SHIPPING MASTERS AT BALTIMORE.

SIR,—I transmit to you herewith an extract of a despatch (extract, 11th November, 1867) from Her Majesty's Consul at Baltimore, reporting that the Shipping Masters at that Port refuse to ship a white crew on board any vessel in which a colored seaman is serving, together with a copy of the answer which has been returned to that despatch.

It will be desirable that you should take such steps as may be necessary for giving publicity to the state of things disclosed in this correspondence (Foreign Office, 30th November, 1867), and for warning ship owners in the colony under your Government for the course pursued by the Baltimore Shipping Masters.

Extracts of a letter from Mr. Consul Rainalds to Lord Stanley, dated British Consulate, Baltimore, 11th November, 1867, No. 25.

"Hitherto white and colored seamen have been shipped indiscriminately on board the same vessel, whereas now the shipping masters and the boarding-house keepers have, at a period when trade is extremely dull and seamen consequently plentiful, determined not to ship a white man on board the same vessel with a colored man; and their combined power cannot be counteracted by any means at my command, as through their medium alone can seamen be obtained.

In order to illustrate the practical result of such combination, I have the honor to submit for your Lordship's consideration a case of recent date.

The British ship *R. B. Mulhall* arrived here a short time ago with a mixed crew of white and colored seamen shipped at Liverpool, Nova Scotia, for a term of twelve months. Soon after her arrival, several of the men deserted (as is invariably the case here), but one colored man and two white men remained by her. When she was nearly ready for sea the captain told me that the shipping masters positively refused to ship a white crew on board the vessel so long as the colored man remained there.

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This colored man the captain informed me was an excellent seaman, whose services he was as anxious to retain as the man was desirous to remain by the vessel until the expiration of his term of service.

My instructions give me no authority to compel a seaman to leave a ship without a just cause, and yet I felt that, the case being without a precedent as far as I am concerned, I should not be justified in delaying the departure of the vessel for an indefinite period. I therefore determined if necessary to take some responsibility on myself by discharging the colored seaman and sending him home at the ship's expense.

Fortunately, however, I was later able to persuade him to take his discharge on payment of additional wages. And the matter was so settled.

Under these circumstances I would solicit your Lordship's instructions as to the means I may be permitted to adopt if cases of a similar nature present themselves again, but when the colored seamen insist on remaining on board the vessel until their time of service shall have expired."

Mr. Hammond to Mr. Consul Rainalds.

SIR,—I am directed by Lord Stanley to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch, No. 25, of the 11th instant, reporting a difficulty which had arisen in consequence of the refusal of the shipping masters at Baltimore, to ship a white crew on board the British vessel *R. B. Mulhall*, as long as a colored seaman remained on board that vessel.

As it appears from your despatch that the negro in question subsequently accepted his discharge, it is unnecessary for Lord Stanley to make any observation on this particular case, but in reply to your request for instructions as to the course you should adopt in any similar case in future, I am to state to you, that this is not a matter in which Her Majesty's Government can interfere. Your powers as Consul are clearly defined by the *Merchant Shipping Act*, and you can only remove a seaman from a British ship as ordered by that Act.

Colored seamen being British subjects are in all respects to be treated as other seamen.

It must therefore be left to the masters and owners of ships to adopt such measures as they may think best calculated to obviate the difficulties caused by the course pursued by the Baltimore shipping masters, and in order that British and Colonial shipowners may be warned of the necessity of taking such measures, Lord Stanley has caused a copy of your despatch to be communicated to the Colonial Office and to the Board of Trade.

INSTRUCTIONS TO OFFICERS IN BRITISH POSSESSIONS
ABROAD.

On Termination of Agreement, Ship's Papers to be sent to the Registrar-General of Seamen.

It frequently occurs that agreements with crews of British ships are terminated abroad. In such cases it is important that the articles of agreement, whether made in the United Kingdom or not, and the official log-book for the voyage then terminated, should be forwarded to the Registrar-General of Seamen, Adelaide place, London Bridge, by the earliest mail after the completion of the discharge of the crew.

Officers in British possessions abroad are therefore requested to obtain from the masters all such agreements and official log-books, and to transmit them accordingly.

SIR,—I transmit to you herewith an extract of a letter from the Board of Trade, with copies of the Imperial Act 30th and 31st Victoria cap. 124, entitled *An Act to amend the Merchant Shipping Act of 1854*, enclosed therein; also copy of a letter from that Board, with copies of a circular (to which a copy of the Act is appended), which has been prepared for the guidance of officers in the British possessions abroad.—(18th October, 1867, Imperial Act 124, 1867; 8th November, 1867, Circular No. 271, 1867.)

You will perceive that the Board of Trade call attention to sections 6 and 10, paragraph 5, of the Act, which relates to the supply of anti-scorbutics, and the appointment of Medical Inspectors of Seamen in the colonies.

Extract of a Letter from Mr. Gray to the Under Secretary of State, Colonial Office. Dated Board of Trade, Whitehall, 18th October, 1867.

I am directed by the Board of Trade to transmit to you, for the information of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, the accompanying copies of *The Merchant Shipping Act 1867*.—(Vide Instructions below.)

In laying these documents before the Duke of Buckingham, I am to request that you will be good enough to call the attention of His Grace to section 6 and section 10, paragraph 5, of the Act in question, relating respectively to the supply of anti-scorbutics, and the appointment of medical inspectors of seamen in the colonies; and I am to request that you will move the Duke of Buckingham to cause copies of this Act to be forwarded to the various colonial authorities, in order that steps may be taken for making the necessary regulations under the sections above referred to.

I am to add that this Board are ready to supply for this purpose as many copies of the Act as may be required.

MERCHANT SHIPPING ACT, 1867.

CAP. CXXIV.

An Act to amend the Merchant Shipping Act 1854. [20th August, 1867.]

BE it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords spiritual and temporal, and Commons, in this present parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. *Short Title.*—This Act may be cited as *The Merchant Shipping Act 1867*, and shall be construed with and as part of *The Merchant Shipping Act 1854*, hereinafter termed the Principal Act.

2. *Commencement of Act.*—This act shall come into operation on the first day of January, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, but shall not apply to any ship which belongs to the United Kingdom, and is absent therefrom at the time when this Act comes into operation, until such ship has returned to the United Kingdom.

3. *Sections 224, 227, and 231 of 17 and 18 Vict. c. 104 repealed.*—The Two hundred and twenty-fourth, Two hundred and twenty-seventh, and Two hundred and thirty-first sections of the Principal Act are hereby repealed.

4. *Lime or lemon juice and other anti-scorbutics to be provided and kept on board certain ships.*—The following rules shall be observed with respect to medicines, medical stores, and anti-scorbutics (that is to say)—

- (1.) The Board of Trade shall from time to time issue and cause to be published, scales of medicines and medical stores suitable for different ships and voyages, and shall also prepare or sanction a book or books containing instructions for dispensing the same.
- (2.) The owners of every ship navigating between the United Kingdom and any place out of the same, shall provide and cause to be kept on board such ship, a supply of medicines and medical stores in accordance with the scale appropriate to the said ship, and also a copy of the said book or of one of the said books containing instructions.
- (3.) No lime or lemon juice shall be deemed fit and proper to be taken on board any such ship, for the use of the crew or passengers thereof, unless the same has been obtained from a bonded warehouse for and to be shipped as stores; and no lime or lemon juice shall be so obtained or delivered from any warehouse as aforesaid unless the same is shown, by a certificate under the hand of an inspector appointed by the Board of Trade, to be proper for use on board ship, such certificate to be given upon inspection of a sample after deposit of the said lime or lemon juice in the warehouse; nor unless the same contains fifteen per centum of proper and palatable proof spirits, to be approved by such inspector, or by the proper officer of customs, and to be added before or immediately after the inspection thereof; nor unless the same is packed in such bottles, at such time and in such manner, and is labelled in such manner as the commissioners of customs may direct; provided that when any such lime or lemon juice is deposited in any bonded warehouse, and has been approved as aforesaid by the said inspector, the said spirits, or so much of the said spirits as is necessary to make up fifteen per centum, may be added in such warehouse without payment of any duty thereon; and when any spirit has been added to any lime or lemon juice, and the same has been labelled as aforesaid, it shall be deposited in the warehouse for delivery as ship's stores only, upon such terms and subject to such regulations of the commissioners of customs as are applicable to the delivery of ship's stores from the warehouse.
- (4.) The master or owner of every such foreign-going ship (except those bound to European ports or to ports in the Mediterranean Sea, and also except such ships or classes of ships bound to ports on the eastern coast of America north of the thirty-fifth degree of north latitude, and to any islands or places in the Atlantic Ocean north of the same limit, as the Board of Trade may from time to time exempt from this enactment) shall provide and cause to be kept on board such ship a sufficient quantity of lime or lemon juice from the warehouse duly labelled as aforesaid, such labels to remain intact

until twenty-four hours at least after such ship shall have left her port of departure on her foreign voyage, or a sufficient quantity of such other anti-scorbutics, if any, of such quality, and composed of such materials, and packed and kept in such manner as Her Majesty, by Order in Council, may from time to time direct.

- (5.) The master of every such ship as last aforesaid, shall serve or cause to be served out, the lime or lemon juice with sugar (such sugar to be in addition to any sugar required by the articles), or other such anti-scorbutics as aforesaid to the crew so soon as they have been at sea for ten days, and during the remainder of the voyage, except during such time as they are in harbor, and are there supplied with fresh provisions; the lime or lemon juice and sugar to be served out daily at the rate of an ounce each per day to each member of the crew, and to be mixed with a due proportion of water before being served out, or the other anti-scorbutics, if any, at such times and in such quantities as Her Majesty, by Order in Council, may from time to time direct.
- (6.) If at any time when such lime or lemon juice or anti-scorbutics is or are so served out as aforesaid any seaman or apprentice refuses or neglects to take the same, such neglect or refusal shall be entered in the official log-book, in the manner provided by the Two hundred and eighty-first section of the Principal Act, and shall be signed by the master and by the mate, or some other of the crew, and also by the surgeon or medical practitioner on board, if any.

And if in any such ship as aforesaid such medicines, medical stores, book of instructions, lime or lemon juice, sugar, or anti-scorbutics as are hereinbefore required are not provided, packed, and kept on board as hereinbefore require, the owner or master shall be deemed to be in fault, and shall for each default incur a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds, unless he can prove that the non-compliance with the above provisions, or any of them, was not caused through any inattention, neglect, or wilful default on his part; and if the lime or lemon juice and sugar or other anti-scorbutics are not served out in the case and manner hereinbefore directed, or if entry is not made in the official log in the case and manner hereinbefore required, the master shall be deemed to be in fault, and shall for each default incur a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, unless he can prove that the non-compliance with the above provisions, or any of them, did not arise through any neglect or omission, or wilful default on his part; and if in any case it is proved that some person other than the master or owner is in default in any case under this section, then such other person shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

6. *Penalty for selling, &c., medicines of bad quality.*—Any person who manufactures, sells, or keeps or offers for sale any such medicines or medical stores as aforesaid, which are of bad quality, shall for each such offence incur a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

6. *Power to Governors, &c., to make regulations as to supply of lime or lemon juice, &c.*—In any British possession out of the United Kingdom the Governor or Officer administering the Government for the time being shall, subject to the laws of such possession, have power to make regulations concerning the supply within such possession of lime or lemon juice and anti-scorbutics for the use of ships, and any lime or lemon juice or anti-scorbutics duly supplied in accordance with any such regulations shall be deemed to be fit and proper for the use of ships.

7. *Seaman's expenses in case of illness through neglect of owner or master to be paid by them.*—Whenever it is shown that any seaman or apprentice who is ill has, through the neglect of the master or owner, not been provided with proper food and water according to his agreement, or with such accommodation, medicines, medical stores, or anti-scorbutics as are required by the Principal Act or by this Act, then, unless it can be shown that the illness has been produced by other causes, the owner or master shall be liable to pay all expenses properly and necessarily incurred by reason of such illness (not exceeding in the whole three months' wages), either by such seaman himself, or by Her Majesty's Government, or any officer of Her Majesty's Government, or by any parochial or other local authority on his behalf, and such expenses may be recovered in the same way as if they were wages duly earned: Provided that this enactment shall not operate so as to affect any further liability of any such owner or master for such neglect, or any remedy which any seaman already possesses.

8. *Forfeiture of wages, &c., of seaman when illness caused by his own default.*—Where a seaman is by reason of illness incapable of performing his duty, and it is proved that such illness has been caused by his own wilful act or default, he shall not be entitled to wages for the time during which he is by reason of such illness incapable of performing his duty.

9. *Place appropriated to seamen to have a certain space for each man, and to be properly constructed and kept clear.*—The following rules shall be observed with respect to accommodation on board British ships, that is to say:—

- (1.) Every place in any ship occupied by seamen or apprentices, and appropriated to their use, shall have for every such seaman or apprentice a space of not less than seventy-two cubic feet, and of not less than twelve superficial feet, measured on the deck or floor of such place.
- (2.) Every such place shall be such as to make the space aforesaid available for the proper accommodation of the men who are to occupy it; shall be securely constructed, properly lighted and ventilated, properly protected from weather and sea, and as far as practicable properly shut off and protected from effluvia which may be caused by cargo or bilge-water.

(3.) No such place as aforesaid shall be deemed to be such as to authorize a deduction from registered tonnage, under the provisions hereinafter contained, unless there is or are in the ship one or more properly constructed privy or privies for the use of the crew, such privy or privies to be of such number and of such construction as may be approved by the surveyor hereinafter mentioned.

(4.) Every such place shall, whenever the ship is registered or re-registered, be inspected by one of the surveyors appointed by the Board of Trade under Part IV. of the Principal Act, who shall, if satisfied that the same is in all respects such as is required by this Act, give to the Collector of Customs a certificate to that effect, and thereupon such space shall be deducted from the register tonnage.

(5.) No such deduction from tonnage as aforesaid shall be authorized unless there is permanently cut in a beam, and cut in or painted on or over the doorway or hatchway of every such place, the number of men which it is constructed to accommodate, with the words "certified to accommodate ^{seamen}."

(6.) Every such place shall be kept free from stores or goods of any kind not being the personal property of the crew in use during the voyage.

(7.) Upon any complaint concerning any such place as aforesaid, one of the surveyors appointed by the Board of Trade may inspect such place, and if he finds that any of the provisions of this Act with respect to the same are not complied with he shall report the same to the Collector of Customs at the port where the ship is registered, and thereupon the registered tonnage shall be altered, and the deduction aforesaid in respect of space disallowed, unless and until it shall be certified by such surveyor, or by some other surveyor appointed by the Board of Trade, that the provisions of the Act in respect of such place are fully complied with.

(8.) If any such place in any ship is not kept free from goods and stores as aforesaid, the master shall be deemed to be in fault, and shall for every such failure to comply with the provisions of this section forfeit and pay to each seaman lodged in such place the sum of One shilling a day for each day after complaint made to him by any two or more of such seamen during which any goods or stores, not being the personal property of the crew, are stored or kept therein.

(9.) If in any other respect the provisions of this section are not observed with respect to any such place in any ship the owner shall be deemed to be in fault, and shall for every failure to comply with the provisions of this section incur a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

10. *Rules for medical inspection of seamen.*—The following rules shall be observed with respect to the medical inspection of seamen, that is to say:—

(1.) At any port where there is a local Marine Board, the local Marine Board, and at other ports in the United Kingdom the Board of Trade, may appoint a Medical Inspector of Seamen.

(2.) Such Medical Inspector of Seamen shall, on application by the owner or master of any ship, examine any seaman applying for employment in such ship, and shall give to the Superintendent of the Mercantile Marine Office a report under his hand stating whether such seaman is in a fit state for duty at sea, and a copy of such report shall be given to the master or owner of the ship.

(3.) The master or owner applying for such inspection shall pay to the superintendent such fees as the Board of Trade direct, and such fees shall be paid into and form part of the Mercantile Marine Fund.

(4.) The said medical inspectors shall be remunerated for their services as the Board of Trade may direct, and such remuneration shall be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund.

(5.) In British possessions out of the United Kingdom the Governor or other Officer administering the Government for the time being shall have the power of appointing medical inspectors of seamen, of charging fees for inspections, when applied for, and of determining the remuneration to be paid to such inspectors.

11. *Offences by British subjects on board ships.*—If any British subject commits any crime or offence on board any British ship, or on board any foreign ship to which he does not belong, any court of justice in Her Majesty's dominions, which would have had cognizance of such crime or offence if committed on board a British ship within the limits of the ordinary jurisdiction of such court, shall have jurisdiction to hear and determine the case as if the said crime or offence had been committed as last aforesaid.

12. *Harbor Master at Holyhead may be commissioned as justice.*—The Harbor Master for the time being of the Harbor of Holyhead, in the event of his seeming meet to Her Majesty to assign to him Her Majesty's Commission to act as a justice of the peace within the limits within which he is empowered to act in harbor matters, shall, during the continuance of such assignment and of his tenure of the office of harbor master, execute within such limits the duties of a justice of the peace, notwithstanding he may not be qualified by estate to be a justice of the peace for a county, and shall have within such limits the same power and jurisdiction as a stipendiary magistrate has by Act of Parliament when sitting at a police court or other place appointed in that behalf.

MANAGERS OF COMMON TOLL-ROADS.

THE Governor in Council, on the 17th of February, 1868, made the following appointments and arrangements with reference to Common-toll Roads, under the provisions of the Act 27 Victoria No. 176, § 255, 256, *viz.*—

The value of all packages, whether in bulk or otherwise, is to be included in the price demanded (except flour, meal, and potato bags, which will be returned when empty). The prices must be quoted in words as well as in figures.

Security will be required, either in Government debentures, bank deposit-receipt, or cash deposit, as the tenderer may elect.

Tenders must be accompanied by bank notes, or a bank draft in favor of the Chairman of the Tender Board, for ten per cent. of the amount of security required, which will be returned within ten days to unsuccessful tenderers. Such deposit to be forfeited in the event of the successful tenderer failing to complete the security within the prescribed period.

The security must be completed within ten days of acceptance of the tender, failing which the contract may be again advertised, or another tender accepted.

Tenderers failing to take up their accepted tenders will be disqualified from tendering for Government supplies for a period of twelve months.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest of any tender.

All tenders must be enclosed in a separate envelope, marked "Tenders for —" (as the case may be), and be deposited in the Tender-box at the Government Stores, King street; or (if sent by post) must be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Stores and Transport Office, Melbourne.

CONDITIONS.

1. All the articles are to be of the best quality of the several kinds, in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages.

2. Bread. A sample of the best ordinarily retailed to the public will be considered as a test loaf for first quality. Second quality to be made of flour known in the trade as "best seconds," and the third quality (that issued for prisoners of the Crown) to be made of flour, the produce of prime wheat, from which twelve per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Fresh meat is to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and, when the quantity admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately. When shins of beef form a portion of the supply, a fair proportion of the bone, not less than five inches, must have been cut off.

4. The supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto on the written order of the officer in charge. All other supplies will be ordered by the head of department, either for delivery at the Stores and Transport Office, or at the office of the department concerned, as may be stated in the order.

5. The order issued by the head of department must accompany the goods, and the account is to be rendered simultaneously with delivery of the supplies. In other cases the account is to be rendered monthly. The rates quoted in the orders cannot be exceeded.

6. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles at the time mentioned in the order they will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from his account.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies as to the quality, the same to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor; failing which, it will be procured by the person requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 6.

9. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the person to whom the rations are due, or to the contractor in waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead; failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report of the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

12. It will be competent for the Inspector of Stores, on behalf of the Government, or the contractor, on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving, in writing, a notice of three

full calendar months, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of the month. It will also be competent for the Inspector of Stores to terminate the contract, without notice, on infringement of condition No. 11, or should there be reason to know that the contractor takes advantage of his contract to communicate improperly with a prisoner.

13. In the event of any alteration in the Tariff affecting any of the items included in these contracts, the Government or the contractor, as may be the case, will make a proportionate allowance, by way of deduction from or increase of the price of the item so affected.
