IMMIGRATION REGULATIONS.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has approved of the following Regulations for the conduct of Emigration to Victoria, and for the Nomination of Immigrants, in lieu of those dated the 10th of July 1865.

These Regulations will take effect from the 1st of March 1870.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CONDUCT OF EMIGRATION TO VICTORIA, AND FOR THE NOMINATION OF IMMIGRANTS.

PART I.

1. The only persons eligible for free passages will be single females under the age of 35, British subjects or natives of Germany or Switzerland, who have been accustomed to domestic service, and who can produce certificates of good character satisfactory to the Agent-General of Victoria, 8 Victoria Chambers, Victoria street, Westminster, London, and are free from any bodily or mental infirmity.

2. Also married people of the class of small farmers and laborers, who may be selected by the Agent-General in London—numbers to be limited to requirements of the colony as indicated by the amount annually voted by Parliament—by direction of the Hon. the Commissioner of Trade and Customs of Victoria, and to be selected from England, Scotland, Ireland, and Wales in proportion to the population of such countries respectively according to the last census for the time being.

3. The whole cost of the passage will be defrayed by the Government, and also, at the option of the Agent-General, the expenses of conveyance to the port of embarkation. Each emigrant will, however, be required to pay a sum not exceeding twenty shillings in order to provide the necessary bedding and mess utensils.

4. Immigrants introduced under the above Regulations will be received into a depôt on arrival, provided by the Government, until employment is found, but will be required to proceed to any part of Victoria which the Immigration Agent may direct.

PART II.

1. Persons habitually resident in Victoria desirous of bringing their relatives and friends to Victoria may apply to the Immigration Agent or other officer named in Clause 9 for passage-warrants, which will be granted under the conditions hereafter mentioned in these Regulations.

2. The persons to be nominated shall be of sound mind, in good health, and of good character; but no passage-warrant shall be issued, and no transfer of any warrant permitted, in favor of or to any person

who may be either lunatic, idiotic, deaf, dumb, blind, or infirm, or who may have been previously in the Colony of Victoria.

3. A passage-warrant will entitle the person or persons named therein to be conveyed to Melbourne from a port in the United Kingdom by a ship to be named by the Agent-General within one month of the receipt by him of a request from the nominees for a passage in terms of the warrant; but unless a nominee shall leave the United Kingdom within nine months of the date of the warrant, such warrant will not be recognized, but must be returned to Melbourne for renewal or transfer.

4. Passage-warrants shall not be issued for children under 15 years of age, unless on an undertaking that they shall be accompanied by some suitable person who will take charge of them during the voyage, or the payment of a sum not exceeding two pounds in addition to the amount required to be paid for the warrant for suitable protection.

5. Should the person or persons specified in any passage-warrant decline or be unable to emigrate, or be dead, and the warrant not availed of, the money paid towards their passage will be refunded to the nominator, or the passage-warrant may be transferred or exchanged upon application to the Immigration Agent in Melbourne.

6. No single females will be permitted to be conveyed in any ships, except in accordance with the Queen's Orders in Council, dated 3rd February 1863, unless accompanied by relatives or a family of friends.

7. No warrant will be issued in favor of a married man or woman unless accompanied by the husband or wife respectively, or unless the husband or wife be resident in Victoria.

8. No immigrant will be received into any immigration depôt except those introduced entirely at the public expense, and single females, who may be maintained during five days after arrival at the ship's expense, and any subsequent period at that of the nominator's, unless they hire for domestic service. All nominators are therefore strictly enjoined to make provision for the reception of their nominees immediately on their arrival, as they will not be allowed to remain on board the ship for more than five days from the date thereof. Single females will, on landing, be conveyed to the Immigration Depôt, from which they will be taken by their friends.

9. All applications for passage-warrants shall be made in accordance with Form A hereto attached, which may be obtained at any Post-office throughout the colony, in addition to the offices hereafter mentioned, or which may be subsequently appointed by the Commissioner of Trade and Customs. The form, with the necessary particulars, carefully inserted and signed by the nominator, should be sent to the Immigration Agent, Melbourne, or to any of the undermentioned offices:—

To the Assistant Immigration Agents:

To any Receiver and Paymaster in Victoria.

To any Postmaster in Victoria, or to any officer who may be hereafter authorized by the Commissioner of Trade and Customs.

This form, correctly filled up, is to be handed or forwarded to an officer referred to in these Regulations, together with the necessary amount required to be paid according to Clause 10, who will without delay forward them with advice in terms of Form B, and a post-office order, bank draft, or Treasury receipt for the money to the Immigration Agent in Melbourne, who will then transmit passage-warrants for the persons nominated, either to the office at which the money was paid, or to such address as the nominator may request. The passage-warrant must be sent by the nominator to his friends. All persons paying money for warrants should be careful to get a printed receipt for the same from the officer to whom the money is paid.

10. The following sums shall be in all instances paid by the nominator in advance in respect of intending emigrants of the various classes prior to the issue of the passage-warrants:—

If the nominator misrepresent any of the particulars, or neglect to furnish full information respecting the persons nominated, or if the transferor misrepresent any particulars or neglect to furnish full information respecting the person to whom he proposes to transfer the passage-warrant, or if any person known to be under indenture by the nominator, or any person disqualified by these Regulations, be nominated, the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, or the Agent-General in London, may cancel the said passage-warrant, and the deposit shall be forfeited; or if the nominee or transferee may have been introduced into Victoria previous to the disqualification being discovered, the nominator, or in his absence the nominee or transferee, shall be held liable to refund the amount paid by the Government for the passage-money of the person so disqualified and in whose favor such passage-warrant may have been issued; and such amount may be recovered from such nominator, nominee, or transferee by process of law.

PART III.

1. Persons resident in Victoria desirous of bringing out to Victoria, from the United Kingdom, laborers or servants, without specifying the names of the persons to be introduced, may apply to the officers named in Clause 9, Part 2, of the existing Regulations for passage-warrants, which, will be granted on the following conditions:

2. Applications shall be made in accordance with Form C, which may be obtained at any office named in Clause 9 of the existing Regulations. This form to be carefully filled up and signed by the person applying for a warrant in the presence of a Justice of the Peace of Victoria, and transmitted to the Immigration Agent, Melbourne, or any of the officers before mentioned, who will forward the same, together with the amount to be paid for such warrant, or a Treasury receipt for the same, to the Immigration Agent at Melbourne, in the same manner as specified in Clause 9, Part 2.

3. The persons who shall be permitted a passage under this Part, shall be not less than 15 years old, except as a member of a family, nor more than 40 years of age, of sound mind, in good health, and of good character.

4. The following sums to be paid by the persons desirous of obtaining a passage-warrant prior to the issue of the same:—

5. The passage-warrant issued under this Part shall be valid for a period of nine months after date thereof, and if not availed of within that period may be renewed upon application to the Agent-General of Victoria in London, or the Immigration Agent in Melbourne, who may also permit other names than those specified in the warrant to be inserted, should the person or persons mentioned thereon after been filled in not be able from sickness or other causes to emigrate.

6. As soon as the names of the person or persons for whom a passage-warrant is desired can be ascertained the passage-warrant shall be properly filled in by the agent of the nominator, and forwarded to the Agent-General in London, with application for a passage, together with such certificate in regard to birth, age, and character as the Agent-General may require.

7. No immigrant introduced under these Regulations will be received into the Government dépôt except single females, who may be maintained during five days at the expense of the vessel conveying them.

8. Persons introducing other class of immigrants must therefore make provision for the reception of the persons sent for by them immediately on their arrival, as they will not be allowed to remain on board ship for more than five days from the date of arrival in Hobson's Bay, except single females, who will be conveyed to the Immigration Dépôt.

9. Previous to any passage being granted upon a warrant issued under this Part of these Regulations, an agreement shall be entered into between the agent of the nominator and the nominee or nominees, and which agreement shall be binding on both parties, that he, the agent, agrees on behalf of such nominator to engage such nominee or nominees for the space of twelve calendar months at a wage or remuneration as may be agreed upon and for such term of twelve months; which agreement shall be confirmed on arrival of the nominee or nominees in the Colony of Victoria by the nominator or his duly appointed agent and the person or persons obtaining a passage under warrant, in the presence of the Immigration Agent or other officer acting on his behalf for the time being; and failing such confirmations or renewal of the agreement before mentioned, the person failing or declining to do so, shall hold himself bound to repay to the Immigration Agent for the time being the amount of passage money which may have been paid for such person aforesaid.

SIR,

I have the honor to apply for a passage-warrant, under the 3rd Part of the Immigration Regulations, for the passage of persons whom I am desirous of bringing out to this colony from the United Kingdom, and whose names I am at present unable to specify, and, in consideration of such passage-warrant being granted to me, I undertake and agree in all respects strictly to abide and be bound by all the conditions of the said Regulations, and, on failure of compliance with any of such Regulations, I agree to hold myself bound to repay to the Government of the Colony of Victoria, at suit of the Immigration Agent for the time being, the amount of passage money and other expenses incurred in the introduction of persons brought to Victoria by virtue of such warrant; and I hereby appoint _____ as my agent in the United Kingdom duly authorized by me to enter into the agreement mentioned in the clause of the Regulations referred to, and whose act I hold myself bound to ratify and confirm.

PART IV.

1. Persons resident in the United Kingdom desirous of obtaining for relatives and friends a passage to Victoria may apply to the Agent-General of Victoria, or other duly appointed officer of Victoria, for passage-warrants, which will be granted under the conditions hereinafter mentioned, upon payment of deposits mentioned in Clause 10, Part II. of these Regulations.

2. The persons nominated shall be of sound mind, in good health, and of good character, and under 40 years of age, and subject to the inspection and approval of the Agent-General of Victoria, or other duly appointed officer, who may, if the persons nominated do not correspond with the particulars furnished to him when the application for a passage-warrant is made, or in reply to any enquiries made by him or deputy, reject such nominees at any time previous to embarkation.

3. If the nominee wilfully misrepresent particulars, or neglect to furnish full particulars respecting the persons nominated, and if any person disqualified by these Regulations be nominated, or if the warrant be transferred without the consent of the Agent-General of Victoria, the warrant will be cancelled and the deposit forfeited. Should, however, the nominee, from any legitimate cause, not be able to emigrate, the warrant may be transferred to another eligible nominee by consent of the Agent-General of Victoria.

4. It is to be understood that persons who obtain passages under this part of the Regulations will not have any claim for maintenance or lodging from the Government of Victoria after their arrival in the colony; but every facility will be given by the Government by the establishment of depôts in various parts of the country, for finding suitable and speedy employment for immigrants, to whom information and advice will be afforded by the Immigration Agent on their arrival in Victoria.

5. To those immigrants who have sufficient capital to enter at once upon the cultivation of the soil on their arrival, the Government will afford every facility consistent with the Land Laws of the colony to obtain land, and, whenever practicable, to allot contiguous blocks of land to persons desirous of living in the same locality.

6. No passage-warrant will be issued and no transfer of any warrant will be permitted in favor of or to any person who has already been in Victoria, or who may be either lunatic, idiotic, deaf, dumb, blind, or infirm, or who may have been the inmate of any prison or penitentiary.

7. When the persons to whom warrants may be granted are prepared to emigrate, notice must be given to the Agent-General of Victoria, Victoria Chambers, Victoria street, Westminster, who will furnish them with an embarkation order, and inform them of the name of the ship by which they are to sail, the date and order of embarkation.

8. Warrants not made use of within six months of date of issue will not be recognized, but may be renewed on application to the Agent-General of Victoria.

Warrants may be issued in favor of single males or families eligible under these Regulations who may be desirous of embarking in ships selected by themselves, on payment of the sums hereinafter mentioned. The persons named in warrants granted under this clause will be required to forward the same to the Agent-General of Victoria, in London, at the same time informing him of the name of the vessel selected, the port of embarkation, and the probable date of sailing, who will thereon, should he be satisfied that the nominees are eligible under these Regulations, issue an embarkation order, which will entitle the master, agent, or owner of any vessel conveying to the colony the persons represented therein to payment for the passage at the rate of £14 for each statute adult, which will be payable in the Colony of Victoria fourteen days after the arrival in Melbourne of the persons mentioned in such order, upon a certificate being obtained from the Immigration Agent that such persons had been duly landed at Melbourne, and that the conditions of the contract ticket and of the *Passengers Act 1855* had been complied with. A charge to the emigrant of any additional sum on account of his passage will cause forfeiture of the amount represented by the warrant.

PORTS AND HARBORS OF VICTORIA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Passengers, Harbors, and Navigation Statute 1865*, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council, by Proclamation published in the *Government Gazette*, may, from time to time, define the limits and boundaries of ports in Victoria, and frame rules and regulations for the governance and preservation of the said ports respectively, and for the regulation of shipping in the same; and also for the due protection and preservation and good government and management of all public wharfs, and may appoint officers to carry out and enforce such rules and regulations; and from time to time, in like manner, may alter, amend, or repeal any such limits, boundaries, rules, and regulations, and substitute others in their stead: And whereas, by a Proclamation bearing date the thirteenth day of May, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers vested in him by the above recited statute, did define the limits and boundaries of ports in the said colony, and did proclaim and declare that certain rules and regulations therein specified for the governance and preservation of the said ports, and for the regulation of shipping in the same, should be substituted for other rules and regulations formerly in force: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby repeal rule 92 of the rules and regulations contained in the Proclamation above specified, and do declare that the following rule shall be substituted therefor (that is to say):—

92. Steamers must proceed at moderate speed whilst navigating amongst the shipping in any port; and steamers navigating the river Yarra, when passing upwards, must slow their engines to less than half-speed when abreast of the Melbourne town boundary-post, and as soon as they arrive amongst the shipping must reduce their speed to not more than three nautical miles an hour.

Steamers proceeding down the river from the Melbourne wharfs must not proceed at a greater speed than three nautical miles an hour until below the wharfs and clear of the shipping, and thence to the town boundary-post must keep their engines at less than half-speed.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869*, it is amongst other things enacted that, notwithstanding anything therein before contained the Governor may by proclamation declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, shall cut, dig, or remove live or dead timber, or particular description of timber, or bark, stone, gravel, sand, loam, brick or other earth, from such portions of Crown lands as are named in such proclamation, or shall exercise on any such portions the powers, or any of them, conferred by any license granted under the authority of this Part of this Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power conferred by the above-recited Act, do by this my Proclamation declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, shall cut or remove live or dead timber from the Crown lands comprised in allotments 1, 2, 3, 4, 15, 16, 17, 18, 22, 23, and 24 of section 5, villege and nine-mile reserve, Horsham.

VICTORIA PILOT FUND.

GENERAL STATEMENT.

I am instructed that the amount standing to the credit of this fund is about £13,200 sterling, producing an income of £750 arising from interest, and £580 from other permanent sources, making together the sum of £1,330 of annual income.

That the number of pilots entitled to participation in the fund is, and is to continue restricted to 25.

The ages of the pilots at present entitled to the benefits of the fund, and their respective terms of service, have been furnished to me.

The fund has been in operation for 13 or 14 years; it is saddled with pensions to one widow, and temporary allowances to five children, of the deceased pilots, the particulars of which are also furnished in the papers submitted to me, and £50 per annum is to be set apart for the expenses of management. I am desired to propound a scheme for providing superannuation pensions to pilots who, having attained the age of 60, shall have become incapacitated for following their calling, and to the widows of pilots, whether their husbands shall have been previously superannuated or not, and yearly allowances to the children of pilots surviving their parents under and until they have attained the age of 15.

And I understand my instructions to be, that only such pilots as shall have completed a term of 10 years' service are entitled to be put upon the superannuation list, and that in the event of their decease previous to the completion of such service, their widows and children shall not be entitled to participate in the benefits of the fund.

I am further desired to provide a scale of retirement for pilots who, having served 10 years and upwards, shall be desirous of receiving a gross sum of money in lieu of all future claims on behalf of themselves, their widows, and children, and furthermore to make provision for a weekly allowance to such pilots on the fund as shall be temporarily incapacitated by illness from following their calling.

In certain of the papers forming part of the correspondence which has been submitted to me reference is made to a sum of money to be paid to the widow of a pilot on his decease; but judging from the whole tenor of the correspondence, and the course adopted in the case of the Widow Jones, I am led to infer that I shall best carry out the real intentions of the board by assuming that the provision to the widows is to be made by annual pension, and not in the form of death money.

If any cases should arise in which it may be thought advisable or desirable to commute the whole or part of such widows' pensions for a gross sum, there will be no difficulty in carrying out such arrangements, regard being had to the age of the widow, upon satisfactory evidence being afforded of her being in a good state of health.

I have given the whole subject my most careful and anxious attention, and after having turned it over in various ways and verified my conclusions by distinct modes of calculation, am satisfied that the scheme hereinafter set forth may, with due regard to all existing liabilities, and taking into equitable consideration the accrued rights and future claims of the present corporation of pilots, be safely adopted and carried into operation.

Some considerable elements of uncertainty arising from the change of conditions in the lapse of time are, however, unavoidable in the working of so elaborate a scheme extending over an indefinite period of time, and the experience of other funds of a like nature proves the vital importance of exercising a continual supervision over the actual working of any such scheme to avert the risk on one hand of pledging the fund to engagements at a long period which it may not be in a condition to fulfil, and on the other hand of accumulating an unnecessarily large reserve to the detriment of the just claims of the existing members.

I accordingly strongly recommend that the board should cause a report of the state of the funds to be made, say every 7 or 10 years, and submitted to a competent authority for his opinion whether it is working satisfactorily or not, with power to propose from time to time such changes or modifications as the gathered experience of its operation may indicate to be advisable; but although for greater assurance I recommend that the plan of revision should be adhered to as a fixed rule from the beginning.

I do not anticipate that any material alteration in the details of the scheme will be needed for a long time to come.

SICK ALLOWANCE.

£1 per week to be allowed to each pilot so long as he shall give satisfactory evidence to the board of being incapacitated, by reason of illness, from following his calling.

SUPERANNUATION.

On being placed, by reason of infirmity or other ground of incapacity, upon the superannuation list, each pilot shall become entitled to an annual pension, having reference to the period of his service according to the scale hereunder drawn out.

After 35 years of service such pilots as survive the ordinary risks of mortality, and still greater perils of the sea, will be pretty well worn out, and it is not, I think, expedient to offer them inducements to hold on to the service, to the exclusion of younger and abler men, by the prospect of any further augmentation in their retiring pensions. Not many can be expected to serve even so long as 30 years.

It appears, from official returns, that out of 138 deaths recently occurring in one twelvemonth at the different naval stations of the British fleet, 26 were occasioned by falling from the rigging, and no less than 85 by drowning.

Under 10 years of service no pension for superannuation is to be allowed.

PROVISION TO WIDOWS.

On the decease of a pilot, either in the exercise of his calling or subsequent to his being placed on the superannuation list, leaving a widow him surviving, such widow will become entitled to a pension, having reference to the term of service of her deceased husband according to the annexed scale:—

The above scale is subject to the proviso that the pension to the pilot's widow shall in no case exceed £40 per annum, unless she shall have been married to him 10 years or upwards at the time of his death or superannuation, whichever shall first happen; and shall in no case exceed £60 per annum, unless she shall have been married to him at least 15 years at the time of such decease or superannuation.

PROVISION FOR CHILDREN.

If a pilot shall die, leaving a widow and children, a capitation allowance shall be made in favor of the children, at the rate of £5 per annum to each child, until he or she shall have attained the age of 15 years, as long as the widow shall continue in existence. On her decease, should there be any children under the age of 15 years her surviving, the pension payable to the widow is to be divided into as many equal portions as there are children, and each such portion is to be continued as a yearly allowance in addition to the capitation allowance payable as aforesaid to each such child to be continued until the age of 15 is attained, but without benefit of survivorship between the children, and subject to the further proviso that no child shall in any case receive a larger allowance (capitation money included) than £15 per annum.

In the event of a pilot dying leaving children under 15 years of age, but no widow him surviving, the allowance to each child is to be calculated as if the pilot had died leaving a widow surviving him for a period of 24 hours.

As an example of the operation of this scheme of allowance to widows and children, take the case of a pilot who has served 12 years leaving a widow him surviving. During her life she will receive an annuity of £25 and an allowance of £5 per head per annum for each child under 15 years of age. If she should die leaving four children under the age of 15, each such child will become entitled to an annual allowance of £5 capitation money and a quarter part of £25, i.e. to £11 5s., until the age of 15 is attained; if there be only three such children such allowance will be at the rate of £13 6s. 8d.; if only two children under 15 survive both the parents, the annual income will be £15 to each until the age of 15, and the same if only one child survive.

RETIREMENT.

(In commutation of all future claims of a pilot on behalf of himself, his wife, and children.)

The scale for commutation retirement may be safely fixed at the rate of £22 10s. for each year that the retiring pilot shall have served, provided that his term of service shall have been not less than 10 years.

Thus for example.—At the expiration of 10 years the commutation for retirement will be £225, and at the end of 15 years' service £337 10s.

REMARKS.

In the above scheme provision has been made for continuing to the widows and children who are now in actual receipt of assistance from the fund their present allowances, which will be found considerably to exceed the allowances they would have become entitled to under the provisions of the scheme.

Having regard on the one hand to the existence of a reasonable anticipation on the part of the recipients of relief that these allowances would be continued at their present amounts, and on the other hand to its being desirable to avoid raising exaggerated expectations in the minds of the existing pilots which would not be realized, and might give rise to trouble and remonstrance hereafter, the board, if they should decide on reducing the pension and allowance to Widow Jones and the five children, might do so by striking a mean between the payments hitherto made to them and the payments that under like circumstances would be made to future claimants on the fund.

For instance; under the scheme, Widow Jones would have been entitled to a pension of only £20 per annum; she is in actual receipt of a pension of £50 per annum. The mean between these two sums, say a pension of £35 per annum for life (if she is still young) would probably be the means of obtaining for her a second husband.

The general question whether pensions to the pilots' widows should or should not cease or suffer diminution on their contracting subsequent marriages, may be left subject to the decision of the board who should, however, at once, lay down a fixed rule on the subject.

I recommend the above scheme for adoption by the Pilotage Board of the Colony of Victoria.

BEECHWORTH MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAWS.—[25th January 1870.]

At a Meeting of the Mining Board of the Mining district of Beechworth, begun and holden at Beechworth, in the said district, on the 25th day of January, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy; it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

BYE-LAW No. 46.—FRONTAGE CLAIMS.

1. When an alluvial claim exceeds forty feet in depth, and its drainage (if any) does not exceed twelve hundred gallons of water per diem, it may be occupied as a "dry frontage claim." If its drainage exceed twelve hundred gallons of water per diem, it may be occupied as a "wet frontage claim."

2. The dimensions of a frontage claim shall be determined as follows:—When the depth of a "dry frontage claim" from the surface to the bed-rock does not exceed one hundred feet, its length on the course of the lead shall not exceed thirty-five feet. When its depth exceeds one hundred feet, but does not exceed one hundred and fifty feet, its length on the course of the lead shall not exceed forty-five feet, and so on, adding ten feet to its length for every additional fifty feet of its depth. The number of such claims which may be amalgamated and held as one claim shall not exceed thirty.

3. When the depth of a "wet frontage claim" from the surface to the bed-rock does not exceed one hundred feet, its length on the course of the lead shall not exceed seventy feet. When its depth exceeds one hundred feet but does not exceed one hundred and fifty feet, its length on the course of the lead shall not exceed ninety feet, and so on, adding twenty feet to its length for every additional fifty feet in depth. The number of such claims which may be amalgamated and held as one claim shall not exceed sixty. When twenty or more of such claims have been amalgamated, it shall be lawful for the owners thereof to employ only one-half the number of men required by Bye-laws Nos. 8 and 20 of this board to represent such amalgamated claim, until the lapse of six months from the date on which the pump-shaft thereon was bottomed.

4. A frontage claim may have, provisionally, any width not exceeding one mile.

5. The length of a frontage claim shall be marked, provisionally, by conspicuous posts firmly fixed in the ground on the line of the supposed course of the lead. When the actual course of the lead has been ascertained by sinking, boring, or otherwise, the length of the claim shall be permanently marked as aforesaid on the line of such actual course, and the cross boundary lines laid off as near as possible at right angles to such line: Provided that the length of a claim shall not, after the boundaries are adjusted, be varied by reason of the depth of the lead being subsequently found to be greater or less than was computed at the time of fixing the length of such claim.

6. In order to determine the length of a frontage claim on the course of the lead, the datum of measurement shall be the depth of the shaft or bore bottomed on bed-rock on such lead nearest to such claim.

7. Six months after the date on which a lead has been found in a frontage claim, or amalgamated frontage claim, any person being the holder of a miner's right shall be entitled to demand the owner of such claim to reduce its dimensions laterally; if a "dry frontage claim," to a width not exceeding three hundred yards; if a "wet frontage claim," to a width not exceeding six hundred yards.

8. Within seven days from the date on which such demand shall have been made, the said owner shall erect, or cause to be erected, at each angle of the boundary lines of such reduced claim, a post not less than three inches in diameter, to be firmly fixed in the ground, and to extend not less than three feet above it, and shall define the angles formed by such boundary lines with V trenches, not less than six feet in length and nine inches in depth.

9. When any person shall be prospecting for a lead in alluvium exceeding forty feet in depth, frontage claims seventy feet in length may be provisionally occupied on the supposed course of such lead.

10. The owner of any such claim may defer the working thereof, without forfeiting it, until the supposed lead has been discovered, or the search for it by the prospectors abandoned: Provided he shall, on the day it is registered, post, or cause to be posted, a copy of the certificate of registration on the posts which mark the length of such claim on the supposed course of the lead.

11. When a lead has been discovered, all claims provisionally occupied on its supposed course shall be forfeited; but their owners shall be entitled to occupy in lieu thereof frontage claims, the dimensions of which shall be determined, if dry frontage claims, in the manner prescribed in section 2 of this bye-law, and if wet frontage claims, in the manner prescribed in section 3 of this bye-law; and such claims shall have the same relative number from the prospectors' claim as the claim provisionally occupied: Provided that where a claimholder shall have sunk a shaft two-thirds of the depth of the prospecting shaft previous to the discovery of the lead, he shall be entitled to retain the claim in which such shaft is situated, together with a number of adjoining claims equal to the number of men who shall have been *bona fide* employed in sinking such shaft.

12. In the event of the prospectors abandoning the search for such supposed lead, all claims provisionally occupied as aforesaid on its supposed course shall thereupon be held subject to the general provisions and conditions imposed under the bye-laws.

13. From and after the date on which this bye-law shall become law, Bye-law No. 14 of the Mining Board for Mining District of Beechworth shall be and is hereby repealed. Nevertheless, no existing right, interest, privilege, liability, or obligation shall be affected by the repeal of such bye-law.

The following extract from the Orders in Council of 3rd June 1867, relating to the duties of the mining surveyor under the bye-laws, is published for general information in connection with the above:—

"Upon receipt by a mining surveyor of a formal application for the survey of a mining tenement, if the same be situated in the division for which he is appointed, the mining surveyor shall enter in a proper book to be by him kept for that purpose, the particulars of such application, and each such entry shall be numbered in the order, and dated of the day and hour on which the formal application was received by him."

"At the time of the receipt of the formal application for survey, the mining surveyor shall appoint a time with the applicant or applicants for making survey of the tenement referred to in such application."

"Every survey of a mining tenement shall be connected with some fixed point in the survey of some other mining tenement, or in some government survey."

"Within fourteen (14) days from the date of the formal application for the survey of any mining tenement, the mining surveyor shall make a survey of the tenement, and shall furnish to the applicant or applicants, or his or their agent, a plan and a tracing of the tenement so surveyed, together with a report containing a full and accurate description of all the boundary, connecting, and other surveyed lines, and stating clearly the nature and locality of such tenement, &c., &c."

BYE-LAW No. 47.—WATER-GAUGES IN THE YACKANDANDAH DIVISION.

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in Bye-law No. 25, water-gauges in the Yackandandah division may be placed in races in such a manner that the gauge-box may have a fall not exceeding two inches in twelve feet.

EAGLEHAWK PUBLIC CEMETERY.
RULES AND REGULATIONS MADE BY THE TRUSTEES OF THE
EAGLEHAWK GENERAL CEMETERY.

ALL charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

2nd. Orders for interment to be given to the sexton at the lodge before four o'clock p.m. on the day previous to the funeral, if not an extra charge will be made.

3rd. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

4th. The usual hours for the performance of funerals will be from ten a.m. to six p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from ten a.m. to four p.m. in the other four months, except on Sundays, when the usual and only hours for funerals will be from two to five o'clock throughout the year.

5th. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug; but parties requiring brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of the trustees or their surveyor, and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent (in writing) of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.

6th. By the Act 27 Vict. No. 201, any person making a vault, or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees, and upon the payment of the proper charges, is entitled to have maintained and kept up a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons and his representatives for ever.

7th. Application for such permission to be made at the lodge at the cemetery; a certificate in the form of Schedule A will be granted to the party applying for such permission on payment of the proper charges.

8th. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones to be kept in proper repair and condition at the expense of the owner.

9th. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, slate, or iron.

10th. A drawing of every stone, tomb, fence, pedestal, and plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, and a copy of every epitaph or inscription, to be submitted to the trustees, who are empowered by the Act to withhold permission and prevent the erection of any monument which shall appear to them inappropriate or unbecoming, and who are required to determine and fix the position of any monument which may be preferred to be erected, according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner. In the erection of tablets copper cramps must be used; wooden fences will not be allowed.

11th. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on a certificate of minister of religion, or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relations and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

12th. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees shall be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

13th. A plan of the cemetery, showing situation of the purchased and other graves, is to be kept at the lodge and may be inspected there, and registers of all grants are kept by the sexton.

14th. The ground will be open to the public from seven a.m. to six p.m.

15th. Any person who wantonly or wilfully shall destroy, or do or cause to be done any damage to any grave, vault, monument, tombstone, buildings, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree, or plant, shall, on conviction before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit or pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding twenty pounds, or be otherwise dealt with as the Act provides.

16th. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations, but no such alteration shall be made without the consent of a majority of such trustees.

17th. The dimensions of ordinary graves will be as follows, viz.—Six feet deep, seven feet long, two feet two inches wide at the shoulders, with other parts proportionate; and in the event of a larger-sized grave being required, the undertaker must give notice thereof to the sexton six hours previous to the interment; in default of such notice the undertaker will have to enlarge such grave at his own expense.

6. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles at the time mentioned in the order, they will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from his account.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies as to the quality, the same to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final. In the event of the decision being against the contractor, the survey fees and expenses, if any, will be deducted as in clause 6.

8. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which, it will be procured by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 6.

9. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the person to whom the rations are due, or to the contractor in waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have power to reject such

10.
