WHEREAS by the 70th section of The Amending Land

WHEREAS by the 70th section of The Amending Land
Act 1866 it is enacted, that the Governor in Council
shall have power, from time to time, to make and alter rules,
regulations, and orders for imposing any reasonable charge or
fee for any Crown Grant issued under the authority of the said
Act, and of the more fully carrying out the objects of the said
Act, and whereas the Governor in Council, on the 8th day of
May, 1865, made a regulation prescribing the Fees to be charged
for Crown Grants issued under the said Act: Now therefore
His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive
Council, doth further order as follows:—

1. That the said fees so prescribed shall be demanded and paid

1. That the said fees so prescribed shall be demanded and paid at the same time that the purchase-money (or the balance of purchase-money, as the case may be) of land purchased in fee from the Crown is paid.

2. This regulation shall come into operation on and from the first day of October next.

And the Honorable James Macpherson Grant, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Crown Lands and Survey for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

#### ROYAL VICTORIAN ARTILLERY.

BAST MELBOURNE CORPS.

#### Rules.

1. At any meeting of the corps, the senior officer present shall take the chair.

2. The commanding officer may at any time convene a special meeting of the corps; and must do so on receiving a requisition signed by not less than twenty (20) members, provided the subject to be dealt with be not of a military nature. Such special meeting shall be deemed duly convend by notice being given at parade or company drill, and an advertisement inserted in one or other of the local papers one week previous to such meeting.

3. Any member changing his permanent address, and failing to give notice of the same to the commanding officer, in writing, within fourteen (14) days thereof, shall be fined Two shillings

3. Any member changing his permanent address, and raiting to give notice of the same to the commanding officer, in writing, within fourteen (14) days thereof, shall be fined Two shillings and sixpence.

4. Any member appearing at parade or company drill with uniform, arms, or accourtements dirty or unserviceable from neglect, or who may at any time wear a portion only of the uniform; may be fined by the officer in command, or the captain commanding, the sum of Two shillings and sixpence.

5. A list of all fines imposed in any month shall be signed by the commanding officer, and posted—in the orderly-room or other appointed place, previous to the first drill day in the following month.

6. All fines must be paid to the serjeants in charge of squads within the month in which the list is posted.

7. An account of all fines imposed and paid shall be kept in a book open to the members at the orderly-room on drill days.

8. A general meeting of the corps shall be held in the second week of January and July respectively in each year, at which meeting a detailed statement of the financial position of the corps shall be laid before the members; the meeting to be convened by advertisement and notice being given at parade or drill one week previous to such meeting.

9. The civil business of the corps shall be managed by a general committee, consisting of twelve (12) members, of whom not less than five (5) shall be non-commissioned officers, to be chosen at each half-yearly meeting; candidates to be proposed and seconded; should the number proposed exceed the number required, a balot to be taken. The committee to consider and decide as to the eligibility of all candidates for admission to the corps; consider, pay, and recommend to be paid all expenditure of corps funds, no expenditure exceeding £5 to be incurred without the consent of the commanding officer; and the committee to take into consideration any matters submitted to them by the officer commanding. The committee to meet monthly, and as often as occasion may requi

effect.

12. The name, address, and occupation of any person desirous of joining the corps shall be posted for one week in the orderly room. Any member objecting to the candidate shall communicate the same to the committee, who shall decide as to his

admission.

13. An account shall be kept between the corps and each of its members, wherein the member shall be debited with the liabilities incurred by the corps on his behalf, and credited with the amount earned by him as an effective. If, on the first day of January in any year, a member's debit exceed his credit by ten (10s.) shillings or upwards, he shall be fined the amount of such difference: Provided always that the amount of such fine shall in no case exceed two pounds (£2); but the committee may remit such fine or portion of it, or defer payment of it, at

their discretion. Any payment made under this rule shall be placed to the credit of the member paying it.

14. Any member desirous of leaving the corps under the provisions of the Act shall be fined the amount (if any) that his debit exceeds his credit, but subject to the same conditions as the next preceding rule.

15. Supernumerary members shall be subject to the rules of the corps while their names remain on the books. They may at any time have their names struck off by applying, in writing, to the commanding officer, and paying all amounts due by them to the corps.

16. Any member desirous of altering, rescinding, or adding to the above rules must give fourteen days' notice of such intention to the commanding officer, who shall, on a requisition duly signed by twenty (20) members, convene a special general meeting of the corps, and that such proposed new rules or alteration of rules be posted in the orderly-room at least seven (7) days prior to such meeting.

The above 16 Rules, passed at a general meeting of the corps held at the drill-room on the 21st August, 1866.

#### TEMPORARY LIGHT ON GATCOMBE HEAD, PORT CURTIS.

The Government of Queensland has given notice, that a temporary light, 50 feet above the sea, has recently been established on that part of Gatcombe Head north-west of the Oyster Rock, entrance to Port Curtis.

Vessels entering Port Curtis at night by the north channel, should bring the light to bear about S.W. by W. ½ W., being careful to keep it welf open of Settlement Point, in order to avoid the rocks extending from that point.

A light vessel has also been moored head and stern, in the position of the large black buoy, at the crossing place at the Upper Flats in Fitzroy River. The vessel shows a red light at the mast head, and by day and night the following tidal signals are exhibited:—

#### RENEWAL OF LICENSES UNDER THE 42nd SECTION OF "THE AMENDING LAND ACT 1865."

THE attention of holders of licenses under the 42nd section of The Amending Land Act 1865, is particularly requested to the requirements set forth in the 16th clause of the regulations relating thereto (copy appended), as the penalties attached to a breach of this regulation will be strictly enforced:

attached to a breach of this regulation will be strictly enforced:

16. Renewal of licenses.—If the holder of a license shall, within fourteen (14),days before the expiry of the term of such license, or of any license renewed as hereinbefore provided, notify to such receiver, and paymaster, or other, officer as hereinbefore mentioned, that he desires to renew his right of occupation under such license, and if he forward with such notification the amount payable thereunder, and if he adduce evidence (on being required so to do) sufficient to show that he has complied with the conditions of the license then in force, the license may be renewed subject to all the terms and conditions thereof, and the licenses shall not be required to erect posts, publish notices, or make application as hereinbefore directed. If the holder of any such license fail to forward such notice and fee within the period before mentioned, he will; on the expiration of the term of the license, be liable to forfeit his right to occupy the land, he will be liable to prosecution for unauthorised occupation of Oronn lands, and no compensation will be given for any improvements on the land, which will thereupon be deemed to be available for occupation by other persons, or to be otherwise appropriated.
