## LICENSE FEE FOR THE OCCUPATION OF A SITE FOR AN INN, STORE, ETC.

THE Governor in Council has altered the regulations relating to the issue of leases or licenses for other than pastoral purposes, under part 3 of *The Land Act* 1869, made and ordered by the Governor in Council on the 1st February 1870, so far as the same relate to the issue of licenses under schedule 1, attached to the said regulations for the occupation of sites for an inn, store, smithy, bakery, or similar building, in a thinly populated district, and has directed that a fee of five pounds (£5) per annum be the minimum fee payable for a license to occupy a site for any of the purposes specified herein, such fee to be payable as directed in the before-mentioned schedule: Provided that such reduced minimum fee payable in respect of any license as before mentioned shall not apply to licenses for occupation of sites within any city, town, or borough, the fees chargeable for which shall remain as heretofore.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the fifteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled *An Act to make provision for the better administration of Justice in the Colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor of the said Colony, by any Orders to be by him, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, from time to time made and proclaimed, to define the limits of districts within and the times at which Circuit Courts shall be holden in the said colony, and the said limits and times to alter and vary as he shall, with the advice aforesaid, deem necessary: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order appoint the places and times at which the several Circuit Courts of Victoria shall be holden during the year One thousand eight hundred and seventy-two to be as follow, that is to say:—

## INCORPORATION OF BALLARAT DISTRICT HOSPITAL.

*At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the eighteenth day of December 1871.*

PRESENT:

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled *An Act for Hospitals and Charitable Institutions*, it is amongst other things enacted, that any institution established for the cure of disease, or for the relief of diseased, aged, incurable, or destitute persons, and supported in whole or in part by the voluntary contributions of not less than fifty persons, each of whom shall have paid not less than One pound per annum or Twenty pounds in one donation, may be incorporated as thereinafter mentioned, and all persons who shall have paid as aforesaid shall be deemed contributors within the meaning of the said Act; and it is also enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than twenty-five of the said persons praying that such institution may be incorporated to cause the substance or prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition, signed by an equal or greater number of such persons, shall have been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication) the Governor in Council may declare the contributors for the time being to such institution to be, and they shall thereupon become and continue, a body politic and corporate by the style and title named in the Order in Council, and shall have perpetual succession and a common seal: And whereas the Governor in Council has received a petition, signed by not less than twenty-five contributors to the institution known as the Ballarat District Hospital, praying that the said institution may be incorporated: And whereas the substance or prayer of the said petition has been published in the *Government Gazette*, and no counter petition has been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order declare the contributors to the said institution to be a body politic and corporate in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, in manner following, that is to say:—

The contributors for the time being to the institution called and known as the Ballarat District Hospital, situate at Ballarat in the Colony of Victoria, are hereby declared to be a body politic and corporate by the style and title of "The Ballarat District Hospital."

And the Honorable Charles Gavan Duffy, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

## PART OF THE SHIRE OF ARARAT ATTACHED TO THE SHIRE OF STAWELL, AND PART OF THE SHIRE OF STAWELL TO THE SHIRE OF ARARAT.

*At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the eleventh day of December 1871.*

WHEREAS by *The Shires Statute* (33 Vict. No. 358, § 22) it is amongst other things enacted, that if the whole or a majority of the ratepayers of any part of a shire or road district in which an annual or general election or first appointment of members has taken place, shall, by petition under their hands, describing such part by metes and bounds, pray the Governor that such part be severed from such shire or road district, or if any part of any shire or road district shall not have been alienated from the Crown and be unoccupied, it shall be lawful for the Governor, if he shall think fit so to do, to order that such part, or so much thereof as the Governor shall think proper, be severed from such shire or road district respectively, and by the same or any other order to direct that the portion so severed from such shire or road district respectively shall be attached to any other shire, borough, road district, riding, or subdivision to be named in such order, and the same shall take effect upon the publication of such order in the *Government Gazette*: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of December in the year 1864, the Shire of Stawell was constituted: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the twenty-third day of August in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine the Shire of Ararat was divided into three separate ridings, the respective boundaries of which were therein described: And whereas the powers conferred upon the Governor by the section of the Act above recited are now exercised upon petitions of a majority of the ratepayers of a part of the North Riding of the Shire of Ararat, and of the Southern portion of the Shire of Stawell, and notices of such petitions have been published in the manner prescribed in the twenty-ninth section of the same Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by this present Order, and in compliance with the prayer of the petitions hereinbefore mentioned, doth sever a part of the Shire of Stawell, described in such petition, from such shire, and doth hereby direct that the portion so severed from such shire shall be attached to the North Riding of the Shire of Ararat; and doth sever a part of the North Riding of the Shire of Ararat, and doth hereby direct that the portion so severed from such North Riding of the Shire of Ararat shall be attached to the Shire of Stawell: And the Governor, with the advice aforesaid, doth hereby set forth the altered boundaries of the said Shire of Stawell and of the North Riding of the said Shire of Ararat in manner following, that is to say:—

THE SHIRE OF STAWELL.—Commencing at the bifurcations of the River Wimmera; thence easterly by the main road to the town of Navarre; thence by the western boundary of that

own and a line south to the north boundary of the parish of Dunneworthy; thence west by said parish boundary to the main dividing range; thence by the main dividing range and the range separating the waters of the Mount William and Pleasant Creeks to a point due east of Hall's Gap; thence by a line bearing west to the eastern boundary of the parish of Bell-ellen; thence southerly to the south-east angle of said parish; thence westerly by the southern boundary of said parish to the south-west angle thereof; thence northerly by the western boundary of said parish to a point due east of Hall's Gap; thence by a line bearing west to the Grampians; thence by the Grampians Range to Briggs' Bluff; thence by a line north-east to the River Wimmera; thence by the River Wimmera to the commencing point, excepting the borough of Stawell.

**THE SHIRE OF ARARAT.—NORTH RIDING.**—Commencing at the south-east angle of allotment 58, parish of Shirley; thence north-westerly by a one-chain road to the western boundary of the said parish; thence north-westerly by a one-chain road to the north-west angle of allotment 47 A, parish of Woodnagerak; thence south by a one-chain road to the south-west angle of the said allotment; thence west by a one-chain road to the north-west angle of Chualicum pre-emptive section; thence north-westerly to the north-west angle of allotment 15 A, parish of Ballyrogan; thence west by a one-chain road through the parishes of Ballyrogan, Langhi-logan, Merrymbulla, Kalymna, and Nekeeya to the north-west angle of allotment 35, parish of Nekeeya; thence westerly by the southern boundary of allotments 29 and 31 to the south-west angle of the last-mentioned allotment; thence west by a line to the south-east angle of allotment 33; thence west by a one-chain road to the northern boundary of the county of Ripon at the south-west angle of allotment 80, parish of Nekeeya; thence by a line due west to the western boundary of the shire; thence northerly by said western boundary to the southern boundary of the shire of Stawell, as proclaimed on 21st of January 1861; thence easterly and northerly by the southern and eastern boundaries of the said shire of Stawell to a point due west of the south-west angle of the township reserve of Crowlands; thence easterly and southerly by the shire boundaries to the commencing point, excepting the borough of Ararat.

And the Honorable Francis Longmore, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

#### CONSTITUTING A ROAD DISTRICT TO BE A SHIRE

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the eleventh day of December 1871.

**WHEREAS** by *The Shires Statute amendment Act 1870* (34 Vict. No. 387, § 2) it is amongst other things enacted, that if at any time in any road district, whether single or united, and whether the area be one hundred square miles or less, the total net annual value of the rateable property as appearing by the general rate then last made shall have amounted to or exceeded Twelve thousand pounds, it shall be lawful for the Governor, if it shall seem fit, to constitute such district a shire within the meaning of *The Shires Statute*, by such name as in and by the Order in Council may be assigned to the same; and the subdivisions, if any, of the district subsisting at the time of such constitution shall be and be called ridings of the shire: And whereas the total net annual value of the rateable property in the road district hereinafter mentioned, as appearing by the general rate now last made in such district, has exceeded Twelve thousand pounds, and it seems fit to constitute the same to be a shire: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order constitute the Road District hereinafter mentioned to be a Shire within the meaning of *The Shires Statute* by the name hereby assigned to the same, that is to say:—

**THE KEILOR ROAD DISTRICT**, which was created by a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-third day of February 1863, and was divided into electoral subdivisions by an Order of the fourteenth day of December 1863, shall be and is hereby constituted and shall be named the

**SHIRE OF KEILOR.**

And the Honorable Francis Longmore, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

#### COMMONS RE-PROCLAIMED.

##### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

**WHEREAS** by *The Land Act 1860* it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common and place it under the management of any borough or shire council,

mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees shall be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons; and it is also enacted that the Governor may from time to time increase, and after one month's notice in the *Government Gazette* diminish, alter or abolish any common heretofore or hereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of this Act; and nothing herein contained shall prevent the sale by auction or the leasing or licensing under this Act of any land comprised in any common heretofore or hereafter to be proclaimed; and it is also directed that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons shall be published and all objections thereto shall be heard in the manner set forth in the One hundredth section of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby re-proclaim the common hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

**THE CHILTERN AGRICULTURAL AREA FARMERS' COMMON** which was described amongst others in a Proclamation bearing date the eleventh day of November One thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight and was added to by another Proclamation bearing date the sixteenth day of August One thousand eight hundred and seventy is hereby re-proclaimed as a Common pursuant to the Fifty-eighth section of the recited Act.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this eighteenth day of December, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and in the thirty-fifth year of Her Majesty's reign.

##### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

**WHEREAS** by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled *An Act to consolidate the laws for the protection of Fisheries and Game*, it is amongst other things enacted, that if any person shall set, lay down, use, or fish with any kind of net in the Yarra Yarra, Plenty, Werribee, or Saltwater Rivers in the Colony of Victoria, or in any or either of their respective tributaries, or in any other lake, creek, stream, or pond, to which the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, shall by Proclamation duly published in the *Government Gazette* extend the provisions of the said Act, he shall forfeit such net, and also such sum, not exceeding Ten pounds, as the convicting justice shall think fit: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby extend the above-recited provisions of the said Act, being the Eleventh clause thereof, to the River Wimmera and its tributaries.

#### EXTENSION OF THE 11TH CLAUSE OF THE FISHERIES AND GAME STATUTE TO SWAN BAY AND THE SWAN PONDS.

##### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

**WHEREAS** by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled *An Act to consolidate the laws for the protection of Fisheries and Game*, it is amongst other things enacted, that if any person shall set, lay down, use, or fish with

any kind of net in the Yarra Yarra, Plenty, Werribee, or Salt-water River, in the Colony of Victoria, or in any other lake, creek, stream, or pond, to which the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, shall by Proclamation duly published in the *Government Gazette*, extend the provisions of the said Act, he shall forfeit such net, and also such sum, not exceeding Ten pounds, as the convicting justice shall think fit; and by an Act of the said Parliament passed in the twenty-ninth year of Her said Majesty, intituled *An Act to explain and amend the Fisheries and Game Statute*, it is enacted, that the Eleventh clause of the *Fisheries and Game Statute* shall be held to mean and include, and extend to all waters and all streams, salt or fresh, within Victoria, not being the property of private individuals: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor, and the seal of the colony, bearing date the twelfth day of July One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, the provisions of the said clause were extended to Swan Bay and the Swan Ponds, in the county of Grant, during the whole year: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the said Proclamation, and do extend the above recited provisions of the said eleventh clause of the *Fisheries and Game Statute* to the Swan Bay and Swan Ponds, in the county of Grant, but to have effect only during the months of October, November, December, January, February, and March, in each year.

# QUARANTINE DISTRICTS UNDER "THE SCAB ACT 1870."

IN pursuance of the 64th section of *The Scab Act 1870*, the Governor in Council has ordered that the portions of Victoria whereof the boundaries are hereinafter defined, shall be Quarantine Districts within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:—

**BARTON RUN.**—Commencing at the point where the Lexington run crosses the summit of the Mount William Range; thence by that range and a line, being the eastern boundary of the Mount Burchet run, bearing southerly and south-westerly to the Wannoon run; thence by that run bearing south-easterly to the Yarram-yarram run; thence by that run bearing south-easterly to the Mount William run; thence by that run bearing north-easterly and easterly to the Mount William Plains run; thence by that run and by the Burrumbeep run, bearing north-easterly to the Lexington run aforesaid; and thence by that run westerly to the point of commencement: as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.

**HAMILTON QUARANTINE DISTRICT.**—Commencing at the south-west angle of allotment 7 of section 2, parish of Greenhills, being a point on the eastern side of the road from Portland to Hamilton; thence east to Lake Condah Swamp; thence southerly by the eastern margin of that swamp to the creek which forms part of the eastern boundary of the Lake Condah pre-emptive section; thence by that creek to Lake Condah; thence by the western shore of that lake southerly to Darlott's Creek; thence by that creek downwards to the Fitzroy River; thence by that river upwards to the aforesaid road from Portland to Hamilton; and thence by that road north-easterly to the point of commencement: as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne. [Provided that the run known as Condah Hills Estate, now in the occupation of Mr. Andrew Hamilton, shall form no part of this Quarantine District.]

The boundaries above described include the Whittlebury and Ettrick runs and parts of the Lake Condah and Sinclair's East runs.

**COLBINABBIN RUN.**—Commencing at the south-west angle of the Burrumbot run; thence by the Burnewang East run bearing westerly one mile and three quarters, more or less; thence again by that run and by the Campaspe River run bearing southerly to the Mount Pleasant run; thence by that run bearing easterly and southerly to the Colbinabbin North run; thence by that run bearing easterly, northerly, easterly, and northerly to the Gohareep run; thence by that run bearing northerly to the Wanalta West run; thence by that run bearing north-westerly to Burrumbot run aforesaid; and thence by that run bearing southerly and westerly to the point of commencement: as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.

## BOROUGH OF BUNINYONG.

REGULATION No. 1 UNDER PART 10, SCHEDULE 12, BOROUGH'S STATUTE.

Regulations of the Council of the Borough of Buninyong made under subdivision One of Part 10 of the Twelfth Schedule of the Boroughs Statute adopted by Bye-law numbered One for licensing and regulating hackney carriages, borough stage carriages, and the owners, drivers, and conductors thereof.

IN pursuance of subdivision one of part 10 of the twelfth schedule of the Boroughs Statute adopted by Bye-law of the Council numbered 1, the council of the Borough of Buninyong make the following regulations that is to say:—

1. The fees payable for the license for a borough stage within the area comprised by the circumference of a circle whose radius is five miles from the principal post office of the Borough of Buninyong shall be forty shillings.
2. The fee payable for the license for a hackney carriage within the prescribed space shall be twenty shillings.
3. The name of the borough and number corresponding to the license shall be displayed outside on the centre panel of the door of the borough stage carriage in letters and figures not less than one inch square, to be kept legible and undefaced.

4. The name of the borough and the number corresponding to the license shall be displayed on the near side of a hackney carriage in letters and figures not less than one inch square, to be kept legible and undefaced. The drivers or conductors of borough stage carriages or hackney carriages shall not cause any annoyance or disturbance by shouting out their destination, and shall at the time appointed proceed direct on their journey.

5. No borough stage carriage shall be licensed to carry at one time a greater number of passengers in the whole, or in the inside, or on the outside thereof than the same will contain at one time upon fit and proper seats provided therein or thereupon for that purpose, allowing for every passenger, on an average, upon each and every seat a space convenient for sitting thereon of fifteen inches, measuring in a straight line lengthwise on the front of each seat, inside and out, and such inside seats shall be two feet apart from the outer edge thereof: Provided that no child under five years of age sitting on the lap shall be deemed to be a passenger within the meaning of this regulation.

6. No hackney carriage shall be licensed to carry at one time a greater number of passengers than the same will contain at one time upon fit and proper seats provided therein for that purpose, allowing for each passenger on an average upon each and every seat a space convenient for sitting thereon of not less than fifteen inches in width: Provided that no child under five years of age sitting on the lap shall be deemed to be a passenger within the meaning of these regulations.

7. The number of passengers which a borough stage carriage is licensed to carry shall be displayed in letters and figures not less than one inch square on the outside of the centre panel of the door, or in some equally conspicuous place.

8. The number of passengers which a hackney carriage is licensed to carry shall be displayed in letters and figures not less than one inch square upon a board to be affixed to the iron sustaining the back step.

9. Every licensed borough stage carriage shall have the light necessary to be carried inside placed at the centre of the front of the carriage opposite the door.

- 2nd load of water, Five shillings.
- And for all other loads of water actually used at fires, Three shillings each load.
4. All night-soil or other offensive matter or refuse shall be removed or carted through the prescribed space, between the hours of Seven o'clock p.m. and Six o'clock a.m.

Under these regulations the licenses shall commence on the day of issue, and continue in force until the thirty-first day of December next ensuing, both days inclusive, provided it be not forfeited in the meantime.
