THE KIDNAPPING ACT OF 1872 FOR THE PROTECTION OF THE PACIFIC ISLANDERS.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Imperial Parliament passed in the session held in the thirty-fifth and thirty-sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled *An Act for the Prevention and Punishment of Criminal Outrages upon Natives of the Islands in the Pacific Ocean*, it is amongst other things enacted that the said Act shall be proclaimed in the several Australasian Colonies by the respective Governors thereof, within six weeks after a copy of such Act shall have been received by such Governors respectively, and shall take effect in the several Colonies from the day of such Proclamation: Now therefore I, the Governor of the Colony of Victoria, one of the said Australasian Colonies, in pursuance of the provisions in the said Act contained, do hereby proclaim, certify, and make known that I received a copy of the said Act on the twenty-fourth day of August instant, and that the Act published herewith is a reprint thereof, and that the said Act will, as therein enacted, come this day into operation and commence, take effect, and have the force of law accordingly in the said Colony of Victoria on and from the date hereof.

35 AND 36 VICT. CHAP. XIX.

An Act for the Prevention and Punishment of Criminal Outrages upon Natives of the Islands in the Pacific Ocean. [27th June 1872.]

WHEREAS criminal outrages by British subjects upon natives of islands in the Pacific Ocean not being in Her Majesty's dominions, nor within the jurisdiction of any civilized power, have of late much prevailed and increased, and it is expedient to make further provision for the prevention and punishment of such outrages:

Be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1. *Short title.*—This Act may be cited as *The Kidnapping Act 1872*.

2. *Definition of terms.*—The term "Governor" shall include the officer for the time being administering the government of any of the Australasian colonies, and "Governor in Council" shall mean the Governor acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the colony under his government:

The term "Australasian colonies" shall mean and include the colonies of New South Wales, New Zealand, Queensland, South Australia, Tasmania, Victoria, and Western Australia:

The term "vessel" shall include a ship or boat:

The term "oath" shall include any affirmation or declaration taken or made in lieu of an oath:

The term "master" shall include any person for the time being in command or charge of a vessel.

3. *No British vessel to carry native laborers unless the master has given a bond and received a license.*—It shall not be lawful for any British vessel to carry native laborers of the said islands, not No. 60.—August 30, 1872.—1.

being part of the crew of such vessel, unless the master thereof shall, with one sufficient surety to be approved by the Governor or one of the said Australasian colonies, or by a British consular officer appointed by Her Majesty to reside in any of the said islands, or by any person appointed by either of those officers, have entered into a joint and several bond in the sum of five hundred pounds to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, in the form contained in Schedule (A) to this Act annexed, or in such other form as shall be prescribed by the Legislature of any of the Australasian colonies in respect of vessels sailing from the ports of such colony, nor unless he shall have received a license in the form contained in Schedule (B) to this Act annexed from any such Governor or British consular officer.

4. *Penalty of bond, how recoverable.*—The said penal sum of Five hundred pounds shall be due and recoverable notwithstanding any penalty or forfeiture imposed by this Act, and whether such penalties or forfeitures shall have been sued for and recovered or not.

5. *Power to Governor and consular officer to grant licenses.*—It shall be lawful for any such Governor or British consular officer as aforesaid, upon being satisfied that a bond has been duly given by the master of any British vessel under the third section of this Act, to grant, if he shall think fit, to such master a license in the form contained in the said Schedule (B).

6. *Seizure, &c., of vessels carrying native laborers without license, &c.*—All the provisions of this Act with respect to the detention, seizure, bringing in for adjudication before any Vice-Admiralty Court, trial, condemnation, or restoration of vessels suspected of being employed in the commission of any of the offences enumerated in the ninth section of this Act shall, mutatis mutandis, apply to any British vessel which shall be found carrying such native laborers without a license or in contravention of the terms of any license which may have been granted to the master thereof.

7. *Penalty for carrying natives without a license.*—The master of any vessel carrying such native laborers without such license, or in contravention of the terms of any license which may have been granted to him, shall be liable to a fine of not exceeding Five hundred pounds, which may be sued for and enforced in and by any court of justice of the Australasian colonies; but nothing herein contained shall be taken to affect the liability of such master for any offence committed by him under the ninth or tenth sections of this Act: Provided always that the aggregate sum imposed or recoverable by way of penalty under this Act shall in no case exceed the sum of Five hundred pounds.

8. *Vessels complying with provisions of Colonial Acts not liable to seizure, &c.*—Nothing herein contained shall be taken to affect the provisions of an Act passed by the Legislature of Queensland, intitled *An Act to regulate and control the introduction and treatment of Polynesian Laborers*, nor of any Act of a like kind passed or which may be passed by the Legislature of any of the Australasian colonies not being inconsistent with the provisions of this Act; and the provisions of this Act in respect of vessels carrying native laborers without a license or in contravention of the terms of a license shall not apply to any vessel which has complied with the regulations and conditions imposed by the said Queensland Act or by any other Act of a like kind passed or which may be passed by the Legislature of any of the Australasian colonies as aforesaid, proof of which compliance shall lie upon the master of such vessel.

9. *Colonial courts empowered to try certain offences.*—If a British subject commits any of the following offences, that is to say—

- (1) Decays a native of any of the aforesaid islands for the purpose of importing or removing such native into any island or place other than that in which he was at the time of the commission of such offence; or carries away, confines, or detains any such native for the purpose aforesaid, without his consent, proof of which consent shall lie on the party accused;
- (2) Ships, embarks, receives, detains, or confines, or assists in shipping, embarking, receiving, detaining, or confining, for the purpose aforesaid, a native of any of the aforesaid islands on board any vessel, either on the high seas or elsewhere, without the consent of such native, proof of which consent shall lie on the party accused;
- (3) Contracts for the shipping, embarking, receiving, detaining, or confining on board any vessel for the purpose aforesaid any such native without his consent, proof of which consent shall lie on the party accused;
- (4) Fits out, mans, navigates, equips, uses, employs, lets, or takes on freight or hire any vessel, or commands, or serves, or is on board any such vessel with intent to commit, or that any one on board such vessel should commit, any of the offences above enumerated;
- (5) Ships, lades, receives, or puts on board, or contracts for the shipping, lading, receiving, or putting on board of any vessel money, goods, or other articles, with the intent that they should be employed, or knowing that they will be employed, in the commission of any of the offences above enumerated;

he shall for each offence be guilty of felony, and shall be liable to be tried and punished for such felony in any Supreme Court of justice in any of the Australasian colonies, and shall, upon conviction, be liable at the discretion of the court to the highest punishment other than capital punishment, or to any less punishment, awarded for any felony by the law of the colony in which such offender shall be tried.

10. *Punishment of accessories.*—Any person who aids, abets, counsels, or procures the commission of any offence against this Act shall be liable to be tried and punished as a principal offender.

11. *Venue in respect of offences by persons.*—Any offence against this Act may be described in any indictment, information, or other document relating to such offence, in cases where the mode of trial requires such a description, as having been committed at the place where it was wholly or partly committed, or it may be averred generally to have been committed within Her Majesty's dominions, and the venue or local description in the margin may be that of the county, city, town, or place in which the trial is held.

12. *Courts may issue commissions for examination of witnesses.*—In all cases of indictment or information laid or exhibited in the Supreme Court of any of the Australasian colonies for any offence under this Act, such Supreme Court, upon motion to be made on behalf of the prosecutor or accused, may order a commission or commissions to issue for the examination of witnesses upon oath, and to receive proof at any place or places out of the jurisdiction of such court concerning the matters charged in such indictment or information; and the said Supreme Court is hereby required and authorized by the same or any subsequent order or orders to make such rules and give such directions as to the time, place, and mode of executing such commission or commissions, and as to the notice thereof to be given to the party accused, and as to the proper return of the depositions taken and the matters done thereunder, as to the said court shall seem fitting and proper, and the depositions being duly taken under such commission or commissions and returned to the said court shall be allowed and read as if the witness so deposing had been present, sworn, and examined *vis à vis* at any trial for such offences as aforesaid in the said Supreme Court, any law or usage to the contrary thereof notwithstanding.

13. *Powers to secure attendance of native witnesses.*—In all cases of indictment or information laid or exhibited in the Supreme Court of any of the Australasian colonies for any offence under this Act, the Governor in Council of such colony may authorize and empower the commander of any of Her Majesty's ships or vessels, or the master of any ship or vessel trading with the inhabitants or natives of the said islands, to obtain

the attendance as a witness of any native of any of the said islands for the purpose of giving evidence either before the said Supreme Court or before any commission for the examination of witnesses ordered by such court, and to transport and convey such witness to the colony in which such offence shall be tried or to the place where such commission shall be held, and also to remunerate such witness by such sum of money or other remuneration as the said Governor in Council shall see fit to authorize for his attendance to give evidence as aforesaid, and for his reconveyance back to the island or place from whence he shall have been so brought.

14. *Mode of taking evidence.*—In all cases in which an oath may be lawfully administered to any person either as a witness or deponent in any proceeding under this Act, it shall be the duty of the court or commissioner, or officer administering the same, to ascertain, as far as possible, in what form such oath will be binding on the conscience of such witness or deponent, and to administer such oath in such form accordingly; and the court before which such proceedings shall take place or a commissioner under any commission as aforesaid may declare in what manner the evidence shall be taken of witnesses or deponents who are ignorant of the nature of an oath, and the evidence or deposition taken in any such form or manner as aforesaid shall be as valid as if an oath had been administered in the ordinary manner.

15. *Punishment of persons giving false evidence.*—Every person who shall wilfully and corruptly give false evidence in any examination, deposition, or affidavit had or taken in any proceeding under this Act shall be deemed guilty of perjury, and upon conviction thereof shall be liable to the pains and penalties to which persons convicted of wilful and corrupt perjury are liable, and every such person may be tried either in the place where the offence was committed, or in the Supreme Court of any of the Australasian Colonies.

16. *Powers to seize suspected British vessels.*—Any British vessel which shall upon reasonable grounds be suspected—

- (1) Of being employed in the commission of any of the offences enumerated in the ninth section of this Act; or
- (2) Of having been fitted out for such employment; or
- (3) Of having during the voyage on which such vessel is met been employed in the commission of any such offence;

may be detained, seized, and brought in for adjudication upon the charge of being or having been so employed or fitted out as aforesaid before any Vice-Admiralty Court in any of Her Majesty's dominions by any of the following officers, that is to say:—

- (1) Any officer of customs or public officer in any British possession, subject nevertheless to any special or general instructions from the Governor or officer administering the government of such possession;
- (2) Any commissioned officer on full pay in the military service of the Crown, subject nevertheless to any special or general instructions from his commanding officer;
- (3) Any commissioned officer on full pay in the naval service of the Crown, subject nevertheless to any special or general instructions from the Admiralty or his superior officer;
- (4) Any consul or consular agent appointed by Her Majesty to reside in any island not within the jurisdiction of any civilized power.

17. *Powers of officers authorized to seize ships.*—Any officer authorized to seize or detain any vessel in respect of any offence against this Act may, for the purpose of enforcing such seizure or detention, call to his aid any constable or officers of police, or any officers of Her Majesty's army or navy or marines, or any excise officers or officers of customs, or any harbor master or dock master, or any officers having authority by law to make seizures of vessels, and may put on board any vessel so seized or detained any one or more of such officers to take charge of the same and to enforce the provisions of this Act, and any officer seizing or detaining any vessel under this Act may use force, if necessary, for the purpose of enforcing seizure or detention.

18. *Powers of Vice-Admiralty Courts.*—The Vice-Admiralty Court before which any vessel is so brought for adjudication shall have full power and authority to take cognizance of and try the charge upon which such vessel is brought in, and may on proof thereof condemn the vessel and cargo, or either, as the case may be, as forfeited to Her Majesty, or may order such vessel and cargo, or either of them, to be restored with or without costs and damages, as to the court shall seem fit; and in any such proceedings the said court shall have such powers to issue commissions for the examination of witnesses, and to give directions in respect thereof, as are hereinbefore vested in the Supreme Courts of the Australasian colonies; and the said court shall, in addition to any power given to it by this Act, have in respect of any vessel or other matter brought before it in pursuance of this Act all powers which it has in the case of a vessel or matter brought before it in the exercise of its ordinary jurisdiction.

19. *Payment of costs, &c.*—When any detention or seizure shall be made under this Act, and proceedings instituted in any Vice-Admiralty Court in respect of such detention or seizure, it shall be lawful for the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, if to their discretion it shall seem meet, to direct payment to be made of the whole or any part of the costs, damages, and expenses which may be incurred in such proceedings.

20. *Indemnity to officers.*—Subject to the provisions of this Act providing for the award of damages in certain cases in respect of the seizure or detention of a vessel by the Vice-Admiralty Court, no damages shall be payable, and no officer

or local authority shall be responsible, either civilly or criminally, in respect of the seizure or detention of any vessel in pursuance of this Act.

21. *Proclamation of Act.*—This Act shall be proclaimed in the several Australasian colonies by the respective Governors thereof within six weeks after a copy of such Act shall have been received by such Governors respectively, and shall take effect in the several colonies from the day of such proclamation.

22. *Act not to affect 9 Geo. 4, c. 83.*—Nothing in this Act contained shall be taken to affect the powers vested in the Supreme Courts of New South Wales and Tasmania under the Act 9 Geo. IV. c. 83.

Form of Bond to be entered into by Masters of Vessels under "The Kidnapping Act 1872."

Know all men by these presents, that we *A. B.* of *C. D.* of *are* held and firmly bound unto our Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith, in the sum of Five hundred pounds of good and lawful money of Great Britain, to be paid to our said Sovereign Lady the Queen, her heirs and successors, to which payment, well and truly to be made, we bind ourselves and every of us, jointly and severally, for and in the whole, our heirs, executors, administrators, and every of them, firmly by these presents.

Whereas it is enacted by *The Kidnapping Act 1872* that no British vessel shall carry native laborers of islands in the Pacific Ocean not being within the jurisdiction of any civilized power unless the master of such vessel, together with one sufficient surety to be approved by the Governor of one of Her Majesty's Australasian colonies, or by a British consular officer, or by any person appointed for the purpose by either of those officers, shall have given to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, a bond in the sum of Five hundred pounds for the prevention of kidnapping, and for the due observance of the requirements of the said Act and of the license which the said master is thereby required to obtain.

Now the condition of this obligation is this, that if in respect of the vessel , whereof the above bounden *A. B.* is master, all and every the requirements of the said Act and of the license issued thereunder to the said master shall be well and truly performed, and if the above bounden *A. B.* shall satisfy the Governor of any of Her Majesty's Australasian colonies, or the British consular officer aforesaid, that no kidnapping was allowed or connived at by any person on board of or connected with said vessel during the currency of the said license, then this obligation is to be void, otherwise to remain in full force.

A. WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that notwithstanding anything thereinbefore contained the Governor may by proclamation declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, shall cut, dig, or remove live or dead timber or particular description of timber, or bark, stone, gravel, sand, loam, brick, or other earth, from such portions of Crown lands as are named in such proclamation, or shall exercise on any such portions the powers, or any of them, conferred by any license granted under the authority of Part III. of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power conferred by the above-recited Act, do by this my Proclamation declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, shall cut any young trees of a less diameter than eight inches at a height of three feet above the ground upon Crown lands within the Shire of Grenville.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and Baron BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons; or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons; and

direct the manner by which the fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees shall be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons; and it is directed that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons shall be published and all objections thereto shall be heard in the manner set forth in the One hundredth section of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim or increase (as the case may be) the Commons hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

ALEXANDRA COMMON.—The unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries hereinafter described shall be and constitute a Common, to be designated the Alexandra Common, viz.: Commencing at the south-west angle of allotment 57, in the parish of Alexandra, being a point on the Eglinton Creek; thence by the Alexandra Goldfield Common bearing east one hundred and eighteen chains fourteen links and south one hundred and eighty-seven chains, more or less, to the south-east angle of allotment 29; thence by lines bearing respectively east one hundred and ninety chains, north two hundred and eighty chains, and west two hundred and forty chains, more or less, to the aforesaid creek; and thence down that creek to the point of commencement. The bearings are from the true meridian. Area available for commonage, about 5200 acres.—(72.E.6883.)

MAFFRA COMMON.—The unappropriated Crown land within the boundaries hereinafter described, and the allotments of land hereinafter enumerated, comprising in all an area of 18,900 acres, more or less, shall be and constitute a Common, to be designated the Maffra Common, viz.: Commencing at the north-west angle of allotment 80, parish of Maffra; thence by a line bearing north-easterly nine miles, more or less, to the Avon River; thence down that river to the south boundary of the land in the parish of Wa-de-lock licensed to James Jones; thence by that land and by allotments in sections 1 and 2 to Mr. Foster's fenced paddock on the Boisdale run; thence by that paddock south-westerly and southerly to the north boundary of the parish of Maffra; and thence by that boundary westerly to the point of commencement; as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne. Allotments 30, 31, 32, 33, 46, 48, 49, 50, 51, 57, 58, 59, 60, and 61, parish of Maffra.—(72.E.16025.)

The deaths in July were less than the deaths in June by 15. They also exceeded the average of July in the previous ten years by 21; but if allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been less than the average of July by 30.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 63°9' on the 9th, and the lowest was 34° on the 18th. The mean temperature of the month (48°7') was about half a degree above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (25°) took place on the 6th, viz., from a maximum of 61° to a minimum of 36°. The least range (6°) was on the 20th, viz., from a maximum of 51° to a minimum of 45°. The mean daily range was 15°. The mean atmospheric pressure (29°902 inches) was a little below the average.

Males contributed 61 per cent, and females 39 per cent. to the total mortality. Children under five years contributed 36 per cent., against 34 per cent. in July 1871, 39 per cent. in July 1870, 37 per cent. in July 1869, 44 per cent. in July 1868, 44 per cent. in July 1867, 40 per cent. in July 1866, 44 per cent. in July 1865, 44 per cent. in July 1864, 45 per cent. in July 1863, and 46 per cent. in July 1862.

Eight persons of 75 years of age and upwards died during the month, viz.:—A male aged 75 of paralysis, three males aged respectively 75, 75, and 83, and four females aged respectively 76, 81, 84, and 84, of old age.

Eleven violent deaths occurred during the month, viz.:—Those of a hawker aged 28 who died of fracture of the pelvis caused by a horse falling on him, of a quarryman aged 32 who was accidentally killed in a stone quarry, of a plasterer aged 67 who died of burns received by falling into the fire whilst in a fit, of a seaman aged 33 who was drowned whilst suffering from a blow on the head received in a manner not stated, of a sergeant of police aged 45 who was drowned whilst suffering from a fit, of two seamen aged respectively 40 and 55 who were drowned whilst in a state of intoxication, of a blacksmith aged 34 who was found drowned, of a female infant who was accidentally suffocated at birth, of a female infant aged 10 weeks who was suffocated in bed, and of a laborer aged 45 who was suffocated whilst vomiting, by food getting into the windpipe.

Seventy-five deaths, or 26 per cent. of the total number, occurred in public institutions, viz.:—34 in the Melbourne Hospital, 5 in the Alfred Hospital, 2 in the Lying-in Hospital, 3 in the Benevolent Asylum, 5 in the Immigrants' Home, 11 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 4 in the Carlton Lunatic Asylum, 5 in the Industrial Schools, and 1 in the Melbourne Gaol.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 104, of which 60, or 58 per cent., were of males, and 44 or 42 per cent. were of females. Of those who died, 65 were under one year of age, 15 were between one and two years, 15 were between two and three, 6 were between three and four, and 3 were between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 184, of which 116, or 63 per cent., were males, and 68, or 37 per cent., were females; 11 were between five and ten, 5 were between ten and fifteen, 6 were between fifteen and twenty, 5 were between twenty and twenty-five, 16 were between twenty-five and thirty, 18 were between thirty and thirty-five, 16 were between thirty-five and forty, 19 were between forty and forty-five, 22 were between forty-five and fifty, 20 were between fifty and fifty-five, 7 were between fifty-five and sixty, 10 were between sixty and sixty-five, 9 were between sixty-five and seventy, 12 were between seventy and seventy-five, 4 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 4 were eighty and upwards.

Every tender must bear the *bond fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to *TEN PER CENT.* of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract, to the satisfaction of the Government. SHIRE OF YACKANDANDAH.

No. I. BYE-LAW.

Bye-law of the Council of the Shire of Yackandandah, made under part 12 of the Shires Statute, for regulating the proceedings of the Council.

IN pursuance of part 12 of the Shires Statute, the Council of the Shire of Yackandandah ordain as follows, that is to say:—

- The business of the council at all ordinary meetings shall be conducted with open doors, unless it become necessary to exclude strangers on account of their disorderly conduct.
- If within one hour after the time appointed for a meeting of the council there be not a quorum present, the names of the councillors present shall be entered in the minute book, and the meeting shall be adjourned.
- At every ordinary meeting of the council the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting for confirmation the minutes of the preceding meetings; and no discussion shall be permitted thereon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings.
- After the confirmation of the minutes, the order of business shall be as follows, or as near thereto as practicable:—
 - Reading copies of letters sent.
 - Reading letters received, and ordering thereon.
 - Reception of and reading petitions and memorials, and ordering thereon.
 - Reading and ordering on reports of committees, deputations, and officers.
 - Orders of the day, including subjects arising from proceedings of former meetings of the council, and any business which the president may think fit to bring under consideration.
 - Motions, of which previous notice shall have been duly given.
 - Examination and passing of accounts for payment.
 - Reading notices of motion for consideration at a future meeting.
- Whenever a division shall be demanded by any councillor, the councillors voting in the affirmative shall first hold up their hands, and then those voting in the negative shall hold up their hands, and the result shall be declared by the chairman.
- Every councillor present shall vote, except he be disabled by law from doing so.
- Every petition or memorial addressed to the council must be in writing, and presented by a councillor; and no debate shall take place thereon except as to its being received. Every such petition or memorial, when received, shall be taken into consideration at such time as the council may direct.

DEPUTATIONS.

8. Deputations from ratepayers wishing to be heard before the council in support of any petition, or otherwise, must acquaint some one of the councillors representing them, or the secretary, of their intended interview.

9. Every report of a committee shall be signed by the chairman or acting chairman thereof previous to the presentation of such report to the council. All reports to be of uniform size, and to be numbered in consecutive order.

ORDERS OF THE DAY.

10. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council; any business which the president may think fit to bring under consideration; and any matter arising out of the correspondence, reports, memorials, or petitions read or presented during the same day, if by special motion so ordered to be considered.

11. Every notice of motion shall be given in writing to the secretary, and shall be read aloud by that officer, at the meeting previous to that at which the same is to be taken into consideration; and every such notice shall be considered in the order in which it is given. After a notice of motion has been given, the terms thereof may be altered by the mover, on delivering an amended notice to the secretary, at least ten days prior to the meeting at which such motion is to be discussed.

12. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be considered unless the councillor who has given such notice, or some other councillor authorized by him in writing, be present to proceed with the same when called in order; any notice not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.

13. The mover of every motion appointing a committee to be a member of that committee.

14. Every councillor upon proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the president or councillor acting as chairman; and shall not be interrupted unless by a call to order, when he shall sit down until the question shall have been decided; the subject may then be resumed, or other business entered upon.

15. The president's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice.

16. Any councillor desirous of making a motion or amendment, or taking part in discussion thereat, shall not be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down until the councillor, if any, calling to order shall be heard thereon, and the question of order disposed of, when the councillor in possession of the chair may proceed with the subject.

17. Any councillor desirous of proposing an original motion or amendment must state the nature of the same before he addresses the council thereon.

18. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote; but upon any amendment being carried the original motion shall be deemed rejected, and the amendment so carried shall take the place of the original motion, and on it only one amendment can then be moved.

19. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, except by way of explanation or in reply upon an original motion or amendment of which he was the mover; and immediately after the reply, the amendment or original motion, as the case may be, shall be put to the vote.

20. The president, or councillor acting as chairman, shall, on taking the vote on any motion or amendment, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative. The voting shall in all cases be by show of hands taken for and against the motion.

21. No discussion shall be allowed upon any motion for the adjournment of the council, but such motion shall immediately, upon being seconded, be put from the chair, and, in the event of it being negatived, the consideration of the subject then under discussion shall be resumed, or the next on the notice paper proceeded with, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business undischarged shall have precedence when the council resume.

22. The councillors in meeting of council shall designate each other by their official titles, namely, that of president, chairman, or councillor, as the case may be.

23. No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion, nor impute motives; and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly; and any councillor making use of any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor shall at once, if required to do so by the president or any other councillor acting as chairman, withdraw such expression, and make a satisfactory apology to the council.

24. The president shall call to order any councillor out of order; and if the councillor deemed out of order shall not obey, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds (£5), to be recovered before a court of petty sessions.

25. Any councillor may require the secretary to take down any particular words used by another councillor immediately on the same being uttered.

26. Any part of this bye-law may be suspended *pro tem.*, in case of emergency, with the consent of not less than five councillors present at any meeting, the same being entered in the minutes of the proceedings at such meeting.
