FURTHER PROROGUING THE PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable SIR WILLIAM FOSTER STAWELL, Knight, the Chief Justice of the Colony of Victoria, and Administrator of the Government of the said Colony, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Constitution Act* it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria and, subject to the limitation therein contained, such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he may think fit; and also from time to time to prorogue the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he shall deem it expedient: And whereas the said Council and Assembly, called "The Parliament of Victoria," now stand prorogued until Monday the first day of March next, and it is expedient to prorogue the same further: Now therefore I, the Administrator of the Government of Victoria, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, do by this my Proclamation further prorogue the said Parliament of Victoria from Monday the first day of March next ensuing to Tuesday the sixth day of April in the present year.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-second day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, and in the thirty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign.

MAGPIES TO BE DEEMED NATIVE-GAME.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir WILLIAM FOSTER STAWELL, Knight, the Chief Justice of the Colony of Victoria, and Administrator of the Government of the said Colony, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the thirty-first year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled *An Act to protect Game* (31 Vict. No. 311), it is amongst other things enacted, that for the purposes of the said Act the term "game" shall mean and include all birds and other animals mentioned in the first schedule to the said Act, and the terms "native game" shall mean and include all birds and other animals mentioned in the second schedule to the said Act; provided that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council at any time after the passing of the said Act by proclamation to name any other bird or animal which shall be included in

such first or second schedule respectively, and after the publication of any such proclamation in the *Government Gazette* and the expiration of the period mentioned in such proclamation for the time of its coming into operation, the birds or other animals so named shall be deemed and considered as being thenceforward included in such schedule; and it is also enacted that the period of the year during which the said Act shall be in operation as regards all or any of the birds and other animals mentioned in the second schedule shall be from and after the first day of August until the thirtieth day of November in each year, or such other period as the Governor in Council may by proclamation in the *Government Gazette* from time to time direct: Now therefore I, the Administrator of the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby name the "Magpie" as a bird which shall be included in the second schedule to the said Act annexed, upon the expiration of the period hereinafter mentioned for the coming into operation of this proclamation, and that the period of the year during which the said Act shall be in operation as regards the "Magpie" aforesaid, shall be from the first day of August to the twentieth day of December in every year, both days included: And with the advice aforesaid I do appoint that this my Proclamation shall come into operation upon the expiration of seven days from the publication thereof in the *Government Gazette*.

ENCOURAGEMENT OF THE PRODUCTION OF FLAX AND SILK.

THE Administrator of the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, has approved of the following Regulations for the expenditure of the vote of £1000, for the encouragement of the production of Flax and Silk, viz.:—

1. The vote (£1000) shall be made available in sums as under, viz.:—

(a) For the encouragement of the establishment of a flax mill	£350
(b) For the invention and manufacture of flax harvesting machinery	200
(c) For the encouragement of the cultivation of mulberry trees, and the production of silk	300
(d) To defray judges expenses in connexion with the trials of flax harvesting machines, and the inspection of mulberry plantations	150
	£1000

ESTABLISHMENT OF A FLAX MILL.

2. One hundred pounds (£100) out of the sum set apart for the encouragement of the establishment of a flax mill, will be paid to any person, or company who may produce evidence to the satisfaction of the Government that he or they have manufactured locally from one manufactory, and between the dates of the 1st July 1874, and the 30th June 1875, a quantity of not less than twenty tons of marketable fibre from flax grown within Victoria, and a sum of £5 per ton will be paid for every one ton manufactured in excess of twenty tons.

INVENTION OF FLAX HARVESTING MACHINERY.

3. The sum (£200) set apart for the invention and manufacture of flax harvesting machinery shall be awarded in premiums, on such conditions, in such amounts, as the Minister of Agriculture may hereafter direct; and provided:

- (a) That an equal sum be subscribed jointly by the Adelaide Chamber of Manufactures and the Royal Agricultural and Horticultural Society of South Australia with the concurrence of the South Australian Government, and that the same be offered in conjunction with the Department of Agriculture of the colony of Victoria.
- (b) That such joint premiums shall be open for competition in South Australia and Victoria.
- (c) That trials of the competing machines shall be held in either colony.

CULTIVATION OF MULBERRY TREES AND PRODUCTION OF SILK.

4. The sum (£300) set apart for the encouragement of the cultivation of mulberry trees and the production of silk shall be awarded in premiums, subject to conditions as under:—

6. Persons desirous of competing for the above-mentioned premiums must intimate their intention in writing to the Minister of Lands and Agriculture, specifying the premium or premiums for which it is their intention to compete.

7. Competitors shall afford the judges access at all reasonable times to their mulberry plantations and buildings used in the rearing of the worms, and shall furnish them with such information as they may require from time to time.

8. Persons will not be permitted to compete for two or more separate premiums with one and the same area of mulberry trees.

9. No prize will be awarded where it can not be shown to the satisfaction of the judges that operations are conducted with regard both to profit and the permanent establishment of the industry.

JUDGES' EXPENSES.

10. All reasonable expenses incurred by persons appointed by the Minister of Agriculture to act as judges of Flax-harvesting machinery in South Australia and Victoria, and to inspect and report on mulberry plantations, shall be made a charge on the vote.

BEETROOT SUGAR.

THE Administrator of the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, has approved of the following Regulations in connexion with the vote of £5000 for the encouragement of the manufacture of Sugar from Beetroot grown within Victoria, viz.:—

1. Any person or company desirous of competing for the above-mentioned vote shall intimate his or their intention in writing to the Minister of Agriculture.

2. Two clear days' notice in writing at least shall be given to the Minister of Agriculture of the intention to commence operations for the season in any competing factory.

3. An accurate record shall be kept in every such factory of—

- (a) The quantity of roots supplied.
- (b) The dates upon which the same were supplied.
- (c) The price paid per ton for the same.
- (d) The name and address of the person by whom the same were grown.
- (e) The quantity worked up.
- (f) The dates between which the same were worked up.
- (g) The purposes to which the same were applied; and a copy of such record shall be furnished to the Minister of Agriculture on every fourteenth day from the date upon which the first supply of the season's roots was made, and shall continue to be so furnished until the whole of the roots shall have been converted into sugar, or otherwise disposed of.

4. Any officer appointed by the Minister of Agriculture to inspect beet-root sugar factories shall have power to visit such factories at any time during the hours of work, to inspect any portion or portions thereof, and to remove, in sufficient quantity for the purposes of analysis, samples of beet-root, or any product obtained during the several stages of the process of manufacture.

5. The manager of any competing factory shall, when required in writing so to do, furnish to the Minister of Agriculture a return showing the number of persons employed in the factory under his supervision, the average quantity of marketable sugar obtained from one ton of beet-root, and such further information as may be required from time to time.

6. The sugar as it is manufactured, unless required for immediate sale, shall be deposited in a room on the premises, and the key of such room shall be kept by an officer of the Department of Agriculture, and no sugar removed from the factory shall be included in any claim made on the vote, unless the same shall be removed in the presence of an officer of the Department of Agriculture.

7. When it is desired to dispose of a part or of the whole of the manufactured sugar, or to remove a part or the whole of the same from the factory, notice in writing shall be given to the Minister of Agriculture, and such notice shall specify the hour at which it is desired to remove the sugar for sale or otherwise.

8. When sugar shall have been removed from a competing factory, it shall not be re-admitted to the factory on any condition whatsoever; nor shall sugar of any description, excepting that manufactured on the premises from beet-root, be allowed within the factory.

9. A sum of £500 will be paid to any person or company on production of a certificate from the inspecting officer that he or they have manufactured locally from one manufactory, between the dates of 1st July 1874 and 30th June 1875, and in accordance with these regulations, a quantity of not less than 50 tons of sugar from Beet-root grown within Victoria; and a sum of £10 per ton will be paid for every one ton manufactured in excess of 50 tons.

Pursuant to Orders of 23 December 1874.

BRENNANAH QUARANTINE DISTRICT (including Brennanah and Coyocora Springs runs).—Commencing at the north-west angle of Catto's run; thence by that run south-easterly to the northern boundary of the Glenalbyn run; thence by that run westerly and southerly to the Kingower run; thence by the northern and western boundaries of that run to the Bealiba run; thence by the northern and western boundaries of that run, westerly and southerly to the eastern boundary of the Avoca Forest East run; thence by that run north-westerly to the southern boundary of the Spring Hill run; thence by that run north-easterly and northerly to the southern boundary of Torpichen run; thence by that run north-easterly to Powlett's Plains run; and thence by that run, and the Salisbury Plains run, south-easterly to the point of commencement.

A slight improvement will be noticed this week in the number of deaths compared with the births. Of the total deaths 90, or 61·6 per cent., were of children not exceeding 3 years; 49, or 32·8 per cent., being under 1 year; and 42, or 28·7 per cent., being of the ages of 1 to 3 years. Thirty-four of these deaths occurred from diarrhoea and dysentery and about 20 from measles, the remainder being divided among the ordinary diseases peculiar to children.

In Kew two of the deaths occurred in the Lunatic Asylum, and seven of the South Melbourne and two of the Prahran deaths occurred in the Hospitals.

Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and may be forwarded (if by post, prepaid) addressed to the Honorable the Postmaster-General, with the words "Tender for the Conveyance of Mails" endorsed on the cover, or placed in the tender-box at the General Post Office.

Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender, and every tender will be taken to include the entire service as called for. The amount of the tender must be stated in words as well as figures.

Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

The money deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them on application, on the bond and contract being completed.

The money deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them on application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts, but not otherwise.

In the event of a portion of railway affecting any particular service being opened for traffic during period of contract, and it being decided that the mails shall be conveyed by rail, the place of departure for the mail coaches shall be altered in such way as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct; a rateable reduction shall be made in the amount paid for the service as then rendered by the contractors, such reduction

to be computed on the basis of the average mileage rate of the lump tender or the average mileage rate of the single tender, in whichever form the tender may be accepted.

Persons tendering are requested to state the description of the vehicle they intend to use, and the number of horses by which it is to be drawn.
