The births of 625 children, viz., 345 boys and 280 girls, were registered in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of February. In the month of January 724 births were registered, or 99 more than in the month under review.

The deaths in February numbered 633, viz., 339 of males and 294 of females; the deaths thus exceeded the births by 8. The deaths were fewer than those in January by 359, but were in excess of the average of February during the previous ten years by 240. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have exceeded the average of those ten years by 150 only.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the month was 100.3° on the 3rd, and the lowest was 45.6° on the 2nd. The mean temperature of the month (65.0°) was about two-thirds of a degree below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (48.6°) took place on the 2nd, viz., from a maximum of 93.6° to a minimum of 45.0°. The least range (4.2°) was on the 22nd, viz., from a maximum of 65.2° to a minimum of 61.0°. The mean daily range was 21.4°. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.899 inches) was a little above the average.

Males contributed 54 per cent. and females 46 per cent. to the mortality of the month. The deaths of children who had not attained the age of 5 years, amounted to 63 per cent. of the whole as against 54 per cent. in February 1874; 53 per cent. in February 1873; 56 per cent. in February 1872; 65 per cent. in February 1871; 55 per cent. in February 1870; 60 per cent. in February 1869; 57 per cent. in February 1868; 74 per cent. in February 1867; 58 per cent. in February 1866; and 64 per cent. in February 1865.

Only three persons of the age of 75 years or upwards died during the month, viz.:—A female aged 75, of mortification from ossification of an artery; a farmer aged 81 of disease of the brain; and a miller aged 86 of old age. The first and last of these deaths took place in the Benevolent Asylum.

Eighteen deaths from external causes occurred during the month, of which 14 were set down as accidental, and 4 as suicidal. The particulars are as follow:—A plumber aged 22 died of the effects of injuries received by a scaffold falling; a laborer aged 29 died of fracture of the skull resulting from the kick of a horse; a carter aged 42 was killed by being run over by a dray; a cab-driver aged 65 was killed by falling down stairs whilst in a state of intoxication; a female infant aged 9 days died of umbilical hemorrhage; two females aged respectively 22 and 40 died of burns, the former from her dress catching fire; a cab-driver aged 48, and a ship's steward aged 37, died of insolation; four persons were accidentally drowned, viz.:—a butcher aged 25 in the Saltwater River; a carter aged 48, and a male of occupation not stated aged 56 at Brunswick, and a miner aged 48 in the Yarra; a female aged 22 was suffocated by smoke; a baker aged 71 drowned himself in the Yarra; a cab-driver aged 29 hanged himself whilst suffering from delirium tremens; a painter aged 72 strangled himself whilst in a state of temporary insanity resulting from intemperance; and a female servant aged 24 threw herself from a window whilst of unsound mind.

Sixty-six deaths, or 10½ per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—38 in the Melbourne Hospital; 8 in the Immigrants' Home; 1 in the Children's Hospital; 8 in the Alfred Hospital; 4 in the Lying-in-Hospital; 5 in the Benevolent Asylum; 1 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum; 8 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum; 1 in the Melbourne Gaol; and 1 in the Industrial School.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 401, of which 209, or 52 per cent., were of males; and 192, or 48 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 202 were under one year of age, 142 were between one and two, 30 were between two and three, 13 were between three and four, and 14 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 232. Of these, 130, or 56 per cent., were males and 102, or 44 per cent., were females; 21 were between five and ten, 8 were between ten and fifteen, 16 were between fifteen and twenty, 19 were between twenty and twenty-five, 15 were between twenty-five and thirty, 20 were between thirty and thirty-five, 14 were between thirty-five and forty, 28 were between forty and forty-five, 16 were between forty-five and fifty, 19 were between fifty and fifty-five, 14 were between fifty-five and sixty, 11 were between sixty and sixty-five, 16 were between sixty-five and seventy, 12 were between seventy and seventy-five, 1 was between seventy-five and eighty, 2 were upwards of eighty.

Zymotic diseases caused 308 deaths as against 511 in January, 320 in December. The most fatal complaint under this head was measles, then diarrhoea, then dysentery, and then typhoid fever. The following deaths have been set down to these complaints since October last, that being the month in which measles in a fatal form first appeared.

Deaths from diseases of the nervous system fell from 118 in January to 53 in the month under review, and deaths from atrophy and debility fell from 60 to 42. Eight deaths occurred from childbirth and metria, or 1 to every 78 births registered. Deaths from phthisis numbered 36, a number greater than that in January (32), but still scarcely up to the average.

QUARANTINE DISTRICTS UNDER "THE SCAB ACT 1870."

IN pursuance of the 64th section of *The Scab Act 1870*, the Governor in Council has revoked all previous Orders relating to the Quarantine Districts hereinafter mentioned, and has ordered that the portions of Victoria whereof the boundaries are hereinafter described shall be Quarantine Districts within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:—

Pursuant to Orders of 23 December 1874.

BRENNANAH QUARANTINE DISTRICT.—(including Brennanah and Coyoora Springs runs).—Commencing at the north-west angle of Catto's run; thence by that run south-easterly to the northern boundary of the Glenalbyn run; thence by that run westerly and southerly to the Kingower run; thence by the northern and western boundaries of that run to the Boaliba run; thence by the northern and western boundaries of that run; westerly and southerly to the eastern boundary of the Avoca Forest East run; thence by that run north-westerly to the southern boundary of the Spring Hill run; thence by that run north-easterly and northerly to the southern boundary of Torpichen run; thence by that run north-easterly to Powlett's Plains run; and thence by that run, and the Salisbury Plains run, south-easterly to the point of commencement.

MANSFIELD QUARANTINE DISTRICT.—Commencing at the source of the Howqua River in Mount Howitt; thence down that river to Tarika run; thence by the eastern boundary of that run to Jamieson River; thence down that river to Goulburn River; thence down that river to its junction with the Delatite River; thence up that river to Wappan run; thence by the south-western boundary of that run to Borodomanan South run; thence by the southern boundary of that run to Miller's Ponds run; thence by the eastern boundaries of that run and the Kathkin run to the Goulburn River; thence down that river to Balham Hill run; thence by the eastern boundaries of that run, Killingworth, Murrindindi East, Island, and Muddy Creek A runs to the Main Dividing Range; and thence by that range easterly and northerly to the point of commencement: Provided always that the Upper Thornton run shall form no part of said quarantine district.

POSTLETHWAITE OR BALESTON QUARANTINE DISTRICT.—Commencing at the point where the southern boundary of the Protectorate run abuts on the Goulburn River; thence by the southern boundaries of that run and the Waranga run, the south-eastern boundary of Colbinabbin South run, and by the northern and eastern boundaries of Cherrington run to Comp-ton's Creek run; thence by the northern boundary of that run to the Goulburn River; and thence down that river to the commencing point.

POWLETT'S PLAINS QUARANTINE DISTRICT (including Powlett's Plains run).—Commencing at a point on the River Loddon, being the north-east angle of allotment 62, parish of Kinypaniel; thence southerly along the said River Loddon to the northernmost angle of the Salisbury Plains run; thence westerly and southerly to the northernmost boundary of the Brennanah run; thence westerly along the said boundary to the eastern boundary of the Torpichen run; thence northerly along the said boundary to the southernmost boundary of the Edgar Plains run; and thence easterly to the point of commencement.

PROTECTORATE QUARANTINE DISTRICT (including Protectorate run).—Commencing at the north-east angle of Waranga run; on the west by that run; on the south by Postlethwaite run on the east by the Goulburn River for about seven miles; thence by a line running north-west to the commencing point.

SANDHURST DISTRICT, FREEHOLD PROPERTIES IN THE Parish of Powlett—Clancy.—Comprising allotments 10 and 12, lying on the north side of the main road from Salisbury Plains pre-emptive right to Kinypaniel in the county of Gladstone.

It will be noticed that the births and deaths are about equal, but no particular epidemic is reported to account for the large number of the latter. Of the 146 deaths 63, or 47·2 per cent. were children not exceeding 3 years; 39, or 26·7 per cent. being under the age of 1 year; and 30, or 20·5 per cent. being of the ages of 1 to 3 years. Among the children bowel affections appear to have made the most ravage, and several deaths have occurred from measles and the supervening diseases. Three children in one family are reported to have died from diphtheria in Collingwood. In South Melbourne 12 deaths occurred in charitable institutions, in Prahran 1 occurred in the Hospital, and in Kew 2 occurred in the Asylum.

Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and may be forwarded (if by post, prepaid) addressed to the Honorable the Postmaster-General, with the words "Tender for the Conveyance of Mails" endorsed on the cover, or placed in the tender-box at the General Post Office.

Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender, and every tender will be taken to include the entire service as called for. The amount of the tender must be stated in words as well as figures.

Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

The money deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, on the bond and contract being completed.

The money deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them on application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts, but not otherwise.

In the event of a portion of railway affecting any particular service being opened for traffic during period of contract, and it being decided that the mails shall be conveyed by rail, the place of departure for the mail coaches shall be altered in such way as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct; a rateable reduction shall be made in the amount paid for the service as then rendered by the contractors, such

reduction to be computed on the basis of the average mileage rate of the lump tender or the average mileage rate of the single tender, in whichever form the tender may be accepted.

Persons tendering are requested to state the description of the vehicle they intend to use, and the number of horses by which it is to be drawn.

The contractor shall not be entitled to claim any extra payment on account of the removal of any Post Office during the term of his contract, unless such removal shall increase the distance to be travelled by such contractor on any one day to the extent of one mile.

Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

Every tender must be accompanied by a bank deposit-receipt for a sum equal to *TEN PER CENT.* of the amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; the money to be lodged to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete, within ten days of the date of notice being given of the acceptance of his tender, the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

The money deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, on the bond and contract being completed.

The money deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts, but not otherwise.

In the event of a portion of railway affecting any particular service being opened for traffic during period of contract, and it being decided that the mails shall be conveyed by rail, the place of departure for the mail coaches shall be altered in such way as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct; a rateable reduction shall be made in the amount paid for the service as then rendered by the contractors, such reduction to be computed on the basis of the average mileage rate of the lump tender or the average mileage rate of the single tender, in whichever form the tender may be accepted.
