FURTHER PROROGUING PARLIAMENT AND FIXING THE TIME FOR HOLDING THE THIRD SESSION OF THE SEVENTH PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Administrator of the Government of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c..

WHEREAS by *The Constitution Act* it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria and, subject to the limitation therein contained, such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he may think fit; and also from time to time to prorogue the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he shall deem it expedient: And whereas the said Council and Assembly, called "The Parliament of Victoria," stand prorogued until Tuesday the fifteenth day of April instant, and it is expedient to fix the time for holding the next Session thereof: Now therefore I, the Administrator of the Government of Victoria, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, do by this my Proclamation further prorogue the said Parliament of Victoria from Tuesday the fifteenth day of April instant until Tuesday the thirteenth day of May now next ensuing; and also I do hereby fix Tuesday the thirteenth day of May aforesaid as the time for the commencement and holding of the next Session of the said Council and Assembly, called the Parliament of Victoria, for the despatch of business, at Two of the clock in the afternoon, in the Parliament Houses, situate in Parliament place, Spring street, in the City of Melbourne; and the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this seventh day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, and in the thirty-sixth year of Her Majesty's reign.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

PART OF THE SHIRE OF GLENELG ATTACHED TO THE SHIRE OF PORTLAND.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twenty-fourth
day of March 1873.

PRESENT:

WHEREAS by *The Shires Statute* (33 Vict. No. 358, § 22) it is amongst other things enacted, that if the whole or a majority of the ratepayers of any part of a shire or road district in which an annual or general election or first appointment of members has taken place, shall, by petition under their hands, describing such part by metes and bounds, pray the Governor that such part be severed from such shire or road district, or if any part of any shire or road district shall not have been alienated from the Crown and be unoccupied, it shall be lawful for the Governor, if he shall think fit so to do, to order that such part, or so much thereof as the Governor shall think proper, be severed from such shire or road district respectively, and by the same or any other order to direct that the portion so severed from such shire or road district respectively shall be attached to any other shire, borough, road district, riding, or subdivision to be named in such order, and the same shall take effect upon the publication of such order in the *Government Gazette*: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of colony, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of June One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, the Shire of Glenelg was constituted: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the sixteenth day of December One thousand eight hundred and seventy-two the said Shire of Glenelg was divided anew into three separate ridings, the boundaries of which were therein described: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony bearing date the thirtieth day of November One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three the Shire of Portland was constituted; and by an Order of the Governor in Council, made on the twenty-eighth day of December One thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, the boundaries of the said shire of Portland were altered as therein described: And whereas the powers conferred upon the Governor in the section of the Act above recited are now exercised upon a petition of a majority of the ratepayers of a part of the Shire of Glenelg therein described, and notices of such petition have been published in the manner prescribed in the twenty-ninth section of the same Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, by this present Order, and in compliance with the prayer of the petition hereinbefore mentioned, doth sever a part of the Shire of Glenelg described in such petition from such shire, and doth hereby direct that the portion so severed from such shire shall be attached to the Shire of Portland: And the Officer administering the Government, with the advice aforesaid, doth hereby set forth the altered boundaries of the said Shire of Portland and of the South Riding of the Shire of Glenelg in manner following, that is to say:—

THE SHIRE OF PORTLAND.—Commencing on the sea-coast at the south-east corner of South Australia; thence north by the eastern boundary line of South Australia to the south-west angle of the township of Lindsay; thence by a line east to the River Glenelg; thence southerly by the River Glenelg to its junction with the Stokes River; thence north-easterly by the Stokes River to the intersection of the one-chain road on the western margin of the parish of Grassdale; thence north by that road to the north-east angle of section 8 of the parish of Digby; thence further north by the east boundary of the parish of Merino to the north-east angle of allotment 1 of section 24 of the parish of Tahara; thence further north by the one-chain road on the west boundary of the last-said parish to the junction of the road on the southern boundary of section 12 of last-said parish; thence easterly by that road and north-easterly by the road along the south-eastern boundaries of sections 12, 10, and 9 of said parish of Tahara to the centre of the main road from Green Hills to Harrow; thence northerly by the said main road to the River Wannon; thence south-easterly by that river to the north-west angle of the parish of Murrumbidgee; thence south by the western boundary of that parish to the intersection of the road running between sections 3 and 4 in the said parish; thence westwardly by that road to the north-west angle of allotment 17 of section D in the parish of Tahara; thence south by the western boundaries of said allotment 17 and of allotments 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, and 23 of said section D, to the road from Green Hills to Coleraine; thence south-easterly by that road to the south-west angle of section 19 in the parish of Murrumbidgee; thence easterly by the road on the north of the parish boundary of Braxholme, and by said parish boundary to the north-east angle of section 6 in the said parish; thence south by the parish boundary to the main road from Braxholme to Hamilton; thence north-easterly by that road to the intersection of a right line joining the south-west angle of section 4 in the parish of Yulecurt and the north-west angle of the Lyne pre-emptive section in the parish of Byambynnee; thence southerly by that line to the north-west angle of the Lyne pre-emptive section; thence by the western boundaries of the shires of Dundas, Minhamite, and Belfast to the sea-coast; thence westerly by the sea-coast to the commencing point, excepting the borough of Portland.

THE SOUTH RIDING OF THE SHIRE OF GLENELG.—Commencing at the junction of the Stokes River with the River Glenelg; thence by the course of the River Glenelg to the

junction of the River Wannon; thence by the River Wannon to the northern boundary of the parish of Sandford; thence easterly by the northern boundaries of the said parish of Sandford and the parishes of Merino and Coleraine to the south-east angle of the parish of Muntham; thence northerly by the eastern boundaries of the parishes of Muntham and Beerik to the south-west angle of the parish of Brit-brit; thence easterly by the southern boundary of the said parish of Brit-brit to a point in the centre of the road from Green Hills to Harrow; thence southerly by the centre of the said road to a point opposite the centre of a one-chain road dividing allotment 2, section 17, parish of Tahara, from allotment 6, section 9 in the same parish; passing thence by the centre of the said one-chain road along the south-eastern boundaries of sections 9, 10, and 12 and the southern boundary of the said section 12 to its junction with the one-chain road on the west boundary of the said parish of Tahara; thence south by the said road to the northern angle of allotment 1 of section 24 of the said parish; thence south by the east boundary of the parish of Merino to the north-east angle of section 8 of the parish of Digby; thence further south by the road on the western margin of the parish of Grassdale to the intersection of the Stokes River; thence south-westerly by the said river to the commencing point.

And the Honorable Duncan Gillies, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

Tenderers are to specify the kind of coal tendered for delivery by them, also the kind or kinds of firewood, and the proportions of each kind.

The wood is to be split out of large forest timber of either red or white gum, box, or she-oak (no other kind will be received), perfectly sound, and cut into billets not exceeding nor less than two feet in length, and not less than four inches by four inches in thickness. Neither burnt wood, heart wood, nor outside pieces of bark will be received.

The estimated quantity of charcoal is 1500 bushels for the twelve months.

Printed forms of tender may be obtained from the Secretary to the Tender Board, Melbourne; the Officers in charge at Sunbury and Ballarat Schools; and the Police Magistrate at Geelong; by whom also any information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

The firewood to consist of either box, she-bak, red or white gum, and must be dry, perfectly sound, and of good burning quality. The charcoal must be made from the best hardwood, and be of the best quality, and free from dirt or other impurities.

2. The orders will be issued by the departments requiring the supplies; and should an order be not complied with within forty-eight hours, it will be competent for the department concerned to purchase at the contractor's risk, and to deduct from the contractor's account the extra expense (if any) over and above the contract price. Supplies are to be delivered in quantities from one to twenty tons at a time on board steam tugs wherever the same may be employed, and on board steam tugs at any wharf or hulk selected by the contractor in Hobson's Bay, the Yarra River, or Geelong, as the case may be.

3. The contractor for coal will be bound to furnish scales and weights, and to weigh the coal on delivery; the coal for vessels (steam tugs excepted) to be delivered by the contractors in the ships' bunkers; coal for departments to be delivered in the places set apart therefor. The contractor for firewood will be bound to supply the description of wood named in the order; and to place the same in separate stacks of two feet in width and five feet high for measurement, on such ground as may be pointed out, a space being left between each stack. 5. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supply as to the quality, the same is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the board is to be considered as final.

6. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense (if any) will be deducted from the contractor's account.

7. If from any cause injury would accrue to the public service by waiting for a board of survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of station, will have the power to reject such articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense (if any) will be charged as in condition 6.

8. A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor to such mulct not exceeding £50 as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

Melbourne district will include a radius of six miles from the General Post Office; and Williamstown district will include the town of Williamstown, Hobson's Bay, and the River Yarra.

No tenders are required for meat at Ararat, Beechworth, Melbourne, and Williamstown.

The lock-ups at Melbourne, Hotham, Fitzroy, Toorak, Prahran, St. Kilda, Emerald Hill, Sandridge, Collingwood, Richmond, and the Richmond Depot are included in the contracts for the Melbourne district.

Flour and items mentioned under Schedule 3 when required for the Sanatory Station will be ordered under the Melbourne contract.

The contractor (or his agent) for meat at the Sanatory Station must reside at Point Nepean.

Supplies for country stations for which no local contract may have been taken may be ordered under the Melbourne contract.

Samples of tea and sugar for Melbourne, Williamstown, Ararat, Ballarat, Beechworth, Geelong, and Sunbury lie at the offices of the sheriffs at Ararat, Ballarat, Beechworth, and Geelong, and at the office of the Secretary of the Tender Board, for inspection.

The prices must be expressed, without alterations or erasures, in words as well as in figures, and total amount of tender stated.

The value of all packages, whether in bulk or otherwise, is to be included in the price demanded (except flour, meal, and potato bags, which will be returned when empty), and only the actual net weight or quantity received will be paid for.

Printed forms of tender, showing the estimated monthly consumption and conditions of contract, may be obtained from the Secretary to the Tender Board, Melbourne; the Sheriffs at Geelong, Ararat, Ballarat, Beechworth, Castlemaine, Kilmore, Maryborough, Sandhurst, and Portland; and from the Officer in charge of the Industrial School, Sunbury; by whom also information will be afforded to persons tendering.

Security will be required, either in Government debentures, bank deposit-receipt, or cash deposit, as the tenderer may elect. The security will be calculated at Ten per cent. on contracts under £1000, and at Five per cent. over that sum, but the amount required will in no case exceed that above specified.

Bank deposit-receipts to be in favor of the Secretary, Tender Board.

Tenders must be accompanied by a preliminary deposit in bank notes or a bank draft, payable to the order of the Secretary to the Tender Board, for Ten per cent. of the amount of security required (cheques will in no case be received), which will be returned within ten days to unsuccessful tenderers on their application. Such deposit to be forfeited in the event of the successful tenderer failing to complete the security within the prescribed period.

The security must be completed within ten days of acceptance of the tender, failing which the contract may be again advertised or another tender accepted.

In the event of the contractor failing to carry on the contract, the contract security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited.

Tenderers failing to take up their accepted tenders will be disqualified from tendering for Government supplies for a period of twelve months.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

Tenders must be enclosed in a separate envelope, marked "Tender for —" (as the case may be), and be deposited in the Tender-box at the Tender Board Offices, Treasury; or (if sent by post) must be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Tender Board Offices, Treasury, Melbourne.

CONDITIONS.

1. All the articles are to be of the best quality of the several kinds, in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages, free from all charges for cartage, freight, &c.

2. Bread. A sample of the best ordinarily retailed to the public will be considered as a test loaf for first quality. Second quality to be made of flour known in the trade as "best seconds," and the third quality (that issued for prisoners of the Crown) to be made of flour the produce of prime wheat, from which twelve per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Milk. The milk must be fresh, pure, and of the best quality.

4. Fresh meat is to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and, when the quantity admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately, also buttocks only when ordered. When shins of beef form a portion of the supply, a fair proportion of the bone, not less than ten inches, must have been cut off. The sticking pieces must be removed from the fore quarters of beef.

5. The supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto on the written order of the officer in charge. All other supplies will be ordered by the head of department concerned.

6. The order issued by the head of department must accompany the goods, and the account is to be rendered simultaneously with delivery of the supplies. In other cases the account is to be rendered monthly. The rates or quantities quoted in the orders cannot be exceeded.

7. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles at the time mentioned in the order they will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from his account.

8. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies as to the quality, the same to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final. In the event of the decision being against the contractor, the survey fees and expenses (if any) will be deducted as in clause 7.

9. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor; failing which it will be procured by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 7.

10. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the person to whom the rations are due or to the contractor in waiting for a board of survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good ones instead; failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 7.

11. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor, upon report of the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government to terminate the contract forthwith.

12. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney; coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

13. It will be competent for the Secretary of the Tender Board on behalf of the Government, or the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving, in writing, a notice of three full calendar months, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of the month, and within the period for which the contract is made. It will also be competent for the Secretary to the Tender Board to terminate the contract, without notice, on infringement of condition No. 12, or should there be reason to know that the contractor takes advantage of his contract to communicate improperly with a prisoner.

14. In the event of any alteration in the Tariff affecting any of the items included in these contracts, the Government or the contractor, as may be the case, will make a proportionate allowance, by way of deduction from or increase of the price of the item so affected.

15. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being broken, infringed, or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service, or by any contracts made by the Imperial Commissariat, or on account of other Governments; or by the consumption of the produce or surplus stock of any Government establishment; or by any article being made at, and supplied for the use of any Government establishment.
