UNION UNDER THE "WEIGHTS" AND MEASURES STATUTE 1864.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, called *The Weights and Measures Statute 1864*, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council, at the request of and pursuant to any agreement made by the councils or boards of any two or more of any adjoining boroughs, shires, and road districts, may proclaim such boroughs, shires, and road districts to be a "Union" for the purposes of the said Act; and by such proclamation fix the proportion in which the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act shall be borne by the several bodies corporate of such boroughs, shires, or road districts: And whereas the Council of the Borough of Maryborough, the Council of the Borough of Carisbrook, the Council of the Borough of Craigie, and the Council of the Shire of Tullaroop have requested that the said boroughs and shire may be proclaimed a "Union," and that the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act may be borne in the proportion of one-fourth by the Borough of Maryborough, one-fourth by the Borough of Carisbrook, one-fourth by the Borough of Craigie, and one-fourth by the Shire of Tullaroop: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do proclaim the Borough of Maryborough, the Borough of Carisbrook, the Borough of Craigie, and the Shire of Tullaroop to be a "Union" for the purposes of the said Act, and do fix the proportion in which the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act shall be borne by the Council of the said Borough of Maryborough, the Council of the said Borough of Carisbrook, the Council of the said Borough of Craigie, and the Council of the said Shire of Tullaroop as follows, viz.:—One-fourth by the Council of the Borough of Maryborough, one-fourth by the Council of the Borough of Carisbrook, one-fourth by the Council of the Borough of Craigie, and one-fourth by the Council of the Shire of Tullaroop.

AVOCA GAOL.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the twenty-seventh year of Her Majesty's reign (No. 219), intituled *An Act to consolidate the Law relating to Gaols*, it is amongst other things enacted, that all buildings, erections, houses, enclosed places, and premises, hereafter to be erected, built, enclosed, purchased, enlarged, or maintained at the public expense, as and for public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments within Victoria, which are from time to time proclaimed by the Governor in Council, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, as such public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, or penal establishments, shall, from and after the publication of such notice, be severally deemed and taken to be the public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments (hereinafter called "gaols") respectively of the place or district where the same are situated, and shall be subject to the several provisions made for the regulation, discipline, management, and care of the public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments already erected (also hereinafter called "gaols"), and of the prisoners confined within the same; and it is also enacted that, except where it is otherwise proclaimed by the Governor in Council, every gaol shall be and be taken for all purposes as being equally a house of correction and a prison for debtors, and also every house of correction shall be taken to be a prison: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, certain premises at Avoca described therein were constituted a gaol: And whereas additions have been made to the said gaol and it is expedient to re-proclaim the same: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power and authority conferred by the said Act, and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim that the gaol at Avoca, situate on the land hereinafter described, is a public gaol, prison, and house of correction, within the meaning and in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

AVOCA GAOL.—Comprising all buildings, erections, houses, enclosed places and premises on the following site, viz.:—Commencing at the south-west angle, being a point bearing N. 20° 37' W. one chain fifty links from the north-west angle of block 18; bounded on the south by Camp street, bearing N. 69° 23' E. two chains fifty links; on the east by a road bearing N. 20° 37' W. eight chains five links; on the north by a road bearing S. 69° 23' W. two chains fifty links; and on the west by a road bearing S. 20° 37' W. eight chains four links to the point of commencement. Area 2a. 0r. 14-3p.

WHEREAS by The Electoral Act 1865 it is amongst other things enacted that where any accidental or unavoidable impediment, misfeasance, or omission shall have happened in the preparation or transmission or printing of any general roll or supplementary roll or ordinary electoral roll or roll of rate-paying electors, the Governor in Council may take all such measures as may be necessary for removing such impediment or rectifying such misfeasance or omission, or may declare any such roll valid as to and notwithstanding such impediment, misfeasance, or omission; and every such Order in Council shall state specifically the nature of the impediment, misfeasance, or omission, and shall be forthwith published in the *Government Gazette*: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power in him vested by the 68th section of the said Act, doth by this present Order declare to be valid the General Rolls for the Skipton division of the Ripon and Hampden District and Western Province, notwithstanding that the Lists for the said division were revised on a day not legally appointed for that purpose.

REGISTRAR-GENERAL'S REPORT ON THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF NOVEMBER, 1867.

ACTUAL Daily Mortality of persons of both sexes under and over five years of age in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, embracing a radius of ten miles, and including the Statistical Sub-districts of Melbourne Proper, East Melbourne, North Melbourne and Carlton, Fitz Roy Municipality, East Collingwood, Richmond, Joka-joka parish (exclusive of North Melbourne, Collingwood, and Richmond), South Yarra and Prahran, Emerald Hill and Sandridge, St. Kilda and Brighton, Doutta Galla and Keilor, Boroondara and Heidelberg, Cut-paw-paw parish, and the shipping in Hobson's Bay; also, the Temperature in the shade at the Melbourne Observatory, calculated upon a reduced mean corresponding with that of twenty-four hourly observations taken on each day during the month of November, 1867:—

The mortality in November was lower than the average. The deaths however outnumbered those in October by 18. The month was slightly cooler than usual.

Of those who died Fifty-seven per cent. were males and 44 per cent. were females. Forty-five per cent. had not attained their fifth year, against 60 per cent. in November, 1866; 60 per cent. in November, 1865; 43 per cent. in November, 1864; 47 per cent. in November, 1863; 55 per cent. in November, 1862; 51 per cent. in November, 1861; and 73 per cent. in November, 1860.

The day of the highest mortality was the 29th, for which 19 deaths were recorded. The day of lowest mortality was the 2nd, for each of which only 3 deaths were reported.

Four persons, each of whom was upwards of 75 years old, died during the month, viz.:—One aged 77, of asthma; one aged 77, of paralysis; one aged 77, of mortification of the feet; and one aged 92, of disease of the prostate gland. These old persons were all males.

The deaths from external causes numbered 17, which is an unusually large number. The following are the particulars:—An infant, which lived only 36 hours, died of injuries received at birth; a boy, aged 2, died of a fractured skull; a girl, aged 3, of injuries received from a cart-wheel; a groom, aged 28, of a kick from a horse; a female, aged 30, of a fracture of the neck caused by a fall; a carpenter, aged 32, of paralysis resulting from a fall; a corn merchant, aged 45, of tetanus from an injury by machinery; a ship carpenter, aged 29, of sunstroke; a child, aged 40 weeks, of drowning in a water-tub; a child, aged 48 weeks, a boy, aged 64 years, a clerk, aged 16, a laborer, aged 30, and a mariner aged 47, of drowning; and a male, aged 33, of choking with a piece of meat. All the above are attributed to accident. The following resulted from suicide:—A female servant, aged 21, drowned herself, and a horse-dealer, aged 55, cut his throat whilst in a state of delirium tremens.

Sixty-six deaths, or more than a fourth of the whole, occurred in public institutions, viz.:—45 in the Melbourne Hospital, 1 in the Lying-in Hospital, 6 in the Benevolent Asylum, 4 in the Immigrants' Home, 6 in the Yarra Bend Asylum, 1 in the Carlton Asylum, 2 in the Melbourne Gaol, and 1 in the Pentridge Stockade.

* This calculation is made upon the population at the last census, instead of the present population, as there are no means of estimating the changes which have taken place in the different sub-districts since the census was taken. It is believed that the present population of the whole district of Melbourne and suburbs amounts to 165,000. If this be correct, the mortality of the month under review would indicate a proportion of 1.56 deaths to every 1000 persons living.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 115, of which 56, or nearly 49 per cent., were of males, and 59, or about 51 per cent., were of females. Of those dying, 86 were under one year of age, 18 were between one and two years, 3 were between two and three, 7 were between three and four, and 1 was between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 143, of which 90, or nearly 63 per cent., were males, and 53, or about 37 per cent., were females; 12 were between five and ten, 6 were between ten and fifteen, 3 were between fifteen and twenty, 11 were between twenty and twenty-five, 11 were between twenty-five and thirty, 17 were between thirty and thirty-five, 15 were between thirty-five and forty, 14 were between forty and forty-five, 16 were between forty-five and fifty, 20 were between fifty and fifty-five, 3 were between fifty-five and sixty, 6 were between sixty and sixty-five, 2 were between sixty-five and seventy, 3 were between seventy and seventy-five, 3 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 1 was eighty and upwards.

SIR,—I transmit to you herewith a copy of a letter (11th September, 1867) from the Board of Trade, with copies of a circular (No. 267, 1867) which has been prepared for the guidance of officers in the British Possessions abroad appointed to discharge duties in connection with the relief of distressed British seamen; these instructions have reference to the relief to be afforded to masters, and the conveyance home of lunatic seamen.

INSTRUCTIONS TO OFFICERS IN BRITISH POSSESSIONS ABROAD.

RELIEF OF DISTRESSED SEAMEN.

In addition to Paragraphs 27, 29, and 32.

Relief to be afforded to Masters.—The Board of Trade have no power under the Acts relating to merchant shipping to obtain repayment of expenses incurred in the relief of masters. Relief should therefore be extended to masters in the following cases only:—

1. When masters are absolutely destitute, i.e. without private property and unable to obtain credit or private assistance, or to give a reliable guarantee for the repayment of expenses to be incurred by the officer.

In such cases a subsistence allowance equal to twice that made to seamen may be given to the master, and he may be sent home under the usual Order (C.C. 14.), at the rate of 2s. a day for the length of the passage, but no more expensive clothing is to be allowed to masters than to seamen.

The enactment which provides for the passage home of distressed seamen does not apply to the case of masters. The officer must therefore make the best arrangement he can in the case of a distressed master, but it is desirable that the rate of 2s. a day should not be exceeded.

2. When they are in a position to give a reliable guarantee for the repayment of the expenses to be incurred by the officer. In cases of this kind it must be left to the judgment of the officer to render such assistance as may seem to him necessary, but as a rule the assistance should not differ from that given in cases where the master is absolutely destitute.

The officer should also fully understand that expenses incurred under a guarantee given by a master will be liable to disallowal if the guarantee be repudiated.

Conveyance home of lunatic seamen.—As difficulty sometimes arises in finding masters willing to give passages under the usual Order (C.C. 14.) to distressed seamen suffering from mental derangement, the officer is authorized in any such case that may arise to make a special arrangement with a master willing to take the seaman, agreeing to pay, if necessary, such sum for the passage, in addition to the usual allowance of one shilling and sixpence (1s. 6d.) a day, as may appear fair and reasonable under the circumstances, and with the object of ensuring that requisite care and attendance shall be given to the passenger during the voyage.

A copy of the agreement so entered into should be forwarded to the Board of Trade as soon as possible in every case, and also, in any case where it is desirable to forward the seaman to a foreign port or a port in a British possession abroad, to the consul or the shipping officer, as the case may be, at the port to which the seaman is to be conveyed.

In the case of a seaman arriving under such circumstances at his port, the officer may pay to the master the amount of the passage money on production of such an agreement as described herein, purporting to be entered into between the master and a consul or officer in a British possession abroad, and upon being satisfied that the seaman has received the extra care and attendance stipulated for.

An immediate advice of such a payment together with the original agreement and the receipt of the master for the passage money should be sent to the Board of Trade.

Such payments should be charged in the Quarterly Account with the Board of Trade.

Similar instructions have been sent to Her Majesty's Consuls.
