COMMONS IN AGRICULTURAL AREAS.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unselected within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land a farmers' common; when one-eighth part of any agricultural area has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim any unselected and unleased portion of such agricultural area, not exceeding twice the quantity so selected and leased, to be a temporary common for the use of such selectors and lessees: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the lands hereinafter mentioned to be commons in the undermentioned agricultural areas, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

COROP AGRICULTURAL AREA COMMON.—The allotments of land in the parish of Corop hereinafter enumerated: The portions of the allotments in that parish traversed by the boundary-line between the Burnewang run and the Stewart Plains and Booramboot runs, lying on the east of that line, and so much of the unsurveyed portion of the uargiu of Lake Cooper as lies within the agricultural area of Corop, are hereby proclaimed a Common for the use of selectors and lessees in the said agricultural area: Parish of Corop, allotments 12, 13, 33, 39, 40, 41, 46, 49, 64, 67, 74, 75, 76, 82, 86, 97, 105, 106, 110, 116, 134, 135, 136, 137, 138, 139, 164, 166, 167, 169, 173, 175, 200, 204, and 205. Total area of commonage 5845 acres, more or less, as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.

COMMONS ALTERED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1862* and the now reciting Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase or alter (as the case may be) the commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, that is to say:—

AXEDALE AND EPPALOCK UNITED TOWN AND FARMERS' COMMON.—The United Town and Farmers' Common of Axedale and Eppalock, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 15th day of September, 1862, and increased by a Proclamation dated 13th November, 1862, is hereby further increased by adding thereto 10,200 acres, more or less, being the unappropriated Crown lands within boundaries described as follow, viz.: Commencing at the south-east angle of allotment 4 of section 8, in the parish of Axedale; thence by a line crossing a road to the south-west angle of allotment 13; thence by the south boundary of that allotment and a line bearing east three miles and a half, more or less, to the west boundary of the township of Axedale; thence by the said boundary of that township bearing south two chains, more or less; thence by the south boundary thereof bearing east eleven chains; thence by a road bearing south eighty-three chains, more or less, to the road forming the north boundary of the parish of Eppalock; thence by that road bearing west eighty-one chains fifty links, more or less, to a point bearing N. 15° E. from the north-west angle of allotment 1 of section 11, parish of Eppalock; thence to the said angle of that allotment; thence by the western boundary of section 11 bearing S. 15° W. to the south-west angle of allotment 7; thence by a road bearing east forty-two chains, more or less, to a creek; thence by that creek bearing southerly to a point thereon bearing east from the south-west angle of allotment 7 of section 3; thence by a line bearing east one hundred and ten chains, more or less, to the north-west boundary of the Campaspe Plains run; thence by the said boundary of that run bearing south-westerly one hundred and fifteen chains, more or less; thence by a line bearing S. 60° E. sixty chains, more or less, to the western boundary of allotment 5 of section 4; thence by the western boundary of sections 4 and 5, bearing S. 30° W. one mile, more or less, to the north-western angle of allotment 5 of section 5; thence by a line bearing N. 60° W. one hundred chains, more or less, to the aforesaid boundary of the Campaspe Plains run; thence by that boundary and a line bearing south-westerly two hundred and twenty chains, more or less, to the road forming the east boundary of the parish of Sedgwick; thence by that road bearing north two hundred and ninety-five chains, more or less, to the north-west angle of allotment 1 of section 15, parish of Eppalock; thence by the north boundary of that allotment bearing east; and thence by a road bearing north to the point of commencement; as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(66.N.13383.)

BET-BET FARMERS' COMMON, No. 2.—The Bet-bet Farmers' Common, in the parish of Rathscar, described in Proclamation bearing date the 4th day of March, 1861, is hereby altered by deducting therefrom 6045 acres, more or less, being the portion thereof not comprised in allotment 19, in the parish of Rathscar, and adding thereto 5700 acres, more or less, being the unappro-

JONES CREEK GOLD-FIELD COMMON.—The Jones Creek Gold-field Common is hereby altered by deducting therefrom 1250 acres, more or less, being the portion thereof lying on the east of the road from Tarnagulla to Eddington, and adding thereto 1038 acres, more or less, being the unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries described as follow, viz.: Commencing at the north-west angle of the existing common; thence by a line bearing west eighty-six chains fifty links, more or less, to the east boundary of the parish of Painswick; thence by the said boundary of that parish, bearing south one hundred and twenty chains; thence by a line bearing east eighty-six chains fifty links, more or less, to the south-west angle of the existing common; and thence by the west boundary thereof, bearing north one hundred and twenty chains to the point of commencement; as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(66.M.13834.)

MARYBOROUGH MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAW No. 1.—[17th September, 1866.]

At a meeting of the Mining Board of the Mining District of Maryborough, begun and holden at Maryborough in the said district, on the seventeenth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

By an Act intituled *The Mining Statute 1865*, it was enacted that any person who shall infringe any lawful bye-law of any board shall, on conviction thereof, forfeit and pay for every such offence any sum not exceeding Ten pounds (£10).

1. *Repealing clause.*—All bye-laws regulating mining operations now in force in the mining district of Maryborough shall be and are hereby repealed and rescinded, always saving the rights of all persons obtained previous to and held at the time of this bye-law coming into operation; and any miner or miners occupying any claim under any mining regulations in force previous to its passing, shall be at liberty to take advantage of all the benefits accruing from this bye-law, and shall be protected in his or their existing rights, pending any application for extension he or they may make under this bye-law.

2. *Interpretation clause.*—In the construction and for the purposes of this bye-law the following terms, if not inconsistent with the context or subject-matter, shall have the respective meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say:—The words "registrar," and "mining registrar," shall mean and be interpreted to mean the mining registrar of the division for which he shall have been appointed. The term "lead" shall mean the alluvial deposit or wash-dirt containing gold, running in a continuous course or occurring successively in spots or patches; and words importing the singular number shall include the plural number, and words importing the plural number shall include the singular number; words importing the masculine gender shall include females; the words "miner," "person," "claimholder," "owner," "party," shall mean and include his or her agent respectively; and, for the purposes of this bye-law, any act done by an agent duly authorised shall be deemed to have been done by the person by whom he shall have been authorised to act.

3. *Payable ground and quartz.*—Payable ground and quartz shall be understood to mean any quantity of quartz, stone, earth, or other auriferous substance, obtained by any miner or miners from any claim or claims, which will pay the expenses of carting same from the claim to the nearest crushing-machine or watering-place for washing purposes, also expenses of crushing or washing same, as the case may be, and which will also pay the miner or miners while employed in obtaining such quartz, stone, earth, or other auriferous substance, the current rate of wages in that particular district.

RELATING TO MINING REGISTRARS.

4. *Duties of mining registrars.*—It shall be the duty of the mining registrar appointed for each division, under the provisions of *The Mining Statute 1865*, to keep his office in a convenient place in his division, and to keep it open during one hour each day, Sundays and holidays excepted; that is to say, from Ten o'clock a.m. to Eleven a.m., and to post outside of said office a notice to that effect; and such mining registrar shall also perform within his division all the several duties, and shall make all necessary surveys specified under this bye-law in reference to such mining registrar; and he shall keep a register book in the form of schedule A hereunto annexed, and a register of mortgages in the form in schedule G, and such other books as by this bye-law are required. And no such mining registrar shall, either directly or indirectly, hold any claim, or share, or interest in any claim, or any lease granted for mining purposes in the division for which he shall have been appointed.

5. *Powers of mining registrars.*—Any mining registrar shall have power within the division for which he shall have been appointed to effect registrations in accordance with this bye-law; and in cases where an objection or complaint, as hereinafter mentioned, shall have been lodged against any registration, the registrar shall not register same until such complaint or objection shall have been determined by the warden, or the proper authority, or allowed to lapse.

6. *Information to the public.*—Any person requiring any information from the books of the mining registrar may obtain same on payment of the fee prescribed by this bye-law, and it shall be the duty of the mining registrar to furnish such information; and if such information be required in writing, he shall give an extract, on the payment of an additional fee.

RELATING TO PROSPECTING.

7. *Claims how to be marked.*—Any miner or miners marking out a claim in alluvial sinking shall evidence his or their boundary by firmly driving in a substantial peg at each corner of the claim, except as provided for in section 59, such pegs to be kept visible during the working of the claim.

8. *Prospecting for new gold fields.*—Prospectors previous to discovering payable gold shall be protected in holding an area of 200 yards square, provided they are searching for gold at a greater distance than one quarter of a mile from any other gold field, and at a greater distance than two miles they shall be protected in holding an area of 400 yards square, so long as they continue to work their prospecting claims in a *bona fide* manner; and on obtaining payable gold, they shall mark off their claims in accordance with the following section.

9. *Extent of claim.*—The first miner or party of miners, so prospecting, discovering payable gold, shall be entitled to an

extent of prospecting claim, as specified in the following table of distances from any other gold field:—

	In dry ground.	In wet ground.
Not less than $\frac{1}{4}$ mile ...	200 ft. square.	300 ft. square.
Not less than $\frac{1}{2}$ mile ...	250 " " "	350 " " "
Not less than 1 mile ...	300 " " "	400 " " "
Not less than 2 miles ...	350 " " "	450 " " "
Not less than 3 miles ...	500 " " "	600 " " "
Not less than 5 miles ...	700 " " "	1000 " " "

Such distances to be taken from the nearest point thereto of any abandoned or existing gold workings.

10. *Lost leads.*—The first miner or party of miners commencing and continuing to prospect for a lost lead of gold or gold workings which have been abandoned or then unoccupied, and discovering a payable deposit of gold therein, shall be entitled to an area of ground of 200 feet square.

11. *Newly discovered leads.*—The first miner or party of miners commencing and continuing to sink a shaft, or taking up and continuing to work a shaft which has been partly sunk or bottomed in any claim, on any newly discovered or established lead or gold working, the boundary of such claim not being less than 200 yards distant from the nearest boundary of the last claim bottomed, and then being worked on the same end of such lead or gold working, shall be entitled on discovering a payable deposit of gold therein, to an area of ground of 200 feet square; provided that he or they shall have previously marked off such area; provided also that all prospecting claims under this and the last preceding section shall be at least 300 yards apart.

12. *Discovering payable gold.*—Any prospector discovering payable gold, and neglecting to report the same to the mining registrar without delay, have his prospecting claim registered, and obtain a certificate of registration in the form of schedule B hereunto annexed, shall not be entitled to more than an ordinary sized claim.

13. *Information to adjoining claimholders.*—The owner or owners of prospecting claims shall, on the application of adjoining claimholders, give every information in his or their power as to the course of the gold and the quantity he or they are obtaining from his or their prospecting claim.

DRY SINKING AND SUBFACING.

14. *Extent of claim in new ground.*—The extent of claim in new ground, where the depth of sinking does not exceed 60 feet, shall be, for—

One miner, 42 feet square;
Two miners, 60 feet square;
Three miners, 72 feet square;
Four miners, 84 feet square.

And where the depth of sinking exceeds 60 feet, the extent of claim shall be, for—

Two miners, 72 feet square;
Three miners, 85 feet square;
Four miners, 100 feet square.

15. *Extent of claim in old ground.*—The extent of claim in dry sinking in ground previously worked and abandoned shall be, for—

One miner, 100 feet square;
Two miners, 142 feet square;
Three miners, 174 feet square;
Four miners, 200 feet square.

16. *Shepherding.*—All claimholders or their agents must be present on his or their claim every day, one hour, between Eleven o'clock a.m. and Twelve o'clock at noon, until the shaft thereon has been bottomed. Any miner or miners not complying herewith shall be deemed to have abandoned his or their claim or share, unless in case of dispute he or they can justify such non-compliance under this bye-law.

17. *Claims becoming wet.*—Any claim taken up as dry sinking and proving to be wet shall be worked in accordance with the provisions relating to wet sinking, and may be held by the same number of shareholders as if it were dry sinking.

18. *Amalgamation.*—The holders of adjoining claims which have been taken up under sections 14 and 15, may amalgamate them by posting on some conspicuous place, near the centre of such claims, a notice, in writing, containing the number of claims amalgamated, and the name of each shareholder, and which shall be kept posted until the claim is worked out or abandoned; and such amalgamated claim shall be worked every working day by at least two of the shareholders, and all shareholders or their agents shall be present on their claim during *shepherding hours*, until the shaft thereon has been bottomed, except those shareholders who may be employed in sinking such shaft eight hours, between Nine p.m. and Six a.m. the following day, but in no case shall there be more than three shareholders recognised as being employed on the night-shift; and when the shaft thereon has been bottomed the full number of shareholders shall be employed therein, or otherwise be upon such claim.

WET SINKING.

19. *Interpretation.*—The term "wet sinking" shall mean ground where water is struck below the surface-drift, and where slabbing and water baling may be necessary on account of such water.

20. *Extent of claim in new ground.*—The extent of claim in wet sinking shall not exceed, for—

Four miners, 140 feet square;
Six miners, 175 feet square;
Eight miners, 200 feet square.

And where the depth of sinking exceeds eighty (80) feet, the extent of claim shall be, for—

Four miners, 200 feet square;
Six miners, 250 feet square;
Eight miners, 300 feet square.

21. *Extent of claim in old ground.*—The extent of claim in wet sinking in ground previously worked and abandoned shall be, for—

Four miners, 300 feet square;
Six miners, 350 feet square;
Eight miners, 400 feet square.

22. *Amalgamation.*—The holders of any number of adjoining claims may amalgamate them by posting a notice on some conspicuous part near the centre of the claims proposed to be amalgamated, with the names of all the shareholders; and such notice shall be kept posted during the working of the claim.

23. *Mode of working.*—All claimholders or their agents, within six (6) claims in every direction of any shaft which has struck water, and in amalgamated claims, one half the shareholders, shall sink their shafts every lawful day until the well is completed, and shall bore their due proportion of water daily till it be exhausted, or the water prove too heavy, and work and baling be stopped with the consent of adjoining claimholders, and in amalgamated claims the full number of shareholders shall be employed as soon as the shaft is bottomed; and beyond six (6) claims in every direction from any shaft which has struck water, the claimholders shall be allowed to hold their claims unworked, provided they or their agents are all present on such claims every day from eleven o'clock a.m. until twelve o'clock noon.

24. *Neglecting to work, &c.*—During the sinking of any shaft or shafts, any miner or miners neglecting to work them, or cause them to be worked, in accordance with the preceding section, will be deemed to have committed a breach of this by-law; and parties shepherding neglecting to be present on their claims every lawful day, between the hours of 11 o'clock a.m. and 12 o'clock noon, such claim, share, or shares therein shall be deemed abandoned.

RELATING TO RESERVOIRS, RACES, AND WATER-COURSES.

25. *Interpretation.*—The word "race" shall mean a channel made for the purpose of conveying water; the words "tail-race" shall mean a race cut for the purpose of draining any claim or claims, or for carrying off the water used for sluicing, or for any other mining purpose; the words "right," or "water-right," shall mean the privilege of diverting and using water from any creek or river.

26. *Reservoirs, races, or water-courses.*—Any miner or miners cutting or constructing reservoirs for the storing of water for mining or domestic purposes, or cutting any race or water-course for the conveyance of water from any reservoir, river, or creek, may do so subject to the following conditions:—

Conditions.—A notice of application, in the form of schedule D hereunto annexed, shall be posted for a period of fourteen days on some conspicuous part of the place it is intended to construct such reservoir, or divert the water; and also a copy at the mining registrar's office, of the division or divisions in which the source or sources are situated from which the water is to be taken, and through which such water shall be conveyed, and objections may be made to any such application; and no objections having been made to such application, the mining registrar shall register the same, giving a certificate, in the form of schedule B hereunto annexed, to the applicant or applicants; but in no case shall the extent of ground for a reservoir exceed 50,000 square yards, inclusive of water-shed.

27. *Priority of water-rights.*—Water-rights shall take precedence according to the date of registration, and if at any time the supply of water shall become insufficient, the party or company being last registered shall cease to enjoy such right during such deficiency of water as against any antecedent registered.

28. *Water-gauge.*—All races or water-course shall have placed at the head of the race, at the place from where the water is diverted, a box for the purpose of gauging or measuring the quantity of water flowing into the race or water-course, such gauge-box to be at least 12 feet long, with a fall of half an inch to the foot, and the gauge or measurement, which shall be considered a sluice-head, shall be such a quantity of water as will pass through an aperture at the top-end of the above-named gauge-box of 20 inches wide and 3 inches deep, or 60 square inches.

29. *Quantity of water allowed to each race.*—The quantity of water or number of sluice-heads for any race or water-course shall be in proportion to the number of miners forming the party or company constructing or being in possession of any race at the following scale, that is to say—

One or two miners	... One sluice-head of water;
Four miners	... Two sluice-heads of water;
Seven miners	... Three sluice-heads of water.

And so on at the rate of one sluice-head to every additional three miners.

30. *Width allowed on each side of race.*—Any person or persons occupying a race for the conveyance of water for mining purposes shall be entitled to a width of ten feet on each side of such race, measuring from the centre thereof: Provided always that where the depth of a cutting exceeds twelve feet, or where a tunnel is required, the width shall be twenty feet on each side of such race, measuring from the centre thereof.

31. *Races may be constructed through claims.*—Any miner or miners shall be entitled to cut and construct any race, tail-race, or drain, for mining purposes, through any claim or claims held by any other miner or miners, or under, over, or across any other race, tail-race, or drain: Provided always that such first-mentioned race, tail-race, or drain be cut, constructed, timbered, framed, and formed in such a manner as not to injure the claim, race, tail-race, or drain through or across which it may be cut or constructed.

32. *Water-races may be extended or altered.*—Any miner or miners may extend his or their race or water-course beyond the point for which he or they were originally registered, or make any alteration or deviation therein; provided that no such extension or alteration shall interfere with any registered right obtained by any other miner or miners subsequent to the application for said alteration or extension.

33. *Water to be left running in creeks, &c.*—In all river beds and main creeks, from which water is diverted for mining purposes, there shall at all times be left running at least one sluice-head of water for general use; and in all tributary creeks, from which water is diverted for mining purposes, there shall be left remaining in its natural channel a quantity of water not less than half a sluice-head.

34. *Commencing and continuing the formation of races.*—Any miner or party of miners shall, within one calendar month from the registration with the mining registrar, begin to form such race, and having begun, shall not stop work for a longer period than six consecutive working days during the formation thereof.

35. *Protection to water-rights during drought.*—The race or claim, or right to the water, may be held when the supply of water is insufficient; provided a notice to that effect is kept posted thereon.

36. *Extent of sluicing claim.*—The extent of mining claims for sluicing purposes, in new surfacing or ground previously worked and unoccupied, shall not exceed forty (40) yards in length by a width of sixty (60) yards for each miner forming the party.

37. *Beds of creeks or rivers.*—The extent of claim in the beds of creeks or rivers shall be for each miner 20 yards along the course of said creek or river, by a breadth not exceeding 22 yards.

RELATING TO PUDDLING MACHINES, WATER-DAMS, ETC.

38. *Puddling-machines, water-dams, &c.*—Any miner or miners may erect a puddling-machine, or form water-dams, or take up any unoccupied or forfeited site of any puddling-machine or water-dam, on registering the same with the mining registrar, subject to the conditions as hereinafter provided.

39. *Conditions.*—A notice of the intention to register any such site of a puddling-machine, water-dam, or any other site of a machine, engine, or water-dam, not otherwise specially provided for, shall be kept posted on a conspicuous part of the claim for a period of not less than seven (7) days, where it is intended to erect or construct any of the above-named machines or water-dams, and also a copy at the mining registrar's office, for the same period, previous to the registration thereof; and any objections to such registration shall be made to the mining registrar, in writing, stating the nature of the objections, with the name of the person or of each of the persons objecting; and any such objections must be made within the above-named seven days.

40. *Certificate.*—A certificate of registration in the form of schedule B, hereunto annexed, shall be given by the mining registrar in case of registration.

41. *Area of site for puddling-machine, water-dam, and storage of sludge.*—The area for the site of any horse puddling-machine and water-dam shall be one hundred yards square, and a further, but separate, area below that granted for the machine and water-dam of one hundred yards square, on which the owner or owners shall erect a sludge-dam.

42. *Extent of claim for puddling.*—The extent of mining claim for the holders of puddling-machines shall be, in previously worked and unoccupied ground, 100 feet square for every miner employed thereon.

43. *Catch-drains.*—The owner or owners of any catch-drain cut and constructed for the collecting and conveyance of water to any water-dam, shall be protected in the possession thereof for a distance not exceeding 200 yards from any such water-dam: Provided such catch-drains are on the higher side of the water-dam bank.

44. *Claims may be held unworked.*—All mining claims for puddling may be held unworked for any time that there may be an insufficiency of water for the working thereof, provided a notice to that effect be kept posted thereon.

45. *Water-dams and sites.*—No water-dam or site of puddling-machine shall be left unused for a period exceeding three months, provided a sufficient supply of water has been in such water-dam to enable mining operations to be carried on during such period.

46. *Space to be left between puddling-machines or water-dams.*—Any miner or miners taking possession of a site for a puddling-machine or water-dam shall leave a space of 200 yards between the boundary of such site and the boundary of the site of the puddling-machine or water-dam nearest thereto.

47. *Protection for water-dams.*—Any miner or miners having lawful possession of a water-dam, in compliance with this by-law, shall be protected against any other miner or miners, person or persons using any water therefrom (domestic purposes excepted); and no person or persons shall be allowed to take water from such dam, for the purpose of sale, except the owner or owners thereof, or by his or their authority, in writing; nor shall any person or persons drive or allow his or their cattle into any reservoir or water-dam held under this by-law, or in any way defile, destroy, or damage the same.

48. *Water-holes for domestic use.*—Where any miner or miners find that a water-hole is necessary for domestic purposes, the same shall be protected for such purposes: Provided that he or they shall affix a notice, in writing, on a post at least six feet high, close to such waterhole, signed by at least four miners or holders of business licenses, stating that such water-hole is

reserved for domestic purposes only. Any person disputing the right of the above to such water-hole shall apply to the warden to settle the matter in dispute.

49. *Disposing of sludge.*—No person or persons shall cause or permit sludge, tailings or water to flow from his or their claim or dam, or to accumulate so as to cause injury to any public road or thoroughfare, or to any claim, drive, water-race, water-dam, water-hole for domestic purposes, old or new workings, puddling-machine, or to any other machinery, or to any garden or place of residence held under miner's right or business license, belonging to any other person or persons. This section shall not apply to areas placed under the operation of the bye-law for regulating the disposal of sludge.

50. *Roads to be bridged.*—When it may be found necessary to make a sludge or water drain across any road or thoroughfare, the owner of such drain shall construct a substantial bridge, not less than 14 feet wide, over such drain across the road, which bridge shall be kept in repair by the owner of the drain.

51. *Machines, tailings, &c., obstructing creeks.*—It shall not be lawful for any person or persons to hold, place, construct, or erect any machine, water-dam, bank of earth, or building of any sort, on, upon, or over any creek, so as to impede the passage of water or sludge in any channel or creek.

RELATING TO BUSINESS LICENSES AND RESIDENCE SITES.

52. *Area of ground under business license.*—The holder of a business license shall be entitled to an allotment of ground having a frontage of 45 feet by a depth of 120 feet. The owner or occupier of any such business site, shall erect or cause to be erected, suitable premises, and occupy the same within six (6) weeks from the date of taking possession thereof.

53. *Streets.*—Wherever a large rush may be anticipated, the mining registrar shall mark off, or cause to be marked off, a site for a street or streets in a convenient situation, but not likely to be auriferous, such street or streets to be one chain wide, and shall mark the allotments for business places along such street or streets; and after such site has been marked off it shall be reserved for holders of business licenses only; and no holder of a miner's right shall be allowed to occupy any of such allotments for the purpose of residence except such as had erected their abodes previous to the marking off of same as aforesaid; and to entitle any holder of a business license to occupy any of such allotments for business purposes, he shall first cause same to be registered by the mining registrar, who shall give a certificate of such registration in the form of schedule B hereunto annexed. The party applying shall produce to the mining registrar his business license for the time being, whereupon the mining registrar shall register the owner thereof for only one allotment under such business license. When any mining registrar shall commence to lay off a line of street, no miner or holder of a business license shall take possession of or occupy any allotment on such street until the same is properly surveyed and marked off by the mining registrar. When such street or streets shall be duly surveyed all sites that have not previously been taken possession of by the holders of miner's rights or business licenses shall be balloted for by the holders of business licenses only.

54. *Space to be left between allotments.*—A space of 10 feet available for mining purposes and public thoroughfares shall be left between adjoining allotments; and the stores and premises may be undetermined, provided that such undetermined does not injure or endanger such stores or premises. And in case such space of 10 feet has not been left as aforesaid, or that the same having been left shall be afterwards occupied or built upon, such buildings are liable to be removed if required for mining purposes or public thoroughfares, without compensation to the owner or owners thereof; and any miner or miners requiring the same for mining purposes shall first apply to the warden to be put in possession thereof.

55. *Nuisance.*—Every holder of a business or residence site fronting a new street or thoroughfare shall be required to keep the same in such a state of cleanliness so as not to become a nuisance to his neighbors or the public.

56. *Land to be occupied for residence.*—Every holder of a miner's right shall be entitled to hold one quarter of an acre of land, for the purpose of residence. Should the owner of any residence site held under a miner's right, upon which he has erected a residence and resided thereon for four consecutive weeks, leave such residence unoccupied for a longer period than six months, such site shall be deemed abandoned, unless registered for a further period under schedule B hereunto annexed.

RELATING TO REGISTERED EXTENDED CLAIMS.

57. *Interpretation.*—Wet alluvial ground, new or previously worked, where horse-power or steam machinery is required for the working and baling of water therefrom, may be taken up and occupied as a registered extended claim or claims, subject to the following conditions:—

58. *Claims must be registered.*—Every claim taken up under this section must be registered with the mining registrar, who shall give to the applicant or applicants a certificate of registration in the form of schedule B hereunto annexed; and such certificate shall contain the name or names of the owner or owners, together with the name or title under which the claim is to be worked.

59. *Marking claims.*—Seven days previous to the registration of any such claim, the applicant or applicants shall mark off the land to be applied for, by firmly fixing in the ground a post, standing not less than 3 feet above the surface, at each angle of the land, and an application in the form of schedule D hereunto annexed shall be posted near the centre of such land, such notice to be kept posted until the application is disposed of; a copy of such application to be posted at the mining registrar's

office, and inserted once during the aforesaid seven days in a newspaper published nearest to the land applied for.

60. *Claims to be surveyed.*—At the expiration of the aforesaid seven days, or as soon thereafter as possible, the mining surveyor shall make a survey of the land applied for (provided no objections have been lodged against the registration thereof), and make a plan of it, giving a copy of such plan to the owner or owners; and in making such survey he shall connect such claim with some point, so as to secure its identity.

61. *Objections.*—Any party or parties objecting to the registration of such claim must lodge with the mining registrar their objections, in writing, within the aforesaid seven days, and on the receipt of such objections he shall not register the applicant or applicants until the objections are disposed of; and any party or parties objecting, failing to prosecute their objections within fourteen days from the date of lodging the same, the mining registrar shall proceed to register the applicant or applicants for such claim or claims, as if no objections had been lodged.

62. *Names of claims.*—For the purposes of this bye-law, registered claims shall be classified and known by the following names or titles, that is to say:—

A single claim.—The area held by one miner by virtue of a miner's right.

An united claim.—Any number of single claims, not exceeding 30, where the owners have agreed to work as a company.

An amalgamated claim.—Two or more united claims forming one company.

63. *Extent and form of claims.*—The extent of registered claims shall be according to the following scale:—In ground where the depth of sinking does not exceed one hundred feet, one acre per man; one hundred feet and not exceeding two hundred feet, two acres per man; two hundred feet and upwards, three acres per man; but no claim, whether single, united, or amalgamated, shall exceed in length three times its width.

64. *Time for commencing and mode of working.*—Within two months after the registration of any claim the owner or owners, themselves, or their agents, shall *bona fide* proceed to work regularly upon such claim or claims, according to the usual course and practice of efficient mining, by so many miners as shall be required, until the claim is opened out sufficiently to admit of the full number of miners for which the claim is registered being employed thereon.

65. *Penalties, &c.*—The owner or owners of any registered claim neglecting to commence work on their claim, as required by the preceding section, or at any time during the working thereof neglecting to work, or cause to be worked, or bale their due proportion of water from such claim, for a period of twenty-eight consecutive days, shall be liable, on conviction thereof, to a penalty not exceeding £10, and for a second offence, on conviction thereof, to a penalty not less than £10 and not exceeding £25. Such penalty may be enforced by any duly qualified miner or miners, or mining registrar, and be recoverable in a summary way before any justice being also a warden; provided that no second information shall be laid until fourteen days after the date of the first conviction; and if after the lapse of twenty-eight days from the infliction of any second penalty, the owner or owners shall neglect to work or cause to be worked, such claim may be declared forfeited.

66. *Compensation in case of forfeiture.*—Registered extended alluvial claims that have been adjudged forfeited, the miner or miners in whose favor such forfeiture has been granted shall, as a condition precedent to obtaining possession thereof, pay to the parties having such claim forfeited for all materials or machinery erected on or belonging to such claim; and in the event of the parties not agreeing as to the amount, the same to be ascertained by arbitration.

RELATING TO QUARTZ REEFS.

67. *Taking possession of prospecting claims.*—All quartz reef prospecting claims shall be marked by fixing two substantial posts, one at each end of the claim, on the supposed course of the reef, to stand at least three feet out of the ground, and to be kept visible during the working of the claim. And such marking and working shall be deemed a good and sufficient title to such claim until payable gold has been discovered in the claim, on the discovery whereof the miner or party of miners making such discovery shall, within seven days from the date of such discovery, give information thereof to the mining registrar, and thereupon apply for registration of such prospecting claim; upon which the mining registrar shall register such miner or party of miners therefor, and give a certificate of registration in the form of schedule B hereunto annexed, a copy of which shall, as soon after as possible, be posted on the claim, and continue so posted until same shall be abandoned. The mining registrar shall also keep a list or schedule of all such prospecting claims so registered posted outside his office for at least one week from the day of such registration. And further, within sixty days after payable quartz has been obtained in any such prospecting quartz claim, the owner or owners thereof shall make application to the mining registrar of the division to make a survey of same; whereupon the mining registrar shall survey the same and make a plan thereof (giving a copy of such plan to the applicant), laying down a datum-line on the supposed or ascertained course of the reef in any such prospecting quartz claim, and the mining registrar shall on making such survey and plan connect the said prospecting claim with some point, so as to secure its identity. Any miner or miners neglecting to give notice as hereinbefore mentioned shall not be entitled to hold more than fifty (50) feet per man.

68. *Distance between prospecting claims.*—No second prospecting quartz claim shall be granted within four hundred (400) yards from the centre of any prospecting claim already granted

on the same line of reef, and then being worked, and registered under the provisions of this bye-law, or from the centre of the claim of any party prospecting for the same reef.

69. *Extent of prospecting claim.*—The first miner or party of miners commencing to prospect a quartz reef, or taking up a previously worked and unoccupied quartz reef, shall be entitled to 200 feet along the course of any such reef, if it be defined, or the supposed course thereof, by a width of 400 feet; 200 feet on each side from the centre of such reef, if it be defined, or the supposed centre thereof; and the owner or owners thereof respectively shall be entitled to every reef, vein, and leader, and all gold in the alluvial deposits within such limits.

70. *Encouragement to prospect.*—Any number of miners not exceeding twelve may combine for the purpose of sinking a prospecting shaft or shafts in common. A list of the names of the miners forming such party shall be kept posted on a conspicuous part of the claim. The extent of claim for such party shall be at the rate of 75 feet in length along the course of such reef, if it be defined, or the supposed course thereof, by a width of 400 feet, 200 feet on each side from the centre of such reef, if it be defined, or the supposed centre thereof, for every miner forming such party. And should such party be prospecting at a greater distance than three miles from any other gold field, then the extent of claim shall be one hundred (100) feet per man. Such party may employ only as many of their number as are necessary to sink such shaft or shafts, or otherwise to prospect the ground; provided that if they discover a payable quartz reef they shall employ within two months after such discovery, the full number of miners forming such party; and the owner or owners of such claim or claims respectively shall be entitled to every reef, vein, and leader, and all gold in the alluvial deposits within such limits.

71. *Information to adjoining claimholders.*—The occupier or occupiers of prospecting claims shall, on the application of the occupier or occupiers of adjoining claims, give the utmost information in his or their power to such occupier or occupiers as to the course of the gold and the quantity he or they have obtained or are obtaining from such claim.

ORDINARY QUARTZ CLAIMS.

72. *Marking claim.*—Any miner or miners marking a claim on a quartz reef shall do so by fixing six (6) posts thereon, that is to say, two (2) posts to stand in a line with the datum or ascertained line of the reef laid down in the prospecting claim by the mining registrar, and one at each corner of the claim, such posts to be at least three feet out of the ground, and to be kept visible until such claim shall have been worked out or abandoned. The name of the owner or of each of the owners of a claim must always be kept posted on some conspicuous part of the claim during the working thereof.

73. *Extent of ordinary claim.*—Every miner shall be entitled to fifty (50) feet along the course of the reef, if it be defined, and if not, along the supposed course thereof, by a width of 400 feet; 200 feet on each side from the centre of the reef if it be defined, or if not defined, the supposed centre thereof; provided that when the full width of ground hereby authorised to be held cannot be taken up by reason of a part thereof being occupied as an alluvial claim, the deficiency shall be supplied the instant such deficiency of ground becomes vacated under the operation of this bye-law, as effectually as if such deficient ground had been unoccupied at the time the owners of the quartz claim put down their pegs on the supposed line of reef, and that without any formal act of taking possession, and notwithstanding anything hereinafter implied to the contrary, and the owner or owners thereof shall be entitled to every reef, vein, and leader, and all gold contained in the alluvial deposits within such limits.

74. *Claims how to be worked.*—All quartz claims marked off under the preceding section shall be worked every working day, except as hereinafter provided. Any quartz claim exceeding fifty (50) feet and not exceeding four hundred (400) feet shall be worked as aforesaid by two (2) miners; exceeding four hundred (400) feet and not exceeding six hundred (600) feet by three (3) miners; and by one (1) miner for every two hundred (200) feet or portion of two hundred (200) feet comprising the claim; and when and so soon as payable quartz shall have been obtained in any such claim, the owner or owners thereof shall, within six weeks from the date of obtaining such payable quartz, employ the full number of miners forming such party in such claim. Should the claim at any time fail to be remunerative for one month, the number of miners limited as set forth for the working of the claim previous to payable quartz being obtained will be deemed sufficient for the working of such claim until payable quartz be again obtained.

75. *Extended claim.*—Any miner or party of miners taking up a claim on an abandoned or unoccupied quartz reef that has been sunk to a depth of sixty (60) feet shall be entitled to hold seventy-five (75) feet in length along the course of such reef by a width of four hundred (400) feet, two hundred (200) feet on each side from the centre of such reef if it be defined, or the supposed centre thereof, for each shareholder therein; and it shall be worked every working day as hereinafter provided. From seventy-five (75) feet and not exceeding six hundred (600) feet shall be worked by two (2) miners; exceeding six hundred (600) feet and not exceeding nine hundred (900) feet by three (3) miners; and by one (1) miner for every additional three hundred (300) feet or portion of three hundred (300) feet comprising the claim; and shall be worked in all other respects in accordance with the preceding section.

76. *Reasons for, and conditions of, registration.*—Any prospecting claim taken up on a quartz reef, and having been worked for a period of not less than six (6) consecutive months, may be held unworked for six months, if registered with the mining registrar. Any ordinary or extended quartz claim having been

worked for a period of six (6) consecutive months, no payable gold having been obtained for one month previous to such registration, may be held unworked for six (6) months. Any ordinary or extended quartz claim having been worked for a period of three (3) consecutive months, no payable gold having been obtained for one month previous to such registration, may be held unworked for three (3) months. Registered extended quartz claims may wholly or partially suspend mining operations while engaged in the erection of machinery or repairing the same, or from any natural or unforeseen cause, provided a notice of the cause of such stoppage is posted on the claim, and also registered with the mining registrar; but no registration of such extended claims shall exceed six (6) months. Any quartz claim on which a shaft has been sunk and worked to the water, the party being unable to overcome the same—the adjoining claim not being down to water, such registration to continue in force until the adjoining claim is down to water; and any ordinary quartz claim registered at the passing of this bye-law, having been worked for six months previous to such registration, may re-register for three months. All applications for registration shall be made to the mining registrar in writing. The mining registrar shall give a certificate of registration, in the form of schedule C hereunto annexed, a copy of which shall be kept posted on some conspicuous part of the claim during the period for which it shall be registered, and such registration may be renewed from time to time, whenever the conditions of such registration shall be complied with.

77. *Water in old shafts or openings.*—When quartz claims have old shafts or openings containing water injurious to adjoining claims, the owner or owners thereof shall, on receipt of a complaint in writing, cause the said water in such shafts or openings to be immediately baled, and take the necessary measures to prevent the accumulation of surface water.

REGISTERED EXTENDED QUARTZ CLAIMS.

78. *Interpretation.*—Quartz reefs on which a number of shafts have been sunk and worked to the water-level, or to a depth of one hundred (100) feet, may be taken up as registered extended quartz claims to be worked by steam machinery.

79. *Extent of claim.*—Any party of miners erecting steam machinery on an abandoned or unoccupied quartz reef shall be entitled to hold one hundred (100) feet along the course of such reef by a width of four hundred (400) feet, two hundred (200) feet on each side from the centre of such reef if it be defined, or the supposed centre thereof, for each miner employed thereon, subject to the following conditions:—

Claims must be registered.—Every claim taken up under this section must be registered with the mining registrar, who shall give to the applicant or applicants a certificate of registration in the form of schedule B hereunto annexed; and such certificate must contain the name or names of the owner or owners, together with the name or title under which the claim is to be worked.

Marking claims.—Seven days previous to the registration of any registered claim, the applicant or applicants shall mark off the land to be applied for by firmly fixing in the ground four posts, standing at least three feet above the surface, at each angle of the land, and by an application in the form of schedule D hereunto annexed posted near the centre of such land, such notice to be kept posted until the application is disposed of, a copy of such application to be posted at the mining registrar's office, and inserted once during the aforesaid seven days in a newspaper published nearest to the land applied for.

Claims to be surveyed.—At the expiration of the aforesaid seven days, or as soon thereafter as possible, the mining registrar shall make a survey of the land applied for (provided no objections have been lodged against the registration thereof) and make a plan of it, giving a copy of such plan to the owner or owners; and, in making such survey he shall connect such claim with some point, so as to secure its identity.

Objections.—Any party or parties objecting to the registration of such claim must lodge with the mining registrar their objections, in writing, within the aforesaid seven days; and on receipt of such objections, he shall not register the applicant or applicants until the objections are disposed of; and any party or parties objecting failing to prosecute their objections within fourteen days from the date of lodging the same, the mining registrar shall proceed to register the applicant or applicants for such claim or claims, as if no objections had been lodged.

80. *Time for commencing and mode of working.*—Within two months after the registration of any extended claim, the owner or owners themselves, or their agents, shall *bona fide* proceed to work; and continue to work regularly upon such claim or claims according to the usual course and practice of efficient mining, by so many miners as shall be required, until the claim is opened out sufficiently to admit of the full number of miners for which the claim is registered being employed thereon.

81. *Penalties, &c.*—The owner or owners of any registered extended claim neglecting to commence work on their claim, as required by the preceding section, or at any time during the working thereof neglecting to work, or cause to be worked, for a period of twenty-eight consecutive days, shall be liable on conviction thereof to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds; and for a second offence, on conviction thereof, to a penalty not less than Ten and not exceeding Twenty-five pounds. Such penalty may be enforced by any duly qualified miner or miners or mining registrar, and be recoverable in a summary way before any justice being also a warden, provided that no second information shall be laid until fourteen days after the date of the first conviction; and if, after the lapse of twenty-eight days from the in-

fiction of any second penalty, the owner or owners shall neglect to work or cause to be worked, such claim may be declared forfeited.

82. *Compensation in case of forfeiture.*—Registered extended quartz claims that have been adjudged forfeited, the miner or miners in whose favor such forfeiture has been granted shall, as a condition precedent to obtaining possession thereof, pay to the parties having such claim forfeited for all materials or machinery erected on or belonging to such claim; and in the event of the parties not agreeing as to the amount, the same to be settled by arbitration.

83. *Quartz-crushing machines.*—Any miner or miners may erect any quartz-crushing machine and water-dam on registering the site for same with the mining registrar, subject to the conditions set forth in sections 39 and 40 of this bye-law; and the area for the site of any quartz-crushing machine and water-dam shall not be more than six (6) acres, and if proved to be auriferous may be mined upon under the conditions provided for in section 98 of this bye-law.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

84. *How to take possession of any claim.*—Any miner or miners considering himself or themselves justified in taking possession of any claim, water-right, or any other easement or share therein respectively, may do so provided that no other person or persons is or are then in the possession or occupation thereof respectively, but in the event of any other miner or miners so in possession disputing the right of possession, the first-named party shall apply to the warden to enquire into the subject-matter in dispute; but in no case shall any person take forcible possession of any claim without forfeiting all right and title to such claim he may have acquired therein.

85. *Wall.*—A wall of three (3) feet in width shall be left between all claims marked out under this bye-law, by the miner or miners last marking out; and any party neglecting to leave such wall, the necessary ground may be deducted from the claim of the party so neglecting, and shall be assigned as a wall; and any such wall may be worked by either of the adjoining claimholders, provided that they secure the ground properly with sufficient timber.

86. *Presence of parties marking claims.*—It shall not be necessary for all shareholders in a partnership to be present at the marking out of partnership claims.

87. *Marking more ground.*—Where any miner or miners have marked more ground than he or they are entitled to under this bye-law, any other miner or miners may mark off such ground on any side of the claim, and the miner or miners having marked too much ground shall not be entitled to a wall on the side taken from him or them.

88. *Measurement of disputed ground.*—In all cases where the right to certain ground forms matter of dispute between miners, each claim shall be measured from the boundary pegs opposite to the side of the claim in dispute, and no party shall be protected from encroachment unless the boundary pegs shall have been kept visible during the working of the claim.

89. *Destroying or removing pegs, notices, &c.*—No person shall remove, destroy, or cover any pegs marking the boundary of any claim, or shall efface, remove, or destroy any notice posted on any claim, or shall wilfully cut a channel so as to cause the escape of water from any water-dam that is being used by any miner or miners; nor shall it be lawful for any shareholder or shareholders in any claim to remove the pegs, or to alter the boundaries of such claim, without the consent of a majority of the shareholders of such claim.

90. *Inspection of claims.*—Every claimholder shall, upon a written authority from a warden, allow any miner, or surveyor, to enter into and upon his claim, for the purpose of measuring the depth of any shaft, or the dip, direction, inclination, or length of any tunnel or drive; but such inspection shall only be made during ordinary working hours, and in the presence of one or more of the owners of the claim under examination.

91. *Plurality of claims.*—Any miner or miners may hold, by virtue of his or their miner's right, one or more than one claim or share in any such claim; provided each and every such share shall be fully represented by a miner holding a miner's right in accordance with this bye-law, save and except claims held under a consolidated miner's right.

92. *Form of claim.*—No claims taken up under this bye-law shall exceed in length three times their width, except as provided for in quartz claims.

93. *Tunnelling.*—Where hills can be worked more efficiently by tunnelling, registered claimholders may hold, in addition to their claim or claims, sufficient ground for such tunnel, with twelve (12) feet on each side from the centre of their tunnel, as a protection to the same, for any distance along its course not exceeding one thousand (1000) yards, and with a space of three hundred (300) feet square at the mouth of such tunnel, for the erection of machinery or other purposes.

94. *Owners of alluvial claims entitled to all reefs and other deposits.*—The owner or owners of any alluvial claim shall be entitled to hold all quartz reefs, veins, leaders, and other deposits of gold within the area of such claim.

95. *Prevention of accidents.*—No party shall be allowed to remove logs or any other substance from the top of any shaft to a lower level than four (4) feet above the surface, nor to cut any drain into any shaft whereby any claim may be damaged.

96. *Protection to parties applying for ground.*—Any miner or miners posting any authorised notice, or marking off any ground to be applied for under this bye-law, shall be deemed in possession of the same from the time of marking or posting such notice till the application is disposed of.

97. *Protection to claimholders while erecting machinery.*—The owner or owners of any claim may wholly or partially suspend mining operations while engaged in procuring timber for the sinking of any shaft thereon, or erecting machinery, or repairing the same, or from any natural or unforeseen cause by which the full number of miners cannot be employed, provided a notice is posted on the claim containing the date of and cause of such stoppage, and also registered with the mining registrar; provided also that no such stoppage shall exceed one month, unless in the case of erecting steam machinery, when a period of four (4) months will be allowed for that purpose.

98. *Protection to sites, water-dams, residence areas, &c.*—Parties in legal possession under this bye-law of any site for crushing machinery, water-dam, race, reservoir, tramway, or site for stacking quartz, earth, or other materials, or for any residence area, shall be protected in possession of such holding against any other parties, except in the event of such site or area being required for mining purposes; and in such cases the parties requiring such site shall compensate the holder for any damage, loss, or injury sustained by him or them, in consequence thereof; the amount of such compensation to be determined by arbitration.

99. *Quartz, earth, timber, and other substances may be stacked and registered.*—Any miner, or miners shall be at liberty to hold possession of any quartz, earth, timber, or other substance that may have been raised, stacked, or stored by him or them, or of which he or they may be the owner or owners, provided that the same shall not have been stored on any ground legally occupied by any other person, and may register such substance with the mining registrar in accordance with schedule F hereunto annexed, and shall keep a copy of such registration posted on the stack or store.

100. *Justifiable absence from claim.*—No miner or miners shall forfeit his or their share or shares in a claim, or be considered to have committed a breach of this bye-law by being absent through accident or sickness, or in consequence of attendance on any sick person, a court of justice or mining board, or while employed in any necessary work within the drainage-area in which his claim is situated, or if a member of a volunteer corps in which his claim is situated, or if a member of the commanding officer of such corps; and miners may be further absent from their claims without forfeiting their shares or committing a breach of this bye-law on the following days:—Good Friday until Easter Tuesday inclusive, 23rd December until 4th January inclusive; and from the day before until the day after the polling for members of parliament and the mining board, and all other public holidays.

101. *Objections.*—Where objections to any application are allowed under this bye-law, any person or persons objecting shall lodge such objection, in writing, with the mining registrar within seven (7) days from the date of such application; and if the party or parties objecting shall fail to prosecute his or their objections within a further period of seven (7) days, such objections shall be null and void.

102. *Abandonment of shares.*—Any miner desirous of abandoning his interest or share in any claim held under this bye-law may do so by serving a notice of his intention to do so on the other shareholders, and inserting a copy of the same in the newspaper published nearest to the locality of the claim for three (3) consecutive insertions, and also a copy to be posted at the mining registrar's office for seven (7) days; at the expiration of which time the said shareholder shall be released from all further liability connected with the said share; provided always that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to cancel or set aside, or to interfere with, any debt, agreement, or contract, which at the date of such abandonment may exist between such shareholder and his co-partners.

103. *Registration.*—Any shareholder or any person holding a claim or interest therein, or the owner of any dam, reservoir, residence area, or business site, or other easement, may register the same on application to the mining registrar, unless otherwise provided for in this bye-law, who shall give a certificate of registration in the form of schedule B hereunto annexed.

104. *Providing for the non-appointment or neglect of mining registrar.*—In any division for which there is no mining registrar appointed, or where any registrar shall refuse or neglect to register any application for registration required by this bye-law, such non-fulfilment shall not invalidate the title to any mining interest or privilege held or claimed by such applicant.

105. *Liability of holders of sleeping portions of shares.*—In the event of the working portion of a share being forfeited, and no person taking possession of and working the same, the liability to work it shall fall upon the holder for the time being of that portion of such share which shall have been last transferred by the original shareholder.

106. *Shares may be transferred.*—Any share or interest may be transferred on application to the mining registrar, who shall give to the miner to whom the said share or interest shall be transferred a certificate in the form of schedule E hereunto annexed.

107. *Persons leaving the district shall appoint an agent.*—Any person holding an interest in any claim shall, in the event of being absent from the district wherein such claim is situate for a longer period than fourteen (14) days, appoint an agent, whose name and address shall be registered with the mining registrar on payment of the fee prescribed by this bye-law.

108. *Arbitration.*—In all cases under this bye-law where arbitration shall be found necessary, the subject of such arbitration may be decided by two arbitrators—chosen, one by each of the parties interested; and in the event of such arbitrators failing to arrive at a decision, the arbitrators shall by lot appoint a third party, and the decision arrived at by the majority shall be final; such decision to be registered with the mining registrar by the party in whose favor the award of the arbitrators

shall be given; and such award may be enforced in any court of competent jurisdiction.

109. *Abandoned claims or shares.*—Any claim or share therein, taken up or held under the sections of this bye-law relating to prospecting, dry and wet sinking ordinary claims, sluicing and puddling, creek claims, and quartz prospecting and ordinary claims, where work has been entirely stopped for a period of six (6) consecutive days, shall be deemed abandoned, unless the holder or holders thereof can justify his or their absence under section 100, or the claim or share be protected by registration or otherwise.

110. *Forfeiture of shares.*—The owner or owners, shareholder, or any person holding an interest in any claim, neglecting to work, or cause to be worked, such share or interest, or neglecting or refusing to contribute his or their share, or proportion of capital required for the erection of machinery, or other works, or pay any call lawfully made by the party or company, for four consecutive weeks after any such call is due and payable, shall forfeit all title and interest in such share or interest; and such forfeiture may be enforced by any duly qualified miner or miners, before any warden, or warden and assessors; and in the event of such forfeiture being decreed, the miner or miners enforcing such forfeiture may take, and will have the preference to take, possession of any such forfeited share or interest; provided that all such contributions or calls shall be made by a majority of the company or by directors duly appointed by such company; provided also that a notice containing the amount of monies due, and the date when payable, shall have been served on the defaulting shareholder or shareholders, or his or their agent, or at his or their last-known place of residence; or if such defaulting shareholder or shareholders cannot be found, then it shall be considered good and sufficient service of such notice by having posted it, addressed to his or their last-known place of residence, and advertising it in the nearest local newspaper.

111. *Forfeited shares.*—Any person who shall have obtained an award of any forfeited share or interest in any claim shall, as a condition precedent to his obtaining possession thereof, become responsible for the liabilities of such share.

112. *Recovery of calls.*—Calls legally made by any company or party, for carrying on mining operations, may be recovered before any warden, or warden and assessors, in accordance with section 108 of *The Mining Statute 1865*.

113. *Claims or shares that belonged to individuals deceased or becoming lunatic.*—In case of the death or lunacy of any partner in a mining claim, the remaining partner or partners shall be entitled to hold possession of the share or shares of such deceased or lunatic miner or miners as against every other person or persons, but without prejudice to the rights of the personal representatives of such deceased or lunatic by agreement or by law against the remaining partners; provided that the expenses of working such share or shares shall be paid out of the proceeds of same.

114. *Mortgages or liens must be registered.*—All mortgages or liens on claims, shares, or interests, shall be registered with the mining registrar of the division wherein such claims, shares, or interests are situated.

115. *Mortgagee not liable for neglect or default of mortgagor.*—The registered mortgagee of any claim or share in a claim, whether quartz or alluvial, shall be protected from the consequences of any neglect or omission committed by the mortgagor or his agent in contravention of this bye-law, and shall not be deemed or held to have relinquished, forfeited, or lost his claim or lien upon the mining claim of the mortgagor through or by such his, the mortgagor's, neglect or default; provided always, that fourteen days after due notice to the registered mortgagee his interest be duly represented in conformity with this bye-law.

116. *Relating to Mortgages.—A. Register of mortgages.*—The mining registrar shall keep in his office a book which shall be called the "Register of Mortgages," and it shall be the duty of the mining registrar to enter therein the following particulars of all mortgages left at his office, in the order they are presented to him:—The number; name or names of the mortgagor or mortgagors, and of the mortgagee or mortgagees; the share or shares, or part of share or shares; the name and situation of the reef, workings, or company, and the respective number or numbers of the claim or claims; the amount of consideration money; the time of repayment; and the name of the attesting witness. And shall also endorse on the outside of the instrument of mortgage, that such mortgage has been duly registered in accordance with this bye-law, the day and hour of registration, and the name of the person registering, and such endorsement shall bear the signature of the mining registrar.

B. Index to register of mortgages and search book.—The registrar of mortgages shall keep an index of the register of mortgages, and shall enter therein the number of each mortgage, the name of the mortgagor and mortgagee; also a book containing the name and address of all persons searching the register of mortgages, to be called the "Search Book."

C. Inspection of register of mortgages.—The register of mortgages and index thereto shall be open to the public for inspection during the office hours of the mining registrar, on payment of the fee scheduled, and on the person searching entering in a book, to be kept for that purpose, his name and address; but no such person shall be allowed to take any extract therefrom in writing, nor shall any such person be permitted the use of ink during the time of his making such search.

D. Release of mortgages.—The mining registrar shall make an entry of the release of any mortgage, in respect of which he shall be required to make such entry, provided it appears to him such mortgage has been satisfied, and which must be evidenced by the handwriting of the mortgagee, his duly authorized agent, or assigns, duly attested; and such entry shall be placed in the column of the register of mortgages left for that purpose in the

presence of the persons releasing, by the mining registrar, who shall endorse on the instrument of mortgage, the day and hour of such release, and the name of the mortgagee, his agent or assigns so releasing, which instrument shall bear the signature of the mining registrar.

BYE-LAW No. 2.—FOR REGULATING THE DRAINAGE OF QUARTZ REEFS.—[17th September, 1866.]

At a meeting of the Mining Board of the Mining District of Maryborough, begun and holden at Maryborough, in the said district, on the seventeenth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, it is ordained by the said Board as follows, that is to say:—

Interpretation.—For the purposes of this bye-law the word "claim" shall mean and be interpreted to mean any claim held under the by-laws of the Mining Board or under any gold mining or mineral lease. An "area" shall mean the extent of ground along the course of any quartz reef or reefs, the boundaries of which shall be defined in a plan lodged with the clerk of the mining board. The word "drainage" shall mean the raising or removal of water from the natural water-level in any drainage area granted under this bye-law, by efficient mechanical appliances erected thereon. "Efficient drainage" shall signify the raising or otherwise removing of water from a drainage area, so as to enable quartz or other auriferous deposits to be removed from under the original water-level. The word "grant" shall mean a document signed by the chairman and clerk of the mining board, and concurred in by the members of the board, in which the grantee, his executors, administrators, agents, and assigns are entitled to certain fees or contributions from persons holding claims on an area. The word "quartz-reef" shall mean the entire strata contained within the limits of any drainage area. "Drainor" shall mean the grantee or grantees of any drainage area granted by the Maryborough

Mining Board. The words "person" or "persons," "drainor" or "drainee," shall include any corporate body, and the owners, or their agents, of claims or leases within a drainage area.

1. *Drainage areas to be granted.*—For the purpose of carrying out this bye-law areas shall be granted along the course of quartz reefs to be called drainage areas, as hereinafter provided for. Where efficient drainage machinery is proposed to be erected, the extent of the area shall be the extent which the machinery is supposed capable of draining; and in cases where the drainage machinery is erected previous to the application for a grant, the extent of the area shall be the extent which the draining machinery erected thereon does efficiently drain for practical working purposes at the date of application for a drainage area.

2. *Mode of application for area where drainage machinery is proposed to be erected.*—Any miner or party of miners proposing to erect draining machinery for the purpose of draining a quartz reef, shall mark the corners of the area applied for with rectangular trenches, and shall register his or their application with the mining registrar, and shall serve, or cause to be served, on at least one shareholder, or the manager, of each of the claims contained in the proposed drainage area (such shareholder or manager not being a party interested in, or owner of, the proposed draining machinery), a copy of the terms of his proposal in the form of schedules A and B, hereunto annexed, and any other proposal which the applicant may think necessary to make to parties holding claims within the area applied for; and shall also cause a survey to be made and a plan thereof, after obtaining the grant of the proposed area, on which shall be delineated the claims contained in the proposed area, with their extent, and the position of the claim on which the machinery is to be erected.

3. *Application for area where machinery is erected.*—The owner or owners of any efficient draining machinery erected previous to the passing of this bye-law, and employed in draining a quartz reef, on applying for a drainage area, shall mark off, register, survey, and serve copy of notice in the form of schedules A and D hereunto annexed on the shareholders within the area, as provided for in section 2, and at the expiration of fourteen days the mining registrar shall forward to the mining board a report, with the documents relating to the application, with objections, if any, and all information relating thereto; and on receipt of such documents the mining board shall proceed to grant, postpone, or refuse such application.

4. *Extension of drainage areas.*—In any case where efficient drainage for practical working purposes has been effected under the original water-level on any claim or claims on a quartz reef not included in a drainage area by draining appliances on a drainage area already granted, the drainor or drainees, or their agents, or both parties conjointly, may apply to have the said claim or claims included in such drainage area in the same form as the previous application.

5. *Duties of mining registrars.*—It shall be the duty of the mining registrar to receive and make a note of the day and hour of application for grants of areas when draining machinery is proposed to be erected, and he shall, at the expiration of fourteen days from the date of application, on the receipt from the applicant of an agreement signed by not less than ten (10) of the shareholders, being holders of miners' rights, forward to the mining board all the documents relating to the application, with his report and the address of the applicants, and on receipt of such documents the mining board shall proceed to grant, postpone, or refuse such application.

6. *Of water-level, &c.*—In cases where draining machinery is proposed to be erected, the water-level shall signify the depth at which the water stands in the reef at the date of application; and in cases of application for grants of drainage areas for draining machinery already erected, the water-level shall signify the lowest level sunk to in the draining-shaft or any other shaft in the proposed area.

7. *Sinking of shafts.*—The owner or owners of draining machinery obtaining a grant of a drainage area may compel the claimholders or leaseholders whose claims or leases are included in the said area to sink at least one shaft on each of their respective claims or leases until the water is reached; but the said claimholders or leaseholders may avoid sinking shafts by paying the amount of drainage rates chargeable on their respective claims or leases as hereinafter provided, unless where the sinking of a shaft is necessary for the efficient draining of any claim within the limits of the area.

8. *Claims may be registered.*—Parties having complied with the preceding section by sinking to the water-level, and having prospected at the said level for at least two months, may register their claims with the mining registrar until the water in the engine-shaft has been lowered twenty feet, when work must be resumed in such registered claim; and the drainage fees shall be reduced one-half in such registered claim unless the engine-shaft continues to be sunk.

9. *Drainage rates, when chargeable.*—Where drainage areas have been granted to parties proposing to erect efficient draining machinery thereon, rates shall be chargeable to the claimholders or leaseholders holding claims or leases in the drainage area from a date specified in the grant; and in cases where grants have been obtained for draining machinery erected previous to the date of application, drainage rates shall be chargeable from the lowest level sunk to and drained at the date of grant on the claim or lease on which the draining machinery is erected, unless where the drainees comply with section 7 of this bye-law, in which case drainage rates may be collected until sinking is commenced, as already provided for; but where grants have been obtained for draining machinery erected previous to the passing of this bye-law, drainage fees shall be chargeable from the date specified in the grant; but payment shall not be enforced in any case where a claim has been held under the bye-laws of this board for at least twelve months

previous to the passing of this drainage bye-law, without payable gold having been obtained; and when a shaft has been sunk to the water-level, until payable gold has been obtained; and when payable gold has been obtained all arrears of drainage rates shall be paid by monthly instalments, equalling in amount the sum in which the claim is assessed for drainage.

10. *Of application for area where more than one drainage plant has been erected.*—No drainage area shall be granted to any applicant where more than one drainage plant has been erected on the ground applied for, nor shall the first applicant for any drainage area be empowered to include more than one-half the ground intervening between any other draining plant, situated on the same line of reef, in the area applied for by him, unless with the consent, in writing, of the owners of the other machines; provided such machinery is in operation, and is kept in operation, and does efficiently drain the area or part of the area applied for; but the owners of said machines may obtain a grant conjointly, and the clerk of the mining board shall be empowered to apportion the amount payable to such party as agreed on by the board; but in no case shall the amount chargeable for drainage exceed the sum which would be required to be paid to one efficient machine.

11. *Breakage of machinery or relinquishment of grant.*—Any party desirous of relinquishing a grant of a drainage area shall give notice of such intention to each claim or lease contained in said area, at least three months before the stoppage of the drainage machinery, and any drainor neglecting, or refusing to give such notice may be proceeded against for all damage or injury that the parties have sustained in consequence of such neglect or refusal; and in case of accident to machinery causing breakage, &c., such time shall be allowed as shall be sufficient for the repair of such breakage or otherwise. And all parties obtaining grants of drainage areas shall keep such machinery at work every lawful day; and shall at all times continue to work such machinery so as to prevent the water rising in the drives or shafts of claims contained in the area. Parties refusing or neglecting to comply with any conditions herein stated shall be deemed to have committed a breach of this bye-law; and in cases where a frequent recurrence of such stoppages takes place, the drainees may apply to the mining board to have the grant of said area forfeited, and the mining board may call upon the drainor to show cause why his grant should not be forfeited; and shall, upon a given day, to be fixed by the said board—due notice of which shall be given to the drainor—proceed to forfeit, or otherwise dispose of the case as the said board may see fit.

12. *Of natural obstruction to drainage.*—In cases where the drainor is unable to effect the efficient drainage of any reef, through natural obstructions preventing the flow of water to the engine-shaft, the drainor, or any other person on his behalf, shall have access to any shaft, winze, or drive, within the limits of the area, for the purpose of discovering the locality of such obstruction, and such obstruction shall be removed at the joint expense of the drainees in possession of the claims so obstructed, including the claim in which such obstruction exists.

13. *Accounts may be examined.*—Parties obtaining a drainage area shall keep books of expenditure of all moneys disbursed in drainage, and the drainees of the said area may appoint an agent who shall have access to the said books and accounts; and when any dispute occurs relative to drainage, such dispute shall be settled by arbitration, as provided for in section 103 of the bye-law No. 1, regulating mining operations.

14. *Fees how to be collected.*—All sums due on account of drainage shall be payable on the first day of every month to the officer or officers appointed to receive the same, and who shall pay such sums to the clerk of the mining board, and the board shall, after deducting the expenses of collection, pay the same to the drainor in the manner prescribed by the 76th section of *The Mining Statute*; and any person refusing or neglecting to pay such fees for a period of one calendar month, may be proceeded against under the provisions of section 177 of *The Mining Statute* 1865.

15. *Principle on which drainage shall be charged.*—In cases where it is proposed to erect machinery, provided no agreement to the contrary has been entered into by the drainor and drainees, the principle upon which drainage rates shall be charged to each claim shall be the estimated or ascertained monthly expenditure in maintaining such machinery in operation, together with interest not exceeding fifteen per centum per annum on the amount of capital expended on the purchase and erection of machinery and sinking of draining-shaft; and in cases where draining machinery has been erected previous to the application for a grant of a drainage area, the principle upon which such rates shall be charged shall be the ascertained monthly expenditure in maintaining the said machinery in operation, and sinking the draining-shaft under the water-level after the date of grant of the said drainage area, together with interest at the rate of fifteen per centum per annum on the value of such machinery at the date of application for grant; such valuation to be ascertained by arbitration in accordance with section 103 of the mining bye-law No. 1, and the amount to be paid by each claim or lease contained in the drainage area shall be a proportion of the gross expenditure, as hereinbefore expressed, in proportion to the superficial area of such claim or lease, including the claim or lease of the drainor, comprised within such area.

16. *Private agreements to be binding.*—Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in this bye-law, any agreement entered into for the purpose of the drainage of any quartz reef within this district, shall be, and the same is hereby declared to be binding upon the drainee and drainor; provided such agreement has been registered with the mining registrar of the division in which such reef is situated, and a copy thereof lodged with him, and all agreements so entered into shall be binding on the contracting parties, their executors, administrators, agents, and assigns; and the first agreement so registered shall

have precedence of all others, and shall continue in force until rescinded by the contracting parties. All such agreements may be inspected by parties interested on payment of the fee prescribed by this bye-law to the mining registrar.

BYE-LAW No. 3.—FOR REGULATING THE DISPOSAL OF SLUDGE—[17th September, 1866.]

At a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Maryborough, begun and holden at Maryborough in the said district on the seventeenth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

Interpretation clause.—For the purposes of this bye-law the word "owner" shall be held to include the members of a mining partnership; the word "legal manager" shall be held to include all incorporated mining companies under the Act 27 Victoria, No. 228; the word "claimholder" shall be construed to mean the owner of any claim or claims held under miner's right or miners' rights, as well as any land held under gold mining lease.

1. Power to appropriate funds under this bye-law.—The mining board of the Maryborough mining district may in its discretion appropriate the funds to be collected as hereinafter provided for, for the purpose of forming, repairing, cleansing, and keeping clear all main and intermediate sludge channels, and for defraying all costs incurred in raising the said funds; and such funds shall be raised and levied in manner hereinafter mentioned.

2. Contributions may be levied.—The mining board of the district may, on a petition being presented to it, signed by ten or more holders of miners' rights or business licenses, that it is essential to construct a channel to convey sludge and water from any gold workings, or for the protection from injury of any public road or thoroughfare, proceed to levy such contribution on the owners of such gold workings in the area hereafter described as shall be sufficient for the construction, repairing, clearing, and keeping clear of a sufficient and proper sludge-channel to convey all such sludge and water to such a distance and in such a manner that it will not injure, or in any way interfere with, any public road or thoroughfare, or any gold workings which may be situated on the line of such sludge-channel; provided that no more than £10 per acre yearly for each and every acre of land held for mining purposes shall be levied on any claimholder for constructing such sludge-channel as aforesaid.

3. Assessment on horse puddling-machines, &c.—For the purposes aforesaid the owner or occupier of every horse puddling-machine situated on ground held by miner's right or by lease, and for every site for a horse puddling-machine situated as aforesaid, shall pay, in advance, to the officer appointed by the said mining board, a quarterly assessment of one pound ten shillings (£1 10s.), and such other sum as may be ordered by the said board for the construction of any sludge-channel.

4. Assessment on steam puddling-machine.—For the purposes aforesaid, the owner or owners of every claim and puddling-machine worked by steam-power shall pay, in advance, a quarterly assessment of ten (10s.) shillings per nominal horse-power of the engine or engines used by him or them for such mining or puddling purposes.

5. Assessment on steam crushing-machines.—For the purposes aforesaid, the owner or occupier of every machine situated on ground held by miner's right or by lease, worked by steam-power, and used for the purpose of crushing cement, alluvial soil, gravel, or quartz, shall pay, as aforesaid, a quarterly assessment of three (3s.) shillings per stamper head used by him for such purpose.

6. When assessments payable.—The foregoing assessments shall be due and payable quarterly, in advance, by the owners or occupiers of machinery—on the 28th day of March, the 28th day of June, the 28th day of September, and the 28th day of December in each year. And when it is ordered by the said board that any sludge channel shall be constructed, all assessments, as aforesaid, as well as assessments for the construction of any sludge-channels, shall be paid on or before a day to be fixed by such board.

7. Appointment of officer.—It shall be the duty of the officer appointed by the board for the inspection of sludge and water channels, to demand, receive, and collect all fees and charges imposed by this bye-law, and upon receipt thereof to pay the same to the clerk of the said mining board, and such monies so paid are to be forthwith lodged in such bank as may be fixed by such board.

8. *Conditions*.—Any persons petitioning to have any claim or claims placed under the operation of this bye-law, shall post and cause to be kept posted, a notice in the form of schedule A, hereunto annexed, for seven (7) days, on some conspicuous part of the ground proposed to be included in a sludge area, also a copy at the mining registrar's office for the same period, previous to forwarding the petition to the clerk of the mining board; and objections to any such petition shall be made, in writing, to the clerk of the said mining board within the above-named seven (7) days, stating the nature of the objection and the name of the person or of each of the persons objecting. On receipt of objections to any petition the clerk of the board shall notify to the petitioners that such objections have been made, together with the date of hearing, as fixed by the mining board; and the said clerk shall also notify to the objectors the day and date on which their objections will be heard.

IRON CASTINGS.
