CALIFORNIAN QUAIL TO BE DEEMED GAME.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir WILLIAM FOSTER STAWELL, Knight, the Chief Justice of the Colony of Victoria, and Administrator of the Government of the said Colony, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the thirty-first year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled *An Act to protect Game* (31 Vict. No. 311), it is amongst other things enacted, that for the purposes of the said Act the term "game" shall mean and include all birds and other animals mentioned in the first schedule to the said Act, and the term "native game" shall mean and include all birds and other animals mentioned in the second schedule to the said Act; provided that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council at any time after the passing of the said Act by proclamation to name any other bird or animal which shall be included in such first or second schedule respectively, and after the publication of any such proclamation in the *Government Gazette* and the expiration of the period mentioned in such proclamation for the time of its coming into operation, the

birds or other animals so named shall be deemed and considered as being thenceforward included in such schedule; Now therefore I, the Administrator of the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby name the "Californian Quail" as a bird which shall be included in the first schedule to the said Act annexed, upon the expiration of the period hereinafter mentioned for the coming into operation of this proclamation: And with the advice aforesaid I do appoint that this my Proclamation shall come into operation upon the expiration of seven days from the publication thereof in the *Government Gazette*.

PART II. OF "THE PUBLIC HEALTH AMENDING STATUTE 1867" EXTENDED TO CERTAIN SHIRES.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir WILLIAM FOSTER STAWELL, Knight, the Chief Justice of the Colony of Victoria, and Administrator of the Government of the said Colony, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the thirty-first year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled *An Act to amend the Laws relating to or affecting Public Health* (31 Vict. No. 310), it is amongst other things enacted, that this Part (that is to say, Part II.) of this Act shall apply to all places where the Part of the Act thereby repealed, or any portion thereof, has been in force, and all or some of the provisions of this Part shall also apply to every such city, town, borough, shire, district, or place in Victoria as the Governor in Council shall by Proclamation direct; and the Governor in Council may at any time, and from time to time, alter, repeal, or revoke any such Proclamation theretofore or thereafter made: Now therefore I, the Administrator of the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation, direct that all the provisions of Part II. of the above recited Act, 31 Vict. No. 310, shall apply to the respective shires hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

The Shire of Flinders and Kangarong,
The Shire of Heidelberg,
The Shire of Kilmore,
The Shire of South Barwon,
The Shire of Nunawading,
The Shire of Whittlesea.

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REWARD FOR THE DETECTION OF PERSONS PUTTING POISONOUS OR NOXIOUS MATTER INTO VICTORIAN WATERS.

IT is hereby notified that a reward of Ten pounds will be paid for such information as may lead to the conviction of any person or persons who shall put or attempt to put or assist in putting into any Victorian waters any poisonous or noxious material with intent to destroy any fish therein, or knowingly permit such poisonous or noxious materials to flow or be cast into any such river, creek, stream, pond, or lake, and thereby cause the destruction of any fish therein.

The above reward will be paid immediately upon conviction, and will be in addition to the portion of the fine which is to be paid to the person affording the information.

The name of the person giving the information will not be divulged except by his own consent or unless his evidence be necessary to ensure conviction.

INCORPORATION OF THE MELBOURNE ORPHAN ASYLUM.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the first day of March 1875.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-seventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled *An Act for Hospitals and Charitable Institutions*, it is amongst other things enacted, that any institution established for the cure of disease, or for the relief of diseased, aged, incurable, or destitute persons, and supported in whole or in part by the voluntary contributions of not less than fifty persons, each of whom shall have paid not less than One pound per annum or Twenty pounds in one donation, may be incorporated as thereinafter mentioned, and all persons who shall have paid as aforesaid shall be deemed contributors within the meaning of the said Act; and it is also enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than twenty-five of the said persons praying that such institution may be incorporated, to cause the substance or prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition, signed by an equal or greater number of such persons, shall have been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication) the Governor in Council may declare the contributors for the time being to such institution to be, and they shall thereupon become and continue, a body politic and corporate by the style and title named in the Order in Council, and shall have perpetual succession and a common seal: And whereas the Administrator of the Government in Council has received a petition signed by not less than twenty-five contributors to an institution established at Emerald Hill for the maintenance of destitute orphans, and known as the Melbourne Orphan Asylum, praying that the said institution may be incorporated: And whereas the substance or prayer of the said petition has been published in the *Government Gazette*, and no counter-petition has been

delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary within one month after the date of such publication: Now therefore His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order declare the contributors for the time being to the institution established at Emerald Hill, in the county of Bourke, which is known as and designated the Melbourne Orphan Asylum, to be a body politic and corporate by the style and title of the "Melbourne Orphan Asylum."

And the Honorable Robert Ramsay, Her Majesty's Postmaster-General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

PROPOSED NEW SHIRE UNDER THE "LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT 1874."

IN pursuance of the provisions of the *Local Government Act* 1874 (No. 506, § 46,) the substance and prayer of a petition, in accordance with the 39th and 44th sections of the said Act, which has been presented to His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, in Council, are published, viz.:

The petitioners state that they are inhabitant householders and ratepayers residing within the Shire of Nunawading, and that they are desirous that the district which they describe should be severed from the Shire and constituted a new municipality. They further state that the said district is capable of yielding on a rate, not exceeding One shilling in the pound, the sum of £520, and they pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore pray that your Excellency in Council may be pleased, in exercise of the powers set forth in the first part of the *Local Government Act* 1874, to make the following order, that is to say:—

1. "That portion of the colony of Victoria having the following boundaries shall, from and after the 31st March 1875, be constituted a municipality by the name of the shire of Bulleen; bounded by a line commencing at the centre of the Yarra-Yarra River opposite the south-west corner of the parish of Bulleen; thence up the centre of the said river to opposite the north-west corner of section XII., parish of Warrandyte, east to the said corner, south to the south-east corner of section XXIV., same parish; west to the south-west corner of the same section; thence south to the Mullum-mullum Creek; down this creek to a point east of the south-east corner of the parish of Bulleen; west to the said corner and along the south boundary of the said parish to the commencing point."

NEGLECTED AND DESERTED CHILDREN.

IN pursuance of *The Neglected and Criminal Children's Amendment Act 1874*, whereby it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, to make regulations and conditions for generally regulating the apprenticing, licensing out, and boarding out of children placed in any of the Industrial and Reformatory Schools established under *The Neglected and Criminal Children's Act 1864*, the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, has made the following regulations and conditions, that is to say:—

1. All former regulations relating to the apprenticing, licensing out, and boarding out shall be and the same are hereby repealed. Former regulations repealed.
2. No child under sentence to a reformatory shall be boarded out. What children may be boarded out.
3. Relatives shall not have access to children boarded out, except in the case of a child becoming dangerously ill, but shall be informed quarterly of the state of their children's health, and be supplied with such other information as it may be desirable to give them, provided accurate addresses are registered at the office of Industrial and Reformatory Schools. Relatives not to have access to children.
4. No child shall, unless under special circumstances and with the authority of the Chief Secretary, be apprenticed, licensed out, boarded out, or placed out for adoption to or with any person not residing within a district under the supervision of a committee hereinafter called a "Visiting Committee," provided that this regulation shall not interfere with the licensing or apprenticing of boys to service at sea. Districts within which children may be placed.
5. For the purpose of giving effect to these regulations Visiting Committees may be formed in any district, not already under the supervision of such a committee, by not less than three ladies agreeing to form such committee, and to exercise supervision over such children as may be placed out in their district under these regulations. Visiting committees.
6. Every committee so formed shall represent as far as practicable all the denominations established in the district over which they propose to exercise supervision.
7. Before any district is registered in the office of the Inspector of Industrial and Reformatory Schools as one to which children may be sent under these regulations the boundaries of such district and the name of the person elected to act as correspondent to the committee shall be furnished in writing to the Inspector of Industrial and Reformatory Schools; but such boundaries may be changed (provided that no other district is thereby encroached upon) and such other person may be elected to act as correspondent as may from time to time be desirable.
8. It shall be optional with Visiting Committees to undertake the supervision of children boarded out and adopted only, or licensed and apprenticed only or both at the discretion of the members thereof provided that every committee shall intimate to the Inspector of Industrial and Reformatory Schools in writing in which respect they intend to act.
9. No person deriving directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other personal profit from the boarding out of any child shall be a member of a Visiting Committee.
10. Every committee already constituted or hereafter to be constituted under these regulations shall be held to undertake to see these regulations faithfully administered in their respective districts, and to see that the conditions in the schedules hereto are complied with by the persons to whom they relate.
11. Every boarded out child shall be visited at least once in every six weeks at the home of the foster-parent by a member of the committee; and the visitor shall thereupon make a report in writing to the committee, stating the apparent bodily condition and the behaviour of such child, and all reasonable complaints made by or concerning the child against or by the foster-parents. These reports shall be forwarded by the committee quarterly, in forms to be provided for that purpose, to the Inspector of Industrial and Reformatory Schools. Boarded out children to be visited, &c.
12. If in the case of any boarded out child no such report as that specified in the last preceding clause shall be received by the Inspector for the space of four consecutive months, he (the Inspector) may, after giving fourteen days' notice in writing to the committee and the foster-parent with whom such child is placed, remove the child.
13. The committee will exercise general supervision over the children boarded-out and the persons they are placed with, advising them as may seem necessary; and, in cases requiring prompt action, such as the removal of a child from one home to another, they will be authorized to effect such removal, but will require to report the same at once to the Inspector of Industrial and Reformatory Schools for such further action to be taken as may be necessary.
14. Every licensed child shall be visited by a member of the committee once a quarter but not oftener unless, in exceptional cases, circumstances should render further visiting desirable. Licensed children to be visited, &c.
15. The visitors shall strive to impress on the children the importance of fidelity to their employers, and discourage the habit of gossiping or talking about their private affairs. As far as may be convenient and practicable the visitors shall permit and encourage the children to write to them whenever they need advice or assistance.
16. In the event of any emergency arising seeming to require prompt action the committee shall call on the police to take such steps as the nature and circumstances of the case may require. In special cases not requiring immediate action the Inspector shall be communicated with as speedily as possible.
17. A report of the behaviour of children in their situations shall be sent by the committee to the Inspector half-yearly.
18. Children taken out with a view to adoption shall be visited by the committee or, with the consent of the Inspector, be taken to see some member of committee, or the Inspector at his office at least once in each six months unless in special cases permission is given in writing by the Inspector for this supervision to be dispensed with. Supervision of adopted children.
19. All applications for children under these regulations shall be made on the forms provided for that purpose and shall be accompanied by the certificate of a clergyman resident or having a charge in the district where the applicant resides. Every person taking a child under these regulations shall be bound thereby and by the conditions set forth in such one of the schedules attached hereto as shall be applicable to the terms—whether boarding out or license—under which such child is placed under his care. Applications how to be made.
20. Protestant children shall only be placed under the care of Protestant persons and Catholic children under that of Catholics. Children of other creeds to be dealt with in a similar manner. Children only to go to persons of same religion as themselves.
21. The Government reserves the right of removing children whenever it may be deemed necessary to do so. Government may withdraw children.
22. The following schedules shall be read and construed as part of these regulations. Schedules.

SCHEDULES.

SCHEDULE No. 1.

Conditions relating to the Boarding Out of Children.

1. Applicants (hereinafter called the foster-parents) for children under these conditions must be females of good moral character, good health, not over 55 years of age, and if married, their husbands must be of the same religious persuasion as themselves. They must not be in receipt of assistance from any benevolent asylum or charitable institution or society, hospital excepted.
2. Applications for children must be sent in to the Ladies' Committee, and must be accompanied by the certificate of a clergyman as to the moral fitness of herself, and, if married, her husband, to be entrusted with the training of children. Applications will only be dealt with when recommended by the Ladies' Committee for the district within which the applicant resides.
3. Every applicant having children within the school ages specified in the Education Act must show that they are attending school in accordance with the requirements of that Act, or give a satisfactory reason for their being detained therefrom.
4. The family of a foster-parent must not at any time consist of more than six (6), including the children boarded from the Government, but exclusive of herself, and, if married, her husband. No more than two (2) children—except in the case of families of more than two (2)—may be placed with one foster-parent.
5. No males above the age of twelve (12) years may at any time form portion of a family in which female children over eight (8) years of age are boarded, except in the cases of brothers and sisters; nor may female children under ten (10) years of age be placed in a family in which there are males over seven (7) years of age.
6. The residence of a foster-parent must not be more than two (2) miles from a State school, five (5) from the residence of some member of committee, nor ordinarily more than five (5) miles from the residence of a medical practitioner. In cases that the committee consider it very desirable an exception should be made, the foster-parent's residence may be seven (7) miles from that of the medical officer, provided that the latter expresses in writing his willingness to attend in such case on the terms hereinafter specified. The accommodation provided must be sufficient, and suitable and separate sleeping rooms must be provided for male and female children when above the age of seven (7) years. Children above seven (7) years may not sleep in the same room with married people.
7. No boarders or lodgers (children or adults) other than the children boarded for the Government may be received by foster-parents, nor may a foster-parent or her husband be the holder of any license for the sale of fermented or spirituous liquors, or any member of her family hold such license for premises situated within three (3) miles of her residence.
8. The family, including the children boarded, must all attend the same place of worship.
9. The children must be properly fed, and kept decently clothed by the foster-parents with sufficient and seasonable clothing; the supply at all times to be complete to the extent shown in Schedule two (2). Clothing to remain the property of the children, and to be at all times clean and in good repair. On the return or transfer of a child, the foster-parent giving up such child shall be required to place his clothing kit in as good condition, both as regards quantity and quality, as it was when received by her.
10. The children will be visited from time to time by some member of committee, who, as well as the Inspector of Industrial and Reformatory Schools, or any one appointed on his behalf, shall have free access to them within reasonable hours. The certificate of the committee approving of the treatment of the children must be forwarded to the Inspector with the account for payment.
11. Should a child meet with an accident, or become ill, he must be taken without delay to the medical officer hereinafter mentioned, or, if it be not practicable to take the child, the medical officer must be called in to attend to him, under such regulations as regards charges as may from time to time be made.
12. No child boarded out may be placed at service, or hired out to any kind of employment, except by the written direction of the Inspector of Industrial and Reformatory Schools.
13. The children must be sent to and attend school regularly, unless the Inspector of Industrial and Reformatory Schools, on the written recommendation of the committee or the medical officer, authorizes in writing their non-attendance.
14. The foster-parents will be expected to attend to the moral and religious training of the children, who must, when of a suitable age, be sent regularly to a place of worship and to Sunday School, and clergymen of the denomination to which they belong must also be allowed every reasonable facility for imparting to them religious instruction.
15. Should a child meet with an accident, become seriously ill, die, or run away, information must be at once given to the committee for report to the Inspector.
16. Children received under these conditions may not be transferred, or placed permanently under the care of any other person, without the consent in writing of the Inspector of Industrial and Reformatory Schools. But the committee have power in any case which they consider urgent temporarily to remove children from foster-parents in anticipation of the directions of the Inspector. Foster-parents may not change their residence within the district without giving one (1) week's notice of the proposed change to the committee for report to the Inspector, nor may they remove from the district without the sanction of the Inspector to such removal has been notified to the committee in writing.
17. Payments will be made for the children at the rate of twelve (12) shillings per week for each child up to the age of one (1) year, seven (7) shillings per week up to the age of seven (7) years, six (6) shillings per week to the age of ten (10) years, five (5) shillings per week to the age of twelve (12) years, and three (3) shillings per week from the age of twelve (12) years to that of thirteen (13) years. If retained after reaching the age of thirteen (13) years, the license conditions set forth in Schedule 3 shall be observed. Should the Government decide to reduce the rates of pay, three months' notice will be given to the foster-parents.
18. Deductions may be made from the monthly accounts, at the discretion of the Inspector, for any neglect or improper treatment of the children. Acquittances must be signed by foster-mothers themselves. If unable to write, their mark must be affixed in the presence of and be witnessed by a member of committee. Only in very special cases may payment be made to an agent, and then only when the foster-mother has given an order on the Government (H) form. All accounts must be certified by the correspondent.
19. A medical officer will be appointed for every district in which children are boarded out. His duty will be to visit the children not less than once in every three (3) months, and to attend to them in illness or in case of accident, either at the residence of the foster-parents or his own residence or surgery, as may be necessary, and to supply all requisite medicines and medical appliances. He will be required to report any deficiency of accommodation, any defects in the sanitary condition of the residence, insufficient supply of food or clothing, or absence of cleanliness, and generally any ill-treatment of the children or cause for complaint that may come under his notice.
20. An allowance for such attendance and supervision as above mentioned will be paid by the Government at the rate of One pound (£1) per child per annum.

21. The Inspector may remove or direct the removal of children at any time he considers it necessary or expedient. Persons taking children under these conditions will be at liberty to return them to the school from which they received them, upon giving two (2) weeks' notice of their intention to do so.

22. The Government will make such further rules and conditions as may from time to time be necessary, and foster-parents will require to comply with the directions they may receive from the Inspector, whether provided for in these conditions or not, and to give effect to the requirements of the committee hereinbefore referred to.

SCHEDULE No. 3.

Conditions relating to the Licensing of Children.

1. The child licensed shall be properly fed and lodged by the person to whom he is licensed, and provided with medicines and medical attendance when necessary, and a sufficient quantity of serviceable and seasonable clothing, not less, during every twelve months of service, than the following:—

For a Boy.—3 pairs boots, 3 caps or hats, 2 jackets or coats, 6 pairs socks, 2 vests, 4 pairs trousers, 3 shirts, 2 flannel shirts, 4 handkerchiefs, and 2 belts.

For a Girl.—3 pairs boots, 3 hats or bonnets, 3 jackets, 6 pairs stockings, 2 flannels, 4 handkerchiefs, 4 dresses, 3 chemises, 3 pairs drawers, 3 petticoats, 6 pinafores or aprons, 4 collars, 1 pair stays, and 2 nightgowns.

2. Where there are males in the employer's family or household other than the head thereof and the child licensed is a female she shall sleep in the same room as another female, if the male or males referred to sleep in the same building as that in which sleeping accommodation is provided for the child.

3. No hotel or boarding-house keeper shall be eligible to have a child on license, nor shall a single gentleman be eligible to receive a female child.

4. The child shall be allowed, where practicable, to attend regularly divine service and Sunday school; his moral training shall be duly cared for by his employer; and the clergyman of the denomination to which he belongs, and any officer, member of visiting committee, or other person appointed by Government to visit him, shall be allowed to do so at reasonable hours.

5. Payment shall be made for the services rendered by each child at the following rates:—

For a Girl.—First year, sixpence per week; second year, one shilling per week; third year, one shilling and sixpence per week.

For a Boy.—First year, one shilling per week; second year, one shilling and sixpence per week; third year, two shillings and sixpence per week. One half the wages shall be paid quarterly, viz., on the 1st January, April, July, and October, in advance, to the Inspector, and the other half to the child at the end of each quarter's service.

6. Any person returning a child to the schools before the expiry of the term of license, and not satisfying the Inspector that the child's conduct warranted his being returned, shall be liable to pay wages from the date of the child's return, at the then current rate, for such period, not exceeding three months, as may be fixed by the Inspector.

7. Any employer returning a child shall require to show that the clothing specified in Clause 1 has been supplied, or, failing to do so, shall pay such sum as shall in the opinion of the Inspector be reasonable in lieu thereof.

8. Every employer shall forward a report of the conduct of the child licensed to him, and allow the child to write to this office once at least in every six months. In the event of a child becoming seriously ill, dying, absconding, leaving, or meeting with an accident, written information thereof shall be sent at once to the Inspector's office. In the case of absconding, information to be given at the local police station, and in the case of illness the clergyman of the denomination to which the child belongs to be at once communicated with.

9. In the event of change of residence by an employer, written intimation thereof shall be at once sent to the Inspector's office. A child may not be removed from the district within which he is licensed to reside without the written consent of the Inspector.

10. A child licensed may not be transferred to any other party without authority in writing for such transfer is given by the Inspector.

11. Children on license may not be taken out of the colony of Victoria.

12. When a child's services are no longer required he must be returned to the school from which he was taken, unless the sanction of the Inspector is obtained to his being otherwise provided for.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. The charges for burying in, or otherwise using the cemetery, must be paid before an order can be given for the particular work or privilege required.
2. The charge for occupying ground may be remitted by the trustees when it is shown to their satisfaction that the relatives or friends of the deceased are unable to pay the charge, but all such burials must be made in ground selected by the trustees.
3. Orders for interments must be given to the caretaker at least six working hours before the time appointed for the burial, so as to allow sufficient time for digging the grave within working hours, otherwise the charge for digging will be increased by one-half.
4. The caretaker will dig all ordinary graves, but when the friends of any indigent person deceased wish to dig the grave themselves, or when brick graves or vaults are required, then the excavations must be made and the ground filled in or removed under the inspection and to the satisfaction of the caretaker.
5. The hours fixed for interments are from Ten a.m. till Six p.m. from September to April inclusive, and from Ten a.m. to Four p.m. during the other four months, except on Sundays when the hours are from Two o'clock till Five p.m. throughout the year.
6. All monuments, vaults, graves, gravestones, and fences must be kept in proper condition and repair by the owners, otherwise they may be removed by the trustees, after having given notice of their intention to remove them, by posting such notice to the last known address of one of the parties concerned.
7. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave must be bricked in and cemented, and covered in by a slab of stone, slate, iron, bluegun or redgum planking.
8. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and plan of every monument, or tablet proposed, to be erected, and a copy of every inscription must be submitted to the trustees, without whose approval it shall not be erected or inscribed.
9. The grounds will be open to the public daily from sunrise to sunset.
10. No grave will be allowed to be re-opened for further interment at a shorter interval than twelve years except it be to place a second coffin on top of the first, and this only when the grave has been originally sunk to a depth of six feet or more.

11. No new grave can be made without paying for the ground or satisfying the trustees that it has been already paid for.

The returns show a considerable improvement in the number of deaths as compared with the births during the week. Among the children alone a decrease in the mortality of 9½ per cent. is observable. Thus of the 115 deaths reported, 60, or 52½ per cent., were children not exceeding the age of 3 years; of which 32, or 53½ per cent., were under the age of 1 year; and 29, or 24½ per cent., were of the ages of 1 to 3 years. The principal infantile causes of death were diarrhoea and dysentery, of which there were 10 cases, measles 7 cases, and marasmus 9 cases.

The districts are recovering their healthy character. Twelve of the South Melbourne deaths were in charitable institutions, and two of the Prahran deaths took place in the Alfred Hospital.

Pursuant to Orders of 23 December 1874.

BRENNANAH QUARANTINE DISTRICT (including Brennanah and Croyora Springs runs).—Commencing at the north-west angle of Catto's run; thence by that run south-easterly to the northern boundary of the Glenalbyn run; thence by that run westerly and southerly to the Kingower run; thence by the northern and western boundaries of that run to the Bealiba run; thence by the northern and western boundaries of that run, westerly and southerly to the eastern boundary of the Avoca Forest East run; thence by that run north-westerly to the southern boundary of the Spring Hill run; thence by that run north-easterly and northerly to the southern boundary of Torpichen run; thence by that run north-easterly to Powlett's Plains run; and thence by that run, and the Salisbury Plains run, south-easterly to the point of commencement.

Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and may be forwarded (if by post, prepaid) addressed to the Honorable the Postmaster-General, with the words "Tender for the Conveyance of Mails" endorsed on the cover, or placed in the tender-box at the General Post Office.

Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender, and every tender will be taken to include the entire service as called for. The amount of the tender must be stated in words as well as figures.

Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

The money deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them on application, on the bond and contract being completed.

The money deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them on application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts, but not otherwise.

The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.
