REGULATIONS FOR THE CONTROL AND MANAGEMENT OF YARRA PARK.

WHEREAS by section 108 of *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted that the Board of Land and Works shall have power from time to time to make and alter or rescind rules and regulations for the care, protection, and management of all public parks and reserves: Now, therefore, the said Board of Land and Works, in exercise of the power conferred as aforesaid, doth hereby make the rules and regulations following to be observed and enforced in respect of the Yarra Park—

1. No person shall interfere with the trees, shrubs, flowers, or birds in this park, or throw stones, or commit any nuisance therein, or leave therein any bottles, orange peel, paper, cast-off clothing, or other litter, or light fires therein.

2. No person shall be allowed to climb or jump over the fences in and around this park, or to stick bills on those fences or gates, or to cut names, letters, or marks on the trees, seats, gates, posts, or fences, or to write thereon.

3. No person shall be allowed to offer any article for sale in this park.

4. No person shall be allowed to run any goats or poultry in this park, or any cattle, unless under special authority of the Board of Land and Works, and in such portions only of the park as the Board may prescribe.

5. Entrance into plots of ground specially enclosed for plantations and for other purposes is prohibited.

6. The entrance into this park of any omnibus, hackney-coach, cab, van, dray, or any vehicle bearing either name or number, or licensed for hire, and of any vehicle used for transport of goods, stores, or materials of any kind, is prohibited, unless such entrance is specially authorized in each case by the Assistant Commissioner of Lands and Survey.

Offenders against these regulations shall, in accordance with section 108 of *The Land Act 1869*, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding five pounds for each offence; and every person who shall knowingly and wilfully offend against any such regulation, and who shall not, after he shall have been warned by a bailiff of Crown Lands, or any constable, desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or constable and taken before some justice of the peace, and shall on conviction forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

CONDITIONS.

1. The coal is to be of the very best quality for smithy purposes, and must be screened before delivery over a screen with bars half an inch apart, and afterwards through a screen with bars an inch apart, and that which has passed through the bars one inch apart is to be delivered, and is to be what is termed nutty smith's coal, free from lumps, dust, shale, sulphur, and other impurities.

2. The contractor is to deliver the coal screened, ready for use, into the waggons on the railway or breakwater pier at Williamstown, at the option of the Government, or may deliver into the railway waggons at any station on the Victorian Railways. The coal will be weighed by the Government, and such weight and returns shall form the basis upon which the contractor's account will be made out.

3. The contractor will be required to produce the invoice and a letter from either company to prove the genuineness of the coal before it will be received. The coal will be afterwards

subjected to such test as the Engineer-in-Chief or General Overseer of Locomotives may decide before acceptance.

4. The contract entered into under this notice is not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by the importation of smiths' coal by the Government for the service of the Victorian Railways, or the purchase of slack or small coal.

5. The contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly on the prescribed form, and present the same in a complete state to the Railway Storekeeper to be passed for payment to the Treasury.

6. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supply as to the quality of the coal, the same is to be decided by a board of survey composed of persons named by the Commissioner of Railways, and the decision of the board is to be final.

7. If the delay necessary for obtaining the decision of a board of survey should be detrimental to the public service, the Engineer-in-Chief or General Overseer of Locomotives will have the power to reject coal which is of an inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected coal and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense charged to him.

8. Irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor to such mulct, not exceeding Five pounds for each case, as the Government may direct; and it will also be in the power of the Government to terminate the contract forthwith.

9. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

10. It will be competent for the contractor, or for the Secretary of Railways on behalf of the Government, to terminate the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three calendar months, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month.

11. The orders will be issued by the Secretary, and, should an order for Australian Agricultural or Wallsend coal not be complied with and satisfied within twenty-one days, the Railway Storekeeper shall have power to obtain the supply elsewhere, and charge the extra cost of same to the contractor.

12. The estimated consumption of coal for smiths' use will be about 50 tons; but the Government do not bind themselves to order that quantity, but only what may be required from time to time.
