## LICENSE FEE FOR CUTTING OR REMOVING TIMBER, REDUCED IN RESPECT OF CERTAIN CROWN LANDS.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has, in pursuance of the 54th section of *The Land Act 1862*, made the subjoined Regulations reducing the Fee chargeable for cutting and removing timber on and from certain Crown Lands hereinafter mentioned, viz. :—

The license fee for cutting and removing timber from Crown lands whereon the timber is not of special value owing to proximity to railways, shipping places, or centres of population, or owing to the quality of the timber or its local scarcity, is reduced from £5 per annum to £2 per annum.

Such reduction shall not apply to the procuring of timber on such Crown lands as are situated within a distance of twenty-five miles from Melbourne, or within the boundaries of any shire, road district, or borough, or within the boundaries of any State forest or other reserve, or within a distance of fifteen miles from the sea-coast, or within a distance of five miles on both sides of the crest of that portion of the Main Dividing Range extending from Mount Cole to Mount Disappointment.

The holder of a license at such reduced rate of fee is empowered to cut ordinary wood on Crown lands, and to transport it from the site where cut to the nearest main road; it being however understood that if one person exclusively employs his time in cutting wood on such Crown lands, and another in exclusively transporting the wood so cut to the nearest main road, both these persons must hold licenses to procure wood on Crown lands.

## MINING ON A PORTION OF THE CAMP RESERVE AT RUSHWORTH AUTHORIZED.

THE Governor in Council has authorized the holders of miners' rights to occupy for mining purposes that portion of the Police Reserve at Rushworth comprised within the following boundaries, namely:—Commencing at the south-western angle of the said reserve, and bounded on the west by a line bearing north twenty-four degrees forty minutes west two chains eighty-one links; on the north by a line bearing north sixty-six degrees fifty-two minutes east two chains twelve links; on the east by a line bearing south forty-seven degrees fifty-three minutes east three chains; and on the south by a line bearing south sixty-five degrees twenty minutes west three

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chains thirty links, more or less, to the point of commencement, subject to the conditions and restrictions hereinafter prescribed, that is to say:—

1. The mining operations shall be conducted in such a manner as not to interfere with the purpose for which the reserve was made.
2. The surface of the ground shall not be occupied for the purpose of residence, and no tents or huts shall be erected thereon.
3. The miners shall not interfere with or injure the trees in the reserve.
4. The workings shall be open at all reasonable hours to the inspection of any mining surveyor or other authorized officer.
5. The ground occupied by the miners shall be securely fenced, and means of egress and regress provided, so as not to interfere with the reserve in the occupation of the police.
6. On ceasing to mine, the miners shall fill up all shafts and excavations made by them, remove all debris, clay, and gravel, as well as all fences and buildings erected by them, and leave the surface of the ground in as good a condition as before the commencement of mining operations.
7. All instructions given by the mining surveyor or other authorized officer, relative to the mode of timbering or otherwise protecting the ground, shall be complied with by the miners.
8. All miners who shall take up claims on this portion of the said reserve shall, prior to commencing mining operations, deposit in the hands of the Warden's Clerk of the district the sum of Thirty pounds, as a guarantee that they will observe and fulfil these conditions, and such sum shall be held by the Warden's Clerk until the miners who have made such deposit shall relinquish the claim held by them. If the conditions herein contained be fulfilled, then and in such case the whole sum shall be returned to the depositors, but if any of the conditions be not fulfilled the whole of the said sum shall be forfeited, and the cost of repairing any damage done to the reserve shall be defrayed out of the moneys so forfeited.
9. In case any person so mining shall in any way violate the above conditions, it shall not be lawful for him any longer to mine upon any claim upon or within such lands.

## COMMON-TOLL ROADS.

THE Governor in Council, in exercise of the power conferred by *The Local Government Act 1863*, has, by Orders in Council made on the 11th day of November, 1868, appointed the roads hereinafter mentioned to be Common-toll Roads upon applications made in accordance with the 254 section of the said Act, viz. :—

The road known as the Cherry-tree Flat road to be a Common-toll road of the Shire of Buninyong, the Borough of Sebastopol, and the Shire of Grenville.

The road known as the Ballyshanassy road, passing through the Boroondara, the Nunawading, and the Oakleigh and Mulgrave Road Districts, to be a Common-toll road of the three above-named road districts: such proclamation to be in lieu of and substitution for that of 26th August, 1867, which has been revoked.

## WORKS ON MAIN ROADS.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of the power conferred by *The Local Government Act 1863*, has, by Orders severally made on the 11th day of November, 1868, directed that the undermentioned Shire Councils and District Road Board shall, within the times by the said respective Orders appointed, execute the works on Main Roads hereinafter named and described, as provided by the 220th section of the said Act, according to plans deposited with the Board of Land and Works, that is to say:—

The Council of the Shire of Tullaroop shall, within twelve months from the 11th of November aforesaid, drain, form, and metal one mile three chains and thirty-five links of the Maldon to Dunolly Main road.

The Nunawading District Road Board shall, within twelve months from the 11th of November aforesaid, drain, form, and metal sixty-eight chains and fifty links of the White-horse Main road.

The Council of the Shire of Stawell shall, within twelve months from the 11th of November aforesaid, drain, form, and metal one mile forty chains and fifty-three links of the Ararat to Horsham Main road.

The Council of the Shire of Mount Rouse shall, within twelve months from the 11th of November aforesaid, drain, form, and metal one mile sixty-one chains and eighty-eight links, and drain and form seventy-eight chains of the Hamilton to Ballarat Main road.

The Council of the Shire of Portland shall, within twelve months from the 11th of November aforesaid, drain, form, and metal one mile and thirteen chains of the Heywood to Hamilton Main road.

The Council of the Shire of Ballarat shall, within twelve months from the 11th of November aforesaid, drain, form, and metal fifteen chains of the Ballarat to Creswick and Clunes Main road.

The Council of the Shire of Bright shall, within twelve months from the 11th of November aforesaid, drain, form, and metal one mile forty-five chains and fifty links of the Myrtleford to Bright Main road.

The Council of the Shire of Maldon shall, within twelve months from the 11th of November aforesaid, drain, form, and metal one mile and forty-two chains of the Maldon to Dunolly Main road.

The Council of the Shire of Maldon shall, within twelve months from the 11th of November aforesaid, drain, form, and metal one mile and twelve chains of the Maldon to Maryborough Main road.

The Council of the Shire of Maldon shall, within twelve months from the 11th of November aforesaid, drain, form, and metal forty-two chains of the Maldon to Castlemaine Main road.

The Council of the Shire of Avon shall, within twelve months from the 11th of November aforesaid, drain and form one mile thirty-two chains and fifteen links of the Main Central road.

## PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Justices of the Peace Statute 1865*, it is amongst other things enacted that Courts of General Sessions of the Peace shall be holden in and for such places or districts within Victoria as the Governor in Council appoints; and the Governor in Council may from time to time define and appoint the limits and boundaries of the places or districts within which all such courts shall have jurisdiction respectively, and the places and times at which such courts shall be holden: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby appoint the next Court of General Sessions of the Peace at Portland to be holden on Tuesday, the first day of December next ensuing, instead of on the thirtieth day of November instant, as appointed by a former Proclamation.
