RIDINGS OF THE SHIRE OF MINHAMITE.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twenty-third day of November 1871.

PRESENT:

WHEREAS by *The Shires Statute* (33 Vict. No. 355, § 13) it is amongst other things enacted, that at any time not less than thirty days before or after an annual election, or general election, or first appointment of councillors, whether under the Act No. CLXXVI. hereby repealed or this Act, for any shire, the Governor may, if he shall have received a petition to that effect signed by one-fourth of the number of voters on the voters' roll in such shire, and if he shall think fit so to do, divide the shire into two or into three ridings, by such names and with such boundaries respectively as shall by Order in Council be assigned to the same, and may from time to time, subject to the like conditions, alter, vary, or rescind such Order: And whereas the powers conferred upon the Governor by the section of the Act above recited are now exercised upon a petition to that effect signed by one-fourth of the number of voters on the voters' roll of the Shire of Minhamite, and notices of such petition have been published in the manner prescribed in the twenty-ninth section of the same Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order divide the said Shire of Minhamite into three ridings, to be designated by the names and to be comprised within the boundaries which are hereinafter assigned to the same respectively, that is to say:—

THE NORTH-EAST RIDING.—Commencing at the north-west angle of section 2, in the parish of Banangal; thence southerly by the western boundary of the said section to a road bounding the said section on the south; thence westerly by the said road to the junction of the road bounding section 5 of the said parish on the west; thence southerly by that road to its junction with the main road from Belfast to Hamilton; thence south-easterly by the said main road to the southern boundary of section 5 of the said parish; thence easterly by the southern boundary of said section 5, and by the road bounding section 4 on the south to the north-east angle of section 16, all of the said parish; thence southerly to the north-west angle of section 19 in the parish of Clonleigh; thence easterly by the northern boundaries of sections 19, 20, and 21 of the said parish, and by the road bounding on the north sections 15 and 16, and allotment 2 of section 17, all of the parish of Kangertong to the south-east angle of allotment 5 of section 13 of said parish; thence north by the road bounding the last said allotment on the east to the north-west angle of allotment 1 of section 17 of said parish; thence easterly by the northern boundaries of the said allotment 1 of section 17, and of sections 18, 19, and 20, and of allotments 3 and 4 of section 8 of the said parish, to the eastern boundary of the shire; thence northerly, westerly, and south-westerly by the shire boundaries to the commencing point.

THE SOUTH-EAST RIDING.—Commencing at a point in the centre of the main road from Belfast to Hamilton due west of the southern boundary of section 5 of the parish of Banangal; thence by a line bearing east and easterly by the southern boundary of said section, and by the road bounding section 4 on the south to the north-east angle of section 16, all of the said parish; thence southerly to the north-west angle of section 19 in the parish of Clonleigh; thence easterly by the northern boundaries of sections 19, 20, and 21 of the said parish, and by the road bounding on the north sections 15 and 16 and allotment 2 of section 17, all of the parish of Kangertong, to the south-east angle of allotment 5 of section 13 of said parish; thence north by the road bounding the last said allotment on

the east to the north-west angle of allotment 1 of section 17 of said parish; thence easterly by the northern boundaries of the said allotment 1 of section 17, and of sections 18, 19, and 20, and of allotments 3 and 4 of section 8 of the said parish, to the eastern boundary of the shire; thence southerly, south-easterly, southerly, south-westerly, southerly and westerly by the shire boundaries to the intersection of the main road from Belfast to Hamilton with the southern boundary of the shire; thence north-westerly by the said main road to the commencing point.

THE WEST RIDING.—Commencing at the intersection of the main road from Belfast to Hamilton with the southern boundary of the shire (as gazetted 13th day of January 1871); thence westerly, southerly, westerly, northerly, westerly, northerly and south-easterly by the shire boundaries to the north-west angle of section 2 of the parish of Banagal; thence southerly by the western boundary of the said section to the road bounding the said section on the south; thence westerly by the said road to the junction of the road bounding section 5 of the said parish on the west; thence southerly by that road to its junction with the main road from Belfast to Hamilton; thence south-easterly by the said main road to the commencing point.

And the Honorable Francis Longmore, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

TOWN IN THE PARISH OF TARBAYOUKYAN.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869*, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor may divide into counties the territory not already included in any county, and may also subdivide any county into parishes and towns, and may divide into parishes and towns any territory not included in any county, and by proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette* may define the boundaries of such counties, parishes, or towns, and may distinguish each by a name; and after such proclamation the territory comprised within the boundaries of any of the said divisions shall thenceforward be recognized as a county, parish, or town by the name so given as aforesaid. The Governor may from time to time at the request of the council of any shire or borough alter by proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette* the name of any such shire or borough, and may also from time to time by proclamation as aforesaid alter the name of any county, parish, town, township, land, area, goldfield, river, harbor, lake, bay, lagoon, swamp, mountain, glen, or other place or locality whatsoever within Victoria; and it is also enacted, that the Governor may from time to time by a notice in the *Government Gazette* proclaim as a street or road or as a town or village any portion or portions of Crown lands, and the lands in such town or village shall be sold by auction in the manner therein provided for the sale of Crown lands by public auction, and the lands upon which such street or road shall have been proclaimed shall be and be deemed to be thenceforward dedicated to the public: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby notify and proclaim as a town the portion of Crown lands hereinafter described, viz:—

TOWN IN THE PARISH OF TARBAYOUKYAN.—Commencing at the south-west angle of allotment 53, parish of Tarrayoukyan, being a point on the eastern side of the road from Harrow to Casterton; bounded thence by that allotment bearing east forty-two chains thirty-seven links; thence by allotment 51 bearing south twenty chains; thence by a road bearing west forty-six chains eighty-three links to the first-mentioned road; and thence by that road bearing N. 13° 37' E. twenty chains forty-six links to the commencing point. The bearings are from the true meridian.—(71.D.14825.)

The deaths in October were fewer by 3 than those in September, but exceeded the average of October during the previous ten years by 88. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population they will be found to have been 8 below the average.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 86° on the 24th, and the lowest was 32° on the 3rd. The mean temperature of the month (54°5') was 2°5' below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (37°9') took place on the 31st, viz.:—from a maximum of 82°5' to a minimum of 44°6'. The least range (4°1') was on the 25th, viz.:—from a maximum of 55°1' to a minimum of 51°. The mean daily range was 13·9°. The mean atmospheric pressure (29·968 inches) was slightly above the average.

Fifty-seven per cent. of the deaths were of males, and 43 per cent. were of females; 41 per cent. were of children who had not attained their fifth year, against 32 per cent. in October 1870, 40 per cent. in October 1869, 45 per cent. in October 1868, 40 per cent. in October 1867, 51 per cent. in October 1866, 52 per cent. in October 1865, 41 per cent. in October 1864, 37 per cent. in October 1863, 40 per cent. in October 1862, and 64 per cent. in October 1861.

Five persons of 75 years of age and upwards died during the month, viz.:—A male aged 75 hanged himself, a male aged 82 died of bronchitis, a female aged 83 of heart disease, a male aged 88 and a female aged 81 of old age.

Fifteen violent deaths occurred during the month, of which the following are the particulars:—A boy aged 9 died of concussion of the brain caused by a fall, a boy aged 10 was killed by being dragged and struck by a horse, a boy aged 14 died of accidental injury to the head, a farmer aged 24 died of injuries to the head caused by a fall from a horse, a quarryman aged 26 was killed by a blow from a stone whilst quarrying, a broker aged 33 died of rupture of the bladder the result of a fall in a scuffle, a female aged 39 died of fracture of the skull caused by a fall, a dairyman aged 44 died of concussion of brain caused by a fall from a horse, a girl aged 3 and a boy aged 9 died from the effects of scalds, a female aged 30 died during the administration of chloroform, a boy aged 5 and a saddler aged 20 were accidentally drowned, a butcher aged 38 died of a blow on the head (verdict manslaughter), and a carpenter aged 75 hanged himself.

Sixty-three deaths, or 23 per cent. of the whole, occurred in public institutions, viz.:—35 in the Melbourne Hospital, 5 in the Alfred Hospital, 2 in the Lying-in Hospital, 6 in the Benevolent Asylum, 3 in the Immigrants' Home, 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 4 in the Industrial Schools, 1 in the Melbourne Gaol, and 1 in the Pentridge Stockade.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 114, of which 54, or 47 per cent., were of males, and 60, or 53 per cent., were of females; 72 were under one year of age, 22 were between one and two years; 7 were between two and three, 8 were between three and four, and 5 were between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 163, of which 104, or 64 per cent., were males, and 59, or 36 per cent., were females; 15 were between five and ten, 4 were between ten and fifteen, 7 were between fifteen and twenty, 12 were between twenty and twenty-five, 10 were between twenty-five and thirty, 14 were between thirty and thirty-five, 13 were between thirty-five and forty, 18 were between forty and forty-five, 19 were between forty-five and fifty, 7 were between fifty and fifty-five, 17 were between fifty-five and sixty, 9 were between sixty and sixty-five, 8 were between sixty-five and seventy, 5 were between seventy and seventy-five, 1 was between seventy-five and eighty, and 4 were eighty and upwards.

SHIRE OF SEYMOUR.

BYE-LAW No. 2.

For providing for the management of the affairs and proceedings of the Seymour Shire Council, made under Part XII. of the Shire Statute.

IN pursuance of the 187th section of 33 Victoria No. 358, the Council of the Shire of Seymour ordain as follows, that is to say:—

1st. If, within one hour after the time appointed for any meeting of the council, there be not a quorum present, the names of the councillors present shall be entered in the minute book and the meeting shall be adjourned.

2nd. The ordinary meetings of the council shall be held on the first Tuesday in every month, at eleven o'clock a.m.

3rd. The first business of all meetings of the council shall be the reading and confirmation of the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings; after confirmation, such minutes shall be signed by the president.

4th. Special meetings of the council shall, on the requisition of three or more members, be convened by the secretary; the object of such meeting being set forth in the requisition.

5th. At the ordinary meetings of the council, after the confirmation of the minutes, the following shall be the order of business, viz. :—

1. Reading and ordering on correspondence.
2. Reading petitions and memorials, and considering thereon.
3. Reading and ordering on reports of committees and officers.
4. Orders of the day arising out of previous minutes, and any business the president may bring before the meeting.
5. Motions of which previous notice shall have been given in writing.
6. Examination and passing of accounts.
7. Notices of motion.

6th. Every petition addressed to the council shall be presented by one of the councillors, who shall be responsible for its being properly and respectfully worded.

7th. No motion shall be proceeded with unless the councillor who gave notice thereof, or some other councillor duly authorised by him in writing, be present when called upon to proceed with the same. Notice of motion not so proceeded with shall be considered as having lapsed.

8th. The mover of any motion which may be referred to a committee shall, for that purpose, be a member of such committee.

9th. No motion or amendment shall be entertained or discussed until it has been seconded, and one amendment only shall be discussed at one time; but, if lost, any other may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote.

10th. No person, not being a councillor, shall be permitted to address the council without the consent of the majority of the council then present.

11th. Every councillor, including the president, shall stand while addressing the council.

12th. The ruling of the president shall be final on all points of order or practice, and shall be given without comment or argument.

13th. Every motion and amendment shall be entered in the minute book, with the names of the mover and seconder, and, on a division thereon, the votes shall be recorded.

14th. Any councillor may require the secretary to take down the particular words used by a councillor, immediately on the same being uttered.

15th. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment; if the motion be carried, the business undiscussed shall have precedence at the next ordinary meeting of the council; but, if lost, the subject previously under consideration, or the next in order, shall be discussed before a subsequent motion for adjournment be entertained.

16th. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, except in reply or personal explanation.

17th. Any councillor who shall refuse to obey when called to order by the president, or who shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor, and who shall refuse to withdraw such expression and make a satisfactory apology when required to do so by the president, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds (£5).

18th. Any councillor may protest against any resolution of the council by delivering the said protest in writing to the secretary, duly signed, stating his reason or reasons for protesting against such resolution, and the secretary shall make an entry of same in the minute book.

19th. Any councillor may, without previous notice, move a call of the council for the consideration of any subject, and upon such motion being carried, the secretary shall give notice thereof to each councillor six days at least before the meeting for which such call is made; such notice to state the subject for consideration and the date and hour of meeting.

20th. No motion, the effect of which shall be to rescind a former resolution of the council, shall be entertained unless notice thereof in writing be given at a preceding meeting, and a call of the council made for that purpose.

21st. It shall be competent for a majority of the council to suspend at any meeting one or more of the standing orders herein contained, except the purport of such suspension be the rescinding of any motion previously adopted.


