## FURTHER PROROGUING THE PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA.

### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTEBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

**W**HEREAS by *The Constitution Act* it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria and, subject to the limitation therein contained, such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he may think fit; and also from time to time to prorogue the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he shall deem it expedient: And whereas the said Council and Assembly, called "The Parliament of Victoria," now stand prorogued until Thursday the First day of September next, and it is expedient to prorogue the same further: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, do by this my Proclamation further prorogue the said Parliament of Victoria from Thursday the First day of September now next ensuing until Friday the Thirtieth day of September aforesaid.

### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTEBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

**W**HEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon; and how such fees shall be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons; and it is directed that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons shall be published and all objections thereto shall be heard in the manner set forth in the One hundredth section of the said Act: And

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whereas all objections respecting the union of the commons hereinafter mentioned have been heard as directed by the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby unite the commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE UNITED FARMERS' COMMON OF BAGSHOT, GOERNONG, ELLESMERE, AND NOLAN, described in three several proclamations bearing date respectively the 15th day of October 1866, the 17th day of December 1866, and the 26th day of July 1869, and the Huntly Town Common described in three several proclamations bearing date respectively the 6th day of March 1865, the 8th day of June 1868, and the 19th day of April 1869, are hereby united.—(70.Y.17583.)

## COMMONS ALTERED, ETC.

## PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees shall be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons; and it is also enacted that the Governor may from time to time increase, and after one month's notice in the *Government Gazette* diminish, alter, or abolish any common heretofore or hereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of this Act; and nothing herein contained shall prevent the sale by auction or the leasing or licensing under this Act of any land comprised in any common heretofore or hereafter to be proclaimed: and it is also directed that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons shall be published and all objections thereto shall be heard in the manner set forth in the One hundredth section of the said Act: And whereas the prescribed notices have been duly published and all objections respecting the commons hereinafter mentioned have been heard as directed by the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase or alter (as the case may be) the commons hereinafter mentioned; in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

**DOMA MUNGI AGRICULTURAL AREA COMMON.**—The Farmers' Common for the use of selectors and lessees in the agricultural area of Doma Mungi, described in a Proclamation, bearing date the 18th day of October 1869, is hereby increased by adding thereto the allotments of land hereinafter enumerated, and comprising an area of 1216 acres, viz.: parish of Lilliput, allotments 1, 2, 3, 4b, 5b, 6b of section 1; and allotments 2a, 3, and 4 of section J.—(69.V.24251.)

**HEATHCOTE UNITED TOWN AND GOLDFIELD COMMON.**—The boundaries of the Heathcote United Town and Goldfield Common, described in four several Proclamations bearing date respectively the 19th day of November 1866, the 5th day of August 1867, the 26th day of July, and the 22nd day of November 1869, are hereby altered, and the unappropriated Crown lands comprised within the boundaries hereinafter described shall henceforth be and constitute the said common, viz.: Commencing at the west angle of suburban allotment 48 in the parish of Heathcote; thence east twenty chains ninety-eight links to the north-west angle of the Heathcote town reserve; thence N. 65° 55' E. one hundred and twenty chains to the north-east angle thereof; thence N. 24° 5' W. nine chains thirty-seven links to Mount Ida Creek; thence S. 74° 30' E. one hundred seventy-three chains thirty-two links to a range; thence S. 25° 34' E. thirty-five chains, more or less, to the Wild Cattle Creek; thence by that creek downwards to the north boundary of the land licensed under the 42nd section of *The Amending Land Act 1865* to John Jones; thence by the north, western, and southern boundaries of that land to a point on the prolongation of the line hereinbefore described as bearing S. 25° 34' E.; thence S. 25° 34' E. one hundred and sixty-eight chains, more or less, to a point on a line running parallel with, and ten chains north-westerly from the Major's line; thence by that line bearing south-westerly to McIvor Creek; thence by that creek upwards to the north angle of allotment 51 in the parish of Tooborac; thence by the north-western boundaries of allotments 51 and 52 bearing south-westerly to the west angle of the last-named allotment; thence by the north-western boundary of the Tooborac Farmers' Common, being a line bearing south-westerly sixty chains, more or less, to the Major's line; thence by that line bearing south-westerly to a point bearing north from the north-east angle of allotment 8 in the parish of McIvor; thence to the said angle of that allotment by a line bearing south nine chains, more or less; thence by the north boundaries of allotments 8 and 1 bearing westerly thirty-three chains thirty-four links; thence by the western boundary of allotment 1 bearing southerly to the Wild Duck Creek; thence by that creek downwards to a point bearing S. 43° 50' W. from the point of commencement; and thence to that point by a line bearing N. 43° 50' E. two hundred and fifty-six chains forty links: as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne. The bearings are from the true meridian.—(70.X.4329.)

## CUTTING, ETC., MURRAY PINE TREES WITHIN A CERTAIN AREA PROHIBITED.

## PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted that notwithstanding anything therein before contained, the Governor may by proclamation declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, shall cut, dig, or remove live or dead timber, or particular description of timber, or bark, stone, gravel, sand, loam, brick, or other earth, from such portions of Crown lands as are named in such proclamation, or shall exercise on any such portions the powers, or any of them, conferred by any license granted under the authority of this Part of this Act:—And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the Colony, bearing date the seventh day of March 1870, the cutting or removing any Murray Pine within a distance of ten miles of the Murray River was prohibited: And whereas it is expedient to extend such prohibition to the area hereinafter mentioned: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power conferred by the above-recited Act, do hereby declare, that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, shall cut or remove Murray Pine trees on or from Crown Lands within the area hereinafter described, viz.:—

Commencing at the intersection of the Ovens River by the southern boundary of the land proclaimed as aforesaid on 7th March 1870, the said boundary being a line running parallel with and ten miles southerly from the River Murray; thence by that line bearing westerly to the Broken Creek; thence by that creek upwards to the Melbourne and Beechworth road; thence by that road bearing north-easterly to the Ovens River aforesaid; and thence by that river downwards to the point of commencement: as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(70.X.16570.)

#### INSTRUCTIONS TO OFFICERS IN THE BRITISH POSSESSIONS ABROAD.

*Wages and Effects of Deceased Merchant Seamen.*

THE British Government have agreed with the Governments of France, Denmark, Sweden and Norway, and the North German Confederation, to deliver to their respective Consuls General in London the Wages and Effects received by the Board of Trade under the provisions of the *Merchant Shipping Act 1854*, of Seamen belonging to those countries who have died on board British merchant vessels, and these Governments have on their part agreed to deliver to the nearest British Consul the property of British Seamen dying on board their merchant vessels, or on shore in their territories.

The Officers are therefore requested to report to the Board of Trade the particulars of the deaths of such British seamen.

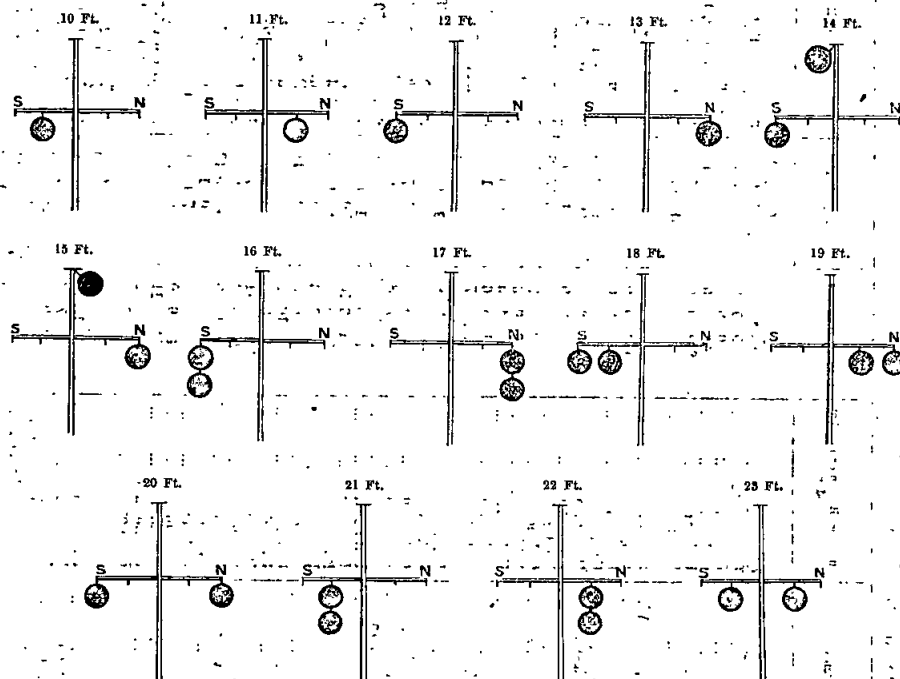

## TIDE SIGNALS

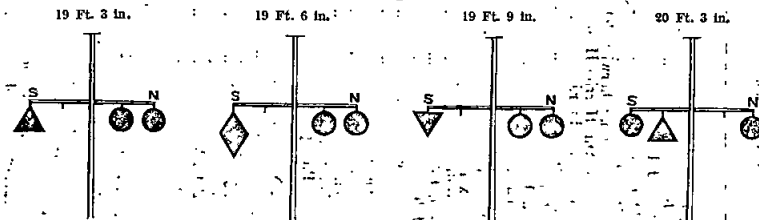
For the inner bar of Port Adelaide, as exhibited from the Pilot Station on the Beach on Le Fevre's Peninsula.

\* This calculation is made upon the population at the last census, instead of the present population, as there are no means of estimating the changes which have taken place in the different sub-districts since the census was taken. It is believed that the present population of the whole district of Melbourne and suburbs amounts to 180,000. If this be correct, the mortality of the month under review would indicate a proportion of 2.01 deaths to every 1000 persons living.

The deaths in July exceeded by 38 the numbers in June, and by 99 the average of July during the previous ten years.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 64.6° on the 16th and the lowest was 30.6° on the 13th. The mean temperature of the month (46.6°) was 1.4° below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (31.4°) took place on the 13th, viz.:—from a maximum of 62.0° to a minimum of 30.6°. The least range (5.0°) was on the 27th, viz.:—from a maximum of 49.5° to a minimum of 44.5°. The mean daily range was 16.2°. The mean atmospheric pressure (30.053 inches) was a fraction above the average.

Fifty-nine per cent. of the deaths were of males and 41 per cent. were of females. Thirty-nine per cent. were of children who had not attained their fifth year against 37 per cent. in July 1869, 44 per cent. in July 1868, 44 per cent. in July 1867, 40 per cent. in July 1866, 44 per cent. in July, 1865, 44 per cent. in July 1864, 45 per cent. in July 1863, 46 per cent. in July 1862, 50 per cent. in July 1861, and 48 per cent. in July 1860.

Four persons over 75 years of age died during the month, viz.:—A female aged 76, a male aged 78, and a male aged 80 of bronchitis, a male aged 88 of fatty degeneration of the heart.

Nineteen violent deaths occurred during the month, of which the following are the particulars:—A female child aged 5½ died from the effects of injuries received by being passed over by a dray; a miner aged 28 of injuries received by falling from a horse; a soldier aged 30 of injuries received by being knocked down by a cab whilst drunk; a carter aged 28 of rupture of the bladder; a carpenter aged 45 of the effects of a fall from a building; a female servant aged 22 of burns received at a fire in Bourke-street; a female aged 64 of burns; a boy aged 3 of poisoning by drinking soap-lye; a moulder's apprentice aged 16, a seaman aged 25, and a master mariner aged 25 of drowning (manner unstated); a seaman aged 21 of drowning, owing to the upsetting of a boat; an infant aged 2 days and an infant aged 6 weeks were suffocated by overlying; a boy aged 3 was choked by the seed of an orange; a new-born infant was murdered by suffocation; a female aged 40 was murdered by her husband; a barber aged 44 (insane) committed suicide by hanging; a plumber aged 50 (insane) committed suicide by cutting his throat.

Seventy-one deaths, or nearly 20 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—48 in the Melbourne Hospital, 1 in the Lying-in Hospital, 8 in the Benevolent Asylum, 11 in the Immigrants' Home, 1 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, and 2 in the Industrial Schools.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 141, of which 91, or 65 per cent., were of males, and 50, or 35 per cent., were of females; of those dying, 86 were under one year of age, 23 were between one and two years, 19 were between two and three years, 8 were between three and four years, and 6 were between four and five years.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 220, of which 121, or 55 per cent., were males, and 99, or 45 per cent., were females; 15 were between five and ten, 9 between ten and fifteen, 9 between fifteen and twenty, 14 between twenty and twenty-five, 20 between twenty-five and thirty, 19 between thirty and thirty-five, 23 between thirty-five and forty, 18 between forty and forty-five, 17 between forty-five and fifty, 17 between fifty and fifty-five, 14 between fifty-five and sixty, 15 between sixty and sixty-five, 16 between sixty-five and seventy, 10 between seventy and seventy-five, 2 between seventy-five and eighty, and 2 eighty and upwards.

The mortality from zymotic diseases was exceeded by that from constitutional and by that from local diseases. Nearly 56 per cent. of the deaths were set down to the latter class, the most fatal complaints being those of the respiratory system, which caused 87 deaths, and those of the nervous system, which caused 63 deaths. Under the head "Constitutional Diseases" 43 deaths were set down to phthisis, against 48 in the previous month.

## KEILOR PUBLIC CEMETERY.

## RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE KEILOR CEMETERY.

**A**LL charges must be paid when orders are given.

2. By the Cemeteries Statute of 1864, any person making a vault, or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the Trustees, under these rules, and upon payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep up such vault, monument, or tombstone according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons, and his and their representatives for ever.

3. Application for such permission must be made at the office of the trustees. A certificate of such permission in the form set out in Schedule B, will be granted to the party applying for permission, on payment of the proper charges.

4. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on the certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relations and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

5. Orders for interment must be given at the cemetery six working hours prior to the hour fixed for the funeral. No free interment will be allowed without the above notice.

6. The trustees will cause all ordinary graves to be dug; but parties wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of the trustees, and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent (in writing) of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.

7. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased must be stated at the time of giving the order.

8. The time fixed for the funeral must be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

9. Hours of interment from Ten a.m. till Five p.m., except in special cases, as where death is occasioned by any contagious disease.

10. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones must be kept in repair and proper condition by and at the expense of the owners.

11. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave must be bricked in, cemented and covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron; and every coffin in a private grave must have on the lid a lead or copper plate with the name of the deceased stamped thereon.

12. Plans of all proposed monuments or fences must be submitted to the trustees for approval.

13. A plan of the cemetery, and a register will be kept, and may be inspected on application.

14. The keeper has orders to turn out or take into custody (as the case may require) any person who shall behave indecorously, or commit any trespass or injury to the trees, flowers, or erections, or otherwise infringing the statute relating to the cemetery, or the regulations for the protection of the same, and such person will be proceeded against according to law.

15. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.

1. The whole of the articles required for the service of the Victorian Railways are to be in accordance with the samples and specifications, and in every respect to be of the very best description, quality, and manufacture, subject to the approval of the Engineer-in-Chief, the Traffic Manager, and the General Overseer of Locomotives. The Goods will be subject to the examination and test of an Inspecting Officer appointed by any of the above. The Government will not be bound to issue orders upon the contractor for all the articles enumerated in schedules, but only for such articles and such quantities of those articles as the Government may order from the contractor from time to time; neither will the Government be bound to take from the contractor any larger supply of any of the articles than the orders which have been issued during the year; nor will they be bound to take any of the articles enumerated in the schedules for which orders have not been issued. 3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or violated by the importation of stores for the Government service of the Victorian Railways, or by the exercise of the right to purchase reserved in the specification or the special conditions to any of the schedules, or by the purchase of articles manufactured in the penal or other Government establishments, or the manufacture of articles by the department.

4. Delivery, as a rule, is to be of the full quantity ordered at one time; but all deliveries must be accompanied with detailed invoices or bills of parcels in duplicate, showing quantity, rate, and value, also the number of the order for the goods, otherwise the goods will not be received. Delivery will not be deemed to have been made until the goods have been approved of.

5. In the event of supplies ordered under these contracts not being delivered within forty-eight hours, it will be competent for the Railway Storekeeper, on the order of the Secretary, to cancel the order and purchase the same, or such articles as may be suitable for the service, at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price will be deducted.

6. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly, in the pre-cribed form, and render the same to the Railway Storekeeper for certification, previously to payment at the Treasury.

7. 8. All rejected goods must be removed by the contractor within twenty-four hours after notice has been given of such rejection, and, if not so removed, the Railway Storekeeper is hereby empowered to send same to Melbourne, there to be stored at the contractor's risk and expense.

9. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the head of the department requiring the supply, as to the quality, the same is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the Government, and the decision of the board is to be considered final. Any expense incurred on account of the rejection of supplies by a board of survey will be charged to the contractor.

10. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged to the contractor.

11. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Railway Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

12. It will be competent either for the contractor, on his own behalf, or for the Secretary for Railways on behalf of the Government, to terminate the contract, by giving a notice in writing of three full calendar months to the opposite party, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made.

#### CONVEYANCE OF MAILS, 1871.

##### FIRST CALL.

In lieu of that published in *Gazette of the 19th August*, which is withdrawn.

TENDERS are hereby invited, and will be received until Noon of Wednesday the 12th October 1870, for the Conveyance of Post Office Mails as undermentioned, for one year, from the 1st January 1871 to 31st December 1871.

Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and may be forwarded (if by post, prepaid), addressed to the Honorable the Postmaster-General, with the words "Tender for the Conveyance of Mails" endorsed on the cover, or placed in the tender-box at the General Post Office.



Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender, and every tender will be taken to include the entire service as called for. The amount of the tender must be stated in words as well as figures.

Every tender must bear the *bond fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to twenty per cent. of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

The money deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, on the bond and contract being completed.

The money deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them on application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts, but not otherwise.

Persons tendering are requested to state the description of the vehicle they intend to use, and the number of horses by which it is to be drawn.

A separate tender must be sent in for each service; but notwithstanding this condition, any offer will be entertained for the performance of any number of services for a lump sum. The number of the service or services tendered for must be plainly endorsed on the outside of the cover.

#### BYE-LAWS OF THE MELBOURNE BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

##### OBJECT.

TO relieve the aged, infirm, disabled, or destitute of all creeds and nations, and to administer to them the comforts of religion. (1) By receiving and maintaining, in a suitable building, such as may be most benefited by being inmates of the asylum. (2) By giving out-door relief in kind to families and individuals in temporary distress. (3) By affording medical assistance and medicine, through the establishment of a dispensary or otherwise. (4) By affording facilities for religious instruction and consolation to the inmates of the asylum.

##### QUALIFICATIONS AND PRIVILEGES OF CONTRIBUTORS.

1. The following shall be life contributors:—Every donor of £20 or upwards in one year. Every person who shall raise £20 or upwards in one year, by one or more collections from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions towards such sum. The executor first-named in any will by which £25 or upwards is bequeathed to the asylum, on proving the will and paying the bequest.

2. Every contributor of £1 per annum, and every contributor of £10 in one donation, shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings at which he or she may be present; and every contributor of £2 per annum, and every contributor of £50 in one donation, shall be entitled to two votes; and every contributor of £5 per annum, and every contributor of £100 in one donation, shall be entitled to three votes.

3. No annual contributor "shall be entitled to exercise" any privileges as such till the subscription for the past year shall have been paid, and no new subscriber shall have the right of voting unless his subscription shall have been paid three months prior to the meeting at which such voting shall take place.

##### GENERAL COMMITTEE AND GENERAL MEETINGS.

4. The whole government of the asylum, subject to these laws, shall be vested in the general committee, which shall consist of twenty-two duly-qualified contributors, of which number one-fourth part shall be honorary medical men on the staff of the institution.

5. Annual general meetings of contributors shall be held in the city of Melbourne on the third Thursday in the month of January in every year, at such time and place as the general committee shall appoint, of which notice shall have been given in two or more Melbourne newspapers seven clear days before the day of meeting, to receive a report and balance-sheet from the committee; to elect members of committee, president, vice-presidents, treasurer, medical officers, and two auditors for the current year; and to transact any other business of which due notice shall have been given.

6. The president, the two vice-presidents, the honorary treasurer, and auditors, shall retire from office at the annual general meeting in every year, and if otherwise qualified shall be eligible for re-election.

7. The general committee may convene a special general meeting of contributors at any time, upon giving notice at least seven days previously in two or more of the Melbourne newspapers; which notice shall be repeated three times in each of such papers; and shall contain the particular subjects to be brought before such general meeting, and none other shall be discussed thereat. Any twenty contributors may request the committee to call a special meeting at any time, and should the committee, after receiving such requisition, signed by twenty or more contributors, refuse or neglect to call such meeting within seven days, then any twenty contributors shall have power to convene such meeting upon giving notice as directed above.

8. The committee shall have power to frame bye-laws and also regulations for the conduct of their own proceedings, and for the proper management of the asylum. Such regulations shall be binding on the committee, as on all officers and inmates of the asylum; provided always, that such regulations shall not be repugnant to any of these laws. The committee shall have power to enter into contracts for the supply of provisions and other articles for the use of the institution, and direct payment to be made thereof, and shall appoint and discharge all paid officers of the institution, and fix and specify their duties and hours of attendance.

9. The general committee shall meet at the asylum once in the week, or oftener if necessary, on such day and at such hour as they may appoint—four to form a quorum. The order of business to be as follows:—To receive the reports of the resident medical officer, superintendent, matron, and visitors; to decide upon the admission and discharge of inmates; to inquire into complaints, and to consider the reports; to see that the duties of the officers and servants of the asylum are duly performed, with power to appoint and dismiss resident medical officer, superintendent, matron, secretary, or other paid officers, and fix their salaries; also to direct the superintendent to hire and dismiss servants, nurses, and wardsmen; and to enter into contracts for the supply of provisions and other necessities, and to transact the general business of the asylum.

10. The president, or in his absence one of the vice-presidents, or treasurer, shall preside at all meetings of the committee, and in their absence the majority present shall appoint their own chairman, and the president or chairman shall have an additional or casting vote.

#### VISITING COMMITTEE.

11. A visiting committee, consisting of three members, shall be elected by and from the general committee, and shall hold office for three months.

12. It shall be the duty of the visiting committee to inspect the several wards from time to time, and, in conjunction with the resident medical officer, to ascertain if any of the inmates are in a fit state for employment or to leave the asylum, and to report thereon at the weekly meetings of committee; to offer any suggestions as to the necessary repairs, alterations, and improvements, and to examine the character and quality of the stores.

#### MEDICAL OFFICERS.

13. No one shall be eligible for the office of honorary physician who is not a graduate in medicine of some university of Great Britain, Ireland, Melbourne, or some of the Australian colonies; or who is not a licentiate or member of a college of physicians of the United Kingdom; or for the office of honorary surgeon, who has not received his degree in surgery from the University of Melbourne or some of the Australian colonies, or the diploma of the College of Surgeons of England, Scotland, or Ireland, or the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons at Glasgow.

14. The physicians and surgeons shall regularly consult on all cases of importance, or of protracted indisposition in the asylum; and when either the physicians or surgeons deem it necessary, they may call a full consultation of all the medical gentlemen connected with the establishment. The surgeons shall perform all the surgical operations necessary, but no capital operation shall be performed on any patient without a previous consultation of the physicians and surgeons, or at least one physician with the surgeons, excepting in cases of sudden accident not admitting of delay.

15. No one shall be eligible for the office of resident medical officer who does not possess the certificate of registration by the Medical Board of Victoria.

16. That every second year from and after the annual general meeting of contributors in January 1871, two of the honorary medical staff, namely, one physician and one surgeon, shall retire from office, and two shall be elected in their place; the medical officers so retiring from office shall, notwithstanding, be eligible for re-election, and for the first occasion named those retiring from office shall be determined by lot.

#### ELECTIONS.

17. Any candidate for election shall furnish to the secretary in writing, three clear days prior to the day of election, a notification of his intention to become a candidate for election, and if the number of candidates shall exceed that of members to be elected, or if less than the number to be elected be nominated, the meeting shall have power to nominate subscribers, and if more than those required to fill the vacancies be nominated the election shall be decided by ballot, to be taken on such day and at such place as may be appointed by the chairman between the hours of twelve o'clock noon and four p.m., such ballot to be conducted by a member of the committee and two scrutineers appointed by the meeting. In all cases of equal voting the member of committee conducting the ballot shall have the casting vote.

#### COMMON SEAL.

18. The common seal of the corporation shall be kept in a box with two locks and keys (one of which keys shall be kept by the treasurer, and the other by the secretary). The common seal shall not be affixed to any deed or instrument except by order and in the presence of the committee, and shall be verified by the signature of the treasurer and the secretary.

#### SUPERINTENDENT.

19. The superintendent shall, subject to the laws of the institution, and the regulations and orders of the committee, have the charge, control, and management of the asylum, and of the inmates and hired servants thereof.

20. Neither the superintendent nor the matron shall be absent from the asylum between the hours of ten p.m., and eight a.m., nor for more than two hours at one time, without permission of the committee, except on Sunday for three hours.

#### RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

21. The inmates of the institution shall be at liberty to receive religious instruction and consolation from the minister of the congregation or denomination to which they belong, at such times as the committee shall appoint. No. 1759
