## AID TO BUILDING FUND OF FREE LIBRARIES, 1871.

**A**PPPLICATION for a share in the sum of £1000 granted by the Legislature in Aid of the Building Fund of Free Libraries in the up-country districts will be received at this office until the 20th of May next.

N.B.—To entitle any institution to share in this Grant, such institution must be *bonâ fide* a free library, that is, a library open to the public daily free of charge, as is the case with the Melbourne Public Library.

The following particulars must be furnished, viz. :—

1. The name of the institution, which should clearly indicate that it is a Free Library.
2. The amount expended in the erection or purchase of the building, and the materials of which it is constructed.
3. The amount already contributed by the Government.
4. The amount locally subscribed, *now in hand*.
5. Whether the land is the property of the institution, and whether granted by the Crown or purchased.
6. The number of books.
7. The number of visitors during 1870.

DISTRICTS WHERE CERTIFICATES MAY BE GRANTED FOR PUBLICANS' LICENSES CHARGEABLE WITH FEE OF £10.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury, in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Wines, Beer, and Spirits Sale Statute 1861 Amendment Act* it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council upon the application in writing of the council of any shire or road district to proclaim any part of such shire or road district to be defined by such council and not being in or within one mile of any city or town a part within which the licensing magistrates for such district may grant certificates for publicans' licenses as aforesaid for which shall be charged the annual license fee of Ten pounds, and on the like application of the council of any borough not being within fifty miles of the city of Melbourne, the Governor in Council may if he shall think fit proclaim any portion of such borough as a part within which the licensing magistrates for the district may grant certificates for such publicans' licenses, and for which license shall be charged a like fee of Ten pounds, and the said Governor in Council may from time to time revoke any such proclamation, such revocation to take effect from the time of the expiration of the last issued license under such proclamation: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the Shire and Road District hereinafter specified to be districts respectively within which Licensing Magistrates may grant Certificates for Publicans' Licenses for which shall be charged the annual License Fee of Ten pounds, that is to say:—

The Shire of Springfield.  
The Towong Road District.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-fourth day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and in the thirty-fourth year of Her Majesty's reign.

CONSTITUTING A ROAD DISTRICT TO BE A SHIRE.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twentieth day of April 1871.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor

Sir J. McCulloch | Mr. Wilson.

WHEREAS by *The Shires Statute Amendment Act 1870* (31 Vic. No. 387, § 2) it is amongst other things enacted, that if at any time in any road district, whether single or united, and whether the area be one hundred square miles or less, the total net annual value of the rateable property as appearing by the general rate then last made shall have amounted to or exceeded Twelve thousand pounds, it shall be lawful for the

Governor, if it shall seem fit, to constitute such district a shire within the meaning of the Shires Statute, by such name as in and by the Order in Council may be assigned to the same; and the subdivisions if any of the district subsisting at the time of such constitution shall be and be called ridings of the shire: And whereas the total net annual value of the rateable property in the road district hereinafter mentioned, as appearing by the general rate now last made in such district, has exceeded Twelve thousand pounds, and it seems fit to constitute the same to be a shire: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order constitute the Road District hereinafter mentioned to be a Shire within the meaning of *The Shires Statute* by the name hereby assigned to the same, that is to say:—

THE MEREDITH ROAD DISTRICT, which was created by a Proclamation bearing date the second day of June 1863, and was divided into electoral subdivisions by an Order of the eighth day of May 1865, shall be and is hereby constituted and shall be named the

SHIRE OF MEREDITH

And the Honorable William Wilson, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**WARRNAMBOOL LIGHTS.**

THE attention of Masters of vessels and others is called to the notice published on the 28th December last, relative to the alteration of the Warrnambool Lights.

These lights will be exhibited on and after Monday next, the 1st of May.

The Upper Light exhibits a *fixed white light*, 100 feet above the level of the sea, and is visible from seaward on any bearing from about east round southerly to N. W. at a distance of fourteen (14) miles in clear weather.

The Low Light, which is a leading light, exhibits a *fixed red light*, and is visible between the bearings S. 1° 30' W. and S. 11° 30' E. at a distance of five (5) miles in clear weather.

The Warrnambool Jetty extends nearly 700 feet from the shore and has a *fixed green light* at its end, visible at a distance of three (3) miles.

Vessels entering Warrnambool Harbor should keep the red light in sight and steer in with it bearing north, and in line with the upper light until the green light on the jetty is opened, when steer in for it and anchor. The best anchorage is in about fifteen (15) feet water, about a cable's length to the northward of the ledge off the Breakwater Rock.

*Leading Marks.*—The two lighthouses in line bearing north lead in the fairway between the five-fathom bank and the foul ground to the S.E. of the Breakwater Rock.

Entering Warrnambool Harbor from the southward or the westward, vessels are cautioned to avoid the seventeen-foot patch which lies S.S.E. nearly half a mile from the Middle Island.

Vessels entering from the eastward either cross the bar to the south-eastward, or proceed to get the leading marks on as before directed.

Masters of vessels are recommended not to shut in the upper white light, nor bring it to bear to the westward of N.W., when standing towards the mouth of the Hopkins River.

In bad weather, or with a heavy southerly swell, the sea breaks one (1) mile off the land.

*Caution.*—It is not safe to enter or leave Warrnambool Harbor in south-westerly or southerly gales.

1. The whole of the articles required for the service of the Victorian Railways are to be in accordance with the samples and specifications, and in every respect to be of the very best description, quality, and manufacture, subject to the approval of the Engineer-in-Chief, the Traffic Manager, and the General Overseer of Locomotives. The Goods will be subject to the examination and test of an Inspecting Officer appointed by any of the above. The Government will not be bound to issue orders upon the contractor for all the articles enumerated in schedule but only for such articles and such quantities of those articles as the Government may order from the contractor from time to time; neither will the Government be bound to take from the contractor any larger supply of any of the articles than the orders which have been issued during the year; nor will they be bound to take any of the articles enumerated in the schedule for which orders have not been issued. 2. All orders for supplies under this contract must issue from the Secretary for Railways, and all goods must be delivered free of charge to the Stores or other part of the Railway premises, Williamstown, unless otherwise directed by the Secretary.

3. The contract entered into under this notice is not to be considered as being infringed or violated by the importation of stores for the Government service of the Victorian Railways, or by the exercise of the right to purchase reserved in the specification or the special conditions to any of the schedules, or by the purchase of articles manufactured in the penal or other Government establishments, or the manufacture of articles by the department.

4. Delivery, as a rule, is to be of the full quantity ordered at one time; but all deliveries must be accompanied with detailed invoices or bills of parcels in duplicate, showing quantity, rate, and value, also the number of the order for the goods, otherwise the goods will not be received. Delivery will not be deemed to have been made until the goods have been approved of.

5. In the event of supplies ordered under this contract not being delivered within forty-eight hours, it will be competent for the Railway Storekeeper, on the order of the Secretary, to cancel the order and purchase the same, or such articles as may be suitable for the service, at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price will be deducted.

6. The contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly, in the prescribed form, and render the same to the Railway Storekeeper for certification, previously to payment at the Treasury.

7. The Railway Storekeeper will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior character, or not in accordance with the specification, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged to him.

8. All rejected goods must be removed by the contractor within twenty-four hours after notice has been given of such rejection, and, if not so removed, the Railway Storekeeper is hereby empowered to send same to Melbourne, there to be stored at the contractor's risk and expense.

9. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the head of the department requiring the supply, as to the quality, the same is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the Government, and the decision of the board is to be considered final. Any expense incurred on account of the rejection of supplies by a board of survey will be charged to the contractor.

10. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged to the contractor.

11. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Railway Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

12.
