WHEREAS by *The Electoral Act 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that where any accidental or unavoidable impediment, misfeasance, or omission shall have happened in the preparation or transmission or printing of any general roll or supplementary roll or ordinary electoral roll or roll of rate-paying electors, the Governor in Council may take all such measures as may be necessary for removing such impediment or rectifying such misfeasance or omission, or may declare any such roll valid as to and notwithstanding such impediment, misfeasance, or omission; and every such Order in Council shall state specifically the nature of the impediment, misfeasance, or omission, and shall be forthwith published in the *Government Gazette*: And whereas the Electoral Registrars for the Digby Division of the Electoral District of Normanby and the same division of the Western Province, and for the Flemington Division of the Electoral District of West Bourke and the same division of the Central Province, did accidentally omit certain names from their Ordinary General Rolls for the respective divisions of the said districts and provinces: And whereas the names so omitted have severally and respectively been incorporated and printed in the Ordinary General Rolls for each of the said divisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power in him vested by the 68th section of the Act No. 279, doth hereby declare valid the Rolls containing the names so omitted as aforesaid.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir George Ferguson Bowen, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Justices of the Peace Statute 1865* it is amongst other things enacted, that Courts of General Sessions of the Peace shall be holden in and for such places or districts within Victoria as the Governor in Council appoints; and the Governor in Council may from time to time define and appoint the limits and boundaries of the places or districts within which all such courts shall have jurisdiction respectively, and the places and times at which such courts shall be holden: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby appoint the next Court of General Sessions of the Peace at the undermentioned place for the district of Kilmore to be holden on the day hereinafter mentioned, for and in lieu of the day appointed by a former Proclamation for the holding of the said court, that is to say:—

ALFRED GRAVING DOCK.

THE accompanying Rules for the management of the Alfred Graving Dock, which have been approved by His Excellency the Governor in Council, are published for general information.

RULES FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF ALFRED GRAVING DOCK.

1. The gates of the dock-yard will be opened at 6 a.m. and closed at 6 p.m. daily, Sundays excepted. Should any extension of hours be required in consequence of continuous repairs to a vessel in dock, such may be obtained on application to the Superintendent.

2. All vessels belonging to H.M. Navy, the Victorian or any colonial Government, or commissioned ship of foreign nations, will be admitted into dock without payment of the usual dock rates, but only of such sum as is necessary for the reimbursement of actual expenditure of stores, wages, and materials. Any such vessel or steamer employed under contract with the Victorian Government to carry mails shall, with the special sanction of the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, have precedence over vessels on the dock register.

3. All other vessels will be required to pay dues according to the Schedule (A) hereunto annexed; the said dues including and covering the cost of pumping, shoring, wedges, and blocking, and the use of the shores, wedges, and blocks, as hereinafter provided; the cost of all labor on shore connected with the docking or undocking of a vessel, and the use of the warp required for warping a vessel in or out of dock.

4. Blocks, shores, and stages will be provided by the Government as follows:—

Blocks.—One set for the length given at time of registering.

Horizontal shores.—One for every fifteen feet of the length given at the time of registering.

Stage poles and planks.—A sufficient number to make one tier of stages round the vessel, to consist of two planks in breadth and a gangway stage of two poles and five planks.

All necessary stage planks and cross bearers, with the use of the yard during the carrying on of repairs, will be allowed the persons effecting the repairs without any additional charge; but any damage occurring to the same, or to the dock, caisson, the keel blocks, or other material, shall be made good at the expense of the applicant for registration of the ship; and all such materials lent by the Government to the person using the dock shall be returned in the same order as received, and stacked to the satisfaction of the Superintendent of the dock or his foreman previous to the vessel being undocked, and no such materials will be allowed to be taken from the dock premises for effecting repairs after the vessel is undocked.

5. The owner, master, or agent of any vessel desiring the use of the dock, should make his application to be registered on the form to be obtained from the Superintendent; such application to be lodged between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. on week days, which will be duly registered in order of receipt. Should any dispute arise as to priority for registration, such shall be submitted to and decided by the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, or other Minister acting in his behalf, whose decision shall be final. With the application for registration, and before registration is made, the sum of Ten pounds (£10) shall be paid to the Superintendent as "entrance fee," which sum shall be allowed as part payment of dock dues, provided that such dock dues shall be settled within seven days after delivery of the account for the same, otherwise such fee will be forfeited, and dock dues must be paid in full. No vessel will be taken into dock until all claims due in respect to such vessel, or other vessels belonging to the same owners, or having the same master or agent, shall have been paid.

6. Should any vessel not be in position and ready to be warped into dock at such time as may be specified in writing by the Superintendent and addressed to the person making the application, the turn of such vessel will lapse, and fresh application for registration must be made, the entrance fee being also forfeited, and the applicant will be responsible for any expenses already incurred in connection with the docking, unless the inability to dock shall have occurred through stress of weather, which the Chief Harbor-master shall determine, when such vessel may retain her position upon the register without forfeiture of the entrance fee.

7. The Government will not hold itself responsible for any delay or accident occurring to any vessel during docking or undocking, nor while in dock, the vessel being during the whole of such time entirely at the risk of the owners, except such may occur by the fault or negligence of any of its servants. No repairs are undertaken by the Government.

8. So soon as any warp shall have been made fast to any vessel by instruction of the Superintendent of the dock, such vessel having been placed in position by and at the expense of the master or owners in line with the fairway and within twenty feet of the entrance of the dock, and until relieved by the withdrawal of such warp, such vessel shall be held to be under the control of the Superintendent, whose directions must be implicitly and promptly attended to.

9. There shall be a sufficient number of officers and crew on board every vessel, while entering or going out of dock, for the purpose of warping the vessel in and out, and assist on board and attend to such orders as may be given by the Superintendent.

10. Changes of turns between vessels will be allowed with the written sanction of the Chief Harbor-master, but not otherwise.

11. No vessel will be admitted into dock with any gunpowder or combustibles on board.

12. No vessel shall be broken up nor scuttled while in dock, except with the written permission of the Chief Harbor-master; and should any master, owner, or agent commence to break up or to scuttle any vessel in dock without such permission, the Chief Harbor-master may at once remove such vessel out of

the dock, and the master, owner, or agent shall be responsible, in addition to the dock dues, for any expenses which may be incurred by such Chief Harbor-master in so doing.

13. Should wind and weather or tide not permit of a vessel being undocked when the repairs are completed, she may be allowed to remain in dock, without any additional charge, subject to the decision of the Chief Harbor-master, but no demand for demurrage can be entertained.

14. Sailing ships are to be charged dues on their registered tonnage, and steamships on their gross tonnage: tonnage in both cases to be British measurement.

15. The officers, crew, and workmen of any vessel while in dock shall strictly comply with the printed rules and regulations of the establishment, copies of which will always be posted at the dock gates and in the dock office. Any workman committing any breach of the regulations will be liable to be prohibited from entering the dock premises; and before the water is let in to take any vessel out of dock, the dock must be cleaned up to the satisfaction of the Superintendent, by or at the expense of the person who registered the vessel.

LAND REGULATIONS.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act* 1869 power is given to the Governor in Council from time to time to make, alter, and rescind rules, regulations, and orders for the various purposes therein specified: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby rescind, to the extent hereinafter mentioned, the rules, regulations, and orders hereinafter expressed to be rescinded, and doth make the Regulations following:—

PRELIMINARY.

1. Chapter II., clauses 1 to 17 of Chapter IV., and clause 1 of Chapter X., of the Regulations of the 26th day of May 1873, are hereby rescinded, except as to all matters done, rights acquired, and obligations incurred thereunder.

2. The following Regulations are to come into force on the 30th day of March 1874.

SELECTION.

3. Every applicant, under the 19th and 49th sections of *The Land Act* 1869, for a license to occupy any allotment shall, between the hours of Nine a.m. and Four p.m., dig a trench at least two feet long, six inches wide, and four inches deep, in the direction of the containing sides, and place a conspicuous post, or a cairn of stones, at each corner of such allotment, or, if the allotment consist of more than one parcel of land, at each corner of each parcel, and shall affix to each of such posts or cairns a notice in writing setting forth that he applies for such allotment, the approximate area thereof, and his name and address.

4. After defining the boundaries as aforesaid, the applicant shall, within four days, post or deliver his application to the District Surveyor.

5. Every application under the 19th section shall be in the form and shall be accompanied by the declaration on oath prescribed in Schedule I. of the Regulations of 26th May 1873.

6. Every application under the 49th section shall be in the form prescribed in Schedule XVII. of the Regulations of 26th May 1873.

7. Every application under the 19th and 49th sections, if not posted, shall be delivered to the District Surveyor between the hours of Eleven a.m. and Two p.m. on any week day except Saturday, and upon Saturday between the hours of Eleven a.m. and Twelve noon.

8. Where the allotment in respect of which such application has been approved is the whole of a surveyed allotment, the successful applicant shall pay half the fees specified for open plain country.

9. Every license issued shall bear date as of the first day of the month next succeeding the date of the notification of the approval by the Minister, and shall be subject to the conditions specified in Schedule III. of the Regulations of the 26th May 1873.

TOWNSHIP OF TATARA—County of Rodney, parish of Toolamba West: Commencing at a point east one chain of the south-east angle of George Robbins' licensed block, No. 6517, 19th section; bounded thence by a road bearing north to the road bounding Hogan's land on the south; thence by that road east to the road forming the east boundary of the said parish; thence by that road south to the road bounding Stewart's and Robbins' land on the south; and thence by that road west to the commencing point. The bearings refer to the true meridian.—(73.M.23852.)

In 1865, the increase was 19,752, or about the same as in the year under review. In the remaining four years of the decennial the increase was less than in 1873, viz.:—1872, in which it was 18,232; 1867, in which it was 14,589; 1866, in which it was 15,887; and 1863, in which it was 17,201. The births registered during the year numbered 28,010, and the deaths 11,414. The gain by excess of the former was thus 16,596. The arrivals numbered 29,450, and the departures 26,294. The increase from this source was therefore 3165. The number of marriages performed during the year was 4915. The figures of births and deaths, and consequently those of the population, also those of marriages, will probably be slightly altered when the returns of the deputy registrars and clergy are finally checked.

5. That any person or persons who may place stock in the market for sale, and neglect for twenty-four hours to supply such stock with sufficient food, shall for every such offence forfeit and pay for every head of such stock any sum not exceeding five pounds.

6. That all cattle intended for sale must be at the yards by Seven o'clock on the morning of sale from the 1st day of November to the 30th day of April, and by Half-past Seven a.m. from the 1st day of May to the 31st day of October, or the owners, agents, or salesmen forfeit the privilege of drawing for priority of sale; and all cattle arriving after the hours above stated will be sold in the order of their arrival, after the others have been disposed of; and in no case shall the number of cattle in one pen exceed twelve head. The first sale to commence at Eight o'clock a.m.

7. That the market inspector shall give out the order of sales at the hour named for the arrival of stock in the cattle market.

8. Any agent or salesman withdrawing his or their cattle from sale will not be allowed to sell on that day until the other sales are completed.
