REGULATIONS UNDER THE EDUCATION ACT 1872.

THE subjoined digest comprising all Regulations which have been from time to time made by the Governor in Council, under the *Education Act* 1872, is published for general information.

I.—COURSE OF FREE INSTRUCTION.

Class I.

Reading and Spelling.—Tablets; First Reading Book Irish National Board, or its equivalent.

Writing.—Capital and small letters on slate, from copies on black-board, and from dictation.

Arithmetic.—Notation—learning to write and read numbers up to 20; oral addition and subtraction of numbers, each less than 11.

Rhymes.—To learn them daily.

Needlework.—Those who are able to learn, to commence.

Disciplinary Exercises.

Class II.

Reading, Spelling, and Explanation.—Irish National Board's Second Book, or equivalent.

Writing.—Single and double turns on paper, copying on slates in manuscript sentences from tablets or books 1 or 2, and writing on slates from copies set on black-board.

Arithmetic.—Simple addition and subtraction, and multiplication tables.

Grammar.—Learn to distinguish articles, nouns, and adjectives.

Geography.—The continents, oceans, and larger seas, with their relative positions.

Needlework.—To be learning to hem.

Class III.

Reading, Spelling, and Explanation.—Irish National Board's Third Book, or equivalent.

Dictation.—From Second Book or equivalent.

Writing.—In copy-books, text-hand.

Arithmetic.—Notation and numeration, four simple rules, and money tables.

Grammar.—The parts of speech.

Geography.—Minor seas, chief gulfs, capes, bays, peninsulas, and islands in the world.

Needlework.—Hemming and seaming.

Class IV.

Reading and Explanation.—In Irish National Board's Fourth Book, or equivalent.

Dictation.—From Third Book, or equivalent.

Writing.—Small-hand.

Arithmetic.—To compound rules and reduction.

Grammar.—Inflections of nouns, pronouns, adjectives, and adverbs, and the principal parts of verbs.

Geography.—The countries, with their relative positions and capitals; the principal mountains, rivers, and lakes of the world.

Needlework.—Hemming seaming, stitching, and darning.

Class V.

Reading and Explanation.—Prose and poetry, in an advanced reading book.

Dictation.—From an advanced reading book.

Writing.—Running-hand.

Arithmetic.—To simple proportion and practice, with the four simple rules in decimals.

Grammar.—Parsing, and the inflections of the parts of speech.

Geography.—Maps of Europe and Australia.

Needlework, for Girls.—To hem, seam, stitch, darn, work buttonholes, gather, and knit.

Class VI.

Reading and Explanation.—Any book or newspaper.

Dictation.—From any book or newspaper.

Writing.—Mercantile writing.

Arithmetic.—Vulgar and decimal fractions.

Grammar.—Syntax, and prefixes and affixes, and analysis from Morell.

Geography.—Generally of the world.

Needlework.—Put work together, cut out, and all plain needlework.

II.—SALARIES OF TEACHERS.

1. Teachers employed on the 31st of December 1872, whilst holding the same positions in the same schools, will receive, for the remainder of the present financial year, that is, to the 30th of June 1873, the same fixed salaries and also the same allowances for results as they would have been entitled to under the Regulations of the Board of Education if such regulations had continued in force, and they will receive as an equivalent for fees an amount at the rate of nine-tenths of their actual receipts on account of fees during the six months preceding the 1st of January last. If at any time it is found that the number of scholars in actual attendance in any school has diminished below the average in such school for the year 1872, the amount paid as the equivalent for fees will thenceforth be diminished in proportion. After the 30th of June 1873, all teachers will be paid according to the next Regulation.

2. All teachers, except those under the last Regulation, will be paid as follows :—

Certificated teachers will receive annual salaries according to the following scale :—

Head Teachers.

In schools where the average attendance is below 20, £80.
 In schools where the average attendance is not less than 20 but under 30, £100.
 In schools where the average attendance is not less than 30 but under 50, £110.
 In schools where the average attendance is not less than 50 but under 75, £120.
 In schools where the average attendance is not less than 75 but under 100, £130.
 And so on, the salaries increasing £10 for each increase of 25 in the average attendance of scholars up to 350, after which the increase will be £10 for each increase of 50 in the average attendance.

Assistant Teachers.

1st assistants will receive £80, with £20 for every 100 scholars in attendance above the first 50.
 2nd assistants will receive £80, with £10 for every 100 scholars in attendance above the first 150.
 3rd assistants will receive £80, with £10 for every 200 scholars in attendance above the first 250.
 4th assistants will receive £80, with £10 for every 300 scholars in attendance above the first 350.
 5th assistants will receive £80, with £10 for every 400 scholars in attendance above the first 450.

Other assistants £80 only.

Uncertificated teachers and assistants will receive annual salaries not exceeding £80.

Pupil-teachers will receive annual salaries varying from £20 to £50 according to their class.

Workmistresses will be paid at the uniform rate of £30 per annum.

Head teachers, assistant teachers, and pupil-teachers, being females, will receive one-fifth less than the above scale.

Note.

Teachers will generally be employed in schools according to the following scale :—

To schools where the average attendance is below 30, 1 teacher.

To schools where the average attendance is not less than 30 but below 50, 1 teacher ; 1 work-mistress.

To schools where the average attendance is not less than 50 but below 75, 1 teacher ; 1 work-mistress ; 1 pupil-teacher.

To schools where the average attendance is not less than 75 but below 100, 1 teacher ; 1 assistant.

To schools where the average attendance is not less than 100 but below 125, 1 teacher ; 1 assistant ; 1 pupil-teacher.

To schools where the average attendance is not less than 125 but below 150, 1 teacher ; 1 assistant ; 2 pupil-teachers.

To schools where the average attendance is not less than 150 but below 175, 1 teacher ; 2 assistants ; 2 pupil-teachers.

After which a pupil teacher and an assistant will be allowed alternately for each successive increase of 50 in the average attendance.

It is not intended at once to reduce the allotment in schools already in existence, but as vacancies occur they will only be filled up in accordance with the above scale.

3. The number of teachers employed in any school may be increased or reduced at any time as the average attendance may render necessary ; but, unless their position in the school has been raised, the rate of payment to the teachers will only be altered at the commencement of a half-year, or at the first day of any month succeeding the visit of an inspector.

4. No person shall be employed as a head or assistant teacher in a State School unless such person shall hold a certificate of competency or a special certificate issued by the late Board of Education, or shall, upon an inspector's recommendation, have obtained from the Minister temporary permission to act ; and no uncertificated teacher who shall, without sufficient excuse, be absent from an examination to which he has been summoned, or who shall fail to pass at such examination, shall continue in such employment more than two months thereafter, unless there be no certificated teacher ready or willing to take the place of such teacher ; and all uncertificated teachers shall be summoned as early as possible after their appointment.

5. Salaries of head teachers appointed between the 1st of January and 30th of June 1873, will be rated upon the average attendance of the months during which the school has been in operation between the 1st of January and the end of the month in which the appointment was made.

6. Teachers employed on the 31st December of 1872, whilst holding the same positions in the same schools, will receive to the 31st of December 1873 the same monthly payment as that paid to them for the month of June 1873, unless in cases where they prefer to be paid under section 2 of Regulation II. and Regulation III.

7. For the purpose of estimating salaries, according to the scale in Regulation II., for 1873, the average attendance in schools during March 1873 will be generally adopted, and thereafter the average attendance during the six months ending the 30th of April and the 30th of October in each year will be generally adopted; but in cases where exceptional fluctuations in attendance have occurred the average of any other month or months may with the sanction of the Minister be adopted.

8. The rates of payments determined under the preceding section will continue till the 30th of June or the 31st of December next ensuing, except under the following circumstances:—

- (a.) Improvement in the position of the teacher.
- (b.) Change in the amount payable for results, to take effect from the 1st day of any month succeeding the visit of an inspector.
- (c.) Any exceptional increase in attendance caused by the closing of a neighbouring school.

9. In the case of a new school, or a school becoming a State School, a staff of teachers will be allotted upon the expected attendance at the school, and the rate of payment based upon such allotment shall continue in force until the expiration of the half-year then current, or, in special cases, until the expiration of a further period of six months.

10. From the 1st January 1874 schools containing more than one department will be recognised as containing one department only, and the rate of payment will be calculated upon the average attendance of the whole school.

11. Teachers employed in the organization or establishment of existing or new schools, or temporarily employed in the place of other teachers, or otherwise specially employed, may be paid by fixed salaries only, at rates from £2 to £7 per week, the rates to be in each case determined by the Minister.

III.—PAYMENTS BY WAY OF RESULTS.

1. In addition to their fixed salaries, payments will be made to head teachers and assistant teachers by way of results, upon examination of their schools by an inspector, in the subjects specified in Schedule I. of the Act.

The maximum payment which any teacher can obtain by way of results will be an amount equal to one-half of his fixed salary.

In order to entitle the teachers of any school to this maximum:—

- 1. Every scholar who has attended such school during any part of the five weeks preceding the inspector's visit must be presented for examination.
- 2. The inspector must be satisfied that all the scholars below seven years of age in class I. are under proper instruction and discipline.
- 3. That every other scholar has been satisfactorily instructed up to the standard of the class with which he is presented by the teacher.
- 4. That the scholars are classified and instructed in accordance with Regulation I.
- 5. That the average age of the scholars does not exceed in class II., nine years; in class III., ten years and three months; in class IV., eleven years and six months; in class V., thirteen years; and in class VI., fourteen years. But the ages of any scholars whom the teacher may present for examination as proficient to the full extent of the course of free instruction will be omitted in calculating the average age of class VI.

Any school complying with the above conditions will have the maximum number of marks awarded to it, viz.:—

- 3 marks for each scholar under 7 years of age in class I.
- 5 marks for each scholar over 7 years of age in class I., and for each in class II.
- 7 marks for each other scholar.
- 1 mark for each girl above 7 years of age where needlework is taught.

Marks will be withdrawn for individual scholars and for classes failing to comply with any of the above conditions, and the result payment made to the teachers will be in the same ratio to the maximum as the number of marks actually awarded is to that which might have been obtained.

6a. In making payments for results during 1873, and until an examination shall have been held in 1874, the inspector's percentage of passes obtained at examination in the year 1872 will be taken as the basis of payment unless a higher percentage be obtained during 1873.

6b. In the case of new schools established during the year 1873, and examined for results for the first time during that year, an allowance not exceeding 10 per cent. will be made upon the marks gained if the school is properly classified and the results have been affected by the excessive age of the scholars.

6c. In new schools established on or after the 1st day of January 1874, result payments will be based upon an inspector's percentage of 60 until the school shall have been examined for results; but the payments upon that percentage will cease from the last day of the month in which the examination takes place.

6d. Teachers employed in new schools established during the year 1873, but which have not been examined for results, may (unless they prefer to await the result of an examination) be paid upon a percentage of 60 until the school shall have been examined in 1874; provided that the decision of those teachers who are willing to accept that payment be communicated to the Secretary within a reasonable time, and prior to the schools being examined for results. The payment will cease from the last day of the month in which the examination takes place.

IV.—FEES FOR EXTRA SUBJECTS.

1. Fees payable by parents for subjects not included in the First Schedule to the Act, herein called extra subjects, will be at a uniform rate for each subject, and not exceeding one shilling per week.

NOTE.—The amount of the fee for each subject will be determined by the Minister as occasion may arise.

2. One-fourth of the fees will be deducted, the teacher who gives the instruction retaining the other three-fourths; the amount deducted will be distributed amongst the teachers in the extra subjects on the principle of payments by results.

3. Instruction in extra subjects must not be given so as to interrupt the course of instruction in accordance with Rule I.

4. During each year an examination will be held of children receiving instruction in extra subjects. Upon the results of this examination will depend the appropriation of the amount deducted from the fees in accordance with Regulation IV. (2). According to the degree of proficiency exhibited by the scholars, the whole of the amount so deducted will be returned to the teacher giving the instruction, or one-half only will be returned, and the other half withheld, or the whole of it will be withheld. The fund arising from the sums so withheld will, at the end of each year, be distributed amongst the teachers of the several subjects, in proportion to the amounts payable to them on the results of their own work.

5. If from any cause for which the teacher is not responsible an examination is not held in any year, the teacher shall receive back the amount deducted from his own fees, but shall not be entitled to participate in the fund resulting from the forfeited fees of others.

V.—EXAMINATION AND CLASSIFICATION OF TEACHERS.

1. Certificates of qualification will be granted upon examination, and will be divided into—

- (1.) First-class certificates of competency for head teachers of schools in which one or more assistants are employed.
- (2.) Second-class certificates of competency for assistants and head teachers of schools in which no assistants are employed.
- (3.) First-class certificates in honours.
- (4.) Second-class certificates in honours.

FOR A FIRST-CLASS CERTIFICATE OF COMPETENCY THE CANDIDATE WILL BE REQUIRED—

To read fluently, and with proper expression and emphasis, both prose and poetry.

To write from dictation, with correct spelling and punctuation, from an ordinary book or newspaper, and to compose a short essay on some given subject from, or reproduce the substance of, some lesson in the reading books used in State schools.

To pass an examination in—

Morell's Grammar and Analysis.

Descriptive geography of the four continents, Australasia, and Victoria, the products, governments, and manners of the various nations, and the mathematical and physical geography of Sullivan's "Geography Generalized," or equivalent.

The simple and compound rules of arithmetic, practice, proportion, interest, principles of mental arithmetic, vulgar and decimal fractions, elements of book-keeping. Females to mental arithmetic only, inclusive.

The art of teaching, that is to say—

To set fair copy head-lines, in large and small hands.

To draw up a time-table.

To compose the notes of a lesson.

To answer questions in the methods of instruction and the organization of schools; to understand class drill;* and to give a collective lesson.

Needlework.—Females to be able to cut out and do any kind of plain needlework.

FOR A SECOND-CLASS CERTIFICATE OF COMPETENCY THE CANDIDATE WILL BE REQUIRED—

To read fluently, and with proper emphasis.

To write from memory neatly, with correct grammar, spelling, and punctuation, the substance of a short narrative read aloud.

To parse an easy sentence in prose.

To pass an examination in—

The elements of mathematical and physical geography, and the principal features on the maps of the World, Europe, Australasia, and Victoria.

The simple and compound rules, practice, proportion, principles of mental arithmetic, interest, and vulgar and decimal fractions. Females to mental arithmetic only, inclusive.

The art of teaching, that is to say—To give a satisfactory lesson to a class in reading, writing, arithmetic, grammar, or geography; to understand class drill;* and to keep a class in order, attention, and activity.

Needlework.—Females to be able to cut out and do any kind of plain needlework.

FOR A SECOND-CLASS CERTIFICATE IN HONOURS THE CANDIDATES WILL BE REQUIRED—

If Males—To have passed at any one examination at the Melbourne University in—

1. English and Logic, Part I.
2. Junior Latin.
3. Geometry and Trigonometry.
4. Also in any one of the following subjects:—
Junior Greek.
Algebra.
Chemistry, Mineralogy, and Botany.
Ancient History.

If Females—To have passed as above in—

1. English and Logic, Part I; and also in three other subjects, which may be either any of those named above, or—
(1.) French,
(2.) German,
(3.) History,
as in the Matriculation Examination; or in Music or Drawing, as in the programme of examination for certificates of competency in those subjects.

* Knowledge of class drill is held to comprise: *Ability of a Teacher*.—1. When standing apart from his class (i.e. where he cannot touch the scholars), by word of command alone, without explanations, to move it from the desks into the body of the school-room and place it in a gallery, if there be one, or, if not, replace it in the desks. 2. To carry his class (by word of command) through a set of extension exercises. Also to be fully acquainted with and to put a class through the parts of military squad drill named below, and described in the "Field Book, 1867," on the pages specified:—"Attention," p. 7 (the position of the soldier). This exact position need not be minutely insisted upon. "To the right face," p. 14. "To the left face," p. 15. "Right about face," p. 15. "Front," p. 16. "Halt," p. 22. "Mark time—quick," p. 27. "Quick march," p. 28. "Right close,"—"Left close," p. 29. "Dress," p. 32. "Right wheel—in file," p. 41. "Left wheel—in file," p. 41.

FOR A FIRST-CLASS CERTIFICATE IN HONOURS THE CANDIDATES WILL BE REQUIRED—

If Males—To have obtained Second Class Honours, and to have passed as above in—

1. English and Logic, Part 2.
2. Senior Latin.
3. Algebra.
4. And one other subject, which may be any of the subjects, except Junior Greek, above named for males, which has not been already taken up, or one of the following :—
 - Senior Greek.
 - Analytical Geometry and Differential Calculus.
 - Natural Philosophy.
 - Comparative Anatomy and Zoology.
 - Geology.
 - History of the British Empire.
 - Mixed Mathematics.
 - Political Economy.

If Females—To have obtained Second Class Honours, and to have passed in—

1. English and Logic, Part 2 ; and—
2. { In three other subjects of those named above for males, or for females, other than English and Logic,
3. { Part 1, two of which have not been previously taken up.
4. }

Application for permission to attend the University Examination, at the reduced fee, must be made to the Secretary, on or before 15th September and 22nd January in each year, on a form which will be supplied on application at the Education Office.

2. All teachers who hold certificates under the Act No. CXLIX. will, on being employed under the *Education Act 1872*, receive, without examination, certificates of classification equal to those held by them under the Act No. CXLIX.

3. Examinations for certificates of competency will be held periodically at Melbourne, and such other places as the Minister may appoint, when all male candidates of eighteen years of age and female candidates of seventeen years who present themselves for examination, and who produce satisfactory certificates of moral character and health, may be examined in the literary subjects required.

4. Candidates must bear their own travelling expenses ; and all candidates who are not actually employed as teachers, workmistresses, or pupil-teachers, will be required to pay a fee of ten shillings previous to examination.

5. No teacher will be allowed to attend an examination for honours who shall not have previously obtained a first-class certificate of competency, or who shall have had an unfavorable report recorded against him at any time during the two preceding years.

PUPIL-TEACHERS.

6. Pupil-teachers will not be appointed under the age of 14 years if males and 13 if females ; they must be of good constitution, and free from any physical defect likely to impair their efficiency as teachers.

7. Pupil-teachers will be divided into four classes, the requirements for which will be as follows :—

FOR THE FOURTH OR LOWEST CLASS.*

Reading.—To read fluently the Irish National Board's Third Book of Lessons, or some book equivalent to it.

Writing and Composition.—To write out neatly in small-hand, with correct spelling, any passage dictated from the Third Book, or its equivalent.

Grammar.—To point out the parts of speech in a simple sentence.

Geography.—To have a knowledge of the elements of geography and the outlines of the map of the world.

Arithmetic.—To write from dictation sums in the first four rules of arithmetic, simple and compound, and work them correctly, and to know the tables of weights and measures.

Needlework, for Girls.—To sew neatly and to knit.

FOR THE THIRD CLASS.

Reading.—To read the Irish National Board's Fourth Book of Lessons, or some book equivalent to it, with fluency and proper emphasis, and to be acquainted with the subjects contained in the Third Book (or equivalent), except stories, fables, and poetry.

Writing and Composition.—To write from dictation, neatly and in a small-hand, with correct spelling and fair punctuation, any passage from the Fourth Book of Lessons, or its equivalent.

Grammar.—To know the first part and first two chapters of the second part of Morell's Grammar, or their equivalent.

Geography.—To know the geography of Australasia.

Arithmetic.—To know simple proportion and practice, with the elements of mental arithmetic.

Art of Teaching.—(1.) Ability to give a class a reading lesson, and to examine on the meaning of what has been read.
(2.) Ability to drill a class in marching and exercises, and to conduct it through the movements necessary for preserving order.

Needlework.—Girls to instruct the younger ones in sewing and knitting.

FOR THE SECOND CLASS.

Reading.—To read with fluency and proper emphasis ; to know the subjects of the Irish National Board's Fourth Book of Lessons, or its equivalent.

Writing.—To write from memory, neatly and in small-hand, with correct grammar, spelling, and punctuation, the substance of a narrative read aloud.

Grammar.—To know the first two parts of Morell's Grammar, or their equivalent, and the elements of parsing.

Geography.—To know the geography of Europe, and the first four chapters of Sullivan's "Geography Generalized," or equivalent.

Arithmetic.—To work sums and answer questions up to vulgar and decimal fractions and mental arithmetic inclusive.

Art of Teaching.—To teach a class the rudiments of grammar and arithmetic, and to keep the class in attention, order, and activity.

Needlework.—Girls to exhibit increased skill in needlework.

* Scholars who have passed the examination for the fifth class in Regulation I., will be qualified for employment as fourth-class pupil-teachers without undergoing this examination.

FOR THE FIRST CLASS.

Reading.—To read with ease and expression either prose or poetry, and to know the subjects of the Fifth Book of Lessons, or its equivalent.

Writing and Composition.—To write from memory, neatly and in small-hand, with correct grammar, spelling, and punctuation, the substance of an easy essay previously read.

Grammar.—To be able to parse, and answer questions from any part of Morell's Grammar, or its equivalent.

Geography.—To know the geography of the world, and the mathematical and physical geography of Sullivan's "Geography Generalized," or its equivalent.

Arithmetic.—To work sums and answer questions up to vulgar and decimal fractions, interest, and mental arithmetic inclusive, and to know the elements of book-keeping.

Art of Teaching.—Ability to give a gallery lesson.

Needlework.—Girls to exhibit some skill in fancy work, and to do plain work well.

The salaries attached to these classes will be :—

8. Salaries will not be paid to pupil-teachers until they shall have passed the examination for the fourth or lowest class. If they pass at the first examination to which they are summoned they will be paid from the date of appointment; if they fail, no payment will be made for any period anterior to the date at which they may subsequently pass.

9. A general examination of pupil-teachers will be held at the commencement of every year, both orally and by means of papers, and all pupil-teachers who have been appointed not less than six months will be required to attend thereat under pain of forfeiting their salaries. At this examination they will be classed for the year.

10. Every pupil-teacher will be expected to advance at least one class at each annual examination, and those who undergo two such examinations without promotion will be liable to dismissal.

11. Head teachers will be required to give to their pupil-teachers, either personally or by competent assistants, instruction outside of the four hours mentioned in the Act, as follows :—

In a school having but one pupil-teacher, five hours per week. In a school having more than one pupil-teacher, at least six hours per week; and the time for such instruction must in all cases appear on the time-table.

Pupil-teachers cannot, at their first examination, be placed in a higher class than the lowest, but at the annual examination they will be allowed to advance more than one class.

12. Pupil-teachers will not be reckoned as scholars in any examination under Regulation III. for payment by way of results.

13. Pupil-teachers will be liable to dismissal without notice, for idleness, disobedience, or immoral conduct.

14. A bonus of £6 will be paid to the head teacher for every pupil-teacher who shall pass the annual examination for promotion, and if no pupil-teacher in a school fails to pass, the head teacher will receive a sum of £6 in addition to the above bonuses.

MUSIC AND DRAWING.

15. Certificates will be granted to teachers of music and drawing upon examination. Teachers will be classified in two divisions, viz., Second Division of Competency, First Division of Competency, according to the details set forth in the following programmes :—

PROGRAMME OF EXAMINATION OF TEACHERS OF MUSIC.

Second Division.

Reading.—To read at sight an exercise consisting of diatonic intervals, easy modulations only being admitted.

Writing.—To write a short and simple passage composed of minims sung in the presence of the candidate.

Theory of Music.—Notation in the various clefs, time, accent, the major and minor scales, the common chord and its inversions.

Teaching.—To be able to teach a class properly.

First Division.

Reading.—To read at sight any ordinary passage from an oratorio or opera.

Writing.—To write in correct time an ordinary passage from an oratorio or opera.

Theory of Music.—To know the theory and practice of harmony and thorough bass, and to understand the formation of the voice.

Teaching.—To be able to teach a class properly. To produce a class taught by the candidate for a period of twelve months which shall pass a satisfactory examination.

PROGRAMME OF EXAMINATION OF TEACHERS OF DRAWING.

Second Division.

Drawing from the Flat.—Pure outline of geometric form. Outline of human head.

Drawing from the Round, with light and shade.—A geometric solid. A group of common things, such as vases, lamps, &c.

Perspective.—An elementary knowledge.

Practical Geometry.—Polygons, circle, ellipse.

Teaching.—To be able to teach a class properly.

First Division.

Drawing from the Flat.—Pure outline of geometric form. Outline of human head. To copy a given lithograph.

Drawing from the Round, with light and shade.—Plaster model of head, hand, or foot of human figure.

Perspective.—First six lessons of Burchet's Perspective, or its equivalent.

Practical Geometry.—Gleig's series, or its equivalent.

Teaching.—To be able to teach a class properly, and to produce a class taught by the candidate for twelve months which can pass a satisfactory examination.

VI.—NIGHT SCHOOLS.

1. No night school will be recognised until the sanction of the Minister shall have been given to its establishment.
2. All night schools must be held in State School buildings, but will not necessarily be conducted by the teacher of the day school held in the same buildings.
3. No payment will be made on account of any night school in which less than six hours a week are devoted to instruction in accordance with Regulation I.
4. The payments made to teachers of night schools will be by way of results.
5. The maximum amount per annum by way of results will be according to the following scale :—

and so on, the amount obtainable increasing £10 for each increase of 10 in the average attendance.

6. In estimating the average attendance upon which the maximum amount depends, no account will be taken of any scholar whose age is below 12 years, or who shall be in attendance at or employed as a teacher or pupil-teacher in any school receiving aid under the Act.
7. In determining the proportion of the maximum amount that any teacher of a night school is entitled to receive, the age of the scholars will not be taken into account as it is in day schools, but no scholar may be twice presented for examination in the same class, and the classification of each scholar at his first examination must be approved by the inspector.
8. All other regulations relative to payments by way of results will, so far as they are applicable, affect night schools.
9. Extra subjects may be taught in night schools, subject to the same regulations as apply to day schools.

VII.—HALF-TIME SCHOOLS.

1. In thinly populated districts a teacher may be employed to give instruction in schools at two separate places.
2. Instruction in the subjects of the free course will be given in each school for $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours on every school day, unless otherwise specially sanctioned by the Minister.
3. The mode of payment will be as follows :—
 - (A.) The fixed salary will be calculated on the average attendance of the two schools combined.
 - (B.) The maximum payment for results for each of the two schools will be equal to one-fourth of the fixed salary.

VIII.—THE STANDARD OF EDUCATION.

The Standard of Education shall be determined by an examination in which the candidate shall be required—

- To read fluently from any ordinary book or newspaper a passage not containing any unusual scientific or technical words.
- To write neatly in small hand from dictation, with correct spelling, a short passage containing no words of exceptional difficulty.
- And to state and work sums in arithmetic up to the four compound rules and reduction inclusive.

IX.—EXHIBITIONS.

In January of each year the Minister of Public Instruction will award exhibitions to eight scholars of State Schools and schools carried on under the 10th section of the Education Act in Victoria, in the manner and on the conditions hereinafter mentioned :—

1. Until January 1875 exhibitors will be selected, as directed in the rules of the late Board of Education bearing date September 1871. In January 1875, and subsequently, they will be selected upon competitive examinations held during the last three months of the preceding year. No competitor will be permitted to attend the examination who will have completed his fifteenth year before the 1st day of January succeeding the examination; and no competitor will be selected unless he shall at the same date have been during the two years immediately preceding, continuously on the rolls of, and in attendance at, any of the State Schools of Victoria, or in schools receiving aid under Clause X. of the Education Act 1872.

2. The subjects for examination will be :—

3. Each exhibition will be of the annual value of £35, tenable for six years upon the following conditions :—

- (A.) That the exhibitioner shall, at the commencement of the session following the award of the exhibition, become a student in one of the following public grammar schools :—Church of England Grammar School, St. Patrick's College, Scotch College, or Wesley College, all of Melbourne, or in the Church of England Grammar School of Geelong; or in one of such other schools as may hereafter be approved of by the Minister.
- (B.) The Minister after consulting the exhibitioner's parents or guardians, will determine which school he shall attend, and during the time he continues to attend such school he shall obtain at the end of each year a report from the authorities of the same. If no report

or an unfavorable report be received, or if at any time the Minister be satisfied that the conduct of any exhibitor has been disorderly or immoral, the exhibition and all the advantages connected therewith shall thereupon cease and determine.

(C.) That at the end of the second year of the exhibitor's tenure he shall pass the matriculation examination at the University of Melbourne.

(D.) That during the fourth, fifth, and sixth years of his tenure he shall be a student of the Melbourne University enrolled as attending lectures, and that he shall in each year have kept as many courses of lectures as would have entitled him to admission to examination under 3rd clause, chapter XI., of the Regulations of the University.

(E.) That at the end of the fourth year of his tenure he shall pass the 1st B.A. degree examination at the University.

4. Payments will be made quarterly. All payments, however, by the Minister will be conditional on moneys being placed at his disposal by the Legislature.

X.—BOARDS OF ADVICE.

School districts.

1. School districts shall mean the districts which shall from time to time be constituted and defined by Order in Council.

Number of Board of Advice for each district.

2. The Board of Advice for each school district shall consist of such number of members, not less than five nor more than seven, as shall be specified in the order constituting the same.

Governor in Council to appoint returning officer for each district.

3. For every school district the Governor in Council may from time to time, as occasion may require, appoint a person to be returning officer, and may remove every such person, and every such appointment and removal shall be notified in the *Government Gazette*. The returning officer may appoint a deputy or deputies to assist him, or to act in his room, at any such election, and any such deputy may do all or any of the acts or things which the returning officer is hereby authorized or required to do.

Time of holding elections.

4. "Ratepayer" shall mean any person whose name is on the roll of ratepaying electors for the whole or any part of a school district in force for the time being, and residing within such school district, or any person who shall prove to the satisfaction of the returning officer that he is a ratepayer residing within such school district although his name is not on such roll of ratepaying electors.

5. The first general election of a Board of Advice in any school district shall be held on some convenient day within one calendar month after the appointment of the returning officer for the district; and a special election shall be held within one calendar month after any vacancy in the Board by the death, resignation, or removal of any member thereof shall be notified, as hereinafter provided, to the returning officer, and every such election shall take place on a day to be fixed by the returning officer, and notified by him by advertisement as hereinafter mentioned.

NOMINATION OF CANDIDATES.

Notice of election.

6. Fourteen clear days before any election of members of any Board of Advice the returning officer shall give notice of such election by advertisement, inserted in some newspaper circulating in the school district, and by such notice shall require all candidates at such election to be nominated at some place to be named in such advertisement in manner hereinafter mentioned between the hours of Ten o'clock in the forenoon and Four o'clock in the afternoon on some day before the election hereinafter called the day of nomination, being not less than four days from the time of giving such notice; and any person desirous of nominating a candidate shall, before four o'clock in the afternoon of the day next preceding the nomination day, cause to be delivered to the returning officer or his deputy a nomination paper in the form in the First Schedule or to the like effect, stating therein the christian name and surname of such candidate, together with the other particulars required in and by the said Schedule; and such nomination paper shall be signed by not less than ten persons duly qualified to vote at such election, and also by the person named therein as a candidate.

Mode of nomination.

First Schedule.

Returning officer to post names of candidates.

7. The returning officer shall, between the hours of nine o'clock in the forenoon and four o'clock in the afternoon upon each day between the giving as hereinbefore provided of notice of any election and the day of nomination named therein, keep posted outside the place so as aforesaid named for the delivery of nomination papers the names of all persons who shall previously have become candidates for such election.

Declaration of election where uncontested.

8. If at the expiration of the time limited as hereinbefore provided for the nomination of candidates the number of persons who shall have become candidates as aforesaid shall not exceed the number of members then to be elected, the returning officer shall then declare such candidates to be duly elected, and shall notify under his hand the same to the Minister of Public Instruction.

POLLING, ETC.

Polling places.

9. Any State school building in a school district and any other place which may be fixed by the returning officer shall be a polling place for such district.

Contested election.

10. If at the expiration of the time aforesaid the number of candidates shall exceed the number of members to be elected, then the returning officer shall forthwith cause ballot-papers to be printed with the christian names and surnames of all the candidates in full in the form in the Second Schedule, and shall also forthwith give notice by advertisement inserted in some newspaper circulating in the school district, stating the names of the persons so nominated, and that a poll will be taken for the election of such members on the day appointed for holding the election under the provisions hereof, and named in such notice, at the polling place or polling places, and which shall be specified in such notice, and such poll shall take place accordingly, and shall commence at Nine o'clock in the forenoon and close at Four o'clock in the afternoon.

Candidate may retire within certain time.

11. If after a poll shall stand appointed as aforesaid at any election, any person who shall duly have become a candidate for such election and five of the persons having signed the paper nominating him as aforesaid shall be desirous that he retire from such candidature, such candidate and the persons aforesaid, not later than four clear days before the day of polling, may sign and deliver to the returning officer between the hours of Nine o'clock in the forenoon and Four o'clock in the afternoon a notice in the form in the Third Schedule, stating that such candidate so retires, and may publish in some newspaper circulating in the school district a copy of such notice; and the returning officer, on such receipt of such notice and on sufficient proof of such publication as aforesaid, if the number of candidates shall by such retirement be reduced to the number of members to be elected at such election, shall on the day appointed for the election

Third Schedule.

declare the remaining candidates to be duly elected, and if the said number shall not be so reduced shall omit the name of such person so retiring from the ballot-papers to be used at the said election, and if such ballot-papers shall have been already printed shall erase such name therefrom, and such person shall not be capable of being elected at such election.

12. At every election the returning officer, if it shall appear to him expedient for taking the poll, may cause school buildings to be divided and allotted into compartments as to the returning officer shall seem most convenient, and the returning officer may also appoint poll clerks to attend at such election. Polling booths, &c.

13. The returning officer or his deputy or some one to be appointed by writing under the hand of the returning officer or his deputy shall preside at each polling booth for taking the poll. Returning officer or deputy, &c., to preside at each booth.

14. Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint in writing one scrutineer to be present in each polling booth; and such scrutineers and the returning officer or deputy or other person and the poll clerks, and any voters not exceeding six in number actually engaged in voting and to be named if necessary by such returning officer or deputy or other person so appointed, shall alone be permitted at any one time to enter or remain in the polling booth. Scrutineers. What persons may be present in booth.

15. The returning officer or his deputy or other person so appointed shall provide pencils in every polling booth for the use of the voters, and also a locked box to be called the ballot box with a cleft or opening therein capable of receiving the ballot papers; and such box shall be opened and exhibited to the poll clerks and scrutineers before the polling begins, and shall stand on a table opposite the returning officer or deputy or other person so appointed, who shall keep the key of such box. Ballot box, &c.

16. The returning officer or his deputy or other person so appointed shall deliver to every voter who shall require the same a ballot paper in the form aforesaid and initialed by the returning officer; and every such voter shall without leaving the booth strike out from any or all of such papers the names of every candidate for whom he shall not desire to vote; and in case any voter shall be unable to read or write, the returning officer or his deputy or other person so appointed if required shall, in view of such one of the scrutineers as such voter may desire, strike out the names of such candidates as such voter may designate, and after such names shall be so struck out the ballot paper shall be forthwith deposited in the said box. Mode of voting.

17. Before delivering any ballot paper to a voter the returning officer or his deputy or other person so appointed shall write upon the back of each such ballot paper, as near as practicable to the lower edge thereof, the number corresponding to the number set opposite to the voter's name in the roll of ratepaying electors, if any, and, if necessary, some mark to designate such roll, and shall thereupon upon a copy of such roll check off such voter's name as having voted, and if such voter's name is not on the roll of ratepaying electors he shall enter such name in a book to be kept for that purpose, and shall number such name and the ballot paper with a corresponding number. Ballot papers to be numbered.

18. If any voter shall suffer to remain upon any of his ballot papers a greater number of names not struck out than the number of members to be elected, the vote given on and by such paper shall be void and of no effect. Votes for excessive number of candidates to be void.

19. At all elections in any school district the returning officer, or his deputy or other person so appointed as aforesaid may if he see fit, or if required so to do by any candidate or scrutineer, shall put to any person tendering his vote— Questions to be put to voter at elections.

As being on a roll of ratepaying electors, the questions following :—

- (i.) Are you the person whose name appears as (A.B.) in the roll of ratepaying electors now in force for [naming the municipal division] ?
- (ii.) Are you still a ratepayer residing in the school district ?
- (iii.) Have you already voted at the present election ?

And no person who shall refuse to answer any of such questions, or who shall not answer the first and second of such questions absolutely in the affirmative and the third of such questions absolutely in the negative, shall be permitted to vote.

Where the person claiming to vote as a ratepayer and whose name is not on the roll of ratepaying electors the questions following :—

- (i.) What is your name ?
- (ii.) Are you the owner or occupier of property within this school district for which you are liable to be rated ?
- (iii.) What is the property in respect of which you claim to vote, and the name and situation thereof, and to what corporation are you liable to pay rates in respect thereof ?
- (iv.) Have you already voted at the present election ?

And no person who shall refuse to answer any of such questions or whose answers to the same shall not show his right to give such vote shall receive a ballot paper or be permitted to vote.

20. Immediately upon the close of the poll the returning officer or his deputy, or such other person so appointed at each polling booth, shall proceed, in the presence and subject to the inspection of the poll clerks and of so many of the scrutineers of the candidates as shall please to be present, to ascertain the number of votes for each candidate; and such returning officer and deputy or other person respectively shall abstain from inspecting the number written as aforesaid on any ballot paper, and take care that the same is not seen by any person before being sealed up as herein provided; and the deputy or such other person shall immediately forward the ballot papers sealed up, together with a list made up under the inspection of the said scrutineers of the total number of votes for each candidate, to the returning officer; and the returning officer shall in like manner seal up the ballot papers deposited in the booth in which he shall have presided; and such returning officer shall as soon as conveniently may be on or after the day of the poll give public notice of the number of votes given to each candidate, and shall declare the candidates not exceeding the number of vacancies to be filled up who have received at all the polling booths taken together the greatest number of votes to be duly elected as members of the Board of Advice, and shall forthwith publish in some newspaper generally circulating in the school district the names of the members so elected; and if two or more candidates shall have received an equal number of votes the returning officer shall in each case have the casting vote. Declaration of poll and casting vote.

21. The returning officer shall forthwith after the declaration of the poll cause all the sealed parcels of ballot papers to be sealed up in a packet endorsed with a description of the contents thereof signed by the returning officer, and shall safely and secretly keep the same for six months; and shall after the expiration of such period of six months cause such ballot papers to be destroyed in presence of three of the members of the Board of Advice so elected. Ballot papers.

Adjournment of
election by

22. When the proceedings at any election of any Board of Advice shall be interrupted or obstructed at any polling place by any riot or open violence, the returning officer or deputy, or person appointed as aforesaid as the case may be, shall not finally close the poll, but shall adjourn the taking of the poll at the polling place at which such interruption or obstruction shall have happened to the day following; and, if necessary, such returning officer, deputy, or person aforesaid shall further adjourn such poll until such interruption or obstruction shall have ceased, when such returning officer, deputy, or person aforesaid shall again proceed with the taking of the poll at the place at which the same may have been so interrupted or obstructed.

Adjournment

23. If from any cause, not being such as in the last preceding section mentioned, after a poll shall stand appointed for any election no such election shall take place on the day appointed for the same, the election shall stand adjourned until the same day of the following week, and the returning officer shall give not less than three days' previous notice thereof by advertisement or by placards affixed in public places in the school district.

24. If at any election no members, or a less number of members than is necessary to fill the vacancies to fill which such election was held shall be elected, the returning officer shall notify the same forthwith to the Minister of Public Instruction.

25. When any vacancy takes place in any Board of Advice by the death, resignation, or removal of any member, the Minister of Public Instruction shall cause the same to be notified to the returning officer, who shall thereupon proceed to fill up the vacancy by an election in the manner hereinbefore provided.

XI.—DRILL AND GYMNASTICS.

1. Special allowances by way of results will be made to teachers for imparting instruction in military drill, subject to the following conditions:—

- That the teacher giving the instruction hold a certificate of qualification from the department, or have passed an examination in Parts I. and II., Field Exercise, before a military board.*
- That not less than one hour's instruction per week be given.
- That the pupils exhibit a fair amount of proficiency.

2. The maximum allowance that can be obtained will be as follows:—

No allowance will be made for a less average attendance than fifteen, and in estimating this attendance only boys in classes above the second will be counted.

3. The proportion of the maximum allowance to be paid to any school will be determined upon examination by an inspector or other officer appointed for the purpose.

4. When gymnastics are also taught by a qualified instructor an additional allowance at half the above rates will be paid, subject to the same regulations as apply to military drill.

XII.—TERMS UPON WHICH SCHOOL BUILDINGS MAY BE USED UNDER THE DIRECTION OF BOARDS OF ADVICE.

- A guarantee must be given to repair any damage to the premises or school property.
- If it is necessary to displace the furniture or school apparatus, this must be done at the expense and risk of the persons using the room, and everything must be replaced at least one hour before the commencement of the next school meeting.
- Five shillings must be paid for the use of each room when used for general purposes to the head teacher, who will retain 2s. 6d. towards the expense of cleaning the room, and pay the balance to the Board of Advice towards a fund for prizes for the scholars.
- When school rooms are used for educational not being State School purposes, the fee may, with the consent of the Board of Advice, be reduced to one shilling, to be paid to the teacher.
- No charge will be made for the use of school rooms for meetings of Boards of Advice.

NOTE.—The Minister will not approve of any use of State School buildings—

- If such use be objected to in writing by one-fifth of the parents of children attending such school.
- If it is likely to interfere with the work of the school.
- If the school property is likely to be injured.

* A certificate of qualification for imparting instruction in drill will be given to every teacher who shall satisfy an examiner authorized by the Minister that he is able to put his class through so much drill as is comprised in the following words of command:—"Fall in;" "Number off;" "Prove;" "Stand at ease;" "Attention;" "Eyes right;" "Eyes front;" "Dress;" "Dress—with intervals;" "Right close;" "Left close;" "Right;" "Left;" "Right about;" "Left about;" "Half right;" "Half left;"—"Turn;" "Quick march;" "Halt;" "Mark time;" "Forward;" "Front;" "Right;" "Left;" "Right about;" "Left about;"—"Wheel."

WHEREAS by The Shires Statute amendment Act 1870 (34 Vict. No. 387, § 2) it is amongst other things enacted, that if at any time in any road district, whether single or united, and whether the area be one hundred square miles or less, the total net annual value of the rateable property, as appearing by the general rate then last made, shall have amounted to or exceeded Twelve thousand pounds, it shall be lawful for the Governor, if it shall seem fit, to constitute such district a shire within the meaning of *The Shires Statute*, by such name as in and by the Order in Council may be assigned to the same; and the subdivisions, if any, of the district subsisting at the time of such constitution shall be and be called ridings of the shire: And whereas the total net annual value of the rateable property in the road district hereinafter mentioned, as appearing by the general rate now last made in such district, has exceeded Twelve thousand pounds, and it seems fit to constitute the same to be a shire: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order constitute the Road District hereinafter mentioned to be a Shire within the meaning of *The Shires Statute* by the name hereby assigned to the same, that is to say:—

The Yea Road District, which was created by a Proclamation bearing date the first day of February 1869, was reduced and again enlarged by two several Orders bearing date respectively the twenty-eighth day of February 1871, and the twenty-eighth day of October 1872, shall be and is hereby constituted and shall be named the

SHIRE OF YEA.

And the Honorable Duncan Gillies, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Railways and Roads for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

IN pursuance of the 64th section of *The Scab Act 1870*, the Administrator of the Government in Council has revoked all previous Orders relating to the Quarantine Districts herein-after mentioned, and has ordered that the portions of Victoria whereof the boundaries are hereinafter described shall be Quarantine Districts within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:—

Pursuant to Order of 28 April 1873.

Bear and Ford's estate, being the Tabilk pre-emptive right, and allotments 31, 33, 33, 44, and 51, all in the parish of Tabilk; also Mr. Thomas Blaney's farm "Lissenelly," being allotments 2A and B, section F, and allotments 3A and B, section F, parish of Avenel; also Mr. George Morrison's farm "Craigielee," being allotment 7, section D, 8B section D, 4A section E, 3A section E, 8 section E, parish of Avenel; also Mr. James Morrison's farm "Woodburn," being allotment 12, section E, parish of Avenel, shall form no part of the Seymour Quarantine District.

SEYMOUR CLEAN DISTRICT.—Commencing at the junction of the Goulburn and Broken rivers; thence up the said Goulburn River to the northern boundary of the Ovens Crossing-place run; thence by the said northern boundary to the Iranjip Creek; thence up the said creek to the Killeen run; thence by the northern and eastern boundaries of that run to Euroa run; thence by the western and a portion of the northern boundaries of that run to Cropper's run; thence by the western, northern, and eastern boundaries of that run to the said Euroa run; thence by the eastern boundary of that run to the Honeyeukle South run; thence by a portion of the western, the northern, and eastern boundaries of that run to Faithful's Creek run; thence by the eastern boundary of that run and the eastern and northern boundaries of Springs run to Lima run; thence by the western and northern boundaries of that run to the Broken River, and thence down that river to the point of commencement.

WIMMERA CLEAN DISTRICT.—Commencing on the Murray River at the point where the western boundary of the colony of Victoria abuts thereon; thence up that river to the eastern boundary of the Murrabit run; thence by the said boundary of that run and the eastern and southern boundaries of the Reedy Lake run to the Quambatook East run; thence by the northern boundary of that run and by the northern, western, and southern boundaries of the Quambatook West run to the Avoca River; thence up that river to the Spring Bank West run; thence by the northern boundary of that run and by the western boundaries of that run and of the Coonover A and Yawong Springs runs, also by the southern boundary of the last-named run to the Avoca Forest West run; thence by the western and southern boundaries of that run to the Avoca River aforesaid; thence by the Avoca River to the bridge on the main road from Avoca to St. Arnaud; thence north-westerly by that road to the north-west corner of allotment 1 section B5, parish of Avoca; thence south by the west boundary of that parish to the south-west corner of allotment 4 section B5 of the said parish; thence westerly by the northern boundary of Avoca common and a one-chain road to the eastern boundary of the Mountain Creek run; thence southerly by the eastern boundaries of that run, Decameron and Glenlogie runs, to the northern boundary of the township of Glenlogie; thence west and south by the boundary of that township to the Avoca and Ararat road; thence westerly by that road to the Amphitheatre Creek; thence southerly by that creek and the western boundary of the Amphitheatre run to the northern boundary of the county of Ripon; thence westerly by the northern boundary of the said county to the eastern boundary of the Allanvale run; thence southerly and westerly by the boundaries of that run to the north-eastern boundary of the Ararat Goldfields common; thence northerly and westerly by the boundaries of that common to the Armstrong Goldfields common; thence north and west by the boundaries of that common to the north-eastern boundary of the Lexington run; thence north-westerly by the boundaries of that and the La Rose Mokepille runs to the southern boundary of the Pleasant Creek Goldfields common; thence west by the south boundary of that common to a two-chain road from Glenorchy

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria passed in the session held in the twenty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign (No. 265), called *The Police Offences Statute 1865*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may by proclamation in the *Government Gazette* extend all or any of the provisions contained in Part I. of the said Statute to any city, town, district, or place in Victoria, and may define the limits of any such city, town, district, or place, and vary and alter such limits, and may revoke any such proclamation; and upon any such proclamation the provisions so proclaimed shall extend to and be in force in such city, town, district, or place: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, do, with the advice of the Executive Council, by this my Proclamation, extend all the provisions contained in Part I. of the said Statute to

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees shall be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby add to the Commons hereinafter mentioned, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

CARLYLE FARMERS' COMMON.—The Carlyle Farmers' Common is hereby increased by adding thereto the unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries described as follow, viz.:—Commencing at the north-west angle of allotment 1 A of section L in the parish of Norong; thence by a road bearing south to the Black Dog Creek; thence up that creek to the south-east angle of allotment 3 of section S; thence by a road bearing north to the north-east angle of allotment 7 A of section L; and thence by a road bearing west to the point of commencement. Area, about 2,887 acres.—(73.K.2083.)

MOYHU AGRICULTURAL AREA FARMERS' COMMON.—The Moyhu Agricultural Area Farmers' Common, proclaimed on the 12th day of August 1867, diminished on the 14th day of October 1867, and increased on the 11th day of November 1868, the 2nd day of December 1870, and the 16th day of September 1872, is hereby further increased by adding thereto the unappropriated Crown lands within the boundaries described as follow, viz.:—Commencing at the point where the boundary between the Oxley plains and Whorouly runs joins the Hurdle Creek run; thence by that boundary northerly about four miles to the existing common; thence by that common bearing west about one mile and south about three miles and three-quarters to the Hurdle Creek; thence up that creek to the Hurdle Creek run aforesaid; and thence by that run easterly about two miles and a-half to the point of commencement. COMMON RE-PROCLAIMED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR GEORGE FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time under regulations to be made for such purpose to proclaim any Crown lands as a common and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees shall be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees shall be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons; and it is also enacted that the Governor may from time to time increase, and after one month's notice in the *Government Gazette* diminish, alter, or abolish any common heretofore or hereafter to be proclaimed or re-proclaimed, and may from time to time re-proclaim the whole or any part of any such common for any of the purposes and subject to the provisions of this Act; and nothing herein contained shall prevent the sale by auction or the leasing or licensing under this Act of any land comprised in any common heretofore or hereinafter to be proclaimed; and it is also directed that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons shall be published and all objections thereto shall be heard in the manner set forth in the one hundredth section of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby re-proclaim the Common hereinafter mentioned, under the designation prefixed thereto, in accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Act, that is to say:—

TOOBORAC FARMERS' COMMON, which was described in a Proclamation bearing date the fourth day of March 1861, and added to by another Proclamation bearing date the twenty-ninth day of October 1866, the boundaries of which common are hereinafter described, viz.:—Commencing at the west angle of allotment 52, parish of Tooborac; thence by the Heathcote United Town and Goldfield Common, being a line bearing south-westerly about sixty chains to the Major's line, the Major's line bearing south-westerly to a point bearing north about nine chains from the north-east angle of allotment 3, a direct line to the said angle of that allotment, the north boundaries of allotments 3 and 1, and the western boundary of allotment 1 to the Wild-duck Creek; thence by lines bearing respectively S. 30° E. two hundred and eighty-six chains and N. 60° E. about twelve chains to Mitchell's log fence; thence by that fence south-easterly to the Gap Creek; thence down that creek to the west boundary of allotment 6 of section 7; and thence by the western boundary of surveyed lands on the Melvor Creek bearing north-westerly to the point of commencement. Area available for commonage, about 8000 acres.—(73.M.24015.)

NOTICE TO MASTERS OF VESSELS:—CAUTION AS
TO FIRES ON BOARD SHIP.

THE following rules, extracted from the Port and Harbor Regulations, are re-published with the view to direct the special attention of Masters and others thereto:—

20. *Boiling pitch, tar, &c.*—No pitch, tar, resin, oil, or other such like combustible matter shall be heated by fire on board any vessel or boat without the permission in writing of the harbor-master. [But this rule is not to be understood to prevent the burning of any lamp or candle for giving light on board, or the lighting of any fire for the purpose of cooking or working the machinery of any vessel, although such permission may not have been given.]

21. *Fires.—Smoking ships.*—Between the hours of ten o'clock p.m. (10 p.m.) and four (4 a.m.) no fires, except the furnaces of steamers, shall be lit, or unenclosed lights allowed to burn on board any vessel in any part of a port or harbor where vessels lie for the purpose of loading and discharging cargo or effecting repairs; nor shall any vessel be fumigated or smoked, except the vessel be moored a sufficient distance from other vessels, and permission in writing be obtained from the harbor-master. All fires and lights allowed must be properly enclosed.

24. *Lights out.*—After work has ceased for the day on board of any vessel, and before closing the hatches, an officer shall go into the hold and into the between decks and satisfy himself that—(1.) There are no signs of fire. (2.) That all lights have been put out except those authorized in clause 21, and an entry thereof shall be made in the log book.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by *The Public Health Act 1872*, it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor may from time to time, by any order notified by proclamation in the *Gazette*, appoint certain stations within or near any harbor or place within New Zealand, for the performance of quarantine, under the Third part of the said Act, where all vessels liable to quarantine, and the crews, passengers, and persons on board thereof, shall perform the same: And whereas it is expedient that the place hereinafter particularly mentioned should be appointed a Quarantine Station for the purposes in the said Act mentioned:

Now therefore I, Sir James Fergusson, Baronet, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me for that purpose, do by this Proclamation order and appoint that the place named and described in the Schedule hereto, shall be and the same is hereby appointed to be a station for the performance of quarantine, under the Third Part of *The Public Health Act 1872*.

SCHEDULE.

Quarantine Ground, Bluff Harbor.

BYE-LAW No. XLII.

THE Board of Land and Works, by virtue of the powers and authorities vested in it by *The Public Works Statute 1865*, doth make the Bye-law following, that is to say:—

Goods which have not been carried, and are not intended to be carried on the Railway of the Board, may be landed or shipped at the expense of the owners or consignees thereof at the Echuca Wharf, upon payment of a charge of One shilling per ton, which charge shall be in consideration of the use of the wharf and cranes merely, and shall not entitle the person paying the same to the assistance of the officers and servants of the Board in landing or in shipping such goods. In estimating such charge, the Board or its officers may assume the weight of such goods to be as the same appears from the manifest or transire of any steamer or vessel from or on board which such goods are landed or shipped.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF THE EGERTON AND KAMAROOKA STATE FOREST.

WHEREAS by section 108 of *The Land Act 1869* it is among other things enacted that the Board of Land and Works shall have power from time to time to make and alter or rescind rules and regulations for the care, protection, and management of all public parks and reserves: Now therefore the said Board of Land and Works, in exercise of the power conferred as aforesaid, doth hereby make the rules and regulations following, to be observed and enforced in respect of the Egerton and Kamarooka State Forest:—

1. The Egerton and Kamarooka State Forest shall be under the management of the Bendigo State Forest Board.
2. Such board shall have power to authorise the cutting and taking away of timber from the state forest, subject to such conditions and terms of payment as such board may from time to time impose; and no person shall be allowed to cut or take away any timber from the state forest unless subject to such conditions and terms.
3. Such board shall have power to let the right of depasturing stock in the state forest, subject to such conditions and terms of payment as such board may with the sanction of the Board of Land Works from time to time impose.
4. The money received by the Bendigo State Forest Board from the sale of timber in the Egerton and Kamarooka State Forest, and from the agistment of stock therein, shall be expended by such board in making payments for services rendered by such person or persons as may be employed by the local forest board, with the sanction of the Board of Land and Works, on the management or improvement of the state forest, and in making payments for such works as in the opinion of the board would tend to improve the state forest and secure the permanency of the supply of timber therefrom.
5. Once in every year all accounts of receipts and disbursements by the Bendigo State Forest Board in connection with the Egerton and Kamarooka State Forest shall be audited, and a copy thereof then forwarded to the Board of Land and Works.

REGULATIONS FOR THE OPEN COMPETITION OF 1874.

N.B.—The Regulations are liable to be altered in future years.

1. On Tuesday, 24th March 1874, and following days, an examination of candidates will be held in London. At this examination not fewer than _____ candidates will be selected, if so many shall be found duly qualified. Of these, _____ will be selected for the Presidency of Bengal [_____ for the Upper Provinces, and _____ for the Lower Provinces], _____ for that of Madras, and for that of Bombay.*—Notice will hereafter be given of the days and place of examination.

2. Any person desirous of competing at this examination must produce to the Civil Service Commissioners, before the 1st of February 1874, evidence showing:—

(a) That he is a natural-born subject of Her Majesty.

(b) That his age, on the 1st March 1874, will be above seventeen years and under twenty-one years. [N.B.—In the case of Natives of India this must be certified by the Government of India, or of the Presidency or Province in which the Candidate may have resided.]

(c) That he has no disease, constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity unfitting him, or likely to unfit him, for the Civil Service of India. †

(d) That he is of good moral character.

He must also pay such fee as the Secretary of State for India may prescribe.†

may prescribe.

8. Should evidence upon the above points be *prima facie* satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the candidate will, upon payment of the prescribed fee, be admitted to the examination. The Commissioners may, however, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of the certificate of qualification hereinafter referred to, institute such further inquiries as they may deem necessary; and if the result of such inquiries, in the case of any candidate, be such as to lead them to them in any respect, in which respect, he will be ineligible for admission to the Civil service of India, and, if already selected, will be removed from the position of a probationer.

4. The examination will take place only in the following branches of knowledge:—

Candidates are at liberty to name, before February 1, 1874, any or all of these branches of knowledge. No subjects are obligatory.

5. The merit of the persons examined will be estimated by marks; and the number set opposite to each branch in the preceding regulation denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it.

6. No candidate will be allowed any marks in respect of any subject of examination, unless he shall be considered to possess a competent knowledge of that subject.

7. The examination will be conducted by means of printed questions and written answers, and by *viva voce* examination, as may be deemed necessary.

8. The marks obtained by each candidate, in respect of each of the subjects in which he shall have been examined, will be added up, and the names of the candidates who shall have obtained a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the remaining candidates will be set forth in order of merit, and such candidates shall be deemed to be selected candidates for the Civil Service of India, provided they appear to be in other respects duly qualified. Should any of the selected candidates become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled up or not. In the former case, the candidate next in order of merit and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a selected candidate. A selected candidate declining to accept the appointment which may be offered to him will be disqualified for any subsequent competition.

9. Selected candidates, before proceeding to India, will be on probation for two years, during which time they will be examined periodically, with a view of testing their progress in the following subjects:—*

In these examinations, as in the open competition, the merit of the candidates examined will be estimated by marks, and the number set opposite to each subject denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it at any one examination. The examination will be conducted by means of printed questions and written answers, and by *viva voce* examination, as may be deemed necessary. The last of these examinations will be held at the close of the second year of probation, and will be called the "Final Examination," at which it will be decided whether a selected candidate is qualified for the Civil Service of India.

10. Any candidate who, at any of the periodical examinations shall appear to have wilfully neglected his studies, or to be physically incapacitated for pursuing the prescribed course of training, will be liable to have his name removed from the list of selected candidates.

11. The selected candidates who, at the final examination, shall be found to have the competent knowledge of the subjects specified in Regulation 9, and who shall have satisfied the Civil Service Commissioners of their eligibility in respect of age, health, and character, shall be certified by the said Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Civil Service of India, provided they shall comply with the regulations in force, at the time, for that service.

12. Applications from persons desirous to be admitted as candidates are to be addressed to the Secretary to the Civil Service Commissioners, London, S.W., from whom the proper form for the purpose may be obtained.

The Civil Service Commissioners are authorized by the Secretary of State for India in Council to make the following announcements:—

(1.) Selected candidates will be permitted to choose according to the order in which they stand in the list resulting from the open competition as long as a choice remains, the Presidency (and in Bengal the division of the Presidency) to which they shall be appointed, but this choice will, be subject to a different arrangement, should the Secretary of State or Government of India deem it necessary.

(2) No candidate will be permitted to proceed to India before he shall have passed the final examination, and received a certificate of qualification from the Civil Service Commissioners, or after he shall have attained the age of twenty-four years.

(3.) The seniority in the Civil Service of India of the selected candidates shall be determined according to the order in which they stand on the list resulting from the final examination.

(4.) It is the intention of the Secretary of State to allow the sum of £50 after each of the three first half-years of probation, and £150 after the last half-year to each selected candidate who shall have passed the required examinations to the satisfaction of the Commissioners, and shall have complied with such rules as may be laid down for the guidance of selected candidates.

(5) All selected candidates will be required, after having passed the second periodical examination, to attend at the India Office for the purpose of entering into an agreement binding themselves, amongst other things, to refund in certain cases the amount of their allowance in the event of their failing to proceed to India. For a candidate under age a surety will be required.

(6.) After passing the final examination, each candidate will be required to attend again at the India Office, with the view of entering into covenants and giving a bond for £1000, jointly with two sureties, for the due fulfilment of the same. The stamps payable on these documents amount to £1 10s.

† The fee for this examination will be £5, payable by means of a special stamp according to instructions which will be communicated to candidates.

EVIDENCE OF AGE TO BE REQUIRED FROM CANDIDATES FOR THE CIVIL SERVICE OF INDIA.

I.—Every candidate born in England or Wales should produce a certificate from the Registrar-General of Births, Marriages, and Deaths, or from one of his provincial officers. This certificate may be obtained at Somerset House, or from the Superintendent Registrar of the district in which the birth took place.

II.—A candidate who is a native of India must have his age certified by the Government of India, or of the Presidency or Province in which he may have resided.

III. Every other candidate *not producing the certificate mentioned in clause I.* must prove his age by statutory declaration, and should also, if possible, produce a record of birth or baptism from some official register; under which term may be included the parochial registers of baptisms, the non-parochial registers of baptisms and births deposited at Somerset House under Acts of Parliament, the register kept at the India Office of persons born in India, &c., &c. This regulation applies—

1. To all candidates not born in England or Wales.
2. To candidates who, though born in England or Wales, cannot produce the Registrar-General's certificate.

The Civil Service Commissioners reserve to themselves the right of deciding in each case upon the sufficiency of the evidence produced, but they subjoin the following general rules for the guidance of candidates:—

- (a) The declaration should specify precisely the date and place of birth, and should, if possible, be made by the father or mother of the candidate. If made by any other person, it should state the circumstances which enable the declarant to speak to the fact. If an entry in a Bible or other family record be referred to, the Bible or other record must be produced at the time of making the declaration, and must be mentioned in the declaration as having been so produced.
- (b) If the candidate was born in England or Wales, the declaration must contain a statement that after due inquiry no entry has been found in the books of the Registrar-General; or a separate declaration must be made to that effect.
- (c) If no extract from any register is produced, the declaration must contain a statement that, after due inquiry, no such record is believed to exist; or a separate declaration must be made to that effect.
- (d) Statutory declarations must be exactly in the form prescribed by the Act of 5 and 6 William IV., c. 62. A printed form, if required, will be supplied on application to the Civil Service Commissioners.

N.B.—Clergymen, as such, are not qualified to take declarations.

(1) If a General Register Office certificate cannot be obtained, the instructions printed under "Evidence of Age" will show what evidence should be supplied. If evidence is already in the hands of the Commissioners, strike out "A certificate of my birth," and insert "Evidence is already in the possession of the Commissioners."

(2) The terms indicated by the marks of quotation must appear in the certificate, which must be given after personal examination, and bear date not earlier than 1st January 1874.

(3) Two testimonials must be sent, bearing date not earlier than 1st January 1874. One of them should be given by an intimate acquaintance (not a relative) of not less than three or four years' standing; the other, if the candidate has recently left school, should be given by his late schoolmaster, or, if he has had employment of any kind, by his late employer. INGLEWOOD HOSPITAL (INCORPORATED).

At a meeting of the subscribers to the Inglewood Hospital (Incorporated), held on the 21st November 1873, the Rules and Regulations of the said Corporation, numbered 1, 2, 6, 7, 9, 13, 31, 35, 38, and 41, were rescinded, and the following were substituted and confirmed, viz.:-

MANAGEMENT.

1. The institution is for the purpose of affording surgical and medical aid to destitute persons in cases of accident and disease.

2. The affairs of the institute shall be directed by a committee, consisting of ten subscribers; and the said committee shall elect at their first meeting after the annual meeting, from amongst themselves, their president, vice-president, and treasurer.

MEETINGS AND QUORUM.

6. The board shall meet for general business on the first Monday in each month, and adjourn such or any meeting as may be deemed expedient. Special meetings of the board shall be called by the president or secretary, or upon the requisition of any three members of the said board to the president or vice-president, such requisitions to state the object of such meeting, and no other business but that stated shall be entertained. At any meeting four members to form a quorum, the president or vice-president to be chairman, and in their absence the meeting shall elect a chairman. The chairman to have, in addition to his own vote as member of the committee, a second or casting vote.

ACCOUNTS.

7. All accounts for payment shall be presented by the finance committee (after having been initialed by at least one of their number), passed by the board, and duly initialed by the chairman then present. And the said finance committee shall at each monthly meeting of the board present a report of the financial position of the hospital.

CONTRIBUTORS.

9. That every contributor of Twenty pounds in one sum shall be a life-governor, with the privilege of voting at all meetings of subscribers and of nominating four patients in each year. Other contributors shall be entitled to nominate one patient for every pound of their contribution within the year of such contribution, provided that the funds and accommodation of the hospital will admit of the reception and treatment of such patients. The board of management shall also have the power to add to the list of life-governors such persons as by their eminent services may have added within one year the sum of Twenty pounds to the funds of the hospital, and members of the board are not to be limited in the number of patients they may recommend. Any person subscribing Ten shillings shall have the privilege of recommending one out-door patient, but shall not be entitled to vote.

VOTER'S QUALIFICATION.

13. That no person shall hereafter be qualified to vote at any meeting of subscribers to this hospital unless he shall have been a subscriber of at least One pound sterling to this hospital within the period of twelve months previous to the time of such meeting being held, nor unless the said subscription, being the first, has been paid at least fourteen days before the meeting at which such subscriber wishes to vote, and all subscribers who shall allow more than a year to elapse since the payment of their last subscription, for the purposes of this clause their next subscription shall be considered as a first subscription.

HOSPITAL SERVANTS.

31. Nurses and hospital servants, such as may be required shall live in the hospital, and shall not leave it at any time without permission of the hospital surgeon, or, in his absence, the senior officer on duty. They shall obey the orders of the said officers, be regular in their attendance, and conform generally to such rules as may be made by the board.

35. Outdoor patients shall attend at the hospital between Eleven and Twelve o'clock a.m. on Tuesdays and Fridays in each week, unless coming from a distance of over ten miles from the hospital, when the dispenser, in the absence of the surgeon, may provide such patients with accommodation for the night of arrival. All outdoor patients must observe the rules so far as may be practicable.

38. Visitors will be admitted on Tuesdays, Fridays, and Sundays, between the hours of Two and Five o'clock in the afternoon, except persons from a distance, who may be admitted at any time by permission of the hospital surgeon or any member of committee, but no visitor will be allowed to remain more than one hour, except ministers of religion, who may visit the patients at any time, but all visitors must retire when requested by the nurses.

41. Any officer, nurse, servant, or other person in any way connected with the hospital, who shall receive, directly or indirectly, any fee, reward, or gratuity, unless by permission of the board of management, shall be immediately disqualified and dismissed, and shall not be permitted in future to hold any office or appointment belonging to this hospital.

And the following additional rule was confirmed, viz.:-

42. No person shall be considered eligible for election at the annual meeting unless he or some one duly authorized on his behalf shall have given notice in writing to the secretary, seven days before the date of such meeting, of his intention to stand for election as member of committee. Provided always that in the event of sufficient nominations not being sent in to supply all the offices it shall be competent for the annual meeting to dispense with the above condition and to fill up any vacancies which may exist after the formal nominations have been disposed of.
