one; and in the absence of the other members, by the resident surgeon.

14. *Cases of emergency.*—Cases of severe accident and emergency shall be admitted without requiring a recommendation, and the sub-committee shall have the power of dispensing with the recommendation papers in special cases.

15. *Paying patients.*—All patients shall be required to pay the actual expense of their maintenance as far as their circumstances may enable them; and all property found on deceased patients shall be appropriated to the defraying of the expense of their maintenance and burial; the residue (if any) to be handed to their legal representatives.

16. *Visits of clergymen.*—Ministers of religion shall have access to sick persons of their respective denominations.

17. *Supply of goods.*—No goods except the ordinary daily supplies of necessaries shall be supplied to the hospital without the sanction of the general committee, on the recommendation of the sub-committee.

18. *Resident surgeon.*—The resident surgeon shall reside in the hospital, and shall not leave it for any period exceeding three hours, nor be absent after Eleven o'clock at night, without leaving a competent person in charge; or shall not be absent for a period exceeding twenty-four (24) hours, without leaving a medical man in charge.

19. *Hospital register.*—A register shall be kept showing the number of patients in the hospital each day, and the same shall be presented at each general committee meeting.

20. *Lists of patients.*—The resident surgeon shall prepare each month a list of the names of patients, both in door and out, with their proper addresses, and the names of the persons recommending them, and lay the same before the committee at each general committee meeting.

21. *Members of committee cannot tender for hospital goods.*—No tender for the supply of goods to the hospital in which any member of the committee is concerned, either directly or indirectly, shall be accepted.

22. *Limitation of agreements and contracts.*—The committee shall not have power to enter into any agreements with paid officers or servants, or into any contracts for the supply of goods, for a period extending over the hospital year.
