LICENSE FEE FOR THE OCCUPATION OF A SITE FOR AN INN, STORE, ETC.

THE Governor in Council has altered the regulations relating to the issue of lesses or liveness for other than pastoral purposes, under part 3 of The Land Act 1839, made and ordered by the Governor in Council on the 1st February 1870, so far as the same relate to the issue of liceness under schedule I, attached to the said regulations for the occupation of sites for an inn, store, smithy, bakery, or similar building, in a thinly populated district, and has directed that a fee of Five pounds (£5) per annum be the minimum fee payable for a licenes to occupy a site for any of the purposes specified herein, such fee to be payable as directed in the before-mentioned schedule: Provided that such reduced minimum fee payable in respect of any licenes as before mentioned shall not apply to licenses for occupation of sites within any city, town, or borough, the fees chargeable for which shall remain as heretofore.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reiwn of Her present Majesty, initialed An Act for Horpitals and Charitable Institutions, it is amongst other things amouted, that any institution established for the cure of disease, or for the relief of diseased, aged, incurable, or destitute persons, and supported in whole or in part by the voluntary contributions of not less than fifty persons, each of whom shall have paid not less than One pound per annum or Twenty pounds in one domation, may be incorporated as thereinafter mentioned, and all persons who shall have paid as aforesaid shall be deemed contributors within the meaning of the said Act; and it is also enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than twenty-five of the said persons praying that such institution may be incorporated to cause the substance or prayer of such perition to be published in the Government Gusette, and (if no counterpetition, signed by an equal or greater number of such persons, shall have been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication) the Governor in Council may declare the contributors for the time being to such institution to be, and they shall thereupon become and continue, a body politic and corporate by the style and title named in the Order in Council, and shall have perpetual succession and a common seal: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition, sixned by not less than twenty-five contributors to the institution known as the Ballarat District Hospital, praying that the said institution may be incorporated: And whereas the substance or prayer of the said petition has been published in the Government Gazette, and no counter satisfion has been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication:

that if at any time in any road district, whether single or united,
and whether the area be one hundred square miles or less, the
total net annual value of the rateable property as appearing by
the general rate then last made shall have amounted to or exceeded Twelve thousand pounds, it shall be lawly for the
Governor, it it shall seem fit, to constitute such district a shire
within the meaning of The Shires Statute, by such name as in
and by the Order in Council may be assigned to the same;
and the subdivisions, if any, of the district subsisting at the time
of such constitution shall be and be called ridings of the shire:

mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees shall be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons; and it is also enacted that the Governor may from time to time incresse, and after one month's notice in the Government Gazette diminish, alter or abolish any common heretofore or hereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of this Act; and nothing herein contained shall prevent the sale by auction or the leasing or licensing under this Act of any land comprised in any common heretofore or hereafter to be proclaimed; and it is also directed that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons shall be published and all objections theretos shall be heard in the manner set forth in the One hundredth section of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby re-proclaim the common hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

Regulations of the Council of the Borough of Buninyong made under subdivision One of Part 10 of the Twelfth Schedule of the Boroughs Statute adopted by Hye-law numbered One for licensing and regulating hackney carriages, borough stage carriages, and the owners, drivers, and conductors thereof.

In pursuance of subdivision one of part 10 of the twelfth schedule of the Boroughs Statute adopted by Bye-law of the Council numbered 1, the council of the Borough of Buninyong make the following regulations that is to say:—

yong make the following regulations that is to say:—

1. The fees payable for the license for a borough stage within the area comprised by the circumference of a circle whose radius is five miles from the principal post office of the Borough of Buninyong shall be forty shillings.

2. The fee payable for the license for a hackney carriage within the prescribed space shall be twenty shillings.

3. The name of the borough and number corresponding to the license shall be displayed outside on the centre pannel of the door of the borough stage carriage in letters and figures not less than one inch square, to be kept legible and undefaced.

4. The name of the borough and the number corresponding to the license shall be displayed on the near side of a hackney carriage in letters and figures not less than one inch square, to be kept legible and undefaced. The drivers or conductors of borough stage carriages or hackney carriages shall not cause any annoyance or disturbance by shouting out their destination, and shall at the time appointed proceed direct on their iourney.

5. No borough stage carriage shall be licensed to carry at one 5. No borough stage carriage shall be licensed to carry at one time a greater number of passengers in the whole, or in the inside, or on the outside thereof than the same will contain at one time upon fit and proper seats provided therein or thereupon for that purpose, allowing for every passenger, on an average, upon each and every seat a space convenient for sitting thereon of fifteen inches, measuring in a straight line lengthwise on the front of each seat, inside and out, and such inside seats shall be two feet apart from the outer edge thereof: Provided that no child under five years of age sitting on the lap shall be deemed to be a passenger within the meaning of this regulation.

shall be deemed to be a passenger within the meaning of this regulation.

6. No backney carriage shall be licensed to carry at one time a greater number of passengers than the same will contain at one time upon fit and proper seats provided therein for that purpose, allowing for each passenger on an average upon each and every seat a space convenient for sitting thereon of not less than fifteen inches in width: Provided that no child under five years of age sitting on the lap shall be deemed to be a passenger within the meaning of these regulations.

7. The number of passengers which a borough stage carriage is licensed to carry shall be displayed in letters and figures not less than one inch square on the outside of the centre panel of the door, or in some equally conspicuous place.

8. The number of passengers which a hackney carriage is licensed to carry shall be displayed in letters and figures not less than one inch square upon a board to be affixed to the iron sustaining the back step.

9. Every licensed borough stage carriage shall have the light necessary to be carried inside placed at the centre of the front of the carriage opposite the door.
