IN pursuance of the provisions of *The Shires Statute* (33 Vict. No. 358, § 334, I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, acting upon the complaint of the Council of the Borough of Daylesford, and pursuant to an Order in Council bearing even date herewith, do hereby proclaim the portion of the Malmesbury to Ballarat road, extending from the east boundary of the Shire of Glenlyon to the Post Office at Daylesford, to be a Common-toll road of the said Borough of Daylesford and the Shire of Glenlyon.

QUARANTINE DISTRICTS UNDER "THE SCAB ACT 1870."

IN pursuance of the 64th section of *The Scab Act 1870*, the Administrator of the Government in Council has revoked all previous Orders relating to the Quarantine Districts hereinafter mentioned, and has ordered that the portions of Victoria whereof the boundaries are hereinafter described shall be Quarantine Districts within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:

Pursuant to Order of 28 April 1873.

BRENNANAH QUARANTINE DISTRICT (including Brennanah and Coyocora Springs runs).—Commencing at the north-west angle of Catto's run; thence by that run south-easterly to the northern boundary of the Glenalbyn run; thence by that run westerly and southerly to the Kingower run; thence by the northern and western boundaries of that run to the Bealiba run; thence by the northern and western boundaries of that run, westerly and southerly to the eastern boundary of the Avoca Forest East run; thence by that run north-westerly to the southern boundary of the Spring Hill run; thence by that run north-easterly and northerly to the southern boundary of Torpichen run; thence by that run north-easterly to Powlett's Plains run; and thence by that run, and the Salisbury Plains run, south-easterly to the point of commencement.

POWLETT'S PLAINS QUARANTINE DISTRICT (including Powlett's Plains run).—Commencing at a point on the River Loddon, being the north-east angle of allotment 62, parish of Kinypaniel; thence southerly along the said River Loddon to the northernmost angle of the Salisbury Plains run; thence westerly and southerly to the northernmost boundary of the Brennanah run; thence westerly along the said boundary to the eastern boundary of the Torpichen run; thence northerly along the said boundary to the southernmost boundary of the Edgar Plains run; and thence easterly to the point of commencement.

PROTECTORATE QUARANTINE DISTRICT (including Protectorate run).—Commencing at the north-east angle of Waranga run; on the west by that run; on the south by Postlethwaite run; on the east by the Goulburn River for about seven miles; thence by a line running north-west to the commencing point.

SANDHURST DISTRICT, FREEHOLD LANDS IN THE Dunn's Farm, parish of Clunes, section C, allotments 20, 27, and 28.

Hop's Farm, parish of Clunes section C, allotments 29, 30, 31, and 32.

CLEAN DISTRICTS UNDER "THE SCAB ACT 1870."

Napier Bluff Light.

NOTICE is hereby given that on and after the 5th May next a Fixed Bright Light, of the fourth order dioptric, will be exhibited from sunset to sunrise from a tower erected on the eastern side of Napier Bluff, Hawke's Bay, one half mile southward of the extreme point, in lat. 39° 28' 50" S., and long. 176° 56' 25" E., as measured on the Admiralty chart.

The tower stands 20 feet high, and is painted white; the focal flame of the light is 160 feet above the ordinary sea level, and, allowing 15 feet for the height of the observer's eye, the light will be visible in clear weather at a distance of 18 nautical miles between the bearings of N.N.W. and S. by W., where at the latter bearing it is cut off by the Bluff.

In addition to the above, the Light on Spit will be shown as heretofore, which is fixed white and red. It stands 27 feet above the sea level on the western extremity of the Eastern Spit, at the entrance to the Iron Pot, and may be seen in clear weather at a distance of 8 miles on the following bearings:—

Red from S.E. by S. to S. by E. ½ E.; white from S. by E. ½ E. to S.W. by S. ½ S.; red from S.W. by S. ½ S. to S.W. ½ S.

The Pania Rock is in the centre of the south-western red light, and is seen a quarter of a mile on each side of rock.

The buoy on the rocky patch known as the Auckland Rock has been carried away, and will not again be replaced.

Vessels to the north and westward of Napier Bluff must take care not to mistake the white light on Spit for the one on Bluff.

All bearings are magnetic and from seaward.

REGULATIONS RELATIVE TO THE ISSUE OF LICENSES TO DEPASTURE PARK LANDS, RESERVES, OR OTHER CROWN LANDS NOT FORMING PART OF ANY RUN OR COMMON.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* power is given to the Governor in Council from time to time to make, alter, and rescind rules, regulations, and orders for the various purposes therein specified: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby rescind to the extent hereinafter mentioned the rules regulations and orders hereinafter expressed to be rescinded, and doth make the regulations following:—

These regulations are in lieu of the regulations as to licenses under section 47 of *The Land Act 1869*, made by the Governor in Council on the 4th May 1874, which are hereby rescinded, and are in lieu also of chapter vii., section 1, and schedule 9 of the regulations made by the same relate to the Governor on the 26th May 1873, so far as the same relate to the fees and conditions to which licenses granted to applicants under subdivision vii. of the 47th section of the said Act shall be subject, which are hereby rescinded, except as to all matters done, rights acquired, and obligations incurred thereunder prior to the commencement of these regulations which shall commence and come into force on the eighteenth day of May 1874, and shall be read and construed with the regulations under *The Land Act 1869* now in force.

Every license granted under subdivision vii. of section 47 of *The Land Act 1869* shall be subject to the conditions set forth in the schedule hereto, and to such special conditions and payment in advance of such fee as the Minister may determine, and shall be issued by an officer of the Department of Lands and Survey duly authorized in that behalf.

This license shall not be deemed to prevent the land comprised therein or any part or parts thereof from being sold, leased, or licensed under any of the provisions of parts i., ii., or iii. of *The Land Act 1869*, except subdivision vii. of the 47th section thereof, or proclaimed a common, or occupied by virtue of any miner's right or business license, or alienated or dealt with under the authority of *The Land Act 1869*, or any other Act now or hereafter to be in force, otherwise than for pastoral or depasturing purposes, or resumed by order of the Governor, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, for railways, roads, telegraph lines, dams, reservoirs, races, catch-water drains, pipe tracks, quarries, or other public purposes; and no licensee shall in any such case be entitled to compensation other than the return of such portion of the fee paid by him as the Minister may think fit.

(The Land Act 1869).

The land and buildings thereon to be held, until otherwise disposed of, for the use of the bishop, or, during the vacancy of the see, of the person for the time being administering the affairs of the diocese.

No approvals to be given or powers to be exercised without the advice of the council of the diocese.

PURPOSES TO WHICH PROCEEDS OF DISPOSITION ARE TO BE APPLIED.

Rents obtained from leases to be applied to payments of costs and expenses connected with execution of trusts, of all charges on the property, and costs of keeping premises insured and in substantial and ornamental repair, so far as such charges and costs shall not have otherwise been provided for.

Balance of rents to be paid from time to time to the bishop, or, during the vacancy of the see, to the person for the time being administering the affairs of the diocese, each such person to receive the balance of such rents for his own use. Premiums on leases or proceeds of sales to be invested with approval as aforesaid in Government debentures, or on mortgage of real estates in Victoria, or in the purchase of land with buildings thereon, or in the purchase of land and in the erection of buildings thereon. The income derivable from such investment to be applied in the same manner as rents derived from leases, the trustees having power to alter or vary investments, with approval as aforesaid, all substituted investments being subject to same trusts as those herein set forth. Persons dealing with trustees not to be bound to see to the application of moneys paid to the trustees by them.

The coal is to be of the very best quality for smithy purposes, and must be screened before delivery over a screen with bars half an inch apart, and afterwards through a screen with bars an inch apart, and that which has passed through the bars one inch apart is to be delivered, and is to be what is termed nutty smith's coal, free from lumps, dust, shale, sulphur, and other impurities.

2. The contractor is to deliver the coal screened ready for use, into the waggons on the railway or breakwater pier at Williamstown, at the option of the Government, or may deliver into the railway waggons at any station on the Victorian Railways. The coal will be weighed by the Government, and such weight and returns shall form the basis upon which the contractor's account will be made out.
