## RULES AND ORDERS OF THE JUDGES OF THE SUPREME COURT OF VICTORIA UNDER THE "INSOLVENCY STATUTE 1865."

WHEREAS by the *Insolvency Statute* 1865, section 8, it is provided, that the Judges of the Supreme Court from time to time may make such Rules, Orders, and Regulations for carrying the said Act into effect, and also touching the form and manner of proceeding, as to them shall seem fit: Now we, the undersigned Judges of the Supreme Court, in pursuance of the said power, do make the Rules following, and declare that the Schedules thereunto annexed shall be read in connection therewith; and direct that they shall commence and come into operation from the First day of November next, and that from thenceforth all former Rules and Orders be repealed: Provided that all acts, matters, or things theretofore made, done, or effected under the said repealed Rules and Orders, shall be as valid and effectual as if these Rules were not made.

1. The Primary or some other Judge will sit every Thursday during the year, except in the interval from the 25th of December to the 31st of January, both inclusive, the times appointed for the sittings of the Full Court in Equity Appeals, the sittings of the Chief Judge of the Court of Mines, and the several holidays mentioned in the *Common Law Procedure Statute* 1865; and also upon such other days as the Primary Judge may appoint for special business; and the Full Court will hear appeals from a single Judge during the time appointed for Equity Appeals.

2. All applications under the Act to a Judge of the Supreme Court shall be made at Chambers, in the same manner as other Chamber business, upon summons to be issued and signed by the Judge's Associate; and such Judge shall have power to adjourn the hearing thereof to the open court.

3. The Associate of the Primary Judge shall attend the Court upon all sittings for the despatch of business relating to insolvent estates, and minute all proceedings, orders, and judgments of the Court thereon; and shall transmit, by delivery, messenger, or post, copies of such minutes to the Chief Commissioner and the District Commissioners respectively, who shall record all such proceedings, orders, and judgments, and, when required, shall have ready for reference the proceedings under his charge in any estate.

4. All affidavits intended to be used before the Court or a Judge thereof, not previously lodged with a Commissioner, shall be lodged with the Associate of the Primary Judge; and after the same have been used shall be in like manner transmitted to the said Commissioners respectively.

5. The said Chief Commissioner and District Commissioners respectively shall personally, or by some proper person authorized by them respectively, in writing, make all applications and reports to the Court or Judge required by the Acts to be made by such Commissioners.

6. All petitions, schedules, reports, and proceedings in insolvent estates shall be partly printed, partly written, on paper of the ordinary foolscap size, or on parchment; and the said Commissioners respectively shall keep and preserve them numbered; and when they are wanted for reference at any appeal, hearing, or proceeding before the Court, shall attend the said Court therewith, or transmit the same with a list thereof by delivery, messenger, or post, to the Associate of the Primary Judge, to be referred to as aforesaid; and the said Associate shall afterwards, in like manner, return the same to the said Commissioners respectively.

7. All process of the Court necessary for procuring the attendance of any person before the Court, or Judge, or Commissioners, in matters relating to insolvent estates (save in cases provided by the second Rule), shall be issued and signed by the Chief Commissioner or the said District Commissioners respectively, or by their respective clerks.

8. A summons to the debtor to show cause why his estate should not be adjudged to be sequestrated, shall, when the debtor is within Victoria, be served personally wheresoever it may be practicable; but it shall be lawful for the person who has obtained such summons to apply from time to time, on affidavit, to the Court or to a Judge, and in case it shall appear to such Court or Judge that

reasonable efforts have been made to effect personal service, and either that the summons has come to the knowledge of the debtor or that he wilfully evades service of the same, it shall be lawful for such Court or Judge to order that the person who has obtained such summons be at liberty to proceed as if personal service had been effected, subject to such conditions as to the Court or Judge shall seem fit; and in like manner, when the debtor is not within Victoria, it shall be lawful for such Court or Judge to provide some notice or substitute for service as to such Court or Judge shall seem fit: Provided that, in all cases where the debtor has been forty days absent from his usual place of residence or business in Victoria, copies of the summons shall also be inserted in three successive publications of the *Government Gazette*.

9. Any person summoned to show cause why his estate should not be adjudged to be sequestrated, shall, within four days after being so summoned, transmit by delivery, messenger, or post to, the Associate of the Primary Judge a statement in writing, signed by him, of any objection to the form, regularity, or substance of the proceeding, and of any facts alleged in the summons which he intends to dispute; and the Associate shall produce the said notice to any person requiring the same, and at the hearing of the summons all other objections shall be taken to be waived; and all other facts alleged in the summons shall be taken to be admitted by the person so summoned, unless the Court, under special circumstances, shall otherwise direct.

10. Upon the hearing of any such summons to show cause where facts are disputed, the proceedings shall be conducted in the same manner, as nearly as may be, as upon a trial of facts at law, according to the practice for the time being of the Court in its Common Law jurisdiction.

11. In case a Judge makes an order upon a debtor to show cause why his estate should not be sequestrated, grounded upon affidavits not conformable to the provisions of the *Common Law Procedure Statute*, the Court before which cause is shown may, at its discretion, make absolute the said order notwithstanding such want of conformity.

12. From and after the said First day of November, no surrender of any estate shall be accepted without a schedule filed by the petitioning debtor, duly signed and sworn to in the form appended to these Rules, except upon a special order of a Judge of the Supreme Court after examination on oath of the alleged insolvent debtor, or upon perusal of an affidavit filed by him satisfying the Judge that there is good reason to accept the surrender of the estate at once without such schedule being sworn to as regards all its details; and when any such special order shall have been made, the petitioning debtor shall prepare a schedule sworn to in the aforesaid form, and file the same in the office of the Commissioner in whose district the estate is to be administered, within such time from the date of the special order as the Judge may direct.

13. In cases of petitions for the voluntary sequestration of trust estates or partnership estates, the same forms shall be followed, as nearly as may be, as herein provided; and, as to partners, the forms shall distinguish joint and separate estates and liabilities.

14. The Chief Commissioner and District Commissioners respectively may, upon the written request of the Official Assignee or any creditor, require the insolvent to file within such time as he may fix a supplementary schedule, showing his transactions for any period not exceeding twelve months before the sequestration, with such particularity as he shall direct; that is to say, an account of all sums received by the insolvent or any one for his use, and when in particular, and from whom, and for what consideration; and an account of all sums paid by him or by his order, and of all property of every kind parted with by him or his order, and when in particular, to whom, and for what consideration; and the insolvent shall sign such supplementary schedule, and shall annex thereto an affidavit that the contents are true in every particular, to the best of his knowledge and belief.

15. In case of compulsory sequestration, the insolvent shall, within eight days of the order absolute, or such enlarged time as the Chief or District Commissioner may, either during or after the said eight days, appoint, file his schedule, in the form attached to these Orders; and shall also make the affidavit annexed thereto, so far as is necessary for verifying the same; and shall also be obliged to file and verify supplementary schedules, in the manner herein provided as to voluntary sequestrations.

16. Every insolvent, within three days after the surrender of his estate has been accepted, shall leave at or send by post to the office of his Official Assignee a note in writing, stating truly the place of his abode; and shall then, and from time to time, as shall be required by himself or his solicitor, furnish the Assignee with all information in his power touching his property, and the means of making the same available for his creditors; and the said Chief and District Commissioners, or their clerks respectively, shall distinctly communicate this Rule to the insolvent, and also the name and office of his Official Assignee.

17. All applications made to the Court to release estates from sequestration under section 42 of the said Insolvent Act shall be supported by, amongst other documents, an affidavit of a solicitor of the Court, stating the holding of the meetings therein referred to, the names of the creditors who have proved, and the value for which they have respectively proved, the names of the creditors attending the second meeting, the names and signatures of the creditors signing the testimonial in writing to the Supreme Court therein referred to.

18. All applications made to the Court to vary the refusal of a certificate under section 109 of the said Insolvent Act shall be supported by, amongst other documents, an affidavit of a solicitor of the Court stating the date of the refusal of the certificate, and of the appeal to the Court and the decision thereupon, the names and number of the creditors who have proved on the estate, and the sums for which they have respectively proved, and the names and signatures of the creditors requesting the varying of the refusal.

19. Before any Commissioner shall refuse or suspend a certificate to any insolvent he shall cause the objections to the granting of the same to be reduced to writing and kept among the proceedings in the estate, and such objections shall show with reasonable distinctness the misconduct attributed to the insolvent; and shall give the insolvent a reasonable time for answering the said charge by the evidence of himself or others and by the arguments of himself or his counsel or attorney: Provided that it shall be lawful for such Commissioner or the Court to refuse or suspend a certificate under special circumstances for grounds not stated in such objections.

20. The scale of charges for the conduct of business in matters of insolvency shall be the same as now in force in the Supreme Court in the Common Law side as far as the same may apply, and for all

business not comprehended within the above scale the like fees shall be allowed as are established by law or sanctioned by usage for the conduct of business in matters of bankruptcy in England.

21. The form of petition and of order of sequestration in the schedule hereto annexed shall be followed or shall be to the like effect, so far as circumstances will permit.

## PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTEBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Justices of the Peace Statute 1865*, it is amongst other things enacted that Courts of General Sessions of the Peace shall be holden in and for such places or districts within Victoria as the Governor in Council appoints; and the Governor in Council may from time to time define and appoint the limits and boundaries of the places or districts within which all such courts shall have jurisdiction respectively, and the places and times at which such courts shall be holden: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby appoint the Courts of General Sessions of the Peace at the undermentioned places, to be holden on the days hereinafter mentioned, for and in lieu of certain days appointed by a former Proclamation for the holding of the said courts, that is to say:-

At Jamieson, on Wednesday the twenty-sixth day of October, in lieu of the seventeenth of September 1870.

At Wood's Point, on Tuesday the first day of November, in lieu of the twenty-third of September 1870.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne this twelfth day of September, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy and in the thirty-fourth year of Her Majesty's reign.

## PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTEBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor may make and proclaim reserves for the preservation and growth of timber, and may from time to time, after one month's notice shall be given in the *Government Gazette*, alter and revoke any such Proclamation, and the Board of Land and Works may issue Licenses to cut timber upon such reserve or any part thereof on such terms and conditions, and subject to the payment of such license fee as shall from time to time be approved of by the Governor, and be set forth in such license: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby make and proclaim as a Reserve for the preservation and growth of timber, in accordance with and subject to the provisions of the 53rd section of the above-recited Act, the land comprised within the boundaries hereinafter described, viz.:-

Five thousand five hundred acres, more or less, county of Talbot, parishes of Maryborough and Bet-bet, being the unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries described as follow, viz.: Commencing at the intersection of the north-eastern side of the road from Maryborough to Timor by the north-west boundary of the borough of Maryborough; thence by that boundary bearing N. 45° E. forty-three chains, more or less, to a point bearing north from the north-west angle of the town reserve of Maryborough; thence north one hundred and four chains, more or less; thence S. 78° 45' E. forty-one chains, more or less, to the north-west angle of allotment 11 of section 1, parish of Maryborough; thence N. 11° 15' E. sixty-one chains fifty-two links to the north-west angle of allotment 6 of section 2; thence N. 78° 45' W. twenty chains, more or less; thence north two hundred and sixty-four chains, more or less; thence west ninety-four chains, more or less, to the road which forms the eastern boundary of allotments 1, 2, and 3, of section 5a, parish of Bet-bet; thence S. 12° W. one hundred and forty chains, more or less, and west twenty-seven chains, more or less, to the road which forms the east boundary of the town of Timor; thence by that road and a line bearing south one hundred and sixty chains, more or less, to the aforesaid road from Maryborough to Timor; and thence by that road bearing south-easterly to the point of commencement: as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(70.X.9836.)

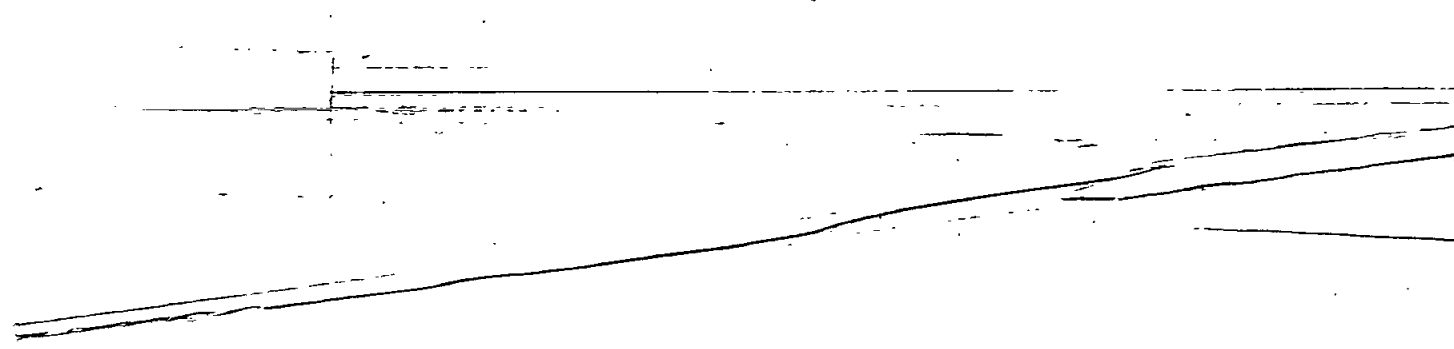
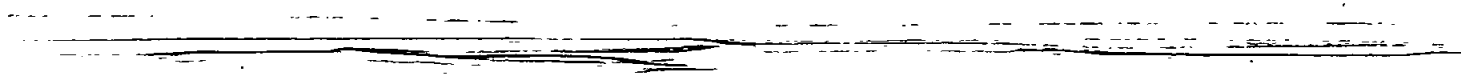

## COLAC PUBLIC CEMETERY.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE COLAC PUBLIC CEMETERY.

*Under 27 Vic. No. 201.*

**A**LL charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground is broken or a vault re-opened.

2. Any person or persons making a vault or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery by and with the permission of the trustees under these rules, and upon payment of the charges therein mentioned, are entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the tenor of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such persons and their representatives for ever.

3. Applications for such permission to be made at the office of the trustees. A certificate in the form set out in Schedule B will be granted to the party applying for such permission on payment of the proper charges.

4. Orders for interment to be given at the office of the trustees on the previous day, between the hours of Eight o'clock a.m. and Five o'clock p.m.

5. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug; but parties requiring brick graves or vaults must construct them under the direction of the surveyor to the trustees, or any other person appointed by them for that purpose; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent (in writing) of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.

6. The hour fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

7. Unless otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals will be from Ten o'clock a.m. to Four o'clock p.m.

8. No catacombs, or any wooden fencing allowed, without first submitting a plan for the approval of the trustees.

9. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

10. No servant or other person employed by, or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees, will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

11. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, is kept at the office, and may be inspected at the charge set out in the schedule.

12. Any person or persons who shall wantonly or wilfully destroy, or do or cause any damage to be done to any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree, or plant, will be proceeded against as directed by law, and is liable to a penalty of £20, or, at the discretion of the justice, to three months' imprisonment, and to the payment of all damages therefor.

13. No interment allowed in common graves at a less depth from the surface than six feet, and in vaults at less than four feet from the top of the coffin.

14. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these regulations.

# SHIRE OF BALLARAT.

## BYE-LAW No. IV.

A Bye-law for regulating the conduct of the officers and servants of the Shire of Ballarat and for providing for the due management of the affairs and proceedings of the Council of the said Shire.

THE Council of the Shire of Ballarat, by virtue of the powers conferred on them by the Shires Statute, doth hereby ordain that Bye-law No. I. heretofore existing be and the same is hereby repealed.

The council of the said shire doth further ordain Bye-law No. IV. to be in lieu thereof, that is to say:—

## GENERAL PROVISIONS.

1. The business of the council at all ordinary meetings shall be conducted with open doors, unless it shall become necessary to exclude strangers on account of their disorderly conduct.

2. The council shall commence business as soon after the time notified as there is a sufficient number of councillors in attendance to constitute a quorum as directed by law; but if at the expiry of an hour from the time specified there is not a quorum present no business shall be transacted by the council at the meeting, and the names of all councillors present shall be recorded in the minute book by the secretary.

3. The minutes of any preceding meeting not previously confirmed shall be read as the first business at all meetings of the council in order to their confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereupon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings.

4. After the signing of the minutes as aforesaid the order of business of an ordinary meeting shall be as follows, or as near thereto as may be practicable, but for the greater convenience of the council at any particular meeting thereof it may be altered by resolution to that effect:—

1. Reading letters received, and considering thereon.
2. Reading reports.
3. Payments.
4. Reception and reading of petitions or memorials.
5. Receiving deputations from ratepayers.
6. Orders of the day, including subjects continued from previous meetings, and any business the president may think desirable.
7. Other motions of which previous notice has been given.
8. Tenders.

5. Whenever a division shall be demanded by any councillor, the councillors voting in the affirmative shall first hold up their hands, and then those voting in the negative shall hold up their hands, and the result be declared by the chairman.

6. Every councillor present shall vote, except he be disabled by law from doing so.

## REPORTS.

7. No motion shall be made on any report of a committee or officer except that for receiving the same, unless under urgent circumstances, when by a separate motion the whole or part thereof may be adopted.

8. If in the report of a committee or officer there be distinct recommendations contained therein, it shall not be adopted until the sense of the council has been taken separately on each.

## PETITIONS AND MEMORIALS.

9. Every petition or memorial addressed to the council shall be in proper form, and be presented by a member of the council, who shall write his name thereon and be responsible for its being respectfully worded.

10. No debate shall take place upon any petition or memorial except as to its being received and taken into consideration as an order of the day, or at any future meeting, or if necessary that it be referred to a committee for their action or report.

## DEPUTATIONS.

11. Deputations from ratepayers wishing to be heard before the council in support of any petition or otherwise must acquaint some one of the councillors representing them, or the secretary, of their intended interview.

## ORDERS OF THE DAY.

12. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council; any business which the president may think fit to bring under consideration; and any matter arising out of the correspondence, reports, memorials, or petitions read or presented during the same day, if by special motion so ordered to be considered.

## MOTIONS.

13. All notices of motion shall be dated and numbered, and given by the intending mover to the secretary three clear days prior to the next meeting of council, and the secretary shall enter the same into the notice of motion book in the order in which they may be received.

14. No councillor shall make any motion initiating a subject for discussion but in pursuance of notice given as prescribed by the last preceding clause.

15. Except by leave of the council, motions shall be moved in the order in which they have been received and recorded by the secretary, and if not so moved shall be struck out.

16. No motion entered in the notice of motion book shall be proceeded with in the absence of the councillor who gave notice of the same, unless by some other councillor producing written authority from him to that effect.

17. The mover of every motion appointing a committee shall be a member of such committee.

18. Before any motion is put from the chair, in case the mover is not prepared with his motion in writing, the secretary shall take down the same in writing, and obtain the signature of the mover and seconder.

19. On any motion being put from the chair, the secretary may be required by any member to enter in the minute book the names of the councillors voting thereon, and specify whether such councillor voted for or against the motion so put from the chair.

## CALL OF COUNCIL.

20. It shall be competent for any councillor without previous notice to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any subject at the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such notice being carried, due notice shall be given thereof by the secretary to each councillor, by post or otherwise, of the day for which the order of the day or notice of motion for which such call is made is set down for consideration; and any councillor not in attendance when such order of the day or notice of motion comes under consideration, or not in attendance at the voting upon such question or any amendment thereof, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds for such offence, or such lesser sum as the justice before whom the penalty may be sought to be recovered may think fit: unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the council. The penalty shall be paid into and shall form part of the shire fund.

## DEBATE.

21. Every councillor, including the president, shall stand while addressing the council.

22. The president's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice.

23. Any councillor desirous of making a motion or amendment, or taking part in discussion thereat, shall not be interrupted, unless called to order, when he shall sit down until the councillor, if any, calling to order shall be heard thereon, and the question of order disposed of, when the councillor in possession of the chair may proceed with the subject.

24. Any councillor desirous of proposing an original motion or amendment must state the nature of the same before he addresses the council thereon.

25. No motion or amendment shall be withdrawn without the leave of the council.

26. The chairman shall, in taking the sense of the council, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative, and the result thereof shall be recorded in the minutes.

27. A councillor moving a motion shall be held to have spoken thereon, but a councillor merely seconding a motion shall not be held to have spoken upon it.

28. The councillors, in meeting of council, shall designate each other by their official titles, namely that of president, chairman, or councillor, as the case may be.

29. If two or more councillors rise to speak at the same time, the president or chairman shall decide which is entitled to priority.

30. No councillor shall speak a second time on the same question, unless entitled to reply, or in explanation when he has been misrepresented or misunderstood.

31. A councillor called to order shall sit down, unless permitted to explain.

32. No councillor shall use offensive or disorderly language; and every councillor so doing shall, upon being called to order by the president or chairman, apologise for such conduct, and withdraw such language.

33. Any councillor may of right demand the production of any of the documents of the council applying to the question under discussion.

34. The mover of every original proposition and amendment shall have a right to reply, immediately after which the question shall be put from the chair, but no councillor shall be allowed to speak more than once upon the same question unless permission be given to explain, or the attention of the chair be called to a point of order.

## AMENDMENTS.

35. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost another may be moved before the original motion is put from the chair, but upon any amendment being carried, it shall be competent for any councillor to move one other amendment thereon.

## PROTESTS.

36. Any councillor may enter his protest against any resolution of the council, provided any such protest is not inconsistent with truth or disrespectful to the council; notice of intention to protest must, however, in every case be given on the adoption of the resolution protested against, and the protest signed by the councillor or councillors protesting, and specifying the reason for protesting must be entered, before the next regular meeting of the council, by the protesting councillor in a book to be kept for that purpose in the secretary's office, and duly referred to in the minutes of the council, the same to be considered also as part of such minutes.

## STANDING ORDERS SUSPENDED.

37. A notice of motion may be dispensed with in cases of emergency where the council considers it necessary to do so, there being not more than two councillors absent at such meeting.

## TENDERS.

38. The security in all cases of contract shall be ten per cent, upon the amount of contract paid over by the contractor to the treasurer of the council, which amount shall be lodged in the bank with the other monies of the council, and only repaid to the contractor when he obtains a certificate recommending its return.

39. All contractors tendering for any works under this council and failing to take up his tender, if accepted by the council, without showing satisfactory cause, shall be disqualified for a period of twelve months from tendering for any works under the said council.

40. When two or more contractors tender for a similar amount for the same contract, the council shall decide by ballot to whom the work shall be let.

## APPOINTMENTS.

41. No election to any vacant office at the disposal of the council shall take place unless notice thereof be given in some local newspaper, and all salaries or allowances may or may not be fixed before calling for tenders or applications for such office,

as the council may deem most desirable, and further, all such appointments herein referred to may be made either by ballot or by open voting.

## BYE-LAW No. 30.

**BYE-LAW** of the Council of the Borough of East Collingwood, made under the 168th section and twelfth schedule of the Boroughs Statute, No. 359, for the purpose of adopting the parts, subdivisions, and sections of said twelfth schedule hereunder enumerated, and repealing existing bye-laws also hereunder described.

In pursuance of the 168th section of, and the twelfth schedule to, the Boroughs Statute, the Council of the Borough of East Collingwood ordain as follows, that is to say:—

The subdivisions 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 11 of the 1st part.

Sections 1, 3, 5, and 6, subdivision 1, of the 2nd part,

Subdivisions 1 and 2 of the 4th part,

Subdivisions 1 and 2 of the 7th part,

Subdivisions 1, 2, 3, and 4 of the 9th part,

Subdivision 4 of the 10th part, and

Subdivision 1 of the 11th part of the said twelfth schedule of the Boroughs Statute are hereby adopted in and for the said Borough of East Collingwood.

The following bye-laws heretofore existing are repealed, that is to say:—

Bye-law No. 3.—To prevent accidents from fires in chimney flues, and to cause water drawers to give prompt aid at fires.

Bye-law No. 4.—For the regulation and government of licensed porters, public carriers or carters, water drawers, butchers, builders, and nightmen; and for the registration of owners of unlicensed carts, common lodging-houses, skittle grounds, bowling alleys, and public ball rooms.

Bye-law No. 5.—For conducting of public meetings and elections of the ratepayers of East Collingwood Municipality, determining the validity of disputed elections, the election of the chairman of the municipal council, and in his absence a chairman for the time being, and for regulating the mode of accepting and resigning membership of the municipal council.

Additional bye-law No. 6.—To enforce observance of standing orders 13 Victoria No 15.

Bye-law No. 7.—To authorize the Municipal Council of East Collingwood to change one or more of two or more streets bearing the same name, and to name streets not now named, and streets which may be hereafter formed within the Municipality of East Collingwood.

Bye-law No. 8.—For the preservation of the footways, water-courses, &c., of public streets and thoroughfares, &c., of the East Collingwood Municipality.

Bye-law No. 9.—To authorize the Municipal Council of East Collingwood to apply the legislative grant of £5000 to East Collingwood, in the purchase, jointly with the Government, of a site for public buildings; towards the cost of forming a catchwater drain from Nicholson street to the Merri Creek; and in the forming and metaling and finishing certain streets; and in the execution of other works.

Bye-law No. 10.—For disqualifying members of the Municipal Council of East Collingwood who may have any beneficial interest directly or indirectly in any contracts with such council.

Bye-law No. 13.—To amend bye-law No. 4, for the regulation and government of nightmen plying for hire within the municipal limits of East Collingwood.

Bye-law No. 15.—To regulate by means of standing rules and orders the proceedings of the Municipal Council of East Collingwood, except the following sections:—

Section 53.—That every committee, at the first meeting after their appointment, shall elect one of their number to be chairman for the municipal year, and in his absence shall elect a chairman for the time being. At such first meeting the day and hour at which the committee will meet weekly, or when required, shall be decided on.

Section 54.—That if there shall not be a quorum of members present within one quarter of an hour after the time fixed for the meeting, the chairman may adjourn the meeting of the committee to a future day.

Section 55.—That all questions shall be decided by a majority of votes, exclusive of the chairman, and wherever the votes are equal, the chairman shall have the casting vote.

Section 56.—That the council shall, if they think fit, on the requisition of any member, discharge him

from serving on a committee, and substitute another member for the same, and shall fill up all vacancies in committees.

Section 67.—That the mayor shall be at liberty to attend any committee upon which he is not a member, without voting; but he shall be a member and chairman of the Finance and Rate Committee, and also of the Legislative Committee, if he desire to be upon the latter.

Bye-law No. 18.—To repeal so much of bye-law No. 4 as relates to stands for carter, and to enact other stands for carter in lieu thereof, under 18 Victoria No. 15.

Bye-law No. 19.—For empowering the chairman of the Municipal Council of East Collingwood, from and after the date hereof, to take elections by ballot to supply vacancies from time to time in the Municipal Council of East Collingwood.

Bye-law No. 20.—For rescinding clauses 12, 13, and 15 of bye-law No. 5, for conducting of public meetings and elections, and so forth.

Bye-law No. 24.—For prescribing materials to be used in their construction, and the height at which to be erected awnings so required upon and over the footways, and for preventing external projections from or before buildings in the public streets and thoroughfares in the municipality.

Bye-law No. 25.—To prohibit buildings or erections in the municipality, and to authorize the removal of those already erected, consisting partly or wholly of cotton, linen, wool, or other fibrous materials, except such erections be not less than twenty feet from any other building.

Bye-law No. 26.—To enforce uniformity on the inner side of footways of public streets and thoroughfares of the municipality—severally or jointly laid out, surveyed, or proclaimed; upon the erecting buildings, posts, fences, or other inclosures on the inner or boundary line of such footways or streets; and for the removal of any such encroachments within the boundary line of such streets to which this bye-law may apply.

Bye-law No. 27.—To provide for the publication of fares of cabs, omnibusses, and other vehicles licensed to convey passengers, and for the arrangement of such conveyances on the public carriage-ways.
