TIMBER RESERVE.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Administrator of the Government of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor may make and proclaim reserves for the preservation and growth of timber, and may from time to time, after one month's notice shall be given in the *Government Gazette*, alter and revoke any such proclamation, and the Board of Land and Works may issue licenses to cut timber upon such reserve or any part thereof on such terms and conditions, and subject to the payment of such license fee as shall from time to time be approved of by the Governor and be set forth in such license: Now therefore I, the Administrator of the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim as a Reserve made for the preservation and growth of timber, in accordance with and subject to the provisions of the 53rd section of the above-recited Act, the unappropriated Crown lands comprised within the boundaries hereinafter described (excepting the portions thereof which may have been applied for under the 19th or 49th section of the said Act prior to the date of this Proclamation, and for occupation of which portions licenses may hereafter be granted), viz.:—

CAPE OTWAY STATE FOREST.—193,000 acres, more or less, county of Polwarth: Commencing at the mouth of the River Aire; thence by that river upwards to a point south of Mount Amy; thence by a line bearing north about eight miles to a line running parallel with and one mile northerly from the Dividing Range; thence by that line bearing easterly, south-easterly, and north-easterly to a point one mile north-easterly of the track from Loutitt Bay to Birregurra; thence by a line crossing the aforesaid range at right angles bearing south-easterly to a point on a line running parallel with and one mile south-easterly from that range; thence by that line bearing south-westerly to Jamieson's Creek; thence by that creek downwards to the sea-coast; thence by the sea-coast south-westerly to a point east of the north boundary of John William Cawood's land at Apollo Bay; thence by a line and the said boundary bearing west about forty chains; thence by the western boundary of that land bearing S. 16° 21' W. twenty-one chains eighty-eight links; thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the north-west angle of allotment A; thence by that allotment and a line bearing south to the right bank of the Barham River; thence by that river upwards to a point north of the west boundary of allotment A 1; thence by a line and the west and south boundaries of that allotment and a line bearing south, east, north, and east to the sea-coast; and thence again by the sea-coast south-westerly and westerly to the commencing point. As shown on the plan deposited at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.—(73.L.2772).*

WHEREAS by *The Shires Statute* (33 Vict. No. 358, § 19) it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor may, if he shall be thereunto requested by the council of the shire, and if he shall see fit so to do, and upon such terms and conditions as shall appear to him to be reasonable and just, annex to any shire or to any riding, or in separate parts to any two or more ridings of any shire if divided into ridings, any portion of Victoria adjoining to such shire and forming therewith one continuous area; and not lying within the limits of the city of Melbourne or the town of Geelong; and every such portion shall thereupon become and be part of such shire, and so much thereof as shall have been added to any riding of such shire shall be part of the riding to which it shall have been so added, and such shire and riding after such annexation shall, save where herein otherwise provided, be deemed to be the same shire and riding respectively after such annexation as before: Provided that notice of any such intended annexation be taken into consideration by his Executive Council shall be published by the Minister in the *Government Gazette*, and in at least one newspaper generally circulating in the portion to be annexed, at least one month before any such annexation shall be made: And whereas by an Order in Council bearing date the twenty-third day of January, One thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, the Heidelberg Road District was constituted the Shire of Heidelberg: And whereas, in compliance with a request from the council of the said shire, it has seemed fit to the Governor to add to the said shire the portion of Victoria described in a notice published in the *Victoria Government Gazette*, bearing date the twentieth day of December, One thousand eight hundred and seventy-two, adjoining to the said shire and not lying within the limits of the above-mentioned city and town or any municipal or road district: Now therefore His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby add to the Shire of Heidelberg a portion of the colony adjoining to such shire and forming therewith one continuous area (such portion not lying within the city or town above mentioned or any municipal or road district), in accordance with the above-recited provisions of the said Act; and doth re-define the whole of the said shire, added to as aforesaid, in manner following; that is to say:—

THE SHIRE OF HEIDELBERG. — Commencing in centre of the Merri Creek, opposite the southward angle of Northcote recreation ground; bounded by a line thence along part of the southward and eastward boundaries of said recreation ground, and to centre of Westgarth street; eastward along said street to west boundary of allotment 113, parish of Jika-jika; north along said boundary to south boundary of allotment 122; east by this boundary and to the centre of the Darebin Creek; up this creek to opposite the south boundary of section 10, Keelundora; east to and along this boundary, the eastward boundary of same section; and the northward boundaries of sections 9 and 8, east to the centre of the River Plenty; down this river to the Yarra Yarra, and down the centre of this river to the Merri Creek, and up this creek to the commencing point.

And the Honorable Duncan Gillies, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by *The Shires Statute* (33 Vict. No. 358, § 22) it is amongst other things enacted, that if the whole or a majority of the ratepayers of any part of a shire or road district in which an annual or general election or first appointment of members has taken place, shall, by petition under their hands, describing such part by metes and bounds, pray the Governor that such part be severed from such shire or road district, or if any part of any shire or road district shall not have been alienated from the Crown and be unoccupied, it shall be lawful for the Governor, if he shall think fit so to do, to order that such part, or so much thereof as the Governor shall think proper, be severed from such shire or road district respectively, and by the same or any other order to direct that the portion so severed from such shire or road district respectively shall be attached to

any other shire, borough, road district, riding, or subdivision to be named in such order, and the same shall take effect upon the publication of such order in the *Government Gazette*: And whereas the powers conferred upon the Governor in the section of the Act above recited are now exercised upon a petition of a majority of the ratepayers of a part of the Shire of Warrnambool therein described, and notices of such petition have been published in the manner prescribed in the twenty-ninth section of the same Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, and in compliance with the prayer of the petition hereinbefore mentioned, doth by this present Order sever the part of the Shire of Warrnambool described in such petition from such shire, and doth direct that the portion so severed from such shire shall be attached to the Shire of Mortlake, the boundaries of the part so severed and attached being hereinafter set forth and described, that is to say:—

Commencing at the point where the Ararat to the south-western seaboard road is cut by the county boundary of Hampden in the township of Chatsworth; thence south-westerly by the centre line of said road to the intersection of the road bounding the parish of Caramut on the north; thence easterly by that road to its junction with the road bounding the parish of West Hexham on the west; thence southerly by the last said road to the intersection of Muston's Creek; thence south-westerly by the course of Muston's Creek to the north-west angle of allotment 1 of section 1, parish of Yeth-Young; thence southerly by the western boundary of said allotment to the road bounding the said parish on the west; thence southerly by that road to the north-west angle of allotment 2 of section 12 of the said parish; thence southerly by the western boundaries of said allotment 2 and of allotment 6 of said section 12 to the north-west angle of allotment 7 of said section 12 of the said parish; thence southerly by the road bounding the last said allotment and section 23 of said parish on the west to the north-west angle of the parish of Ballangeich; thence south-westerly by the parish boundary of Ballangeich to the road bounding a portion of allotment 1 of said parish on the north-west; thence south-westerly by that road bounding the said parish on the north-west to the north-east angle of the parish of Bullanbul; thence southerly by the road bounding the parish of Ballangeich on the west to the south-west angle of last said parish; thence easterly by the southern boundary of the said parish of Ballangeich to the Drysdale Creek and the road bounding allotment 73 of the said parish on the south; thence easterly by that road bounding said allotment 73, and allotments 74, 95, and part of 96 of said parish on the south to the north-east angle of allotment 18 of section 2 of the parish of West Framlingham; thence easterly by the northern boundary of allotment 19 of said section 2 to the Hopkins River; thence northerly by that river to the commencing point.

WHEREAS by *The Shires Statute Amendment Act 1870* (34 Vict. No. 387, § 2) it is amongst other things enacted, that if at any time in any road district, whether single or united, and whether the area be one hundred square miles or less, the total net annual value of the rateable property, as appearing by the general rate then last made, shall have amounted to or exceeded Twelve thousand pounds, it shall be lawful for the Governor, if it shall seem fit, to constitute such district a shire within the meaning of *The Shires Statute*, by such name as in and by the Order in Council may be assigned to the same; and the subdivisions, if any, of the district subsisting at the time of such constitution shall be and be called ridings of the shire: And whereas the total net annual value of the rateable property in the road district hereinafter mentioned, as appearing by the general rate now last made in such district, has exceeded Twelve thousand pounds, and it seems fit to constitute the same to be a shire: Now therefore His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order constitute the Road District hereinafter mentioned to be a Shire within the meaning of *The Shires Statute* by the name hereby assigned to the same, that is to say:—

The Dandenong Road District, which was created by a Proclamation bearing date the fifth day of February 1857, and was divided into electoral subdivisions by an Order of the seventh day of December 1868, and was enlarged by two Orders bearing date the second day of January 1873, shall be and is hereby constituted and shall be named the

SHIRE OF DANDENOG.

It is therefore hereby notified, that vessels not anchoring, but having intercourse for such supplies, shall not be chargeable with the fee of One penny per ton, provided that in such cases the sum of One guinea be first paid to Her Majesty's Customs by such vessel, which shall then be allowed to receive supplies of fresh meat, poultry, fish, green vegetable, medicines, and postal communication.

The said fee to be appropriated towards the maintenance of the pratique boat, telegraph stations, and time-ball office.
