ORDER IN COUNCIL CONSTITUTING A BRANCH MINT AT MELBOURNE.

HIS Excellency the Governor has directed the subjoined Order of Her Majesty in Council to be published.

At the Court at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, the 7th day of August, 1869.

PRESENT:

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a representation from the Commissioners for executing the office of Our Lord High Treasurer, in the words following, that is to say:—

"The Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury beg leave to represent to Your Majesty that it appears to Your Majesty's said Commissioners to be expedient—

"That a branch of the Royal Mint be established at or near Melbourne in Victoria, on such site as the Governor or Officer administering the Government of the Colony for the time being may approve; that the Chief Officer thereof, who shall be considered as a Deputy Master of the Royal Mint, on being appointed by Her Majesty, be authorized and empowered to coin gold and other coin in accordance with the standard of weight and fineness of the currency of this realm, and of the same design; and that the Master of the Royal Mint be authorized to prepare and transmit dies for such coins, so long as the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury may think necessary, and subject to such regulations as they may prescribe;

"That it may be lawful for the Governor or Officer administering the Government of the Colony for the time being with the advice of his Executive Council, to frame regulations under which the Mint shall receive gold bullion, and coin the same;

"That the Deputy Master be empowered, subject to the approval of the Governor or Officer administering the Government of the Colony for the time being, to enter into such contracts, and to establish such regulations for the orderly and convenient performance of the duties of the Mint as may be found necessary: and that he do hold his office during Her Majesty's pleasure, the Governor or Officer administering the Government of the Colony being empowered to appoint a person to perform his duties in the case of his death, or incapacity from any other cause, until the pleasure of Her Majesty is made known;

"That five other principal Officers of the Mint be appointed from time to time by the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and that the Governor, or Officer administering the Government of the Colony, be empowered on the application of the Deputy Master to suspend either of them in case of misconduct, and, on the recommendation of the Deputy Master, to appoint a person to perform the duties of either of them in case of death, sickness, infirmity, resignation, or suspension, subject to the orders of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury;

"And that the five officers so to be appointed shall be—

"1st. The Superintendent of the Bullion Office, who shall be responsible to the Deputy Master for the receipt of bullion and the delivery of coin by the Mint; the safe custody of the same while in charge of his department; the faithful conduct and accurate record of all transactions with the public and the Coining Department of the Mint; the general precision of the arrangements, and integrity of the operations of the refinery and melting house; and for the faithful and zealous discharge of any other duties which the Deputy Master may direct him to perform.

"2nd. The Superintendent of the Coining Department, who will be responsible to the Deputy Master for the bullion delivered into his charge by the Superintendent of the Bullion Office; for its conversion into coin of the legal weight, properly stamped with the authorized dies; for the safe custody and legitimate use of the dies; for the operations of his department being properly and economically conducted; for the records thereof being kept with care and precision; and for the faithful and zealous discharge of any other duties which the Deputy Master or his representative may direct him to perform;

"3rd. The First Clerk of the Bullion Office, who, under the immediate supervision of the Superintendent of the Bullion Office, will be responsible to the Deputy Master for the skilful and economical direction of the operations of melting and refining; for the records thereof being kept with care and precision; and for the faithful and zealous discharge of any other duties which the Deputy Master or his representative may direct him to perform.

"4th and 5th. Two assayers who will be responsible to the Deputy Master for the accurate assaying and reporting of all bullion or coin delivered to them for the purpose, for the safe custody of the same whilst in their charge, and for the faithful and zealous discharge of any other duties which the Deputy Master of the Mint or his representative may direct them to perform.

"And that all such other officers and servants of the Mint as may be necessary, shall be appointed and discharged from time to time by the Deputy Master, on the approval of the Governor or officer administering the Government of the Colony.

"And the Deputy Master shall faithfully and without unnecessary delay, after the expiration of each calendar month transmit to the Master of the Royal Mint the following returns:—

"Weight of rough gold and weight of gold bullion received from the Public by the Bullion Office.

"Weight melted previous to assay.

"Weight assayed and valued and value thereof.

"Weight refined.

"Weight and value of Bullion re-issued, and amount charged for melting, assaying, and refining.

"Weight of bars delivered for coinage, distinguishing those from scissel and ingot pots.

"Weight of each description of coin produced.

"Weight of each description of coin delivered to the public, and the amount, if any, charged for coining.

"Number and average of assay reports on which ingot pots have been passed into work, and the highest and lowest assay reports of such pots.

"The same for scissel pots.

"The same for the assay of coin.

"Number and description of dies received or completed during the month, of dies worn out, of dies effectually defaced, and of serviceable dies in hand.

"And that the Deputy Master shall faithfully, and without unnecessary delay, forward to the Master of the Royal Mint, at the end of every quarter, a return showing the waste during the quarter, distinguishing the waste arising in melting, in refining, in coining, and in assaying.

"And he shall forward any other returns which the Master of the Royal Mint with the consent of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury may require:

"And that, to ensure the careful observance of the Standard in the Coin, the Deputy Master shall only permit coin to be delivered to the public between such hours, on such days, as shall from time to time be ordered by the Governor or Officer administering the Government of the Colony, during which time an officer appointed by the Governor or Officer administering the Government of the Colony shall attend and take, without preference in the selection, a number of pieces, in proportion to the quantity delivered, not being more than one piece out of every five hundred coins, nor less than one piece in five thousand:

"That the piece or pieces so taken be sealed up by the Officer appointed as aforesaid, and the envelope dated and signed by him, and be forwarded by the Deputy Master to the Master of the Royal Mint in London for such examination as the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury may direct:

"And that the Governor or Officer administering the Government of the Colony shall also direct a Board of Government Officers, not less than three in number, to assemble at the Mint at the expiration of each quarter, for the inspection of the store of bullion and coin in the Mint, and report on the same to him, stating the exact amounts of the balance of each description verified by them, and shall transmit a Copy of the Report to the Deputy Master, to be transmitted by him to the Master of the Royal Mint:

"That the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury and Her Majesty's principal Secretary of State for the Colonies may have authority to issue and give such instructions as to them may respectively appertain for effecting the several matters and things hereby ordered to be carried into effect:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners therefore beg to lay before Your Majesty the beforementioned circumstances, and humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation into consideration was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order and it is hereby ordered, that the same and every part thereof be acted upon and carried into effect; and the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Earl Granville, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Master and Worker of Her Majesty's Mint, are to issue and give such rules and directions as to them may respectively appertain for effecting the several matters and things hereby ordered to be carried into effect.

BY THE QUEEN.

A PROCLAMATION

FOR declaring Gold Coin made at the Branch Mint in Victoria, a Legal Tender within all parts of Her Majesty's Dominions in which Gold Coins issued from Her Majesty's Mint in London are now a Legal Tender.

VICTORIA R.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council bearing date the seventh day of August, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, We have thought fit to order that a Branch of Our Royal Mint should be established at or near Melbourne, in Victoria: And whereas by the said Order We have thought fit to order that certain pieces of Gold money should be coined at the said Branch of Our Royal Mint, to be of the same designs, and of the same respective weights, fineness, and values with the sovereigns and half sovereigns now current within this Our Realm:

And whereas pieces of Gold money will hereafter be coined at Our said Branch of the Royal Mint, in pursuance of orders to be issued:

And whereas by an Act made and passed in the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Our Reign intituled, *An Act to enable Her Majesty to declare Gold Coins to be issued from Her Majesty's Colonial Branch Mints a Legal Tender for Payments, and for*

other Purposes relating thereto, it is provided that "It shall be lawful for Her Majesty, from time to time by Proclamation, issued with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare that, for such period, and subject to such conditions as may be specified in such Proclamation, Gold Coins made at any such Colonial Branch Mints, of designs approved by Her Majesty, and being of the same weight and fineness as are required by law with respect to Gold Coins of the same denominations made at Her Majesty's Mint in London, are to be a Legal Tender for payments within any part of Her Majesty's dominions, to be specified in such Proclamation, in which gold coins issued from Her Majesty's Mint in London shall at the date of the issue of such Proclamation be a legal tender; and upon such Proclamation being issued, Gold Coins made of such designs, and being of such weight and fineness as aforesaid, shall be a legal tender for payments accordingly."

We therefore, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, have thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and we do ordain, declare, and command, that from and after the date of the publication of this Our Proclamation in the *London Gazette*, Coins made at the said Branch Mint, of designs approved by Us, at Melbourne aforesaid, and being of the same weight and fineness as are required by law with respect to Gold Coins of the same denomination made at Our Mint in London, shall be a legal tender for payments within all parts of Our Dominions in which Gold Coins issued from our Mint in London are at the date of the issue of this Our Proclamation a legal tender.

Given at Our Court at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, this seventh day of August, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and in the Thirty-third year of Our Reign.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed by the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, in the eighth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to amend an Act passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of Her present Majesty intituled, "An Act to incorporate the Inhabitants of the Town of Melbourne,"* it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for His Excellency the Governor, upon petition from the Council of the Town of Melbourne, to increase from time to time the number of wards within the said Town, by Proclamation published in one or more of the Melbourne newspapers, and every additional ward so appointed shall have the same rights, privileges, and immunities as any of the other wards within the said Town: And whereas the said Town has been erected into a City, and is now designated the City of Melbourne: And whereas the Council of the said City of Melbourne have presented a Petition, praying me to constitute moieties of two of the wards of the said City, respectively called "Smith Ward" and "La Trobe Ward," to be separate and additional wards of the said City, with the metes and bounds and under the names, styles, and titles in the said Petition suggested: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, in pursuance of the power vested in me by the said Act, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation increase the wards of the said City of Melbourne, and do appoint the moieties of the existing wards thereof called Smith Ward and La Trobe Ward, hereinafter described, to be separate and additional wards of the said City, with the metes and bounds and under the names, styles, and titles hereinafter set forth, that is to say:—

VICTORIA WARD.—The portion of Smith Ward bounded as follows, viz.: Commencing at a point being the centre of the Sydney road at the southern boundary of the borough of Brunswick; proceeding thence eastward along the said boundary to Nicholson street; thence southward by the centre of Nicholson street to Faraday street; thence westward by the centre of Faraday street to Madeline street; thence northward by the centre of Madeline street to College crescent; thence north-westward by the centre of College crescent to Cemetery road west, and by the centre of Cemetery road west to the Sydney road; thence northward by the centre of Sydney road to the

commencing point: shall be and is hereby appointed to be a separate and additional ward of the said City of Melbourne under the name, style, and title of "VICTORIA WARD."

ALBERT WARD.—The portion of La Trobe Ward bounded as follows, viz.: Commencing in Victoria parade at the south-western angle of the borough of East Collingwood, being a point opposite to the centre of Smith street, and half a chain southward of the northern side line of Victoria parade; proceeding thence easterly by the southern boundary of the borough of East Collingwood to Hoddle street; thence southward by the east side line of Hoddle street and across the River Yarra Yarra to the north-western angle of the borough of Prahran, being a point on the south bank of the said river at the centre of Hoddle street; thence further southward by the centre of Hoddle street to High street; thence westward by the centre of High street to the south-western side of the St. Kilda road; thence north-westward by the south-western side of the St. Kilda road to the River Yarra Yarra; thence eastward and south-eastward by the centre of the River Yarra Yarra to opposite the centre of the Jolimont road; thence northward by the centre of the Jolimont road to Wellington parade; thence north-eastward across Wellington parade to a point in the centre of the southern end of FitzRoy square; thence further northward through the centre of FitzRoy square and the centre of Eades place to Victoria parade; thence north-eastward across Victoria parade to the commencing point: shall be and is hereby appointed to be a separate and additional ward of the said City of Melbourne under the name, style, and title of "ALBERT WARD."

COMMON IN AN AGRICULTURAL AREA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR JOHN HENRY THOMAS MANNERS SUTTON, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Amending Land Act* 1865, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected under *The Land Act* 1862, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land a farmers' common; when one-eighth part of any agricultural area has been selected under *The Land Act* 1862, or selected or leased under the now reciting Act, the Governor in Council may proclaim any unselected and unleased portion of such agricultural area, not exceeding twice the quantity so selected and leased, to be a temporary common for the use of such selectors and lessees; and it is also enacted, that the Governor in Council may from time to time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or reproclaimed, and may from time to time reprocclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of *The Land Act* 1862 and the now reciting Act: Now therefore I, the Governor

of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby diminish the common hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above recited Act, that is to say:—

DARGALONG AGRICULTURAL AREA COMMON.—The Dargalong Agricultural Area Farmers' Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 26th day of April, 1869, is hereby diminished by deducting therefrom allotment 82 in the parish of Moika, containing an area of 486 acres 7 perches.—(69.T.17733.)

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862* it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold-field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold-fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common, respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the Common hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

SANDFORD TOWN COMMON.—The Sandford Town Common, described in a Proclamation bearing date 24th day of December, 1864, is hereby increased by adding thereto allotment 1 of section B, in the parish of Casterton, together with the unappropriated Crown land within the portion of the Sandford town reserve, lying on the eastern side of the Wannon River: as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne. Area, about 430 acres.—(69.T.13691.)

MINING OPERATIONS WITHIN RESERVED LANDS AUTHORIZED.

THE Governor in Council has authorized Messrs. Robert Marshall and Company to occupy a site for quartz crushing machinery, particularly described in the schedule hereto, and situate within the area reserved in connection with the Coliban water supply scheme, subject to the conditions following:—

RULES OF THE WESTERN ARTILLERY CORPS.

1.—CONSTRUCTION OF DETACHMENTS AND ENROLMENT OF NEW MEMBERS.

Each detachment shall consist of those members whose names shall appear on the muster roll on the date on which these rules shall have been approved by the Governor in Council, and of such other persons as may from time to time be admitted members in manner hereinafter mentioned.

From and after that date every person desirous of being enrolled shall forward to the commanding officer an application in writing, supported by two members of the detachment, and the following particulars also in writing, viz. :—

Name in full

Age

Height

Occupation

Address

Which particulars shall then be posted in the orderly room for a period of one week, and thereafter submitted to the general committee before admission of the candidate.

2. ADDRESS.

Any member of the detachment intending to be absent from his usual address for a period of more than thirty days must give notice of the same in writing to the officer commanding, and deposit his arms and accoutrements in the store at the orderly room, under a penalty of five shillings.

3. PARADES, DRILLS, &c.

Parades of the detachment will be held at least twice in every month; and company, gun, or other instruction drill will be given at least once a week. Such parades and drills will take place on such days, at such hours, and at such places as shall from time to time be ordered by the officer commanding.

The muster roll shall be taken on all occasions immediately after the members have fallen in and before the drill has commenced.

Full uniform to be worn at all parades except when otherwise ordered by the officer commanding.

Any member who shall attend parade not dressed in accordance with the established regulations (unless such parade shall have been ordered in plain clothes), or whose arms, accoutrements, or clothing shall be dirty or in any way unserviceable from neglect, will be liable to a fine not exceeding five shillings.

No member will be allowed to talk while in the ranks, either at parade or on the march, except when standing easy or marching at ease, under a penalty of one shilling.

4. MANAGEMENT.

The civil business connected with the detachments shall be managed by a general committee, a match committee, and a secretary.

The general committee shall consist of six members of the detachment besides the commissioned officers and secretary, who will be *ex officio* members of all committees. The general committee shall be elected at a general meeting of the detachment, to be held every six months, at the expiration of which time three members shall retire by rotation, but will be eligible for re-election. Should any member absent himself from three regular consecutive meetings, without special leave, his office shall be declared vacant, and may be filled up at the next special meeting of the detachment.

The general committee shall meet at least once a month, on such days as they may agree upon, shall be at liberty to make rules for the conduct of their business, and five members of such committee shall form a quorum.

The match committee shall consist of five members of the detachment, who shall be elected yearly at a general meeting of the detachment, shall continue in office for twelve months, and be eligible for re-election; vacancies occurring to be filled up as in the case of the general committee.

The duties of the match committee shall be as follow:—

To challenge and accept or decline challenges for matches with the rifle or other weapons; to make and carry out all necessary arrangements for all matches; to select members to compete therein; to take charge of and arrange as to the competition for prizes; and generally to manage all matters connected with matches. The match committee shall meet at such times as may be agreed upon, may make rules for the conduct of their business, and three shall form a quorum.

The secretary shall be elected annually, at a general meeting of the detachment, shall hold office for twelve months, and be eligible for re-election.

The secretary shall attend the meetings of the detachment and committees; keep clear and intelligible minutes or records of all proceedings at such meetings relating thereto, under the direction of the officer commanding. He shall collect from the sergeants or others all fines or other moneys belonging to the detachment; keep proper books of accounts, containing entries of all receipts and payments; produce such books whenever required by the detachment or general committee; prepare all necessary balance-sheets, and render such explanations regarding the financial affairs of the detachment as may be required by proper authority. He shall, within twenty-four hours after receipt, lodge to the credit of the Public Account, as hereinafter mentioned, all moneys received by him.

The secretary may at any time be removed from office by the vote of the majority present at any special meeting of the detachment. In the event of such removal or the resignation of the secretary, the detachment may at any special meeting elect a person to perform the duties for the remainder of the time for which such removed or resigned officer shall have been elected.

5. PROPERTY, UNIFORM, ETC.

Every member will be responsible for the good and serviceable order of his arms, accoutrements, and clothing; and any damage done thereto, except on duty, shall be made good by the person holding the same, or in default he may be fined by the officer commanding the amount of such damage.

Every member must produce his arms and accoutrements for inspection by the officer commanding, or other officer appointed for that purpose, whenever and so often as may be required, and must also return such arms or accoutrements to the officer commanding whenever directed by him so to do; or deposit the same in the orderly room; under a penalty, in either case of ten shillings. Any member ceasing to be a member of the detachment must forward his uniform and other property of the detachment in his possession to the officer commanding, or in default he may be fined to the amount of the value of the property retained.

Any member who may damage, lose, destroy, or retain any weapon, book, plate, or other property whatever belonging to the detachment, shall make good the same to the satisfaction of the officer commanding, or in default be liable to a fine not exceeding the value of the property so damaged, lost, destroyed, or retained.

6. FUNDS.

All moneys granted by the Government shall be at once obtained when payable, and deposited in a bank, to the credit of the officer commanding, who shall keep a public account for the purpose, to which shall be added all sums arising from fines or other sources.

Each member of the detachment shall contribute to the general funds of the detachment a sum not exceeding two shillings per month, the amount of such sum to be fixed at each annual meeting of the detachment, to be payable monthly in advance.

All fines, contributions, &c., shall be collected by the non-commissioned officers from the members, and when received shall be at once handed to the secretary, who shall at the first committee meeting in each month hand in a list of arrears, which list shall afterwards be posted in the drill room.

A book shall be kept called the fine book, in which all fines shall be entered, and signed by the officer commanding; a separate entry is also to be made when such fine is collected, with the signature of the receiving officer. This book shall be kept in the orderly room, and shall be produced when required. Any member who may be fined must pay the amount of such fine to the non-commissioned officer or other person authorized to receive the same within seven days after its notification to him, and in default of such payment may be proceeded against according to law. In the event of such fine not being paid within seven days from its notification the same shall be publicly intimated to the detachment at the next parade, and the name of the defaulter posted in the orderly room until payment.

At every annual meeting of the detachment a balance-sheet showing the actual financial position of the detachment shall be submitted by the general committee for the approval of the meeting, the accounts having previously been audited by two auditors, who shall have been elected at the parade of the detachment previous to the annual meeting.

7. MEETINGS.

The officer commanding is empowered at any time to convene a special general meeting of the detachment, giving not less than three days' notice; and on a requisition signed by not less than ten members, providing the subject to be dealt with is not of a military nature, the officer commanding shall call a special general meeting, giving not less than three days' notice. In either case such notice shall consist, if possible, of an advertisement in at least one of the local newspapers, and an intimation on parade.

At every meeting of the detachment or its committees the senior officer present shall be chairman. No person will be permitted to speak to any question more than once unless in explanation; except the original mover, who will be entitled to a reply. No person shall be allowed to vote or take any part in the proceedings at any meeting who is not at the time an effective member of the detachment, or who shall have any unpaid fine or penalty recorded against him; but a newly joined member will not be so disqualified on the ground of non-effectiveness if he shall have passed recruit and gun drills. Every motion must be delivered to the chairman in writing, if so demanded by any member present, and shall be decided by the holding up of hands, unless a division be demanded by two or more members. No meeting shall be adjourned or dissolved without a question to that purpose.

8. Any member failing to become an effective in any year shall be fined £3, less any fines he may have paid for non-attendance; provided always that the officer commanding shall have power to remit the whole or portion of such penalty.

9. If a member at any time desire to quit the detachment under the provisions of the Volunteer Statute he shall be required to pay all expense incurred by the detachment on his behalf for the year then current; provided always that no such fine shall exceed £3, and that a portion or the whole may at the discretion of the officer commanding be remitted.

10. No alteration or addition whatsoever shall be made to these rules unless at a meeting of the detachment convened for that purpose.

IRON CASTINGS.

Should the contractor, in the opinion of the Engineer-in-Chief, fail to furnish work in accordance with the specification, then, in seven days after due notice to that effect shall have been given, in writing, the Secretary for Railways shall have full power to re-advertise and relet this contract to any other person the Government shall think fit; and at the expiration of seven days after such notice shall have been given to the contractor this contract shall become null and void.

5. The contractor must furnish with each delivery detailed invoices or bills of parcels, in duplicate, showing quantity, rate, and value, also the number of the order of the goods, otherwise they will not be received. Delivery, as a rule, is to be of the full quantity ordered at one time.

6. The contractor will prepare his own account on the prescribed form, and render the same to the Railway Storekeeper for certification, previously to payment at the Treasury.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer requiring the supply as to the quality, the same is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the Engineer-in-Chief, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.
