ACTS OF PARLIAMENT LEFT TO THEIR OPERATION.

THE Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, has, in a Despatch bearing date the 1st day of January 1875, intimated to the Administrator of the Government that Her Majesty will not be advised to exercise Her power of disallowance with respect to the Acts of the Parliament of Victoria passed in the session held in the 38th year of Her Majesty's reign, the numbers, titles, and dates of which are hereto subjoined, viz.:-

38 Victoria.

No. 481. An Act to extend the Powers of the Acting Engineer-in-Chief of the Victorian Railways. [Assented to 23rd June 1874.]

No. 482. An Act to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of One hundred and five thousand three hundred and sixty-five pounds six shillings and ten pence to the service of the year One thousand eight hundred and seventy-three and four, and the sum of Five hundred thousand pounds to the service of the year One thousand eight hundred and seventy-four and five. [Assented to 23rd June 1874.]

THE NEXT COURT OF GENERAL SESSIONS AT CLUNES.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the fifteenth day of March 1875.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Administrator of the Government
Mr. Kerferd Mr. Mackay
Mr. Service Mr. Ramsay.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the thirty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled *An Act to erect a new Court for the Trial of Offences, to establish uniformity of Venue in Civil and Criminal Judicature, and to amend the practice and procedure of Courts of Criminal Jurisdiction*, it is amongst other things enacted that this colony shall be and is divided into Bailiwicks; and it is also enacted that in and for every bailiwick there shall be a Court of General Sessions of the Peace which shall have jurisdiction in and throughout such bailiwick; and it is further enacted that the Central Criminal Court shall be held in the city of Melbourne, and the said other courts respectively shall be held at the several places in that behalf mentioned in the Third Schedule to the said Act, on such days as the Governor in Council shall from time to time appoint; but if from any cause any court shall not be opened or held on the day appointed for that purpose it may be opened and held on any subsequent day, and the proceedings shall be as valid as if such delay had not taken place: Now therefore His Excellency the Administrator of the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order appoint that the Court of General Sessions of the Peace to be holden at Clunes, shall be held on Wednesday the thirty-first day of March instant, in lieu of the second day of April next ensuing.

And the Honorable Townsend MacDermott, Her Majesty's Solicitor-General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

QUARANTINE DISTRICTS UNDER "THE SCAB ACT 1870."

IN pursuance of the 64th section of *The Scab Act 1870*, the Governor in Council has revoked all previous Orders relating to the Quarantine Districts hereinafter mentioned, and has ordered that the portions of Victoria whereof the boundaries are hereinafter described shall be Quarantine Districts within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:—

Pursuant to Orders of 23 December 1874.

BRENNANAH QUARANTINE DISTRICT (including Brennanah and Coofoora Springs runs).—Commencing at the north-west angle of Catto's run; thence by that run south-easterly to the northern boundary of the Glenalbyn run; thence by that run westerly and southerly to the Kingower run; thence by the northern and western boundaries of that run to the Bealiba run; thence by the northern and western boundaries of that run, westerly and southerly to the eastern boundary of the Avoca Forest East run; thence by that run north-westerly to the southern boundary of the Spring Hill run; thence by that run north-easterly and northerly to the southern boundary of Torpichen run; thence by that run north-easterly to Powlett's Plains run; and thence by that run, and the Salisbury Plains run, south-easterly to the point of commencement.

POWLETT'S PLAINS QUARANTINE DISTRICT (including Powlett's Plains run).—Commencing at a point on the River Loddon, being the north-east angle of allotment 62, parish of Kinypanial; thence southerly along the said River Loddon to the northernmost angle of the Salisbury Plains run; thence westerly and southerly to the northernmost boundary of the Brennanah run; thence westerly along the said boundary to the eastern boundary of the Torpichen run; thence northerly along the said boundary to the southernmost boundary of the Edgar Plains run; and thence easterly to the point of commencement.

PROTECTORATE QUARANTINE DISTRICT (including Protectorate run).—Commencing at the north-east angle of Waranga run; on the west by that run; on the south by Postlethwaite run on the east by the Goulburn River for about seven miles; thence by a line running north-west to the commencing point.

SANDHURST DISTRICT, FREEHOLD PROPERTIES IN THE PARISH OF POWLETT-CLANCY.—Comprising allotments 10 and 12, lying on the north side of the main road from Salisbury Plains pre-emptive right to Kinypanial in the county of Gladstone. Parish of Kinypanial—Mackins.—Comprising allotment 95, on the River Loddon, in the county of Gladstone.

The deaths during this week have again exceeded the births by 12. Of the total deaths, 72, or 54·5 per cent., were children not exceeding three years, 48, or 36·3 per cent., of which were under the age of one year; while the remainder, 24, or 18·2 per cent., were of the ages of one to three years; the most fatal causes of death among the children being diarrhoea and dysentery, 14, and marasmus, 12. Six deaths occurred from measles. Low fever is reported to be prevalent at Brunswick. One death from typhoid fever occurred at South Yarra, and one from diphtheria at Williamstown. The deaths at Kew were both asylum cases; of the South Melbourne deaths, 14 were in charitable institutions, and two of the Prahran deaths occurred in the Hospital.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF THE RESERVE FOR RACING AND GENERAL RECREATIVE PURPOSES AT STAWELL.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* power is given to the Board of Land and Works to make rules and regulations for the care, protection, and management of all public parks and reserves, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein, the Board of Land and Works, in pursuance of the powers conferred as aforesaid, has made the following Regulations, to be observed and enforced in respect of the land conditionally reserved, by Order of the 19th September 1870, for Racing and General Recreative purposes at Stawell:—

REGULATIONS.

The reserve on days set apart for racing purposes shall be managed by the Pleasant Creek Racing Club Committee, consisting of twelve (12) members of the club, elected according to the rules of the Victoria Racing Club.

No person without permission from the committee shall be admitted into the reserve with a horse or any other animal, or with any vehicle, or with goods of any sort to dispose of, or shall be allowed to erect any buildings, tents, booths, or sheds thereon.

All members of the club shall, upon production of their tickets, be admitted at all race meetings to the buildings erected by the club in the reserve, and to bring their own horses and carriages to the paddock free of charge.

The following is the scale of charges which shall be levied and taken for admission during the race meetings into the

reserve and buildings thereon of persons who are not members of the club:—

For admission into the reserve of every person with a horse, or horse and vehicle	2	0
For admission of vehicles plying for hire	5	0
For admission to the Grand Stand	2	6
For admission to the Grand Stand and Saddling Pad-dock	4	0

Any person proved to the satisfaction of the committee to have been guilty of any malpractice or dishonorable conduct in connection with racing may be refused admission.

Any person committing on the said land or any of the buildings or erections for the time being thereon any of the following offences shall be removed from the reserve, notwithstanding such person may be a member of the club, or may have purchased, and is or may be in possession of a ticket of admission:—

1. Assaulting any other person.
2. Being drunk.
3. Riding, crossing, or trespassing upon the course or any part of it during a race meeting, or when the horses are preparing to start, or are running for any race.
4. Using profane, indecent, or obscene language.
5. Using any threatening, abusive, or insulting words.
6. Behaving improperly or riotously.
7. Obtaining admission into the reserve when disentitled to such admission under these regulations.

On days not set apart by the committee for race meetings the reserve (except the actual running ground and two chains on either side thereof) shall be open to the general public for cricket, football, or other athletic games.

The committee shall have power to allow the reserve to be depastured by quiet milch cows or sheep, and to use the proceeds of such agistment of stock for the maintenance and improvement of the reserve, on the distinct understanding that such agistment shall not debar the general public from the unrestricted use of the ground for cricket, football, or other athletic games on days not set apart by the committee for race meetings.

HYDROGRAPHICAL INFORMATION RELATING TO VARIOUS PLACES ON THE AUSTRALIAN STATION, RECEIVED FROM DIFFERENT SOURCES.

AUSTRALIA, EAST COAST.

(Extract of a letter from Lieut. Suckling, H.M.S. *Renard*, 20/12/74.)

Encountered very heavy weather for a day off Port Stephens, on the way up, and very strong southerly current, setting the ship on an average of nearly 40' a day.

AUSTRALIA, NORTH-WEST COAST.

(Extract of a letter from Lieut. Rendell, commanding H.M.S. *Beagle*.)

Broadhurst Bay.—No fresh water on east side of Dolphin Island. We obtained 3 hds. of brackish water from pools in the rocks a little further north. After passing through Flying Foam Passage, found sufficient water in the pools to complete; but it was brackish.

Hampton Harbor is the only fair one on the coast, and is only suitable for vessels of light draught. No fresh water obtainable.

Port Weld.—The deepest water is 2 fathoms. It is surrounded by reefs and sandbanks, which render it difficult of access.

Beadon Bay.—Fresh water, very good, obtainable from wells dug in the soft sand at 100 yards from high-water mark. The anchorage is shoal. The *Beagle* was obliged to lie about 1½ from the mouth of the creek, in 2½ fathoms.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

Notice to Mariners, 30/9/74.

Port Wakefield Light.—On and after 1st November 1874 a red light will be exhibited at Port Wakefield, instead of the present white light.

NEW ZEALAND.

(Extract from Remark Book of Navigating Lieut. Mourilyan, of H.M.S. *Basilisk*.)

At Cardwell.—There is now a red buoy placed on the edge of the extensive mud flats off the township of Cardwell, which marks the deep water. This buoy is in about 2 fathoms.

Ahuriri Roadstead, Napier.—There is now a light fixed close to the mouth of the Iron Pot, to clear the Pania Rock: in clear weather it can be seen 8' to 9'. It shows red when in line with the rock: white clears the danger.

Auckland Rock.—The buoy on the Auckland Rock has been washed away, and has not been replaced. The least depth of water on the rock is 18 feet, at low-water springs. It being found impossible to keep the buoy in its position, it is to be discontinued.

Poverty Bay.—The river marked to the right of Young Nick's Hd. does not exist. The mouth of it has been filled up with sand and driftwood during the heavy weather and S.E. winds.

The Tower is situated on the N.E. part of the bay, on the Turanga-nui River, and is called Gisborne. The entrance to this river is marked by two beacons, and a black buoy is placed outside to show a rock, with 2½ to 3 fathoms on it.

(Extract from Report of Lieut. Sanders, commanding H.M.S. *Alacrity*, 10/5/74.)

Whangarei Harbor.—The inner anchorage is very good. The directions in *New Zealand Pilot* are so clear as to make it easy of access by night as well as by day. Although there are large shoals on either hand, I did not get less than 5 fathoms going to the anchorage at night.

I think that Passage Island makes a better leading mark than either of those laid down in the *New Zealand Pilot* for altering course from N.W. by N. to W. by N. rounding the Mores Bank. It is clear of the land when necessary to alter course, and is therefore more easily distinguished at night than High Islet, which is under the land. I could not easily distinguish Sandy Point.

Passage Island, W. by N. ½ N., and almost clear of Lost Point, forms a very good guide at night for hauling up to W., proceeding to the inner anchorage.

Tutukaka Harbor.—The entrance is very narrow, faces the eastward. There is generally a heavy swell setting in, which, combined with baffling winds, makes it very difficult and even dangerous to clear the harbor, except with a fair wind. The swell sets on to the rocks forming the south side of the entrance, and the tide is very treacherous round these rocks.

Whangururu Harbor is very snug, and a pretty harbor and easy of access. There is very good fishing off Hayes Island.

Whangaroa Harbor is snug, with good anchorage for a large vessel as far as Peter and Sawyer's Points. There is a good watering place in the bay, of which Sawyer's Point forms the N. W. extreme.

Mongawani Harbor.—A small snug harbor, easy of access.

Parenga-ranga Harbor.—The bar renders the entrance to this harbor often dangerous. I found it difficult to make out the inner N. entrance point, which is given as a leading mark for crossing the bar, as it is low and sandy, and the high ground

from it stands back in a line with the rest of the high ground of the coast, while the beach behind the point is all sandy, so it is only when aloft that the point is made out.

The point is a little inside of Otehe Point (which cannot be mistaken), on a west bearing. The point between Inner North Entrance Point and Coal Point is bold, clearly defined, and is liable to be mistaken for the former.

I found the leading mark given in the *New Zealand Pilot* leads fair in the channel over the bar.

Manukau Harbor.—The only channels now used (except by small coasters) are the South and Fanny Channels. The latter is a narrow one, just to the southward of the South Channel, close in shore. The sand shoals between the South and Main Channels have shifted to the northward, making the South Channel a good broad one. The signal station is now on the South Head, instead of on Paratatai Island.

The two beacons on the South Head, for leading through the South Channel, are fitted on traversing slides, so that when the channel shifts they can alter the beacons so as to lead through. There are four small beacons just to the left of the two large ones, which, when in line, lead through the Fanny Channel. From the Signal Station vessels are guided in by the semaphore arms, keeping to the northward or southward according as the north or south arm is raised, steadying directly the arm drops. I beat in in H.M.S. *Alacrity* through the Fanny Channel, being guided entirely from the Signal Station.

The channel from the Manukau Heads to Onehunga is very well buoyed.

(Extract of letter from Capt. Simpson, H.M.S. *Blanche*, 3/11/74.)

Freshwater Basin, Milford Sound.—The plan of this anchorage in chart No. 2589, sheet 12, is, in the main, correct; except that the available space for anchorage is decidedly less than shown on the chart, and the entrance is shoaler—¾ fathoms at half tide being the greatest depth of water in the channel, which is very narrow. It is, however, the best anchorage to be obtained in the Sound.

Thompson's Sound.—An anchorage inside McDermot's Island, in Bradshaw Sound, in 15 fathoms. This is a good and well sheltered anchorage, but not nearly so large as the charts and directory would lead one to suppose.

(Notes by Navigating-Lieutenant Campion, H.M.S. *Blanche*.)

Cook's Straits, No. 2 Chart, No. 2685.—The rock awash in the Kakaho Channel has a small iron beacon with a ball erected upon it.

Nelson Harbor, Chart No. 2385.—The Lighthouse is not on the Boulder Bank, as shown in the chart, but on the bank or island, always 3 to 6 feet above high water, on the same line of bearing as the chart shows.

The light also shows Red between the bearing of E.b.N.; the south limit of white light, to N.E.b.N., the approximate position of the outer White Buoy.

The two beacons on shore for entering the inner harbor are, upper one white and lower one red; and they show similar lights at night.

The light on Pilot-house is discontinued.

A white light is shown at night on the Beacon off Haul-shore Point, on its being known a vessel is coming in.

The clump of trees on with a ravine in the mountains S. ½ E. does not exist, the trees having disappeared, but a large white house stands where the trees were. It is a difficult mark for a stranger.

The pilot reports that the Waimea River is rapidly closing up, the south bank silting up to the northward.

Fiji Islands.

Levuka.

Lighthouses.—An improvement has been made in the shape of the two lighthouses which are used as leading marks for the entrance. They have been increased in height and made of a pyramidal shape. They are whitewashed, and can now be seen well from seaward. The lights have not been altered.

Beacon.—A cask beacon, chequered black and white, has been erected on the centre of the reef which fronts the entrance.

Buoys.—The following buoys have been placed in Levuka Harbor, North entrance:—

One chequered buoy on a patch having 9 feet over it at low water, S.E. ½ S., 1½ cables from the S.W. extreme of the reef on the N. side of the North entrance.

One red buoy on a patch having 7 feet over it at low water, S.E.b.S., 4 cables from the S.W. extreme of the reef, on the N. side of the North entrance.

The best passage is N. of chequered buoy.

One chequered buoy has been placed on a patch having 10 feet over it at low water, S.E. by E., 2½ cables from Observation Point.

SOLOMON ISLANDS.

(Note by Lieut. Newell, of H.M.S. *Sandfly*.)

Savo Island.—The best anchorage is about 60 yards from a large conspicuous stone on the beach; but you must be careful not to let her have too little cable, as the patch is small, and you drag off without warning.

(Extract from log of H.M.S. *Conflict*.)

Mortlock Islands.—Passed between the assigned positions of Mortlock Islands without seeing them.

PACIFIC ISLANDS.

(Extracts from letter of Commr. Dupuis, dated 31st October 1874.)

Onaseuse or Hunter Island.—About noon on 26th July 1874 we passed over the position of Hunter Island, as laid down on the chart; clear weather; no signs of land.

Rotumah Island—Lee Bay, lat. $12^{\circ} 29' S$, long. $176^{\circ} 59' E$.—Population, last census, 3 years ago, 2700; decreasing; 14 white people. Two hurricanes were experienced in January and February, great damage done, causing a scarcity of food.

Ellice Island—Mission House, lat. $8^{\circ} 31' S$, long. $179^{\circ} 10' E$.—Population, 130; slowly increasing; 2 whites. Steamed along the reef, looking for the passage as marked in the chart; being unable to make it, anchored outside in 8 fathoms. When canoes came out an intelligent half-caste pointed out the passage. Passed through without difficulty (5 fathoms), and anchored off the principal village (64 fathoms).

Nukunutan or De Peyster's Island—West Islet, lat. long. $178^{\circ} 18' E$.—There is a good ship channel into the lagoon. Population 260; 3 whites. Strong W.S.W. current off the island.

Rotcher Island.—On the 9th August 1874, at 8 a.m., the *Rosario* passed close to the position of Rotcher Island as marked in the chart. There were no signs of land.

Gilbert Island (*Topoutouca or Drummond Island*).—Anchorage, lat. $1^{\circ} 10' S$, long. $174^{\circ} 38' E$.—Population between 6000 and 7000; 3 whites. The islands seem to be badly off for supplies, the natives being short of necessary food, and the island overpopulated. The natives should not be trusted too implicitly.

Nuncut or Sydenham Island.—South Point, lat. $0^{\circ} 51' S$, long. $174^{\circ} 29' E$.—Population about 3500; one white man; island seems to be overpopulated. The natives being short of necessary food, few supplies to be obtained. Natives not to be trusted. Wind being fresh from the eastward, a heavy surf was breaking on the reefs; landing by boats appeared impracticable.

Marakie or Mathew Island.—An unusually strong N.W. current; population about 1800; a few (4) white men; natives in an unsettled state; no chief or king; constantly quarrelling and fighting; seems to be overpopulated; no anchorage.

Apianang or Charlotte Island.—Anchorage, lat. $1^{\circ} 46' N$, long. $173^{\circ} E$.—Experienced a tremendous current W. before making this island; passage into the lagoon shallow; least water 24 fathoms; strong tide running; population nearly 3000; 7 white; overpopulated; no supplies can be obtained; natives untrustworthy.

Tarawa or Cook's Island.—Anchorage, lat. $1^{\circ} 22' N$, long. $172^{\circ} 56' E$.—Population 3000; 1 white; overpopulated; natives not to be trusted; constantly fighting; have lately elected a chief (October 1874).

Taritari or Touching Island.—Anchorage, lat. $3^{\circ} 3' N$, long. $172^{\circ} 47' E$.—Strong N.W. set; entered the lagoon without difficulty; uneven bottom; 3 fathoms on one side of the ship, $4\frac{1}{2}$ to $7\frac{1}{2}$ on the other. Anchored off a village on S. side. Population about 1500; no whites; natives understand but little English. Very few supplies could be obtained. Natives well disposed, civil, and more settled among themselves than at other islands of this group; chief or king living at Pitts Island.

Marshall Islands—Mille or Musgrace Island.—Observation Point, lat. $6^{\circ} 14' N$, long. $171^{\circ} 46' E$.—Sighted it on the 26th August; passed through the reef entrance into the lagoon; entrance on N. side very deep, about two cables wide; anchorage 19 fathoms. Weather for the last two days unfavorable; light variable winds from N.E. to S., with heavy rain squalls. Population 800 to 900; 3 whites. A chief or king rules. The island quiet; natives civil and inoffensive. A few supplies were obtained from the natives, who flocked on board in great numbers.

Arako or Pedder Island.—Lat. $6^{\circ} 59' N$, long. $171^{\circ} 43' E$.—Population 1000 to 1200; 3 whites. Natives civil and inoffensive. A chief or king. No supplies to be obtained. No man-of-war ever called before. Before arriving at Pedder Island experienced a strong easterly set of $3\frac{1}{2}$ in 18 hours. Entered by the east passage into the lagoon; least water 44 fathoms. Left the lagoon by another passage about $1' N$ of the one we entered by, called on plan "boat passage;" least water 6 fathoms.

Ebon or Boston Island.—Lat. $4^{\circ} 35' N$, long. $168^{\circ} 42' E$.—Passed through the reef entrance about 5 p.m., which is deep, very narrow, with strong irregular eddies. Anchored off Missionary Station. Population 800; 5 whites. A good supply of necessities were obtained; pigs, poultry, and vegetables being abundant.

Odia or Elmore Island.—Lat. $7^{\circ} 17' N$, long. $168^{\circ} 47' E$.—Entrance marked by a village with two remarkable coconut trees on the east shore; 3 fathoms least water. Entered the lagoon without difficulty, through a deep but narrow channel. Anchored off a small village on the south side. Population probably 150; no whites. Natives civil and honest; had never seen a man-of-war. They have a king, who also rules over Jalnit or Bonham Island, Ebon, Lib, and others. Very few supplies obtainable.

Alcifos or Providence Island.—Lat. $9^{\circ} 47' N$, long. $160^{\circ} 56' E$.—The passage to this island took six days; light easterly winds with frequent tremendous rain squalls, lasting several hours. On the evening of the 18th September, being $12'$ off the position of the island as shown on the chart, and seeing no signs of land, hove to till daylight 19th; made sail standing to the northward; at 9 a.m. observed the island ahead, its real position being considerably north of that shown on the chart. It is an outlying island of the Marshall Group; same language as in that group. Population 21. No supplies obtainable. By the native account, this island was almost totally destroyed by a tidal wave and hurricane about thirty years ago, and nearly the entire population were swept away.

Strong Island.—Between the 19th and 24th September unfavorable weather; constant rain, with furious squalls, was experienced from N.E. to S.E. Is an independent island. Population about 500, with a king; 7 whites. Small quantities of supplies procurable, and in season plenty of yams and other vegetables.

(Information furnished by Roger Turpin, Master of L.M.S. barque *John Williams*.)

Whilst beating up from the Ellice Group, bound to the Samoan Group, at 10 a.m. 25th July, saw bottom under the ship; got soundings in 16 fathoms, sand and coral. Vessel was on a wind, all sail set to a light E.S.E. breeze; heading N.E.; speed 3 knots. Position—worked back from noon observations:—Lat. $12^{\circ} 18' S$, long. $174^{\circ} 38' W$. Ship sailed at least five miles on a N.E. course, with the bottom distinctly visible; immense quantities of fish; a confused and irregular sea. Bottom appeared to be regular, no less than 16 fathoms having been obtained (3 chrs.).

(Extract from letter of proceedings of Lieutenant Sanders, commanding H.M.S. schooner *Alacrity*, 12th September 1874.)

SOLOMON ISLANDS.

Oas, Sta. Anna.—Good anchorage open to the N.W., but protected by the reef which stretches across from each end of the harbor. There is a patch off the south reef in the passage, which makes it rather narrow, but still leaves plenty of room for any vessel to pass through.

Three Sisters Islands.—*Alacrity* anchored in a small anchorage outside at Southernmost Island, formed by the points of land and spurs of the reef, in 25 fathoms, but found no passage into the lagoon, a bar of sand and coral running across the entrance with less than a fathom of water on the boulders, which stretch right across. (There appears to be a passage laid down in the chart.) Inside is a fine land-locked lagoon, about $3'$ by $\frac{1}{2}'$, with $9\frac{1}{2}$ and 10 fathoms near the entrance, shoaling to $2\frac{1}{2}$ and 3 fathoms. Islands flat, inclined to marshy; are uninhabited. The natives of San Christoval come across to catch fish, which abound here. Westerly winds expected to set in in September.

(Extract from letter of proceedings of Lieutenant Sanders, commanding H.M.S. schooner *Alacrity*, 11th January 1875.)

SIMBO ISLAND TO NEW IRELAND, DUKE OF YORK AND ADMIRALTY ISLANDS.

Simbo Island.—I found the natives very off-hand in their manners. On passage to Sydney I passed close to Simbo, but did not see anything over the 5-fathom shoal laid down; a white man who lives at Rubiana, however, informed me that it does exist. (This shoal is not shown on new issue of chart.) On passage from Simbo to Port Praslin, New Ireland, I encountered a very strong current always to the southward in the passage, and losing the wind, I was compelled to anchor.

Mocoda Harbor.—Is an excellent harbor for small vessels; it is formed by Duke of York Island and Mocoda Island, which is to the westward of the former. There are two entrances; the one from the north is about a mile from Point Hunter, passing between Bradley Island and Duke of York Island; it is narrow, with 18 feet of water, increasing from $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 7 fathoms inside. Strong tide in passage setting on to Bradley Island. Keep close to the corner of Duke of York Island, almost touching the trees. Water not good, and difficult to obtain.

Jesu Maria Island.—Coasted along the east side to look for a harbor; on seeing a narrow entrance through the reef, which extended $\frac{3}{4}'$ from the shore, I ran in and anchored. Holding ground good, 10 fathoms, just to the northward of a small islet on the reef, about 100 yards from the shore; barely room to swing; faces the eastward; sailing vessels find a difficulty in getting out against trade wind. Natives came alongside without any fear; seem to have seen few white men before. A fair anchorage is also to be found on the south coast; the reef has to be crossed to get to it; $2\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms water in the passage, which can be made out from the fact of the sea not breaking over it. It is about $1\frac{1}{2}'$ to the eastward of a small islet off the S.W. end of Jesu Maria. Anchorage 14 fathoms, protected to the southward by the reef; anchorage also in 32 fathoms on edge of reef on its west coast. Proceeded along a string of small islands which extend in a westerly direction from the N.W. end of Jesu Maria, all connected by reefs; seeing a small bay at the west end of the westernmost one, I ran in and anchored in 27 fathoms close to the reef. Completed with water hardly fit for drinking, but good for washing.

Admiralty Island.—On the east coast of this island there is a fair anchorage, close to a small islet, in 24 fathoms, but it is small (room for a large ship).

Anchorage also on south coast protected by reef (room for large ship).

Up to this position the navigation had been clear, but continuing along the south coast it became intricate, shoals and reefs extending some distance from the land, rendering it necessary to pilot ship from the mast-head, keeping as close to the shore as practicable, so as to be able to anchor at any time should the weather become thick or bad for seeing the reefs (there would appear to be a deep channel if passage were known). Good anchorage on the S.W. coast of this island, where I was detained for sixteen days by a heavy N.W. gale; the anchorage was open to the westward, but fortunately protected by shoals and reefs in that direction, which prevented a heavy sea getting up; part of the time I laid with three anchors down. The holding ground was admirable, and I do not think that the *Alacrity* moved her anchors the whole time. (First of the monsoon.)

On leaving the Admiralty Islands I passed out through some small islands to the westward, there being a broad clear passage, but between them and the Admiralty Island the shoals are so numerous that even in a small vessel I found some difficulty in picking my way.

From Admiralty Island shaped course for the Hermit Islands; but, owing to a strong northerly set of $26'$, made the Anchorite Islands.

Monks Islands.—I am of opinion that Monks Islands do not exist, or rather that the person who discovered them made the Anchorites to be in a different position. I must have passed almost over their position as shown on the chart, and that too at the very time I was keeping a sharp look out for land. In this opinion I am borne out by Captain Hersheim, of the German brigantine *Coeran*, who informed me that he also, coming down from the N.E., passed over the position of the Monks Islands without seeing anything of them. I came from S.E., therefore I think they are identical with the Anchorites.

Cumerson.—Appears to be correctly placed; is uninhabited.

Hermit Islands.—Sparsely inhabited; anchorage a very good one; the entrance is on the eastern side of the group; the passage generally used is on the N.W. side; then vessels lay off the town. We anchored $3\frac{1}{2}$ from it. (Anchorage for large ship; two cables passage; kind of lagoon; strong tide in passage.)

Anchorite Islands.—These islands are surrounded by a reef, through which, as far as I could see, there is no passage. Inside the reef it is all shoal water; the canoes watch their opportunity, and come out through the surf. There are five islands; three from a half to a quarter of a mile in length, and two islets. They appear to be thickly inhabited, and build most of their huts on piles in the shoal water on the reef.

Westernmost Islet of the Admiralty Islands.—Seems correctly placed on chart. About 8' east there is a reef three miles long, and as it was to the northward of me, and night was coming on, I was obliged to haul to the northward to get an offing before dark.

Los Reyes.—Consists of three small islands; as far as I could see neither island had a reef extending more than a hundred yards from it. Their position appeared to be quite correct, as also that of Vendala.

Port Prastin, New Ireland.—Seems best adapted for watering and refitting of any harbor hereabouts; the water is excellent, and easily obtained. No natives to interfere.

I experienced very dirty weather passing between the New Hebrides and Banks groups, 26th December. (Change of monsoon.)

1. Should the Government require a larger supply of any article than the quantity stated in the schedules, the contractor will be bound to supply the same at the contract rate.

2. All articles must be of the best quality of their several kinds, and all preparations or compounds are to be those of the new "British Pharmacopœia," unless otherwise specially ordered.

3. All orders for supplies under this contract will emanate from the Chief Medical Officer, or from the departments requiring the supplies, and the articles must be delivered at such place in Melbourne or Williamstown districts as may be stated in the order; and for the purposes of this contract all Government offices within a radius of six miles from the General Post Office will be deemed to be within Melbourne; and Williamstown district will include the town of Williamstown and Hobson's Bay. The goods are to be delivered free of all charges for packing, freight, cartage, &c.

4. All supplies, when delivered, must be accompanied by the order, which, when receipted, is to be rendered with the contractor's account. No supplies can be received unless accompanied by the order, and net weight or quantity only will be paid for.

5. The contractor shall, at the time of delivering the supplies, furnish his account in the prescribed form, and present it in a complete state to the Chief Medical Officer, or to the officer taking delivery of the supplies, for payment at the Treasury.

6. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supply as to the quality, the same is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the Government, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

7. If the board shall decide that the article is not of a proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense and survey fees (if any) will be deducted from the contractor's account.

8. If, from any cause, injury would accrue to the public service by waiting for a board of survey, the Chief Medical Officer, the Inspector of Stores, or the head of the department ordering the supplies (as the case may be), will have the power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality; it being understood that they will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and the contractor must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense (if any) will be charged as in condition 7.

9. A repetition of irregularity in quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding the sum of Fifty pounds, as the Government may direct, and the amount may be deducted as in condition 7. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

10. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power of attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and may be forwarded (if by post, prepaid) addressed to the Honorable the Postmaster-General, with the words "Tender for the Conveyance of Mails" endorsed on the cover, or placed in the tender-box at the General Post Office.

Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender, and every tender will be taken to include the entire service as called for. The amount of the tender must be stated in words as well as figures.

Every tender must bear the *bond fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

CORPORATION OF THE MELBOURNE HOSPITAL.

AMENDED BYE-LAWS OF THE MELBOURNE HOSPITAL, CONFIRMED AT A SPECIAL MEETING OF CONTRIBUTORS, HELD ON 16TH DAY OF MARCH 1875.

OBJECT.

1. The object of the Melbourne Hospital shall be to afford medical and surgical aid to the sick poor, and for casualties; but no person who shall be found able to pay for aid shall receive further than temporary assistance.

GOVERNORS AND THEIR PRIVILEGES.

2. Any person who shall contribute the sum of £1 per annum shall be an annual governor, or not less than £20 in one donation, shall be a life governor of the hospital, and shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings, and to recommend four out-patients in every year. And any person who shall contribute the sum of £5 per annum shall be an annual governor, or not less than £100 in one donation, shall be a life governor, and shall be entitled to two votes at all general meetings, and to recommend two in-patients and twelve out-patients in every year. And any person who shall contribute the sum of £10 per annum shall be an annual governor, or not less than £200 in one donation, shall be a life governor, and shall be entitled to three votes at all general meetings, and to recommend four in-patients and twenty out-patients in every year. And the word governor used in these bye-laws shall mean and be equivalent to the word contributor in Act 27 Victoria No. 220.

3. Any person who shall pay to the hospital in one year in one sum collections to the amount of £50 or upwards shall be enrolled a life governor, and as such shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings, and to recommend one in-patient and four out-patients in every year.

4. Any public or corporate body which shall contribute the sum of £5 annually shall be authorized to nominate some one person to be enrolled an annual governor, who shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings, and to recommend one in-patient and ten out-patients in every year, and if the contribution shall amount to £20 per annum, such nominee shall be a life governor, and be entitled to two votes at all general meetings, and to recommend two in-patients and twenty out-patients in every year.

5. The executor first named in any will through which the hospital shall receive the sum of £100 shall be enrolled a life governor, and shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings, and to recommend one in-patient and four out-patients in every year.

6. Any governor being absent from the colony of Victoria may, by power of attorney containing the necessary powers, exercise all the privileges to which he would be entitled if personally present; but such power of attorney shall be deposited with the secretary for record at least seven days before the same can be used in exercise of such privileges.

7. Every yearly subscription shall be paid in advance, and every first yearly payment shall be calculated from the date of such payment, but no such first yearly payment shall entitle to a vote at a general meeting within three months from the date of such payment.

8. The privileges of annual governors shall be suspended until all arrears are paid.

9. Every firm or partnership subscribing may exercise their privilege through some one member of such firm.

10. Persons who shall have conferred any signal benefit on the hospital, irrespective of subscription, may be elected honorary life governors at any general meeting, on the recommendation of the committee of management, and shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings, and to recommend one in-patient and five out-patients in every year.

GENERAL MEETINGS.

11. At all meetings of governors, the president, or one of the vice-presidents, or the treasurer, as the case may be, shall take the chair, but in their absence the meeting shall choose its own chairman.

12. The annual meeting of the governors to the hospital shall be held during the month of January in every year for the following purposes, viz.:-

1. The election of members of the committee of management.
2. The election of the president, vice-president, treasurer, and three auditors for the ensuing year.
3. The transaction of any other business of which due notice has been given.

13. At all general meetings of the governors, twelve shall constitute a quorum, but if no quorum be present within half an hour of the time named, such meeting shall stand adjourned for the following week, at the same day and hour.

14. It shall be competent for the committee of management, or any twenty or more of the governors, by a writing under their hands, to require the secretary to summon a special meeting. The purpose for which such meeting is called shall be specified in the requisition, and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting except that for which it shall have been summoned. Every such meeting shall be called by the secretary by advertisement in two at least of the public newspapers published in Melbourne at least one week before the day of meeting.

COMMON SEAL.

15. The common seal of the corporation shall be kept at the hospital, in a box having two different locks; one key shall be kept by the treasurer, and the other by the secretary.

16. The common seal shall not be affixed to any deed, instrument, or writing except by order of the committee of management at a meeting at which seven members at least are present, and of which notice has been given.

EXTRACTS FROM ACT OF INCORPORATION.

17. The governing committee, in whom are vested the powers and authorities of this corporation, consists of the president, two vice-presidents, and treasurer for the time being, and sixteen contributors, of whom one-fourth part may be honorary medical men on the staff of the institution.—27 Vict. No. 220, sec. 4.

18. On the second Thursday in the month of January in every year, one-third part of the elected members of the committee shall go out of office (but may nevertheless be re-elected), and the persons who shall go out of office shall be those who have been the longest in office without re-election, or where two or more shall have been in office the same length of time, then those who shall go out of office shall be determined by lot.—27 Vict. No. 220, sec. 11.

19. If any member of the committee shall die, or resign by letter under his hand addressed to the chairman of the committee, or become insolvent, or compound with his creditors, or be convicted of any treason, felony, or misdemeanor, or be absent for four consecutive meetings from the committee, his office shall become vacant, and the remaining members of the committee may declare his office vacant, and temporarily appoint thereto some contributor to such institution until the next annual meeting for the election of the committee, when the person thus temporarily appointed shall retire as one of those who, by the provisions of the said Act, are required to go out of office.—27 Vict. No. 220, sec. 12.

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

20. The committee of management may suspend any member of the honorary staff, provided that an absolute majority of the whole committee concur in such suspension, and provided that the suspension and cause thereof be reported to a general meeting of the governors to be specially convened for that purpose within two weeks after the order of suspension was made.

21. The committee of management shall direct the general business of the hospital, shall frame bye-laws, and rules for its regulation, shall have power to enter into contracts for the supply of provisions and other articles for the use of the hospital, and direct payment to be made for the same, and shall appoint and discharge all paid officers and servants.

22. A meeting of the committee of management shall be held at the hospital at three o'clock p.m. on Tuesday in each week.

23. Special meetings of the committee may be convened on the requisition of the president, or one of the vice-presidents, or of any four members of the committee, and the secretary shall give notice of the business to be transacted at such meeting, at which no other business shall be considered.

24. The committee shall present a general report of the affairs of the hospital at the meeting of governors to be held in the month of January in each year, together with a full statement of the accounts of the corporation for the preceding year, from 1st January to 31st December inclusive, duly audited.

25. Sub-committees may be appointed from time to time, at the discretion of the committee of management.

26. At the first meeting of the committee in each year, after the annual general meeting, the following sub-committees shall be appointed, viz.:-

1. A finance committee, to consist of three members.
2. A building committee, to consist of three members.
3. A drug committee to consist of three, two of whom shall be members of the honorary staff.
4. An election committee, to consist of three members.
5. A committee to manage the endowment fund and have the oversight of all property whatsoever, whether in possession, or reversion, devised or bequeathed to the institution, to consist of the treasurer for the time being, the trustee of the property in the estate of Hodgkiss, and three members of the committee of management.
27. The president, vice-president, and treasurer shall be *ex officio* members of all committees.

RULES APPLICABLE TO THE COMMITTEE.

28. The president, one of the vice-presidents, or treasurer, if present, shall preside at meetings of the committee, but in their absence the meeting shall appoint its own chairman.

29. Four members of the committee constitute a quorum.

30. The committee shall commence business as soon after the time notified as there is a sufficient number of members present to constitute a quorum; but if, at the expiry of twenty minutes from the time specified, there is not a quorum present, the meeting shall stand adjourned to the following Tuesday.

31. No business shall be entered upon until the minutes of the previous meeting have been read, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy.

32. No proposition to enact or amend a bye-law, or frame or vary any rule, shall be entertained, unless one month's previous notice has been given, and no motion to rescind a resolu-

tion shall be submitted within three months after such resolution has been passed, unless one month's notice of the same be given and such motion be passed by an absolute majority of the whole committee.

53. No motion, except on current business, shall be entertained, unless three days' notice of the same shall have been given to the secretary, who shall notify the same in the summons to each member of the committee.

GENERAL RULES.

34. At all general, special, or committee meetings, the chairman shall have a deliberative vote, and also a casting vote whenever the numbers are equal.

35. All questions at general, special, or committee meetings shall be decided by a division or show of hands.

36. All governors of the hospital are qualified to act as members of the committee of management, if elected thereto.

37. No person who shall hold any office or place of profit under the corporation, or be concerned or participate in any wise in any contract with the committee of management, or in the profit thereof, or of any work to be done under the authority of the same, shall be capable of being or continuing a member of such committee, provided that such disability shall not apply to any member of any company, partnership, or association consisting of more than ten persons, when such contract shall be entered into for the general benefit of such company, partnership, or association. But no committee man shall vote or take part in the discussion of any matter in or before the committee in which he shall directly or indirectly, by himself or his partners, have any pecuniary interest.

HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF.

38. The medical staff shall consist of eight physicians, viz.:—Four of whom shall have charge of the in-door patients, and be designated honorary physicians, and four shall have charge of the out-door patients, and be designated honorary assistant physicians.

39. Whenever an extraordinary vacancy or vacancies shall occur through death, resignation, or suspension in the office of honorary physician, the senior honorary assistant physician shall or may succeed to such vacancy or vacancies.

40. Whenever any extraordinary vacancy or vacancies shall occur in the office of honorary assistant physician, the same shall be filled up in accordance with bye-law No. 45.

41. The surgical staff shall consist of eight surgeons, four of whom shall have charge of the in-door patients, and be designated honorary surgeons; and four shall have charge of the out-door patients, and shall be designated honorary assistant surgeons.

42. Whenever an extraordinary vacancy or vacancies shall occur through death, resignation, or suspension in the office of honorary surgeon, the senior honorary assistant surgeon shall or may succeed to such vacancy or vacancies.

43. Whenever any extraordinary vacancy or vacancies shall occur in the office of honorary assistant surgeon, the same shall be filled up in accordance with bye-law No. 45.

44. The honorary staff are empowered to frame rules for the admission of medical and surgical pupils, and name the fees to be paid by such pupils, subject to the approval of the committee of management.

QUALIFICATION, ELECTION, SUSPENSION, AND REMOVAL OF HONORARY STAFF.

45. Whenever any extraordinary vacancy shall occur in the office of president, vice-president, or treasurer, or in the honorary staff, the secretary shall report the same at the next ensuing meeting of the committee of management, who shall at their next meeting direct the secretary to summon a general meeting of governors, not earlier than ten nor more than thirty days after the occurrence of such vacancy, for the election by such meeting of a successor, and shall notify the same and the names of the candidates in some one or more of the Melbourne daily papers at least on three separate days until such election has been made.

46. Every such election, if there are not more candidates than one for the same office, shall be determined by show of hands; but in the event of a contest, the election shall be determined by ballot, and the poll shall commence at Nine a.m. and close at Four o'clock p.m., and in case of an equality of votes, the chairman shall decide. Governors in the colony of Victoria must attend personally to vote.

47. No person shall be eligible for election as an honorary physician or an honorary surgeon unless he shall be registered as a legally qualified medical practitioner under any Act in force in Victoria relating to medical practitioners; or unless he shall possess (for the office of physician) a degree from some one of the universities of the United Kingdom or of the Australian Colonies or a foreign university recognised by the University of Melbourne, or a diploma from a college of physicians in the United Kingdom; and unless he shall possess (for the office of surgeon) a degree as master of surgery from some one of the aforesaid universities, or be a member or licentiate of some one college of surgeons in the United Kingdom.

48. No person shall be eligible for the office of assistant physician or assistant surgeon unless he possess a similar qualification to that required for honorary physicians or honorary surgeons.

49. Honorary physicians and surgeons, and assistant physicians and surgeons, shall only hold office until the next general election after their appointment, but on the termination of that period shall be eligible for re-election; and every honorary officer shall, on his election to office, sign the by-laws and rules as an acknowledgement that he will observe the same.

50. Honorary medical officers shall not absent themselves from the hospital for more than ten consecutive days without the leave of the committee; and if they do so for four con-

secutive weeks without such leave, the committee of management may suspend such officer, and report the same, as provided for in bye-law 20.

51. Candidates for any honorary medical or surgical appointment shall forward their qualifications to the secretary, who shall lay them before the committee of management four days, at least before the day of election, and the same shall be referred to the election committee, and such election committee shall make a written report thereon to the committee of management at their next sitting; provided, nevertheless, that the absence of any such report shall not prevent the election taking place.

52. Honorary officers having served in that capacity for ten years shall be entitled to the position of honorary consulting physicians and surgeons, as the case may be.

AUDITORS.

53. The accounts of the hospital shall be audited prior to the annual meeting in the month of January in every year, by two at least of the auditors, who shall sign a statement of accounts exhibiting a summary of receipts and expenditure.

FINANCE COMMITTEE.

54. On the first Tuesday of each month (or such other times as the committee may appoint), the finance committee shall examine all accounts for disbursements, and certify as to their correctness, and also see that the money received by the collectors, as checked by the secretary, has been paid into bank to the credit of the hospital.

ACCOUNTS.

55. All sums received on account of the hospital shall be paid into the Bank of New South Wales, or such other bank as the committee of management may appoint, to one or other of the following accounts as the case may be, viz.:—

Melbourne Hospital Maintenance Fund.	
" " Building Fund.	
" " Convalescent Fund.	
" " Endowment Fund.	

56. All bequests made to the institution shall be paid to a separate fund, to be called the Endowment Fund, due regard being had to the conditions under which such bequests are made. And all such moneys shall be invested from time to time in such manner as the committee shall direct. The interest of such endowment fund may be available for the maintenance of the institution.

57. All accounts, before they are discharged, shall be submitted to the finance committee, who shall certify as to their correctness.

58. All payments shall be made by order of the committee of management.

59. All cheques shall be signed by the chairman of the committee of management, countersigned by the treasurer and two members of the finance committee.

ADMISSION OF IN-PATIENTS AND OUT-PATIENTS.

60. Patients are admitted on Tuesdays and Fridays, at Half-past Eleven o'clock.

61. All sick persons are admissible as in-patients on the recommendation of a governor, provided they appear to the committee of management as proper objects of charity, and that the physician or surgeon of the week reports that they are likely to receive benefit by treatment in the hospital.

62. Accidents and cases of emergency are at all times admissible without letters of recommendation, where delay might prove dangerous.

63. The committee may admit articleed seamen on payment of 25s. per week, or in that proportion, on the order of the shipping master of the port, countersigned by the captain or agent of the vessel, in accordance with an agreement made with the Government.

64. No lunatic, or person having the small-pox, or person suffering from delirium tremens, chronic epilepsy, or from ulcerated legs of long standing, or pregnant female for the purpose of confinement, or person whose case might be equally relieved as an out-patient, shall be deemed to be a proper case for admission as an in-patient.

65. Whenever the applications for admission are more than can be accommodated in the house, the most urgent cases only will be admitted.
