PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and Baron HORTSFORD, of Hertsford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act 1863* it is amongst other things enacted, that if any borough and any road district shall adjoin each other and form with the boundaries thereof respectively one continuous area, or if any borough shall be surrounded by any road district, and if the council of such borough and the board of such road district shall be desirous that such borough and such road district be formed into one united district under the said Act, the same may be done in like manner and with the like effect in all respects as is thereinbefore provided with regard to the union of two or more road districts; and for the purpose of such union such borough shall be deemed to have been a district, and the several wards thereof, if any, to have been subdivisions, under the said Act, and the several provisions of the said Act shall apply to the same accordingly: And whereas the Borough of Jamieson (the boundaries of which are described in Schedule I. of *The Boroughs Statute 1869*) is wholly surrounded by the Howqua Road District, the boundaries of which are described in a Proclamation bearing date the thirtieth day of August in the year 1869: And whereas the council of the said borough and the board of the said road district have by petitions under the respective common seals of the said council and board prayed the Governor in Council, in manner provided by the twelfth and seventeenth sections of the above-recited Act, that the said borough and road district shall be constituted one united district: And whereas it seemed fit to the Governor in Council to make an Order in Council this day constituting the said borough and road district one district as hereinafter mentioned: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the constitution of the said Borough of Jamieson and Howqua Road District to be one district under the said Act, by the name in and by the said Order in Council assigned to the same, that is to say:—

THE HOWQUA UNITED ROAD DISTRICT.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this fourteenth day of August, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and in the thirty-fifth year of Her Majesty's reign.

CONSTITUTING A ROAD DISTRICT TO BE A SHIRE.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the fourteenth day of August 1871.

WHEREAS by *The Shires Statute Amendment Act 1870* (34 Vict. No. 387, § 2), it is amongst other things enacted, that if at any time in any road district, whether single or united, and whether the area be one hundred square miles or less, the total net annual value of the rateable property as appearing by the general rate then last made shall have amounted to or exceeded Twelve thousand pounds, it shall be lawful for the Governor, if it shall seem fit, to constitute such district a shire within the meaning of *The Shires Statute*, by such name as in and by the Order in Council may be assigned to the same; and the subdivisions if any of the district subsisting at the time of such constitution shall be and be called ridings of the shire: And whereas the total net annual value of the rateable property in the road district hereinafter mentioned, as appearing by the general rate now last made in such district, has exceeded Twelve thousand pounds, and it seems fit to constitute the same to be a shire: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order constitute the Road District hereinafter mentioned to be a Shire within the meaning of *The Shires Statute* by the name hereby assigned to the same, that is to say:—

THE SWAN HILL ROAD DISTRICT, which was created by a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-fourth day of June 1862, and was altered and re-defined by two several Proclamations bearing date respectively the eighteenth day of March 1863 and the 12th day of December 1864, shall be and is hereby constituted and shall be named the

SHIRE OF SWAN HILL.

And the Honorable Francis Longmore, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

For the regulation and government of the Kyneton Shire Cattle Market, for fixing the days and hours during each day on which the market shall be held, for licensing yards and premises for the sale of cattle within the shire, and for fixing the dues to be paid for such license.

BYE-LAW OF THE COUNCIL OF THE SHIRE OF KYNETON MADE BY SPECIAL ORDER UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THE SHIRES STATUTE.

IN pursuance of the 187th and 366th sections of the Shires Statute the Council of the Shire of Kyneton ordain as follows, that is to say:—

1. Cattle market to be opened daily.—That the cattle market shall be opened for the reception, delivery, and sale of cattle and other live stock on every lawful day until seven o'clock post meridian.
2. That on application the council may license certain yards and premises for the sale of cattle within the shire.

3. Amount of dues to be paid for each license.—That the sum of Two shillings and sixpence each per annum shall be the amount to be paid for such yards and premises so licensed.

4. Appointment and duties of collector.—That there shall be appointed for such cattle market an officer or officers to be called the market collector, whose duty shall be as follows, viz.:—

1. To see that the market regulations be duly observed in the said market.
2. To demand and receive all tolls in respect of cattle exposed for sale in the said market.
3. To allot the principal and drafting yards to the use of parties bringing cattle to the market for sale in such manner as in each particular case may seem to such collector to be most convenient, and to prevent any unbroken horses or cattle from being roped within the market before 5 o'clock p.m.
4. To preserve order and cleanliness within such market, and to take proceedings against any person or persons creating a riot or disturbance, or cursing or swearing, or using any gross or indecent language, or being guilty of gross or indecent conduct therein.
5. Notwithstanding anything herein contained as to hours during which the market shall be opened, the market collector shall at all times give such facilities for the reception and delivery of stock as may in any case be actually necessary.
