TORRES STRAITS AND GREAT NORTH-EAST CHANNEL.

THE following information has been supplied by Captain Moresby, R.N., having been obtained by him during the recent visit of H.M.S. *Basilisk* to Torres Straits.

A reef, not laid down on the charts, lies two miles S.S.W. from Brothers Hills' Island (Gabba). It is three and a quarter miles long, W. by N. and E. by S., and two miles wide; and is named Mourilyan's Reef.

An island (Sibic Island), not shown on the chart, lies three miles E.N.E. from Mount Cornwallis Island. It is about four miles long, N.N.W. and S.S.E., by one and a half wide, its northernmost point being in about $9^{\circ} 23' 50''$ S. latitude, and $142^{\circ} 37' 40''$ E. longitude.

Warrior Island.—A sunken reef with two fathoms of water over it extends one mile to the westward of the fringing reef shown upon the chart. In the passage between this island and Dungeness Island the tide was found to run from four to five knots. The flood setting N.W. by N., and ebb S.E. by S.

The correct position of the sunken rock (now named Moresby Rock) reported by Mr. Jardine as lying off Saddle Island, in the Great North-East Channel, a notice of which was issued from this office, on the 9th February 1872, is as follows:—

Bearings from the sunken rock—
Banks Island Peak, just open of Burke Island West.
Nine-pin Rock, S.S.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.
Bet Islet, E.N.E.
Sue Islet, E. by S.

Bearing of sunken rock from south point of Saddle Island, S. $85^{\circ} 20'$ E.

The flood tide in the vicinity of the rock was found setting to the north-east, and the ebb to the south-east, at the rate of two and a half knots at springs. The channel between the rock and Saddle Island is clear and free from danger.

Captain Moresby is of opinion that the "Wreck Shoal," shown on recent charts as lying five miles E.N.E. from Saddle Island, will be found not to exist.

He also remarks that, as a general rule, the fringing coral reefs round the islands are of greater extent than shown on the chart.

INNER ROUTE TO TORRES STRAITS.

Mourilyan Harbor, about forty miles northward of Cardwell, is marked on recent charts as "Shoal Haven." "Reported good harbor," and is situated in latitude $17^{\circ} 35'$ S. and longitude $146^{\circ} 9'$ E. It has been examined by Captain Moresby, R.N., during the late trip of H.M.S. *Basilisk* to Torres Straits, and is reported by him as being a harbor likely to prove a valuable refuge for vessels during heavy south-easterly weather.

The least depth of water found in the centre of the channel until well inside the harbor was thirty feet. The width of the entrance from rock to rock being only 120 yards, with high land on either side, sailing vessels should not attempt to enter except with a fair and commanding breeze; steamers may enter safely at all times. After entering, the water immediately deepens to seven, eight, ten and twelve fathoms; but

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the area over which this depth of water is found, though affording space within which four or five large vessels could moor, is apparently of limited extent, the greater part of the harbor being an extensive mud flat, with from three to six feet on it at low water; the rise and fall apparently ranging from eight to twelve feet.

Moresby River (not shown on the chart) empties itself into the southern end of Mourilyan Harbor, and a narrow channel, with nine feet at low water, leads from Camp Point—the point on the south shore inside the entrance—to the mouth of the river. For the first mile after entering there is not less than six feet at low water, and above that for fourteen miles not less than eight feet in mid-channel. The current was sluggish, and the banks fringed with mangroves, which, however, did not seem to extend far beyond the farthest point explored.

Glady's River, in latitude $17^{\circ} 30'$ S., and longitude $146^{\circ} 6'$ E., is marked on the chart as "Shoal Rivulet." It has a bar entrance, with only two or three feet at low water. Inside the bar, the stream is about 150 yards in width, with an average depth of six or eight feet. The stream was sluggish, but fresh to within a few hundred yards of the bar.

REEF OFF PIPON ISLANDS.

Captain Thos. Harris, late master of the *Jeanie Oswald*, reports striking on a reef in the position given on the chart to a five fathom patch, lying one and a quarter miles to the north-westward of the Pipon Islands. He estimates the depth of water on this patch as not exceeding one fathom at low water.

Captain Harris also reports that the two and a-half fathom patch, lying about two miles from the main land, in $11^{\circ} 31'$ S. latitude, has not now more than three feet of water upon it at low water.

He also reports a reef lying six miles S.S.W. from the southernmost, Sir Chas. Hardy's Island.

SOUTH ENTRANCE, MORETON BAY.

MASTERS of vessels using this Passage, are cautioned that the depth of water on the Bar has decreased from 15 to 13 feet 6 inches at low water springs.

To ensure carrying this depth, the bar should be crossed with the rocky knoll on the beach westward of Point Lookout almost in line with the centre hummock of the triple hill at the back, instead of midway between the two western hummocks, as previously directed; the north break being at the same time on with Mount Cumpest. After crossing the bar the inshore end of the north break should be steered for until the deep water channel is reached, when a course should be steered so as to ensure being to the northward of the line of beacons before rounding the south spit.

ALTERATION IN THE CUTTING OF THE LIGHT AT GABO ISLAND.

It having been ascertained that the present cutting of the light on Gabo Island shows across Cape Howe and does not guide vessels clear of the foul ground in the immediate vicinity, masters of vessels and others navigating that locality are informed that on and after the first day of July next the bearing of the western limit of the light will be altered from S.S.W. to S.W. b. S., so as to clear the dangers to the southward and south-eastward of Cape Howe.

The light will be visible in clear weather from a ship's deck at a distance of seventeen (17) miles on an arc from E.N. round northerly to S.W. b. S.

FEES FOR LICENSES UNDER § 49 OF "THE LAND ACT 1869."

IN pursuance of the provisions of *The Land Act 1869* (33 Vict. No. 360, § 49, 50, and 110), and in exercise of the power thereby conferred, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order make the Regulations hereinafter set forth, that is to say:—The Regulation, No. 35, made and ordered by the Governor in Council on the 1st February 1870, prescribing the fees payable for licenses to occupy land for residence or cultivation under the provisions of the 49th section of *The Land Act 1869*, is hereby rescinded, and in lieu thereof the fee payable for licenses to occupy lands for those purposes under the before-mentioned section of the said Act, is hereby fixed at the rate of Two shillings (2s) per acre, or fractional part of an acre, per annum for land outside the boundaries of cities, boroughs, towns containing more than 150 inhabitants, or within a distance of twelve (12) miles of Melbourne; such fees to be payable in advance to the Receiver and paymaster (or other officer appointed to receive the same) whose office shall be nearest to the land held under such license; and every license to bear date of the day on which it is granted by the Governor, and to continue in force for a period not exceeding one year from such date, and to be renewable: Provided that no such license shall issue for any less fee than One pound (£1), and that fees to be paid for licenses to occupy land for residence or cultivation in any city, town containing more than 150 inhabitants, or borough, shall be as under, viz.:

For sites comprising any area not exceeding five (5) acres, Two pounds (£2) per annum.

For sites comprising any area exceeding five (5) acres and not exceeding ten (10) acres, Two pounds ten shillings (£2 10s) per annum.

For sites comprising any area exceeding ten (10) acres and not exceeding twenty (20) acres, Four pounds (£4) per annum.

The deaths in March were fewer than those in February by 23. They were also less than the average of March in the previous ten years by 20. If allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been less than the average of March by 90.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 96° on the 3rd, and the lowest was 43.2° on the 31st. The mean temperature of the month (65.3°) was nearly 2° above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (38.6°) took place on the 2nd, viz., from a maximum of 91.6° to a minimum of 56°. The least range (6.8°) was on the 27th, viz., from a maximum of 57.8° to a minimum of 51°. The mean daily range was 21.7°. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.925 inches) was slightly below the average.

Males contributed 55 per cent. and females 45 per cent. to the total mortality of the month. Children who had not attained their fifth year contributed 55 per cent. to that mortality against 52 per cent. in March 1871, 47 per cent. in March 1870; 43 per cent. in March 1869; 61 per cent. in March 1868; 63 per cent. in March 1867; 57 per cent. in March 1866; 59 per cent. in March 1865; 58 per cent. in March 1864; 57 per cent. in March 1863, and 53 per cent. in March 1862.

Six persons of 75 years of age and upwards died during the month, viz.:—A male, aged 78, of old age; a male, aged 83, of apoplexy; a male, aged 81, and a female, aged 82, of cancer; a female, aged 80, of dysentery; and a female, aged 82, of paralysis.

Sixteen violent deaths occurred during the month, of which the following are the particulars:—A boy aged 5 was killed by a kick from a horse; a baker, aged 18, died of injury to the spine; a carter, aged 27, died of injuries to the chest caused by the upsetting of a cart; a carpenter, aged 37, was killed by an accidental fall from a building; a french-polisher, aged 60, died of fracture of the skull caused by a fall whilst, under the influence of drink; a female, aged 66, died of injuries received by falling down stairs; a laborer, aged 71, died of accidental fracture of the skull; a female servant, aged 28, died of burns; a boy, aged 2, was accidentally drowned in a water-tub; a boy, aged 8, a publican, aged 25, and a seaman, aged 35, were accidentally drowned; a hawker, aged 62, was found drowned; a female infant was suffocated in bed; an ex-wardsman of the Melbourne Hospital, aged 26, was murdered; and a carpenter, aged 53, committed suicide by hanging.

Sixty-two deaths, or 18 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—33 in the Melbourne Hospital, 4 in the Alfred Hospital, 5 in the Lying-in Hospital, 1 in the Children's Hospital 9 in the Benevolent Asylum, 5 in the Immigrants' Home, 3 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 2 in the Industrial Schools, and 1 in the Pentridge Stockade.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 188, of which 88, or 47 per cent., were of males, and 100 or, 53 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 117 were under one year of age, 50 were between one and two years, 9 were between two and three, 6 were between three and four, and 6 were between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 155, of which 102, or 66 per cent., were males, and 53, or 34 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 117 were under one year of age, 50 were between one and two years, 9 were between two and three, 6 were between three and four, 6 were between four and five, 14 were between five and ten, 8 were between ten and fifteen, 6 were between fifteen and twenty, 6 were between twenty and twenty-five, 14 were between twenty-five and thirty, 13 were between thirty and thirty-five, 17 were between thirty-five and

forty, 21 were between forty and forty-five, 16 were between forty-five and fifty, 12 were between fifty and fifty-five, 8 were between fifty-five and sixty, 10 were between sixty and sixty-five, 10 were between sixty-five and seventy, 5 were between seventy and seventy-five, 1 was between seventy-five and eighty, and 5 were eighty and upwards.

RULES OF THE CLUNES DISTRICT HOSPITAL.

(Incorporated 1871.)

OBJECTS.

THE objects of the institution are to afford medical and surgical aid to destitute persons requiring it, and for the necessary treatment of casualties, but no person who shall be found able to pay for surgical aid shall receive further than temporary assistance; provided always that persons willing to pay may be admitted to the institution at the discretion of, and on such terms and conditions as the committee may deem fit.

GOVERNMENT.

2. The institution shall be governed by a committee of management, consisting of a president, two vice-presidents, treasurer, and eleven ordinary members of committee, all of whom shall be contributors or benefactors, and shall be elected in accordance with the provisions of *The Hospital and Charitable Institutions Act, 27 Vic., No. 220, sec. 12.*

CONTRIBUTORS.

3. Benefactors of £10 or contributors of £1 shall be called annual subscribers, and shall have the privilege of recommending one in-door or three out-door patients annually, they shall also be entitled to one vote at all general meetings.

4. Benefactors of £25 or contributors of £10 shall be called life subscribers, and shall have for life the same privileges as the annual subscribers.

5. Benefactors of £20 or contributors of £2 shall be called annual governors, and shall be entitled to recommend two in-door or six out-door patients, or have the alternative of recommending one in-door and three out-door patients annually; they shall also have two votes at all general meetings.

6. Benefactors of £50 or contributors of £20 shall be called life governors, and shall have for life the same privileges as the annual governors.

7. Any additional benefaction or contribution shall entitle to additional privileges in accordance with the above scale in respect of recommending patients only.

8. The current year shall, with respect to each benefaction or contribution, be reckoned from the day of payment.

9. That it is hereby understood that the word "benefaction" shall mean a sum of money raised from the public by collection or otherwise, and the word "contribution" a personal gift.

10. Every firm or partnership contributing shall exercise the privileges through some one member of the same only.

11. No person shall hold or be eligible for any honorary office (except that of honorary medical officer), nor have any vote, nor exercise any privilege connected with the institution, unless his subscription shall have been paid at least seven clear days previous.

GENERAL MEETINGS.

12. The annual meeting of contributors to the hospital shall be held on the second Thursday in the month of January in every year, for the following purposes, viz.:

To receive the annual reports.

To elect a president, two vice-presidents, and treasurer.

To fill vacancies in the committee of management.

To elect an honorary medical officer.

To elect two auditors.

13. All votes at the annual and other meetings of contributors shall be taken by a show of hands, unless a ballot shall have been previously demanded by three of the contributors present, in which case the vote or votes referred to shall be by ballot.

14. At all meetings of contributors ten shall constitute a quorum, and as soon as a quorum is present the chair shall be taken, but if no quorum be present within half an hour of the time named, such meeting shall stand adjourned to the following week at the same day and hour.

15. It shall be competent for a majority of the committee of management, or ten or more contributors by a writing under their hands, to require the secretary to summon a special meeting of contributors, the occasion of calling such meeting being specified in the requisition, and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting but that so specified, and every such meeting shall be convened by the secretary by advertisement, in one or more local papers, at least one week before the day of meeting.

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

16. The committee of management shall direct the general business of the hospital, enter into all contracts connected therewith, and direct payment for the same; they shall appoint and discharge all paid officers and servants of the institution.

17. They shall meet on the first Monday in every month, at eight o'clock p.m., and at such other times as may be necessary; five members shall constitute a quorum.

18. The chairman of committee (who shall be the president if present; one of the vice-presidents in his absence, or some other member in their absence) shall have a casting vote only.

19. The president shall be empowered to convene a meeting of the committee at any time he may consider necessary, and the secretary shall, on receiving a requisition from three members of committee, convene a special meeting thereof.

20. The committee of management shall, at the first committee meeting subsequent to the annual meeting of subscribers in each year, elect from among themselves a house committee of three, one of whom shall retire from office in rotation at each monthly meeting, at which meeting the vacancy shall be filled up. The duties of the house committee shall be to visit the hospital at least once a week, to examine buildings, inspect the wards, make enquiry respecting the quality and quantity of the rations, enforce rules, investigate accounts and report upon the same, and all other matters connected with the management of the institution, at the next monthly meeting of the general committee. The office of any member of the house committee shall cease by his ceasing to be a member of the general committee.

21. The committee of management shall, at the first committee meeting held subsequently to the annual meeting of subscribers in each year, elect from among themselves a finance committee of five, whose duty shall be to examine all accounts for disbursement, and certify as to their correctness, and also see that the money received by the collector has been paid into the bank to the credit of the hospital.

22. If any member of committee shall die, or resign by letter under his hand addressed to the president of the committee, or become insolvent, or compound with his creditors, or be convicted of any treason, felony, or misdemeanor, or be absent from four consecutive ordinary meetings of the committee, his office shall become vacant, and the remaining members of the committee may temporarily appoint thereto some contributor until the next annual meeting for the election of the committee, when the person thus temporarily appointed shall retire as one of those who, by the provisions of the Act 27 Vic., No. 220, are required to go out of office.

23. The general committee shall present a report of the affairs of the hospital at each annual meeting, which report shall be presented at a special meeting of the committee for revision and approval, at least one week before the annual meeting.

24. The president, vice-presidents, and treasurer, shall be *ex officio* members of all sub-committees.

25. The committee shall be empowered to frame such by-laws and regulations as they may deem necessary for the proper internal government of the institution, in its different departments, provided such by-laws are not repugnant to the laws of the institution, or the Act of Parliament.

TREASURER.

26. All moneys received on account of the hospital shall be paid to the treasurer, or his account at the bank, and appropriated by him to the purposes of the institution on the authority of the committee of management.

27. All moneys received by the treasurer on account of the hospital shall be paid into the credit of the institution at the bank, within forty-eight hours after such moneys shall amount to Five pounds (£5), and receipt of same made known to the collector as early as possible.

28. The treasurer shall close his accounts on the 31st of December in every year.

SECRETARY AND COLLECTOR.

29. The secretary shall attend all meetings, take minutes of the same, conduct all correspondence, and carry out the directions of such meetings in the particulars incident to his duties. He shall submit a balance-sheet at every ordinary meeting of the committee of management, showing the receipts and expenditure since the previous meeting. He shall collect subscriptions for the institution, and in all cases give receipts for the same, and pay them over to the treasurer's account within forty-eight hours after such moneys shall amount to Five pounds (£5). He shall act as secretary in connection with the yearly hospital fetes or any other public demonstrations in aid of the funds of the institution, and shall carry out the instructions of the committee with reference to the same. He shall enter into a guarantee for the faithful discharge of his duties.

AUDITORS.

30. The auditors shall, in the first week of January in every year, or as soon as conveniently may be, prior to the annual meeting of contributors, examine the collector's books, cash-book, and balance-sheet, with all accounts, vouchers, and documents relating thereto, and shall report thereon to the general committee at the meeting appointed by them. In the event of the office of auditor becoming vacant between the annual meetings of subscribers the committee of management shall be empowered to fill up such vacancy or vacancies.

HONORARY MEDICAL OFFICER.

31. The honorary medical officer shall attend at the hospital for consultation or co-operation whenever requested by the resident surgeon, and shall have access to the institution at all times.

RESIDENT SURGEON.

32. The resident surgeon shall be a legally qualified medical practitioner, and shall reside at the hospital. He shall be allowed private practice within the hospital after the hour of twelve o'clock noon, and outside between the hours of two and six o'clock p.m., provided always that he shall not attend any cases outside of the borough, except in consultation, or any midwifery cases, and shall make provision for being communicated with during his absence, in case of accidents or urgent cases, otherwise he shall devote his whole time to the duties of the hospital.

33. He shall receive the certificates from applicants for admission, examine the nature of each case, and decide on its fitness for admission, and shall discharge such patients as he considers fit to be discharged.

34. He shall have charge of all patients in the hospital, and their treatment; but, if necessary, in case of difficulty or danger, shall request the attendance of the consulting medical officer.

35. He shall perform all surgical operations and *post mortem* examinations, and shall keep the key of the dead-house. He shall also give due notice to the honorary medical officer when a consultation is to be held, or an operation performed; but in all cases of emergency shall act to the best of his judgment.

36. He shall superintend and control all servants in the hospital, and have power, in cases of insubordination or neglect of duty to suspend any of them until the decision of the committee; and, if necessary, to hire temporary substitutes for servants thus suspended.

37. He shall receive, examine, take charge of, and distribute all articles supplied for the use of the hospital.

38. He shall keep all such accounts and make such reports as may be directed by the committee.

39. He shall carry out all regulations made by the committee for the internal management of the hospital.

PATIENTS.

40. All applicants for admission must be provided with a recommendation ticket; the medical fitness of the applicant shall be determined by the surgeon.

41. All patients shall be required to pay the actual expense of their maintenance, as far as circumstances may enable them; and all property found on deceased patients shall be appropriated to the defraying of the expense of their maintenance and burial, and the residue (if any) to be handed to their legal representatives.

42. Severe accidents and cases of decided emergency may be admitted at any time by the visiting committee, honorary medical officer, or house surgeon.

43. No pregnant female, for the purpose of confinement, no child under two years of age, no person insane or laboring under *deltium tremens* or infectious disorder, or subject to epilepsy, or any one who in the opinion of the examining physician or surgeon might receive equal benefit as an out-door patient, shall be admitted into the hospital.

44. Patients shall conduct themselves orderly, and shall strictly observe all the directions of the honorary medical officer, resident surgeon, wardsmen, and nurses.

45. They shall take their medicines at the time directed, and they shall not take any other medicines than those prescribed; and they shall not conceal nor put away any portion of the medicines or diet administered to them.

46. No one shall leave his or her ward and go into another ward or department, nor leave the house, nor remain out for a longer time than is granted, nor shall introduce visitors, nor receive medicines, victuals, liquor, or tobacco, or anything without the express leave of the resident surgeon.

47. They shall not gamble, nor smoke, nor spit on the floor, nor deface or injure any parts of the ward, nor any furniture, bedding, or clothing therein; nor sing, blaspheme, nor use any rude or indecent language on pain of dismissal.

48. No patient shall give reward or gratuity to any of the wardsmen, nurses, or any of the other servants.

49. Any patient having any cause of complaint shall make the same known to the resident surgeon, whose duty it shall be to enter such complaint immediately, in the presence of the nurse or wardsmen of the ward, in a book kept for that purpose, which book shall be laid before the visiting committee at each meeting.

50. Patients considered by the resident surgeon sufficiently convalescent to be able to assist in the work of the institution, may, at the direction of the resident surgeon, be so employed.

51. Patients shall not sit up after eight o'clock p.m. in the winter, or after nine o'clock p.m. in the summer, and all patients considered by the resident surgeon able to do so shall rise at seven o'clock a.m. in the summer, and before eight o'clock a.m. in the winter.

OUT-PATIENTS.

52. Out-patients holding a ticket of recommendation will receive out-door relief on Tuesday and Friday mornings only, between the hours of ten and twelve o'clock, except in cases of emergency.

53. Each out-door patient having a recommendation from a subscriber, will be entitled to receive medical relief for eight weeks, from the date of first advice, but should the disease from which the person is suffering require more than eight weeks attendance, it will be necessary to obtain another ticket of recommendation.

54. Any person or persons imposing on the charity of the institution will render themselves liable to prosecution.

55. Ministers of religion shall have access to sick persons of their respective denominations, at such times as shall be appointed by the committee; any minister may attend any patient at any time, when requested by such patient; and in cases of death, a notice shall be forwarded to the clergyman of the denomination to which the deceased patient belongs, stating the hour of burial.

VISITORS.

56. In-patients will be furnished with cards to admit three friends on Sunday and Wednesday in each week, between the hours of Two and Five o'clock in the afternoon.

57. Visitors may be admitted on special occasions, by permission of the resident surgeon.

58. Visitors will not be allowed to go into any ward without the leave of the resident surgeon, and must retire when requested to do so by him.

59. They will not be permitted to give to or leave with any patient medicine, food, tobacco, or liquor of any kind, nor any other thing, without the express sanction of the resident surgeon.

60. Visitors shall not give to any servant of the institution any money or gratuity of any kind.

61. Visitors shall not interfere with the wardsmen or nurses, nor disturb the patients by loud talking or unnecessary noise.

62. Any visitor violating any of the regulations of the institution, or behaving with impropriety, will be compelled to re-

tire, and will not be re-admitted without special leave from the resident surgeon or house committee.

MEETINGS.

63. All meetings in connection with the hospital shall be open to subscribers, and to the representatives of the press, but no person present at committee meetings, who is not a member of committee, shall be permitted to interfere or take any part in the proceedings.

ALTERATION OR AMENDMENT OF RULES.

64. No new rule shall be made, nor any of the existing rules rescinded, altered, or amended, except with the concurrence of a majority of the subscribers present at the annual general meeting; or of a majority of subscribers present at a special meeting convened for the purpose, of which seven days notice shall have been given by advertisement. No. 1678

BYE-LAWS, SWAN HILL DISTRICT HOSPITAL.

Incorporated under 27 Vict. No. 230, 11th March 1872.

THE following Bye-laws were adopted and confirmed at a special meeting of contributors duly convened for that purpose, and held in the board-room of the Swan Hill District Hospital on Thursday, 28th March 1872, at Two o'clock p.m.

OBJECT OF INSTITUTION.

The object of this institution shall be to afford gratuitous medical and surgical aid to poor persons requiring the same irrespective of race, country, or color, and no person who, in the opinion of the board of directors, shall be considered able to pay for such aid shall receive further than temporary assistance, except said board shall, from special circumstances, deem it advisable to accept payment.

PORTION OF ACT FOR HOSPITALS AND CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS APPLICABLE.—(2ND JUNE 1864.)

Bye-laws.—It shall be competent for the corporation of any such institution to make bye-laws for the regulation of its own proceedings, for fixing the number of votes of contributors in proportion to the amount of their contributions, for determining the validity of disputed elections, and for conducting such elections, and generally for all matters whatsoever affecting the management of the institution not inconsistent with the laws of this colony; but no such bye-law shall be of any force or effect until one month after the same shall have been confirmed by a general meeting of contributors specially convened for that purpose and published in the *Government Gazette*: Provided that no such bye-laws shall enable any contributor to exercise more than three votes.

Disallowance of bye-laws.—The Governor in Council may at any time revoke any such bye-law, and every order by which any such bye-law shall be revoked shall be published in the *Government Gazette*, and shall take effect from the time of such publication.

Legality of bye-laws may be tried in a summary manner.—If any contributor to the support of any such incorporated institution as aforesaid shall desire to dispute the validity of any such bye-law, and shall pay into the Supreme Court the sum of Fifteen pounds as security for the costs of the proceedings hereinafter mentioned, it shall be lawful for such contributor to apply to the said court upon an affidavit of the facts for a rule calling upon the corporation to show cause why such bye-law should not be quashed for the illegality thereof, and the said court may make the same absolute or discharge it with or without payment of costs as to the court shall seem meet.

Property of institution to be vested in body corporate.—All real and personal estate held by any person in trust for any institution at the time of the incorporation thereof under the provisions of this Act shall be and the same is hereby transferred to and vested in such incorporated institution.

Retirement of committee-men.—(On the second Thursday in the month of January in every year one-third part of the elected members of the committee shall go out of office (but may nevertheless be re-elected), and the persons who shall go out of office shall be those who have been the longest in office without re-election, or where two or more shall have been in office for the same length of time, then those who shall go out of office shall be determined by lot.

Vacancies how filled.—If any member of the committee shall die, or resign by letter under his hand addressed to the chairman of the committee, or become insolvent, or compound with his creditors, or be convicted of any treason, felony, or misdemeanor, or be absent from four consecutive meetings of the committee, his office shall become vacant, and the remaining members of the committee may declare his office vacant, and temporarily appoint thereto some contributor to such institution until the next annual meeting for the election of the committee, when the person thus temporarily appointed shall retire as one of those who by the provisions of the Act are required to go out of office.

Notice to contributors may be sent by post to registered address (14 and 15 Vict. c. 56, s. 2).—All notices to any officer or member of, or a contributor to, any present or future charitable institution, whether incorporated or not, which, by the charter, statutes, laws, or rules (as the case may be) of such institution for the time being are or shall be required to be given, may be served by the same being transmitted through the post, directed according to an address in this colony (to be left for that purpose by such officer, or member, or contributor, in writing under his hand, at the chief establishment of such institution), in such time as to admit of the delivery in the due course of post at or before such period (if any) as is or shall be prescribed by the charter, statutes, laws, rules (as the case may be) for the time being of such institution for the giving of such notices.

Proof of service (ib. s. 2).—In proving such service as aforesaid it shall be sufficient to prove that such notice was so directed as aforesaid and put into a general post office in such

time as aforesaid, but so nevertheless that nothing in this Act contained shall be held to render invalid any personal service of any notice, any further act, matter, or thing than would have been required for the service thereof by the charter, statutes, laws, rules, for the time being of the institution which the same shall concern if this Act had not been passed.

Notice to certain contributors to be unnecessary (ib. s. 2).—No notice of any intended court, board meeting or election shall be required to be served either by post or otherwise on any officer or member of or contributor to any such institution as last aforesaid who shall not have left an address in the manner, at the place, and for the purpose hereinbefore mentioned, anything in any such charter, statutes, laws, or rules to the contrary notwithstanding.

Existing Acts inapplicable.—The several Acts mentioned in the schedule to this Act shall not extend or apply to or in any manner affect any institution incorporated under this Act, or any of the officers or servants of the same, or any of the contributors thereto.

BYE-LAWS ANENT GOVERNING BODIES.

Government in whom vested.—The government of this institution shall be vested in annual or special meeting of the subscribers, and in a committee of management, whose decisions and government shall in all disputed matters be subject to the revision of such annual meeting of subscribers.

BYE-LAWS ANENT ANNUAL MEETING.

Section 1. *Annual meeting when to be held.*—The annual meeting of subscribers shall be held on the second Thursday of January in every year, at Two o'clock p.m. in the board-room of the Swan Hill District Hospital, Swan Hill.

Section 2. *Who may attend.*—Subscribers of One pound or over, whose subscriptions have been paid any time on or before the 31st of December, shall alone be entitled to record their votes at such annual meeting, held on the second Thursday of the succeeding year. All subscribers shall be entitled, however, to be present and express their sentiments.

Section 3. *Chairman.*—At such annual meeting the president, or in his absence the vice-president, shall take the chair, and in the absence of either the meeting shall choose its own chairman.

Section 4. *Order of business.*—The following shall constitute the roll of business, as well as the order in which such business shall be taken up by the meeting:—

Clause 1. The election of a president, vice-president, and treasurer.

Clause 2. Receive the annual report of the committee of management for the preceding year.

Clause 3. The election of one-third of the members of the board of directors in the place of those retiring (clause 9, Act 1864).

Clause 4. The election of honorary medical officers and two auditors.

Section 5. *Disputed elections.*—Such elections having been made, objections to their validity shall be called for three times at the outer door of the board-room; and should no objections be taken then and there such elections be declared to be beyond dispute or appeal. Should objection be taken to any or all of such elections an adjourned meeting shall be called to hear and finally adjudicate on such disputed elections, always supposing that written reasons of dissent or objections shall have been placed in the hands of the chairman prior to the adjournment of such meeting, otherwise such dissent or objection will be taken as having been fallen from.

Section 6. *Quorum must meet within one hour.*—At all meetings of contributors twelve members shall constitute a quorum. Should no quorum present themselves within one hour of the time named for such annual meeting, then such meeting shall stand adjourned to that day week, at Two o'clock p.m.

Section 7. *Special meetings.*—It shall be competent for the chairman for the time being, or the committee of management, or any twenty or more subscribers of not less than One pound per annum, by a writing under their hands to require the secretary to summon a special meeting of the contributors, the occasion of calling such meeting being specified in the requisition; and no business shall be transacted at any such special meeting except that for which it has been summoned. Every such meeting to be advertised, in a local newspaper which shall circulate in the district, not less than one week before the date of such meeting; also that the first business before such special meeting be for the subscribers then present to declare whether the business on which they have been summoned justifies the party or parties signing the requisition in calling such a meeting. Being of opinion that the business is such as justifies the requisitionists, they shall then proceed as in the annual meeting to deliberate and decide. Should they rule otherwise, they shall dismiss without proceeding to business. Voters must be annual subscribers of One pound for the time being.

Section 8. *Qualification. Voters. No. of votes. Proxies not allowed. Reference, stations, and partnerships.*—At all such general meetings annual contributors of not less than One pound, or new contributors of not less than One pound, whose subscriptions may have been paid not less than six months previous to the annual meeting, shall be entitled to record one vote; annual subscribers of Twenty pounds may record three votes; and subscribers of not less than three annual payments of Five pounds may record two votes. At all such meetings contributors or benefactors may not vote by proxy.* Firms and partnerships, and societies, may exercise their privileges through any member of the same who shall produce proper written authority for so doing.

* By an annual contributor or subscriber of One pound is meant any one who shall have paid the above sum for a past and for the current year. By a benefactor is meant any one who shall have subscribed £20 in one sum to the funds of the hospital.

Section 9. *All honorary officers retire annually.*—The president, vice-president, treasurer, honorary medical officers, and auditors shall retire annually from their respective offices, and shall be eligible for re-election.

Section 10. *No paid official can vote.*—No paid officer or servant of the institution shall record his vote at such meeting.

Section 11. *Life governors, appointment.*—The annual meeting shall appoint life governors.

BYE-LAWS ANENT BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

Board of directors.—The governing committee shall be styled the board of directors; shall consist of the president, vice-president, treasurer, and not less than seven contributors, with the honorary medical officers.

Section 1. *Qualification of members.*—Any person shall be eligible for election as a member of the board of directors who shall have actually paid One pound to the funds of the hospital any time prior to the annual meeting, or who is a benefactor of Twenty pounds.

Section 2. *Ex-officio members.*—The president, vice-president, and treasurer shall be ex-officio members of the board.

Section 3. *Chairman.*—The president, or in his absence the vice-president, shall preside at all meetings of the board, but in the absence of either the meeting may appoint its own chairman.

Section 4. *Meetings when and where held. Quorum.*—The ordinary meetings of the board shall meet on the first Saturday of every month, at Seven o'clock p.m., in the board-room of the hospital; four members to constitute a quorum.

Section 5. *Paid officials may not be present.*—No paid officer or servant except the secretary, nor any contractor to the institution, shall be present at any meeting of the board, unless specially requested to attend, or be eligible for election thereto; and on any such member of committee becoming a paid servant or officer or contractor, his seat shall immediately be forfeited.

Section 6. *Quorum must meet within half an hour.*—Should no quorum present themselves within half an hour of the time specified for meeting, the board shall adjourn until the corresponding day and hour in the following week.

Section 7. *Reading of minutes.*—No business shall be entered upon until the minutes of the previous meeting have been read, and no remarks will be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy.

Section 8. *Duties of board.*—The board of directors shall direct the general business of the hospital; shall frame bye-laws in accordance with the Act of 1864, and rules for the internal regulation of the hospital; shall enter into contracts by tender for the supply of provisions and all other articles for the use of the hospital; shall appoint one of their visiting committee to sign orders for such supplies, &c.; shall appoint and discharge all paid officers and servants of the institution, and shall determine upon, order, and direct all repairs or extension of the present hospital building.

Section 9. *Duties of visiting committee.*—The visiting committee shall, on the surgeon's report, give orders for the admission, discharge, dismissal of all patients, and report their reasons for so doing to the board at their next meeting.

Section 10. *Special meeting.*—The president, vice-president, or any three of the board, by a writing under their hands, may require the secretary to call a meeting of committee. Notice of such special meeting must be given to and in the hands of each member of committee then within the district, not less than three days previous to meeting. The occasion for calling such meeting shall be stated in such requisition, and no other business may be transacted at such special meetings. Four members to form a quorum. The occasion, as in meetings specially called by subscribers, for calling such meeting shall be the first business.

Section 11. *Vacancies how filled up.*—Whenever any vacancy shall occur in the offices of president, vice-president, treasurer, honorary medical officers, or auditors, the board of directors shall appoint a contributor to fill such office until the next annual meeting of subscribers.

Section 12. *Appointment of sub-committee.*—The board of management may appoint sub-committees from time to time, and at the first meeting of the board in each year the following sub-committees shall be appointed:—

Clause 1. *Visiting.*—A visiting committee, to consist of two members, for each month in the year.

Clause 2. *Finance.*—A finance committee of two members, who shall hold office for the year.

The sub-committees to report at each ordinary meeting of the board and receive directions from it.

Section 13. *Notices of motions anent bye-laws. Notices of important business.*—One month's notice must be given of any motion to enact or amend bye-laws, or rescind resolutions passed; and no motion during the same year to rescind resolutions passed will be received later than three after passing of such resolutions. All motions on other than ordinary business must be intimated to the secretary one week before such meetings. The secretary to give intimation of the same to all members of committee.

Section 14. *Protests and appeals.*—It shall be competent for any member of the board to demand that his protest, dissent, and appeal to the annual meeting be entered on the records, provided such records of dissent be not accounted frivolous or vexatious, in which case they shall be kept in *retentis*, and the committee shall, in such a case, be open to censure by the annual meeting, should such action be by them judged unjust. Protest, dissent, and appeal being recorded, all action must cease until the decision of the annual meeting.

Section 15. *Chairman's vote.*—The chairman of the board shall in cases of equality of votes have a casting as well as a deliberative vote.

Section 16. *Annual report.*—The board shall present a yearly general report of the affairs of the hospital to the annual subscribers on the second in January of every year.

Section 17. *New officials engaged by board.*—The board shall engage all servants and paid officers, and have power to reduce or increase their number or salaries at their discretion.

BYE-LAWS ANENT DUTIES OF TREASURER.

Section 1. *Monies to whom paid.*—All monies paid by cheque.—All monies received on account of the hospital by the collector or others shall be paid to the treasurer, and appropriated by him to the purposes of the institution under the direction of the board. All monies received by him whenever the same shall amount to ten pounds shall be paid to the account of the Swan Hill District Hospital, in such bank as the board shall direct, and no monies may be paid by the treasurer except by cheque on the hospital account.

Section 2. *Vouchers must be produced.*—The treasurer shall pay no monies except on vouchers duly discharged.

Section 3. *Monies alone payable on warrant of board.*—Cheque countersigned.—The treasurer shall pay no accounts except on the warrant of the board of directors authorizing such payments, duly signed by their chairman, and all cheques on the hospital account must be countersigned by some member duly authorized.

Section 4. *Balance-sheet and reports.*—The treasurer shall submit his balance-sheet to the board every three months or oftener as they shall direct; he shall also report on the state of the hospital funds and accounts generally at the monthly meeting of the board, and shall present a financial report to the annual general meeting, the same having been previously examined by the auditors of the hospital.

Section 5. *Books producible on demand.*—All books, papers, voucher, cheque-books, bank-books, &c., &c., shall be submitted to the board on its order and demand.

Section 6. *Receipts to collector.*—The treasurer shall give a receipt duly signed to the collector for all sums duly delivered to him by said collector.

BYE-LAWS ANENT DUTIES OF SECRETARY.

Section 1. *Duties.*—The secretary shall have charge of the corporate seal of the institution, he shall keep the records and minutes, conduct the correspondence, call all meetings, draw up all reports, bring all business before the same, and carry out the resolutions passed at such meetings.

Section 2. *Convenes annual meeting.*—He shall convene the general annual meeting on the second Thursday of January in every year by advertisement fourteen days previous to meeting in a local newspaper. The non-appearance of the said advertisement shall not in any way hinder the subscribers from meeting or invalidate or render illegal their meeting on the above day.

Section 3. *Convenes special meetings.*—He shall convene special meetings of contributors or of the board when directed by the requisition of parties duly authorized to do so by the bye-laws.

Section 4. *Perform all clerical duties.*—He shall perform all clerical duties ordered by the board, and assist the treasurer when called upon.

BYE-LAWS ANENT DUTIES OF AUDITORS.

Section 1. *When accounts are audited.*—The accounts of the hospital shall be audited in the first week of January in every year by the auditors of the hospital, who shall sign the summary of receipts and expenditure for the preceding year.

Section 2. *Qualification of auditors.*—The auditors shall be two in number, and shall not be members of the board of directors nor necessarily contributors.

Section 3. *Duties.*—At the audits the auditors shall report, for the information of the contributors, as to the accord of the collector's books and receipt books with the list of subscriptions, the bank pass-book, and collector's acquittance-book for the preceding year, also as to all expenditure being for legitimate objects and in accordance with the authority of the board.

BYE-LAWS ANENT DUTIES OF COLLECTOR.

Section 1. *Canvas where the board may direct.*—The collector shall canvas for contributions in such districts as the board of directors shall order.

Section 2. *Receipt to be given.*—He shall give printed receipts for all sums received, and keep an account or counterpart of such receipts in a book to be supplied to him for that purpose.

Section 3. *Admission tickets to be given.*—He shall, on demand, furnish admission tickets to such contributors who may be entitled to receive them.

Section 4. *All monies to be handed over once a month.*—He shall forward or hand over to the treasurer all monies in his hands, accompanied by an account of the same, stating contributor's name, address, date and amount of contribution, on the first week of every month; also he shall forward at the same time a similar list of monies promised. The number of tickets granted to be marked after each name.

Section 5. *Reports.*—The collector shall present an annual statement and report from time to time as they shall order or direct.

Section 6. *Guarantee of £150.*—The collector shall find a guarantee society's surety or two sureties, to the satisfaction of the board, who shall enter into a bond for the sum of £150 as guarantee for his fidelity.

BYE-LAWS ANENT SURGEON.

Section 1. *Certificates.*—The surgeon shall possess the certificates of qualification of the Medical Board of Victoria.

Section 2. *How long absent.*—He shall not be absent from the hospital more than twelve hours, except when called upon to attend urgent cases in the district, and then not more than twenty-four hours, without leave from visiting committee.

Section 3. *Supervision of house servants.*—He shall have the immediate supervision of the wardsmen and other house servants of the hospital. He shall preserve order and sobriety,

and, in cases of insubordination or gross neglect of duty on part of the wardman or other house servants, he shall immediately report the same to the visiting committee, who may, if necessary, suspend such servants and hire temporary substitutes until the next board meeting.

Section 4. *In charge of medicines, &c.*—He shall have charge of and be accountable for the medicines and surgical instruments, an inventory of which shall be taken, with date of receipt, cost, or loss.

Section 5. *Keep registry of patients.*—He shall enter regularly in the medical registry the names of patients as they are admitted or discharged, and note, if required, the nature and history of their diseases whilst in the hospital. Such medical registry shall be ready for inspection by the board monthly.

Section 6. *Inspection for sanitary arrangements.*—On his visits to the wards he shall examine their condition with respect to cleanliness, temperature, and ventilation.

Section 7. He shall cause to be fixed to the bed of each patient a card stating his name, age, date of admission, and religious denomination to which he belongs.

Section 8. *Inspection of diet.*—He shall inspect the diet of the patients, and see that no food or liquor be partaken of except that prescribed by himself.

Section 9. *Report disorderly patients.*—He shall report at once any patient who may be disorderly and disobedient to his own or to the wardman's orders to the visiting committee, who, if necessary, may discharge such patient.

Section 10. *Report condition of patients.*—He shall report to the board every month the number of persons who have been received, discharged, and have died since the last report; with the number of all under treatment, and also of those deemed incurable, to be dealt with as the board shall direct.

Section 11. *Permission to engage in private practice.*—He shall be permitted to exercise his profession in Swan Hill and district surrounding, provided always his hospital patients are not neglected.

Section 12. *Carrying out rules made by the board.*—He shall keep all such reports and accounts as may be ordered by the board, and shall carry out all regulations made by the said board for the internal management of the hospital.

Section 13. *Responsible to board for treatment of patients.*—He shall be responsible to the board for the treatment of his patients.

Section 14. *Recommends patients.*—All applications for admission must be provided with the surgeon's recommendation, certifying their fitness to receive medical aid.

BYE-LAWS ANENT WARDSMAN.

Section 1. *Wardman lives in the house.*—The wardman shall live in the house, and shall not leave except on necessary occasions, nor be absent later than ten o'clock at night without the special permission of the surgeon.

Section 2. *Responsible for chattels.*—He shall have the charge and be accountable for all stores, bedding, linen, &c., and make an inventory of the same, in which he shall enter the receipt, loss, and cost of each article.

Section 3. *Obey the surgeon.*—He shall obey the orders of the surgeon, and shall behave with tenderness to all patients and with civility to strangers.

Section 4. *Obey orders of board.*—The wardman and all other servants of the hospital shall obey the bye-laws, regulations, and rules of the institution, as also the orders of the board whatsoever.

Section 5. *Report insubordination to surgeon or visiting committee.*—He shall report immediately to the surgeon any impropriety of conduct or infringement of the rules by any patient, and if such complaint be not properly attended to he shall report the same directly to the visiting committee.

Section 6. *Admits patients.*—The wardman shall receive and admit patients on the proper recommendation or order being tendered.

Section 7. Any officer, servant, or other person in connection with the hospital, who shall receive directly or indirectly any fee, or reward, or gratuity, shall be immediately dismissed, and declared unfit ever again to hold office in the institution.

BYE-LAWS ANENT PATIENTS.

Section 1. *Destitute patients alone admitted.*—If any patient shall have been admitted, with or without a ticket, who is found possessed of sufficient means, such patient shall be required to reimburse the hospital for maintenance and medical attendance, according as the board shall direct.

Section 2. *Admission by order of board and surgeon.*—All patients shall be admitted by the order of the visiting committee on the recommendation of the surgeon.

Section 3. *Behave sober and decent.*—Patients or servants shall not gamble nor smoke in the hospital, nor spit on the floor, nor deface nor injure any part of the ward, nor furniture, bedding, &c., nor sing lewd songs, blasphemy, nor use indecent language, on pain of dismissal. Smoking subject to the special permission of the surgeon.

Section 4. *Complaint.*—Any patient having cause of complaint shall make the same known to the visiting committee, or, in their absence, to the surgeon, who shall be required to enter the charge in a book which shall be laid before the visiting committee on every occasion of such visitation.

Section 5. *Outdoor relief.*—Holders of tickets shall be entitled to receive outdoor relief, but will be required to attend personally at the hospital from 10 a.m. to 12 noon on Mondays and Fridays.

Section 6. *Payment in special cases.*—Non-contributors or others able to afford medical aid shall be entitled to admission on payment of £2 per week, at the discretion of the board.

Section 7. Recommendations for admission shall be subject to the approval of the board, who, from want of room or other cause, may decline to accept of the patient, and return the ticket to the owner.

Section 8. *Admission of severe cases.*—Cases of severe accident

admitted without recommendation. Patients may be admitted at the discretion of the board by the advice of the surgeon.

Section 9. *Property of patients who die.*—All property found on patients who may die in the hospital shall be appropriated to defraying the expenses of their maintenance and burial, the residue, if any, to be handed over to their legal representatives or the Curator of Intestate Estates.

Section 10. *Duties of convalescent patients.*—Patients considered by the surgeon sufficiently convalescent to be able to assist in the work of the institution may, at the discretion of the surgeon and by order of the visiting committee, be so employed.

Section 11. *Patients make declaration.*—All patients on entering the hospital shall be required to make a declaration in writing as to the amount of their means.

Section 12. *Patients cannot introduce food, drink, or medicines.*—No article of food, drink, or medicine shall be introduced into the hospital by any patient.

Section 13. *Patients cannot leave hospital.*—Patients must not leave the hospital without the written consent of the wardman.

Section 14. *Fines.*—Any infringement of the above rules shall subject the patient to dismissal.

BYE-LAWS ANENT PRIVILEGES OF CONTRIBUTORS AND BENEFACTORS.

Section 1. Every contributor of one pound shall receive a ticket, which one month after date shall entitle him or another to be admitted during the ensuing twelve months.

Section 2. Corporate bodies, proprietors, managers of stations, and others, shall be entitled to receive one transferable ticket for every one pound subscribed by them, and a transferable stranger's ticket for every two pounds collected on the station, available for hands who have been not more than three months in the district.

Section 3. *Life governors.*—Contributors of £20 in one sum shall be eligible to be declared life governors, who shall have the right to one vote at annual and special meetings of contributors, be eligible for election as member of the board of directors, and to recommend one patient yearly.

BYE-LAWS ANENT PRIVILEGES OF VISITORS.

Section 1. *Visitors—Ministers.*—Ministers of religion shall have access to sick persons at any time.

Section 2. *Visitors.*—Visitors to patients shall be admitted on Mondays and Thursdays between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Special permission at other times by order of the surgeon or visiting committee.

Section 3. *Visitors not to introduce any article into hospital.*—Visitors are strictly prohibited from introducing anything to the hospital without the sanction of the surgeon. No. 1757
