REGULATIONS FOR REFINING OPIUM IN BOND.

THE accompanying Regulations for Refining Opium in Bond, which have been approved by His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, in Council, in accordance with the 9th section of the Act 38 Vict. No. 503, are published for general information.

1. The refining of opium in bond will be allowed for home consumption or exportation upon the following conditions:—
2. Applications to be made in writing, specifying the building in which it is desired that refining opium in bond shall be carried on.
3. The buildings shall be subject to the approval of the Commissioner of Trade and Customs. The refining-house shall be capable of being secured under the locks of the Customs department as well as all other places for the storage of opium above mentioned.
4. The proprietor or occupier shall provide, at his own cost, all such locks and weighing-machines as the Collector of

Customs may require, and a suitable "Locker's Office," and shall keep the same in good repair.

5. Opium may be transferred from any bonded warehouse to the refining-house, into which it must be weighed, and a correct account thereof kept by the officer in charge; but at no time shall there be more than one hundred and sixty pounds stored in the refining house inclusive of the raw opium and opium in process of being refined or packed.

6. The refined opium, when repacked, must at once be replaced in a bonding warehouse, and residue must be placed in a store appointed for the purpose; and none of the residue shall be removed except it be destroyed to the satisfaction of the landing surveyor.

7. The refined opium must be repacked into tins without any brand or mark thereon, unless with the special approval of the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, and only in whole or complete packages, each containing not less than forty-five pounds net weight.

8. The hours to be observed for the refining of opium and for receiving and delivering opium or residue for home consumption or exportation shall be the same as in bonding warehouses.

9. The men employed in the refining house to be searched when deemed necessary by the locker or other proper officer of customs.

MANAGER OF A COMMON-TOLL ROAD.

THE Administrator of the Government in Council, on the 22nd March 1875, made the following arrangement with reference to the Common-toll Road hereinafter mentioned, under the provisions of the Act 38 Vict. No. 506, § 434, viz.:-

EDWARD LUCAS

having been appointed by the Local Bodies interested Manager (vice John Keys, whose term of office has expired) of the portion of the Point Nepean road appointed a Common-toll road under Order in Council of 8th February 1864; he shall, upon the last day of each calendar month, receive from the collectors and lessees of all tolls upon such portion of road, and upon the bridges thereon, all moneys collected by them as and for such tolls, or due by them as the rents thereof; and shall once in every month distribute the tolls so payable and collected amongst the local bodies interested therein, in the proportions prescribed by Order in Council of 26th August 1870; such appointment to be in force from 1st of January to 31st of December 1875.

There is a marked improvement in the general health of the districts this week. Of the 108 deaths 56 or nearly 52 per cent. were children not exceeding the age of 3 years, of which there were 37, or 34 per cent., under 1 year; and 19, or 17 per cent., of the ages of 1 to 3 years; the principal causes of mortality among them being diarrhoea, and dysentery, and measles, but the latter is decidedly on the decline. Two cases of diphtheria and one of typhoid fever are reported from Richmond. In South Melbourne ten of the deaths occurred in public institutions, in Prahran three occurred in the Hospital, and in Kew four occurred in the Lunatic Asylum.

REEF OFF LIBAN, OR BABI, FLORES SEA.

CAPTAIN PARK, of the mail steamer *Normanby*, reports having struck upon a reef extending some three quarters of a mile from the southern end of Liban, or Babi. The position of the vessel when aground was as follows:—

Detached rock off south end of island N. 55° E.

Western point of island just open of S.W. point N. 7° W.

This reef, which is not laid down on the chart, was steep to, having a depth of 20 fathoms within half a cable. It was covered at low-water, and appeared to extend also for some distance from the western side of the island.

A break was also observed on what appeared to be a sunken rock, lying about 3 miles to the eastward of the southern point of the island.

discharged, shall be liable to the storage charges aforesaid, or to be removed from the ground within twelve hours after the truck is discharged, or to be warehoused, or to be sold at the cost and risk of the said consignee. And no claims shall be recognized by the Department on account of trucks unloaded for which no receipts have been given; and after receipts have been given, the lessee or consignee shall be bound to observe the regulations as to gate passes.

9. No carts will be allowed to pass away loaded from the said lower-level sidings unless the carter produce to the gate-keeper, and leave with him, a gate pass signed by the consignee, showing the nature, ownership, and amount of the loading. The gate pass must be on forms which will be supplied by the Department on application. When the consignee, being absent from the sidings, sends a carter only, he must provide him beforehand with a signed gate pass, to show that the carter is the authorized agent of the consignee, and to enable the carter to pass the gate. In the case of lessees who are not present, but have always their men on the ground, they must notify the Department in writing as to the persons authorized to sign gate passes for them, and on such signature loads will be passed out on their account.

10. At other than store allotments, storage upon consignments not removed will commence to accrue twelve hours after the truck is discharged; but at any time after the expiry of the said twelve hours the department may, without any notice, sell the said consignments, or remove the same to a timber-yard, warehouse, or store, there to be held at the cost and risk of the owner. And this rule will apply to the property of lessees should consignments, through their default, be delivered upon other than store allotments; and all consignments delivered upon the said lower-level sidings, whether upon store or other allotments, shall be absolutely at the risk of the consignee immediately the truck is unloaded, in respect of any damage or loss that may arise or accrue with reference to the said consignments until the removal of the same by the consignee, and independently of whether a receipt has been given or railway charges have been paid to the department.

11. Occupiers of lots for short firewood will be required either to provide skids, so that trucks consigned to them, which are placed for discharge on the 24' level marked on plan, may be unloaded therefrom without injury to the embankment, or they must in the first instance cover over the embankment from top to bottom with their consignments of short firewood, and allow a certain portion to remain covering the bank permanently, so as to shield it from injury.

IN pursuance of the 64th section of *The Scab Act 1870*, the Governor in Council has revoked all previous Orders relating to the Quarantine Districts hereinafter mentioned, and has ordered that the portions of Victoria whereof the boundaries are hereinafter described shall be Quarantine Districts within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:-

Pursuant to Orders of 23 December 1874.

TENDERS are hereby invited, and will be received until Noon of Thursday the eighth day of April 1875, for the Conveyance of Post Office Mails as undermentioned, from the 1st July 1875 to 30th June 1876.

The covers of Tenders for these services must be endorsed "Tenders for First Call."

Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and may be forwarded (if by post, prepaid) addressed to the Honorable the Postmaster-General, with the words "Tender for the Conveyance of Mails" endorsed on the cover, or placed in the tender-box at the General Post Office.

Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender, and every tender will be taken to include the entire service as called for. The amount of the tender must be stated in words as well as figures.

Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfillment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

The money deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them on application, on the bond and contract being completed.

The money deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them on application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts, but not otherwise.

In the event of a portion of railway affecting any particular service being opened for traffic during period of contract, and it being decided that the mails shall be conveyed by rail, the place of departure for the mail coaches shall be altered in such way as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct; a rateable reduction shall be made in the amount paid for the service as then rendered by the contractors, such reduction to be computed on the basis of the average mileage rate of the lump tender or the average mileage rate of the single tender, in whichever form the tender may be accepted.

NINETY-NINE SERVICES.

TENDERS are hereby invited, and will be received until Noon of Thursday the fifteenth day of April 1875, for the Conveyance of Post Office Mails as undermentioned, from the 1st July 1875 to 30th June 1876.

The covers of Tenders for these services must be endorsed "Tenders for Second Call."

Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and may be forwarded (if by post, prepaid) addressed to the Honorable the Postmaster-General, with the words "Tender for the Conveyance of Mails" endorsed on the cover, or placed in the tender-box at the General Post Office.

Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender, and every tender will be taken to include the entire services as called for. The amount of the tender must be stated in words as well as figures.

Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

The money deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, on the bond and contract being completed.

The money deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them on application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts, but not otherwise.

In the event of a portion of railway affecting any particular service being opened for traffic during period of contract, and it being decided that the mails shall be conveyed by rail, the place of departure for the mail coaches shall be altered in such way as the Postmaster-General may from time to time

direct; a rateable reduction shall be made in the amount paid for the service as then rendered by the contractors, such reduction to be computed on the basis of the average mileage rate of the lump tender or the average mileage rate of the single tender, in whichever form the tender may be accepted.

Persons tendering are requested to state the description of the vehicle they intend to use, and the number of horses by which it is to be drawn.

A separate tender must be sent in for each service; but notwithstanding this condition, any offer will be entertained for the performance of any number of services for a lump sum. The number of the service or services tendered for must be plainly endorsed on the outside of the cover and on the tender itself.

The tender of any person failing to comply with the foregoing conditions will not be entertained.

The general conditions referred to in the printed form of tender, and upon which the tender is to be made, can be inspected by persons proposing to tender, either at the General Post Office or at any post office in the colony.

The attention of tenderers is drawn to the condition which requires that in cases where vehicles are used Members of Parliament shall be conveyed free of charge between the districts they represent and the districts in which they reside and Melbourne.

The contractor shall not be entitled to claim any extra payment on account of the removal of any Post Office during the term of his contract, unless such removal shall increase the distance to be travelled by such contractor on any one day to the extent of one mile.
