TOWN OF WOORNDOO.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may from time to time, before or after the proclamation of any agricultural area, proclaim as a road or as a town or village any portion or portions of such area not selected, purchased, or leased, and not exceeding, if proclaimed as a town or village, six hundred and forty acres of the lands comprised in such area; and the lands in such town or village shall be sold by auction in the manner provided for the sale by public auction of lands not reserved for proclamation in such areas: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the land hereinafter described as a town, that is to say:—

TOWN OF WOORNDOO.—Six hundred and three acres, more or less, county of Hampden, parish of Woorndoo, comprising allotments 119, 120, 121, 122, and 123: Commencing at the north-east angle of allotment 119, being a point on the right bank of the Salt Creek; bounded thence by a road bearing west thirty-six chains fifty-seven links, to the eastern side of the road from Warrnambool to Ararat; thence by a line bearing west, crossing that road to the western side thereof; thence by a road bearing west forty-five chains ninety links to the north-east angle of allotment 124; thence by that allotment bearing south seventy-four chains seven links to the northern side of the road from Chatsworth to Geelong; thence by that road bearing N. 72° 30' E. twenty-nine chains fifty-two links, and S. 72° 30' E. forty-three chains seventy-one links to the western side of the road from Warrnambool to Ararat aforesaid; thence by a line bearing east five chains fifty links, more or less, to the aforesaid creek; and thence by that creek bearing northerly to the point of commencement; as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(67.O.11491.)

COMMON INCREASED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Amending Land Act 1865*, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land a farmers' common; when one-eighth part of any agricultural area has been selected under *The Land Act 1862*, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim any unselected and unleased portion of such agricultural area, not exceeding twice the quantity so selected and leased, to be a temporary common for the use of such selectors and lessees: and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act 1862* and the now reciting Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the common hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

KIORA AGRICULTURAL AREA TEMPORARY COMMON.—The Kiora temporary Common, described in three several Proclamations bearing date respectively the 22nd day of January, 1866, the 24th day of December, 1866, and the 27th day of May, 1867, is hereby increased by adding thereto 1272 acres of land, being allotments 34a and b, and 62a and b, in the parish of Kiora.—(67.O.10588.)

REGISTRAR-GENERAL'S REPORT ON THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF SEPTEMBER, AND FOR THE QUARTER ENDING 30TH SEPTEMBER, 1867.

ACTUAL Daily Mortality of persons of both sexes under and over five years of age in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, embracing a radius of ten miles, and including the Statistical Sub-districts of Melbourne Proper, East Melbourne, North Melbourne and Carlton, Fitz Roy Municipality, East Collingwood, Richmond, Jika-jika parish (exclusive of North Melbourne, Collingwood, and Richmond), South Yarra and Prahran, Emerald Hill and Sandridge, St. Kilda and Brighton, Doutta Galla and Keilor, Boroondara and Heidelberg, Cut-paw-paw parish, and the shipping in Hobson's Bay; also, the Temperature in the shade at the Melbourne Observatory, calculated from a reduced mean corresponding with that of twenty-four hourly observations taken on each day during the month of September, 1867:—

The mortality in September was slightly above the average. The daily rate, however, was lower than it was in August. The mean temperature was slightly below the average.

Males contributed 54 per cent. and females 46 per cent. to the mortality of the month. Forty per cent. of those dying had not attained their fifth year, against 41 per cent. in September, 1866; 51 per cent. in September, 1865; 38 per cent. in September, 1864; 33 per cent. in September, 1863; 43 per cent. in September, 1862; 40 per cent. in September, 1861; and 63 per cent. in September, 1860.

The day of highest mortality was the 6th, for which 17 deaths were recorded. Only 1 death was reported for the 21st. The month was more than usually fatal to old people, no less than eight persons having died at the age of 75 and upwards. The following are the particulars:—A female aged 75 died of old age, a male aged 76 of paralysis, a female aged 79 of diarrhoea, a male aged 80 of apoplexy, two females and one male aged 83 of old age, and a male aged 86 of old age.

Nine violent deaths took place in the month, of which 6 have been referred to accident, 1 to murder or manslaughter, and 2 to suicide. The accidental deaths occurred as follow:—A boy, aged 13, died of the effects of being ridden over; a male, aged 23, of a fall from a horse; a female, aged 30, of tetanus, the result of an injury to the foot; a female child, aged 3, of a scald; a female child, aged 6, of a burn; and a boy, aged 7, of drowning whilst sailing a toy boat from the beach. The supposed murder was that of a new-born infant. The suicidal deaths were those of a female, aged 17, who poisoned herself, and of an engineer, aged 32, who hanged himself.

Fifty-three deaths, or about 22½ per cent. of the whole number recorded, occurred in public institutions, viz.:—33 in the Melbourne Hospital, 5 in the Benevolent Asylum, 3 in the Immigrant's Home, 1 in the Immigration Hospital, 4 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 3 in the Carlton Lunatic Asylum, 3 in the Industrial Schools, and 1 in the Melbourne Gaol.

* This calculation is made upon the population at the last census, instead of the present population, as there are no means of estimating the changes which have taken place in the different sub-districts since the census was taken. It is believed that the present population of the whole district of Melbourne and suburbs amounts to about 165,000. If this be correct, the mortality of the month under review would indicate a proportion of 1.42 deaths to every 1000 persons living.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 93, of which 44, or about 47 per cent., were of males, and 49, or nearly 53 per cent., were of females. Of those dying, 47 were under one year of age, 21 were between one and two years, 9 were between two and three, 11 were between three and four, and 5 were between four and five.

The relative proportions of the different classes of diseases have changed but little during the last three months. All the articles required by this notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages.

The flour and bread must be the produce of prime wheat, from which 20 per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

IRON CASTINGS.

6. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supply, as to the quality of the coal, the same is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the Engineer-in-Chief, and the decision of the board is to be final.

7. If the delay necessary for obtaining the decision of a board of survey should be detrimental to the public service, the Engineer-in-Chief or Locomotive Superintendent will have the power to reject coal which is of an inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected coal and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere and the extra expense charged to him.

8. Irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor to such mulct not exceeding Twenty-five pounds for each case, as the Government may direct; and it will also be in the power of the Government to terminate the contract forthwith.

9. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

10. It will be competent for the contractor, or for the Secretary for Railways on behalf of the Government, to terminate the contract, by giving, in writing, a notice of three calendar months, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the 1st day of a month.

11. The orders will be issued by the Secretary, on the requisition of the Locomotive Superintendent; and, should an order for Australian Agricultural or Wallsend coal not be complied with and satisfied within twenty-one days, the Railway Storekeeper shall have power to obtain the supply elsewhere, and charge the extra cost of the same to the contractor.

12. The estimated consumption of coal for smiths' use during the year will be about 300 tons; but the Government do not bind themselves to order that quantity, but only what may be required from time to time.
