SIR,—I have the honor to transmit herewith for your information and guidance—

1. A copy of the official announcement.
 2. A circular, No. 29, issued for the information of Her Majesty's Consuls, which may be of use to you in directing attention to the special principles of these exhibitions.
- I have further to call your particular attention to the following points, which will be found embodied in the official announcement in the paragraphs indicated by the letters prefixed:—
- (A.) The exhibition is to consist solely of selected works, which will be few in number.
 - (B.) Only such works will be admitted as may be considered worthy of exhibition by the persons appointed in each country or colony.
 - (C.) Instead of embracing all kinds of industry, the manufacturing division will be restricted, in the first exhibition of the series, to three classes:—
 1. Pottery.
 2. Woollen and worsted.
 3. Educational works and appliances.
 - (D.) Exhibitors will be permitted to show only one specimen of each kind of object, and it is necessary that each specimen should be distinguished by novelty, excellence, or some other quality, to be entitled to selection.
 - (E.) Her Majesty's Commissioners will provide glass cases, stands, and fittings, free of cost.
 - (F.) Agents will be appointed to attend to the interests of exhibitors.

FEEs UNDER THE COUNTY COURT STATUTE 1869.

At the Executive Council held at Toorak, the eighth day of May 1871.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor

Mr. Michie | Mr. MacPherson.

WHEREAS by The County Court Statute 1869 it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to direct what amount of fees, and in respect of what steps taken, process issued, or duties performed, fees shall be taken in the County Courts in such manner as to him shall seem fit, and from time to time to lessen or increase the same; and such fees may be regulated by way of percentage on the amount of the demand; and it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to appoint, instead of all or any of the fees which may from time to time be payable as aforesaid, other fees by way of percentage or otherwise to be payable on such proceedings under the now reciting Act as the Governor in Council may direct: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that the fees specified in the schedule hereto annexed shall be taken, in lieu of the fees now taken, in respect of the steps, process, or duties severally detailed in that schedule for proceedings in County Courts; that in calculating the same every fraction of a pound or mile shall be reckoned as an entire pound or mile; and that this order shall come into operation on and after the first day of June now next ensuing, that is to say:—

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees shall be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons; and it is also enacted that the Governor may from time to time increase, and after one month's notice in the *Government Gazette* diminish, alter, or abolish any common heretofore or hereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of this Act; and nothing herein contained shall prevent the sale by auction or the leasing or licensing under this Act of any land comprised in any common heretofore or hereafter to be proclaimed; and it is also directed that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons shall be published and all objections thereto shall be heard in the manner set forth in the One hundredth section of the said Act: And whereas the prescribed notice has been duly published and all objections respecting the common hereinafter mentioned have been heard as directed by the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the common hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

THE UNITED TOWN AND FARMERS' COMMON OF HUNTLY, BAGSHOT, GOORNONG, ELLSMERE, AND NOLAN, described in a Proclamation bearing date the 22nd day of August 1870, is hereby increased by adding thereto the unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries described as follow, viz.: Commencing at the south-west angle of allotment 30, in the parish of Ellesmere; thence by a road bearing west four miles, more or less, to a point bearing north from the north-west angle of allotment 10 of section 11, parish of Axedale; thence by lines bearing respectively north two miles and east four miles, more or less, to the west boundary of allotment 11, parish of Ellesmere; and thence south two miles to the point of commencement; as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne. ment 34, section C, parish of Merrai; thence easterly by a one-chain road to the south-west angle of section 19, parish of Cooramook; thence northerly by a road to the north-west angle of section 25, same parish; thence easterly by the north boundary of the parish of Cooramook to the Hopkins River; thence southerly by the Hopkins River to the sea; thence easterly by the sea to Cape Otway;

Provided that the Borough of Belfast, the three-chain road from Skipton to Dunkeld above spoken of, as well as any runs intersected by such road, shall be entirely out of the Hexham Clean District and not in it.

IN pursuance of the 66th section of *The Scab Act 1870*, the Governor in Council has ordered that the portion of Victoria whereof the boundaries are hereinafter defined shall be a Clean District within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:

UPOTIPOPON CLEAN DISTRICT (including the Upotipotpon and Goomalibee runs).—Commencing at the point where the eastern boundary of the Gowangardie run abuts on the Broken River; thence by the said boundary of that run to the Stony Creek run; thence by the northern boundary of that run to the eastern angle thereof; thence by the Warrenbayne run bearing easterly to the town of Benalla; thence by the western boundary of that town to the north-west angle thereof; thence by a line to the Broken River aforesaid; and thence by that river downward to the commencing point.

Provided always that all purchased land within these boundaries which is not in the possession of the licensees of these runs, shall be out of, and not in, this Clean District.

BALLARAT DISTRICT.

Office of Inspector of Sheep,
Ballarat, 31st March 1871.

I HAVE the honor to report for the quarter ending 31st March 1871.

During the quarter one meeting of the Ballarat Board of Advice has been held, but, owing to only two members attending, no business was transacted.

I have had a plan of the proposed Ballarat clean district prepared, and forward it herewith.

I regret to report that, on the 23th instant, I discovered scab in two flocks in the Corporation Sale-yards, both of which came from Dowling Forest, one from Labona, the farm of Mr. G. G. Morton, 646 in number, and the other from Spring Brook Farm, belonging to Mr. F. Leech, 281 in number. I had the whole destroyed under section 53 of the Scab Act, and the pens and lanes of the yards through which they passed have been thoroughly cleansed in accordance with section 48.

Upon examination I found there were 140 sheep left on Labona, and 350 on Spring Brook, which are now being destroyed, and will be all dead by the 4th April.

On the Spring Brook farm sheep, after the most careful examination, I found only two small spots, caused in each case by a single acarus.

The sheep on Labona were diseased to a considerable extent, but those on several adjoining farms, also owned by Mr. G. G. Morton, showed no sign of disease, so that I have reason to hope the prompt destruction of the 147 sheep found diseased has effectually stamped out the infection in this part of the colony.

I HAVE the honor, to furnish you with a report of the state of my district as regards scab, in accordance with the 12th section of the Scab Act, and to state there are four stations under license, namely:—Kangaroo Ground, 11,305 sheep, licensed by Messrs. D. and E. McPherson; Koontong, 7000 sheep, licensed by Mr. Jos. Chrisp; Bungli, licensed by Mr. Jos. Chrisp; Annaudale, 7300, licensed by Mr. Andrew C. Irving. The appearance of scab in these stations is most singular, from the fact of the country having been clean for the last four years. The cause of the outbreak is unknown. The sheep in the present quarantine district are in a satisfactory condition.

I have further the honor to state Thomas Merton has been fined by the Berchworth bench £50, with 5s. costs, under the 67th clause of the Scab Act.

I HAVE the honor, in accordance with the requirements of section 12 of the Scab Act, to forward to you the following report of the state of my district relative to scab:—The last scab licenses issued in this district having expired early in January last, and no fresh applications having been made since, there are consequently no sheep under license in this district at present, and so far they have stood the test to which they are submitted without any fresh breaking-out.

However, it was suggested to the owners of doubtful sheep the propriety of dipping during this month, as a precautionary measure, in order to put the possibility of the existence of scab out of the question, and to advance a step in the right direction to entitle them to an early release from quarantine; but I am sorry to relate that only two took the hint.

Whether these gentlemen who have not thus dipped acted discreetly and for their own and for the district's ultimate benefit, remains yet to be proved.

I had one prosecution during this quarter.

Coleraine, 31st March 1871.

I HAVE the honor to furnish you with the quarterly report under clause 12 of the Scab Act. There are no sheep under license at present in the Coleraine district, and I have regularly visited the stations and farms in quarantine, and find no disease existing. The only station I cannot report in a healthy condition is the Kadbro station, which was till very recently under license for 1757 sheep; but on my visiting the station and examining the said sheep a short time since, I could not detect any live scab, owing to them being dipped a short time previous.

I have had one prosecution this quarter under clause 32 of Scab Act, against Charles McInnes, of Kaladbro, and got a conviction.

The condition of the district with regard to scab is I think in a very satisfactory condition. I find the Local Board a great assistance in the working of the Act.

St. Helens, Geelong West, 1st April 1871.

I HAVE the honor, in accordance with section 12 of the Scab Act, to hand this my report for the first three months of the present

year, together with a return of the licenses granted and fines inflicted during that period. One lot were licensed on account of having been shorn and yarded in the same place as infected sheep; one because joined to an infected flock; two because they were not cured, one of infected sheep having been brought into this district, and one of fresh infection.

The persons fined had used lime and sulphur, and confirms my opinion that it never should have been allowed by the Government, for in no instance have I as yet found it cure.

I have, with the concurrence of the Board of Advice, granted some clean certificates, viz.:—To Mr. George Russell, of Golf Hill, Shelford, for his three flocks; Mr. A. S. Robertson, one flock; Mr. J. L. Dow, one. Both these flocks never had been diseased, but came under the Act on account of being shorn and yarded at infected places. Mr. George Malheson, of Wardyboluc, and Mr. J. G. Carstairs, of Brown's Marsh, near Queenscliffe—both these have been cured by using good tobacco and sulphur.

The Board have come to the determination of placing all those who have not succeeded in cleaning their flocks in quarantine, and any future outbreak is to be dealt with in a like manner, but as yet nothing has been done respecting the proclamation of a clean district.

I have seen all the sheep that had been under license, and believe cures have been effected in most cases, but on some of the stations that are very scrubby are not assured it will not break out again owing to the difficulty of collecting all the straggling sheep.

I have one prosecution pending against J. Rawlinson for 230 scabby sheep, having found two infected in the flock. They were all dipped the following day.

I find a general desire upon the part of owners of scabby sheep to clean them, and it is only on those stations where the difficulties are very great, from the scrubby nature of the country, that I expect to find scab breaking again when the rains begin.

On Wednesday 1st March I discovered about 500 sheep in the Flemington yards infected with scab, the property of Thomas Emms, of the Pentland Hills. The sheep were destroyed and the owner prosecuted under the 42nd clause of the Act, and fined £25 and £3 costs.

I have issued two licenses during the quarter, one for 1500 sheep at Wallan-walla, and the other for 150 sheep at Pentland Hills.

I HAVE the honor (in compliance with the 12th clause of the Scab Act) to report that during the quarter ending 31st March only one station in my district has been infected with scab, viz., Burnewang West, near Lunnymede.

The Board works satisfactorily, and will, I think, assist in the eradication of scab.

IN compliance with the 12th section of the Scab Act 1870, I have the honor to transmit the following report for the quarter ending 31st March. I have carefully inspected the sheep in the quarantine districts of Barton and Narraport, and could find no appearance of the disease called scab, and am very hopeful the sheep in those districts are now clean.

With the exception of the above-named districts, which comprise only two stations, the sheep in the large district of the Wimmera continue free from disease.

Three persons have been fined in the sum of Fifty pounds each for driving sheep into the Northern clean district without first obtaining the authority required. I consider the necessity for this authority being obtained before entering a clean district one of the most important provisions in the Act; in no other way can those portions of the country already rid of scab be kept so. The experience of the last number of years has taught us that in every district there are some reckless men who, for the sake of a lower price, will purchase doubtful sheep; and it must not be forgotten scab is one of those diseases which may be in existence for a time and show no symptoms the most finished expert can see.



BAIRNSDALE PUBLIC CEMETERY.

RULES and Regulations.

1. All charges must be paid to the secretary when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.
2. By *The Cemeteries Statute 1864*, "any person making a vault, or erecting a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees, under these rules, and upon payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have maintained and kept up a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the tenor of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons and his or their representatives for ever."
3. Applications for permission to make a vault or erect a monument in the cemetery to be made to the trustees. A certificate of permission will be granted to the person applying, on payment of the proper charges.
4. The charges will be remitted for the burial of any person on evidence being produced satisfactory to the trustees that the relatives or friends of such persons are unable to pay the costs and charges.
5. Orders for interment must be given to the person in charge of the cemetery between the hours of Nine a.m. and Three p.m. of the day previous to the interment.

6. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but parties wanting brick vaults or other graves will be required to construct them under the direction of the trustees; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault the consent, in writing, of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.

7. When giving the order for interment, a form of application for burial containing the name, age, and late place of residence of the deceased, will be provided, and must be filled up where practicable, and entered in the interment book.

8. The time fixed for the funeral to be at the cemetery must be punctually observed.

9. The hours fixed for interments will be from Ten a.m. to Six o'clock p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive; and from Ten a.m. to Four o'clock p.m. in the other four months, except on Sundays, when the only hours for funerals will be from Two to Five o'clock p.m. throughout the year.

10. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones, to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

11. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in and cemented, and covered by a slab of stone, slate, iron, or good blue or red gum planking.

12. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, and a copy of every epitaph or inscription, to be submitted to the trustees for approval, who are required by the 17th section of the Statute to withhold permission and prevent the erection of any monument which shall appear to them inappropriate or unbecoming, and by the 18th section of the Statute the trustees shall determine and fix the position of any monument which may be preferred to be erected according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner. In the erection of tablets copper or brass must be used.

13. Wooden or other fences, if not kept in proper repair, may be removed by order of the trustees without notice to the owner.

14. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

15. The ground will be open daily to the public from sunrise to sunset.

16. A plan of the cemetery and a register will be kept, and may be inspected.

17. That no interments take place on Sundays, excepting in cases where a medical certificate is obtained to show the necessity.

18. By the said Statute, any person wilfully or wantonly destroying, or doing or causing to be done, any damage to any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree, or plant in the cemetery, is guilty of a misdemeanor, and liable on conviction before any two or more justices of the peace to a fine of £20, or imprisonment for three months.

The occupier of every slaughter-house shall cause such slaughter-house to be kept in such a state of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause the blood accumulated therein to be collected in a fit receptacle provided for the purpose, which receptacle shall be emptied of its contents at least once in every twenty-four hours. Before any blood shall be removed from any receptacle, the occupier thereof shall cause to be mixed therewith a quantity of chloride of zinc, perchloride of iron, Condy's fluid, chloride of lime, or some other efficient deodorizer sufficient to effectually deodorize and disinfect the same.
