Not exceeding ten words ... Two shillings.

## PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and Baron BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament of Victoria, passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, called *The Weights and Measures Statute 1864*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council, at the request of and pursuant to any agreement made by the councils or boards of any two or more of any adjoining boroughs, shires, and road districts, may proclaim such boroughs, shires, and districts to be a "Union" for the purposes of the said Act, and by such Proclamation fix the proportion in which the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act shall be borne by the several bodies corporate of such boroughs, shires, or districts: And whereas the Councils of the Borough of Stawell and Shire of Stawell have requested that the said borough and shire may be proclaimed a "Union," and that the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act may be borne in the proportion of two-thirds by the Borough of Stawell and one-third by the Shire of Stawell: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the Borough of Stawell and Shire of Stawell to be a "Union" for the purposes of the said Act, and do fix the proportion in which the expenses devolving upon such union under the said Act shall be borne by the Councils of the said Borough of Stawell and Shire of Stawell, as follows:—

Two-third by the Council of the Borough of Stawell and one-third by the Council of the Shire of Stawell.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-fourth day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy and in the thirty-fourth year of Her Majesty's reign.

# QUARTERLY REPORTS OF INSPECTORS OF SHEEP.

I HAVE the honor to report on the state of the Ballarat district during the quarter ending 30th September 1870.

During the past three months there has been no fresh outbreak of scab, and with the exception of Barton Station and a selection on the Mount William Run, I believe at the present time there is no scab in this district, and that immediately after shearing I shall be able to recommend that the whole district be declared "a clean district," by placing the above-named runs in quarantine.

Shearing has been considerably delayed by the recent floods, but will become general during the present month.

I HAVE the honor to furnish you with a Report of the state of my district on the 30th of September as regards Scab, in accordance with the 12th section of the Act. And to state that I have four stations under license, namely, Porpunka, number of sheep licensed 400, which the owner has since killed, the station has now no sheep on it; Happy Valley, owned by Mr. Woodside, 4000 sheep; Mr. Box, Barwidgee, 3600; Mr. Robinson, Myrtle Creek, 10,596. Mr. Box, of Barwidgee, has been fined £15 and 5s. costs for neglecting to brand his licensed sheep with the letter S. Josep Paul, a butcher at Myrtleford, has also been fined £10 and 5s. costs for dipping 42 sheep without either obtaining a scab license or a permit to dress.

I HAVE the honor, in accordance with your instructions in relation to the 12th section of the Scab Act, to show the state of the district in reference to scab, so far as it is known to me at this date. There are now 7,500 licensed sheep under the old Act, and 64,487 licensed sheep under the new Act in this district, making a total of 71,987. The disease extends over twelve stations and four farms.

The condition of the district with regard to scab is satisfactory, except in the south-west portion on the Adelaide border. As soon as the local board is appointed it is expected that the operation of the Act will have a very salutary effect.

I HAVE the honor, in accordance with section 12 of the Act, to send you a Return of the licenses issued and fines inflicted for the quarter ending this day.

I am sorry to report that a good deal of scab exists in this district in various parts, and that a small flock of very badly infected sheep passed from Cressy to Inverleigh about the end of July, shortly after the Act came into force. How the flock-owners in the neighborhood could have allowed these sheep to get into the state they were in without noticing it surprises me. These sheep passed down the road without any one of the settlers on either side of the road troubling themselves to go and look at them; and a flock of Mr. John Galletly's camped for three days on the very ground that this infected flock had only left about twelve days previously. I brought Mr. Galletly to court for refusing to comply with the Act, but the Bench of magistrates dismissed the case, giving costs against me. However, the matter has been sent for the opinion of the Hon. the Attorney-General. I am sorry to say I do not think the Act will work well. In the first place too little notice was given of the great changes, and no one was prepared for them. The present wet season is all against dipping, rendering it in many instances useless. One of the greatest faults I find in it, is that the inspector has to prove when the owner of the sheep infected with scab was aware of the infection; and with small farmers, &c., that really in most cases know nothing about it and employ no hired labor, it will be impossible to prove that they did know anything about it previous to the inspector going to them. There are several more objections but I will not now trouble

you with them. I hope a board of advice for this district will soon be appointed, so that there will be some one to consult with on matters of importance.

I have the honor to state that in consequence of the fences on the Major's Line Station being very inferior, I considered it necessary to have all the sheep shepherded on that station. In two instances, Mr. Jeffreys, of Burnewang, and Mr. Winter, of Colbin Albyn, did not comply with the Act, Mr. Jeffreys not branding with letter S, and Mr. Winter neither dipping or branding. In consequence of the continual heavy floods, and a court of petty sessions being held only once a fortnight in that locality, I have not been able to prosecute these cases yet, but they will come on at the next court. As the rain has been almost continual, and the ground in many parts of the country so boggy that a horse could not go through it, ever since I came into this district, I have found it impossible to make as thorough an examination of sheep as I wished, but I am surprised to find that the majority of the infected sheep in this district are running on the flat and comparatively open lands, where I trust there will be very little difficulty in getting rid of it under the present Act.

IN compliance with the 12th section of *The Scab Act* 1870, I have the honor to transmit you the following Report for the Quarter ending this day.

At the time *The Scab Act* 1870 was assented to, there were scabby sheep on two stations in the Wimmera scab district, viz., Narraport and Barton.

The diseased sheep at Narraport were sheep purchased on the lower Glenelg, April last, and must have been scabby when they left that district, though the disease did not show itself until their arrival at Narraport. At Barton the sheep had been scabby for some time in one paddock, and in the end of July and beginning of August the disease made its appearance in two other paddocks.

The 36th and 47th sections of the Act not having been complied with at Narraport, I prosecuted for breaches of these sections, but the cases were dismissed, the court ruling that the license held under the Act No. 231 was a protection. The 36th and 47th sections, prior to the hearing of the cases, were complied with. The dressing used was lime and sulphur, which checked the disease greatly; a cure (from almost constant rain and wet state of the country the sheep had to travel over) could hardly have been expected; the dressing off the shears will test it.

At the time of my visit to Barton, in August last, every effort was being made to cure the sheep; since then that station being intersected by the common boundary of Ballarat and Wimmera has been all transferred to Ballarat. Hood of Barton was fined £5 for a breach of the 47th section.

I am glad to say, scab has not as yet spread to any of the other stations in the Wimmera district.

## ARARAT MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAW No. 1.—REGULATING QUARTZ MINING IN THE ARARAT MINING DISTRICT.—[Dated 30th August 1870.]

**A**T a Meeting of the Mining Board of the Mining District of Ararat, begun and holden at the Mining Board Room, Ararat, in the said district, on the thirtieth day of August, One thousand eight hundred and seventy, it is ordained by the said Board as follows, that is to say:—

1. *Marking off claims.*—All claims must be marked off at each corner by a post, and the boundary lines meeting at each post shall be as near as practicable at right angles to each other; the length of all claims shall be with the course or supposed course of the reef, and all reefs or veins of quartz within the said claims shall be the property of the holders thereof.

2. *Boundary posts.*—The corner posts of all claims shall be at least three (3) feet above the surface; they must be firmly fixed in the ground, and kept visible during the working of a claim or while it is held in possession. In places where it is impossible to keep wooden posts standing to define boundaries, in consequence of the same being situated on public roads, an iron peg firmly driven into the ground shall be a sufficient definition of boundaries; where iron pegs are placed instead of wooden posts to define boundaries, their position must be shown at once to any person wishing to know the same, and all corner posts, if made of wood, must be painted white within twenty-four (24) hours after marking out such claim.

3. *Prospecting claims.*—Any miner or miners prospecting for or discovering a quartz reef shall be entitled to hold in length three hundred (300) feet along the course or supposed course of the reef by a breadth of eight hundred (800) feet.

4. *Extended prospecting claims.*—Any number of miners not exceeding twenty (20) prospecting for a quartz reef not less than a quarter of a mile from any known reef at work at the time of marking out, shall be entitled to mark off and hold as a prospecting claim an area of sixty (60) feet, in length along the course or supposed course of the reef for each shareholder by a breadth of eight hundred (800) feet.

5. *Ordinary claims.*—In ordinary claims each miner shall be entitled to hold in length fifty (50) feet along the course or supposed course of the reef by a breadth of six hundred (600) feet, but no ordinary claim shall exceed six hundred (600) feet in length.

6. *Registration.*—Within six (6) days after taking possession of a claim, prospecting or ordinary, application in the form of Schedule A hereto annexed shall be made to the mining registrar for the registration thereof.

7. *Claims to be worked in a bonâ fide manner.*—Within six (6) days after taking possession of any claim the owners thereof, or as many of them as can from time to time be properly employed thereon, shall *bonâ fide* proceed to work and continue to work upon such claim by themselves or their agents or servants according to the usual course and practice of efficient mining, and any such holder neglecting to work and to continue to work as aforesaid, either personally or by substitute, shall be deemed to have forfeited his share or interest in and to such claim, nevertheless the title to any claim, share, or interest, shall not be invalidated by reason of such claim being worked by a smaller number of men than are registered in respect of such claim, or by reason of the work being done by contract, hired labor or otherwise, provided such claim be worked efficiently.

8. *Efficient mining.*—For the purposes of this bye-law efficient mining shall be the employment of such appliances and such a number of men as shall be necessary to carry on the work at its various stages with reasonable expedition, nevertheless within three (3) months after the discovery of a payable reef every share shall be fully represented, or the share or shares unrepresented shall be deemed liable to forfeiture.

9. *Liability of shareholders.*—If any shareholder should neglect to have his interest represented as required by the provisions of this bye-law, a majority of the other shareholders may have his place supplied by a competent miner, and such shareholder shall be responsible for any reasonable wages to the person so employed. Any shareholder who fails to contribute the proportion of working expenses, or of his share of labor due on any claim in which such shareholder is interested, within one week after receiving written notice from the rest of the shareholders, or some agent appointed by them, shall render his interest liable to forfeiture, but no claim or part of a claim shall be taken possession of by any claimant, for the same until an order by a competent court has been issued authorizing such possession.

10. *Amalgamation of claims.*—Any number of adjoining claims on the same line of reef may, provided the length of such claims taken together do not exceed four hundred (400) yards, be amalgamated by the holders thereof posting near the centre of the claims so amalgamated, a notice stating the registered numbers and extent of such claims, provided that not less than one miner for every two hundred (200) feet be employed thereon; claims so amalgamated must be worked *bonâ fide*, the amalgamation of such claims must be registered. This clause does not apply to extended prospecting claims.

11. *Suspension of work.*—Any miners who have done three (3) consecutive months' *bonâ fide* work in a claim, may obtain from the registrar a certificate (in the form of the schedule hereunto appended) authorizing suspension of work in said claim for any period not exceeding three (3) months; previous to a subsequent suspension being allowed, three (3) additional consecutive months' *bonâ fide* work must be done on the claim. No certificate shall be granted if the holders of the greater part of the interest in a claim are opposed thereto. The provisions of this clause shall not apply to claims amalgamated under clause ten (10) of this bye-law or to prospecting claims.

12. *Suspension on the water-level.*—The holders of any claim who strike the water in such quantities as to prevent the continuance of work shall be entitled to receive from the registrar a certificate (in the form of the schedule hereunto appended) authorizing suspension of work for three (3) months, and such certificate shall be renewable from time to time until the claim is sufficiently drained to enable work being proceeded with, but no such renewal of certificate of suspension shall be granted, unless all reasonable exertions have been made to overcome the water.

13. *Exempted lands.*—In accordance with the provisions of the 13th section of *The Mining Statute 1865*, any holder of a miner's right, or a consolidated miners' right, wishing to occupy for mining purposes any land held under a business license, or other lands which, as in that section provided, may cease to be exempt from mining, shall be allowed to occupy the same by paying compensation to the parties in possession the amount of such compensation—to be determined in the following manner, viz.:—The occupier under a business license or otherwise shall appoint one arbitrator, the person wishing to mine shall appoint one, and the said two so appointed, before proceeding to an arbitration, shall appoint a third arbitrator, and the decision of any two of such arbitrators shall be final.

14. *Quartz reefs in alluvial claims.*—Should a quartz reef be discovered in an alluvial claim, the owners of the claim may work such reef subject to all the provisions of this bye-law; but should the working of the alluvial part of the claim be neglected or given up, all the excess over and above the legitimate extent of the quartz claim shall be deemed to be forfeited.

15. *Claims to be numbered.*—All claims shall be numbered consecutively on either side from the prospecting claim, which shall be numbered one (1).

16. *Suspension whilst procuring machinery.*—Claimholders shall be entitled to receive from the registrar a certificate (in the form of the schedule hereunto appended) authorizing suspension of work whilst procuring machinery, which must be done in a reasonable time, or the claim shall be liable to forfeiture.

17. *Claims dependent on machinery.*—Should the machinery, upon which any claim is dependent for assistance, be disabled or stopped from working, the holders of such claim shall be entitled to suspension from work until the machinery is repaired, or the working of it renewed. Holders of adjoining claims, who have worked out the level such machinery is drawing water from, may suspend work until the owners of the machinery have completed the sinking of their shaft to a lower level.

18. *Tunnels and tramways.*—Any person cutting a tunnel, or laying down a tramway, for the greater convenience of working a claim, may hold possession of the same, together with a wall of six (6) feet on each side thereof, provided the same does not impede the working of the claim of any other person, or obstruct any road in ordinary use.

19. *Protection to stocked quartz or tailings.*—Persons wishing to retain possession of any quartz or tailings he may possess, the produce of his own claim or of his own machinery, may do so for twelve (12) months by registering the same with the registrar.

20. *Sites of dams, &c., proving auriferous.*—When the site occupied by a dam, tunnel, tramway, race, stacked quartz or tailings shall prove auriferous, it may be mined upon, but any person before commencing work upon such site shall compensate the owner for any injury that may be sustained thereby. The mode of determining the amount of compensation shall be the same as enacted in clause thirteen (13).

21. *Sludge.*—Where machinery is employed an embankment for the purpose of retaining the sludge must be constructed, except the sludge can be more conveniently carried off by drainage without injury to any other person.

22. *Roads to be bridged.*—When sludge or water runs across any road in general use, a substantial bridge, not less than sixteen (16) feet in width, must be constructed and kept in repair by the owners of the claim from which such sludge or water proceeds.

23. *Forfeiture of claims or interests.*—Non-compliance with the provisions of clauses numbers nineteen (19) and thirty-one (31), and the obtaining by false representations a certificate from the registrar authorizing suspension of work, and the non-resumption of work after the expiry of the time allowed for suspension, shall render the claim or interest affected liable to forfeiture.

24. *Non-forfeiture through neglect of hired workmen.*—No registered interest shall be forfeited through neglect on the part of any hired miner, or contractor, or agent; provided that after seven (7) days' notice, in writing, of such neglect to the owner or his agent, the owner's interest be fully represented in conformity with this bye-law.

25. *Effacing notices or removing pegs.*—No person shall efface, alter, remove, or destroy any notice posted on a claim or willfully remove the posts or pegs thereof.

26. *Plurality of shares.*—Any holder of a miner's right may hold one or more shares in any number of claims; provided each claim be represented in accordance with this bye-law, but no person shall be entitled to mark off more than one claim on any reef until the claim last marked off by him be abandoned or shall have been worked in a *bonâ fide* manner at least four (4) days.

27. *Protection to mortgagees.*—Any person having an interest in a claim or share by way of lien or mortgage, his interest shall not be liable to forfeiture by non-compliance with this bye-law on the part of the lienor or mortgagor, or their agent or representative; provided he the lienor or mortgagee has the said in-

terest represented within thirty (30) days after receiving notice from the other owners of the claim, or from any person desiring to take possession of the interest so lien or mortgaged.

28. *Registration.*—All interest in quartz claims, all mortgages, liens, or encumbrances thereon, the discharge of any such mortgages, liens or encumbrances, and the sale of any shareholder's interest under the decree, judgment, or order of any court, or the decision of a warden, must be registered.

29. *Insolvency, &c.*—In the event of the insolvency, lunacy, or death of any shareholder, it shall be incumbent on his partner or partners to register the same with the mining registrar.

30. *Penalties for infringements.*—Any infringement of this bye-law not involving forfeiture, shall subject the person so offending to the penalty specified in the 237th section of *The Mining Statute 1865*.

31. *Agent to be appointed.*—Any person holding an interest in any claim shall, in case of absence from the locality, appoint an agent whose acts shall be held as those of his principal, and whose name and address must be registered with the registrar of the division in which such interest is registered.

32. *Scale of fees.*—The scale of fees to be paid to the mining registrar for the purpose of defraying the expenses of registration mentioned in this bye-law, shall be as follows:—

33. *Non-forfeiture of claims of special value.*—Claims on which an expenditure of One thousand pounds (£1000) has been incurred for labor and machinery, shall not be forfeitable under any circumstances, unless the claimholders fail to comply with the provisions of this bye-law within seven (7) days of their receiving notice, in writing, from any minor or miners stating their intention to take possession.

34. *Oversized claims.*—Any person marking off or holding a claim larger than he is entitled to, the person or persons who may be by a competent court put in possession of such excess of ground shall be allowed to choose from which end of the claim it shall be taken.

35. *Abandoned shares, claims, or interests.*—All claims, shares, or interests left unworked for seven (7) consecutive days, unless protected by clauses seven (7), eight (8), eleven (11), twelve (12), sixteen (16), seventeen (17), and thirty-three (33) of this bye-law, shall be deemed to be abandoned, and any person or persons first claiming to be put in possession shall be entitled to such claim, share, or interest.

36. *Roads.*—No miner or party of miners shall have power to prevent public traffic across any part of their claims, provided no injury be done to their working by such traffic.

37. *Justifiable absence.*—Any miner whose absence from his claim is caused by illness, or attendance on a sick person, or court of justice, or by urgent business, shall not forfeit his share or interest during such absence; but a majority of the other shareholders may have his place supplied by a competent miner, and he shall be responsible for any reasonable wages to the miner so employed.

38. *Holidays.*—Any person may be absent from his claim on the following days, viz.:—Good Friday to Easter Tuesday, both inclusive; twenty-fourth (24th) December to the second (2nd) January, both inclusive; any day on which the election within the district of a member of the Legislature or Mining Board may take place, and the day before and the day after such election; and any day proclaimed a holiday by the warden.

39. *Repeal clause.*—Bye-law No. 5, gazetted on the seventh day of July One thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight for regulating quartz mining in the Ararat Mining District is hereby repealed, saving as affects the rights obtained previous to and held at the time of this bye-law coming into operation.

Melbourne district will include a radius of six miles from the General Post Office; and Williamstown district will include the town of Williamstown, Hobson's Bay, and the River Yarra.

## CONDITIONS.

1. All the articles are to be of the best quality of the several kinds, in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages, free of all charges for cartage, freight, &c.

2. Bread. A sample of the best ordinarily retailed to the public will be considered as a test loaf for first quality. Second quality to be made of flour known in the trade as "best seconds," and the third quality (that issued for prisoners of the Crown) to be made of flour, the produce of prime wheat, from which twelve per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Milk. The milk must be pure and of the best quality.

4. Fresh meat is to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and, when the quantity admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately, also buttocks only when ordered. When shins of beef form a portion of the supply, a fair proportion of the bone, not less than ten inches, must have been cut off. The sticking pieces must be removed from the fore quarters of beef.

5. The supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto on the written order of the officer in charge. All other supplies will be ordered by the head of department concerned.

6. The order issued by the head of department must accompany the goods, and the account is to be rendered simultaneously with delivery of the supplies. In other cases the account is to be rendered monthly. The rates or quantities quoted in the orders cannot be exceeded.

7. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles at the time mentioned in the order they will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from his account.

8. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies as to the quality, the same to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final. In the event of the decision being against the contractor, the survey fees and expenses, if any, will be deducted as in clause 6.

9. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor; failing which, it will be procured by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 6.

10. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the person to whom the rations are due, or to the contractor in waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead; failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 6.

11. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor, upon report of the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government to terminate the contract forthwith.

12. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

13. ## HOWQUA ROAD DISTRICT BOARD.

### STANDING ORDERS AND GENERAL BYE-LAWS.

#### BYE-LAW NO. 1.—CHAP. I.—Order of Procedure.

THAT the sittings of the board shall on all ordinary occasions be open to the public, but any member of the board may require the exclusion of strangers while the sense of the board is taken as to whether the question proposed shall be discussed with closed doors.

2. The board shall commence business so soon after the time appointed for the meeting as there are a sufficient number of members present to constitute a quorum, but if at the expiration of thirty minutes from the time specified for meeting there is not a quorum present no business shall be transacted by the board at that meeting; but the names of the members present shall be recorded in the minutes.

3. That at the hour appointed for the meeting of the board, or any committee thereof, the clerk shall enter on the minute book the names of the members present or who may be present at any time during the meeting, the time of entry being stated, and from such entries compile and publish a half-yearly register of members' attendance, and keep an attendance registry.

#### Orders of Business.

1. Confirmation of minutes of previous meeting.
2. Reading of copies of letters sent by authority of board.
3. Reading letters received, and considering and ordering thereon.
4. Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
5. Reading and ordering on reports of permanent committees.
6. Reading and ordering on reports of select committees.
7. Reading and ordering on reports of deputations.
8. Special payments.
9. Special business not classified.
10. Order of the day, including subjects arising from proceedings of former meetings.
11. Motions of which previous notice has been given.
12. Notices of motion.
13. The standing orders may be suspended in cases of emergency provided a majority of the members present shall deem such suspension necessary.
4. With reference to the confirmation of minutes, no discussion will be permitted thereon, except as to their accuracy as a record of their proceedings.
5. All communications by letter intended for the board shall be made and addressed to the clerk, and applications and memorials shall be addressed to the chairman under cover to the clerk.
6. The order of the day shall include all business of which due notice has been given, and all matters arising out of former meetings of the board.
7. Any motion entered on the notice paper, and the member having given notice of the same being absent, and no other member deputed to bring forward such motion, when the business is called in order, such motion shall be struck out.
8. No bye-law shall be decided on without due notice (as in case of motions), and a copy of the proposed bye-law shall be open in the board room for the inspection of all ratepayers, free of charge, or of any person duly qualified to vote at elections under the Act.

#### CHAP. II.—Order of Debate.

1. Any member proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the chairman, and no member shall be interrupted unless by a call to order (when he shall sit down); the member calling to order shall then be heard, and the question of order decided before the subject is resumed or any other business.
2. Any member proposing a motion or an amendment must state the nature of it before addressing the board.
3. No member shall speak twice on the same question, unless by way of explanation merely, or in reply as the mover of an original motion, or upon any amendment, and after such explanation or reply the question shall forthwith be put to the vote.
4. If more than one member rise at one time, the chairman for the time being shall decide which is entitled to pre-audience.
5. No member shall digress from the subject under discussion, nor impute motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly.
6. The chairman when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case, without argument or comment, and his decision as to what is order or explanation shall be final.
7. The chairman shall rise when addressing the board in discussion on any question.
8. Any member may demand the production of any of the documents of the board relating to the subject under discussion.
9. Only one amendment shall be discussed at one time, and upon the adoption of any amendment the original motion shall be deemed rejected, and the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.
10. The chairman shall, on taking the sense of the board, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative, and the votes of all members shall be entered on the minutes.
11. The board shall vote by show of hands except in cases of elections.
12. No proposition once brought before the board shall be withdrawn without leave of the board, nor shall any proposition be entertained by the board until the same be seconded.
13. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion of adjournment, but if the question be negatived the next motion or order of the day shall be considered before the question of adjournment shall again be entertained: Provided the motion be carried, any business left undecided shall take the precedence at the next meeting of the board.

14. Any member may record his protest against any decision of the board, provided the same be made in writing before the next meeting of the board, and couched in respectful language, and be consistent with the truth. Notice of such intention, however, must be given on the adoption of the resolution.

15. No motion, the effect of which if carried would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the board, shall be entertained during the same year unless a call of the whole board has been duly made for the purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the board which shall have been negatived by the board shall again be entertained during the same year.

16. All notices of motion shall be dated and numbered, and given by the intended mover at the close of the meeting of the board to the clerk, who shall file the same for the year.

17. That when in consequence of a breach of order the chairman shall call upon any member or person by name, such member or person shall withdraw as soon as he has been heard in explanation, and after such member's or person's withdrawal, the board shall at once take the case into consideration, and if such member or other person be adjudged guilty, he shall be fined in a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds, and in default of immediate payment shall be sued before two or more justices of the peace for recovery of the same.

#### CHAP. III.—Elections.

1. No election to any office at the disposal of the board shall take place until four clear days' notice shall have been given in one or more of the local newspapers inviting application for the same; and the salary of such officer shall in all cases be fixed for the year before proceeding to the election.

2. At all such elections the voting shall be by ballot.

3. No member or officer belonging to the board shall be received as security for any officer appointed by the board, or for any work to be done for the board, and in all cases in which security for the due and faithful performance of any duty or contract is required, the expense of preparing such security shall be borne by the person or persons giving the same.

#### CHAP. IV.—Miscellaneous Regulations.

1. The clerk shall have the charge of the common seal of the corporation, and shall be responsible for the safe custody and proper use of the same, each impression being duly verified by the signature of the chairman.

2. The clerk shall affix the common seal to contracts, bonds, and licenses requiring the same, and to all bye-laws and addresses to the Governor passed by the board, but he shall not affix it to any other corporation document without the authority of the board.

3. The clerk shall not affix the common seal to any corporate document without the express order of the board, or unless such document bears the signature of the chairman.
