CAUTION AS TO KINDLING FIRES IN THE OPEN AIR AND THE CARELESS USE OF MATCHES AND IGNITED MATERIALS.

THE past season having been very favorable for the growth of Grass and Herbage, apprehensions are entertained that in localities where they become ignited serious losses of life and property may result.

With a view to avert such calamities the Government deem it necessary hereby to warn all persons to exercise caution in kindling fires in the open air, and against leaving such fires imperfectly extinguished, and also to be on their guard against the careless use of matches, smoking, or using or carrying ignited materials near inflammable matters.

Occupants of wooden buildings and owners of stacks of hay and straw are recommended to cause the grass, straw, stubble, or herbage near such buildings and stacks to be pared off, or the land to be ploughed, for a considerable distance around them, in two or more belts, so as to serve as a barrier to the progress of fire.

CONSTITUTION OF A SHIRE TO BE TWO SEPARATE SHIRES.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twenty-second day of December 1870.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor

Sir James McCulloch | Mr. Francis.

WHEREAS by *The Shires Statute* (33 Vic. No. 358, § 20) it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor if he shall have received a petition, signed by not less than twenty persons each of whose names shall appear upon some voters' roll for a shire or any one or more ridings thereof, setting forth that by reason of the great extent of such shire or remoteness of the part wherein such petitioners reside from other parts thereof, and of the diversity of the industry and interests of such part from those of the remainder thereof (of the truth of which allegations and the grounds thereof the Governor alone shall judge), it is expedient to constitute the two parts of such shire so differently affected two separate shires, to constitute accordingly such parts with such boundaries and under such names as shall seem fit two separate shires to be deemed proclaimed shires under this Act, and all ridings of the shire so separated shall cease to exist: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the thirtieth day of November in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the shire of Belfast was constituted: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the twenty-seventh day of February in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-five the said shire of Belfast was subdivided into Ridings: And whereas the powers conferred upon the Governor by the section of the Act above recited are now exercised upon a petition signed by not less than twenty persons, each of whose names appears upon the voters' roll of the North Riding of the said Shire of Belfast, and notices of such petition have been published in the manner prescribed in the twenty-ninth section of the said Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order constitute the two parts, hereinafter described, of the area hitherto constituting the Shire of Belfast to be two separate shires, and, with the advice aforesaid, doth hereby set forth the names and boundaries of such proclaimed shires in manner following, that is to say:—

THE SHIRE OF MINHAMITE—Commencing at the north-west angle of the parish of South Caramut; thence south by a road the western side of which coincides with the western boundaries of the parishes of South Caramut, Minjah North, Minjah, and Woolthorpe, to the intersection of the road from Woolthorpe to Green Hills at the south-west angle of allotment 1 of section 20 in the parish of Woolthorpe; thence south-easterly by the said road intersecting sections 20, 19, 22, and 23, in the said parish, to its junction with the road bounding the township of Woolthorpe on the west; thence southerly by the last-named road to the south-west angle of the township of Woolthorpe; thence south-westerly by the north-western boundary of sections 26 and 29 in the parish of Woolthorpe, and allotment 3 of section E in the parish of Warrong; thence southerly by the western boundary of said allotment and of allotments 2 and 3 of section F in said parish to the south-west angle of allotment 3 of section F; thence westerly by the road on the north of sections Q, P, O, N, M, and the northern boundary of allotments 2 and 3 of section K in said parish of Warrong, to the north-west angle of allotment 3 of said section K; thence southerly to the south-east angle of section 24, in the parish of Kapong; thence westerly by the road on the south of said section and of sections 25, 26, 27, and 28 in said parish, and of the township of Orford, to its intersection with the River Shaw; thence southerly by the course of that river to a point opposite the north-west angle of allotment 18 in the parish of Yambuk; thence by a line bearing west eighty chains; thence northerly to the south-west angle of allotment 160 in the parish of St. Helens; thence north by the western boundary of said allotment and allotment 153, and further north crossing a road, and by the western boundaries of allotments 144 and 137 in said parish to the centre of the road on the northern boundary of said allotment 137; thence west by that road, and by a line bearing west to the intersection of the western boundary of the present shire of Belfast; thence by the western and part of the northern boundaries of the north riding of said present shire (as described in the *Government Gazette* of 21st April 1865) to the commencing point.

THE SHIRE OF BELFAST—Commencing at the north-west angle of the parish of South Caramut; thence south by a road the western side of which coincides with the western boundaries of the parishes of South Caramut, Minjah North, Minjah, and Woolthorpe, to the intersection of the road from Woolthorpe to Green Hills at the south-west angle of allotment 1 of section 20, in the parish of Woolthorpe; thence south-easterly by the said road intersecting sections 20, 19, 22, and 23 in the said parish to its junction with the road bounding the township of Woolthorpe on the west; thence southerly by the last-named road to the south-west angle of the township of Woolthorpe; thence south-westerly by the north-western boundary of sections 26 and 29 in the parish of Woolthorpe, and allotment 3 of section E in the parish of Warrong; thence southerly by the western boundary of said allotment, and of allotments 2 and 3 of section F in the said parish to the south-west angle of allotment 3 of section F; thence westerly by the road on the north of sections Q, P, O, N, M, and the northern boundary of allotments 2 and 3 of section K, in the said parish of Warrong, to the north-west angle of allotment 3 of said section K; thence southerly to the south-east angle of section 24 in the parish of Kapong; thence westerly by the road on the south of said section, and of sections

25, 26, 27, and 28 in said parish, and of the township of Orford to its intersection with the River Shaw; thence southerly by the course of that river to a point opposite the north-west angle of allotment 18 in the parish of Yambuk; thence by a line bearing west eighty chains; thence northerly to the south-west angle of allotment 160 in the parish of St. Helens; thence north by the western boundary of said allotment and allotment 153, and further north crossing a road, and by the western boundaries of allotments 144 and 137 in said parish to the centre of the road on the northern boundary of said allotment 137; thence west by that road, and by a line bearing west to the intersection of the western boundary of the Shire of Belfast, as described in the *Government Gazette* of 2nd September 1863; thence southerly, easterly, northerly and westerly by the boundaries of said Shire of Belfast to the commencing point, excepting the Boroughs of Belfast and Koroit.

And the Honorable William Wilson, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**REGULATIONS UNDER "THE VOLUNTEER
STATUTE 1865."**

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to approve of the following alterations in the Regulations under *The Volunteer Statute 1865* (28 Victoria 266), dated 26th March 1866, viz.:—Clauses 30 to 44, 263, and the items of expenditure, page 31, are hereby cancelled, and the following clauses substituted.

30. No troop will be allowed to return more than thirty effectives, unless when a troop has horsed a gun at its own expense, when twelve extra effectives will be allowed. Any members in excess of this number are to be considered as supernumerary.

31. At the commencement of each year, the commanding officer of each troop will be credited with the sum of £3 for each effective member of his troop, beyond which no assistance will be given by Government.

32. No claim shall be admitted at the commencement of any year if the number of effectives of a corps be below twenty, and the services of such corps shall be dispensed with.

NAVAL, ARTILLERY, AND RIFLE VOLUNTEERS.

33. At the commencement of any year, the following Volunteers, and no others, will be classed as effectives in the above-named branches of the force:—

(a.) Any volunteer who was enrolled before the 1st April of the year next preceding, and who has gone through a course of musketry instruction for that year, and has also during that year—

- (1.) Attended two battalion parades.
- (2.) Attended and passed two parades for official inspection.
- (3.) Attended thirteen other parades.
- (4.) Attended seven other, either parades or company drills.

(b.) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st April and 30th June of the year next preceding, and has during that year—

- (1.) Attended two battalion parades.
- (2.) Attended and passed two parades for official inspection.
- (3.) Attended nine other parades.
- (4.) Attended five other, either parades or company drills.

(c.) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st July and 30th September of the year next preceding, and who has during that year—

- (1.) Attended one battalion parade.
- (2.) Attended and passed at one parade for official inspection.
- (3.) Attended seven other parades.
- (4.) Attended three other, either parades or company drills.

Parades.

34. In the definition of an effective, a parade shall mean an assembly of a corps under arms in the open air, whereat not less than 40 members are present, for three-quarters of an hour at least. Should the corps, having assembled in sufficient numbers, be dismissed, from inclement weather, before the three-quarters of an hour be passed, the officer commanding the force may allow the parade to be returned.

35. A company drill shall mean any assembly of a corps for drill whereat not less than 20 members are present. Officers commanding corps may not return in any month more than four parades and four company drills ordered by themselves.

36. For the purposes of battalion drill or inspection, the officer commanding the force may order other parades of corps in addition to the four specified in the preceding regulation, which may be returned by officers commanding corps.

37. A battalion parade shall mean an assemblage of two or more corps under the conditions of the regulations defining a parade.

ENGINEER VOLUNTEERS.

38. At the commencement of any year, the following Volunteers, and no others, will be classed as effective in the above-named branch of the force:—

- (a.) Any volunteer who was enrolled before the 1st April of the year next preceding, and who has during that year—
- (1.) Attended two battalion parades.
 - (2.) Attended nine parades of the corps.
 - (3.) Attended and passed an official inspection.
 - (4.) Passed an official inspection in some branch of military engineering.
 - (5.) Attended eighteen musters of the corps for exercise and instruction, of which ten at least were for engineering instruction.
 - (6.) Gone through a course of musketry instruction.

(b.) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st April and 30th June of the year next preceding, and who has during that year—

- (1.) Attended two battalion parades.
- (2.) Attended and passed an official inspection.
- (3.) Passed an official inspection in some branch of military engineering.
- (4.) Attended six parades of the corps.
- (5.) Attended twelve musters of the corps for exercise and instruction, of which seven at least were for engineering instruction.

(c.) Any volunteer who was enrolled between the 1st July and 30th September of the year next preceding, and who has during that year—

- (1.) Attended one battalion parade.
- (2.) Attended and passed one parade for official inspection.
- (3.) Attended five parades of the corps.
- (4.) Attended nine musters of the corps for exercise and instruction, at which five at least were for engineering instruction.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS FOR VOLUNTEER ENGINEERS.

Enrolment.

39. No person shall be enrolled as a member of the Engineers unless he shall have been educated as an architect, surveyor, civil, mechanical, or mining engineer, or as an assistant to one or other of them, or be a skilled mechanic, or shall have served in the corps of Royal Engineers.

Parades.

40. A parade shall mean an assembly of the corps under arms in the open air, for instruction in the field exercises and evolutions of infantry, at which twenty at least are present.

ALLOWANCE FOR THE MAINTENANCE OF NAVAL, ARTILLERY, ENGINEER, TORPEDO, AND RIFLE VOLUNTEER CORPS.

41. At the commencement of each year commanding officers will be credited for each effective member in the sum of £2 10s., to be expended by the said commanding officers, on behalf of their corps, on the following items:—

Items of authorized Expenditure of Effective Money by Officers commanding Corps.

- Orderly room.
- Drill shed, or
- Drill ground.
- Magazine, or
- Armoury.
- Care and repair of arms.
- Ranges.
- Clothing and accoutrements.
- Cost of conveyance of men and guns to or from drill, field days or reviews, and gun or rifle practice.
- Store rooms.
- Gun sheds.
- Expenses incidental to target practice, and prizes.
- Articles for repository exercises.
- Repair of expense magazines.
- Repairs of platforms, &c.
- Cost of all supplies received from military stores on repayment, or any other expenditure authorized by the officer commanding the force.

42. The sums due to the Government for supplies of cloth, ammunition, and other stores, and for repair of arms, &c., will take precedence of other claims to be paid out of the effective grant.

43. Commanding officers are responsible to Government for the due custody and expenditure of the effective allowance grant, the whole or no portion of which is to pass from their control or be expended except by their direction. The Government grant shall be kept as a special bank account, and all books and accounts connected with the expenditure thereof shall be produced, when required, to inspecting officers, or such other persons as the officer commanding the force may direct. On the first of January in each year, an audited balance-sheet of the past year's receipt and expenditure, signed by the commanding officer, and countersigned by one officer and one non-commissioned officer, must be forwarded to head quarters, before the annual grant, or any portion thereof, shall be issued.

44. No claim shall be admitted at the commencement of any year, if the number of effectives in any corps be below 75; and the services of such corps shall be dispensed with (torpedo corps excepted).

SPECIAL REGULATIONS FOR THE TORPEDO AND TELEGRAPH CORPS.

Professional men joining this corps during 1870, approved by the commandant, may classify as effectives on the 1st January 1871, provided the number of effectives does not exceed 30.

MEREDITH CEMETERY.

THE following Rule has been adopted by the Trustees of the Meredith Cemetery, viz.:—

That every person who may have paid the fee of One pound sterling for the opening of a grave shall have the privilege of maintaining and keeping the ground for the sole and separate use of such person and his representatives for ever, by paying a further sum of Three pounds sterling for each allotment measuring eight feet by four feet that he may require.

Printed forms of tender and conditions of contract may be obtained from the Secretary, Tender Board, Treasury, Melbourne, or from the officer in charge of police at each station, by whom also any information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

Each station to be tendered for on a separate form of tender, and tenders must be upon the printed form.

Tenders will be received for either oats, bran, hay, or straw; but if all be included in one tender, it may be accepted for one article only, if advisable. The tender must show the particular kind of hay or straw offered.

Tenders must express the prices in words as well as in figures, and without alterations, erasures, or discrepancies.

As much forage as can be stored at any station where the storage is small, will, for the convenience of the contractor, be ordered at one time.

The price must be per cental for hay, straw, oats, and bran (net weight), including delivery at the stations and all charges; bags to be returned when empty.

Tenders not complying with the terms of advertisement will not be entertained.

The successful tenderer will be required to enter into a bond for one-third of the estimated amount of the contract, within ten days after the acceptance is notified. Two approved securities are required for contracts amounting to £150 and upwards, and one surety for contracts under £150.

Tenderers failing to take up their accepted tenders, or failing to carry out their contract satisfactorily, will be ineligible to again hold contracts for Government supplies.

Tenders must be enclosed in an envelope, marked "Tender for Forage," and deposited in the box at the Stores Tender Board Offices, Treasury, Melbourne; or, if sent by post, they must be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Stores Tender Board Offices, Treasury, Melbourne.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

The decision of the Government will be made known by *Gazette* notice, and by letter to accepted tenderers.

CONDITIONS.

1. The hay to be good, sound, and sweet, and properly trussed; the straw to be wheaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats (colonial grown) and bran to be sound and sweet and of the best description.

2. The supplies are for police, telegraph, and other horses, and are to be delivered on the order of the officer in charge of the district or station. The quantities stated in the schedule being only approximate, it must be understood that the Government

may draw either more or less than those mentioned; and should new telegraph stations be formed, or additional horses be required to be stationed in any of the districts tendered for, the supplies required may be drawn from the contractor. The excess over the estimate, will not, however, exceed during the whole 50 per cent. of the estimated quarterly consumption.

3. The forage, when delivered, must be accompanied by the particulars of quantity, showing the net weight, to be endorsed on the back of the order, which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

4. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the District, as may be indicated by the contractor on the account.

5. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours of the time specified in the order for delivery, it will be competent for the department (should circumstances require it) to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

6. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department ordering the supply, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

7. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 5.

8. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 5.

9. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £20, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

10. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

11. It will be competent for the Secretary to the Tender Board, on behalf of the Government, or for the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to that effect, it being understood that such notice can only be given from the first day of a month, and provided that no such notice can be given before the 30th September 1871; and in the event of a station being discontinued or any change in the supplies required, the contractor will receive the earliest possible intimation.

For regulating the depression and inclination of crossings across or over footways and channels, and the materials for making and constructing the same, and the mode of laying and bedding such materials, that is to say: Crossings across or over footways and channels shall be flush with the footway for one-third the width of the footway, and shall then fall with a gradual inclination to the bottom of the channel, and shall be constructed of squared bluestone pitchers, nine inches wide, nine inches deep, and from eight inches to twelve inches long; and shall be laid in courses parallel with the length of the footway, and bedded in good sand at least three inches deep, with close joints, properly flushed up with sand and well rammed with a heavy pavio's rammer.
