TOWNSHIP OF DERRINALLUM.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR WILLIAM FOSTER STAWELL, Knight, Chief Justice of the Colony of Victoria, and Officer administering the Government of the said Colony, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1860* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor may divide into counties the territory not already included in any county, and may also subdivide any county into parishes and towns, and may divide into parishes and towns any territory not included in any county, and by proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette* may define the boundaries of such counties, parishes, or towns, and may distinguish each by a name; and after such proclamation the territory comprised within the boundaries of any of the said divisions shall thenceforward be recognized as a county, parish, or town by the name so given as aforesaid; the Governor may from time to time at the request of the council of any shire or borough alter by proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette* the name of any such shire or borough, and may also from time to time by proclamation as aforesaid alter the name of any county, parish, town, township, land, area, goldfield, river, harbor, lake, bay, lagoon, swamp, mountain, glen, or other place or locality whatsoever within Victoria: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the eighteenth day of March 1867 the village of Tooliorook was proclaimed and the boundaries thereof were defined: And whereas it is deemed expedient to alter the name thereof: Now therefore I, the Officer administering the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of the power vested in me by the said Act, do hereby alter the name of the village designated Tooliorook in the said Proclamation, and do proclaim that the name by which such village shall be distinguished and recognized shall be as follows, that is to say.

THE TOWNSHIP OF DERRINALLUM.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor may from time to time by a notice in the *Government Gazette* proclaim as a street or road or as a town or village any portion or portions of Crown lands, and the lands in such town or village shall be sold by auction in the manner therein provided for the sale of

Crown lands by public auction, and the lands upon which such street or road shall have been proclaimed shall be and be deemed to be thenceforward dedicated to the public: Now therefore I, the Officer administering the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this notice proclaim as a village the portion of Crown lands hereinafter described, viz. :—

VILLAGE IN THE PARISH OF BRIAGOLONG.—Seventy-four acres one rood twenty-two perches, county of Tangil, parish of Briagolong, being allotment 16: Commencing at the south-east angle of the allotment; bounded thence by a road bearing north thirty chains sixty-eight links to allotment 16 A; thence by that allotment, being Wm. Forbes' land, bearing west twenty-four chains twenty-four links to allotment 15 A; thence by that allotment bearing south thirty chains sixty-eight links; and thence by a road bearing east twenty-four chains twenty-four links to the commencing point.—(72 G. 23225.)

COMMON.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir WILLIAM FOSTER STAWELL, Knight, Chief Justice of the Colony of Victoria, and Officer administering the Government of the said Colony, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees shall be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons; and it is directed that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons shall be published and all objections thereto shall be heard in the manner set forth in the one hundredth section of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Officer administering the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the Common hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

BEREMBOKE COMMON.—The unlicensed Crown land comprised within the following boundaries shall be and constitute a Common, to be designated the "Beremboke Common." Nine thousand eight hundred acres, more or less: Commencing at the north-west angle of allotment 51, parish of Ballark, in the county of Grant; thence by allotments 52, 53, and 54, and by a line bearing east about two hundred and sixty chains to the Little River; thence by that river downwards to the south boundary

of the parish of Beremboke; thence by that boundary bearing west about thirty-six chains to the west boundary of the parish of Anakie; thence by that boundary bearing south about three hundred and thirty chains to the north boundary of the parish of Durididwarrah; thence by that boundary bearing west about two hundred chains; thence by the eastern boundary of the Steiglitz Goldfields Common, and by a line bearing north about two hundred and thirty chains to the north-eastern side of the road from Geelong to Ballan; and thence by that road north-westerly and northerly to the commencing point.—(73.K.3457.)

CONTROL AND MANAGEMENT OF TIMBER RE-
SERVES AND STATE FORESTS IN THE COUNTY
OF BENDIGO.

BENDIGO WOODS AND FOREST BOARD.

WHEREAS by the 103th section of *The Land Act 1869*,
power is given to the Board of Land and Works to
make rules and regulations for the care, protection, and
management of all public parks and reserves, and for the
preservation of good order and decency therein, the Board of
Land and Works, in pursuance of the powers conferred as
aforesaid, has made the following Regulation relative to the
control of all Timber Reserves and reserves for State Forests
within the county of Bendigo:—

REGULATION.

The undermentioned representatives of local public bodies
in the county of Bendigo shall constitute a Board of Manage-
ment, to be called "The Bendigo Woods and Forest Board,"
to exercise control over all Timber Reserves and State Forests
in the said county.

They may propose rules and regulations for the care, pro-
tection, and management of such reserves and State Forests,
and for the preservation of good order and decency therein,
and, after approval and confirmation of such rules and regula-
tions by the Board of Land and Works, shall give effect to
and carry out the same as such Board of Management.

The deaths in February were less than the deaths in January by 32. They were also less than the average of February in the previous ten years by 27. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been less than the average of February by 98.

During the month the highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory was 102.4° on the 16th, and the lowest was 49.1° on the 1st. The mean temperature of the month (66.1°) was about half a degree above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (45.2°) took place on the 6th, viz., from a maximum of 99.2° to a minimum of 54°, and the least (7.7°) on the 17th, viz., from a maximum of 69° to a minimum of 61.3°. The mean daily range was 19.7°. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.885 inches) was exactly the same as the average.

Fifty-nine per cent. of the deaths were of males and 41 per cent. were of females, 53 per cent. were of children under five years of age as against 56 per cent. in February 1872, 65 per cent. in February 1871, 55 per cent. in February 1870, 60 per cent. in February 1869, 57 per cent. in February 1868, 74 per cent. in February 1867, 58 per cent. in February 1866, 64 per cent. in February 1865, 62 per cent. in February 1864, and 65 per cent. in February 1863.

Five persons of 75 years and upwards died during the month, viz.:—A laborer aged 75 of congestion of the lungs; a mariner aged 76, and a male aged 77, of phthisis; a laborer aged 78 of apoplexy; and a laborer aged 82 of paralysis.

Twenty-one violent deaths occurred during the month, of which seventeen were set down as accidental, two as homicidal, and two as suicidal. The accidental deaths were those of:—A lad aged 7 whose skull was fractured by a fall; of a butcher aged 16 who died of injuries resulting from a kick from a bullock; of a groom aged 31 who died of compression of the brain caused by falling from a loft; of a painter aged 35 whose skull was fractured by a fall when drunk; of a laborer aged 36 who died of injuries to the face caused by a cart falling; of a carpenter aged 57 whose skull was fractured by a kick from a horse; of an engineer aged 66 who died of fracture of the ribs; of a carter aged 19 who died from the effects of a wound in the back; of a girl aged 4 who died of burns; of a female aged 47 who died of exhaustion caused by taking a poisonous dose of opium; of three males aged respectively 8, 25, and 45, and two females aged respectively 26 and 44, who were drowned; of an engine-driver aged 31 who died of tetanus caused by injury to the hand; and of a male aged 52 who died from the effect of an explosion of gunpowder. Two newly born infants, the one a male and the other a female, were wilfully murdered, the latter by suffocation. The suicidal deaths were those of a male aged 56 who hanged himself, and of a blacksmith aged 58 who drowned himself when in an unsound state of mind.

Seventy-two deaths, or 21 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—44 in the Melbourne Hospital; 7 in the Alfred Hospital; 5 in the Benevolent Asylum; 3 in the Immigrants' Home; 4 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum; 1 in the Melbourne Gaol; 1 in the Lying-in Hospital; 3 in the Industrial Nursery Schools; and 4 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Hospital.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 182, of which 105, or 58 per cent., were of males, and 77, or 42 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 127 were under one year of age, 34 were between one and two years, 10 were between two and three, 5 were between three and four, and 6 between four and five.

The persons who were of a more advanced age at the time of death numbered 160, of whom 97, or 61 per cent., were males, and 63, or 39 per cent., were females; 11 were between five and ten, 3 were between ten and fifteen, 6 were between fifteen and twenty, 11 were between twenty and twenty-five, 17 were between twenty-five and thirty, 16 were between thirty and thirty-five, 12 were between thirty-five and forty, 14 were between forty and forty-five, 18 were between forty-five and fifty, 16 were between fifty and fifty-five, 14 were between fifty-five and sixty, 6 were between sixty and sixty-five, 4 were between sixty-five and seventy, 7 were between seventy and seventy-five, 4 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 1 was over eighty years of age.

As in January, most deaths were caused by local diseases, the most fatal complaints being those of the nervous and digestive systems. Under the head zymotic diseases, diarrhoea and dysentery caused 53 deaths in January and 50 in February. Twenty-seven deaths were caused in the month under review by phthisis as against 39 in the previous month.

If a claim on any lands demised for mining purposes be intersected by a race, and if the holder of the claim, or the lessee, shall apply to the warden, and if the warden, having investigated the case, shall be of opinion that such claim or demised lands could be more effectually worked if a flume or flumes were substituted for the portion of the race intersecting such claim or demised lands, he may authorize such flume or flumes to be constructed by and at the expense of the holder of such claim or of such lessee.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

REPORT ON THE LATE BALASORE CYCLONE.

THE following extracts are taken from a Report by Mr. W. G. Willson, Officiating Meteorological Reporter to the Government of Bengal, on the late Balasore Cyclone, and are published for general information. A copy of the Report in question may be seen at the office of the Chief Harbor Master.

44. Indications of the probable formation of a cyclone in the north of the Bay during the months of May and June:—

I. The barometer falls steadily for some days round the north of the Bay. The fall occurs first to the south-east at Chittagong and Akyab, and afterwards at Saugor Island, Cuttack, and Calcutta. The barometer at Saugor Island ranges lower than the barometer at Calcutta (normally, at this season, it ranges higher).

II. At Calcutta the winds become light and variable from S.E. round to N.E. As the disturbance increases, masses of clouds drift from E.N.E. or N.E., and as the storm approaches, showers are frequent and the wind blows in gusts.

III. At Saugor Island the winds are at first light and variable, working round from S.E. to N.E. As the disturbance increases, and as the storm approaches, the barometer continues to fall steadily; the wind increases in force with squalls from the N.E., and masses of clouds float rapidly from the same direction. Outside there is a heavy southerly swell.

IV. At Cuttack, or False Point, the winds are at first light and variable from N.N.E., working gradually round through N. to W. and W.S.W. As the storm approaches, the wind increases in force with squalls from W. and N.N.W.

V. At Chittagong the winds are light and very variable, mostly from S.E. and N.E.

VI. At Akyab the winds are at first light and saturated with moisture, mostly from S. and S.E. As the disturbance increases, the wind increases in force, and works gradually round from S.E. to S. and S.S.W.

VII. In the Bay, along and south of a line drawn from about False Point to Chittagong Island, south-westerly gales, accompanied with torrents of rain, prevail. Standing northwards the barometer falls, and rises when standing southwards.

45. Under the circumstances above specified (III), it appears unwise for ships in a good anchorage at Saugor to put to sea. The great danger is that they may be caught in a cyclone before they have got sea room to avoid it. Moreover, the pilot vessels will, under the circumstances, be generally off their

stations, and ships will be unable to land their pilots. It should be remembered also that generally the worst part of a cyclone is the heavy cross sea which accompanies it. In the late cyclone it was this tremendous sea, which is reported never to have been equalled in the Bay, which did such damage. It is accounted for by the long-continued gales from the S.W. This danger would be avoided by not putting to sea until the weather improved. From (VII) the following would appear to be a safe rule. *Ships coming up the Bay in the months of May and June with fresh south-westerly gales, accompanied by torrents of rain and a falling barometer, should not press northwards until the weather improves and the barometer rises steadily.*

46. I wish to draw particular attention to the following modern development of the laws of cyclonic storms. Disregard of this law may lead, and has led, to many losses at sea. "The direction of the wind, specially at a distance, is far from being at right angles to the bearing of the centre. The wind does not revolve round the vortex in circles, but along in-curving spirals, differing two, three, or more points, from the tangential circular direction." For example, a ship running up the Bay with a S.W. gale, squalls, torrents of rain, a barometer falling rapidly, and every appearance of a cyclone, has no right to conclude that the centre bears N.W. and that therefore a N. or N.N.E. course is a safe one. The centre, if at a distance, may bear N. or N.N.E. and a northerly course may run the ship into it, particularly as it may be then almost stationary. "The safest course seems to be to lie-to and watch the barometer and wind till the bearing of the centre be known with some certainty." It must be born in mind that before any vortex is formed, gales blow towards and round a considerable belt of low pressure. The following rule is I think a safe one when within the influence of a vortex. "To find the bearing of the centre stand with your face to the wind and measure round to your right hand side about ten points. In the southern hemisphere the ten points should be measured round to the left."

47. The Meteorological Reporter in Calcutta, with daily telegraphic reports of the state of the weather at Akyab, Chittagong, Saugor Island, and Cuttack (False Point would, I think, be a better station than Cuttack), will always, I think, be able to give ample warning of the probable formation of a cyclone in the north of the Bay, and in most cases some warning of the approach of storms from more southern latitudes. The telegraphic stations do not, however, extend far enough south to afford certain information of the generation of storms about the Andaman Islands. There the cyclones of the greatest violence, and those which travel furthest inland, are generally formed. Telegraphic communication with meteorological observatories at the Alguada Reef and Port Blair would, I think, enable him to give warning of the formation of the latter.

48. The experience of the late cyclone, I think, suggests that more use might be made of the information of the state of the weather from the meteorological stations, as regards warning the shipping at Saugor Island of the probable formation of a cyclone, more particularly when generated in the north of the Bay. According to experience these storms seldom travel far inland (there are some exceptions, for example, the great storm of June 3rd and 5th, 1839), but they may cause great disasters to ships outward-bound.

49. I think it would be practicable, to make arrangements for the exhibition of warning signals at Saugor light-house, from which they might be signalled to some of the light-ships, if considered necessary. The signals would be hoisted by orders from the Meteorological Reporter at Calcutta by telegraphic communication with Saugor light-house.

(1) A *cautionary signal*, suppose a signal cone in the daytime, to indicate that bad weather is probable. It might then be left optional with masters and pilots whether they would put to sea or not.

(2) A *warning signal*, a double cone in the daytime, to indicate that a cyclonic vortex is probably in course of formation in the Bay. It might then be made imperative on masters and pilots not to put to sea.

(3) A *storm signal*, a drum in the daytime, to indicate that a vortex has been formed and is probably approaching. During the night colored lights to correspond to these signals should be hoisted.

50. I do not know anything, however, about the safety of anchorage at Saugor Island. It is a question for those who are qualified to give an opinion to consider whether it would, in all cases be safer to ride out the storm at Saugor, or put to sea at once, if there was time, especially in the case of the more violent storms which come up from the Andaman Islands, and whether it is expedient to fetter the discretion of masters and pilots at all in the matter. The signals, however, might be hoisted in any case. The ships that put to sea before the late cyclone, and which were lost in it, would have been probably saved had they remained at Saugor; but I cannot say that such would always be the case.

51. Signals corresponding to those which I have recommended for Saugor Island light-house might also be hoisted, under similar circumstances, for the shipping in Calcutta. At all events, before the next cyclone period comes round, it would be well to arrange for night signals for the shipping to correspond to the signals adopted by the Meteorological Committee (No. 296, from the Secretary to the Meteorological Committee to the Junior Secretary to the Government of Bengal, Fort William, the 18th December 1867). There is at present, as I understand, only one night signal, and it corresponds to the *drum*, which is the storm signal, indicating that a cyclone is imminent, while the warning signal, the double cone, does not indicate the actual approach of a storm, but only that the state of the weather is such that there may be a storm. There seems to be a good deal of misconception about the meanings of these signals.

DISTINGUISHING CHARACTERISTICS OF VESSELS.

17. Every pilot vessel or boat shall be distinguished by the following characteristics, that is to say:—

- (1.) Each vessel or boat shall be painted upwards from the water-line (with the exception of such name or numbers as are hereinafter mentioned) a light stone-color.
- (2.) On the stern the name of the vessel or boat, and the port to which she belongs, painted in black letters at least one inch broad and three inches long, and on each bow the number in figures of such vessel or boat also painted black.
- (3.) On her mainsail the number of her license painted in conspicuous black figures.
- (4.) When afloat a flag at the masthead or on a sprit or staff, or in some equally conspicuous situation, shall be shown; such flag to be of large dimensions compared with the size of the vessel carrying the same, and to be of two colors, the upper horizontal half white, and the other horizontal half red.
- (5.) It shall be the duty of the pilots in charge of the vessels for the time being to attend to the following particulars:—

First, That the boat or vessel possesses all the above characteristics. Secondly, That the aforesaid flag be kept clean and distinct, so as to be easily discerned at a proper distance. Thirdly, That the names and numbers before mentioned are not at any time concealed. Fourthly, That a bright white light be kept at the mast-head, visible all round the horizon, and that a flash-light be also exhibited every fifteen minutes, from sunset to sunrise. Fifthly, That his vessel be kept in thorough repair and in every way fit for service, and a log kept by the mate, in conformity with the Board's instructions, wherein shall be entered all occurrences which take place on board, which shall be signed daily by himself and the mate, and transmitted every three months to the secretary to the Board. He shall also, on leaving the station, cause the pilot flag to be hauled down and kept so until the station is again taken up, and insert in the log of the day's proceedings the names of all pilots on board at the time of leaving the station, and the bearings of known visible objects on shore at the time. The pilot in charge of the relieving vessel shall also insert the names of all pilots of his company relieving the station, which shall at no time be less than five, and every endeavor shall be made by the company to keep that number on board by relay; and he shall also insert the bearings of known visible objects from the vessel when taking up the station. This rule shall apply, as far as practicable, to vessels leaving the station from having shipped all pilots of her company and the vessel relieving her, the vessel so relieving being considered on the station when outside the inner boundary.

STATIONS OF PILOTS AND PILOT VESSELS.

18. All pilots and pilot vessels shall be stationed at such place as the Board may from time to time determine.

LIMITS OF CRUISING STATION.

18A. The boundary of the cruising station, until rescinded, shall be the extremity of a line twelve miles from the centre of the heads N.E. by N. and S.W. by S., Bream Creek bearing therefrom N.W. by N., and Cape Shanck east. The eastern side of this boundary will extend on an eastern line until Arthur's Seat bears N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ N., and from thence towards the shore. The inner boundary is marked on the same line of fairway four (4) miles with Barwon Heads bearing N.W. by W. and a hill marked 225 on the chart bearing E. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. This hill is from half a mile to three-quarters of a mile eastward from the gap known as London Bridge. All bearings are magnetic.
