VICTORIAN VOLUNTEER FORCE.

AMALGAMATION OF THE 1ST AND 2ND GEELONG ARTILLERY CORPS.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to accept the services of a corps to be called the "Geelong Corps of the Royal Victorian Volunteer Artillery," its precedence to be that now held by the 1st Geelong Artillery Corps, and the seniority of officers enrolled therein to be not junior to that now held by them in the Volunteer Force.

The Geelong Artillery Corps will be organized by Lieut.-Colonel Rede, commanding the Corio Volunteer District, from volunteers now serving in the 1st and 2nd Geelong Corps. Lieut.-Colonel Rede will be president of a board to be appointed by the Commandant to consider, recommend, and report upon the claims of the officers and non-commissioned officers for position in the Volunteer Force, and also for officering the Geelong Artillery; but no officer or non-commissioned officer shall be enrolled therein as such until the proposed arrangement for officers and non-commissioned officers be submitted and approved.

The board will also recommend as to the financial arrangement on the basis that no debt or obligation shall be imposed on the corps fund of the 1st Geelong Corps for moneys now due by the 2nd Geelong Corps, and also as to the disposal and appropriation of all Government funds and property in possession of the Commanding Officers of the 1st and 2nd Geelong Corps.

Nothing herein is to be taken as interfering with the present appointments or powers of officers of the 1st and 2nd Geelong Corps or of the discipline thereof until the volunteers therein have either enrolled in the Geelong Artillery or left the service in compliance with law.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees shall be imposed, paid, collected and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees shall be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons; and it is directed that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons shall be published and all objections thereto shall be heard in the manner set forth in the one hundredth section of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the Common hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

MAUDE COMMON.—The unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries hereinafter described shall be and constitute a common, to be designated Maude Common, viz.:—Commencing at the junction of the northern side of Vaughan street, in the town of Maude, with the western side of High street, in that town; thence by the last-named street bearing northerly to the south-east angle of allotment C of section 18, parish of Darriwill; thence by that allotment bearing west twenty-eight chains eighty-one links to the Moorarbool River; thence down that river to the east boundary of suburban allotment 25, in the town of Maude; thence by that allotment bearing south fourteen chains nineteen links to Vaughan street aforesaid; and thence by that street bearing easterly to the point of commencement, as shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne. Area available for commonage, about ninety acres.—(72.G.19298.)

PROCLAMATION OF A STREET AT STAWELL
REVOKED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN HENRY THOMAS VISCOUNT CANTERBURY, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and BARON BOTTESFORD, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Boroughs Statute* (33 Vict. No. 359) it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time upon the request of the council by notice in the *Government Gazette* to proclaim any land reserved or used for a street, highway, thoroughfare, bridge, square, court, alley, or right-of-way to be a public street within the meaning of this Act, and such land reserved or used for a street, highway, thoroughfare, bridge, square, court, alley, or right-of-way shall thereupon and thenceforth from the date of such proclamation become and be absolutely dedicated to the public and reserved for public use as a public street within the meaning of any law now or hereafter in force; provided that no such proclamation shall be deemed to be a proclamation as a main road as thereinafore provided; and provided further that every and any

such proclamation may be at any time revoked, if necessary, by the Governor: And whereas by a notice in the *Government Gazette* of the 17th day of November 1871 certain lands in the Borough of Stawell, as shown by a plan submitted to the Governor in Council and thereon colored yellow, were, pursuant to Order in Council of the 16th day of the said month, proclaimed public streets within the meaning of the said Act, including amongst others a street called Fisher street: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, acting upon the request of the Council of the Borough of Stawell do hereby revoke so much of the notice and Order in Council hereinbefore mentioned as relates to Fisher street, in the said Borough of Stawell.

WHEREAS by the 20th section of the Act No. 446, intitled *An Act to amend the Mining Statute 1865*, it is enacted that the Governor in Council, in the name or on behalf of Her Majesty, upon application made to him for that purpose, may grant leases to any person of mines on, under, or upon lands granted or reserved for railways, waterworks, public parks, places of recreation, or other public purposes, subject to such regulations as may be from time to time passed by the Governor in Council for that purpose, and with the consent of the Board of Lands and Works, in whom the said lands are vested: And whereas it is desirable to make regulations for the granting of such leases: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of every power enabling him in that behalf, doth by this present order make the regulations following, i.e.:—

INTERPRETATION CLAUSE.

1. In construing these regulations the following words and expressions shall have the meanings hereafter assigned to them, except where inconsistent with the context:—

“The Minister” shall mean the responsible Minister of the Crown administering the Act aforesaid.

“The Warden” shall mean a Warden of the Gold-fields in and for the colony, or any district thereof, in which the mines or some portion thereof, are situated.

“The Clerk” shall mean a Warden's Clerk or a Clerk of Petty Sessions.

“The mines” shall mean the mines the lease of which is applied for.

The singular number shall include the plural and the plural the singular.

MANNER IN WHICH LEASES SHALL BE APPLIED FOR.

2. Any person desiring to obtain a lease of mines in, under, or upon any lands, vested in the Board of Land and Works, which have been granted or reserved for railways, waterworks, public parks, places of recreation, or other public purposes, shall address to the Governor, and leave with the warden, an application, in duplicate, in the form in the schedule hereto, marked A., having attached thereto a plan of the lands in which the mines are situate, showing the situation of the mines and the position and direction of the shafts, drives, and other works, proposed to be executed by the applicant for the purpose of mining, and shall, on the day of his leaving such application with the warden, deposit with the clerk the sum of £5, which shall be appropriated in such manner as the minister may direct, and shall, within three days after such day, or in the first issue of any such newspaper after the expiration of three days from such day, insert, as an advertisement, in a newspaper circulating in the neighborhood of the mines, a copy of such application.

3. On receipt of any such application, the warden shall cause to be entered in a book, kept for the purpose, a note of the application, numbered in order, and the day and hour when the same was left with him, and shall cause to be endorsed a similar note on both such duplicate applications.

4. In cases where more than one application is made for the same land, the first in order of receipt shall be first dealt with.

OBJECTIONS.

5. Any person objecting to any application made under these Regulations shall, previous to the time appointed for the enquiry by the warden hereinafter provided for, lodge with the warden and leave for the applicant, or, if more than one, for each applicant, at his or their address, stated in the said application, a statement in writing of the grounds of his objections,

and at the time of leaving his statement with the warden, deposit with the clerk of the warden, or with any other clerk in his office authorized to receive deposits, the sum of £5, which shall be dealt with and appropriated in such manner, as the minister may direct.

ENQUIRY INTO APPLICATIONS AND OBJECTIONS.

6. The warden shall proceed to hold an enquiry at a time and place to be notified by him to the applicant and all other persons who shall notify, in writing, to such warden that they are interested in the enquiry, and such time shall be not less than fourteen clear days after the publication of such advertisement, and every applicant shall receive not less than seven clear days' notice, and every such other person shall receive the same notice as an applicant, or such notice as the time of his notifying his interest to the warden will allow.

7. At such enquiry the warden shall take evidence in relation to the application and the objections thereto, if any; and shall within seven days after termination of the enquiry forward to the minister the application, together with the objections thereto, if any, and the evidence taken by him and his opinion thereon.

8. The warden shall have power to adjourn the hearing to any other time or place.

9. Any applicant or objector shall be permitted to take a copy of the application and the evidence, and any other documents produced at the enquiry, at any time before the same shall have been forwarded to the minister.

LEASES.

10. Upon receiving from the warden any such application the minister shall if he think fit cause the same and the documents accompanying it to be submitted to the Governor in Council and the Board of Land and Works, who shall determine—

Whether to grant such application subject to any and what covenants, clauses, stipulations, restrictions, and conditions, or whether to refuse such application, and to determine what sum of money (if any) ought to be paid by the applicant as compensation for damage to the lands on which the mines are situate, and what security (if any) shall be given by the applicant to make good any damage that may result from his mining beyond that for which such sum to be paid as aforesaid shall be a sufficient compensation.

11. Whenever the Governor in Council shall order a lease to issue under these regulations, the Minister shall cause such lease to be prepared and submitted to the Board of Land and Works for their approval, and the rent reserved by every such lease shall be such as the Governor in Council shall determine.

MISCELLANEOUS RULES.

12. If any applicant shall make default in proceeding in accordance with these regulations, or if he neglect to execute and take delivery of the lease within sixty days after a notice properly addressed has been sent to him through the post office that the lease is ready for execution, the minister may, by an order under his hand, declare the application abandoned, and cause to be published in the *Government Gazette* a notice to that effect, and after the publication of any such notice such applicant shall not be entitled to proceed with his application or to execute or accept delivery of any such lease: provided that, in any case where an applicant appears at an enquiry by an agent, or gives sufficient reasons in writing on or before the day on which the enquiry is to be holden why he cannot appear, his application shall be proceeded with at such times and places as the warden may think fit.

13. Before executing any lease the applicant shall pay to the Receiver and Paymaster of the district within which the mines lie the cost of the preparation of the lease; and also the first half-year's rent reserved in the lease, and any sum to be paid by him by way of compensation, and shall give any security that may be required of him, as hereinbefore provided, and he shall produce receipts for such payments and such other payments as under the provisions of the Act he may have been required to make before executing the lease; and he shall not be permitted to execute the lease and the same shall not be delivered to him until such receipts have been produced and such security had been given.

14. If the lease shall be refused a notice to that effect shall be published in the *Government Gazette*, and all proceedings in relation to the application shall be stopped; but the applicant, or any other person, may make a fresh application for the same mine, and such application shall in all respects be dealt with as the Act and these regulations prescribe.

15. Any applicant may at any time withdraw his application by giving notice in writing to the minister; and in like manner any objector may, before or during the enquiry held by the warden, withdraw his objections.

16. Any applicant, or objector, may proceed under these regulations by his attorney, provided that such attorney be constituted by the execution of a power-of-attorney for that purpose in such form as shall be approved of by the minister.

17. Any person or persons being the holder of a lease granted under these regulations, except any person who by operation of law shall be entitled to sell or dispose of such lease for the benefit of creditors, in which case no license shall be necessary, may apply to the minister for a license under the hand and seal of the Governor, to transfer, underlet, mortgage, or otherwise dispose of or encumber such lease, or the mines or premises comprised therein, or any part thereof, and it shall be lawful for the Governor to grant or refuse such license. Every such application must be accompanied with a remittance of £1,

which will be returned if the license be not granted. The minister shall determine the form of the license to be granted.

The deaths in January were less than those in the previous month by 9. They were also less than the average of January; in the previous ten years by 49. If allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been less than the average for the month by 131.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 101° on the 20th, and the lowest was 47° on the 31st. The mean temperature (65.3°) of the month was about a degree below the average. The greatest range (38.4°) of the thermometer in any one day took place on the 5th, viz., from a maximum of 98.4° to a minimum of 60°. The least range (8°) was on the 30th, viz., from a maximum of 60° to a minimum of 52°. The mean daily range was 22.2°. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.832 inches) was slightly above the average.

Males contributed 51 per cent., and females 49 per cent. to the total mortality; children under five years of age contributed 49 per cent. to that mortality. In January 1872 the proportion of children under five years of age to the total mortality was 56 per cent.; in January 1871 it was 57 per cent.; in January 1870 it was 58 per cent.; in January 1869 it was 58 per cent.; in January 1868 it was 62 per cent.; in January 1867 it was 75 per cent.; in January 1866 it was 65½ per cent.; in January 1865 it was 65 per cent.; in January 1864 it was 64 per cent.; and in January 1863 it was 64 per cent.

The deaths of seven persons of 75 years of age or upwards took place during the month, viz.:—A male aged 78 of diarrhoea; a male aged 75 of dysentery; a female aged 78 of sanguineous apoplexy; two females aged respectively 73 and 80 of acute gastritis; and two females, aged respectively 75 and 81, of old age.

Twenty-two violent deaths occurred during the month, of which twenty were set down as accidental, one as homicidal, and one as suicidal. Of the accidental deaths the following are the particulars:—A lad aged 15 was killed by a dray-wheel passing over him; a man aged 30 died of injury of the spine resulting from the fall of the roof of a house; a bootmaker aged 35 died of injury to the head, caused by being knocked down by a cart; a man aged 49 died of fracture of the skull; a farmer aged 42 was killed by being thrown from a dray; five persons died from the effects of burns and scalds of which 3 were females aged respectively 20 months, 13, and 53 years; and 2 were males aged 2 years and 2 years and six months; a boy 4 years old died from sunstroke; five males aged 9, 11, 32, 47, and 54 years respectively were drowned; two male infants of the ages of 3 weeks and 1 month were accidentally suffocated, in each case by the mother; a woman 26 years old died in a state of collapse from the administration of chloroform; a girl 7 years old died from the effects of a splinter in the thumb. Of the remaining two violent deaths one was that of a male infant willfully murdered immediately after birth by a cloth being put over its mouth; and the other was that of a barmaid aged 20 who committed suicide by drowning.

Eighty deaths, or 21 per cent. of the whole mortality, occurred in public institutions, viz.:—45 in the Melbourne Hospital; 13 in the Alfred Hospital; 1 in the Lying-in Hospital; 6 in the Benevolent Asylum; 6 in the Immigrants' Home; 8 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum; 1 in the Nursery Industrial Schools; and 1 in the Children's Hospital.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 184, of which 84, or 46 per cent., were of males, and 100, or 54 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 133 were under one year of age, 33 were between one and two years, 10 were between two and three, 5 were between three and four, and 3 between four and five.

The persons dying at a more advanced age than five years numbered 190, of whom 105, or 55 per cent., were males, and 84, or 44 per cent., were females; 9 were between five and ten, 9 were between ten and fifteen, 6 were between fifteen and twenty, 10 were between twenty and twenty-five, 17 were between twenty-five and thirty, 7 were between thirty and thirty-five, 21 were between thirty-five and forty, 27 were between forty and forty-five, 15 were between forty-five and fifty, 18 were between fifty and fifty-five, 13 were between fifty-five and sixty, 11 were between sixty and sixty-five, 10 were between sixty-five and seventy, 10 were between seventy and seventy-five, 5 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 2 were over eighty years of age.

IRON CASTINGS.

TENDERS will be received until Ten a.m. on Tuesday the 25th March 1873 from persons willing to furnish Iron Castings, in such quantities as may be required for the Government Railways, from 1st July 1873 until the 30th of June 1874. The castings are required for locomotive engine work, carriage work, &c.

Whenever specially ordered the castings shall be run from the very best "cold-blast iron" and of such particular brand, quality, and mixture as may be described in the order; or of such other substituted mixture as may be approved or directed by the General Overseer of Locomotives, so as to produce a hard, close, soft, or other description of metal.

The castings are to be clean, sharp, free from surface scale, shell, cold shuts, blow holes, honeycomb, cinder, or any other imperfection, and are to be sound in every respect and thoroughly close in grain. When specially ordered the castings are to be run with heads or runners of such weight as may be requested, and no extra charge shall be made or allowed for same, and the contractor will be required to remove the head or runner from the casting where possible, and charge the casting at the net weight only, trimmed and cleaned. In cases

where it is necessary to cut off the head in a lathe or machine, such head will be cut off by the Government, and returned to the Melbourne Station, there to be delivered to the contractor free of cost or carriage.

Whenever ordered, the castings are to be moulded in loam without a pattern, and loam price will be paid according to schedule, but no extra charge will be allowed for patterns, strickles, or loam boards. The orders will express the kind or description of casting according to the schedule distinction; and the rates there filled in opposite each item will be allowed accordingly.

The Government will supply all patterns, and deliver the same to the Melbourne Station free of cost, from whence the contractor must fetch them when required and when due notice of same has been given in writing, and no cost for carriage from Spencer-street Station to the contractor's place of business will be allowed.

Whenever only one or two castings are required, and they can be moulded from the broken originals, the contractor will be bound to mould from such patterns without requiring the Government to supply a wooden or other pattern for same, and no extra price will be allowed.

All pipes and bends must be moulded in loam whenever required, and a loam pattern made. Any expense incurred on account of the rejection of supplies by a board of survey will be charged to the contractor.

8. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor,

failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged to the contractor.

9. The Railway Storekeeper will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior character, or not in accordance with the specification, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged to him.

Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under power-of-attorney coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

10.
