## POLYNESIA.

CAPTAIN GRAINGER, of the Australian and Californian mail steamer *City of Melbourne*, reports the existence of an Island not laid down in the Admiralty charts, situated in latitude 11°34' south, longitude 165°26' west.

It is described as being a hundred feet high, nearly round, and two miles in diameter; and it has breakers extending a quarter of a mile from its southern extreme.

Captain Grainger also reports passing over the position, without seeing any indication from the mast-head, of an Island placed on the chart in latitude 11°52' south, longitude 165°01' west.

## DATE FOR HOLDING GENERAL SESSIONS AT BAIRNSDALE CHANGED.

### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTEBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Justices of the Peace Statute 1866* it is amongst other things enacted, that Courts of General Sessions of the Peace shall be holden in and for such places or districts within Victoria as the Governor in Council appoints; and the Governor in Council may from time to time define and appoint the limits and boundaries of the places or districts within which all such courts shall have jurisdiction respectively, and the places and times at which such courts shall be holden: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby appoint the Court of General Sessions of the Peace at the undermentioned place to be holden on the day hereinafter mentioned, for and in lieu of the day appointed by a former Proclamation for the holding of the said court, that is to say :—

At Bairnsdale, on Thursday the twenty-eighth day of September, in lieu of the twenty-seventh of September 1871.

## DISTILLERY PREMISES, MELBOURNE.

### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTEBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed by the Parliament of Victoria in the twenty-fifth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled *An Act to consolidate and amend the law relating to the distillation rectifying and compounding of Spirits, to the granting a Duty upon Spirits distilled in Victoria, and to regulate the brewing of Beer and the sale of fermented and spirituous Liquors in certain cases*, it is amongst other things enacted that any person, except as thereafter excepted, who shall carry on the business of a distiller or rectifier and compounder of spirits, or who shall have in his possession or who shall make use of any still or other utensil for distilling or rectifying and compounding spirits, except in such place as the Governor in Council shall by proclamation in the *Government Gazette* direct, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than One

hundred pounds, nor more than Five hundred pounds: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the undermentioned place in the city of Melbourne as a place wherein the business of a distiller or rectifier and compounder of spirits may be carried on, that is to say:—

**DISTILLERY PREMISES.**

All that piece of land containing one acre two roods and twenty-five perches, or thereabouts, situate in the county of Bourke, parish of South Melbourne, being allotment U: Commencing at the west angle of allotment Z, and bounded on the north-east by the said allotment bearing south twenty-seven degrees east four chains; on the south-east by a road bearing south sixty-three degrees west three chains fifty-one links; on the south-west by a road bearing north forty-seven degrees twenty-nine minutes west three chains sixty-seven links; and on the north-west by lines bearing north forty degrees thirty-one minutes east one chain thirty-nine links, and north sixty-three degrees east three chains fifty-one links to the point of commencement.

**COMMON INCREASED.**

**PROCLAMATION**

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTSFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees shall be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons; and it is also enacted that the Governor may from time to time increase, and after one month's notice in the *Government Gazette* diminish, alter, or abolish any common theretofore or thereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of the said Act; and it is directed that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons shall be published and all objections thereto shall be heard in the manner set forth in the One hundredth section of the said Act: And whereas the notices prescribed by the said Act have been given: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the Common hereinafter mentioned; in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

**YEA TOWN COMMON.**—The Town Common of Yea, described in two several Proclamations bearing date respectively the 18th day of February 1861 and the 26th day of November 1863, is hereby increased by adding thereto the unappropriated Crown land within the boundaries hereinafter described, viz.: Commencing at the north-east angle of allotment 7, parish of Killingworth, being a point on the southern boundary of the town of Yea; thence by that boundary bearing N. 60° E. twenty-six chains eighteen links; thence by allotment 31 by a line and by allotments 31 A and 32 bearing south thirty-eight chains forty links to the north-east angle of the land licensed to Thomas McAsey; thence by that land bearing west twenty-two chains sixty-seven links; and thence by allotments 8 and 7 bearing north twenty-five chains thirty-one links to the point of commencement; as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne. Area available for commonage, about sixty-four acres. The bearings are from the true meridian. —(70 & 27183.)

**DISTRICT BROUGHT UNDER THE GUNPOWDER ACT.**

**PROCLAMATION**

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTSFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Importation and Custody of Gunpowder Statute 1864* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may proclaim any town, township, or borough, not being a seaport town, as a district into which no gunpowder shall be brought unless for deposit in a public or licensed magazine; and if any person shall bring more than one hundred pounds of gunpowder into any such district, and shall not forthwith deposit the same in a magazine as aforesaid, it shall be forfeited: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the borough hereinafter mentioned as a district into which no gunpowder shall be brought unless for deposit in a public or licensed magazine, that is to say:—

**THE BOROUGH OF CLUNES.**

**PART I. OF "THE POLICE OFFENCES STATUTE 1865" EXTENDED.**

**PROCLAMATION**

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTSFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria passed in the session held in the twenty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign (No. 263), called *The Police Offences Statute 1865*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* extend all or any of the provisions contained in Part I. of the said Statute to any city, town, district, or place in Victoria, and may define the limits of any such city, town, district, or place, and vary and alter such limits, and may revoke any such Proclamation; and upon any such Proclamation the provisions so proclaimed shall extend to and be in force in such city, town, district, or place: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, do, with the advice of the Executive Council, by this my Proclamation, extend all the provisions contained in Part I. of the said Statute to the town hereinafter mentioned, and do define the limits of such town in manner following, that is to say:—

**TOWN OF BATESFORD, IN THE COUNTY OF GRANT.**—Commencing at a point sixty chains west from the north-east angle of section X, parish of Moorparanal; thence by a line bearing south forty chains to the southern boundary of the said section: thence by a line bearing west sixty-nine chains fifty links to the River Moorabool; thence westwards from the opposite bank of the river thirty chains fifty links; thence by a line bearing north forty chains; thence by a line bearing eastwards to the River Moorabool forty-two chains seventy links; thence from the opposite bank of the river along the northern boundary of section X, parish of Moorparanal, fifty-seven chains thirty links to the point of commencement.—(Area 400 acres.)

The deaths in July were fewer by 57 than those in June. They, however, exceeded the average of July during the previous ten years by 7.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 64° on the 14th, and the lowest was 34° on the 4th. The mean temperature of the month (48°6') was 7° above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (23°8') took place on the 24th, viz. — from a maximum of 60°0' to a minimum of 36°2'. The least range (9°4') was on the 23th, viz. — from a maximum of 58°0' to a minimum of 48°6'. The mean daily range was 15°0'. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.886 inches) was a fraction below the average.

Sixty-one per cent. of the deaths were of males, and 39 per cent. were of females; 34 per cent. were of children who had not attained their fifth year, against 39 per cent. in July 1870, 37 per cent. in July 1869, 44 per cent. in July 1868, 44 per cent. in July 1867, 40 per cent. in July 1866, 41 per cent. in July 1865, 41 per cent. in July 1864, 45 per cent. in July 1863, 46 per cent. in July 1862, and 50 per cent. in July 1861.

Twelve persons of 75 years of age and upwards died during the month, viz. — A male aged 76 of softening of the brain, two males aged respectively 75 and 76 and a female aged 76 of bronchitis, a male aged 79 of old age, two males aged respectively 80 and 85 of heart disease, a female aged 80 of phthisis, three females aged 80 of old age, and a female aged 83 of syncope.

Eleven violent deaths occurred during the month, of which the following are the particulars:—A girl aged 4 died of accidental fracture to the skull, a boy aged 7 died of injuries to the head caused by a fall from a pony, a groom aged 37 died of an accidental injury to the knee joint, a carter aged 54 was killed by a fall from his dray, a male child aged 1½ died from the effects of inadvertently inhaling steam from a teapot, a female aged 48 was accidentally poisoned with chloroform medicinally administered, a newly-born male infant was suffocated by immersion in fluid, two male infants aged respectively 7 weeks and 8 months died of suffocation, the latter in bed; an upholsterer aged 26 died from a wound in the jugular vein, verdict manslaughter; and a wood-carver aged 31 cut his throat while of unsound mind.

Seventy-two deaths, or 26 per cent. of the whole, occurred in public institutions, viz.: 37 in the Melbourne Hospital, 1 in the Alfred Hospital, 3 in the Lying-in Hospital, 8 in the Benevolent Asylum, 4 in the Immigrants' Home, 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 2 in the Carlton Lunatic Asylum, 3 in the Industrial Schools, 1 in the Industrial Home, 4 in the Pentridge Stockade, and 3 in the Melbourne Gaol.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 93, of which 61, or 66 per cent., were of males, and 32, or 34 per cent., were of females; 63 were under one year of age, 12 were between one and two years, 4 were between two and three, 9 were between three and four, and 5 were between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 180, of which 106, or 59 per cent., were males, and 74, or 41 per cent., were females; 10 were between five and ten, 5 were between ten and fifteen, 6 were between fifteen and twenty, 9 were between twenty and twenty-five, 20 were between twenty-five and thirty, 11 were between thirty and thirty-five, 22 were between thirty-five and forty, 17 were between forty and forty-five, 21 were between forty-five and fifty, 14 were between fifty and fifty-five, 10 were between fifty-five and sixty, 7 were between sixty and sixty-five, 6 were between sixty-five and seventy, 9 were between seventy and seventy-five, 5 were between seventy-five and eighty, 7 were eighty and upwards, and 1 was of age unspecified.

The deaths from zymotic diseases in June and July were about equal, the most fatal complaint being whooping-cough, which caused 15 deaths in the former month as against 18 in the latter. Forty-five per cent. of the mortality in both months was due to local diseases, the largest number of deaths being caused by diseases of the nervous and respiratory systems. Under the head "Constitutional Diseases," phthisis caused 40 deaths in June, and, combined with hæmoptysis, caused 42 deaths in July.

The persons hereby authorized to occupy for mining purposes as occupants in common the portion of land described in the schedule at the foot hereof, shall not nor will sink any shaft or make any excavation, deposit any earth, stone, or other substance upon or in any other way occupy the surface of any portion of the land actually reserved or set apart or used for reservoir purposes, without having first obtained the permission in writing of the Minister of Mines.

2. The mining operations shall be conducted in such a manner as not to pollute the water in the reservoir, or to cause to flow into it any water pumped from any mine, or any sludge or tailings, or to interfere in any way with the purpose for which the said land was so reserved or set apart or used.

3. It shall be lawful at any time for the Chief Mining Surveyor, or any officer authorized by the Minister of Mines, together with such other person or persons as such Chief Mining Surveyor or other officer may require for assistance, to visit and examine the shafts, galleries, drives, airways, and waterways on, under, or in connection with any workings within the said land, and to use any machinery therewith connected, whether the shafts, galleries, drives, airways, and waterways be within the said land or not, so that they be connected with any workings on or within the said land; and all persons employed in connection with such workings shall afford all necessary facilities to such Chief Mining Surveyor or other officer and his assistants as may be required for the purposes of and with a view to such inspection.

4. ## SHIRE OF CORIO.

## BYE-LAW No. 2.

*For providing for the Management of the Affairs and Proceedings of the Corio Shire Council, made under Part XII. of the Shires Statute.*

IN pursuance of the 187th section of 33 Victoria, No. 358, the Council of the Shire of Corio ordains as follows, that is to say:—

1. If within one hour after the time appointed for any meeting of the council there be not a quorum present, the names of the councillors present shall be entered in the minute-book, and the meeting shall be adjourned.
2. At every ordinary meeting of the council the first business shall be the reading and putting for confirmation the minutes of any preceding meetings; and no discussion shall be permitted thereon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings.
3. After the confirmation of the minutes the order of business shall be as follows or as near thereto as practicable:—
  - I. Reading copies of letters sent since previous meeting.
  - II. Reading letters received and ordering thereon.
  - III. Reception of and reading petitions and memorials and ordering thereon.
  - IV. Reading and ordering on reports of committees, deputations, and officers.
  - V. Orders of the day, including subjects arising from proceedings of former meetings of the council, and any business which the president may think fit to bring under consideration.
  - VI. Motions of which previous notice shall have been duly given.
  - VII. Examination of and passing accounts for payment.
  - VIII. Reading notices of motion for consideration at a future meeting.
4. Every petition or memorial addressed to the council must be presented by a councillor, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded, and no debate shall take place thereon except as to its being received. Every such petition or memorial when received shall be then dealt with as the council may deem most advisable.
5. Every report of a committee shall be signed by the chairman thereof previous to the presentation of such report to the council. All reports to be of uniform size, and to be numbered in consecutive order.
6. Every notice of motion must be given in writing to the secretary, and shall be read aloud by that officer at the meeting previous to that at which the same is to be taken into consideration, and every such notice shall be considered in the order in which it is given. After a notice of motion has been given, the terms thereof may be altered by the mover, on delivering an amended notice to the secretary at least ten days prior to the meeting at which such notice is to be discussed.
7. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be considered unless the councillor who has given such notice, or some other councillor authorised by him in writing, be present to proceed with the same when in order. Any notice not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.
8. The mover of any motion which may be referred to a committee shall, for that occasion, be a member of such committee, and shall convene the first meeting of such committee, for the purpose of their appointment.
9. The president's or chairman's ruling shall be final on all questions or points of order or practice.
10. Every councillor upon proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the president, or councillor acting as chairman, and shall not be interrupted unless by a call to order, when he shall sit down until the question shall have been decided; the subject may then be resumed or other business entered upon.
11. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but, if lost, another may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote; but upon any amendment being carried, the original motion shall be deemed rejected, and the amendment so carried shall take the place of the original, and on it only one amendment can be moved.
12. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, except by way of explanation, or in reply upon an original motion or amendment of which he was the mover; and immediately after the reply, the amendment or original motion, as the case may be, shall be put to the test.
13. The president, or councillor acting as chairman, shall, on taking the vote on any motion or amendment, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative. The voting shall in all cases be by show of hands taken for and against the motion.
14. No discussion shall be allowed upon any motion for the adjournment of the council, but such motion shall immediately upon being seconded be put from the chair, and in the event of its being negatived, the consideration of the subject then under discussion shall be resumed, or the next on the notice paper proceeded with, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment be carried; the

business then undisposed of shall have precedence when the council resume.

15. No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion, nor impute motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly, and any councillor making use of any expression capable of being applied to any other councillor, shall at once, if required so to do by the president, or any other councillor acting as chairman, withdraw such expression, and make a satisfactory apology to the council.

16. The president or chairman for the time being shall call to order any councillor out of order; and if the councillor deemed out of order shall not obey he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds (£5).

17. Any councillor by consent of the president may require the secretary to take down any particular words used by another councillor immediately upon the same being uttered.

18. Any councillor may record his protest against any resolution of the council, on giving notice of his intention to do so, immediately upon the adoption of such resolution, and on such councillor entering his protest, and his reasons for protesting, in a book to be kept for that purpose in the office of the council, and on his signing the same before the next meeting of the council; provided always that such protest may be expunged if declared by a majority of the council not to be in accordance with truth, or not to be in its terms respectful to the council.

19. That no petition or memorial applying for pecuniary aid from the shire funds be entertained by the council.

20. Every application for temporary permission to erect gates on roads within the shire shall be entertained at the subsequent ordinary meeting of the council to that at which such application has been made. The applicant shall be required in the meantime to publicly notify both by placards posted in the immediate vicinity, and on the site whereon such gate is intended to be erected, and also by publication in a local newspaper, the fact of such application having been so made. Should the council see fit to grant the permission applied for, the expenses in connection therewith shall in all cases be borne by the applicant.

21. Any part of this bye-law may be suspended *pro tem* in case of emergency, with the consent of two-thirds of the number of councillors present at any meeting, the same being entered in the minutes of the proceedings at such meeting.

And that the following bye-law heretofore existing be and the same is hereby repealed, that is to say:—The bye-law numbered 1, "To provide for the management of the affairs of the Shire Council of Corio."

The foregoing bye-law was made by special order on the fourth day of January 1871, and was confirmed this first day of February 1871.

## BYE-LAW No. 3.

*Bye-law of the Council of the Shire of Corio, for the purpose of regulating the conduct of the Officers and Servants employed by the said Council, made under Part XII. of the Shires Statute.*

IN pursuance of the 187th section of 33 Victoria No. 358, the Council of the Shire of Corio ordain as follows, that is to say:—

1. Any person appointed hereafter to a vacant office in the shire shall be appointed by resolution passed at a special meeting of the council to be called for that purpose; his appointment shall be made under the common seal of the shire, and shall be signed by the president for the time being. Every officer shall hold his appointment only during the pleasure of the council, and shall be paid such salary or allowance by way of salary as the council shall determine from time to time.
2. If the council desire to dispense with the services of or to remove any officer, they shall do the same by a resolution passed to that effect at a special meeting to be called for the purpose, and one month's notice in writing from the date of such meeting shall be given to such officer, to notify that his services will be dispensed with and that his appointment will be cancelled accordingly.
3. If any officer desire to resign his appointment, he must give at least two month's notice in writing thereof, to be addressed to the president of the shire.
4. Any officer or servant of the council who shall wilfully disobey the lawful orders or instructions of the council, or refuse or neglect to perform the duties appertaining to his office, or misconduct himself as such officer or servant, may be suspended from duty by the president of the shire, who may appoint some other person to do and perform such office, pending the decision of the council at a special meeting to be called for the purpose of inquiring into or investigating the causes of the complaint and suspension, as shall be reported by the president in writing, with respect to such accused officer or servant.
5. The secretary of the shire shall attend all ordinary and other meetings of the council, and shall also give attendance at the office of the council one day in every week, and at other stated times as the council may appoint.
6. The secretary shall prepare the notice paper of business for each ordinary and special meeting, and shall send a copy thereof by post, or otherwise, to each councillor six clear days

before such meeting; and shall, beside keeping the minutes, books, and accounts of the council, be the custodian of all documents belonging to the council, and of the common seal of the shire, and shall be responsible for the same. Every impression of the common seal affixed to any corporate document by instruction of the council shall be verified by the signature of the secretary.

7. The treasurer of the shire shall furnish monthly reports to the council, showing all moneys that have been received by him during the previous month, and their disposal.

8. The shire surveyor shall attend all ordinary and special meetings of the council, and also meetings of committees if required; and shall furnish a report in writing at each ordinary meeting of the state and condition of the roads in the shire, and of the works in progress, together with the amount of payment due on each contract.

9. The shire surveyor shall, in any case where the works of any contract are not complete within the time specified, set forth in the next and each subsequent certificate given for the purpose of progress payment, the particulars of the delay in the completion of such works, and the amount to be deducted as and by way of liquidated damages from the moneys due to the contractor, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the contract.

10. The collector shall furnish monthly reports in writing, showing all moneys that have come into his hands during the previous month, and their disposal, and shall report from time to time, as occasion may require, all changes in the occupancy of rateable property, and any other matters done by virtue of his office.

11. No councillor shall become surety for any officer or servant of the council, nor shall any officer become surety for any other officer of the council.
