LEASES OF AGRICULTURAL ALLOTMENTS FORFEITED.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, Monday, the fifth
day of February, 1866.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst
other things enacted, by sec. 15, that no person shall
within any period of twelve months become the lessee or sub-
lessee or assignee, either in his own name or in the name or
names of any other person or persons, of more than 640 acres of
the lands proclaimed under that Act as therein mentioned; and
no person shall become the lessee or sub-lessee or assignee of any
allotment who is an infant, or who is a married woman not
having obtained a decree of judicial separation binding in
Victoria, or who is not domiciled in Victoria, or who is in re-
spect of the allotment for a lease of which he applies or in re-
spect of any part thereof an agent or a servant of or a trustee
for any other person, or who at the time of his application has
entered into any agreement to permit any other person to
acquire by purchase or otherwise the allotment in respect of
which such application is made or any part thereof or the appli-
cant's interest therein, and all land applied for under that Act
shall be so applied for *bona fide* for the use and benefit of the
applicant in his own proper person and not as the agent or
servant or trustee of or for any other person; and allotments
selected or purchased under the provisions thereof before con-
tained shall be reckoned as part of the 640 acres thereinbefore
mentioned: And it is by the said Act provided that if any per-
son shall in violation of any of the provisions of that section
become the lessee or assignee or sub-lessee of an allotment the
Governor in Council may declare the lease of such allotment to

be forfeited, and upon publication in the *Government Gazette* of notice of such declaration the term created by the said lease shall cease and determine, and the right, title, and interest of the lessee and of every assignee and sub-lessee in and to such lease, and all moneys paid for rent in respect of such allotment, shall be absolutely forfeited, and the allotment may be sold in fee simple or leased again in manner in the said Act provided:

And whereas the leases mentioned in the 1st column of the schedule hereto of the allotments therein comprised and thereby demised, being land proclaimed under the provisions of the said Act, were granted at the time in manner and to the lessees therein mentioned:

And whereas the persons whose names are mentioned in the 2nd column of the schedule hereto became the assignees of the said allotments comprised in and demised by the hereinbefore mentioned leases, in violation of the provisions to the contrary of the said hereinbefore recited section in manner and for the reasons mentioned in the 3rd column of the schedule hereto: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise and execution of the power or authority in that behalf given by the said hereinbefore mentioned Act, doth hereby declare that the said leases mentioned in the said 1st column of the schedule hereto of the allotments therein comprised and thereby demised are forfeited.

The mortality of Melbourne and suburbs during December was not so high as it was in the same month of 1860 by 47; but it was higher than in the same month of any subsequent year. It exceeded the average of the month in six years by 93.

The mean temperature in the shade was lower during the month than it was in the corresponding month of any year of the previous five, and was upwards of 2 degrees below the average of December extending over a period of 6 years.

Males contributed 57 per cent., females 43 per cent. to the mortality. Children under five contributed 65½ per cent., against 63 per cent. in December, 1864, 47 per cent. in December, 1863, 66 per cent. in December, 1862, 50 per cent. in December, 1861, and 73 per cent. in December, 1860.

The greatest number of deaths occurring on any one day was 27 on the 28th; the next highest number was 25 on the 22nd, then 21 on the 20th. The least numbers were 9 on the 18th, and 10 on the 1st and 8th.

Seven persons over 75 years of age died during the month, of whom no less than six were over 80. The following are the particulars of the deaths of these old people:—A male, aged 79, died of paralysis; a male, aged 80, of heart disease; a male, aged 80, of old age; a female, aged 80, of paralysis; a male, aged 84, of old age; a male, aged 86, of apoplexy; and a male, aged 87, of dysentery.

Twenty-five violent deaths occurred during the month, which is a number which has not been equalled in any month since January, 1863. Of these nine were of drowning, viz., three boys, aged respectively 9, 10, and 11, in the Yarra; three youths, aged respectively 13, 17, and 17, in the Merri Creek; a clerk aged 25, a steward aged 26, and a sailor aged 41, in Hobson's Bay. Three were of burns or scalds, viz., two male children under 2, and a laborer aged 19. Nine were of fractures or contusions, viz., a female infant, aged 26 weeks, of accidental fracture of the thigh-bone; a male, aged 10 years, of an injury by machinery; a house painter, aged 19 years, of a fall from a ladder; a cabman, aged 32, of a kick from a horse; a carpenter, aged 55, of a fall from a house; a miner, aged 35, of a rupture caused by violence, the nature of which was not returned; a carter, aged 35, of the effects of being accidentally crushed; a quarryman, aged 42, of a fractured skull caused by a fall in a quarry; and a publican, aged 65, of injuries caused by being struck by a railway engine. An infant aged 2 months was accidentally suffocated by bed-clothes; a newly-born

infant was murdered by suffocation; a female aged 26 committed suicide by taking poison; a laborer aged 29 committed suicide by cutting his throat.

Seventy-nine deaths, or 16½ per cent. of the whole mortality, occurred in public institutions, as follows—35 in the Melbourne Hospital, 15 in the Benevolent Asylum, 14 in the Yarra Bend Asylum, 2 in the Royal Park Asylum, 10 in the Industrial Schools, 2 in the Immigrants' Home, and 1 in the Pentridge Stockade.

Of 313 children who died under the age of five years, 166, or 53 per cent., were males, and 147, or 47 per cent., were females; 209 were under one year of age, 69 were between one and two years, 14 were between two and three, 10 were between three and four, and 11 were between four and five.

Of the 165 deaths of persons at a more advanced age than five years, 108, or 65 per cent., were of males, and 57, or about 35 per cent., were of females. Of those dying, 9 were between five and ten, 8 were between ten and fifteen, 13 were between fifteen and twenty, 8 were between twenty and twenty-five, 15 were between twenty-five and thirty, 15 were between thirty and thirty-five, 20 were between thirty-five and forty, 9 were between forty and forty-five, 16 were between forty-five and fifty, 18 were between fifty and fifty-five, 10 were between fifty-five and sixty, 10 were between sixty and sixty-five, 5 were between sixty-five and seventy, 3 were between seventy and seventy-five, 1 was between seventy-five and eighty, 6 were eighty and upwards.

Deaths from zymotic diseases increased from 133 in November to 202. Deaths from the same class in December, 1864, numbered 108, and in December, 1863, only 75. The diseases of this class which were most fatal as compared with those in November were scarlatina and diphtheria, which caused 22 deaths against 23 in that month; whooping-cough, which caused 43 deaths against 43; typhus and infantile fever, which caused 14 deaths against 9; dysentery and diarrhoea, which caused 99 deaths against 34; and cholera, which caused 7 deaths against 1. Deaths from phthisis numbered 32 against 25 in November.

WORKS ON MAIN ROADS.

THE Governor in Council, in exercise of the power conferred by *The Local Government Act 1863*, has, by Orders severally made on the 29th day of January, 1866, directed that the under-mentioned Shire Councils shall, within the times by the said respective Orders appointed, execute the works on Main Roads hereinafter named and described, as provided by the 220th section of the said Act, according to plans deposited with the Board of Land Works, that is to say:—

The Council of the Shire of Ararat shall, within twelve months from the 29th of January aforesaid, drain, form, and metal about one mile and sixteen chains of the Main Ballarat to Ararat road.

The Council of the Shire of Ballan shall, within twelve months from the 29th of January aforesaid, drain, form, and metal about two miles and twenty-six chains of the Main Melbourne to Ballarat road.

The Council of the Shire of Mount Rouse shall, within twelve months from the 29th of January aforesaid, drain, form, and metal about two miles and forty-two chains of the Main Dunkeld to Wickliffe road.

The Councils of the respective Shires of Ripon and Lexton shall, jointly or severally, within twelve months from the 29th of January aforesaid, drain, form, and metal about six miles two chains and ten links of the Main Ballarat to Ararat road.

The successful tenderer will be required to enter into a bond, with two approved sureties, for one-third the estimated amount of the contract, within ten days after the acceptance is notified.

Tenderers failing to take up their accepted tenders, or failing to carry out their contracts satisfactorily, will be ineligible to again hold contracts for Government supplies.

All tenders must be enclosed in a separate envelope, marked "Tender for ——" (as the case may be), and deposited in the box at the Government Stores, King street; or if sent by post they must be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Stores and Transport Office, Melbourne.

The decision of the Government will be made known by *Gazette* notice and by letter to accepted tenderers.

CONDITIONS.

1. The hay to be eaten, good, sound, and sweet; the straw to be wheaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats (colonial grown) and bran to be sound and sweet and of the best description.

2. The supplies are for police and telegraph horses, and are to be delivered on the order of the officer in charge of the district or station. The quantities stated in the schedule being only approximative, it must be understood that the Government may draw either more or less than those mentioned; and should new telegraph stations be formed or additional horses be required to be stationed in any of the districts tendered for, the supplies required may be drawn from the contractor. The excess over the estimate will not, however, exceed during the whole year 50 per cent. of the estimated quarterly consumption.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the military commissariat.

4. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by the particulars of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight, to be endorsed on the back of the order, which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the District, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours of the time specified in the order for delivery, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of the department ordering the supply, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue either to the public service or the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct not exceeding £20, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11.
