THE SUBDIVISIONS OF THE SHIRE OF BAIRNSDALE.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twenty-eighth day of September, 1868.

WHEREAS by The Local Government Act 1863 it is amongst other things enacted that at any time after the first annual election or general election, as the case may be, or first appointment of members of the district board for any original or proclaimed district (hereinafter sometimes called "single district.") the Governor in Council, if it seem fit, may, and if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by twenty persons liable to be rated under the said Act in respect of rateable property in the said district, shall, within three months after the receipt of the same, divide the district into two, or, if the Governor in Council shall see fit, into three separate electoral subdivisions (hereinafter called subdivisions), by such names as shall by such Order in Council be assigned to the same, and in and by such Order in Council the boundaries of the subdivisions shall be set forth; provided that no such division shall be made within three months before any day appointed for holding any election of members of the district board in or for such district; and it is also enacted that every shire shall after the proclamation thereof as such be and be deemed to be and have been such and the same district as such shire was at the time of such proclamation, and save as aforesaid and save where therein otherwise expressly provided, all the provisions of the said Act relating to districts shall continue and be of full force and effect with regard to such shire and be read accordingly: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the sixth day of July, 1868, the Shire of Bairnsdale was constituted: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order divide the Shire of Bairnsdale into three separate electoral subdivisions, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, by the names hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, and doth hereby set forth the boundaries of the said several subdivisions in manner following, that is to say:—

WEST RIDING.—Starting at Lake Victoria up Tom's Creek and by the northern boundaries of Meerlieu, Yeerung, and Stratford parishes, and western and part of the northern boundary of Sandy Creek run, and by the boundaries of Glen-

sladale and Tabberabera (including those runs), and by Mitchell River (excluding the town of Bairnsdale, viz.) to a point in line with the western boundary of portion 14 in the township of Bairnsdale; thence by that line and the south-eastern boundary of that portion and the Main street, and by that river and the shores of lakes King and Victoria to the starting point.

CENTRAL RIDING.—Starting on Mitchell River by Main street, Bairnsdale, to the western boundary of portion 14 of that town; thence by that boundary and in the same direction to Mitchell River; thence by that river and the Dargo River to a point true west of the summit of Mount Birregun; thence to that mount; thence by the Main Dividing Range and western boundary of Angora Run to Mount Baldhead; thence by the south-western boundary of Angora Run and the most direct range from the southern junction of Angora and Mount Baldhead runs to the source of Nicholson River; and by the Nicholson River, the shore of Lake King, and by Mitchell River to the starting point.

EAST RIDING.—Starting on Mount Baldhead by the western boundary of Angora Run and Main Dividing Range to Tongee Gap; thence direct to the summit of Mount Bulla-bulla as far as the Snowy River; thence by that river, the Southern Ocean, the northern shore of Lake King, and by Nicholson River to its source; thence by the most direct range to the southern junction of the boundaries of Mount Baldhead and Angora runs; thence by the south-western boundary of Angora Run to the starting point.

And the Honorable Charles Edwin Jones, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

LADDERS.

The Ladders are to be of red or yellow Baltic fir, free from large or loose knots, and perfectly straight in grain, sound, and free from heart and sap. The rounds are to be cleft, of young and fresh hickory, English ash or English oak, straight in grain, and turned to 1½ inch diameter in centre, and for ¾ inch holes at ends. The sides of the ladders are to be bored to receive the rounds, and the holes are to be tapered outwards so as to admit of the round being opened and wedged. All the rounds are to well fill the holes, and to be wedged with glue into the sides, previously having received a coat of wet white lead. Every eighth round is to be a tie bolt ½ inch diameter, with collar at each end 1½ inch diameter, is to be inserted below the round, with nut and washer at each end, the rounds to be 9 inches apart, centre to centre. The ladders are to be finished with three coats of good lead and oil paint of such color as may be ordered.

The 36 feet Ladders are to spread at bottom 18 inches clear between the sides, which are to be 4½ inch x 2½ inch; and at top 9½ inches clear, and at sides 2½ inches x 1½ inches.

The 30 feet Ladders 18 inches clear at bottom, with sides 4½ inches x 2½ inches; and at top 10½ inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1½ inches.

The 24 feet Ladders 16 inches clear at bottom, and sides 4½ inches x 2 inches; at top 10 inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1½ inches.

The 20 feet Ladders 15 inches clear at bottom, and sides 3½ inches x 2 inches; at top 10 inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1½ inches.

The 16 feet Ladders 14 inches clear at bottom, and sides 3½ x 1½ inches; and at top 10 inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1½ inches.

The 12 feet Ladders 13 inches clear at bottom, and sides 3½ x 1½ inches; and at top 10 inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1½ inches.

The 10-foot Ladders 13 inches clear at bottom, and sides 3½ inches x 1½ inches; and at top 10 inches clear, and sides 2½ x 1½ inches.

All the Ladders over 14 feet long are to be parallel in the sides to one-third of the height from the bottom; that is, the sides are to be of the same section one-third up as at bottom.

2. Bread. A sample of the best ordinarily retailed to the public will be considered as a test loaf for first quality. Second quality to be made of flour known in the trade as "best seconds," and the third quality (that issued for prisoners of the Crown) to be made of flour, the produce of prime wheat, from which twelve per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Fresh meat is to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and, when the quantity admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately, also buttocks only when required by the Lunatic Asylum. When shins of beef form a portion of the supply, a fair proportion of the bone, not less than ten inches, must have been cut off. The sticking pieces must be removed from the fore quarters of beef.

4. The supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto on the written order of the officer in charge. All other supplies will be ordered by the head of department, either for delivery at the Stores and Transport Office, or at the office of the department concerned, as may be stated in the order.

5. The order issued by the head of department must accompany the goods, and the account is to be rendered simultaneously with delivery of the supplies. In other cases the account is to be rendered monthly. The rates quoted in the orders cannot be exceeded.

8. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor; failing which, it will be procured by the person requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 6.

9. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the person to whom the rations are due, or to the contractor in waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead; failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report of the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

12. It will be competent for the Inspector of Stores, on behalf of the Government, or the contractor, on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving in writing, a notice of three full calendar months, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of the month, and within the period for which the contract is made. It will also be competent for the Inspector of Stores to terminate the contract, without notice, on infringement of condition No. 11, or should there be reason to know that the contractor takes advantage of his contract to communicate improperly with a prisoner.

13. In the event of any alteration in the Tariff affecting any of the items included in these contracts, the Government or the contractor, as may be the case, will make a proportionate allowance, by way of deduction from or increase of the price of the item so affected.

14. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service, or by any contracts made by the Imperial Commissariat, or on account of other Governments; or by the consumption of the produce or surplus stock of any Government establishment.


